Sympathizers with Nationalist China find little cheer in the recent war news from that country. The defeat in Manchuria seems to be of disastrous proportions.

A graver matter is whether Chiang can effectively rally the hungry, war-weary Chinese people to the great effort which may be called for in the face of the disaster in the north.

Those who espouse the belief that Communism will blow up in due course because of its undemocratic structure... have received plenty of encouragement for this view in the efforts of the 58-nation Social Committee of the United Nations Assembly in Paris to draw up a charter of human rights.

Progress in writing this all-important document has been marked by a fierce battle between Soviet Russia and the anti-Communist nations. The efforts of the Muscovites have been aimed at limiting the rights of the individual and making him a puppet of the state.

In order to understand the significance of this, it is essential that we recognize the structure of present day Communism. A lot of people have the mistaken idea that the current Communism is the same mild and beneficent ideology of long ago which laid down a humanitarian code of one for all and all for one.

The current so-called Communism is Bolshevism. It is a cold blooded philosophy of totalitarian dictatorship in which the individual is wholly subservient to the state—a cog in a machine.

That is the background for the maneuvers of the Soviet Union. Alex Pavlov in the Social Committee—and he has fought doggedly for the totalitarian code. For example, he sought to delete freedom of religion from the declaration of human rights.

The Russian position in this argument about religion is easy to understand. One of the cardinal tenets of Bolshevism is that religion is the opium of the masses and must be destroyed.

Sanford Ball Club Has 20 Assigned Players For 1948

10 Men Are Rookies, But Nine '48 Players Are Slated To Return To Locals

Despite the football talk of teams being selected for bowl games, and stunning upsets on the gridiron, baseball-minded people of Sanford and Seminole County are beginning to think about the 1949 baseball season and the Sanford entry in the Florida State League.

Yesterday Manager Hal Gruber of the 1948 edition of the Sanford aggregation declared that the New York Giants have assigned contracts for 20 baseball players for the Sanford Giants in 1949.

Among the 20 players will be ten '48 rookies, one assigned player and nine men returning from last year's squad.

"Many people are beginning to ask me if we are going to have a good ball club for the coming year. I can truthfully say that I do not know what we will have until the opening day of the season. I do not even know if I will be manager of the Sanford club," Gruber declared.

"Many of the youngsters returning from last year's club will be given an opportunity to show they have the ability to make better ball clubs, if they can do it then we will either take them, or give them their releases. I can not say a thing about the rookies assigned to Sanford. They have been assigned to contracts by scouts in the Giants' organization, but that is all I can say at this time," he added.

Buddy Lake, Connie Kavakis, Len Matle, Johnny McManus, Charlie Pappo, Pat Romanelli, Charlie Rocco, Joe Schultz and Bill Spinkks have been re-assigned to Sanford by the New York Giants. Sanford fans will remember that all of these men played on the 1948 Sanford club.

James Glackin has been assigned to Sanford by the Ogdensburg, N. Y. entry in the Border League, a Class C organization. Glackin is a right handed pitcher from Philadelphia. "I know little of this fellow's ability. I do know that he pitched very little last year for Ogdensburg, because they had an experienced staff," Gruber said.

Six rookie right handed pitchers have been named to appear in Sanford uniforms when spring training opens. They include: Ed Kurpiewski, 27, from New Britain, Conn., five feet ten inches tall and weighs 165; Al Miller, 19, from Philadelphia, six feet tall and weighs 175; Pete Muller, 20, from New York City, six feet-one inch tall and weighs 175; Gene Shelton, 21, from Indian Head, Md., five feet-ten inches tall and weighs 190 and Hank Becker, 21, Beckenmeyer, Ill., six feet tall and weighs 185.

George Shmogradoff is a catcher, 19, from St. Louis, Mo. He is six feet tall and weighs 180. Three infielders include Dick Bangham, 18, from Philadelphia. He is five feet-ten inches tall and weighs 150. Ed Kasko, 18, is a shortstop on Elizabeth, N. J. He is five feet-11 inches tall and weighs 160. Charlie Furry, 19, is a combination third baseman-shortstop. His home is New York City. Sal Ferrara, 19, is the only rookie outfielder listed on the rosters. He hails from New York City and is six feet tall. He weighs 190.

