Kirk's 'State Of The State' Indicates Changes

Republican Gov. Claude R. Kirk, Jr., has presented to the Democrat-controlled state legislature an opening day message which has at least two aspects that need to be remembered.

What a contrast to the opening of the regular session in 1969 when open warfare broke out and personal animosities were allowed to take away with almost indefinable loss to the people of the state of Florida.

Not now, not on this opening day! Neither Governor Kirk, nor President of the Senate John Matthews of Jacksonville who seeks the Democrat gubernatorial nomination or Speaker of the House Fred Schultz who wants the U.S. senatorial nomination from the Democrats can forget that this 60 days session in Tallahassee can well determine where the votes go in the September primaries or November elections.

We believe that the tone sought by the Governor and evidently accepted by the legislators is one of careful and guarded cooperation.

Work And Eat!

Almost everybody is organized now, including people on the welfare rolls. Their group, the National Welfare Rights Organization, is currently campaigning against the Nixon welfare reform bill, partly because they consider its guaranteed family income too low — they want \$5,500 instead of \$1,600 — and partly because they oppose the requirement that the able-bodied go to work.

Said the Welfare Rights leader, George E. Wiley, a former chemistry professor: "We're going to fight against forcing people to work in order to get welfare. We're prepared to beat it in the streets. We're prepared to refuse to take the jobs that are given to us."

