Fairbanks, Sr. Is Victim Of Heart Attack

Ranking Male Star Of Pictures Dies Unexpectedly At His Santa Monica Home

Screen Actor Had Retired

Dashing Don Juan Of Movie Was Sick For Only One Day

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Douglas Fairbanks, Sr., who leaped to film fame with his spectacular acrobatics, died in bed of a heart attack today. He was 56 years of age.

The dashing Don Juan and for 15 years, a ranking male star in pictures, succumbed after a day's illness at his beach home in nearby Santa Monica.

At the bedside were his wife, the former Lady Sylvia Ashley, and his brother, Robert. Mrs. Douglas, Jr., called a few minutes before his death at 11 A. M. had not reached the house.

In contrast to his career, his life during recent months was quiet and retiring. He did not complain of illness until Monday morning, but even when he suffered a slight heart attack in the afternoon, physicians did not consider his condition serious.

His marriage to Mary Pickford in 1920 was considered a scandal, but six years ago they were divorced. He later married Lady Ashley, former English musical comedy star.

Denver-born Fairbanks went to the stage at 18 and after achieving a success he started his career in 1914.

His major pictures were "Robin Hood," "Mark of Zorro," "The Thief of Bagdad," "Don Quixote," "The Three Musketeers," "The Fighting Temeraire," "The Taming of the Shrew," "Pickford," "Reaching for the Moon," "Mr. Robinson Crusoe." He retired from the screen in 1935.

Hoover Says U. S. Responding With Funds For Finns

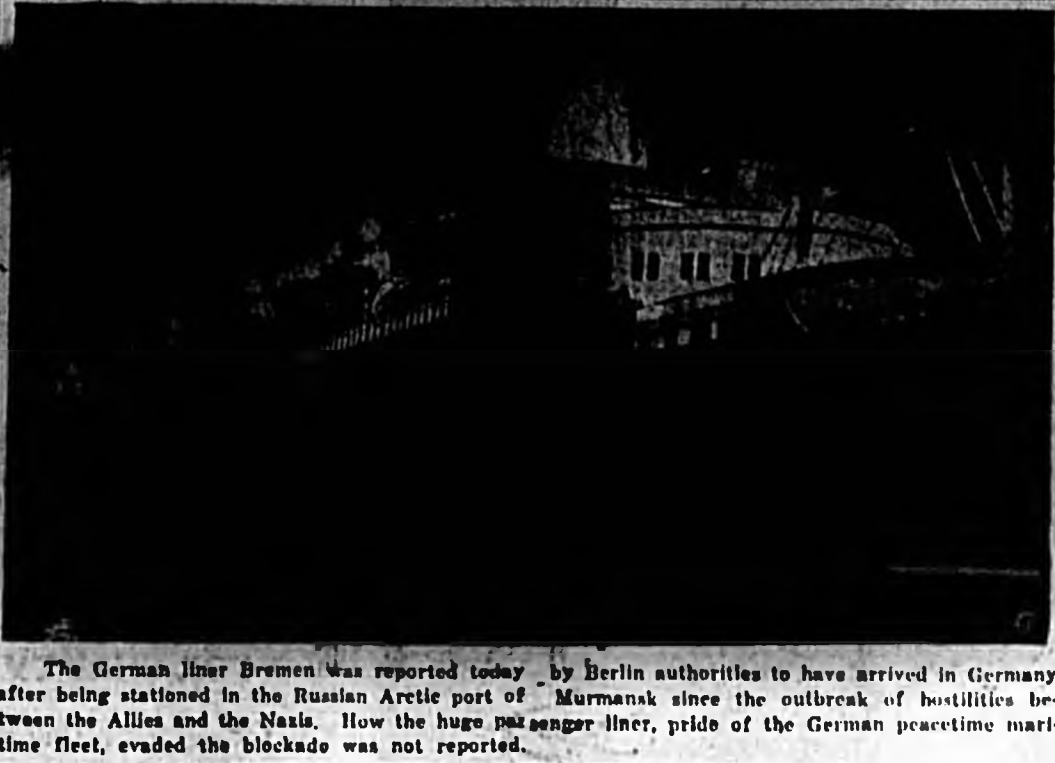
SALO ALTO, Calif., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Former President Hoover said yesterday the response to the appeal for the Finnish relief fund is demonstrating the national outpouring of sympathy to the Finnish people and that the multitude of donations has been most gratifying.

