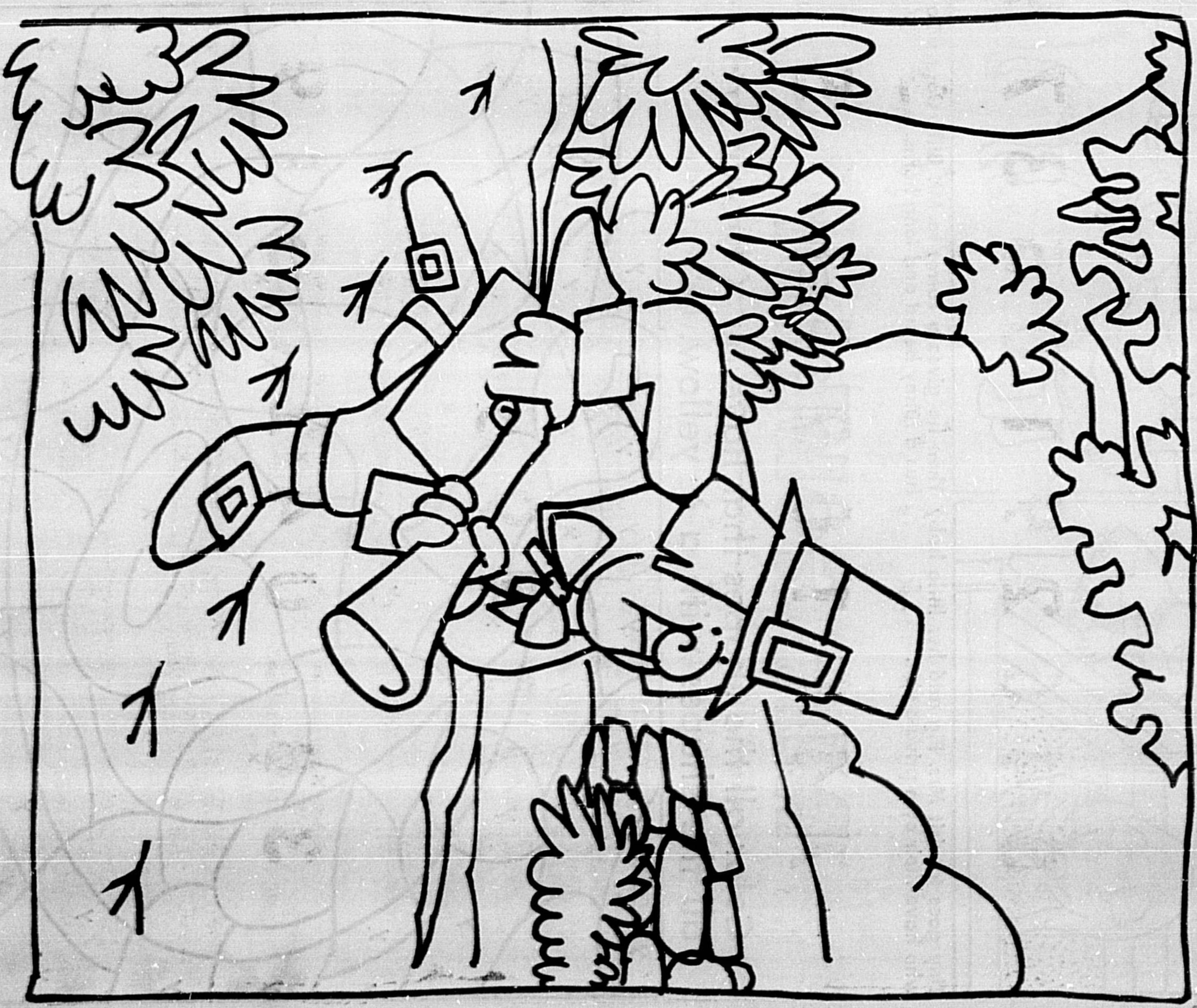

Woman Is Fatally Beaten; Man Held

A 50-year-old Sanford man has been arrested by police on a murder charge stemming from the death of a 63-year-old Goldsboro woman.

Adam Wade, 1604 1/2 West 13th Street, was jailed Saturday night in the beating death of Effie Mae Pope, 1607 West 13th Street, after police were called to the woman's house by a telephone call.

According to Detective William Lykens, the woman appeared to have died after receiving a severe beating by someone using fists.

Wade was removed from the city jail to county jail this morning to await a preliminary hearing and arraignment.

In other weekend crime news, a South Seminole nitery was looted of between \$1,200 to \$2,000 in cash by burglars. Seminole County investigators are probing the reported theft from Adams Inn, operated by Edward Adamkiewicz, of coins and currency.

It is believed the thieves used two pillow cases to carry the money, which was removed from various hiding places.

Sales tax receipts located in the same drawer with the currency were not touched by the thieves, who also overlooked a bag of quarters next to a purse where a roll of bills was cached.

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Arguments Held Over Alignment Army Continues Canal Study

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will proceed with the study to realign the St. Johns River Canal channel between Lake Monroe and Lake Harney, despite the verbal assault on the project by various ecology and conservation groups Friday at a public hearing.

The hearing helped to give both the proponents and opponents of the canal a chance to express themselves in accordance with their beliefs and desires but actually did little to impede or add impetus to the ultimate position of the Corps of Engineers to study the realignment of the channel to avoid spawning grounds.

