

## Planned Jacksonville Clear Factory

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 23.—The Jacksonville Clear Factory, a \$1,000,000 plant which is rapidly nearing completion here atop the new site of the King Edward Hotel, is the first of a series of new factories planned for the city by the Jacksonville Clearing and Land Reclamation Co., Inc., which is headed by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The factory, costing several hundred dollars, will be maintained in perpetuity by the King Edward Industrial Nursery Foundation, which is headed by Mrs. Eula E. Roosevelt, the company's director. The factory will be used to grow plants for the children of the city, which Mrs. Roosevelt believes that it is necessary to increase if the number of children in the city is to be reduced to a normal level.

Approximately 60 men will be employed in the construction of the plant, which is scheduled to be completed within a maximum of three months after work begins. Work to be done will consist of erecting a concrete foundation, building rest rooms for men and women, entrance gates, and preparing a driveway for automobiles and parking spaces. The driveway will be surfaced with drainage tile.

Land in the immediate vicinity of the Big Tree will be cleared but most of the natural growth in the park will be retained with the exception of heavy undergrowth, according to the engineer's specifications prepared by the office of County Engineer Fred T. Williams. Throughout the park area benches will be placed for the convenience of visitors. Allocation of funds for the project by the WPA administrator at Jacksonville, Fla., is being handled by the Jacksonville County Office, the Chamber of Commerce, Women's Garden club, and other interested groups for the construction of such a park around the Big Tree which has been nationally publicized as one of the oldest living trees in the world. Chamber Of Commerce Election

We have no idea who is going to be elected president of the Chamber of Commerce for the coming year. Ben Haines has indicated his unwillingness to serve again. Several other prominent citizens have been suggested, but they are apparently viewing the responsibilities of this generally thankless job without enthusiasm. And yet within the next few days someone will have to be selected.

Before this choice is made, The Herald would like to go on record as urging the whole-hearted support of the entire community for whoever happens to be head of the Chamber of Commerce during the coming months. No matter who he may be, no matter how great his prominence or wise his leadership, he cannot do much without the undivided co-operation of the whole county.

No one should underestimate the difficulties in finding a man who will be equally acceptable to every group or faction. It simply can't be done. No matter who is elected, there are bound to be people who will wonder why in the world he was ever chosen. There are likely to be some who will think that the directors actually went out of their way to find the very worst man in the county for the job.

What we ask is that anyone thus disqualified recognize the difficulties of pleasing everyone and accept the choice of the majority in the true American way and continue to support the Chamber of Commerce to the same extent as if his own man had been elected, and help to make what he expects to be a bad administration into the best possible administration. By his own support he may enable the Chamber of Commerce to help the community in spite of poor leadership.

Any group or faction which takes upon itself this unpleasant task can wreck the Chamber of Commerce if it wants to. The supporters of one candidate for president can do it as well as the supporters of another candidate, if they want to. And by the same token, merely by withholding their support, they can materially reduce the benefits which might accrue to the city and county if their wholehearted support were given.

It is only if the leaders of the Chamber of Commerce have the support of all our citizens that the maximum benefits can be accomplished. It does no good either for the individual or the community as a whole to sit around and criticize when things do not go to suit. If one really wants to help he should come down to directors' meetings, which are open to the entire membership, or to the committee meetings and make his voice heard for the side which he thinks is right.

Let the Chamber of Commerce have the support of every group and faction, and Sanford and Seminole County will really go places.

Florida's Sugar

According to the Melbourne Times, the Administration in Washington suspended the quota provisions which restricted so drastically the production of sugar in Florida as soon as it was learned that profiteering, particularly in sugar, had started immediately after the declaration of war in Europe. It is interesting to note that, properly exploited, Florida could produce enough sugar to supply the whole nation.

"The United States Corporation in the Clewiston area," the Times says, "has 21,100 acres of cane ready to harvest, and there are 1,600 acres belonging to independent growers. Under the quota that has just been discarded, the sugar company would have been required to destroy 25 percent of that acreage. Without the quota, the company can make the sugar that the cane will produce. The big mill will start grinding cane about October 20 and continue operations until the latter part of April.

"If the government does no more meddling with the sugar out-put and so permits the growers to produce as much as they believe they profitably can, the Florida company will build another mill, and add several thousand acres of cane to its plantation.

"There was no justice in the curtailment of Florida's sugar cane growing and sugar manufacture. It was done to foster the sugar business in Cuba. It was an 'ill-wind' of course that caused the suspension of the quota provisions, but it happens to be an ill-wind that brings protection to all the people of America who have been forced to pay profiteering prices for sugar since the war in Europe started.

