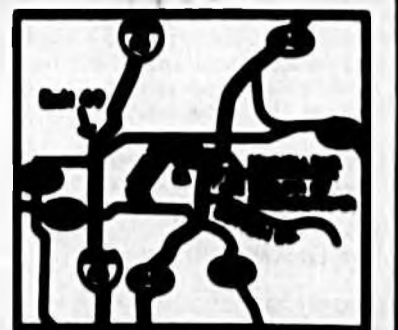

Mayor: Disband waterfront group

SANFORD — Members of the city's Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee held Wednesday what members felt would be their final meeting.

At the start of the Steering Committee meeting, Sanford Mayor Linda Kuhn told members she would recommend at the next City Commission meeting that the committee be disbanded or possibly restructured.

In straightforward language, the mayor told committee members that

their activity has been problematic and redundant.

"It's redundant in that this is an advisory board to an advisory board," she said referring to the Steering Committee's relationship with the Community Redevelopment Agency, or CRA.

Kuhn said her decision was based in part on recommendations by former City Manager Al Grieshaber.

"The CRA is also in concurrence that perhaps this is not the best entity to advise them," Kuhn said during the Wednesday meeting at City Hall.

She also indicated that this may not be the only advisory group or committee to be disbanded or changed.

Steering Committee members acknowledged strong opinions against the fort playground proposed for Fort Mellon Park. They want a comprehen-

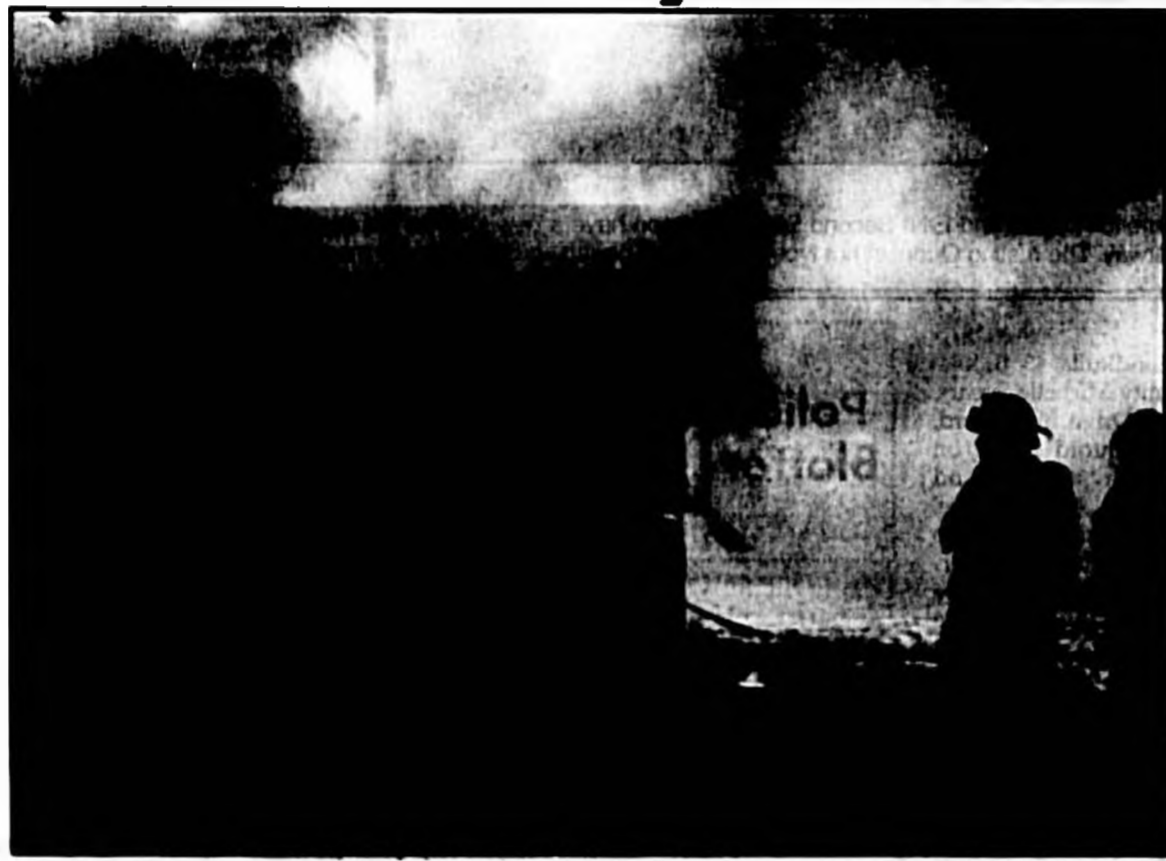
sive plan for the park, which they consider the jewel of Sanford.

That has led to animosity between them and supporters of the yet to be named playground.

Some committee members were pleased to hear Kuhn say Sanford needs a landscape architect to look at Fort Mellon Park and to follow what the community wants to do

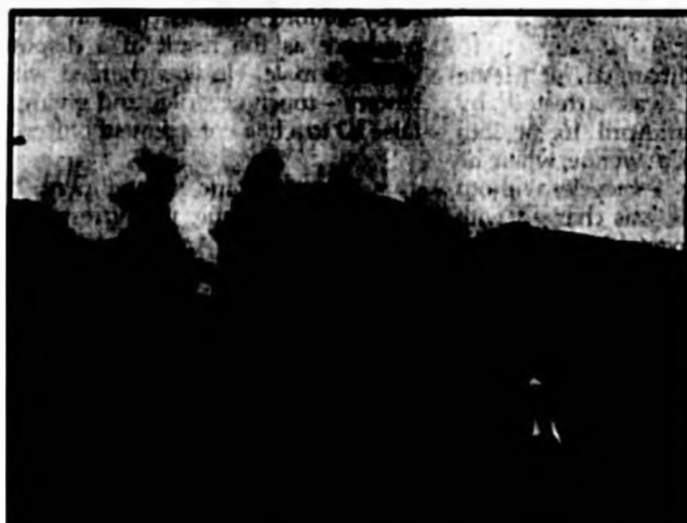

Officer sees SUV run over man on 17-92

SANFORD — At press time Friday, Sanford police arrested two men and charged them with second degree murder after they threw a man into French Avenue following an altercation early Thursday morning.

Robert L. Bagley, 45, of 1204 Golden Gate Circle, Sanford died after being run over by an SUV not long after Michael L. Charron, 20, and Lavert Jerome West left him in the street.

Police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen said Charron and West entered the nearby Smokers Express store, made a purchase and left. They had a confrontation with Bagley outside. Bagley was punched and thrown into the road. Bagley's assailants took off running, Cohen said.

Sanford police Officer Talton Kenton witnessed the SUV run over Bagley.

Kenton had just responded to a call of a man down on 17-92 near 19th Street. He saw Bagley lying across the road in the northbound lane of 17-92. Bagley's head faced southbound.

Bagley died less than two hours later just after 3 a.m. at Central Florida Regional Hospital.

A police report said Bagley apparently died from the injuries received from the crash.