Congress appropriated \$50,000 to complete the study within the next two years and apparently will decide at that time whether the existing project should be further modified.

Actually, the only subject under consideration at the Civic Center Friday was the realignment of a channel in the St. Johns River, and not the canal itself, but it was evident that certain participants on both sides of the question were confused into thinking the canal, itself, would hinge on the outcome of the study.

There were quotes against the channel alignment and for the project from representatives of the same state wildlife agencies, according to speakers.

G. Edward Carlson, a director with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, is reported to have said "any canal project in the St. Johns River flood plain will have profound effects on fish and wildlife resources, even if only the dredging and spoils are considered."

O. E. Fyre, State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission director, indicated his department had also endorsed the statements of Carlson in its summation of the situation.

However, other statements from letters written to the Canal District from James R. Fielding and W. L. Towns, both regional directors with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, indicate that the canal district's resolution provides satisfactory assurance that proper safeguards to protect fishery resources are included.

Raynolds Smith-Hill's engineering report on recreational boating implies that initial demands of \$1.7 million "will be exceeded by the year 2,000 if the monetary benefits will reach \$2.7 million a year, which exceeds the cost of the entire project."

Committee Will Be Organized N. Orlando Charter Study Slated

NORTH ORLANDO — A meeting will be held tonight at 7:30 p.m. at Village Hall in organization of a charter review committee.

Altamonte Building Sewers

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — The municipality's \$1,784,500 sewer system is "all systems go" with all three phases approved. Lines are presently being installed in Glen Arden Heights and on the south and east of Lake Oriata.

The system is being funded by a federal loan in the amount of \$955,000, a federal grant in the amount of \$341,500 and a grant from the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration. The city is required to furnish funds in the approximate amount of \$500,000. This will be paid through connection charges.

Contracts for construction of the system were recently awarded to Smith-Sweger Construction Company, sewer lines, \$331,882.50; Tech Corporation, lift station, \$223,000, and Chilton Construction Company, sewer treatment plant, \$205,701.

