Girl Witness In Pantages Trial Tells Of Party

Miss Nitto, the state charged, was brought here from Hollywood by William Jobmann and Olive Clark Day, alleged operators of a "girl market" there, as a result of a conspiracy entered into by the mart operators with John P. Mills, real estate dealer, Jesse H. Shreve, business man and Pantages.

Mills pleaded guilty to contributing to the delinquency of Miss Nitto, was freed of the conspiracy count, and Thursday testified for the prosecution.

Miss Nitto described the party at the hotel and broke into tears when she told what happened when she and Pantages were together. She said Pantages gave her \$10 and asked her not to tell the others, adding that she was "too young to be here."

The next day, the day Mills testified he, Shreve and Pantages were in confer on an overdue \$50,000 note she had signed, the Day woman told her and Miss Helen Livingston, her companion, they would not be needed longer. Miss Nitto said she also declared Miss Day showed her a roll of bills saying "Mr. Shreve has taken care of everything."

Each girl, she said, was given \$10.

Mills had testified Thursday he and Shreve planned the party and agreed to pay Mrs. Day \$500 to bring the girls, because they wanted to "put Pantages in a good humor" before the conference.

After spotting the Giants three runs in the first inning, the Cards came from behind to win 8 to 7 in 10 innings today. It was the Cards' third victory of the series, and gave them a lead of three and one-half games. A rookie first baseman, Collins, of Rochester, drove in the winning run after Watkins had singled to open the 10th, advanced on Frisch's sacrifice, and stole third. Burleigh Grimes got credit for the win, his eighth of the season, although he pitched but one inning.

The Reds are in a winning streak. They whipped the Phillies 9 to 2 to make it three straight wins. Johnson held the Phillies to 7 hits, while the Reds, led by Hoettger and Crabtree, pounded out 13 hits off four hurlers.

Old Thomas Zachary hurled another shoutout game, this time defeating the Pirates 4 to 2. He gave up six hits while the Braves got only five off Meine and Grant. Regan and Sankey erred in the seventh for the Pirates, and the Braves poked out two hits to take advantage of it, scoring three runs. Berger hit a homer in the eighth for the fourth run.

The Robins scored early to give them a 3 to 1 win over the Cubs, getting an even break in the series. Phelps and Quinn allowed six hits, while the Robins got nine off Root. The win put them in fifth place.

The White Sox won a thrilling 12-inning game from the Athletics, 7 to 5, the features of which were three: Lefty Grove lost his second game of the year; The Athletics lost their first game of the year to a Western club, and Lu Fonseca hit a homer with one on in the 12th to win the game. Hias and Watwood hit homers earlier in the game. The Sox got 13 hits off Mahaffey, McDonald and Grive, while Faber, Braxton and McKain limited the A's to seven hits.

One of the best pitching duels ever played in the American League saw two veterans, Sam Jones of the Senators, and George Uhle, of the Tigers, battle for 11 innings before the Tigers broke an eight-game losing streak and won, 1 to 0. Uhle allowed only five hits in the 11-inning, and did not walk a single batter.

Sweeney and Berry led the Red Sox to a 4 to 3 win over the Indians, who had won 10 straight games. Morris hurled great ball, checking the heavy-hitting Indians at every step.

Babe Ruth won a hectic ball game when he hit a homer with one on in the ninth giving the Yanks the game with the Browns, by an 8 to 7 score. The Yanks had a 6 run lead for five innings, but Herb Pennock blew up and Piggas and Weinert had to be called in before any good was done. Kross hit a homer with one on in the seventh, while Ouellet hit one in the eighth with none on.

The leaders to date Honora, Klein, Phillips, 121 triples; Worthington, 8 runs; Cronin, Senators, 7 each; Douglas, Webb, Red Sox, 23; Alton, Klein, Phillips, 44; next, Klein, Cronin, Senators, Gehrig, Yanks, 20 each; stolen bases, John B. The American League today lost some momentum when the White Sox and Athletics tied in the ninth, but the Sox won in the 12th.

Personal we favor DeLand to win the first half, with the rest of the teams spread out like this: Daytona, Winter Park, Cocoa, St. Augustine and Sanford. Winter Park third unless they strengthen as the season between now and Thursday. Cocoa fourth because Sanford, Johnson, and Alton will pitch good enough ball to a mediocre hitting team to win games with St. Augustine fifth because they have too many old timers on the club, and Al Whalley, their coach, is just about through; and Sanford last, because it is impossible to strengthen the club until the management is able to find the players for the number of games they have to play.

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MEMPHIS GARBAGE BURNED
 MEMPHIS, Tenn., June 6.—(AP)—Fire Capt. Dick Droop and Lieut. Austin were injured yesterday in fighting a fire which swept the Public Market-East Company garage, causing damage approximately \$50,000. An auto top and fuel tank landed near door to the garage but was damaged.

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The machine, more than twice as powerful as that in which, a little more than four years ago, he flew to Paris, was in the plant near North Beach, Long Island, being equipped with fantom in place of its recently installed retractable landing gear. The work was all but finished but the Flying Colonel's plane still was in the making, he told interviewers.

The entire journey, with the announced destination China, and Japan, will be made with water stops, Colonel Lindbergh said. He added that his wife would assist in flying the trans-Pacific machine.

The low-wing monoplane will be equipped with radio and both of its passengers will be able to operate the set. On none of his previous important flights has Colonel Lindbergh had wireless in his airplane.

Colonel Lindbergh continued today to study many angles of the flight. He is keenly interested in its geographical side, and has tentatively charted some routes but said that definite decision must be deferred. Waterways are plentiful along these routes. "Naturally we favor a route that offers ample water landings," he said, "but you can land the 'pontoson' on soft ground, you know, if you have to, without causing much, if any, damage. You can land them in plowed ground safely, I should say."

Regarding the possibility of making it a round trip flight, Colonel Lindbergh said his present plans called for such a voyage. He said, however, that was among the unsettled matters confronting him. The return may be made by steamship.

He was still uncertain of the time of departure. He said he "hardly thought" the take-off would be made within three weeks. "I have asked the State Department to make arrangements for Mrs. Lindbergh and me to visit."

LEGISLATURE GETS UNDER WAY ON NEW SESSION OF 60-DAYS
 TALLAHASSEE, June 6.—(AP)—The Florida Legislature opened a special 60-day session today with the introduction of seven major revenue measures sponsored by Governor Carlton.

Immediately after organization and the introduction of the bills both houses adjourned over the weekend. The House will reconvene Wednesday morning and the Senate Tuesday night.

The special session followed the regular 60-day session which ended at 12:30 o'clock today.

The Governor in calling the extraordinary meeting, laid down a program of finance and taxation which included a tax of \$1.50 on each \$100 gross receipts of gas, electric, telephone, and telegraph companies; the creation of a state purchasing department; a tax of five cents a gallon on gasoline; the creation of a health and unemployment tax on business and industry; the location of the state's gasoline tax revenues in counties on the basis of area, population, and money spent in state road construction; and increased contributions from the passenger tax on buses, and freight capacity tax on trucks. The measures covering these recommendations were introduced at regular session but not advanced to final vote in both houses.

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