Willie J. Wilson, 43, of Sanford was arrested and charged with hit and run from a scene involving a death and driving on a suspended license. Other charges are pending and are likely since Wilson admitted that he smoked crack cocaine before the incident.

"I notified dispatch of my finding, and simultaneously, an unidentified black SUV struck the black male, and dragged him approximately 20 feet under the vehicle as it was traveling northbound," Kenton wrote in his report.

Manager looks to build trust

SANFORD — New interim City Manager V. Eugene Miller believes adults say the darndest things.

Although Miller has been on the job just a few days, he said he is spending time getting to know the city staff.

Miller's management philosophy is taken in part from an Art Linkletter and Bill Cosby saying.

"Kids say the darndest things. Well, adults say the darndest things, and they act that way," Miller said. "That's normal. That's just the way it is and you just have to expect that. Do your best to try to understand that, and understand that everyone's a good person. Everyone is a good person. Emphasize that."

Miller, who has 37 years

experience as a city manager in seven cities in six different states believes elected officials are truly interested in the betterment of their community.

"You just emphasize that point," Miller said. "And, you just keep reminding them — betterment of the community. Yes, yes, yes. You've got agreement, and you've got enthusiasm. Then, when you go into the nitty-gritty details, into maybe some different thinking of how do we get there, let's just

Local men say car thefts out of control in Sanford

SANFORD — A Sanford auto theft victim wants to know what is being done by law enforcement and the courts to stop a group he refers to as, the "jump-out boys."

According to D&J Auto Shop owner, Darren Jones, his shop on Elm Avenue has had a number of vehicles stolen. He said the juveniles who began stealing cars out of his shop referred to themselves as a gang.

"The jump-out boys—something like that," Jones said.

The only well-known reference to "jump-out boys" or "jump-out gang" dates back to the late 80s when police officers formed a squad called the jump-out squad, boys, or gang. The purpose of this squad was undercover anti-drug teams, and was dubbed "jump-out" for the way the officers quickly exited their unmarked vehicles to



apprehend unsuspecting criminals.

Similarly, in many of the arrest reports from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Sanford Police Department and Winter Springs Police Department, the auto theft suspects "jump-out" of the cars when they are caught.

"It's just a mess and something needs to be done about it," said Stearnon Williams, who has

had his car stolen twice this year from his home on East 20th Street in Sanford.

Some of the juveniles arrested in January for a string of car thefts continue to steal cars. One juvenile, after being arrested in January and in March for grand theft auto, was released by the juvenile justice center a few days before he turned 18.

Dwayne D. Russell was arrested for the third time this year on April 9, three days after his 18th birthday, for grand theft auto charges. He is now in the hands of the Orange County Corrections facility.

According to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, they are not familiar with any gang called the jump-out boys. Sanford did have a car theft gang back in 1999, called the Min boys, said spokesman Steve Olson.

On Nov. 24, 1999, the City/County Auto Theft Task

Not smart, Art (Part II): I enjoy pushing the limits in this column each week. Doing that, however, comes with the same risk as giving teenage boys keys to the Corvette: sooner or later there is going to be a spectacular high-speed crash.

In last week's column I chastised District 1 City Commissioner Art Woodruff for filing a formal complaint with the Florida Elections Commission against Bernard Mitchell, Woodruff's opponent in the March 29 run-off election. In that column I accused Art of asking a city employee to procure a car from a local dealership for his church group to use during the last year's Christmas Parade. I had the information from two separate sources, but my allegation was wrong.

The fault lies with me, not the sources. In one case I made an assumption I shouldn't have. In the other, I just flat out misunderstood the information.

It was my mistake, and I apologize.

Part of my confusion comes from the 2003 Christmas parade. Art did procure a vehicle for another non-profit group, Tajiri Arts. In that case, he paid for the car and the group's entry fee.

Like I said, when I run it off the road, I do it full speed. I apologize to Art and his church group for my mistake.

That said, I'm not backing off my contention that Art needs to offer his own mea culpa to Bernard Mitchell. Why does Art need to apologize? Because by filing a formal complaint with the state, Art is dragging Bernard's good name through the mud for no reason. In addition, Art is guilty of some of the same violations he's accusing Bernard of.

Art asserts that Bernard is guilty of three violations:

- Using an unauthorized photo of Police Chief Brian Tooley in a campaign ad.

- Failing to file a written authorization that supporters would make telemarketing calls on his behalf.

- Allowing the telemarketers to refer to themselves as a neighbor's mom from down the street.

Not exactly election-changing violations, but violations still the same. Art's campaign has similar faults. For instance, one of Art's ads prior to the general election took parts of The Herald's endorsement of his campaign and used them out of context. The meaning of the quotes changed only slightly, but still they were a misrepresentation of The Herald's original intent. I noticed it and mentioned it to Art, but I didn't think it rose to the level of a campaign violation.

In addition, Art freely admits that he did not file the proper paperwork prior to his campaign making their own telemarketing call.

"None of us knew about it," Woodruff said. "Nobody filed the proper paperwork."

If none of the candidates filed the paperwork, why should Bernard be singled out for prosecution? Art knew when he filed the complaint that he was guilty of the same offense.

In explaining his reasons for filing a formal complaint, Art said, "It was a matter of, I think, the election laws should be followed and enforced." That's a hollow excuse, but I'm still smarting from last week's high-speed crash, so I'm not going to express some of my more cynical thoughts about Art's motives.

Whatever the reasons, Art needs to find a way to move past this debacle. Politicians are elected to get things accomplished. Art is going to have a hard time getting much accomplished if his constituents and his colleagues on the commission question his motives.

You shouldn't drag this out much longer, Art. I've made my apology. It's time for you to live up to your campaign advertisements that promise "Leadership, Service, Integrity" and do the same.

brush aside a little bit and refocus on what we want to be. It works."

On Tuesday, Miller took his position and the first thing he did was meet the office staff to talk about some of his personal habits and preferences in daily routines. He then met with some department heads, who dropped by as a courtesy.

"Just, kind of, get the lay of the land, so to speak, of the city," Miller said.

The city staff then had a staff meeting in the afternoon, where Miller made sure he said the things that came to mind about his philosophies and style before the staff knew him at all.

"I want total, factual, I guess also, open communication. I want to know what's going on in their organizations, what they see, and their perspective on some of the things that are coming up that are going to be important for the city," Miller said.

He also let them know what he didn't like.

"I told them I don't like surprises and I want to know what they have in mind rather than hearing about it," Miller said.

According to Miller, the city needs to build trust. He said that was essential and by building that trust an outgrowth of communication will happen.

"People who trust one another are going to communicate more freely. And when that happens, good is going to come from it," Miller said.

Miller emphasized that because there are a lot of ongoing projects in the city he doesn't want the city to be slowed down by the transition.

"I'd rather have the opposite, to expedite projects," Miller said. "I want to do everything possible to illustrate to the citizens ... that we don't intend, in anyway, to slow progress or slow

"I want total, factual, I guess also, open communication."

down projects. We want to go out of our way to illustrate that we're improving in everything that we do."