With this array of new men, and the holdovers from the '48 season, Sanford has the largest number of men assigned to a team in the Florida State League.

"We are looking forward to the baseball school to be held in Sanford in February. We are in hopes of getting several men out of that school," Gruber asserted.

Georgia's Geri May Break Point Record In SEC

ATLANTA, Nov. 16, (AP)—Only 21 points separate Georgia's Joe Geri from breaking the Southeastern Conference scoring record of 98 points set by Steve Van Buren of LSU in 1943.

At Geri's present pace of averaging just short of ten points per game, the record will stand, but at least one of Georgia's two remaining games should give the slow starting but powerful Phoenixville, Pa., runner a chance to step up his pace.

Georgia's two remaining games are against Furman and Georgia Tech. Geri's 78 points were scored with eight touchdowns and 30 extra point kicks. There is little likelihood he will break Frank Sinkwich's record of 14 touchdowns in a season, set in 1942, but he is a real threat to Van Buren's mark.

Van Buren scored 14 touchdowns and kicked 14 points. Sinkwich was Georgia's All-American back in the early war years. In addition to scoring the most touchdowns in a season, Sinkwich is the conference's second highest scorer with 96 points, made during the 1942 season.

Already Geri has equaled or surpassed the scoring leaders of 1935 through 1940, the leader in 1916 and last year's co-leaders, Charlie Conerly of Mississippi and Bobby Forbes of Florida.

The 30 placements successfully kicked by Geri put him among the all-time leading kickers, but he still is far short of the 17 placements kicked by George Jernigan of Georgia in 1946.

Another power driver is in the runner-up spot this year. Ed Price of Tulane with 48 points is second but hardly a threat to Geri. Vanderbilt's Dean Davidson, Tech's Frank Ziegler and Florida's Chuck Hunsinger and John Cox are bunched at third place with 36 points apiece.

Gators Get 6 More State Prep Stars

GAINESVILLE, Nov. 16, (AP)—Six outstanding high school athletes will be among enrollees at the University of Florida next September, university athletic officials said last night.

Four players of the strong Robert E. Lee high school football team of Jacksonville are included. They are Bob Knight, end and also baseball, basketball and track competitor; Stanley Cain, tackle; trackman David Jones, halfback and trackman; Mikey Kelly, end and basketball and track athlete.

The other two are Jackie Pappas, football fullback from Tarpon Springs, and Charles Malloy, football half tackle from Leon high in Tallahassee.

Coch Ray Wolf said last night: "It begins to look now as though we will have one of the finest groups of freshmen athletes in the South next fall."

The Harlem dandy won a unanimous 10-round non-title decision over undersized Bobby Lee of Baltimore as many in the arena crowd of 4,792 cried "draw" at the fight's end.

The welterweight champion—weighing in at 154—was far from the devastating fighting man who won the title two years ago from Tommy Bell after five years as the recognized "uncrowned welterweight king."

Michigan Takes Commanding Lead In Race For Year's Grid Honors

By WILL GRIMSLEY NEW YORK, Nov. 16, (AP)—With only one more game to play, Michigan has taken a commanding lead in the race for the year's football team honors.

The Wolverines moved more than 200 points ahead of runner up Notre Dame by grabbing 130 first place votes in the weekly Associated Press poll of football writers and broadcasters.

They had a total of 1,922 points compared with 1,721 for the Irish, who led at the end of the regular season vote last year.

Army is in third place with 1,426 and California completed the big four with 1,228. North Carolina, with 1,094, climbed from sixth to fifth on the strength of its smashing victory over Maryland.

Completing the first ten, in order, are Penn State, Northwestern, Oklahoma, Clemson and Southern Methodist.

The mighty men of Michigan grew in prestige by swamping Indiana, 54-0, Saturday while their main challengers, Notre Dame and Army, were shouldering through in the hardest way.

The Irish had to rally late to beat out Northwestern, 13-7, while the Cadets won in the last 30 seconds over Pennsylvania, 24-20.