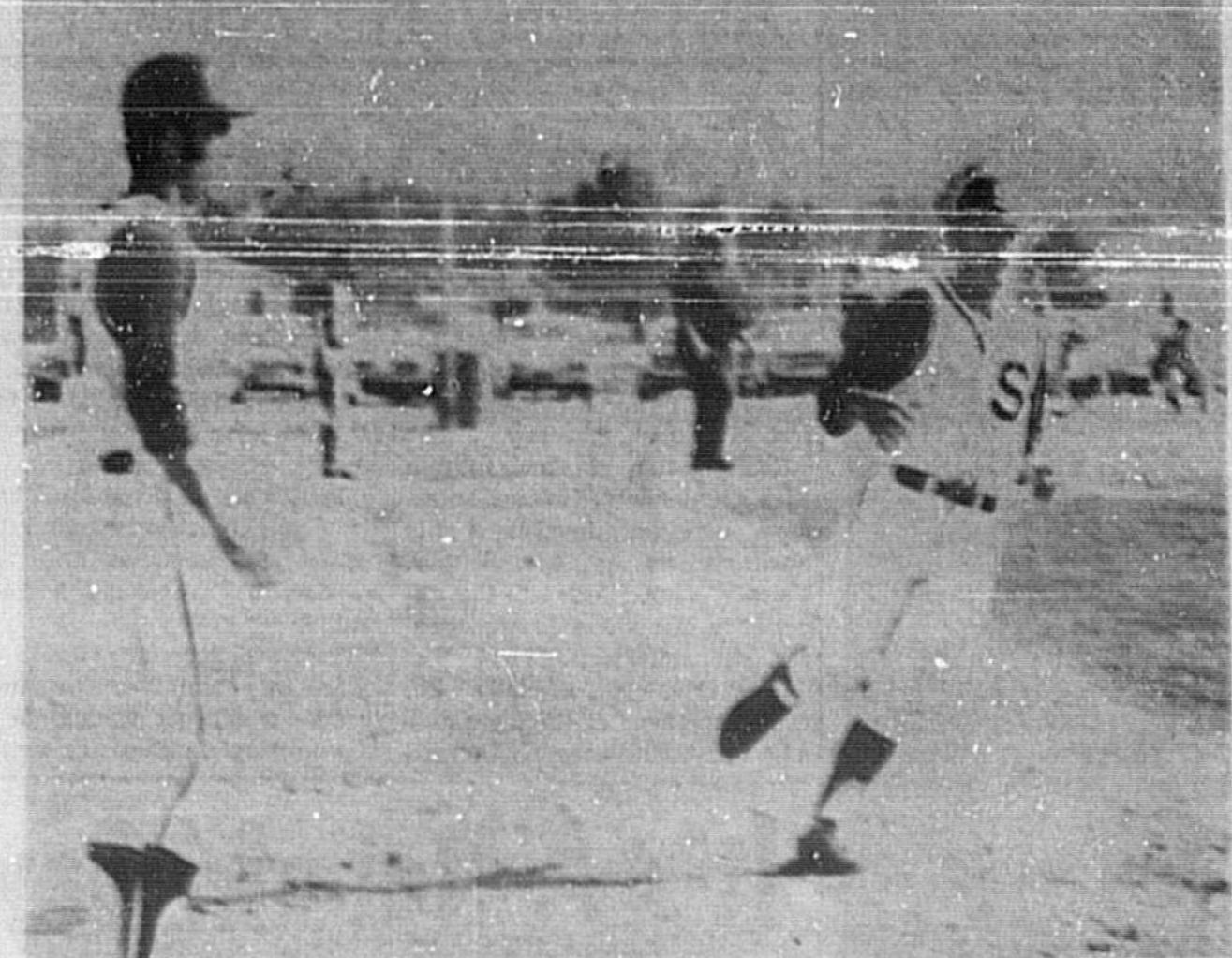

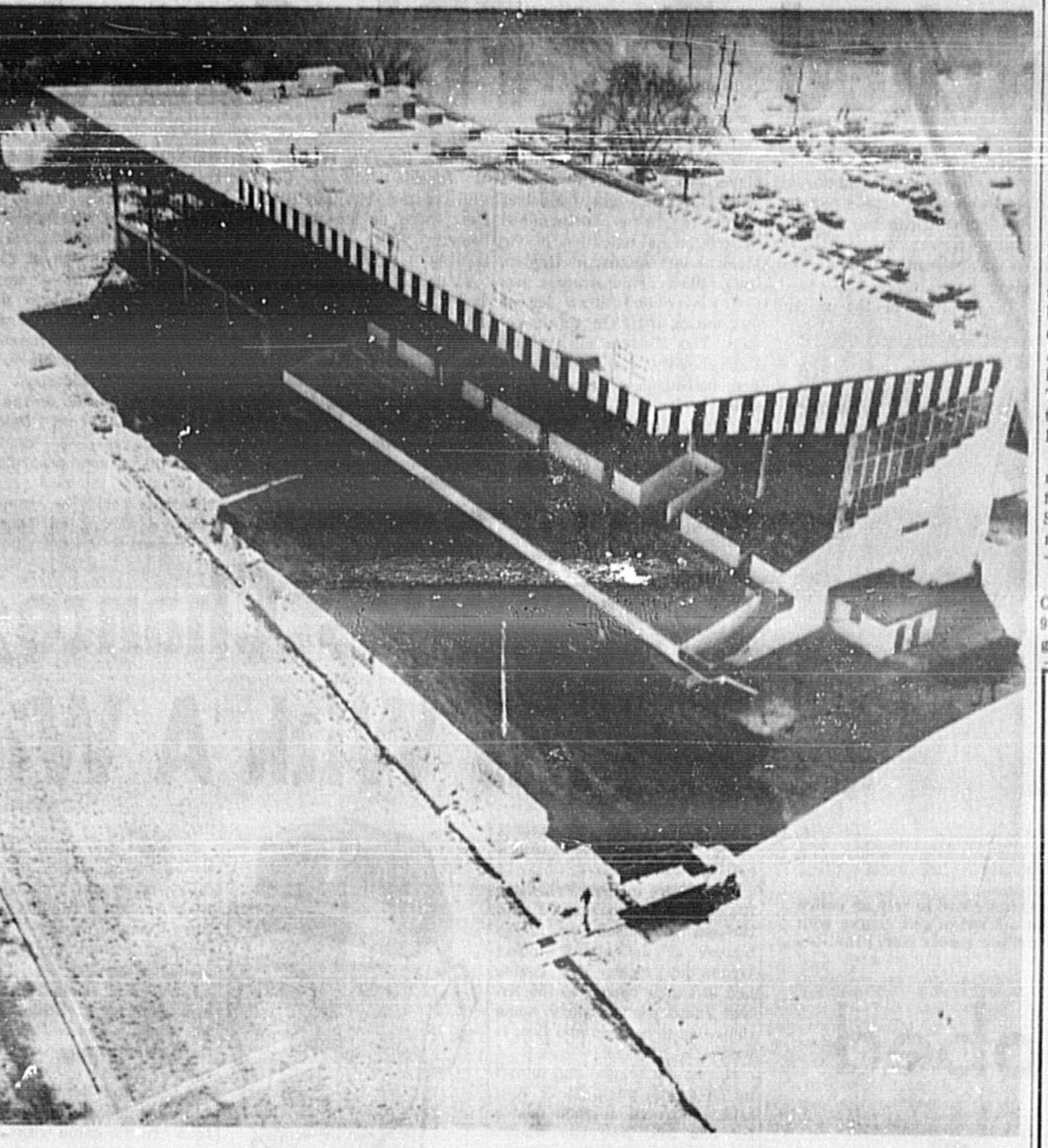

As I See It!

by Gary Taylor. ATTENTION ALL BOYS WHO WILL BE BETWEEN THE AGES 8-12 ON JULY 1, 1980. You are eligible to enter the Pitch, Hit and Throw contest being sponsored by the Phillips 66 Company and the American National Baseball League. It's a brand new contest, similar to the Punt, Pass and Kick competition held each year. Seminole Petroleum in Sanford is sponsoring the local competition. But to be able to compete, you MUST pick up an entry form at a Phillips 66 dealer. Your parents MUST be with you to verify your age. Deadline for entering is May 16. There will be two semi-finals in the county, and then a county championship to decide the overall winner in each of the four age groups. On May 11, at 2 p.m., the semi-final for the south end of the county will be held at Seminole Little League Park, better known as Cooper's Field. A winner will be selected in each age group. On May 23, competition will be held at Fort Mellon Park for boys in the north end of the county and DeBarry, here again one winner will be selected in each age group. The boys will be scored in three categories: throwing, hitting and pitching. HITTING - Each boy will be scored on how far he can hit the ball on the fly in fair territory. He will be allowed to hit two fly balls and will be measured on the longest fly ball hit, scoring one point per foot of distance the ball travels in the air. He gets five chances to test the ball up and swing away for his two hits. If he gets only one hit in his five tries he will be scored on that one hit. If he misses in five tries, he will get a zero score. PITCHING - Each boy pitches the ball into a pitching target at home plate 46 feet away. He has five throws and gets 25 points for each pitch on target. THROWING - Each boy goes to home plate and gets one throw over either first or third base, depending on which tool he is using. He scores one point per foot the ball travels on the fly, minus one point per foot the ball lands right or left of the foul line.