From Miller's 41 total years of experience, he has gained a lot of knowledge of the do's and don'ts. He said he's learned to ask questions, especially when it comes to local traditions.

"Why are we doing it this way?" Miller said. "And, that's what I intend to do here. Even though things are happening and [people] say that's the way it is here. I'm going to say, 'Well why?'"

That thought process, he said, could jumpstart fresh thoughts and ideas from commissioners, the mayor and citizens about what they want for the community.

"If you start that process and spread it in the community, good things come from it," Miller said.

Miller retired in late 2000. He spent some of his time, in between interim positions, traveling with his wife Janet. They traveled Route 66.

"We did the whole distance from Chicago all the way to L.A.," Miller said. "It was very interesting to see the old route and some of the places that still exist; many that are boarded up or gone. It's a history trip. I enjoyed it immensely."

They enjoyed the road trip so much, that just this past spring, the couple took another trip off the main interstate systems to visit his

stepdaughter in Houston. On the trip they traveled through central Arkansas, central Mississippi, and through Alabama and Georgia.

"We're kind of hooked on the old back roads type of trips through the U.S. We're going to continue that as long as we possibly can move around," Miller said.

Before taking the position, Miller said he and his wife had spent "many Saturdays" in downtown Sanford at the antique stores, but other than that he had not subscribed to anything but the Daytona News Journal.

"If you mention a name that should arouse some attention, I don't know that. I don't know those names, so I guess that's the way I'm approaching the job as city manager. I don't know anybody. I'll build respect from those people I hope—mutually," Miller said. "We'll see how it goes."

Reverse 9-1-1 from Ormond reaches Sanford in error

SANFORD — The City of Sanford has received notification of a "Reverse 9-1-1" alert from the Ormond Beach police department, in error.

The alert was supposed to be confined to Volusia County and the Ormond Beach area. However, a wide area of Seminole County and Sanford has received this Reverse 9-1-1 ALERT IN ERROR.

There is NO chlorine gas leak in the City of Sanford.

Therefore, City of Sanford residents do not have to follow the standard precautionary measures as it pertains to a "gas chlorine leak."

Those measures include, staying indoors, closing windows, and turning off air conditioners until the gas dissipates.

In the event of actual chlorine leak in Sanford, residents will be informed via the Reverse 9-1-1 system, and news media releases.

This information will include contact information from Seminole County public Safety and the City of Sanford Fire Departments.

The city of Sanford Utility Department is currently transitioning from using chlorine

gas to liquid chlorine in the water and wastewater treatment process.

Liquid chlorine is safer to use because it does not release to the air. This new project will be completed later this year.

The city of Lake Mary is planning on doing the same with its chlorine storage, moving from gas to liquid form.

The gas form is 100 percent chlorine, whereas the liquid form is only 14 to 16 percent chlorine. One fire officials described like bleach used at home, only more concentrated.

The city of Sanford regrets any inconveniences and assures all residents that no chlorine danger persists in the city including the Hidden Lake area.

According to Sanford Fire Inspector and spokesman Tim Robles, this information was issued by the Ormond Beach Police Department.

It was erroneously sent to citizens in the Sanford and especially the Hidden Lake areas.

"It has nothing to do with Sanford or this area," he said, "and we wanted to tell folks that this was sent from Ormond Beach to us in error."

Is this the reason why many people refuse to seek political office? They can't conduct a campaign and keep every single person working for him or her on a tight leash.

There are many people who would make excellent government officials. They are usually well educated, knowledgeable of their communities, fully aware of the problems and needs that would face them, and believe they, if elected, could make improvements.

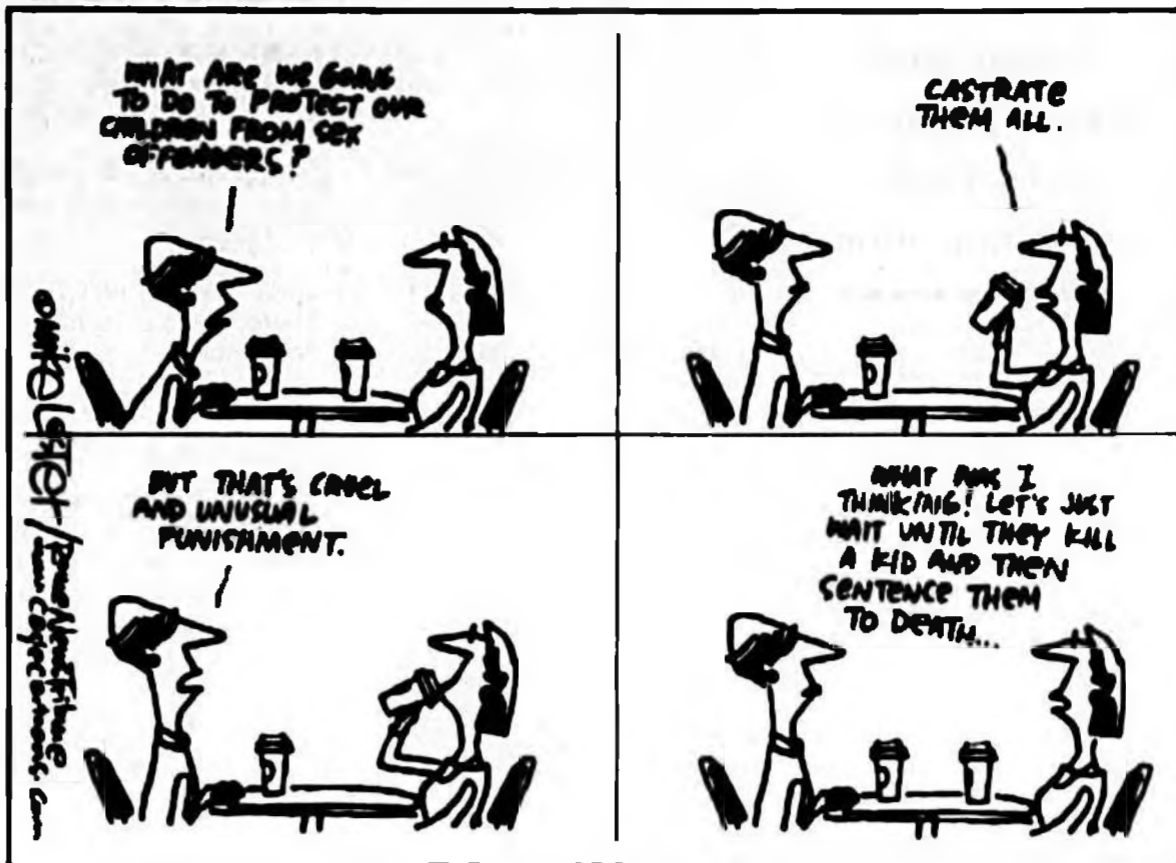
But a person cannot conduct a campaign alone. They must have others working for them, and the more people who are involved in the campaign, the more chance there is of something going wrong.

