WATERWAY MUST BE HANDLED AS A BUSINESS DEAL

canal and the deepening of the waterway from Palatka to Sanford. Mr. Braxton stated that in order to obtain the improvement, it will be absolutely necessary to prove to the government and the board of engineers that it is a practical proposition. It must be shown that, as must any business proposition, he said, that the investment will be a paying one and one that will benefit the entire state and the country at large as well as locally.

The fundamental basis of the whole thing, said Mr. Braxton, is to secure economical transportation and thereby pave a way for the movement of the rapidly increasing production of fruits and vegetables from this state.
It is also necessary, he said, to show that lower freight rates will be secured by virtue of the waterway improvement and that the lowered rates will continue to exist even after a number of years. The saving to the people of Sanford and this community during the past five years due to the lower freight rates because of water transportation and water transportation itself, stated Mr. Braxton amounts to a sum almost staggering to those who are not acquainted with the facts. It amounts to approximately \$14,000,000, he said.

In all, it was learned, the proposition must be approached from a business viewpoint and the help and co-operation of all the sections interested in the improvement must be secured during the collection of data which will serve as a basis for the demands to be made upon the government.

MOTION TO ASK LOWE TO QUASH MANDAMUS WRIT

Will Be Presented in Regard Award By Education Board of Scholarship to Miss Sandlin, Hamilton County

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 26.—A motion will be presented to Judge E. C. Love of circuit court for Leon county, asking him to quash the alternative writ of mandamus issued several days ago, requiring the State Board of Education to award Miss Ruth Sandlin, of Hamilton county, a scholarship to the state college, or show cause why such award should not be made. The writ was made returnable October 7.

The Board of Education, at a meeting at which the case was brought up and discussed, reached the conclusion, it is authoritatively stated, to ask Judge Love to dismiss the writ, on the ground that the board has placed a correct interpretation upon the scholarship law, passed by the 1923 legislature providing for the award of two scholarships from each county yearly, one to the University and the other to the State College for Women.

As interpreted by the board, only one scholarship at a time to each school is given from each county. These are awarded on competitive examinations, as provided by the act creating the scholarships, and the successful candidates are permitted to renew them, if they are successful, each year until four

It has been a week of great importance, the results of which can not be seen just at this time.

The papers are full of traffic rules these days. All parts of the country are realizing the value of safety campaigns...

There hasn't been much said about the road hog in this safety campaign. Is there any kind of an automobile driver more despised than the fellow who sticks in the middle of the road...

Perhaps if reckless driving continues some drastic laws will have to be enacted so that the lives of careful people may be protected.

In New Hampshire they have ten rules for motorist, which if followed would practically do away with automobile accidents.

1. Drive on the right side of the road; it is just as good as the left. 2. Slow down when approaching a cross road; it is nearly as dangerous as a railroad crossing.

3. Look out for children. You can never tell what they will do, and you are always in the wrong if you hit one. 4. Try to help instead of hindering the traffic officer; he is there for your good and he's got a tough job.

5. Be sure that your lights are not defective or glaring; it's no job to be driving in a blind glare, as you yourself know. 6. Read and obey the warning signs; they are not put up as ornaments.

7. If you've got to speed—do it where it won't kill anybody but yourself. 8. When you make minor repairs get all wheels off the road and stop where your car may be seen from both directions, otherwise you may stop longer than you anticipate.

9. Speeding around corners is a straight route to the hospital. Don't race past a stopped car. Some day the jury will call it manslaughter. 10. Use discretion. The fact that you had the right-of-way won't bring anybody back to life, least of all yourself.

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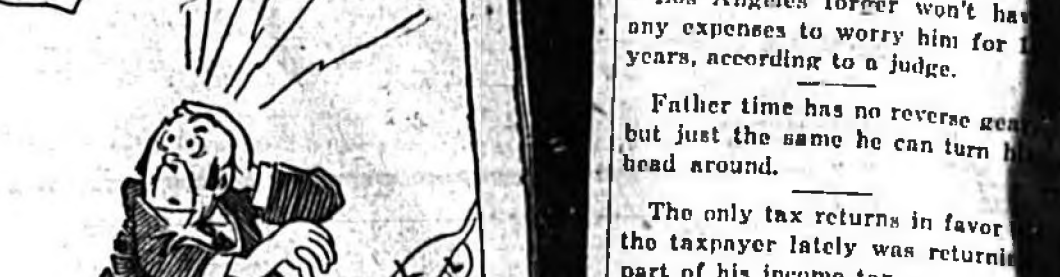
