Pan Am doubles number of flights to Puerto Rico

In response to market demand, Pan American Airways has announced plans to add a second daily round trip flight between Sanford and San Juan, Puerto Rico. The original Pan Am service to Puerto Rico was announced in January, and will begin on May 24. Now, the second flight has been announced. It will begin on May 30.

The route will be operated as a part of a strategic relationship between Pan Am, Carlson Wagonlit Travel-Turavia's San Juan office and Expert Travel of Altamonte Springs. The route partnership provides the opportunity to promote travel packages in conjunction with Pan Am's scheduled service.

Dave Fink, President of Pan Am said, "The combination of strong passenger interest in Pan Am and our Orlando Sanford facility as well as a great working relationship with Carlson Wagonlit and Expert Travel has made the San Juan market a success even before the first flight has taken off." He added, "We are especially encouraged by the volume of traffic that originates from Worcester and other cities we serve that will connect to San Juan through Sanford."

The Pan Am Clipper fare does not require a round trip purchase, Saturday night stay or advance purchase.

From the Orlando-Sanford International Airport, Pan now has regular service to Boston and New England through Portsmouth, N.H., the Gary/Chicago airport, Bangor, Me., Lehigh Valley International Airport in Allentown, Penn., Mid America-St Louis airport, and Worcester, Ma.

The trip between San Juan and Sanford is expected to take approximately two hours and 50 minutes.

Residents will vote on lighting proposal

SANFORD — Streetlights or no streetlights, that's the question residents of the Historic District will answer in the coming weeks.

The City Commission authorized city staff to move forward with a plan to erect decorative street lights on every east/west and north/south road between French and Sanford avenues and between 3rd Street and 13th Street. Part of that plan includes a ballot initiative to determine if property owners in the Historic District will support a special assessment tax district to pay for the installation and

maintenance of the lighting project. Under the terms commissioners approved Monday night, every property owner in the district will receive a ballot to express whether they are for or against the tax district. If 51 percent of the returned ballots are in favor of the tax district, the city will conduct a public hearing and most likely approve installing the lights.

"I would like to have more than 51

percent," said Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard. "If the majority of residents vote to add this tax, we as City Commissioners should be thrilled these folks would vote to pay for this."

Andrew Van Gaale, a consultant the city has hired to assist with the project, explained that a ballot would be provided for each parcel of property in the proposed assessment district. If one person owns 10 parcels of property, that owner

would receive 10 votes and likewise would be taxed 10 times if the lighting proposal is approved.

Van Gaale also explained those parcels belonging to multiple owners would have only one vote.

"The property owners would have to determine among themselves how that one vote would be cast," Van Gaale said.

"A lot of people have asked me about that," Lessard said. "It's very important people understand how the voting will be conducted."

The project will cost approximately \$690,000 to install 122 15-foot historic

Lessard delays naming SHA board

Mayor needs more time; legal services group files motion to nullify resignations

SANFORD — Mayor Brady Lessard put off naming his appointments to the Sanford Housing Authority Board of Commissioners until Thursday, when City Commissioners will meet in a continuance of Monday night's regular session. The meeting begins at 5 p.m.

Lessard was expected to fill the positions Monday, since one of the seats is currently vacate, and four others will be open May 1. During a work session Monday afternoon, Lessard said he delayed his announcement because wanted commissioners to meet all of his nominations at once.

"I think the commission needs to meet them all and be able to ask any questions they might have," Lessard said. "I tried to coordinate that meeting for this afternoon, but a couple folks had prior commitments."

Lessard also said he received three more applications for the board shortly before the 3:30 p.m. work session, and he wanted time to consider those applications, as well.

Lessard's nominations could be delayed even further following a motion filed Monday by

Region looks to Canada for high-tech skills

HEATHROW — Members from the high-tech industry gathered Monday to discuss a new international consortium established to help Central Florida keep up with the growing world of software development.

The VIP luncheon hosted by the Seminole/Lake Mary Regional Chamber of Commerce was held to introduce local high tech companies to the concept of a Canadian/Central Florida partnership created to enhance software development in both countries.

High-Tech Products International Corporation recently

developed a Canadian solution to aid in the high-tech skills shortage facing Central Florida and other areas in the United States, said Steve Flamm, business development officer with the Canadian Consulate.

The Altamonte Springs-based company put together a consortium of about 15 Canadian companies interested in partnering

with local companies in the software and high-tech industries.

"This is a good solution to the problem," Flamm said. "The government of Canada is very excited about this strategic alliance that will benefit both countries."

According to Flamm, the con-

SANFORD — Coffee consumption in downtown may be on the rise.

Cool Beans Coffee, a traditional house of java, recently opened among the antique stores and office buildings in Magnolia Square. According to owner Lisa Blackshaw, the new business offers a commodity previously not available to people visiting and working in downtown.

"My husband and I came here on the weekends to shop," Blackshaw said. "My husband is a big coffee drinker, and there was no place to grab a coffee and walk."

Hence, the Orlando resident decided it was time to fulfill her dream of opening a business. After months of transforming the old office building into a colorful coffee house, Blackshaw sold her first cup of Cool Beans coffee on April 2.