People who want to help — who volunteer to assist in a campaign, are generally unfamiliar with the many laws on Florida books dealing with elections. There are many dos and don'ts that they may not realize, and as a result, have a tendency to do things that will reflect negatively on the person seeking office, such as the Dyer case.

Even if these volunteers do nothing wrong during the campaign, opponents can easily come up with charges — valid or false, that reflect negatively on the person which they are against. Charges of this type then bring about investigations, and allegations of negligence or illegal activities. True or false, they produce what has commonly been referred to as "mud slinging" during a campaign.

These then, bring about publicly reported investigations that could include delving into the candidate's entire life, as well as the lives of his or her entire family. One instant of misjudgment during a candidate's childhood or teenage years could be blown out of proportion, and make him or her appear as though they were unfit to serve in public office.

Therefore, we have folks who would make excellent government leaders, but refuse to run for election, knowing they would get involved in being scrutinized by a fine-tooth comb. It's not only a tragedy for our cities and counties, but for ourselves, and I'm afraid that even a complete revision of the Florida Election laws won't change this problem.

Bill Frist's immigration folly

Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist may have just killed his hopes to be the Republican nominee for president in 2008 — by coming out against a proposal to bar illegal immigrants from getting drivers licenses.

All but one of the 19 9/11 hijackers had a valid drivers license. In a bid to tighten our security, House Judiciary Chairman F. James Sensenbrenner Jr., R-Wisc., is pushing legislation to make it illegal for a state to issue a drivers license to an illegal immigrant. At the moment, he's trying to pass it into law as an amendment to the Supplemental Defense Appropriation Bill.

Licenses are the main American form of ID; in our nationwide post-9/11 security upgrade, they have become, in effect, passports for air travel.

Yet 10 states now permit illegals to get licenses. And many more have porous systems that, de facto, do the same by asking only that the applicant produce a Social Security number. (New York officials recently discovered

that one Social Security number had been used to get 57 driver's licenses!)

The Sensenbrenner bill would require states to ascertain that the applicant is here legally before granting him a drivers license that would be recognized as adequate identification to board an airplane. (States could also offer "soft-ID" licenses, which would not be adequate for air travel.)

Even though this measure is a vital part of our battle against terrorism, liberal Democrats and some big business Republicans are opposing it — the former on civil-liberty grounds, the latter because it would interfere with making money.

Knowing full well that a Democratic filibuster loomed in the Senate, House Republicans chose to tack the license ban onto the Intelligence Reform Bill the president was pushing last year. They knew that Democrats wouldn't dare filibuster the bill and their amendment could pass with a simple majority in the upper chamber.

But President Bush and House Speaker Dennis Hastert got Sensenbrenner to pull back that amendment — in return for their commitment to let him attach it to another piece of "must pass" legislation early in 2005. He decided to cash in on

this commitment by tacking it onto the Supplemental Defense Appropriation Bill. Nobody is going to filibuster a bill to fund our troops in Iraq and Afghanistan in the middle of a war.

But now Sen. Frist has come out against amending the Defense Spending bill. He claims that he wants to "defer" consideration of a license ban until it can be part of a broader debate on immigration — one that he knows full well will run headlong into a Democratic filibuster.

By this sleight of hand, Frist hopes to set the ban on licenses for illegal immigrants up for a Democratic kill later in the year — and avoid getting the blame.

Why are some Republicans trying to derail a measure vital to our national security? Because big business interests — e.g. agricultural interests — oppose the legislation, mostly so they can go on hiring illegals.

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, once more leading the way, has repealed a law (passed under his ousted predecessor) that let undocumented workers get licenses.

When I worked for President Clinton, I proposed again and again a ban on licenses to undocumented people. I urged that licenses to non-citizens expire when visas do and that anyone

found driving without a license be referred to the INS and the FBI to see if they are here illegally or are on a terror watch list. Clinton, under pressure from liberals, wouldn't agree.

When Mohammed Atta, the ringleader of the 9/11 attacks was pulled over in Florida for driving without a license, he got a summons and was sent on his way, a free man.

Some have described the GOP debate over licenses for illegals as a fault line between the cultural conservatives and business interests. It is really more like a division between those who put protection against terror first — versus those who prefer to curry favor with campaign contributors who want to hire illegal immigrants.

By blocking efforts to attach the license ban to the defense appropriation, Frist is siding with those who put profit ahead of national security.

County must find new water resources within 20 years

Lake Mary.

Only taking minutes to pump out, one drop of water takes about 86 years to reach the aquifer at a depth of 100 feet, said Michelle Thatcher, the executive director for the Seminole Soil and Water Conservation District.

On average, only nine out of about 59 inches of annual rainfall in Seminole County reaches the aquifer through recharge areas. Recharge areas refill the aquifer by allowing rainwater to percolate down through the soil, said Bill Belleville, an environmental author and documentary maker.

"At some point, we are

going to be taking out more than nature can replenish," Belleville said.

"Florida water is pristine," Paster said. "It requires virtually no treatment at all."

The Floridan aquifer system is the primary water resource for northeast and east-central Florida. It extends as far north as South Carolina and as far west as Mississippi.

As the population grows and development continues, the quantity and quality of water decreases, experts say.

"We are consuming more water than we should be," said Michael Barr, elected supervisor and chairman of the board for the Seminole Soil and Water Conservation District.

Seminole County has the third densest population in the state and continues to grow.

With the demand for water increasing because of the booming population in Seminole County, utilities will not be able to pump enough water without harming our natural environment, said Nancy Christman, inter-governmental coordinator for the water management district.

Various reasons for the huge consumption of water include excessive irrigation and the growing population.

"St. Augustine grass is the biggest water hog in Florida," Barr said.

The expanding population has also caused an increase

in development, which destroys areas that refill the aquifers.

"The best land for recharging is the best land for building," said Thatcher of the conservation district.

Development also poses a problem with the quality of water in the aquifer because of runoff from the work sites.

"There will always be development, but you have to control the quality of the water," said Ron Morton, Sanford resident for about 50 years.

Florida possesses numerous rivers and lakes, and that is where officials will turn for the alternate source of water.

Officials targeted surface water primarily from the

Lake Monroe area of the St. Johns River. In order to make the surface water potable, or drinkable, a surface water treatment plant would need to be implemented.

More than 95 percent of the nation gets drinking water from surface water; however, the process of cleaning surface water will be expensive.

It will also take many years to complete surface water treatment plans. For that reason, it is urgent that citizens take action in their communities to protect the aquifers for years to come.

"We should not be polluting the aquifers. We can protect it," Barr said. "It's like taking a pristine lake and purposely polluting it."