Michigan plays Ohio State this week at Columbus and a convincing triumph may clinch them the season's No. 1 position.

Notre Dame plays Washington two weeks hence and Southern California on Dec. 4. Army closes with Navy Nov. 27.

Four Southeastern Conference teams were named for places among the second ten teams. Georgia was chosen for 11th place with 292 votes, Tulane for 14th with 172, Mississippi 17th with 60, and Georgia Tech 20th with 16.

Vanderbilt received nine votes and Tennessee 3.

ALEXANDER GETS AWARD

NEW YORK, Nov. 16, (AP)—W. A. (Bill) Alexander, Georgia Tech athletic director, is winner of the 1948 National Touchdown Club award as the person who has done the most for football over a long period of time.

The club made the announcement yesterday at the weekly meeting of New York Football Writers.

Last year's award went to Glenn S. (Pop) Warner. Others to receive the honor have been Coach Lou Little of Columbia and the veteran Alenzo A. Stagg, now associate coach at Susquehanna.

Alexander was head coach at Georgia Tech from 1920 through the 1944 season. He became athletic director when Bobby Dodd succeeded him as mentor.

His teams won 183 games, lost 25 and tied eight. He was the first coach to send teams to the four major bowl games.

A group of eastern coaches with small college squads voiced objections to the two-plateau system yesterday at the weekly meeting of New York football writers.

Meanwhile, a poll of Southeastern Conference tutors showed four of them against the regulations, one in favor of modification, one undecided and two for the rule.

The rule permits unlimited substitution and encourages so-called two-unit play among institutions with adequate material. The two-plateau system calls for sending separate 11-man units into the field for offensive and defensive play. Army is a leading proponent of the two-unit system.

The foreign ministers of the United States, Britain and France met at the French foreign office to frame their reply and adjourned after 40 minutes.

The nature of this reply was kept secret, but authoritative sources said it coincided with a French view that the west will not negotiate under the duress of the Berlin blockade, but hopes that the Berlin issue can be solved by conciliation.

A French government spokesman announced this stand earlier.

The government also circulated a statement denying recent suggestions in the French press that the foreign ministry, the premier's office and the president's office were not in agreement on the appeal for Berlin talks.

The American, British and French foreign ministers met late today at the French foreign office to draw up replies to the Lie-Evatt appeal. Secretary of State Marshall was accompanied by the U. S. ambassador to Paris, Jefferson Caffery. The acting British foreign secretary, Hector McNeill, was accompanied by the British ambassador to Paris, Sir Oliver Harvey. Foreign Minister Schuman represented France. Philip C. Jessup, U. S. Deputy on the Security Council, and Charles Bohlen of the U. S. State Department, also attended.

Mitterand emphasized to reporters after the French cabinet meeting that the exchange of letters by Lie and Evatt on one hand and by the foreign ministers on the other represents a demonstration of willingness to reach a solution of the blockade, which Russia imposed last June.

There is no question, he said of a text which would involve

agreement to definite proposals. Mitterand pointed out the Lie-Evatt letters referred to a general statement of principles favoring settlement of international disputes. This statement was contained in a resolution introduced in the General Assembly by Mexico and adopted unanimously.

Mitterand said the Evatt-Lie move pleased the French government, that it had always favored a conciliatory approach to disputes.

General Marshall, he said, never wanted to do anything but re-

lieve from the time he left the Army. He is serving as a patriotic duty.

And, the President went on, General Marshall is one of the greatest patriots of this country. In his first news conference since his stunning election victory, the President announced unequivocally that he would press the new Congress for enactment of the Democratic platform, including the Civil Rights proposals, and embracing his original 21-point domestic program of Sept. 8, 1948.

But, adopting the language of his recent campaign, he said he would not call a special session of what he described as the do-nothing 80th Congress.

Senator Bridges (R-N.H.) had

proposed a special session to deal with the deteriorating situation in China.

Mr. Truman said today that we are in communication with the president of China now. He would not discuss his communications with Chiang Kai-Shek, however.

As to whether new aid is being planned, he said Congress has authorized spending \$125,000,000 aiding that country.