A special survey shows over 1200 newspapers have accepted the extraordinary service of organizing the Finnish relief fund in their towns and cities. Hoover said.

"I urge again that all donations for this fund should be made directly to the newspapers in each locality. They receive the donations, and then through their columns and thus save all the overhead expense that ordinarily accompanies such a public movement."

"I am glad the action already taken by the editors of New York, Detroit and some other cities to have today asked the managers of the fund to act as agents of the fund and to cooperate with the newspapers in their locality."

Son-In-Law Of FDR Reported Against NLRB

Boettiger Quoted As Saying He Didn't Blame Employers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—A memorandum today placed on record the House labor board committee as quoting John Boettiger, the President's son-in-law, as saying he "didn't blame employers for complaining" against the NLRB's administration of the Wagner Act.

The memorandum was from Edwin J. Egan, Labor Board regional director of Seattle, to Nathan Witt, board secretary, who reported the conversation with Boettiger.

Allegedly it concerned the case to which the Hearst Seattle paper and American Newspaper Guild were involved. Boettiger is publisher of the paper.

Egan wrote that Boettiger said he was "very sympathetic with the act but when the board made the kind of decision it made in this case, he didn't blame employers for complaining." He stated "very definitely that he did not intend to take the matter up with the President," Egan wrote.

The special house committee investigating the National Labor Relations Board opened its long-awaited inquiry yesterday with testimony by Dr. William M. Leiserson, newest board member, who waxed scathingly critical of some of his colleagues but defended the record of the NLRB as a whole.

The committee's initial session was devoted chiefly to the examination of letters and notes written by Leiserson and other members of the board, showing dissension within the board itself and a charge by one woman regional director that methods like those of the Soviet OGPU had been employed in an investigation of her office.

A third point brought out was the disaffiliation of David Dubinsky, leader of the Independent International Ladies Garment Workers union, over an unfavorable board decision and the appointment of Leiserson to the board by President Roosevelt.

During the course of the hearing Committee Counsel Toland presented a document after document to develop that Leiserson's refusal to develop NLRB Secretary Nathan Witt as incompetent and unworthy and at least twice has attempted unsuccessfully to get the board to discharge him.

Dubinsky telephonically complained to Witt that President Roosevelt did not do "a good thing" when he named Leiserson to the labor board and told Witt "that isn't what we pay our money for."

A NLRB member Edwin Smith on Aug. 11 proposed a special session to investigate the performance of Leiserson before his appointment to the agency, or at least passage of a "test resolution" condemning Leiserson's refusal to participate in an investigation.

Papworth Is Named Head Of Market Group

Local Interests Investigate Possibilities Of Adding Stock Facilities

H. M. Papworth, pioneer Sanford resident and charter member of the Supervisory Committee of the Farmers' State Wholesale Market, was again elected chairman at a meeting of the group in the market office last night.

A committee to investigate the feasibility of constructing facilities for handling of livestock at the market was the first to be named by Chairman Papworth after he was elected to head the committee.

Members of this committee, Ralph Wight, chairman; C. R. Johnson and Gus Schmitt, visited the state headquarters of the Market's Department in Jacksonville today to discuss the plan with state officials.

Mr. Papworth pointed out that Seminole County lies in the heart of the cattle producing area of the St. Johns River valley and that livestock within a radius of 50 miles could be handled at the local market.

Mr. Papworth, who was active in securing the market for Sanford, was the first chairman of the Supervisory Committee, resigning after four years of active service, has continued as an active member.