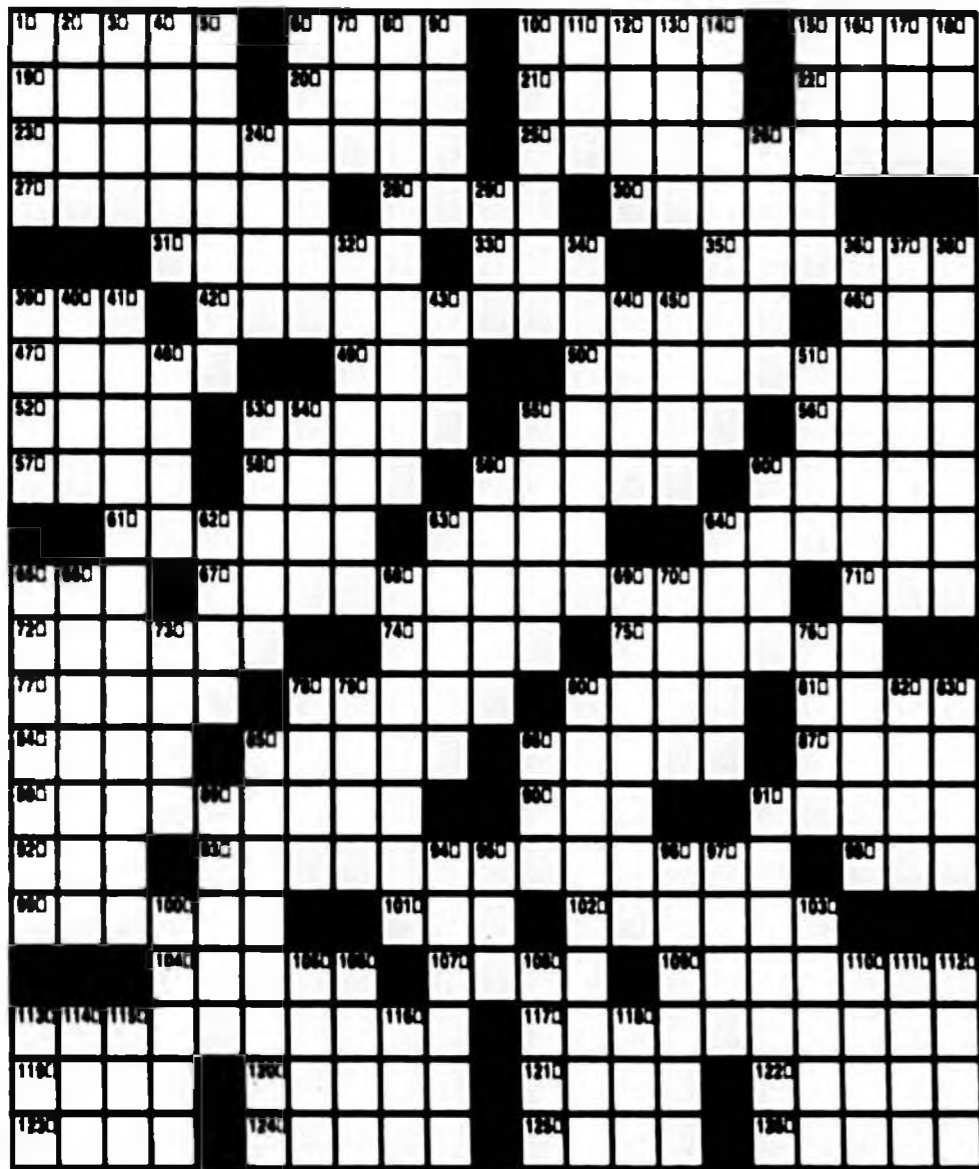

Westside Story

by Joynie DeFoor

We moved to Sanford from Sandy Ridge, Alabama in the middle of my first grade and rented a small house on Elm Avenue cross from the Grammar school, which my brother, Bobby, attended. Almost everyone along our street sat outside on the porches in the cool evenings. Every night the people next door would sing, "You are My Sunshine".

Mom helped me with my memory verses for Sunday School on our porch, and one night, as I was reciting the 23rd Psalm, I wondered why the neighbors laughed as I acclaimed loudly, "Thy rod and they reel, they comfort me."

Rudolph Smith lived around the corner on Sixth Street. He is now a doctor in Texas. Viola McAlexander lived around the other corner and her mother made and sold delicious, fragrant rolls.

Being a very loyal person, and being unhappy over moving, I made up my mind that I would hate Florida and Sanford.

Mom enrolled me in Westside Primary. I remember walking into an auditorium filled with children and teachers. It was just before Christmas and the boys and girls were practicing a Christmas program. Everything was very strange, and I didn't know any of the songs they sang. But somehow, the school smelled almost like the one I had left in Fort Deposit, Ala.

Soon I had two friends: Irene Green and a girl named Betsy. Irene was a tomboy who could hold her own with two older brothers. We knew her mother as "The Story Lady." Betsy was very daring. We called ourselves the Three Musketeers, only I had never heard of a "musketeer" so I told mother we were the Three Mosquitoes.

Duane Harrell became the plague of my existence. He punched me every time he had the opportunity. I really wanted to get him in trouble, but what could I do? My friend, Betsy, furnished the answer. She was caught passing a note, and sentenced to (gasp!) corporal punishment with a ruler. I decided that if I could just write a note and let the teacher find it on Duane's desk, she would think he wrote it and he would get whacked, too.

I tried to copy his printing and was concentrating so hard on it that I failed to notice that he had seen me, and had brought the teacher over to observe also. They quietly watched me for a while. The note said, "I love you, do you love me?" There was no way to explain that I had only written the note to get Duane in trouble, and not to actually send to someone, so I was - CAUGHT!

I felt several watts short of bright. Now there were two of us facing the firing squad. We were taken into the auditorium and denounced in front of the whole school, and then to the third grade room where Miss Dorothy Stokes, the principal and third grade teacher, administered the punishment. The ruler which was weakened on Betsy, was broken on me. I was only 6 years old, so my ego was crushed, right? My self-esteem damaged beyond repair? Goodness no! In Alabama, I had been spanked on the hand with a ruler many times. It actually made me feel brave and important, especially since I didn't cry.

Later at home, I told mother the note was meant for her. She explained this to the teacher who then apologized to me. I can't remember ever telling mother the truth.

Since my nearest actual neighbor is several acres away and screened by trees, he's had no comment. It was easy to silence the voice inside, since no one from the outside seemed to mind the view.

So my inner flower child won out and our purple-carpeted property continues to ripple in the spring breezes and tickle our legs as we walk to the mailbox.

I'm a no-mow convert, man. My no-mow policy even has me thinking that it might be something the county could adopt on some of their rural roadways. Why not seed wildflowers along the ditch-lined banks of outer drives and let the residents enjoy the beauty of it all? The beauty of it all for Seminole would be - you guessed it - no mowing!

Anyone who has ever driven in the mountains of West Virginia during summer can picture just what I have in mind. Surely there are southern varieties of wildflowers that could create a similarly spectacular scene.

Summer rains will undoubtedly fuel the latent grasses and soon I'll be forced to pull the cord and noisily shave the earth into submission - but not before these flowers send out their seeds for next year's show. Until that time comes, I ain't gonna mow no mo', no mo'. I ain't gonna mow no mo'!

He immediately went over to Bagley.

