

> ALTAMONTE SPRINGS The municipality's \$1,784,500 sewer system is "all systems go" with all three phases approved. Lines are presently being installed in Glen Arder Heights and on the south and east of Lake Orienta. The system is being funded

> by a federal loan in the amount of \$995,000, a federal grant in the amount of \$247,500 and a grand from the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration. The city is required to furnish funds in the approximate amount of \$250,000. This will be paid through connection charges.

Contracts for construction of the system were recently awarded to Smith-Sweger Construction Company, sewer lines, \$551,985.55; Tech Corporation, lift station, \$223,000, and Chilton Construction Company, sewer treatment plant, \$393,791.

Lawmen's Lustre

Law enforcement officers in South Carolina, not a notably overpaid group of individuals, deserve a resounding pat on the back for their recent establishment of a college scholarship program.

The first annual funding (\$500 as a grant and \$500 as a loan) will be made to a student entering a South Carolina institution for the 1971 school year. Three other scholarships will be added in successive years until a total of four is in continuing existence.

Two features adopted by the Law Enforcement Officers Association in sponsoring the scholarships are particularly deserving of commendation. For one thing, the awards are open to all students or recent graduates of a South Carolina high school, without regard to race, age, sex, or religion Furthermore, the recipients do not have to study for or enter the field of law enforcement.

There is however, an incentive for the scholarship winners to enter law enforcement If they do, the \$2,000 loan (at \$500 a year) will he erased at the rate of \$500 for each year they stay in the field. And - here again is an instance of the breadth of thinking back of the scholarship program - the loan-for-giving feature applies whether an individual enters police work in South Carolina or elsewhere. In terms of numbers, the Law Enforcement Officers' scholarship program is modest, But as a gesture of devotion to the combined causes of education and public safety, it looms large. -Columbia (S.C.) State





In the United States, the meat of the calf is more pink, because the animal generally feeds on grass and grain rather than on milk

Veal has never become a universal favorite in America. In the meat with a wary eye. It s long been an attractiion in continental in origin, and it has grown in popularity in New ork and other eastern cities where interest in European food has grown tremendously since World War II

Only a small portion of the population is reported to eat veal with any regularity in Texas and other states in the West, although most of our supply comes from the dairy states of Wisconsin and Minnesota,

For one thing, there is the economic factor. In a country like Italy where pasture land is limited, farmers slaughter their calves to save fodder and make a quick profit. But on the great cattle spreads of America where grass and grain are plentiful, the rancher lets his cattle grow to adulthood, since the meat yield is far higher and the profit correspondingly greater. Curiously enough, however. veal inspired one of the famed nuckwagon dishes of olden ays. "Son-of-a-Gun Stew" was cowboy favorite for many ears, and still is, I understand. certain areas. It consists of the tongue, liver heart, sweetbreads and marrow gut of the calf. A couple of onions are added with a little chili powder, salt and pepper. This dish is virtually unknown in the East, and frankly I have no great desire

Personally, I prefer to stick to the tried and true French variations of veal, like Escalopes de