Chairman Papworth expressed regret over the Committee's loss of two fine members, Roy Symes, Sr. and John Meisch, Jr., who have done so much to build the market. The State, however, has given us two more fine men to continue the work with the appointment of Ralph Wight and Benjamin F. Holmes of Altamonte Springs," Mr. Papworth said.

One of Sanford's pioneer residents, Mr. Papworth is also prominently connected with the development of Sanford in the last half century. Coming here in 1860 when the city was in its infancy, Mr. Papworth has done much to foster the growth and development of Sanford on the shores of the St. Johns River to a thriving, modern city.

He organized the volunteer fire department in 1892, and its 60 members serve at one time the pride of Sanford in the east.

He has also assisted in the organization of many other groups for the development of the city, including the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce of which he was president for several years.

He planted his first orange grove in this county on the Lake Mary road in 1887 only to have it killed by the big freeze in 1895. The grove which grew from the

Russia Ignores Mediation Offer

League To Condemn Reds For Invasion Of Finnish Nation

How the huge passenger liner, pride of the German peacetime maritime fleet, evaded the blockade was not reported.

The deadline reply passed at noon (EST) but officials said consideration still would be given if received later. Nevertheless the League committee considering Finland's appeal for aid immediately began drafting a report that would condemn Russia as an aggressor.

Indications pointed to its adoption tonight or tomorrow, then Argentina's plan to propose a mediation was likely to go through.

Reports circulated that France will break diplomatic relations with Russia if the Soviet is expelled. Before the deadline, Finland had gone ahead with a campaign in Geneva for war supplies and was reported to have been promised British planes, French guns, and South American food.

Two campaigns were proposed by the Reds in Finland, one to cut the country crosswise in the north, and the other to outflank the defenses on the Karelian Isthmus where 12 days of bitter fighting failed to break the Mannerheim line.

The German-Allied struggle remained more active on sea than land. The British Admiralty reported a submarine had sighted the 51,730-ton Bremen, apparently bound from Murmansk, but refrained from attack without warning in conformity to sea warfare rules.

German naval authorities expected the liner to dock at a German port this afternoon. They said German planes hovered over the Bremen as she neared the snow-covered frontier, and compelled the British submarine to submerge.

The French still a German attack action was reported in three sectors. Britain and France announced co-ordination of financial resources for the duration of the war. The British Air Ministry claimed superiority over the Germans in the air and Germany claimed Britain was on the defensive at sea.

Several Russian tanks were said to have been destroyed in fighting along the Taipale river, on the eastern side of the Kavelan isthmus.

GENEVA, Dec. 13 (AP)—The moribund League of Nations, which was unable to save China, Ethiopia, Czechoslovakia or Poland, last night dispatched a 24-hour ultimatum to Moscow "inviting" Soviet Russia to withdraw Red troops from Finland and begin peace talks under league auspices.

A special league committee of 12 members, set up to try to end the 12-day-old Finnish war, sent the message appealing to Russia to withdraw Red army troops from Finland, cease hostilities and enter peaceful discussion of Russo-Finnish problems.

League delegates described the message as an "ultimatum" in view of the time limit for a Russian reply, but admitted it did not contain any threat of positive league action against the Soviet.

It was anticipated that Russia, which called Finland's appeal to the league an "insult," would ignore the League's message, or at least, reply negatively. Therefore the chief effect of the forlorn peace offer was expected to be to provide Finland with the basis of future action through the league.

In the case of Italian aggression against Ethiopia, the league voted sanctions. When China appealed against Japan, the league adopted a resolution of sympathy urging members to give individual aid to China. What procedure to take to aid Finland was debatable.