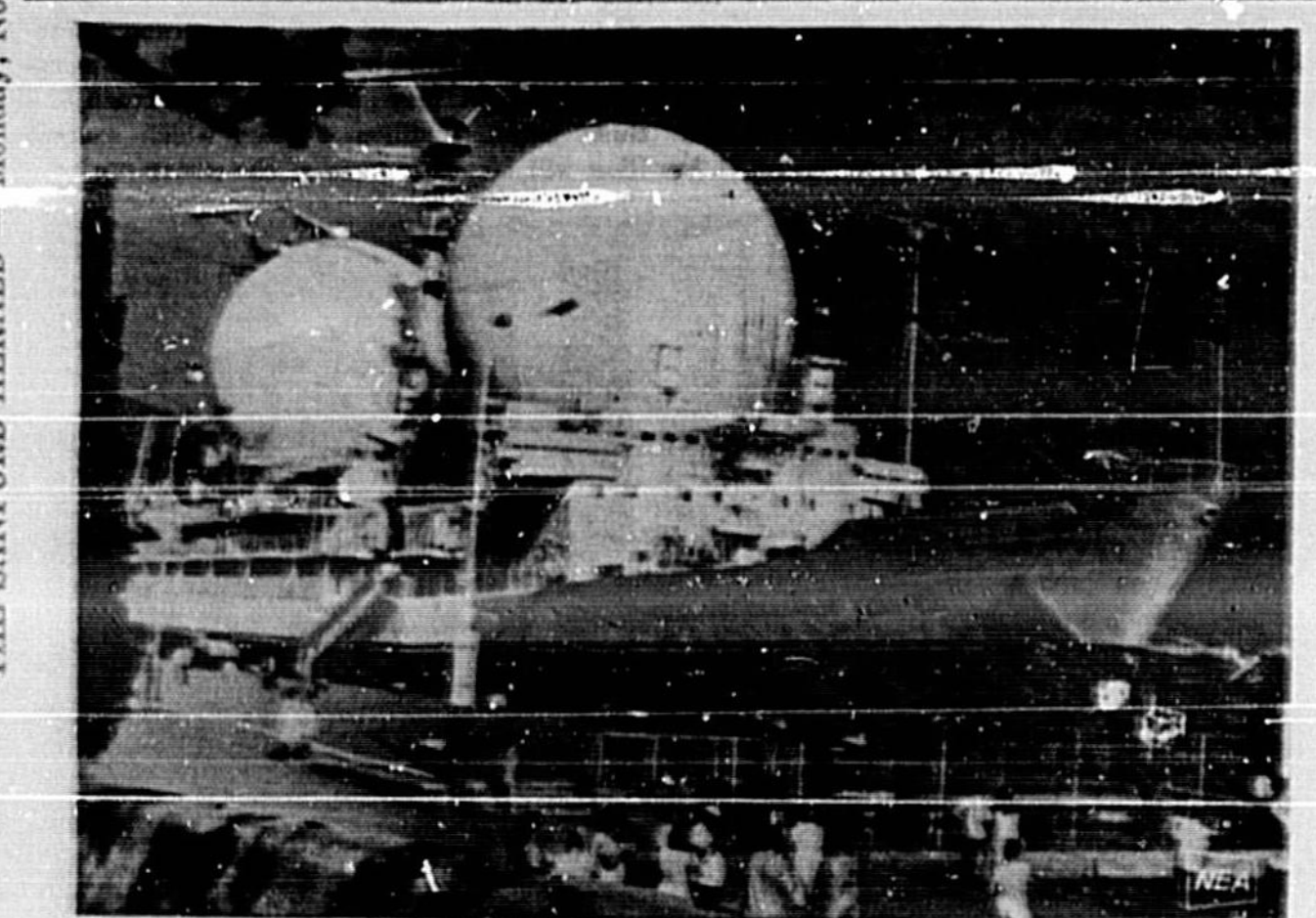

Nixon's Political Advisor On Top

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite the mixed results of the 1970 elections, the man who called many of the political signals for the White House says there has been no suggestion of any changes in his team. Murray Chotiner, the durable presidential adviser who shares leadership of the political tactics squad, said in an interview he now has altered a word to him that would indicate any alteration of his setup. Another well-known Nixon aide agreed, saying he hasn't picked up so much as a hint that the Chotiner operation might be changed. It is perhaps the more remarkable in view of burgeoning rumors, many circulated with semi-official encouragement, that a major restructuring of the Cabinet and the White House staff is in the immediate offing. If a change does develop, some suspect Chotiner might move to the GOP National Committee staff to help plan for Nixon's expected 1972 re-election, which committee chairman Rep. Rogers C. B. Morton is moving to absorb post-White House duties. Chotiner, 52, views the outcome of the Nov. 3 balloting in a cheerful light, citing GOP Senate gains in Connecticut and Tennessee. Losses in Illinois and California are minimized as having been anticipated by the Republican high command. Democrats, of course, point to their continuing control of the Senate, a gain of nine House seats and a major pickup in

Pakistani Storm Victims Still In Need Of Succor

Dacca, East Pakistan (AP) — President Agha Mohammed Yahya Khan is expected to reach Dacca Tuesday to look into the fendering relief program for the hundreds of thousands of storm victims still in need of food, shelter, clothing and medicine. The announcement of the President's return gave no indication how long he would stay. Following the cyclones and tidal waves which hit the Ganges Delta 10 days ago, Yahya Khan made one brief visit to Dacca on his way home from a visit to China and flew over the devastated areas for two hours. That was five days ago, and there has been much criticism because he has not been back. As government officials and relief agencies battled over operation of the aid program, political leaders in East Pakistan were growing increasingly critical. The dispute is expected to put new life into demands for local autonomy from the central government in West Pakistan.

Guinean Forces Repulse Mercenaries' Invasion

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast (AP) — The Portuguese government in Lisbon said Guinea's charge claimed today that mercenaries hired by Portugal used through the night to land on its shores but Guinean forces repulsed them. The U.S. Security Council at an emergency meeting Sunday night called for the immediate withdrawal of all foreign forces in the West African country and agreed to send an investigating mission. "The fight has not ended," Marxist President Sekou Toure's government said today in a broadcast from Conakry, the capital. "The enemy is still here. All night he tried to disembark other mercenaries, but in vain." Thus the second day of the war that Portuguese colonialism has imposed upon us is beginning. Earlier broadcasts from Conakry charged that about 300 European and African mercenaries under the Portuguese flag attacked the Defense Ministry of the airport early Sunday to divert Guinean troops from northern and middle Guinea. They said the town of Bissau, about 100 miles northwest of the capital near the frontier with Portugal, was probably being "mated" next. The radio reported captured invaders said six to 10 ships left Bissau. Portuguese Guinea's capital moved in Guinean territorial waters and sent in boats with the landing party. In a personal appeal to U.N. Secretary-General U Thant, President Toure of Guinea said his country "was the object of aggression by the Portuguese armed forces." He appealed for a force of U.N. troops to help wipe out "the last positions occupied by the Portuguese mercenaries and to pursue the aggressors' ships from our territorial waters."

Schools Offering Drugs People In The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — As many as 30 per cent of the children in some elementary schools may be receiving drugs to quiet them down, a government investigator told Congress today. "This is a sober estimate I have heard," Dr. Leo E. Hollister, a medical investigator for the Veterans Administration, said in testimony prepared for a Senate subcommittee beginning four days of hearings on government drug buying practices. Overactive children used to be thought of as being "naughty" or "unmanageable," but that is changing, he said. "That a disorder usually brought on by a chemical imbalance should suddenly become a major affliction of childhood now seems to be viewed as pathological," he said. "In any case, large numbers of children are being treated with stimulants—usually methylphenidate, as amphetamine has a bad name at present—on a questionable diagnosis."

Canal Hearings Said Beneficial By Krider

Overall, the hearing was most beneficial. There were the comments of John Krider, St. John Indian River Canal chairman, expressed to The Herald, two days after the public hearing on the canal channel realignment from Sanford's Lake Monroe to Lake Harney was concluded. Krider said, "The statements and testimony were given at the hearing to guide engineers in making their study and I personally think that some of the points made by the proponents and opponents were very good, while others were based on the crusade that is so prevalent today on conservation and ecology." Krider went on to explain that ecology can be construed to mean whatever both sides of the issue want it to mean. "On the subject of apparently conflicting statements made by wildlife agencies at the hearing, Krider stated, 'As far as the wildlife agencies blaming the district, this is a fabrication of the mind of the persons that wrote it.'"

