BIBLE VERSE FOR TODAY

A SOUND SPIRITUAL ATMOSPHERE OF DEVOTION AND PRAYER PERFORMS MIRACLES AS WELL AS SPIRITUAL HEALING. James 5:15: The prayer of faith shall save him that is sick.

Service men are coming home fast these days that we can write stories about all of them, but news of returning veterans has priority over everything else.

Governor Caldwell says we don't have "sweat boxes" in this state. But whatever it is, we have that in giving Florida's prison system a black eye, we should get rid of it.

President Truman implies that industry can grant further wage increases without raising prices, but almost on the same day the price of butter goes up five cents a pound.

It would be a fine thing if employers would "do unto others as they would be done by" when asked for wage increases by Labor unions, and if union leaders would ask for higher wages than they would like to have to pay if they were employers.

The City of Sanford will cooperate in a clean-up campaign sponsored by the Woman's Club. Parks and parkways, playgrounds and vacant lots have been allowed to grow up in weeds during the war, largely on account of the shortage of labor with which to keep them trimmed.

Sanford is to have a new radio station along with its many other civic signs of progress. At least it will have a radio station if the Federal Communications Commission approves the application now on file.

Following Senator Andrews' announcement that he will not seek re-election next year on account of his health, former Governor Holland has announced that he will be a candidate for the office.

President Truman was asked at the press conference by other day whether he would be a candidate for re-election in 1948. The President merely laughed off the question, indicating that he had no way to give the matter any thought.

Profitable Lives

People who concentrate on religion are likely to be unduly distrustful of science; but in the scientific age that we have been coming through lately, the religionists may have the better of the argument.

There is plenty in this world for everybody, if it is properly handled. Plenty of foodstuff, plenty of homes or materials to make them, plenty of people to do what is needed, plenty of ways and means to travel and see the world.

Wait Whitman our American poet-philosopher, preached and practiced some good ideas. He said particularly that he did not want to be "demented with the mania of owning things" and was not "proud or stuck up."

We don't need to whittle life down to that degree, with so many beautiful and wonderful things and possibilities in the world. But maybe even that would be better than devoting life to making and using bombs and munitions, living in hate and fear.

Marshall's Uncertainty

Apparently, after having fought and bled and triumphed to a degree the American people never experienced before, there is still a war to fight. It is a war centered in the minds and hearts of the American people - a campaign against the lightness and irresponsibility with which so many of us have accepted the aftermath of the conflict.

General Marshall, the leader whose words are credited at least as much as those of any other man, says flatly that our demobilization "has become disintegration, not only of the armed forces but apparently of all conception of world responsibility and what it demands of us."

Americans do not want to fight the war over again, or see the world go to pieces. But most of us wake up, take a brace and get back to reality. It is still a very dangerous and precarious world, which calls for intelligent understanding, wary walking and a high degree of patriotic devotion.

Knowing Latin

School boys had better learn their Latin. A lot of high ranking allied military men and diplomats, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Mark Clark among them, were talked to in Latin the other day at Oxford University, England.

Eisenhower was called "the Cincinnatus of his age, a man of modest bearing and unassuming composure when millions of men followed in a war grander in scale and greater than any known in history."

The New Wage-Price Policy

President Truman's wage-price policy speech Tuesday night was addressed to a restless and confused nation. All of us have been troubled and apprehension has increased because of the mounting strikes, wage disputes and delays in reconversion.

In all fairness, it should be pointed out that the President and his advisers, trying to discover a formula for reconversion wage adjustments, found themselves between the devil and the deep blue sea.

will work successfully. Here in so. We say this because many why. Every increase in wages, unless immediately accompanied by an equal increase in labor productivity, means an increase in costs of production.

However, this does not excuse the policy that has been announced. The fault we find with the President's formula is that it follows the line of the easiest way. It is a slapdash, stop-gap answer.

Politically, of course, it appears to be an ideal formula. It meets labor's demand that wages be increased but that the cost of living be held down.

## Inside WASHINGTON

Capitol Dome Once Again Open to Capital Visitors Washington Tourist March Out-of-Bounds During War

Special to Central Press  
WASHINGTON—The dome of the nation's Capitol is open again to the public. Hundreds of feet are again daily tramping the long, winding steps that lead to the dome, closed during the war as a defense measure.