"His breathing was shallow and he had a pulse at that time," Kenton wrote.

The SUV continued north and stopped at the intersection of 18th Street and 17-92. After parking for about 20 seconds, Kenton said, the SUV turned east onto 18th Street.

Another officer located the vehicle with no occupants.

Wilson later told police that he had parked the SUV and saw police and emergency personnel working on Bagley. He then left the scene without identifying himself, and went to his brother's home.

His brother, Frederick Wilson, is listed as the owner of the SUV and lives on Lakeside Circle.

Willie Wilson was later located by police at the corner of Live Oak Boulevard and Spreading Oak Drive.

Willie Wilson told police he drove the SUV that hit Bagley, but that he thought he had hit some clothes or a dog. He also admitted that he knew his license had been suspended.

Police said Wilson also told them he had smoked some crack not long before the crash.

The police report said charges of driving under the influence and DUI manslaughter are pending results of a blood test.

Bagley graduated from Seminole High School.

Survivors include his brother, Lawrence Hagan; sisters Alma Smith and Kathy Smith, both of Sanford; and his grandmother Ella Wynn of Sanford.

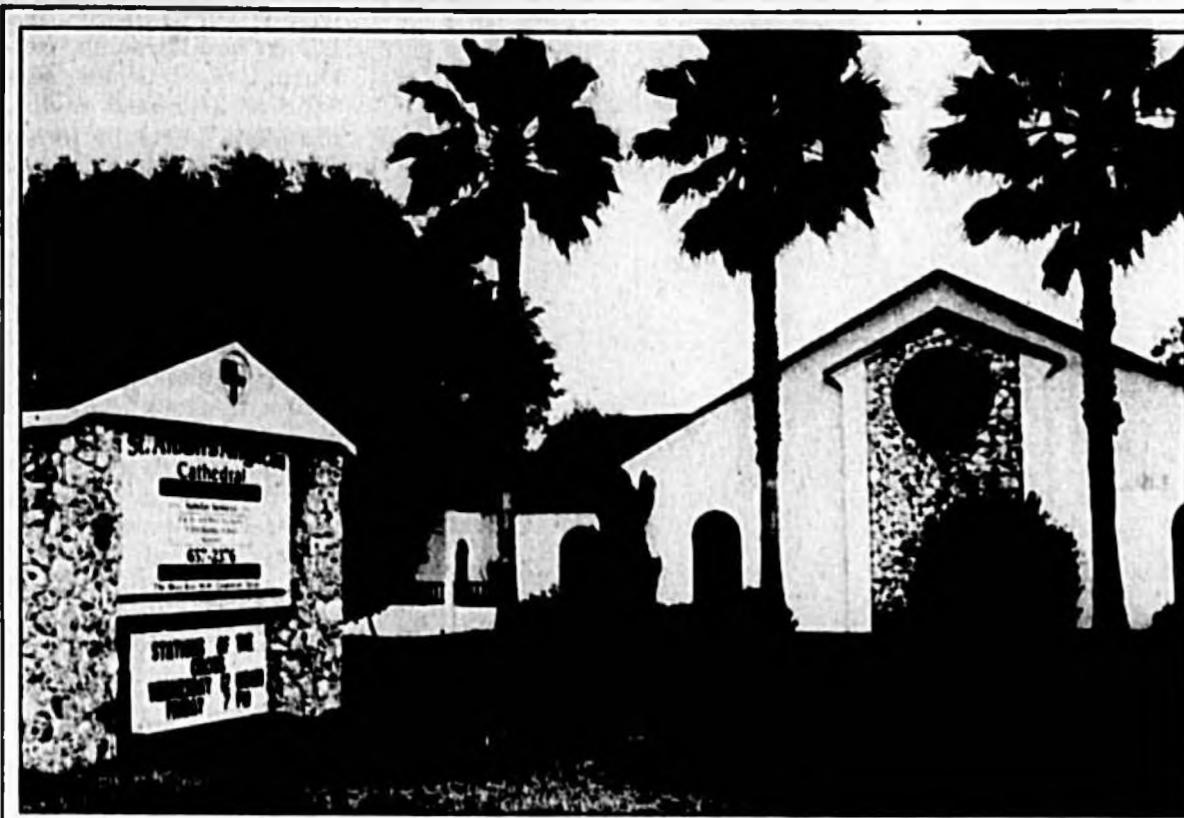

with that prime real estate. She stated, however, that the fort playground is a done deal.

"Whether you agree or disagree with the project, the bottom line is it has been voted on by the [city] commission," Kuhn said. She added that the Steering Committee had become divisive and had been more of an obstruction in recent months.

"We're not making progress," she said.

"I'm only one vote on the City Commission," she told the Steering Committee, and there could also be a restructuring of the committee created in 1993.

Kuhn was elected mayor in March. During her campaign, she often talked about the delays in progress experienced in Sanford.

"Projects need to be determined and we need to move forward with them," she said Wednesday.

Some Steering Committee members felt shafted by the mayor's decision. They felt the committee's authority went beyond simply advising the CRA, and that the Steering Committee or at least the role of the committee is vital considering the waterfront.

Member Ron Fraser pointed to December 1995 Sanford Ordinance No. 3282, which established the CRA about two years after the Steering Committee was formed.

"It clearly defines the committee's authority," he said.

The ordinance states that the Steering Committee will be the official advisory committee to the CRA. The committee will assist the CRA in the "development, review and

modification of all plans and major redevelopment activities and projects within the Lake Monroe Waterfront and Downtown Sanford Community Redevelopment Area."

In that sense, the Steering Committee is an advisory group, members said, but the ordinance gives the committee additional responsibility.

"The [CRA] shall submit proposed plans and projects to the Committee for review and recommendations as to its conformity with the overall master plan concepts for the redevelopment of the Waterfront and Downtown area prior to final action by the [CRA]."

Steering Committee member Reggie Lowery said he agreed with much of what the mayor said, but that the committee had been left out of the loop too often.

Former chairman and now member of the committee, Jerry Mills, said Sanford is on the cusp of booming development.

"We've had a lot of discus-

sion on the difference between the CRA and the Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee," Mills said.

In dealing with the waterfront, Mills said the city needs someone reviewing architectural plans.

"I just don't want us to end up with a carnival waterfront," he said. The Steering Committee, he said, was instrumental in getting phase 1 of the RiverWalk done. Extending the walkway to the Central Florida Zoo and eventually to a trailhead near Interstate 4 would provide closure on that project.

Later, Mills said somebody needs to be a watchdog on waterfront development. The Steering Committee served in that capacity, Mills said. Planning and zoning do not look at architecture, for example.

"I really want to see [the waterfront] developed to the best it can be," Mills said. He didn't know what would happen now, but he did say that the conflict between the CRA and the Steering Committee went too far.

Kuhn told Steering Committee members that the relationship between boards cannot become adversarial, board versus board.

"The dynamics of Sanford have changed since a lot of those boards were created," she said, meaning all the boards and committees that advise the city.