Warrants Claimed Illegal

Charges against James Kirkland, 30-year-old Mattland man arrested Oct. 14 on warrants charging forgery were dropped and he has been ordered released from jail by Circuit Court Judge Roger F. Dykes after the jurist ruled the warrants were illegal. Kirkland thus becomes the second man released in less than a week by Circuit Court judges on technicalities caused by the lack of an oath being administered at the office of Peace Justice Thomas Lovett, when the warrant affidavits were signed. Ray Corgy, cashier at First National Bank at Mattland, Friday testified in court that Lovett was not present, when he signed the affidavits while not under oath. According to Florida law, a warrant affidavit should be sworn until the person making the affidavit has been placed under oath. The lack of an oath caused Circuit Court Judge William Albridge to order the necessary indictment against former Constable Robert Jane dismissed. An affidavit for a warrant for Jane was also issued from Judge Lovett's office.

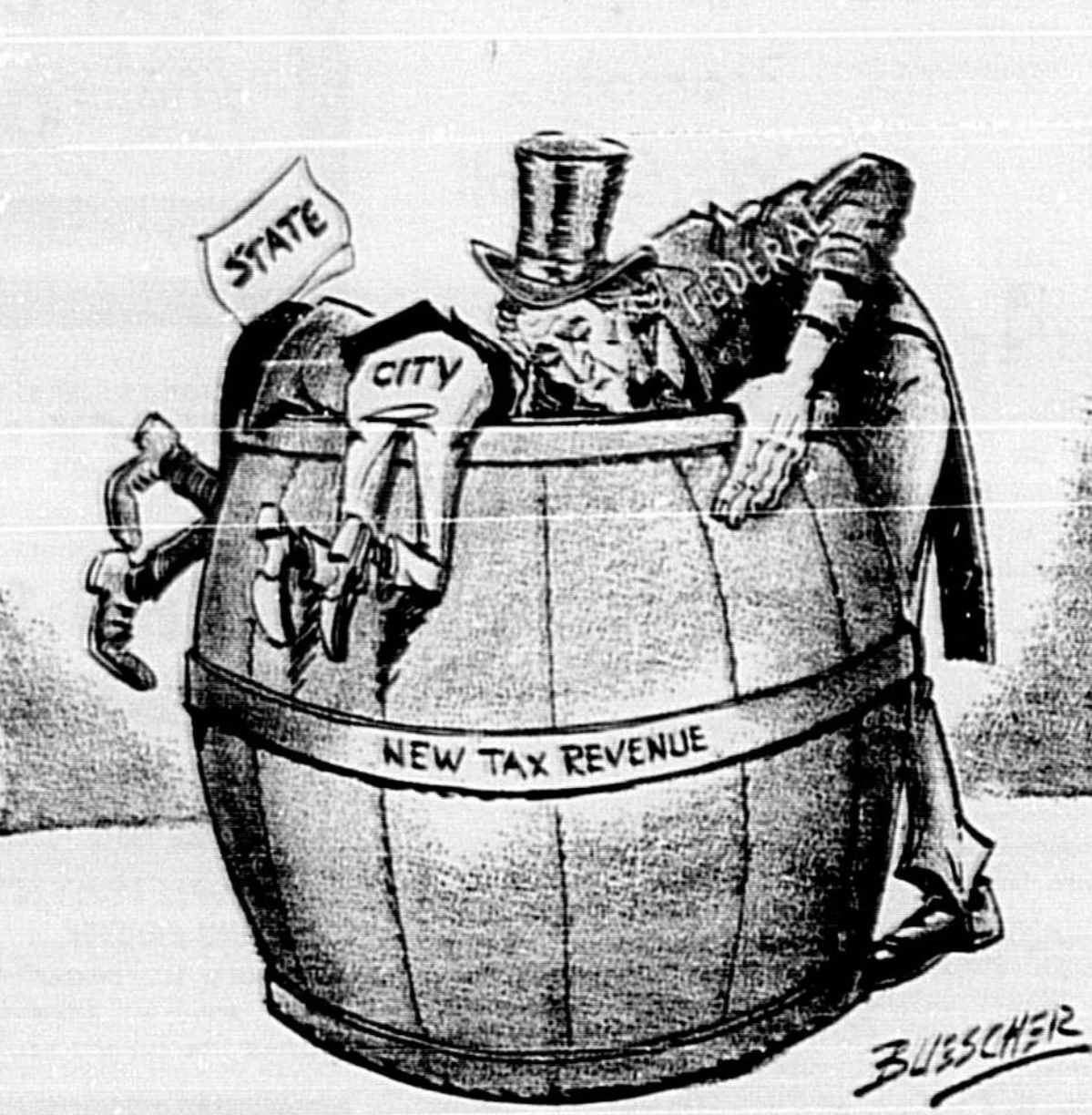

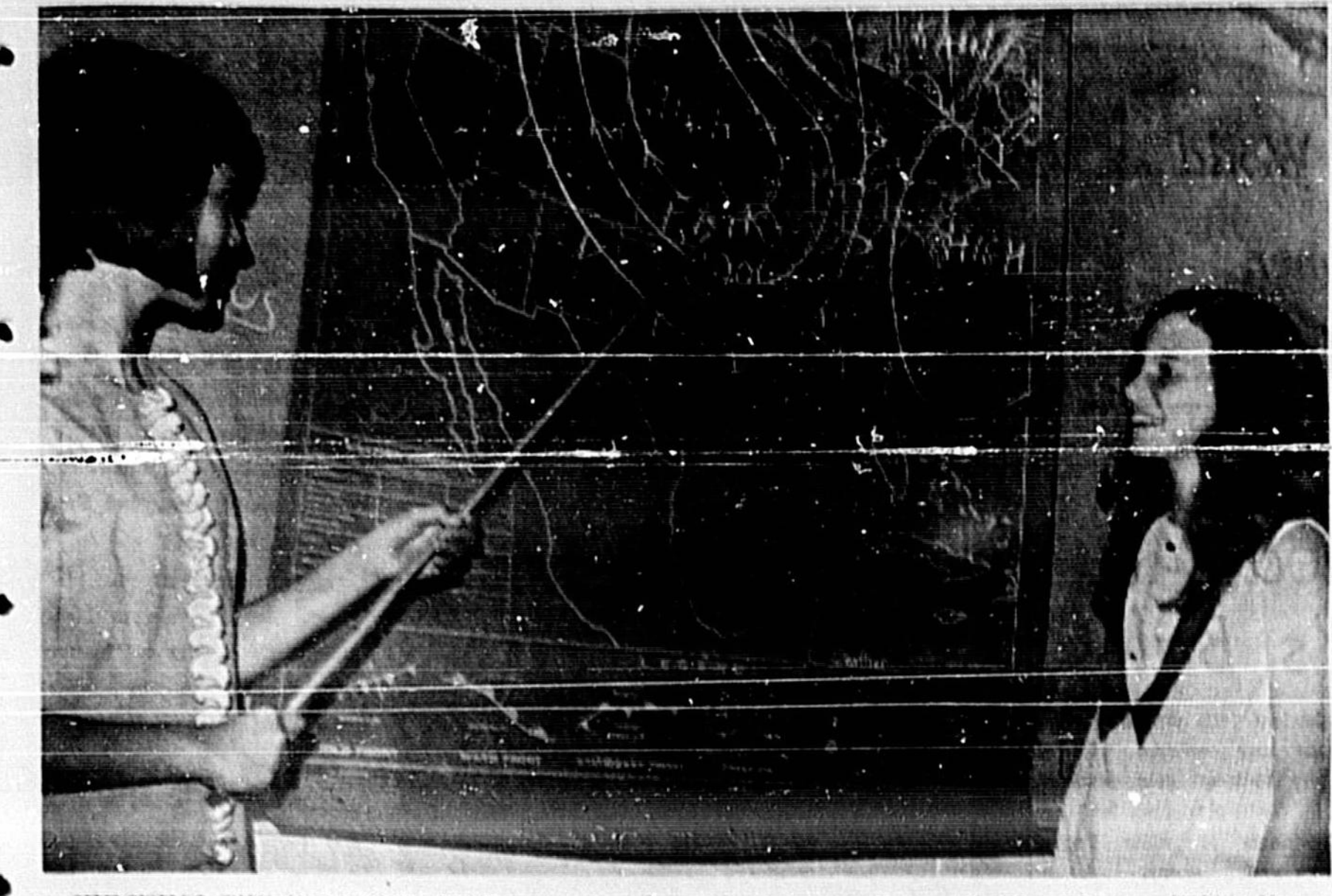

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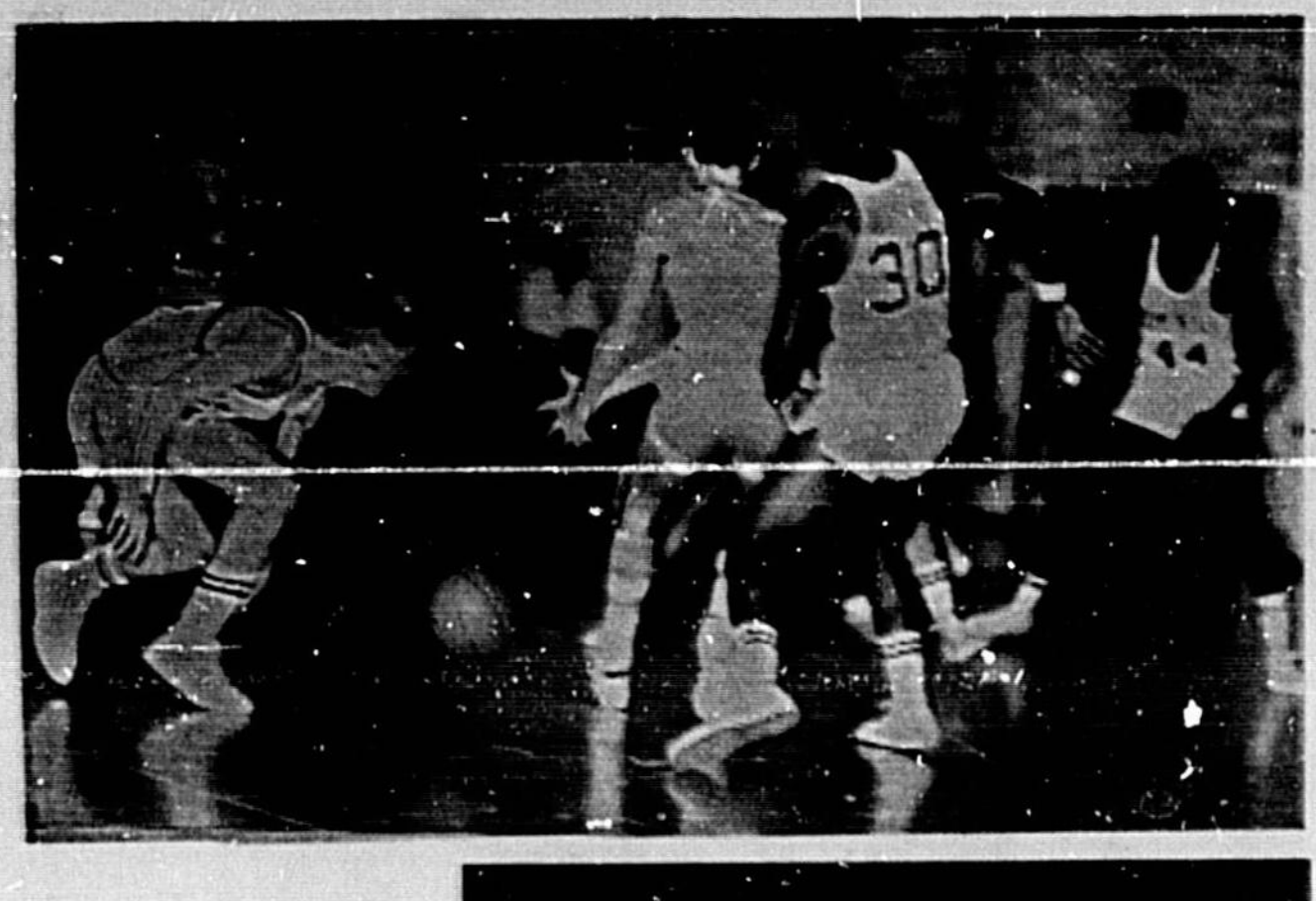

LAMB RAGOUT

A ragout dish that makes enough for a couple of meals.

2 pounds lamb cubes
2 cans (each 1 1/2 ounces) gravy with onions

1 small whole potatoes (about 1 1/2 pounds) peeled
1 cup chopped canned tomatoes

1 small bay leaf
Large clove garlic, minced
1/2 pound fresh snap beans, cut in 2-inch pieces (2 cups)