With its opening, one of the capital's feature attractions has again become the mecca for thousands of tourists.

Four years have elapsed since the dome, which dominates the Washington Vista, has been closed and the steps leading to it are somewhat dilapidated.

Climbing the 365 steps, one for each day of the year, which lead to the top gives the visitor an unparalleled view of the capital city 285 feet below.

Countless thousands have climbed the steep stairway since the dome was completed in 1865.

According to David Lynn, architect of the Capitol, no count has ever been kept of the people who have trudged the long, winding stairway, but they have come from every state in the union.

On the veranda underneath the statue of the Goddess of Freedom, high above the street, they have etched and written their names into the stone and cement.

The dome of the original central building of the Capitol was constructed of wood, covered with copper. This was replaced in 1866 by the present structure of cast iron, the work being completed nine years later.

Construction of the new dome was made necessary by the building of the present House and Senate wings, in order to maintain the architectural symmetry of the Capitol.

The weight of the dome is 8,909,200 pounds, surmounted by the bronze statue of Freedom weighing 11,985 pounds.

Visitors to the dome are able to climb to the base of the statue, which was modeled by Thomas Crawford, father of Francis Crawford, the novelist, in Rome, Italy.

The plaster model of the statue was shipped to this country and the statue was cast in bronze. It was placed in its present position on Dec. 2, 1863. Its cost was \$23,796.

Visitors to the dome also obtain a striking view of the beautiful paintings which adorn the ceilings of the rotunda inside the Capitol. Galleries permit tourists to obtain a close-up view of the paintings and to peer down 180 feet to the floor below.

The rotunda is 97 feet in diameter and light is furnished through 105 windows in the dome, as well as by artificial means.

During the long years of war the dome was not only closed to the public but was blacked out as well at night.

Following V-E day, however, the giant arc lights which bathe the Capitol at night in brilliant light were again thrown on and the dome is once more visible for miles around.

In anticipation of victory, the dome also received a thorough cleaning outside, the first in years, the entire surface being painted.

Other parts of the Capitol were also painted and stone portions were washed by city firemen who directed their hoses against the accumulated dirt.

Spruced up, the dome is again a mecca for visitors.

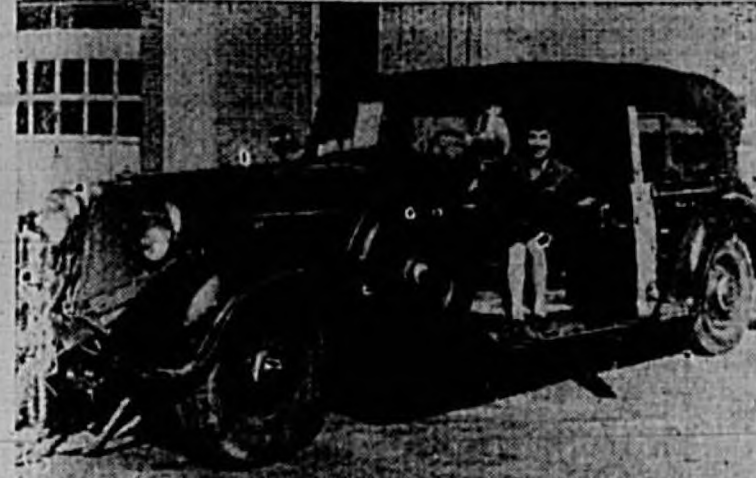

## Fighting Again Breaks Out In Batavia Area

### Roosevelt Files On Pearl Harbor—64 Bales Of Hay—Made Available To Probe

Sporadic fighting flared anew in the northern section of Batavia during the night as new British reinforcements maintained a firm hold on the situation at the important Soerabaja naval base.

A British communique described the situation elsewhere as quiet during the past 24 hours, but acknowledged it is "tense." The news was limited by a British decision to hold no more press conferences on military developments which brought strong protest from foreign correspondents.

In Nuernberg, Supreme Court Justice Robert Jackson witnessed a dress rehearsal for the Nuernberg trial of top German war criminals today. A mock trial was the first of several scheduled to make sure there are no kinks in the elaborate mechanical system by which the proceedings will be conducted in four languages. Jackson said the United States will be ready to proceed with the trial on Nov. 20, but the opening may be delayed if defense requests for additional time to prepare.