Becoming an entrepreneur didn't happen over night for Blackshaw. The mother of four

Former commander of Sanford NAS dies

Retired Rear Adm. Richard E. Fowler, former commander of the Sanford Naval Air Station, died Monday, April 23, after a long battle against cancer. He was 76.

Born in New Orleans and raised in Houston, Fowler graduated from high school at 16 and attended Rice University. On his 18th birthday, he signed up with the Navy and began flight training school.

Fowler fly combat missions during World War II and the Korean War, collecting the Navy Cross, Silver Star, four Distinguished Flying Crosses and nine Air Medals.

During his second duty in Sanford, as commander of the Sanford NAS, Fowler found the house on Silver Lake that he moved his family to after retiring from the Navy in 1974.

It was here that he became deeply rooted in his adopted community.

Fowler owned and operated the Dollar Rent-A-Car franchises in Orlando,

and taught corporate financial management at the University of Central Florida.

He was a member of the Friends of the St. Johns River

and was active in trying to preserve the rural setting of his Silver Lake neighborhood in the shadow of the booming Orlando/Sanford International Airport.

Remembering the five W's

"Dear Sir: Please put the following item in your paper to promote our upcoming event." Fine. I'm usually the one who puts it into the computer system where it will be taken and placed on a page for publishing in the *Seminole Herald*.

It isn't easy. It's not a matter of simply copying what was sent to us via fax or letter. It involves the proper use of the basics in writing — who, what, why, when, and where. I'm constantly having to phone people to get the full information — and even then, many times there is no phone number or name for a contact. The "where" is often omitted. "The (name) organization will meet..." is an example. The members know where they will meet, but not every resident knows the location. Many people identify a facility, but fail to say where it is. A street address should always be included — and with the duplication of street names around the county, even the name should be included.

Acronyms bug me to death. Many are common, such as the P&Z (Planning and Zoning) VFW, (Veterans of Foreign Wars), and RSVP. But everyone does not know every acronym. BCC for example — is it Board of County Commissioners, Brevard Community College or Bethune Cookman College? If the PDQ met at the PAV building to discuss XYZ, how many people would know what's going on?

In the past few weeks, the following are some of the acronyms we have used, but only with an explanation of what they stand for. If you weren't part of the organization involved, would you know what these mean: ABATE, P.E.O., GIFT, EFO, NACO, GIS, FOWR, HIBC, etc.

There also needs to be clarification on who is invited to a specific event. "The general public is invited" is a common phrase used by many. But there are times when a meeting or gathering is strictly for membership, or a small group. Seeking publicity (for example) of an activity in one classroom of one school. In which only those students would be involved, it's exactly something to be promoted. The students know what is coming up, and if no one else is invited, why promote it? Yet we often get such items.

For everyone's sake, there's the sending of information. I have actually received a "please publish" letter two days after the event happened.

It should be known by now that the *Seminole Herald* goes out Wednesdays (Midweek) and Saturdays (Weekend). Stories are written and the paper is compiled before those times, so it should be apparent that receipt of a "please publish" item late Tuesday afternoon will not be in Wednesday's publication.

We receive these items via fax, mail, and often hand-delivered. The mail isn't necessarily something which will reach us the following day. It can be assumed that an event isn't set up the preceding day. Therefore, as soon as information is available, send it in. The earlier the better.

The *Herald* is happy to help inform the general public about events and occasions, but we have no mind readers on the staff.

Remember, WHO, WHAT, WHY, WHEN and WHERE, and do it early.

From 1967 until it closed in 1976, the present site of New Tribes Mission on East First Street in Sanford, was the Sanford Naval Academy. It was a private preparatory boarding school, offering private personal education with small classes, with the focal point being true learning experiences.

Students enrolled in the school were from various parts of the United States, as well as some from Central and South America, Mexico and Canada.

Many of the staff members were retired military personnel, giving the students a structured learning environment while offering leadership training as well as an advanced education. The staff members were excellent as role models for the midshipmen and stood as examples of leadership and service to their country from the late 60s to early 70s.

Some of the instructors, many local area residents from Daytona Beach to Orlando, not only served as educators, but as

Young suffering Child slave trade sparks little outrage

In the summer of 1996, two Baltimore journalists went to Africa — to the war-torn, sun-scorched and desperate country of Sudan — to buy a slave. They had little trouble making the transaction.

Slavery has been commonplace in Sudan for decades, collateral damage from a vicious civil war. The journalists bought two boys for about \$1,000 and returned them to their grateful father.

The two journalists — an African-American columnist and a white foreign correspondent for The (Baltimore) Sun — might have expected their stories about the Sudanese slave trade to provoke howls of outrage and protest from Americans, especially African-Americans. They might have expected pickets outside the Sudanese embassy, fiery anti-slavery speeches in black churches and demands that the American government intercede. They might have believed their sad and awful accounts of small children taken from their families during raids by enemy soldiers would have provoked a resurgence of black America's interest in human rights on the African continent.

It didn't turn out that way. Outrage followed their news accounts, but it centered on the ethics of their purchase. They met harsh criticism from black journalists, who accused them of sensationalism, of exploitation, of aiding and abetting slave traders. There was very little in the way of opprobrium toward the Sudanese government, which lends implicit support to the slave raids.