In a Dutch oven brown lamb; pour off fat. Add all ingredients except snap beans. Cover; cook over low heat for 20 minutes.

Add beans; cook until meat is tender—about 1 hour. Stir occasionally. Uncover; cook to desired consistency. Makes 8 servings.

NOTE: 1/2 cup dry white wine may be added with the gravy.

GARNET SALAD

The sliced tomatoes called for are seasoned with onion, green pepper and celery.

1 package (3 ounces) raspberry gelatin
1/2 cup boiling water

1 can (16 ounces) sliced tomatoes

1 container (8 ounces) commercial sour cream

Into a medium mixing bowl turn the gelatin; add boiling water; stir vigorously until gelatin is dissolved. Add stewed tomatoes, breaking up any very large pieces with a fork or spoon. Turn into 1/2 cup molds or 8 or 6-ounce custard cups, distributing tomato pieces evenly. Chill until set. At serving time unmold on salad greens. Serve with sour cream—this is a must because the salad, with its sweet and sour cream—needs this bland and somewhat tart accompaniment. Makes 6 servings.

This delicious coffee cake is made with yeast.

2 packages active dry yeast
1/2 cup warm water
2 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 1/2 cups unbleached flour; fork stir to aerate before measuring
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup (1/4 one-quarter pound sticks) butter
4 egg yolks