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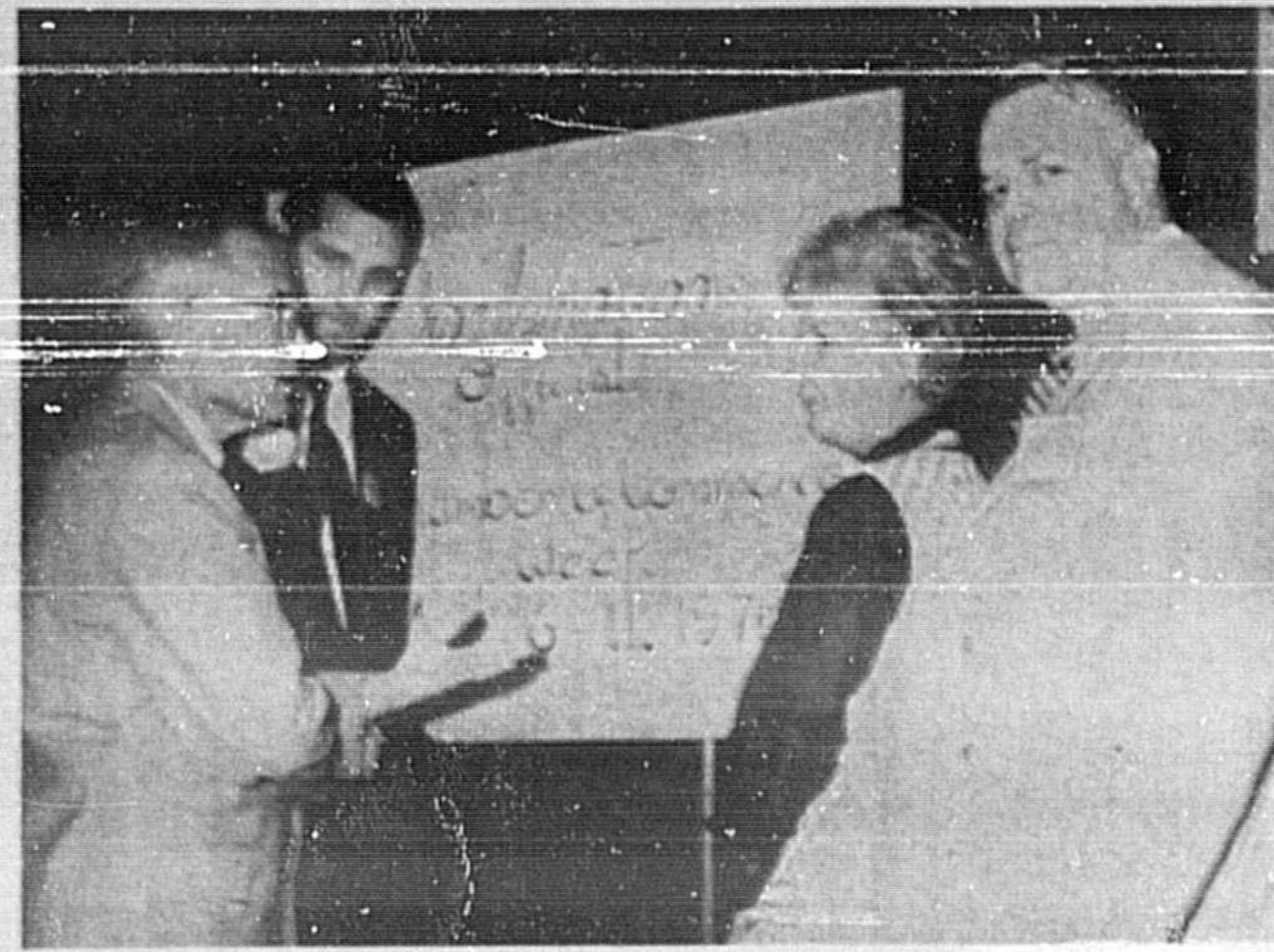