Since Gregory Kane and Gilbert Lewthwaite wrote their stories, the inhuman practice of human trade has grown worse across the African continent. Just last week, news accounts focused on West Africa, where officials passed on stories of a ship suspected of carrying children who would be sold into slavery. While the ship was never located and may never have existed, the news reports sounded credible because so many children are sold into slavery throughout Africa — stolen by gangs or sold by parents too poor to feed them.

The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) estimates that 200,000 children are sold every year, the girls to domestic work or, worse, prostitution, the boys to field labor on vast plantations. The U.N.'s International Labor Organization puts the number of children held in slavery or near-slavery at 250 million, largely in Africa and Asia.

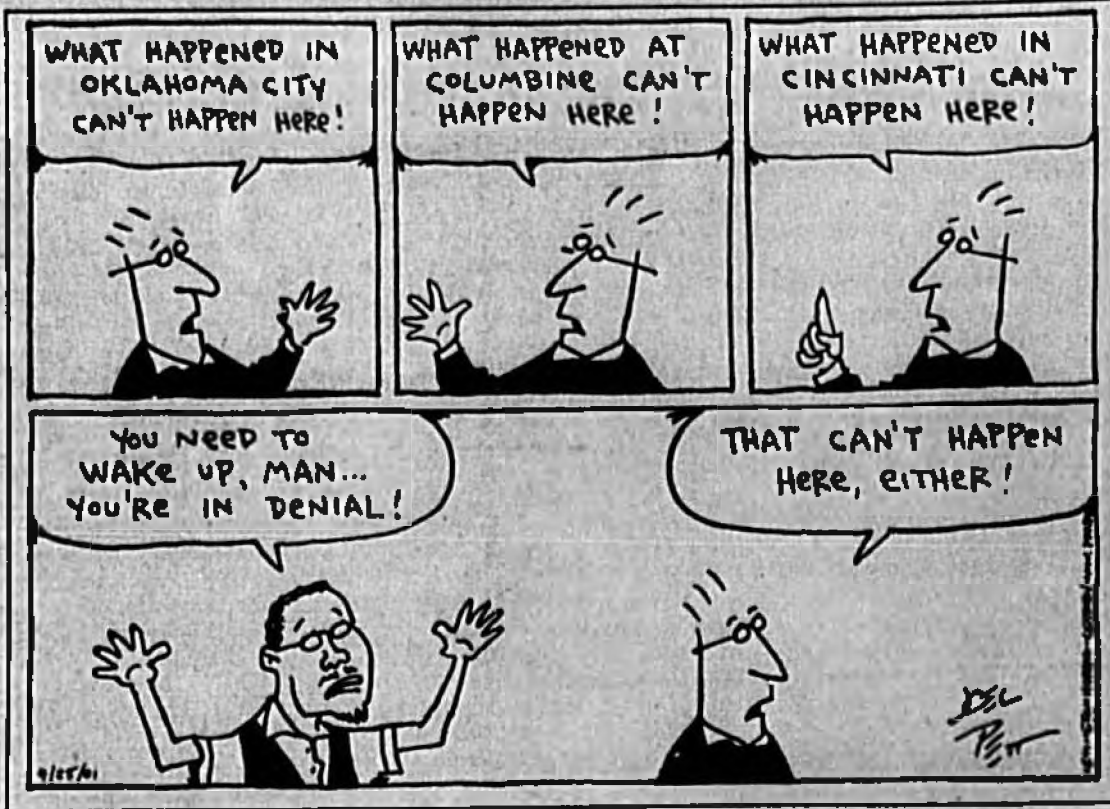
Still, there is little in the way of outrage, little in the way of protests or pickets or mass arrests in front of African embassies. A few conservative church groups have pressured the Bush administration to assist persecuted Christians in Sudan, where an Islamic government is trying to convert (or wipe out) Christians and animists.

But the modern slave trade has not become a cause celebre among black American intellectuals. It has not attracted the high-profile attention that helped to undermine and dismantle apartheid in South Africa. Though New York City activist Al Sharpton made a recent trip to the Sudan to condemn the slave trade, even his involvement has not stirred much interest.

That's not just because white racism is an easier target than black-on-black exploitation. It's also true that the problem of South African apartheid had a simple solution: democratic elections leading to majority rule. By contrast, the problem of modern-day slavery is complex, with deep roots in intractable social ills such as extreme poverty, government corruption and civil wars. Protests, pickets and demonstrations won't end the trade in human chattel.

But the vastness of the problem cannot be an excuse for turning away. If there were ever an issue that deserved the attention of dedicated activists who can attract television cameras, congressional hearings and U.N. resolutions, the modern slave trade is it.

Politicians need to stop throwing our money away

During the presidential campaign, George W. Bush said that only in Washington would a reduction in the rate of spending increases be considered a "cut." Now, as president, he is experiencing for himself the stupidity of Washington-think. The proposed Bush budget for fiscal 2002 would spend a record \$1.96 trillion, a 5.6 percent increase over current levels. Conservative estimates of the budget surplus over the next 10 years total \$5.64 trillion. Yet, liberals — mostly Democrats but some Republicans — are screaming about "cuts" and the disaster they predict will result if the Bush budget is passed. There is the predictable cry about benefits for "the rich" from the usual congressional Democrats.