Raisin Nut Filling: see below in a small mixing bowl dissolve yeast in water; stir in sugar and vanilla. Into a medium mixing bowl turn the flour and salt; with a pastry blender cut in butter until particles are small; add yeast mixture; stir well. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating well with a wooden spoon after each addition. Cover and let rise in warm draft-free place until doubled—1 hour. Turn out half the dough; it will be very soft—on a well-floured pastry cloth; with a floured stockinet-covered rolling pin roll out to a 12 by 6 inch rectangle. Spread with half the Raisin Nut Filling to about 1 inch from edges. Roll up from short side; seal well. Place seam side down on buttered cookie sheet. Repeat process with other half of dough. Let rise as previously—1 hour. Bake until golden-brown—about 20 minutes. Makes 2 rolls.

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Escalopes De Veau Biarritz

Prime veal is a delicacy as a meat as one could wish for, which is why the French lean on it so heavily in their cookery. But veal which has passed the age of 14 weeks begins to turn into beef without yet acquiring the marbling of fat that makes adult beef tender.

And that is why the French have mastered the art of blanchette, or simmering doubtful veal thoroughly to make sure it won't be tough.

In America, a blanquette is a white stew seasoned with cloves as a rule and thickened with egg yolk and cream with a few drops of lemon juice.

The trick is to poach the meat for more than an hour, then reduce it to below the boiling point when the egg sauce is blended in, or the whole mixture will curdle.