Steering Committee chairman Robert Segal replied: "Absolutely." But added, "This is not the way I have viewed this committee," as just an advisory group to the CRA.

Pet partners help Hospice patients

Local dogs, Fanny and Tipper Parsell, are Pet Partners, certified by Delta Society located in Bellevue, Wash.

Delta was founded in 1977 and is an international organization dedicated to improving human health through service and therapy animals. There are more than 11,000 Pet Partner teams working in communities in the United States alone.

To become a Pet Partner, the handler must take a course and pass a written test. The animal must have a comprehensive examination by a veterinarian, and a License evaluator with Delta Society does a screening of the animal and handler together, as a team, because this really is a team effort.

After passing the tests, the

team is covered for two years with a \$1 million primary liability insurance policy to do animal-assisted activities and animal-assisted therapy for hospitals, rehabilitation centers, jails and juvenile facilities, safehouses for the abused, and many other places. When the two-year certification expires, the team must be re-evaluated.

Two of these special canines are volunteers for Hospice of the Comforter in Altamonte Springs. They visit patients in their homes, assist-

ed living facilities and nursing homes in Seminole, Orange and Osceola counties. They have also done work in Hospice programs such as bereavement, children's grief, eleven-hour, and public relations in health fairs, senior fairs, TV and radio.

"As for me, I just drive the car," said Inez Parsell, who, with her husband Bob, handles these two pets like they were their children. If you are interested in this program, contact Inez Parsell at 407-321-9438.

Force, along with the Office of Statewide Prosecution, and law enforcement from Sheriff's Offices and Police Agencies in Seminole, Ocala, Orange, Lake, and Volusia counties, began arresting members of the Hot Boys Gang.

The Hot Boys Gang was based in Sanford and its primary function was to steal cars. The gang primarily targeted auto dealerships, but often members would first steal cars from people's homes to get to the dealerships. Many times the stolen vehicles were left in the neighborhood in which gang members lived.

"This was done, basically, to brag to their peers that they were above the law," Olson wrote in a 1999 news release.

The members of the gang stood accused of engaging in a criminal enterprise in a five county area, so the Office of Statewide Prosecution prosecuted members of the gang under the RICO Act, accusing them of racketeering and conspiracy to commit racketeering.

The members of the Hot Boys Gang ranged in ages of 14 to 20. The total value of the property stolen by the Hot Boys gang was estimated at \$1.1 million.

In late January 2005, the same City/County Auto Theft Task Force implemented arrests on eight teenagers and a 12-year-old boy for grand theft auto. Task Force officials said at the time they hoped they had found the answer to a string of stolen cars and break-ins. The suspects were caught at the Sanford Auto Dealers Exchange.

In a Jan. 31 Herald story, Investigator Paul Herx said the modus operandi of the boys seemed to fit other thefts, most notably at the Alamo rental lot near the Orlando-Sanford International Airport.

He described a group of young people searching the lots for cars with keys, possibly chauffeur keys. When they find one, they jump in and drive over landscaping, even through fences, he said. The Dollar rental lot was also hit. The Alamo lot was hit at least six times in the later part of 2004, Herx recalled.

"It's really become an epi-

demie," Herx said in January.

Russell is in the Orange County jail system after being arrested for stealing Williams' vehicle. Williams told deputies that his car had also been stolen in January.

When the vehicle was first stolen, part of a broken ignition key was still in the ignition. After his car was recovered, the broken key was missing, the offense report said. The offense report also lists a witness, Sonya Wilson, who said she saw the car on Eudell Drive occupied by four or five black males.

On April 9, Russell was arrested for grand theft auto after the Winter Springs Police Department found him driving the vehicle.

Williams, the victim in the case, said he's tired of the teenagers stealing his car. When his car was recovered the second time, it had a busted steering column, among other damages.

"It's going to cost me a lot of money," Williams said.

Williams said he doesn't see much being done to deter the auto thefts. According to both Williams, and D&J Auto Shop owner, Jones, the teenagers involved are "only getting a slap in the wrist" from the court system.

Williams said the males involved are familiar to him because they grew up in the

surrounding neighborhoods.

"I know the parents. I didn't know who it was the first time, but some neighbors saw them in the car," Williams said.

He said he now has to go to the junkyard to find a steering column and other parts to put his car back the way it was.

"I'm hoping to go before the judge and make them pay for the damage," Williams said.

Jones said he has had \$22,000 worth of damages since the break-ins began occurring. He went to the Sanford City Commission meeting to bring attention to the matter.

At the March 28 meeting, Jones said he had made several attempts to speak with Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley, but to no avail. So Tooley, who was present at the commission meeting, agreed to meet with Jones.

Tooley was unavailable for comment, but Sanford police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen said Thursday that the department does go to businesses and residents individually, if needed, to make suggestions for providing tighter security.

"[The department] has made numerous, numerous arrests and we will continue to diligently work to help prevent these type of incidences," Cohen said.

"I don't know what's wrong with the police ... they take care of the other places," Jones said.

According to Herx, the City/County Auto Theft Task Force investigator: "the incidents at D&J Auto Care appear to be the only ongoing problem."

... Since these incidents, businesses such as the Sanford Auto Dealers Exchange, Dollar Rent a Car, and Alamo Rent a Car have made commendable efforts to thwart future incidents from occurring. Most have made additions to their perimeter fencing and enhanced their physical security."

Jones said because he runs a small business, it is difficult to put in high-tech security, but he has put cameras up in his shop.

"But these kids are so smart that they wear hats," Jones said.

Herx said that Russell appears to be the original link to the break-ins and vehicle thefts at D&J Auto. Jones and business partner Jim Brown operate it. Brown is Russell's uncle/guardian and the young man has worked at D&J Auto performing odd jobs and transporting vehicles.

"I believe this has given Dwayne Russell familiarity with the business' day to day operations," Herx wrote in an email to The Herald. He said he has arrested Russell for one of the incidents at D&J Auto and that he has also arrested Larry Oliver for another one of the incidents there.

According to Herx, the other cases with D&J Auto are being investigated and arrests are expected to follow.

Jones said that Brown is no longer a business partner, but that he considers him a friend.

The Herald requested an interview with Russell in jail, but he said he didn't want to talk to the media.

Herx said a majority of the auto theft cases are pending trial dates.

Williams said the law and courts need to do something about it, and that harsher punishments may be the answer for these juveniles. He said he is a law-abiding citizen, who raised his children here. He is a citizen of the United States, and a registered voter.

"And this is how I'm treated? Why were these kids out again stealing?" Williams asked.

