

Leathernecks Fighting On 'Hottest' Front In War

SAIGON (AP) — A powerful strike force from three U.S. aircraft carriers bombed a MIG airfield just outside the North Vietnamese port of Hai Phong today and two of the city's thermal power plants, including one inside the city limits.

The raid just after noon cost one Skyhawk jet shot down by Red gunners — the 58th U.S. combat plane reported lost over North Vietnam. The pilot was missing.

The two power plants had been hit before on April 26, but the raid on the Kien An airfield 3 1/2 miles southwest of Hai Phong was the first against that MIG base. It was the third MIG base bombed by American warplanes.

In the ground war the northern corner of South Vietnam continued to be the hottest front as U.S. Marines fought another battle with North Vietnamese troops and Air Force B-26s made two attacks in support of the Leathernecks. The Marines claimed 31 North Vietnamese died in a five-hour fight Tuesday but reported 24 Marines killed and 19 wounded.

The jets that raided the Hai Phong area streaked off the flight decks of the carriers Enterprise, Hancock and Kitty Hawk.

A U.S. spokesman said the nighttime raids had good weather and the pilots reported they bombs on target. However, there was no immediate assessment of bomb damage.

Following the previous raids on the power stations, pilots reported the lights of North Vietnam's major port went out for one night.

The power plant inside Hai Phong, in a northwest sector of the city, is part of an industrial complex which includes a cement plant that also has been bombed. The other power plant is just east of the Hai Phong city limits.

The coordinated strikes from the carriers were among the heaviest raids ever made on the Hai Phong area.

The Kien An airfield is evidently one of the secondary bases for the North Vietnamese air force's jets. A spokesman said MIGs had been seen operating from the field in the past few days but he did not know if there were any on the field when it was hit.

He also had no word on whether MIG opposition was encountered in the air.

American warplanes have previously blasted the MIG bases at Kep, 57 miles northeast of Hanoi, and Hoa Lac 29 miles west of the capital.

A spokesman said Tuesday that Hoa Lac fields, hit five times, could no longer be used. Although three MIG bases have now been hit, the North Vietnamese air force has at least three other jet fields which have not been bombed. Those are at Phuc Yen, Gia Lam and Cat Be, all in the Hanoi-Hai Phong area.

The ground battle in the northwest corner of South Vietnam Tuesday developed when a Communist force of unknown strength opened up with snipers and automatic weapons fire on part of the 3rd Marine Regiment nine miles northwest of Khe Sanh.

Fighting continued for five hours. The North Vietnamese contact only Tuesday night after the Marines called in reinforcements and air support.

The B-26s flew in high above the mountain terrain Tuesday night to hit Red positions 14 miles northwest of Khe Sanh.

LBJ Lays His Re-election Chances On The Line

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson laid his 1968 re-election chances on the line of "Great Society" accomplishments and the fight against "naked aggression" in Vietnam.

The President left little doubt he expects to be the party's nominee next year when he told a glittering Democratic dinner at which about 2,000 persons paid \$250 a plate Tuesday night.

"If the Democratic party continues to serve by giving the greatest good to the greatest number, in the year 1968, as we come around the turn, we'll come home for the victory the people deserve."

Johnson told the cheering Democrats he believes the party's success depends on how voters react to efforts to share economic security of the elderly, curb crime, counter air pollution and secure rights for all citizens.

"That will demand of us at home and abroad the will, yes, the character, to persevere when the going gets tough," he said.

"It will take character to stand for freedom against naked aggression, and when some say it is none of our business to resist it."

This challenge found two of the President's chief war policy critics, Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D.N.Y., and J.W. Fulbright, D Ark., busy elsewhere.

Kennedy was on his way to California, Fulbright, an object of caustic presidential remarks at a similar dinner last year, entered Walter Reed Army Hospital Monday for treatment of bronchitis.

Tongue-in-cheek, Johnson greeted members of "our quiet but completely unified party."

He said if this was irreparable, he would call for a special election.

That was not called upon for any remark.

House Speaker John B. McCormack, 53 years old, said he predicted Johnson's re-election. These and sundry other speeches were delivered against a backdrop of a 9 by 12 foot photo of Johnson sitting in the Oval Room rocker the late President John F. Kennedy made famous—gesturing with both hands, his rimless glasses in his right fist.

Except for a mention of Kennedy by the President, any other evidence of the Kennedy re-election was consistently lacking in the transcripts and the program.