Dispatch of the message to Moscow followed an impassioned plea for aid by Rudolf Holsti, former Finnish foreign minister and that country's chief advocate at Geneva. He received a wild ovation when he asked the world to help the embattled Finns "with

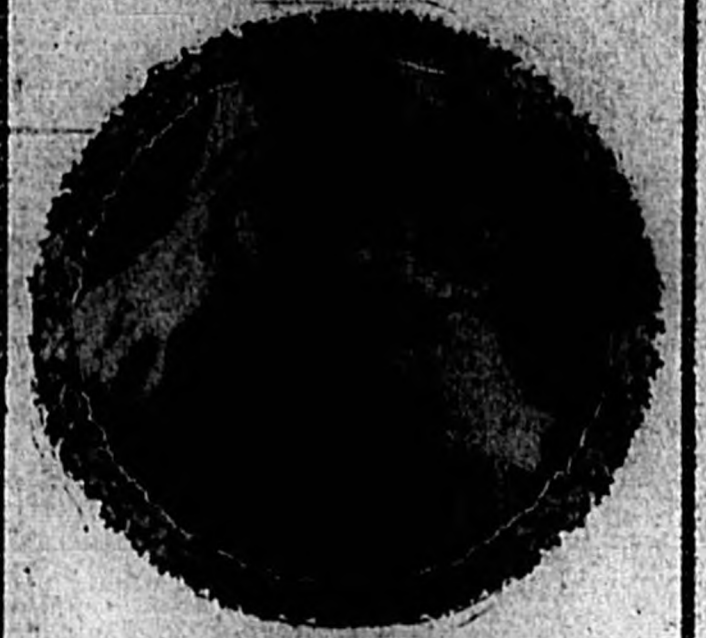

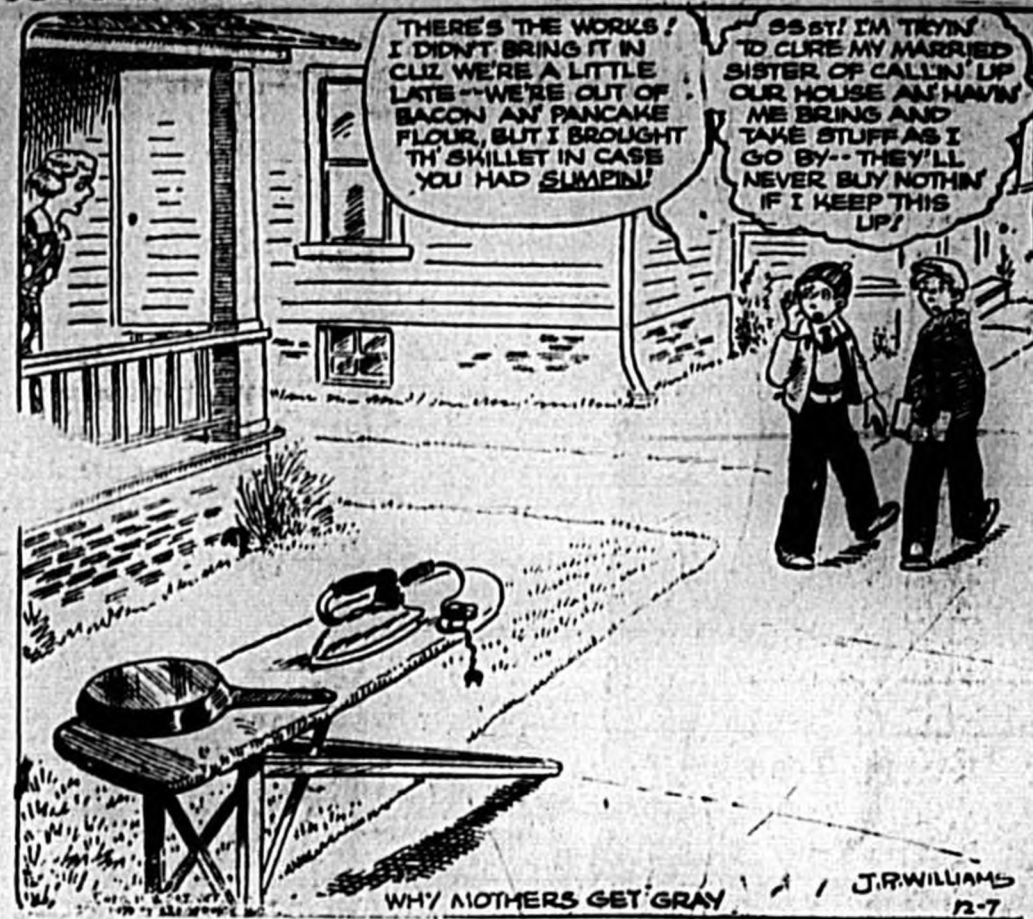

ment of the present deteriorated wooden line has been ordered and is expected to arrive within a short time. The WPA project which the City is sponsoring for laying the line has not yet been approved.

