NEW YORK, May 7.—Now being about the time for all good ball clubs to come to the aid of the percentage column, it is noted today that outfits like the Pittsburgh Pirates, the New York Giants and the Cincinnati Reds in the National League and the New York Yankees and the Philadelphia Athletics in the American League are beginning to show where the "authority" is vested. They were the heavy winners on the week just concluded, a week during which frostbite was at a minimum for the first time this season. In brief class is beginning to register. MANILA, P. I., May 7.—(INS)—The League of Nations has been called upon to intervene in the present warfare raging about Tainanfu China. A cablegram was dispatched here today for the League's headquarters at Geneva asking for intervention on behalf of Chinese Nationalists to protect them against "Japanese brutality." The cable was sent by leaders of a mass meeting of 500 prominent Chinese residents of the Philippine Islands called in Manila today. The plea to the League of Nations was made following a resolution authorizing it.