Their alarm bells ring hollow but they show the problem that big and ever-growing government, fed by career politicians, has become. Instead of concentrating on spending, we should be examining results. Has our money been well spent, producing the advertised benefits? If not, why are we spending more every year?

If members of Congress would act like responsible citizens and exercise fiscal restraint — limiting government growth to the 4 percent Bush has called for — it would (along with tax cuts) provide far more revenue for government and for existing businesses to expand and new ones to start. The problem is in the tax code, which continues to punish risk-taking and hard work. A healthy and growing economy will produce all of the tax revenue that government needs (not wants, which is another matter). As for our paltry (compared to most other nations) national debt of just over \$3 trillion, that figure will continue to decline on its own so long as the economy grows. Some facts from the National Taxpayers Union (NTU) highlight the budget politics. According to the NTU's John Berthoud and Jeff Dirksen, non-defense discretionary spending in the Bush budget will actually be 60.8 per-



cent higher (or 25.3 percent after adjusting for inflation) than in fiscal year 1992.

Measured against the first Reagan budget, this is a 42.8 percent increase. And, to show how much government spending has grown, the NTU figures show a 99 percent spending increase in real terms over the 1972 budget. The Bush figures still keep spending at record high levels. No entitlement program is cut. Some pork is slashed, which is a major reason some congresspersons are howling like stuck pigs. Most of the budget reflects a slowdown in the spending increases. There is no "gutting" of federal agencies, yet alarmists will again raise the specter of no Social Security checks for retirees, laid-off police and closed libraries.

The lie worked before, so why not try it again? A visit to the NTU Web page recalls that then-House Speaker Tip O'Neill (D-MA) countered the 1981 \$1.2 trillion Reagan tax cut proposal over five years with an annual \$237.4 billion tax reduction plan of his own. How could the O'Neill plan have been considered responsible by Democrats then and a Bush tax cut proposal of \$160 billion over 10 years is irresponsible now?

In 1981, the federal budget was "only" \$678 billion. Since 1989 (when Ronald Reagan left office), the federal

government's domestic outlays, adjusted for inflation, have grown by an enormous 10 percent per year, according to an analysis by The Heritage Foundation. Domestic spending expanded at a faster rate under President George H.W. Bush than it did under other recent presidents, including such "big spenders" as Lyndon Johnson, Richard Nixon and Jimmy Carter. Heritage labeled the first President Bush as "the biggest champion of new domestic spending since Franklin Roosevelt."

The current President Bush is right to begin to ease up on the accelerator. Critics say Bush is not only putting on the brakes but also throwing government into reverse. This is a lie, but people who get their news solely from television are likely to believe it if liberals in the media and in Congress keep repeating it.

The facts are available on the NTU and Heritage Foundation Web pages. If people will take a few minutes to read them and respond accordingly to their elected leaders. It is said that we get the government we deserve. If we do, shouldn't we be getting what we pay for instead of throwing our money away? Tax time is the best time to consider the answers to these questions.

Dad fears name change could ruin bond with son

DEAR ABBY: When we learned our baby was going to be a boy, my wife and I settled on a name we both loved.

My mother-in-law has been gravely ill with Alzheimer's disease for several years, but she is now terminal. So my wife is facing the loss of her mother at almost the same time as the birth of our son. My wife asked what I thought about changing our son's name so the first letter of his name will be the same as her mother's. She told me it is customary to use the first letter from the name of a deceased relative when choosing a name for a child.

Common sense tells me I have no choice in this matter, but I don't want to change the name we have already chosen. Part of the bonding between me and my son has been talking to him in the womb. I fear the bond may be damaged if I have to name him something else.

What should I do?
DISAPPOINTED FIRST-TIME DAD

DEAR DAD: Satisfy both your needs by giving your son a first name that begins with the first letter of your mother-in-law's name, but call him by his second name — the one you and your wife chose in the first place. It happens all the time.

DEAR ABBY: I had to write when I read the letter from "Been Down That Road, St. George, Utah." She said that for years she and her children had laughed about the fact that being a step-grandchild brings with it the consequences of receiving fewer gifts and less recognition.

Exactly the opposite is true in my family. My mother-in-law, Cherylene, has gone to great lengths to include my daughters from my first marriage in everything. When my husband and I had two sons together, nothing changed.

Kalanchoe: The plants borne from leaves

The genus Kalanchoe includes some of the most curious plants that you can find. Plants in this group have thick succulent leaves which often give rise to small plants along their margins called offsets or plantlets.

It seems incredible that each leaf can produce dozens of tiny plants already developing as parasites on the leaves.

Plants in this group also produce beautiful leaf shapes and markings that makes them unique in the vegetable world. To make them even more interesting, some of them produce showy flower clusters that can only be described as spectacular.

Flowers are bell-shaped, borne in terminal clusters, and usually hanging downward. Fruits are very small and uninteresting. Stems tend to loose the lower leaves.

Habitat

Plants in this group are native of the Old World tropics, mainly in Africa and Madagascar.