City Engineer Fred T. Williams gave the Commissioners a report of the recent hearing in Washington on the proposed St. Johns Indian River Canal before the Board of Engineers for the House Rivers and Harbors Committee, in which he told of the optimism which prevails among proponents of the project over the possibilities of a favorable report to the House Rivers and Harbors Committee.

Mr. Williams also gave a resume of the progress being made on the current street paving project which is sponsored by the City through the WPA.

The Commission authorized the purchase of 10 tons of asphalt and 531 feet of sewer pipe to be used on this project.

The purchase of two traffic lights at the cost of \$102.95 each also authorized. One of these lights will be installed at the intersection of Park Avenue and Twentieth Street and the other at the intersection of Park and Geneva Avenues.

The construction of back stops on the negro tennis courts on Ninth Street and Sanford Avenue and on West Seventeenth Street was also approved, as was a quarter page advertisement in the 1940 issue of the high school annual.

The payment of the City's annual dues of \$50 to the Florida League of Municipalities was authorized while the Commissioners took under advisement a request by representatives of the Florida National Exhibits, Inc. for a donation to a fund to be used for the maintenance of Florida exhibits at prominent locations during the winter months.

The two local banks were designated as depositories for the ensuing year.

700 Russians Believed Dead In Ship Wreck

Crowded Fishing Vessel, Enroute To Vladivostok, Runs Aground In Storm

395 Are Saved By Rescue Ship

1,100 Fishermen Many Women, Children Were Aboard Ship

WAKKANAI, Japan, Dec. 13—(AP)—More than 700 Russians, including women and children, were missing today and were believed drowned or frozen to death in the wreck of the Russian steamer Indigirka on the treacherous coast of Kokkaido.

The Japanese ship Karafuto Maru arrived here, 395 survivors of the crowded Russian fishing vessel which went aground in a blizzard yesterday. The survivors, most of them suffering from exposure, said the ship carried 1,100 fishermen, many accompanied by their wives, children, and a crew of 20.

Survivors said they sent out one S. O. S. before a heavy snow storm set in. A search held rescue ships in port through-out yesterday.

The Indigirka was only 2,600 tons capacity but vessels playing the northern Russian coast to Vladivostok often carry large passenger lists. It originally was one of several older American ships sold to Russia in recent years.

Guards Emergency Training Will Be Discontinued Soon

There will be no continuation of the present emergency training measures for the Florida National Guardmen after Jan. 31, Col. A. W. P. Sands, of the Fourth Corps Area Headquarters at Fort McPherson, Ga., told members of the Florida National Guard Officers Association at its annual meeting in the San Juan Hotel in Orlando Sunday, according to a report of local officers who attended the affair.

In the election of officers, Col. Preston Ayers of Orlando, commanding officer of the 124th Infantry, was elected president of the association for the ensuing year, while Lieut. Karl Koytzen of this city, was elected vice president from the 124th Infantry.

During his discussion of military affairs with the officers from all of the National Guard organizations in the state, Col. Sands pointed out that the continuation of the present two-day a week drills and the emergency field training period would not be necessary by the end of January 31 because of the provisions of the National Defense Act, which he declared is not likely to be changed at the next session of Congress.

He also announced that the annual encampment of Florida's 124th Infantry, of which the local companies are a part, will be held at Fort McClane, near Anniston, Ala., from July 14, to July 25, 1940. It will be an encampment of the 62nd Brigade which includes the Florida regiment and the 107th National Guard regiment of Alabama.

