A dinner meeting has been arranged and reservations have come in fast. At this meeting the annual reports of officers will be heard, also elections held for four directors and one credit committeeman. Directors and Credit Committeemen serve terms of two years, the Board of Directors consisting of

3 Mets Teams To Train Here

Sanford City Commission Monday night approved an agreement whereby three of the New York Mets' farm baseball teams will hold their spring training at Municipal Stadium.

Ray Kennedy, of Casselberry, scout for the National League team, said the Williamsport (Pa.), Auburn (N. Y.) and Salina (Kan.) farm clubs will move here from Columbus, Ga., for training between March 15 and May 1.

The three teams will be on a seven-day schedule, with free exhibition games between themselves and with out-of-city visiting teams.

City agreed to ready the playing field and clubhouse while the Mets agreed to supply all water, electricity and fuel oil. Mets will have use of the main diamond and a second playing field free of charge.

Everett Kerr, manager of Mayfair Inn, where the teams will be housed during their stay here, and John Krider, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, pointed to the nation-wide publicity Sanford will receive in having the three clubs train here, also stating "it may be the opening wedge in bigger things to come in baseball for Sanford."

City Commission also approved application for a \$50,000 loan from the two Sanford banks to complete the \$60,000 cash purchase of the Woodruff building, First Street and Park Avenue. Members were undecided whether to place meters after the building is razed and a parking lot installed.

Jim Jernigan, recreation director, requested and received permission to host the highly basketball state tournament. Sanford won the state championship the last two seasons. Visiting players will be housed at the Sanford Naval Academy.

In other action, City Commission agreed for the old library building to be used as a cultural arts center, under Jernigan's management; approved annexation of the shopping center property at 27th Street and French Avenue; adopted a resolution approving the meter telephone system plan for the county, appointed Joe Denison to the Board of Adjustment (zoning) and Merle Warner to the Board of Ad-

justment and Appeals (building code), directed City Manager W. E. Knowles to advertise for bids for curbing forms, discussed the sale of city-owned property adjacent to the Central Fire Station, approved installation of a sidewalk on the north side of Commercial Avenue, with abutting property owners paying for the materials, and discussed a plaque for the new library building.

New Commander Takes Over Squadron 7

Cdr. Bryan B. Brown Jr., veteran Sanford attack pilot, Monday assumed command of Sanford's Heavy Attack Squadron Seven in formal ceremonies aboard the nuclear-powered carrier USS Enterprise.

He relieved Cdr. Leroy A. Heath, who had held the job since January, 1963.

The ceremonies took place during a brief in-port interlude between the ship's operating commitments. The Enterprise, with VA11-7's twinjet A-3A Vigilantes aboard, will deploy to the Mediterranean next month. For the past two weeks she has been conducting readiness operations off the Eastern Seaboard.

Cdr. Heath leaves the VA11-7 post for duty as nuclear weapons coordinator on the attack carrier USS Independence. He has been connected with Sanford aviation in one capacity or another since 1954 and with the A-3A program almost since its inception.

Brown served in the late 1950's through 1961 with several units based at the Sanford Naval Air Station, including VA11-3 and VA11-11. He holds a BS degree from the U. S. Naval Academy (Class '46) and a Master's Degree in aeronautical engineering from the Naval Post Graduate School at Monterey, California.

Cdr. Brown, his wife Dolores and their six children live in Sanford at 1109 Lincoln Street.

City's Bid On P. O. Lot High

ATLANTA (UPI) — A bid submitted by the office of the city manager of Sanford was the highest of 10 bids on sale of the old post office lot in Sanford. The bid was for \$8,011.49.

The second highest bid was from Herman Jacobson, of Sanford, for \$7,690 and third was Cornelius A. Ross Jr., Livermore, Calif., for \$6,100. The lowest bid was \$200.

The bids were opened by the General Services Administration (GSA) office here today.

City Manager W. E. Knowles said at noon today that if GSA accepts the City's offer the lot will be used as a parking area for the public library, now in the old post office building, and for a walkway between the city's No. 1 parking lot on Commercial Street and First Street.

In the original bidding several months ago, Jacobson offered \$10,000 for the lot but his bid was rejected.

Board Approves Proposal For Pay Increase

The Seminole Board of County Commissioners today unanimously adopted a recommendation presented by a former Commissioner Vernon Dunn which calls for the county's legislative delegation to give consideration to pay raises for members of the board.

Dunn declared that "Seminole County business during the past five or six years has become big business since current budgets combined amount to more than \$2.3 million plus \$300 million in assessed value."

Dunn said that "such county business requires properly qualified and dedicated officials in all departments." He went on to ask, "how can such qualified and dedicated members be induced to serve, and continue to serve and devote the interest and the time required, even to the detriment of their personal businesses, for a mere stipend when compared to other counties?"