Viviparous Plants

Plants in the genus Kalanchoe are sometimes called viviparous. The name indicates that the plant produces offsprings that germinate while still attached to the parent plant.

Care

As with most succulent plants, they should receive good light during the spring and summer. Too much light will turn leaves red or darker color. As winter approaches, keep flowering plants a little cooler. Minimum temperatures should be around 60 degrees.

Plants that do not produce big cluster of flowers can be kept at a minimum temperature of 41 degrees; they usually do not tolerate high temperatures during the winter and tend to do poorly during this time of the year.

The offsets drop constantly from the leaves and may compete for nutrients with the mother plant. Transplant or discard

the plantlets as they can overcrowd the mother plant.

Soil Requirements

Well drained soils with medium fertility are recommended for kalanchoe. These plants are tolerant to high salt content, alkaline soils, and dry soil conditions.

Light Requirements

Plants will grow well in full sunlight or partial shade. The kalanchoe is a short-day plant and will only bloom when

the days are less than 12 hours long. Under normal conditions, flower buds will start to develop by November and flowering will occur during the spring.

Plants can be forced to develop flower buds by artificially controlling the hours of darkness using a black plastic bag or placing them in a dark room. This treatment must be continued for three to four weeks until buds are produced. By removing the initial flower buds, a more profuse flowering will occur. It takes about 12 to 15 weeks for flowering following this treatment.

Watering

Succulents should not be watered frequently. Plants with large leaves may require a little more water than plants with smaller leaves. Plants that produce offsets may be kept in relatively moist soils during the summer but in winter they should receive very little water.

Fertilization

Succulents do not require much fertilizer but plants will benefit from a monthly application of a liquid fertilizer. Do not feed heavy doses of nitrogen to kalanchoe, it may affect their natural growth habit. A cactus fertilizer could be used to feed succulents.

Propagation

The kalanchoe can be propagated by seeds but most gardeners propagate them by removing the plantlets produced on the leaves margins and planting them directly on the potting

media. Other plants in this group can be propagated from tip cuttings or leaf cuttings. Very fleshy leaves should be left to dry before placing them in the potting media.

Uses

Many of these plants are used in rock-and-sand gardens. They can be used for urns, and some species are used as ground covers.

The flowering species are grown mainly for their beautiful flowers.

Because of their low water requirements, they are placed in

the garden next to the cactus.

Pests And Diseases

These plants are generally free of pests and disease problems. Occasionally, caterpillars can damage leaves and sometimes leaf spots, caused by fungi, may affect some plants under very humid conditions.

Central Florida Legal Services, a non-profit agency that has represented residents of the Housing Authority in legal fights to improve conditions. Filed on behalf of residents Amanda Geter and Trumella James, the legal services agency is seeking a temporary restraining order to nullify an agreement that led to the resignation of four board members. A fifth board member, Ida Stephens, voluntarily resigned.

The motion argues the agreement violates Florida's Sunshine Law because board members did not discuss it during a public meeting.

Former Sanford mayor Larry Dale, whose term was ending just as the HUD investigation began, formally brought charges of "inefficiency and neglect of duty" against the five board members and set a date for a removal hearing. Dale's term ended before the hearing date, and Lessard brokered the compromise. Under the agreement, the remaining four board members agreed to resign effective April 30, have their duties substantially restricted and to appoint —

with the approval of city and HUD officials — and interim director.

During the meeting to approve to agreement, Commissioner Whitey Eckstein voiced his concern the proposal violated the state's open meeting laws.

"How did they all agree to this?" Eckstein asked. "They didn't have a meeting. They didn't give public notice it was up for consideration. How did this come about if they didn't violate the Sunshine Law?"

Commissioner Velma Williams and Art Woodruff, along with Lessard approved the agreement during the April 11 meeting. Eckstein and District 3 Commissioner Randy Jones voted against the agreement.

While not backing off about his concerns about a possible Sunshine Law violation, Eckstein on Monday praised the results generated from the agreement.

"Things have progressed better than I had hoped," Eckstein said. "I commend [City Manager] Tony [VanDerworp] and Mayor Lessard for their efforts."

Lessard said City Attorney Bill Colbert is working on several scenarios regarding the lawsuit by Central Florida Legal Services but added he intends to go through with Thursday's meeting because, "We don't know if they're going to get a hearing."

"My goal is to put a new board in place on Thursday and to continue the improvements at the Housing Authority," Lessard said. "I don't think this lawsuit fulfills those goals."

"If everyone's goal is to provide better living conditions for the residents of the Housing Authority, it's puzzling to me how this lawsuit accomplishes that," Lessard added. "It's Central Florida Legal Service's right to sue, but I don't understand how this benefits the residents."

Lessard said if a new board is not appointed by April 30, Colbert has informed him the current board will continue to have jurisdiction over the

Housing Authority. As for his search for new board members, Lessard said he is looking for a diverse group, not only in terms of race, but also expertise in fields such as accounting, property management and law.

The upheaval at the Sanford Housing Authority follows an intense investigation by the Department of Housing and Urban Development regarding mismanagement of SHA. The investigation resulted in SHA

being labeled a "troubled agency. Officials with HUD were highly critical of executive director Timothy Hudson, who has since resigned, and cited board members for a lack of oversight into Hudson's management practices.

