# UNRRA Urged To Seek Aid FromUNGroup

### LaGuardia Says No Funds Left To Prolong Life Of World Relief Organization

GENEVA, Switzerland, LaGuardia today told the UNRRA Policy Committee that there are no funds to prolong the life of the international relief agency. He declared that UNERA should make specific recommendations to the United Nations for relief and rehabili-

With this declaration, Latiunrilia intervened in a committee debate a debate in which American and British members and a Russian group had become locked in an agument over continuing UN RRA beyond the present program.

The Polish delegation had sug-November. The flussian delegation urged that UNRRA aid be constinued through 1947. A Canadian resolution urged that responsibility for supply operations next year be handed to the United Nations, and that the committee submit definite recommendations to UN fer carrying on the UNit RA program.

The Canadian Resolution won the support of the United States which carries the greater part of UNRRA expenditures. It also won support from Great Britain, Cuba. What is it that has caused the Holland and New Zealand Czechoslowakia, Yugoslavia, the Soviet

### A Matter Of Morals

What happens to a nation when it loses all sense of moral values is shown by the tragedy of France which emerged from the first World War by far the most powerful nation on the continent of Europe, and following two decades of fabulous prosperity, political corruption and moral degeneracy, slumped into a fourth rate power where it had neither the courage, the strength, or the character to make even a respectable showing in the defense of its own borders.

Now that the war is over there seems to be very little indication that the cause of France's downfall is fully appreciated by her own people or that her sufferings have yet restored her moral fibre. Georges Bernanos, writing in Les Letters Francaises, is quoted by This Week as saying that the crisis of the French nation in every domain of thought and activity resolves itself more and more into a moral crisis.

Emphasizing the increase in gambling, prostitution, and black market operations since the Occupation, Bernanos declares that nowhere has the moral decline provoked more consternation than in the field of academic training where university examination papers are sold on the eve of baccalaureate tests at upwards of ten thousand francs, and men are being admitted into the practice of medicine, law and similar professions

on the basis of knowledge gained on the black market. That we in America are not entirely above such low forms of corruption was shown last week by the Tampa Tribune which disclosed that a so-called "Southfern University" has inaugurated a "diploma racket" where college certificates for any type of training under the sun can be procured by anyone for a price. A man with a sixth grade education was cited as having had conferred upon himself the degree of "Doctor of Naturopathy," while another of similar educational attainments was graduated as a "Doctor of Divinity."

Scarcely one rung tower on the ladder of dellinquency is the practice of cheating in public schools. Although most of our public schools have long since been put on the honor system wherein a student pledges Does excessive perspiration in himself not to cheat on examinations, the impression hot summer weather makes you widely prevails that more and more high schools and feel weak? HAPIA, Aug. 13 (A)—An uncasy calm has returned to the ancient port city of Halfa in Palestine, but the trouble there may not yet be over. Order was finally restored by British troops after crowds of angry Jews rioled in the streets for several hours.