November Sales At Farmers Market Total \$70,000, Manager Reports

With the sale of more than \$70,000 worth of produce at the Sanford State Farmers' Wholesale Market during the month of November, aggregate sales for the current fiscal year, beginning July 1, have reached a total of approximately \$100,000, Market Manager H. J. Lehman announced today.

Optimistic over the prospects of the most successful season in the market's history, Mr. Lehman stated that the impressive record of sales had been compiled during the month of November despite the shortage of fall crops from the Seminole County area.

The reason at the market is just beginning, however, and Mr. Lehman expects a large increase over last month in the volume of produce during the month of December. For several seasons the goal of those connected with the market has been gross receipts of a million dollars for a single season. According to Mr. Lehman, the year's sales, if they continue as at present, should come near this goal, "if the farmers take advantage of this outlet for their crops and increase the diversification of their plantings," Mr. Lehman said.

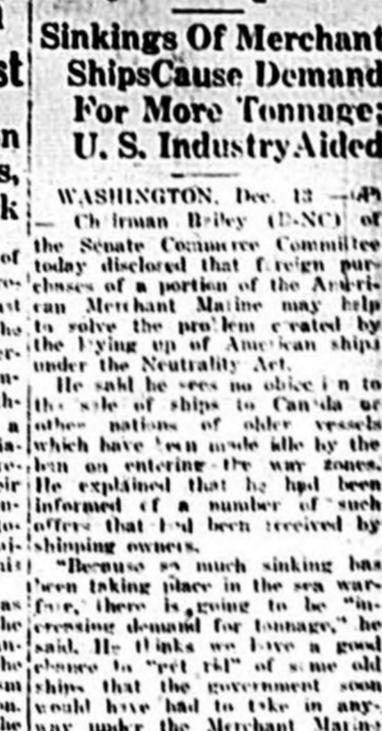

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League Of Nations Condemns Soviet Union As Aggressor

Resolution Passed By Committee Implies Demand For Ouster; Aid Asked For Finns

A Resolution League of Nations committee today adopted a resolution condemning Russia as an aggressor, containing an implied demand that Russia be ousted from the League.

The resolution, then submitted to the League assembly which may act tonight, was incorporated in a subcommittee report "inviting" League members to aid Finland, as Argentina led the way toward expulsion by threatening to resign if Russia, which refused mediation, was not expelled.

There were unconfirmed reports available of a mass meeting in London, England, at which the British naval authorities in London were expected to meet tonight to discuss the League's action.

A great number of relations with the League of Nations were expected to be held in London, according to the League's press office.

British Foreign Secretary, Lord Halifax, had been expected to announce the League's action.

It was reported that the League's action would be a significant step toward the expulsion of Russia from the League.

The letter to the Mayor is as follows: "Dear Mr. Hogan, 'My sympathy with you effort to help Sanford business prompted me to tell you of a small purchase made at home yesterday.'"

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Public Is Warned Against Accepting Counterfeit Bills

Two more counterfeit \$20 bills have turned up in Sanford with their discovery by employees of the Florida State Bank of Sanford and will be turned over to federal authorities within a few days, Mr. E. McNeil, president of the bank, announced.

Being residents of Sanford and Seminole County to be in the look-out for counterfeit bills of \$10 and \$20 denominations, Mr. McNeil pointed out that persons holding the "fake" money are "just out of luck" if they attempt to pass a bill and it is discovered that it is counterfeit. "There is no way to reimburse the holder of the bill even though he accepted it in good faith," Mr. McNeil pointed out.

The casual observer, the counterfeit notes are perfect duplicates of regular currency, the bank president said, and a closer scrutiny reveals that the ink used in printing the bill is slightly off color and that the printing on one side of the bill is also slightly blurred. The counterfeit bill does not have the "threads" woven into the paper that can be found in the bill, and under the supervision of the government.

For several days those who desire to see the bills will be given the opportunity by calling at the bank.

Both the Police Department and the Sheriff's Office are assisting in an effort to trace the counterfeit money to its original source but with no degree of success. It is also understood that a member of the Federal Bureau of Investigation is seeking clues.