A raid two weeks ago by the FBI and HUD's Inspector General's office seized all of the Housing Authority's records, and those officials are considering whether to bring criminal charges against Hudson.

There will be a viewing tonight, Wednesday, April 25, from 6 to 9 p.m. at Gramkow Funeral Home in Sanford.

Funeral services will be Thursday, April 26, at 3 p.m. in St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Lake Mary.

Fowler will be buried with full honors at Arlington National Cemetery.

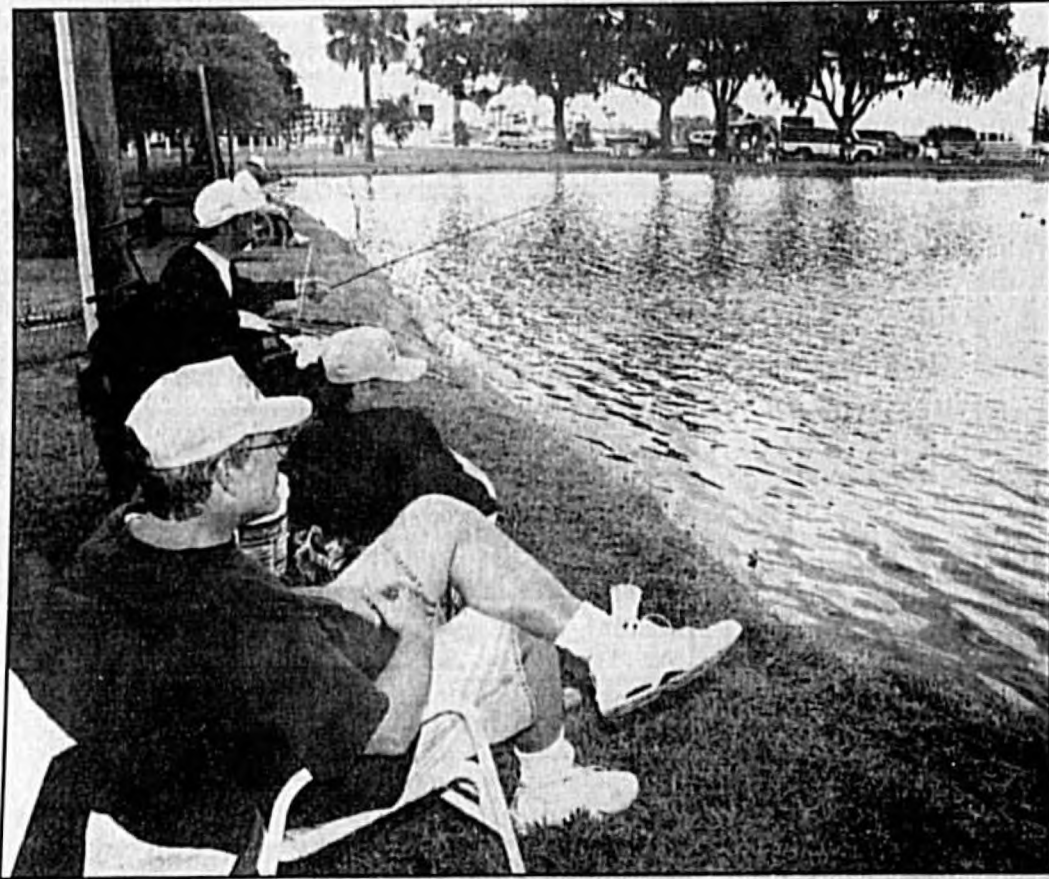

Washington concrete black poles with a single Acorn, 175-watt lamp fixture. Costs for each property owner are not yet final, but are expected to be between \$10 to \$12 per month per parcel for a 10-year period. The assessment will be based on the square-footage of each parcel. Over the 10-year finance period, maintenance and energy costs are estimated at approximately \$100 per month. The city will have fact costs once it completes an engineering study on the project.

"We have to have those final sets available at the public hearing so the public knows exactly how much this will cost," said City Clerk Jan Dougherty.

Dougherty said she plans to mail the ballots out within the next six weeks, and property owners will have 30 days to

complete the form and mail it back. Both Dougherty and Van Gaale stressed that the 51 percent threshold would be determined by returned ballots, not total ballots mailed out.

Linda Kuhn, who chaired the Sanford Historic Trust Lighting Committee, said she was pleased with the commission's actions.

"This has been a long process working out all the little glitches," Kuhn said. "Hopefully the residents will understand the safety issues and the aesthetic issues and support the lighting project."

In other business, the commission:

- Agreed on second reading to annex 126 acres of property on the north side of Celery Avenue between Brisson Avenue and May River Court. Though zoning and site plan requests have yet to be submitted, the

property is expected to become single-family housing with a density of 2.6 units per acre.

- Agreed on second reading to annex and rezone 2.28 acres of land on the south side of SR 46. Commissioners were initially concerned with the request because the proposed use is a used car lot. The business owner, Craig Johnson, provided commissioners with information about his business plan, specifically that he intends to deal in high-end vehicles, all sales are by appointment only, and vehicles will be kept indoors.