## Ingley Discusses Bretton Woods At Rotary Luncheon

J. L. Ingley, president of the Sanford Atlantic National Bank, spoke at the Bretton Woods Luncheon, which was held at the Hotel Mayfair on Friday, Oct. 26, 1945.

The proposals consist mainly of two parts, Mr. Ingley, who was introduced by Program Chairman George Touhy, pointed out, one for the establishment of an International Monetary Fund and the other for the creation of an International Bank for Reconstruction and Development.

1) To stabilize currencies.  
2) To promote international trade.  
3) To make loans to member nations.

Declaring that exchange controls, trade embargoes and other restraints on international trade, as practiced by Germany and many other nations during the past twenty years inevitably result in economic warfare which leads to actual wars among nations, Mr. Ingley said that a high level of production and trade, full employment and the promotion of a better standard of living in all nations is essential if the peace of the world is to be preserved.

The Monetary Fund, he said, would have a working capital of about eight billion dollars of which the United States is to put up 2 1/2 billions. This country would be the largest single contributor and as such would have the largest voice in decisions affecting the fund. Headquarters for the fund would be established in the United States when 65 percent has been subscribed by the 44 member nations.

## Farm Credits To Vets Urged By Farm Union

### Plan Offered To Aid Ex-Service Men In Buying Farms And Equipping Them

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5, (AP)—The National Farmers Union yesterday recommended a program intended to give "adequate credit facilities" to World War II veterans desiring to purchase and equip farms.

James G. Patton, union president, criticized the farm credit provisions in the GI Bill of Rights, asserting in a statement that their "shortcomings" are "self-evident."

Estimating that 1,000,000 members of the armed forces will be seeking farms or farm employment and that only 800,000 farm units will become available in the next five years, Patton said "it is quite evident that not all veterans who desire to become farm owners will be able to achieve this objective."

Patton said in a statement that the cost of equipping and operating a family farm may range from \$1200 to \$13,000, while the amount of farm loans insured under the GI Bill of Rights is limited to 50 percent of the loan or \$2000, whichever is the smaller. He said also that the 4 percent maximum interest rate is higher than most local rates, and that some states limit repayments to less than the act's 20 years.

Noting that the GI Bill also makes qualified veterans eligible for loans under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, Patton said this act "best meets the needs of veterans farm purchasers."

The union program announced by Patton recommended:  
"1. Funds for the purchase of farms by veterans should be provided under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act at the same rate as loans now available to tenants, namely a 3 percent interest rate, a 40-year repayment period, and a variable repayment plan."  
"2. Such appropriations should be made for a five-year period to permit the administering agency sufficient latitude in the encumbrance of these funds."  
"3. The size of the loan to an individual veteran for the purchase of a farm should be limited to the average value of efficient family-type farm-management units, as determined by the secretary of agriculture, in the county, parish or locality in which the farm is located."  
"4. And the amount loaned to a veteran to purchase, repair and improve a farm should not exceed its reasonable value as determined by the administering agency."

Option to Compromise  
"5. A case foreclosure threat within 10 years following the initial loan, the veteran farmer should be given the option of requesting the administering agency to re-evaluate the farm on the basis of average earnings of farms in the vicinity of the veterans farm, during the year that the veteran's loan has been in effect. If a re-appraisal of the farm shows that the original loan plus the veteran's equity is greater than the proven earning power of the farm, the administering agency should be authorized to compromise the loan."  
"6. Veterans eligible for farm purchase loans under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act should also be provided loans for the purchase of livestock and equipment at a maximum interest rate of 8 percent, and probably less."

Saying he was anxious to remove all wartime controls as fast as possible, Mr. Truman said Labor and management must find a way of resolving their differences "without stopping production."

"Find the best way to do that—without a government directive to either labor or industry—that is your job. At the basis of the problem involved, he said, "is not only the right—but the duty—to bargain collectively."

Approximately 245,000 persons are idle in labor disputes, the management labor conference opened in Washington to study long-range peace moves.

The Greyhound Bus strike is spreading with more than 1,000 in 28 states involved. Andrew Higgins, New Orleans chamberlain, has closed three plants "temporarily," the AFL union threatened a city-wide strike to force Congress to investigate.