The French have a finer appreciation of veal than Americans, something nurtured over the years. On small farms in France, newborn calves are kept on a milk diet as a rule for at least three months, or during their wealhood. This produces the delicately flavored white veal that is a mark of the French cuisine. In the United States, the meat of the calf is more pink, because the animal generally feeds on grass and grain rather than on milk.

Veal has never become a universal favorite in America. In fact, many here seem to regard the meat with a wary eye. It has long been an attraction in New Orleans where the cuisine is continental in origin, and it has grown in popularity in New York and other eastern cities where interest in European food has grown tremendously since World War II.

Only a small portion of the population is reported to eat veal with any regularity in Texas and other states in the West, although most of our supply comes from the dairy states of Wisconsin and Minnesota.

For one thing, there is the economic factor. In a country like Italy where pasture land is limited, farmers slaughter their calves to save fodder and make a quick profit. But the great cattle spreads of America where grass and grain are plentiful, the rancher lets his cattle grow to adulthood, since the meat yield is far higher and the profit correspondingly greater.

Curiously enough, however, veal inspired one of the famed cowboy wagon drives of olden days. "Son of a Gun Steer" was a cowboy favorite for many years, and still is, I understand, in certain areas. It consists of the tongue, liver, heart, sweetbreads and marrow gut of the calf. A couple of onions are added with a little chili powder, salt and pepper. This dish is virtually unknown in the East, and frankly I have no great desire to try it.

Personally, I prefer to stick to the tried and true French variations of veal, like Escalopes de Veau Biarritz.

ESCALOPES DE VEAU
2 lb. butter
8 thin slices veal (about 1 lb.)
salt and pepper to taste
4 oz. boiled rock lobster tails
8 thin slices black truffles
about 7 oz. Sauce Bernaise
tube of anchovy paste
Melt butter in a sauce pan. Sprinkle veal on both sides with salt and pepper. Sauté veal till brown on both sides. Place veal slices on warm serving plates. Cut lobster tail into 8 equal slices. Heat lobster and truffle slices in pan drippings. Divide lobster and truffle slices on veal slices. Cover with sauce Bernaise which has been warmed. Garnish each veal slice with a ribbon of anchovy paste. Serves four. Good with a Beaujolais.