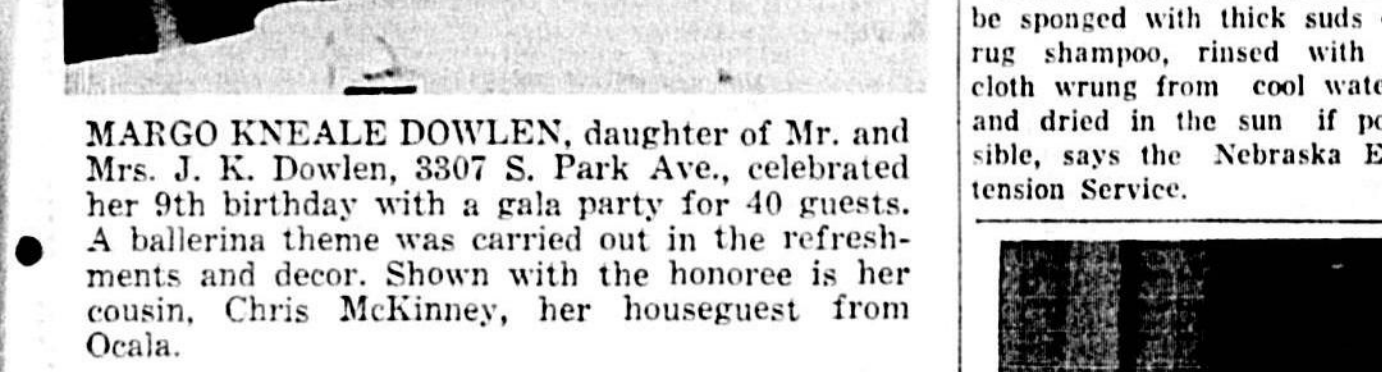

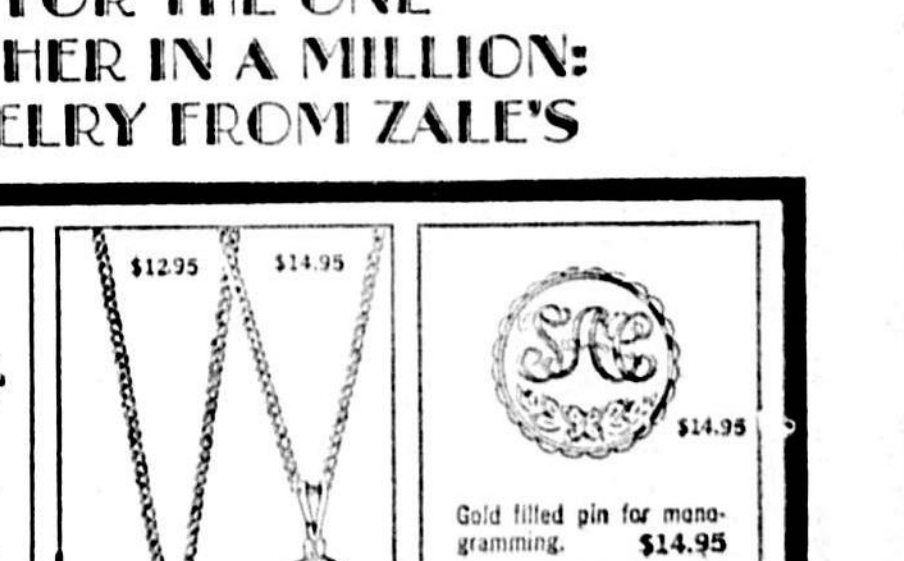

Ballot Space Expensive For Geo. Wallace

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama could find it expensive and difficult to get his name on the ballot in every state if he becomes a third-party candidate for president next year.

Each state makes its own laws in this field and they vary widely.

In some the number of signatures required for effective petitions would necessitate an army of volunteer workers, salaried solicitors, legal talent or a paid headquarters staff.

Wallace said in an interview with executives of the Richmond News Leader published Monday: "We know how to get on the ballot in every state—all 50 states."

He mentioned California and Ohio as possibly the most difficult.

In Ohio, the requirement is a petition bearing signatures equal to 15 per cent of the vote for governor in the last election. On the basis of the 1966 election, this would be 432,000 names.

In California, a third party can get on the ballot with backing from 65,000 voters, or one per cent of the total vote cast last November. However, these 65,000 must be registered as adherents of the third party 135 days before the election.

There are small fees and but in the laws of some states which complicate petition routes for getting on the ballot.

In Indiana, a third-party candidate needs a petition with only one-half of one per cent of the vote cast for secretary of state in the last election. This works out to 8,200 for 868.

Chicken Headed For The Coop

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Joseph Pavada (Chicken) Caciatore, 48, who ducked out before Dade County (Fla.) could toss him in jail for five years on a burglary conviction, has popped up in Las Vegas. Caciatore has been in the Clark County jail since April 16 when, according to a sheriff's deputy, the fugitive was caught forging stolen traveler's checks in a strip hotel. It was in December that Dade Criminal Court Judge Carlisle Stedman ordered Caciatore committed to jail although the Chicken was no where in sight. A month earlier, he did not show up in Tampa Criminal Court to face charges of buying, receiving and concealing stolen property and possession of burglary tools. At that time, an attorney for Caciatore said his client might have fled the country. But in Las Vegas, where Joseph Caciatore became known to police as Joseph Carruso, the books showed his residence as Las Angeles. While Caciatore waits for his next court appearance, maybe in Nevada on forgery charges, authorities in Florida started procedures to return him to the state and Ralston Prison. Caciatore was convicted for his part in the 1964 looting of the Voyager Hotel on Biscayne boulevard in Miami. "I'll do everything I can to get him back," said Judge Stedman. "I really want to see the man."