"A lot of people who bought sugar for a war-time gamble will soon be trying to get rid of it at any price."

## German And French Forces Are Locked In Heavy Fighting

**Paris Reports Cannonading At South End Of Front To Halt Nazi Concentration**  
**New Assault Is Made On Warsaw**  
**Convoy System Is In Full Operation, Churchill Says**

PARIS, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Premier Daladier's war cabinet today derided the dislocation of the Communist Party in France. The action was taken as a reprisal for Berlin's non-aggression pact with Germany and her invasion of Poland, France's eastern ally.

The decree submitted by Albert Barrat, Minister of Interior, and signed by President Albert Lebrun, dissolved Communist Party and all affiliated organizations and forbade propaganda of the Communist International in France.

A cabinet communiqué said penalties were prescribed for violation of the decree. The severity of the penalties will become known upon the publication of a measure in an official journal.

A new German assault on Warsaw was launched today while German and French forces were locked in heavy fighting on the western front. French and German artillery exchanged fire south of Zweibruecken and across the Rhine frontier.

Paris dispatches said French cannonading at the south end of the western front was aimed at breaking up German troop concentrations reported near the Swiss border. Reports reaching Switzerland said heavy losses had been sustained by both France and Germany when French troops repulsed a German counter-attack attempting to relieve the pressure on key forts near Zweibruecken.

On the eastern front a German communiqué said operations had started against Warsaw "after all efforts had failed at convincing the Polish commander of the senselessness and uselessness of resistance."

Foreign circles said they expected Russia would seek a guarantee from Turkey to close the Dardanelles to any ships opposed to Russian interests in return for possible Soviet guarantees against any German attack on Turkey. Diplomats were keenly interested in the sudden departure of the Estonian foreign minister. ## Estonia's Envoy Department Of Hurriedly Leaves Recreation Set Up For 1st Time

MOSCOW, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Abruptly ending his stay in Moscow after less than 15 hours, Estonia's foreign minister rushed home yesterday on what was reported to be a urgent business.

Diplomatic circles said Estonia might be making demands upon her Baltic neighbors, whose territory Russian-ruled before the World War.

Secrecy shrouded the sudden cessation of conversations between Karl Selfer, the Estonian minister, and high Soviet officials. At the same time a number of Russian officials welcomed a diplomatic mission from Turkey and a great display of Soviet and Turkish flags.

The Turkish delegation, headed by Foreign Minister Saracoglu, came for important diplomatic trade talks. The welcome was headed by Vladimir Potemkin, vice minister for foreign affairs. Moscow's railroad station was decorated with intertwined Soviet and Turkish flags.

Envoys of five Black sea and Balkan states were at the station to greet the visitors. They were the ministers of Rumania, Bulgaria, Greece, Persia, and Afghanistan.

## 50 Dead When Coast Storm Finally Ends

**Property Damage Estimated To Exceed One Million Dollars; 33 Persons Missing**

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 26.—(AP)—A death toll of at least 50 and property damage in excess of \$1,000,000 was counted by Southern California today as the tropical storm which brought death and destruction moderated.

Still unaccounted for were 15 seaplanes, some damaged, and 33 persons, which put to sea before the storm broke.

More than a score of persons were believed aboard the vessels. Ten bodies have been recovered from the ocean which claimed most of the victims in the wrecks of pleasure and fishing craft.

## City Adopts Budget For Fiscal Year

**\$260,462.50 Estimate Of Expenditures Is Little Higher Than 1938-1939 Expenses**

**30-Mill Levy Gets Approval**  
**Most Of Increase Set Up For Retirement Of Refunding Bonds**

A budget setting up expenditures slightly above last year's total of \$242,571.25 but most of the increase in which approximately \$100,000 was set up for the retirement of refunding bonds of the city government, was approved by the City Commission in the City Hall last night.

The year's estimate of expenditures of \$260,462.50 was estimated at the regular meeting of the City Commission in the City Hall last night.

A breakdown of the budget show that \$118,122.50 was estimated for the operating expenses of the city government, a comparison with \$118,000 set up in the general operating fund for the current 1939 year.

A total of \$182,340 was set up for the current year's \$1,000,000 for the refunding of bonds. Interest payments on the City's bonds and business are estimated at \$300,000 and the remainder of the debt service allocation will be used for the retirement of bonds.