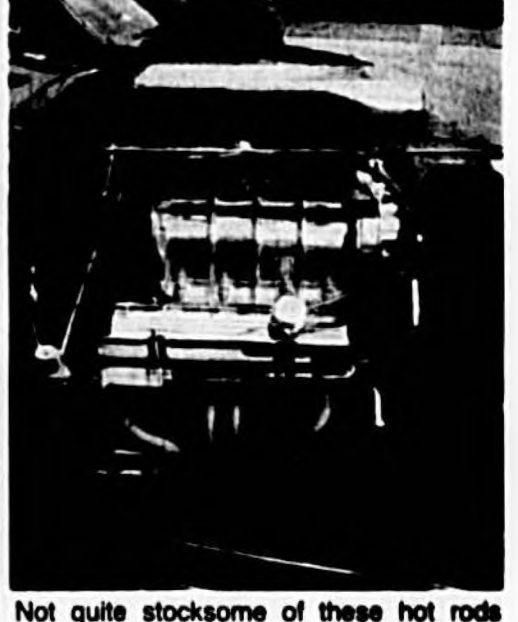
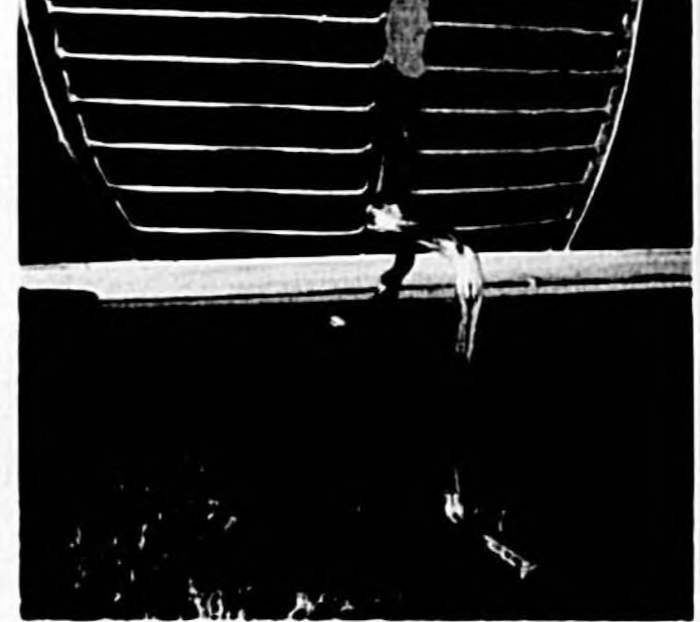


Celery City Cruisers

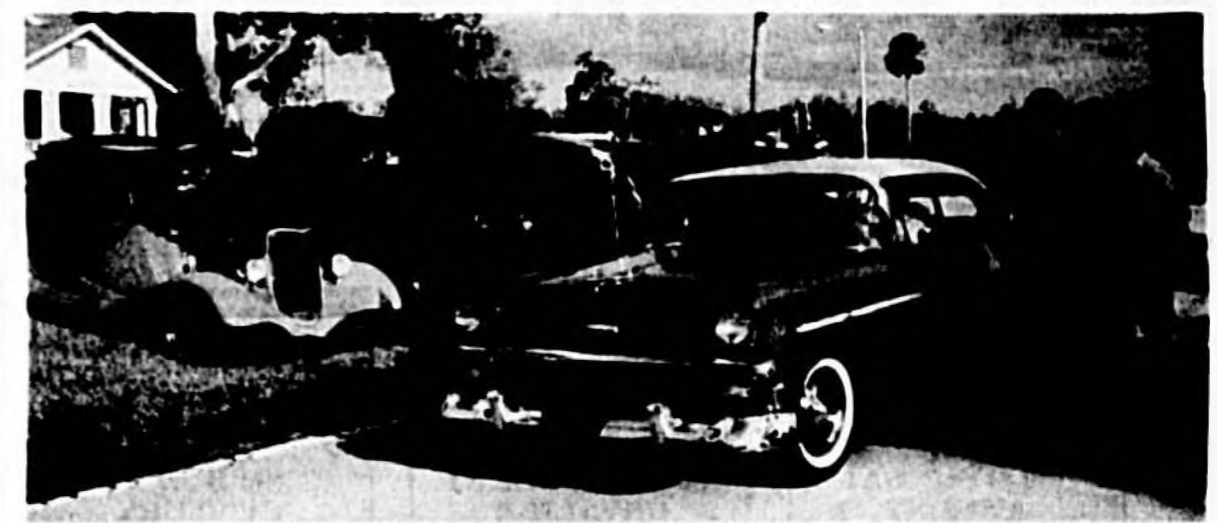

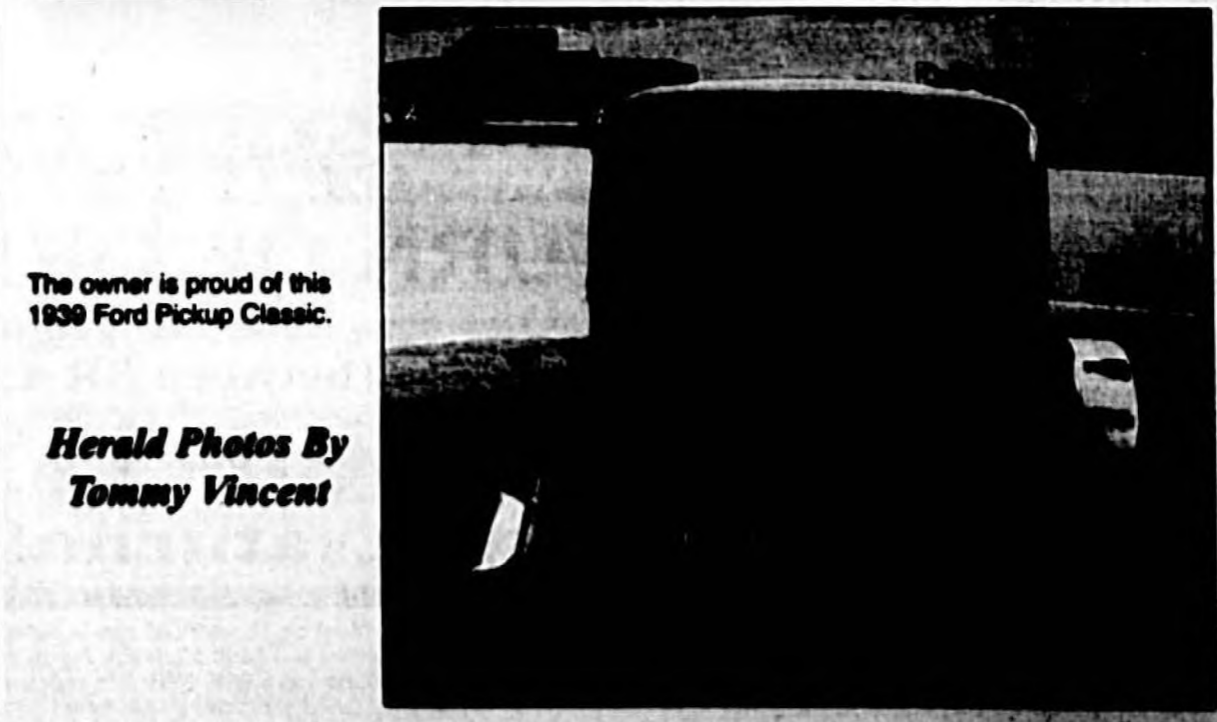