- Approved a \$760,000 contract with Glattig, Jackson Kercher Rinehart and Lopez Inc. for architectural and engineering services for the Riverwalk and revitalization project downtown.

- Designated the residence at 703 Sanford Avenue as a Historic Landmark.

return is an evolution of the steady strong partnership between the United States and Canada. The creation of NAFTA (North American Free Trade Agreement) in 1993, which cut tariffs and eliminated other trade barriers between the United States, Canada and Mexico, also allows for the stability and success of the high-tech consortium.

Currently, Canada has the highest software development production per capita in the world, Flamm said. The country's tax structure also allows Canadian software companies to be highly competitive in the global economy.

In contrast, the United States is currently experiencing a shortage of individuals with high-tech knowledge, he said. U.S. companies are having

problems finding workers skilled in software development such as JAVA and database programming.

Dilip Mirchandani of High-Tech Products said his company established the consortium to offer temporary help to local businesses unable to find people with a specific skill set.

"No company offers all the skill sets," Mirchandani said. "We have set up a consortium of Canadian companies with different skill sets."

For example, a local company may need temporary help to establish a database. High-Tech Products finds a Canadian company focused on that specific skill set. A partnership is established between the two companies.

Mirchandani said the partnership is also beneficial to the local economy. The area receives

additional revenue through money spent on lodging, food and other living expenses.

A good relationship, along with similar software laws and restrictions, makes Canada more attractive than many other countries in regard to the high-tech partnership.

"The political stability between the two countries is also very important," he said. "It allows for the free flow of people so the project can be successful."

Jim Shipley of Longwood's Trading Wise Inc., a company that helps open global markets, said the Canadian consortium is part of the growing global economy.

"There is no doubt the global economy is here," Shipley said. "With the birth of the Internet, any business can be a global business."

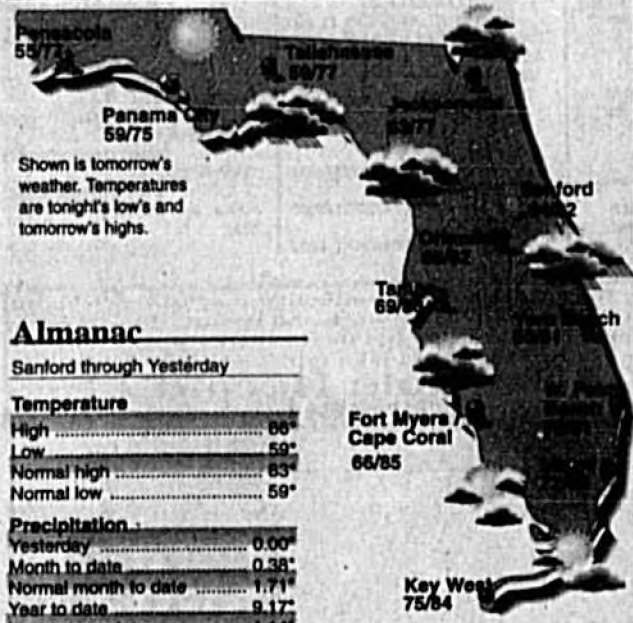

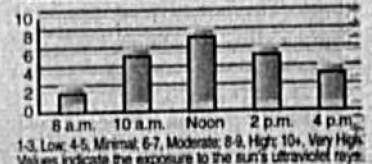

More of the best places to bass fish

Today we continue with two more of the Top 10 Bass Lakes in Florida as selected by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).

STICK MARSH/FARM 13 RESERVOIR

Created in 1987, the Stick Marsh/Farm 13 Reservoir is synonymous with trophy bass fishing. This 6,500-acre reservoir near Fellsmere, east of Vero Beach, became one of the hottest bass lakes in the country during the past decade.

FWC biologists predict excellent bass fishing during the early part of the next decade. During winter-spring 2000, many fishing guides reported the best trophy bass catches in recent years. This summer has been no exception, with a number of anglers catching 50 to 100 bass a day, with many over 10 pounds.

Anglers can locate bass in or near hydilla. Plastic worms, spinner baits, crank baits, soft-jerked baits and topwater propeller baits are effective. Wild golden shiners are the top choice for anglers looking to catch a trophy fish.

The regulation for large-mouth bass is catch and release. There is a two-lane boat ramp, paved parking lot, picnic pavilions and rest rooms. No gasoline, food, ice or other facilities are available on site.

LAKE KISSIMMEE

Lake Kissimmee has a national reputation for high quality bass fishing. The 34,948-acre lake is between Lake Wales and Yeehaw Junction in central Florida.

In 1996, the FWC revitalized 24 miles of shoreline, resulting in increased numbers of largemouth bass in the lake. Bass spawned in 1997 and 1998 are beginning to show up in the lake.

These fish will provide excellent action with many reaching 10 pounds within the next four or five years.

Currently, trophy fish and high catch rates are reported regularly from guides, fish camps and tournament anglers. Bass tournament winners routinely catch a five-fish bag limit weighing 18 to 25 pounds.

Expansive stands of vegetation (maldenecane, bulrush, knotgrass) account for excellent catches of bass. Slow-trotting golden shiners and flipping plastic baits along, and within, the vegetation are proven techniques, especially during the winter and spring.

