



Our genial contemporary, Esquire Magazine, printed a piece in contempt of newspaper editorials. It describes them as "that part of the newspaper which nobody reads." Esquire's coldly calculated statement of fact is challenged by the Kansas City Journal.

"The Esquire article is an overstatement," Associate Editor Ray Runnion boldly claims. Editorials are read regularly, he confidently asserts, by four classes of people: 1. Linotype operators-necessarily, since they must put editorials in type.

2. Proofreaders-also necessarily, since they must catch

the operator's errors.

3. Editorial writers themselves, to revel in the mastery of their own logic and expression.

4. Authors of magazine articles about editorial pages. Otherwise, where would they get the lowdown?

Personally we feel that the Kansas City Journal de-

fender has overstated the case for the editorial. 1. Our understanding is that good linotype operators develop a defensive mechanism of such perfection that they can set an editorial without reading it. "Why We Should Buy In Sanford"

In an effort to show why we should buy in our home town, I intend to try to trace a dollar spent by a Sanford citizen in a neighboring town and a dollar apent by a Sanford citizen in Sanford.

When a Sanford citizen spends a dollar in a neighboring city the dollar goes into that city. First the cost of the article is sent to the factory, the profits going to the merchant of that city. From these profits the employees of that merchant are paid, thus sending Sanford money all over this city. This Sanford money goes to grocery stores, apparel stores and to the home-owned utilities company of this neighboring city. Then some of the profit is paid to that city for taxes, thus enlarging and beautifying this city on Sanford money. The owner's share is used in much the same way as the employees' salary but rarely does any of this money that is taken out of Sanford come back into Sanford in trade as these people buy in their own home town because they want to help it to grow.

A dollar spent in Sanford goes into our own city and stays there, excepting of course that which goes to the factory. The profit is spent in employees' salaries, which is spent in Sanford thus circulating through Sanford business. Taxes that are paid out of this dollar spent in Sanford help to enlarge and beautify Sanford, thus making it more attractive to tourists who bring more money into our town. The owner's share of the profits is naturally spent here in Sanford in order to atimulate trade and set an example for the town people to follow. Money spent out-side Sanford generally stays where it is spent, while money spent in Sanford will circulate here and help our own city and will soon get back to the original

In trying to get people to sign pledge cards not to buy out of Sanford, I found the main reason offered for buying in neighboring tities was that they could not find what they wanted in Sanford. If everyone would try to find what they want, here at home before going out of town they would usually be able to find what they wanted here, and if not the merchants would gladly order the article for them

and probably stock up on the merchandise wanted. Many people think merchandise is cheaper out of town; this is not so. Pay a dollar less for an article town; this is not so. This is bound to be true, because no matter where an article is bought, the cost is the same at the factory if the quality is the same.

Furthermore, observant shoppers find in comparing quality, that the larger stores in neighboring cities on account of high rental and expensive overhead, usually charge more rather than less for good, merchandise.