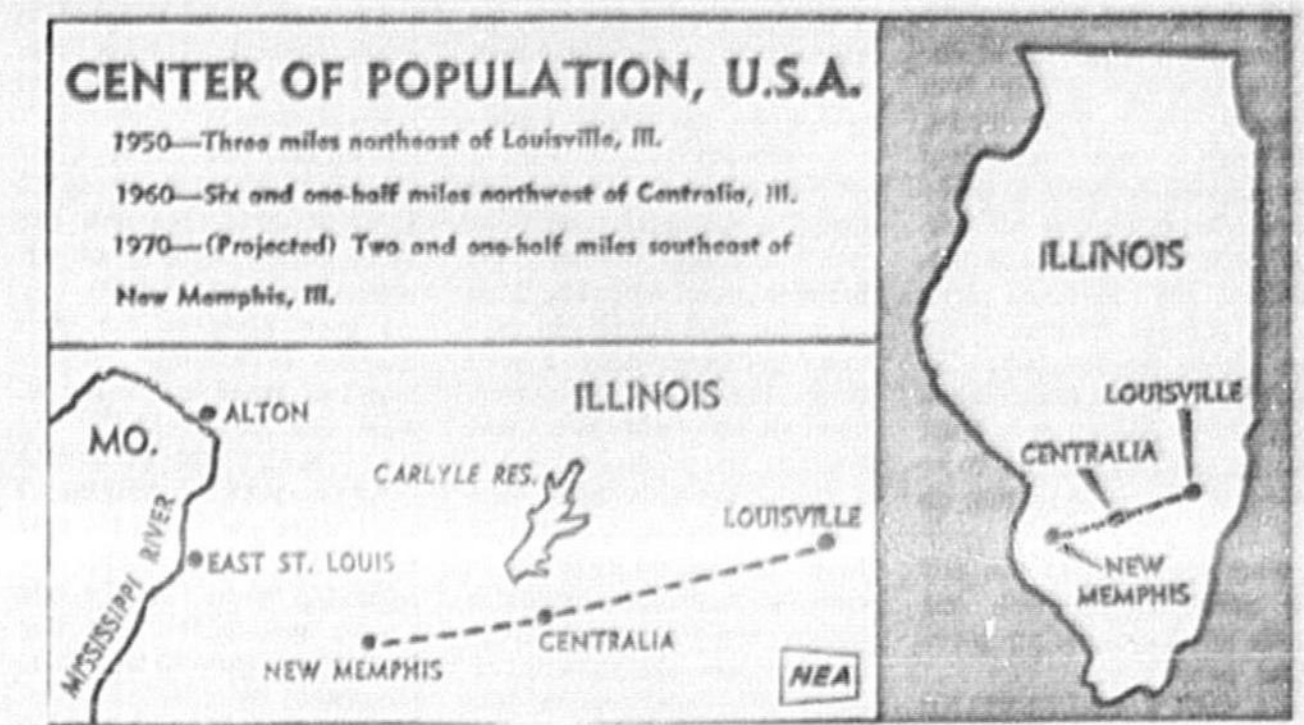

4-Cities Merger Picture Is Dim

Only two of the four South Seminole municipalities involved were represented Thursday night at a special meeting called by Casselberry City Council Chairman Thomas Napier for this purpose of dialogue on the proposed merger study.

Attending the meeting held in the Casselberry City Hall were in addition to Napier, who chaired the discussion, Councilmen Edith Dwert and Louis Kirby, of Casselberry, and Mayor Clifford Jordan and Councilman Pat DeVillaggio, of North Orlando. A Longwood Council meeting conflicted with the merger meet. Altamonte, whose mayor, Lawrence Swadlow, has stated opposition to the merger move, was not represented.

Mayor Jordan, whose community is the only one thus far to send the necessary data to the city to Dr. Paul Douglas, head of Rollins College Center for Practical Politics, read a letter from the professor offering to do the feasibility study at no cost to the cities. In order to proceed, Douglas asked that each city send a formal letter of authorization.

Student Placement Plan For 1970-71 Is Outlined

The much discussed and in some quarters maligned student placement plan for the 1970-71 school year was unveiled tonight during the School Board meeting and, except for some changes in the existing transportation zones, it was not too different than the plan in use this year.

Andrew Bracken, administrative aide, outlined the proposals affecting county elementary, middle and high schools.

Using three county maps, Bracken pointed to the boundary areas around each school and explained that under the county's freedom of choice plan, a student may attend any school he desires, but can expect to be bused only to those schools for which a transportation zone has been established.

Four county elementary schools are termed walk-ins and no busing will be provided in the following: Hopper and Hopper elementary schools in Altamonte Springs.

Bracken said some elementary bus zones were changed in the Sanford area to get more students in the new air-conditioned Idlewild facilities. These 148 pupils will be mostly from the Academy Manor area, he said. Some 70 students from the Sanford area will be bused to Idlewild.

Sanford is expected to have an enrollment of 1,082 and Lakeview 1,152 students.

South Seminole middle schools are Milwee for students living east of 14 and west of Highway 17-92, and South Seminoles for students living west of 14 and east of 17-92.

Sixth grade will operate at Lawton next year and seventh and eighth grades will also continue next year at Oviedo Junior-Senior High.

High schools in Sanford will be more affected than Lyman High, because of the presence of Croons High and complicated matters even more is the case.

While the motion for the special meeting was on the floor and had been made and seconded, a citizen was allowed to interrupt. Charles Latoe spoke out, urging the council to have the special meeting and pass the ordinance in order to protect the city.

James Gambin, of Pine Street, appeared before council with a request for zoning variance in order that his daughter's trailer could be parked on a block foundation on the rear yard in order to protect the city.

Here again, just which side of the line will attend morning or afternoon sessions must wait until all information is known.
