Upon the completion of the 23
miles of hard surfaced road which

program, the county will have 95
miles of paved roads, a remarkable
showing for a county of this size,
according to authorities.

The projects which are to be
completed next year are:

Titusville road, five miles; from
Longwood through Markham to the
Wekiva brick road, eight and one-
half miles; Silver Lake road, one
and one-half miles; Lehman road,
two and one-quarter miles; Rich-
man and Cameron avenues, two
and one-quarter miles; and the old
Monroe road, two miles. In addi-
tion to the paving work, several
other projects are being planned.

DENBY ASSUMES BLAME FOR OIL POLICY OF 1922

Ex-Secretary Of Navy Says
He Suggested To Fall To
Switch Land From Navy
To Interior Department

Both Men Talked To
Harding On Subject

Denby Also Says First Sug-
gestion As To A Storage
Project Came From Him

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(AP)—
Much of the responsibility for the
oil policy of 1922 was
shouldered in court here today by
S. Denby, then secretary of the
navy.

Called by the attorneys defend-
ing former Interior Secretary Al-
bert B. Fall and Edward L. Do-
herty, the oil magnate, on a con-
spiracy charge in connection with
Doherty's acquisition of the Ek-
k Hills lease, the former naval sec-
retary said he himself had suggested
that the naval oil reserves be
transferred from the navy to the
interior department to permit
steps to prevent draining by pri-
vate wells adjoining.

Fall said he would help as much
as he could to that end, the wit-
ness continued. Denby then
brought the subject to President
Harding, who issued the transfer
order. Fall helped draft it and
Harding signed it in June, 1921,
while Denby was out of the city.
Some officers of the navy approved
the transfer and the President was
acquainted with this fact before
he issued the order.

The former secretary said the
first suggestion of a storage pro-
ject at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, also
originated in the navy department,
and that navy officers first
thought of the plan to convert
naval crude oil into fuel oil for
storage under a presidential pro-
clamation which would not require
enabling legislation from Con-
gress. The Pearl Harbor subse-
quently went to Doherty.

Denby approved the conversion
proposal, he said, after the plan
had been held to be legal by the
advocate general's office.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(AP)—

yesterday because of Doherty's
illness, the oil magnate's counsel

trial. He was summoned as a
character witness.

Although the delay caused by
Doherty's forced retirement from
the court room interrupted the
presentation of testimony, the op-
posing counsel who had hoped to
wind up the case this week, expect
to get their last witness on the
stand next week and give the jury
plenty of time to reach a decision
before Christmas.

President's Budget Asks Expenditure Over Four Billion

Bank Deposits Are
Over Five Millions

Combined deposits of the
three Sanford banks on Dec. 1
totalled \$6,109,864.89, according
to figures compiled from indi-
vidual institutions. This sum
does not include the thousands
of dollars in bond money that
was on deposit at this time
last year and is said to be a
marked showing for a city of
this size.

Heads of the three banks
have expressed satisfaction
with the figures and believe
they are more truly represen-
tative of the business situation
than was the showing of 1925.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—
(AP)—The new session
of Congress passed out of
"house warming" period
today and began to face
grim fiscal realities that
to occupy henceforth its
serious attention.

It received from President
Coolidge a new federal budget
requiring expenditures of
\$4,014,827,124 in the next
year, and the House, where ap-
propriation measures must originate,
at once began consideration of
the first money bill of the many
to come.

The budget represented an
increase of more than \$16,000,000
over the current year, largely
result of mounting requirements
for veterans and for the ex-
panding postal service.

In an accompanying mes-
sage to the capital by message
Mr. Coolidge disapproved any
permanent tax reduction and left
to Congress to decide whether
\$383,000,000 Treasury surplus
should be returned to the pos-
sibility of tax payers in rebates or be
applied to the national debt.

Almost simultaneously the De-
mocratic leaders of Senate and
House announced a party agree-
ment on a \$335,000,000 permanent
tax reduction.

Like the President's mes-
sage yesterday, the budget
message was presented for reading
clerks in the Senate and
Senate put it over until
and adjourned after a five-
session out of respect for Sen.
McKinley of Illinois, who died
yesterday.

sage to consideration of the
annual appropriation bill sur-
plus funds for the Postoffice and
new departments. As it came

Illinois Boxing Board Is Asked by "Tiger's" Pilot to Change Referee's Decision

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—(AP)—An official reconsideration of the referee's decision which took away Tiger Flowers' middleweight title and gave it to Mickey Walker was sought today from the Illinois Boxing Commission by Walk Miller, Flowers' manager.

Miller sent the commissioners a letter stating his appeal, and expected to confer with them. The commission plans to meet tomorrow to discuss the case.

No protest was filed by Miller in his letter but he declared he thought the commission should reverse the ruling of Referee Danny Yanger of its own accord.

While his appeal is under consideration, Miller said he would set out on the trail of Walker and Manager Jack Kearns, to close arrangements for the return match, for which Kearns posted a \$65,000 forfeit. Walker and Kearns left for the East the morning after the

match, without waiting to collect their ten per cent of the \$85,000 gate.

In a statement after the match, Yanger cited rule seven of Illinois Boxing Commission's code, in support of his decision awarding the match and title to Walker. The rule says:

"In case of minor fouls, such as hitting with the open gloves, clinching or prolonging contest after warning has been given by the referee, he shall have the power to disqualify offender and award the decision to the opponent."

Flowers repeatedly was guilty of slapping and flicking with his gloved hand open, Yanger declared. Miller's letter to the boxing commission disclaimed any intention of alleging collusion, and said that the decision, while an honest one, was "manifestly unfair and unjust."

DEMPSEY WILL BEGIN TRAINING SOON FOR GENE

Former Champ Avers Stories About Being Poisoned And Throwing Fight "Hokum"

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey, former heavy-weight champion, waiving the formality of a few warming up fights, will start training next week in the hope of having a return bout with Gene Tunney, to whom he lost the world's title last September at Philadelphia.

This he announced today saying: "If I can come back, I can whip Tunney, and if I can't come back, I'm through with the fight game. I don't want any 'set ups'."

Replying to reports that he had been poisoned before the fight with Tunney, the former champion declared:

"All this stuff about throwing fights, being poisoned or worried to death is a lot of hokum. Tunney can whip any man in the ring to-day. "It wasn't loss of weight. I see where some people claimed I lost 10 pounds the last three days before the fight. I lost about three pounds. I weighed 193 pounds when I tapered off and I weighed 187 pounds when I climbed into the ring. I couldn't get started. I knew what I wanted to do but couldn't make my muscles function."

"The next time we meet—and I sincerely hope we do—Tunney will be the defender—he will carry the load of a title."