During the summer and fall, bass are caught offshore with rattling crankbaits, jerkbaits and plastic worms.

Six fish camps, one state park and three public boat ramps are available at Lake Kissimmee. Wade fishing is a popular method used by many anglers and access is provided at some of the fish camps and boat ramps.

"Against CFCC we just didn't have it together. The defensive errors and not coming up with the big plays, which we usually make, led to the losses.

Hopefully, we can learn from these last few games and go into the tournament focused and ready."

The Raiders finished 46-12 overall and 18-10 in the conference and are ranked No. 9 in the nation.

"I don't know who our first round opponent will be," said Miller. "Either Florida Community College at Jacksonville, Central Florida Community College or Santa Fe Community College. We are familiar with all of those teams, so there should be no surprises."

Pairings and game times for the state tournament were to be announced on Monday, but no information had been received at printing time.

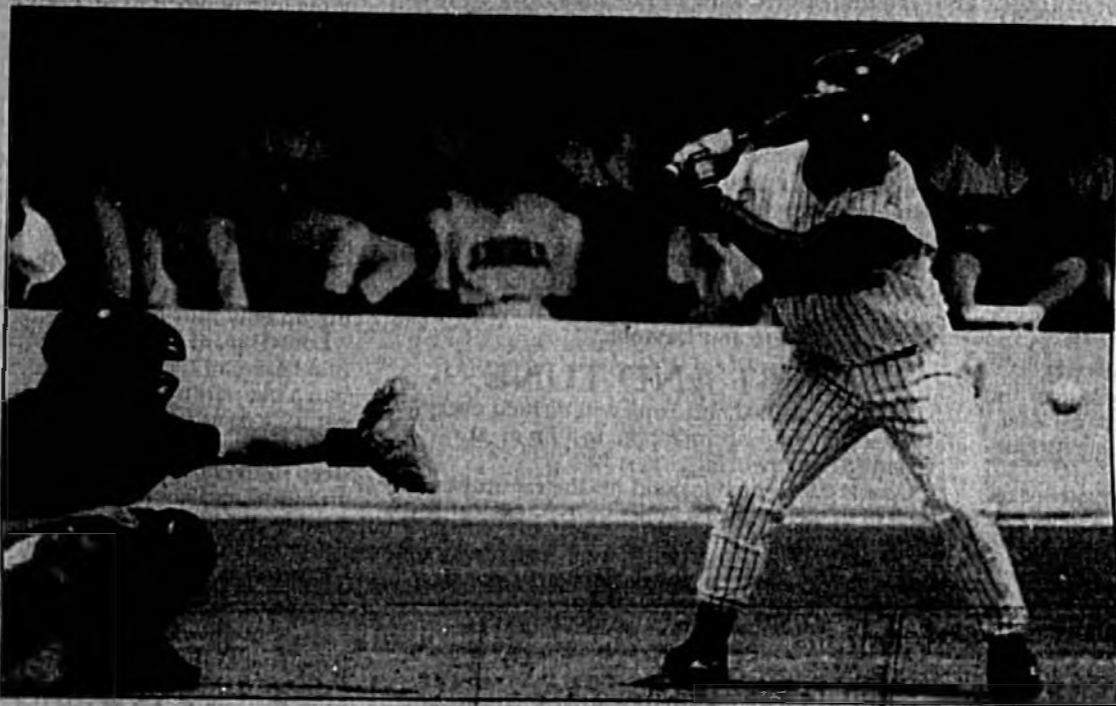

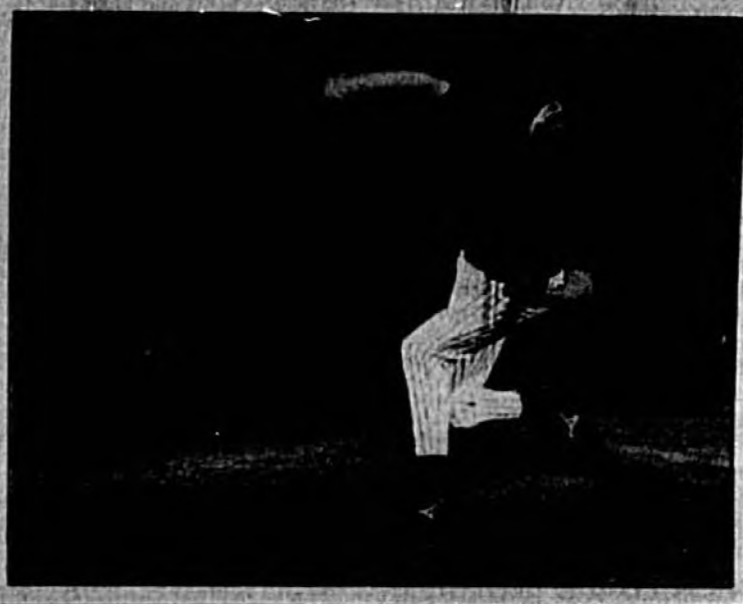
But when the Seminole coaching staff challenged the squad to win the game in the fifth inning, the Tribe responded.