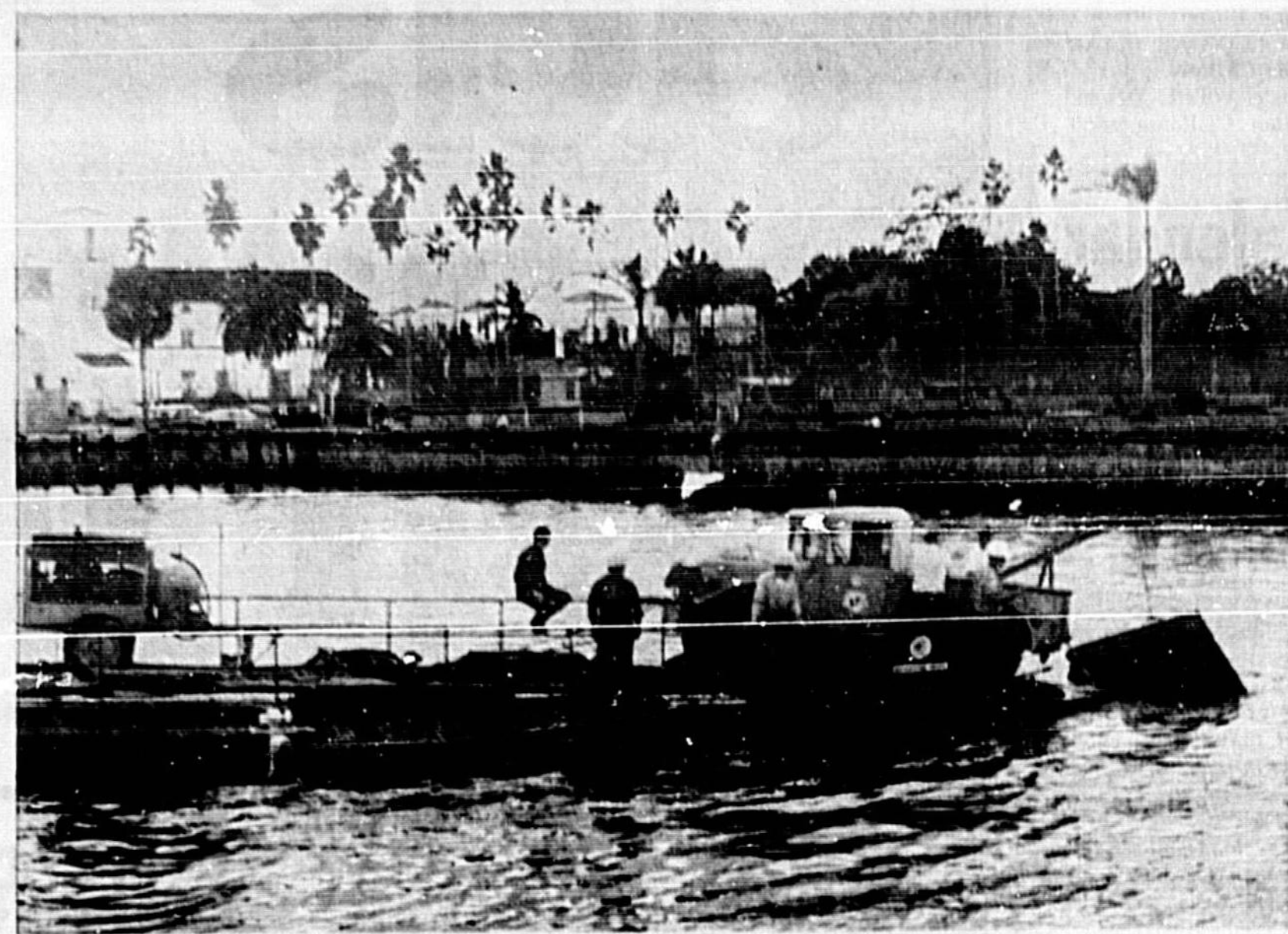

Courthouse Project Aide Hired

County Commissioners this morning authorized a reimbursable expense to the architect for the courthouse project.

Richard M. Shea was employed in such a capacity at a salary of \$850 a month, plus eight per cent of his salary for miscellaneous expenses such as workman's compensation, insurance and taxes.

Shea will be employed for the duration of courthouse construction or until notice of termination by the county.

Shea, it was pointed out, has had experience as project representative at Lakewood High School, Lakewood Middle School, and Seminole Junior College. He went on to note that the architect is in contact with the contractor from time to time but that a full-time man is needed on any job exceeding \$1 million.

Chairman John Alexander said that he recommended a project representative in such a detailed situation where unless "someone is riding shotgun" the contractor might have deficiencies such as "walls out of plumb," etc.

County Attorney Harold Johnson emphasized that although the project representative would be employed full-time at the job site, it did not relieve the architect of his contractual responsibilities. Commissioner Sidney Vihlen Jr. concurred, saying that generally the project representative would "ride herd on the contractor and subcontractor to make certain that the taxpayers get a quality building and will be there during all construction hours."

\$15,000 Federal Grant Sought

Sheriff John Polk will apply for a \$15,000 federal grant to retain an attorney to work solely for the sheriff's department in preparation of county cases for court and other activities.

Polk already has discussed the position with four attorneys now practicing in Seminole County: Fred Leone, now an assistant with the Seminole state attorney's office; Harold Johnson, attorney for the County Commission; Ned Julian, former Sanford policeman and now public defender; and Thomas Freeman, Casselberry city judge.

Polk said the money for the sheriff's attorney would come from the omnibus crime bill, which was passed sometime ago to allow the federal government to aid local city and county governments in their fight against crime.

Polk added that one municipal attorney in the state had been granted \$15,000 for an attorney. "I feel we need a full-time legal advisor who will work not only with the sheriff's department, but with area police departments as well," Polk added.

Lawmakers Favorable To Airport Authority

Preliminary indications that the Orange Seminole legislative delegation will approve the proposed bill to create a Sanford Airport Authority appeared favorable this morning at the conclusion of a breakfast meeting between the Sanford City Commission and seven of the 10 legislative members.

On hand for the 90-minute session held at Holiday Isle were Reps. Harvey Matthews, Walter Sims, William Gorman, Robert Milburn, William Fulford and Sen. Kenneth

Sen. William Gunter was represented by his aide, Jack McElvitt. Not present at the meeting were Reps. William Gibson and Eugene Stoner, and Sen. John Tucker.

Mayor Lee P. Moore and Sanford's other four commissioners were present to hear City Attorney W. C. Hutchison state the airport bill would remove politics from the city's airport industrial operation, now being operated by the Sanford Industrial Commission.

The proposed legislation gives power of eminent domain to the authority from the City Commission, which has held title to the property since the former Navy base was released to the General Services Administration (GSA) to operate a civilian airport and industrial park with all proceeds to be put back into airport capital improvements.

The airport district is not confined strictly to the airport but also includes property within the boundaries of Sanford. Hutchison stated the authority would have no taxing powers but. (Continued on Page 1B, Col. 1)

Protection Cut Off Good Neighbor Policy Nixed In Casselberry

CASSELBERRY — Casselberry will immediately discontinue its "Good Neighbor Policy" of extending police and fire protection to business establishments on the outskirts of the city, and four burglar alarm connections presently located in the police department will be immediately removed, since these alarms serve businesses outside the city limits.

The City Council made this decision last night during the course of a regular council meeting, after hearing City Attorney Kenneth McElvitt's opinion that in offering this protection the city would be subject to exposure, officers making arrests would be creating a bad public relations problem, since these alarms were not within the city boundaries, he claimed.

McElvitt said he didn't want to be in the city and was not properly asked to become a part of Sanford.

Mayor Lee P. Moore replied to Ferguson that he was anxious because he was contiguous to the city's boundaries and other property owners surrounding him on three sides.

After more argument, Commissioner Thomas McDonald moved to annex the property in question for city taxing purposes effective Jan. 1, 1971, which means that Ferguson will not pay taxes to the city until November, 1971.

Commissioner approved McDonald's motion with only Commissioner J. H. Crapps casting a "nay" vote.

On another matter, the commission indicated approval of the recent action of the Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) to not restrict the leasing of Sanford Airport building 310 to the state for a police academy but to allow all persons, including the state, to lease the structure at the old price of \$110 a square foot or approximately \$40,000.

Previously, the city had offered the structure for a cut-rate \$20,000 lease price in order to attract the academy.