Commissioner John R. Alexander pointed out that while he was in favor of the suggestion he wanted it made clear that any consideration given to pay raises by the legislative delegation should include his request that it not be placed into effect until the close of his term, "term of office. Commissioner Leo Gary of Oviedo stated that he knew what his salary would be when he sought the office."

Dunn also requested the commissioners to consider the possibility of favoring the establishment of a county taxpayers' association. Commissioner J. C. Hutchison expressed his opinion that such an association be given consideration provided that other agencies such as the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction and the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce also look upon the proposal favorably. The commission decided to confer with school board and chamber officials before taking final action.

In other action the commission: Asked officials of the Forest City Improvement Association to confer with County Attorney Harold Johnson and decide the best manner in which the county can provide suitable property upon which the association can construct a community center.

Named E. J. Moughton Jr. to the insurance committee and appointed Gled McCall to the zoning board. McCall will replace Bob Crumley, who resigned. The commissioners authorized a letter commending Crumley for his service.

Decided to confer with professional planning consultants but reaffirmed their previous opinion that a full time county planner would be necessary, as Commissioner Hutchison put it, "Planning is now a continuous proposition and anything a professional consultant might plan could be obsolete tomorrow."

Decided to ask all municipalities in the county to allow State Road Department personnel to enter their respective areas for conducting a traffic study which will be the most comprehensive ever made in this county. The cost is estimated at \$40,000. When all municipalities concur the county will enter into an agreement with the state agency to conduct the survey.

An announcement should be forthcoming by the end of the week.

Chiang Mulls Break With France

LONDON (UPI) — Most of Western Europe reacted with comparative calm today to France's recognition of Red China, but the move sent uneasiness through parts of non-Communist Asia.

Hussia called it a "step inward strengthening peace," but reports from Taipei, seat of the Nationalist Chinese government, indicated Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek might break relations with France.

Members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) tended to evaluate the move, announced Monday, in terms of the alliance itself. Some feared it might weaken NATO because President Charles de Gaulle of France had indicated he would withdraw from the treaty.

Others deplored its limits. But there was little evidence of opposition to the principle of recognition. Henri Fayol, deputy foreign minister of Belgium, indicated his government might follow France's lead.

Britain, which recognized Communist China 14 years ago, had no official comment. But British newspapers seemed to approve France's action.

The official Soviet government newspaper Izvestia said France was taking a "realistic approach" and that the Kremlin had "insisted for over 10 years on the restoration of China's lawful rights in the United Nations."

House Owners Here Warned Of Operator
Seminole County residence owners were warned today by F. Stewart Helms, vice president of the Seminole County Board of Realtors, to beware of a Miami man operating in this area.

Helms pointed to an article in Sunday's Miami Herald outlining the operator's activities. The newspaper article reported the man will buy equities in VA and FHA homes for small down payments and then rent them. Within months, it continued, the seller learns that he has not made mortgage payments and the seller finds himself facing collection action.

Dearborn Loss Set At \$759,000
Company officials today estimated a \$759,000 loss in the fire which destroyed the Dearborn Electronics Laboratories plant on Highway 17-92 south of Sanford Monday morning.

Ralph Bell, captain of the Lake Mary Volunteer Fire Department, suffered a broken arm when he fell while fighting the blaze.

Officials said today they will release a detailed statement about the fire and future company plans to the press Wednesday.

Casselberry Board Adopts 3 Budgets

Budgets for the Casselberry Recreation Commission, the Volunteer Fire Department and Mayor Owen Anstey's office were adopted Monday night by the Casselberry Board of Aldermen which met in continued session at the Municipal Building.

Amounts were \$3,650 for recreation, with insurance to be added when ready; \$7,891.15 for the firemen, with terms of compensation for the volunteers to be regulated at a later date, and \$9,192 for the mayor's office after items of \$6,230 were transferred to a Public Building and Improvements budget.

Included in the transfer were \$5,000 for a proposed addition to the Municipal Building, \$450 for air conditioning and heating and \$80 for a sign.

Marshall Gus Sawyer was asked to submit a revised budget for the Police Department after tentative estimates on costs of a new patrol car cut his totals by approximately \$1,600.

Discussion of a budget for the Road Board was tabled. However, Mayor Anstey was authorized to continue with necessary road work for the present. Expenditure of \$101,700 was approved for 30 feet of 18-inch pipe for a complete culvert at the intersection of Jasmine Road and Palm Drive.

Attorney Kenneth McIntosh was authorized to consult with County Road Superintendent J. C. Lavender for recommendations needed as a basis for setting up a comprehensive drainage program which could be carried out over a number of years.

McIntosh also will draw a preliminary ordinance as a worksheet for the Board to use in setting forth qualifications needed to fill the office of Superintendent of Public Works for the town.

Possibility was discussed of combining the duties of Building Inspector with the superintendent's job until such time as work loads require separation of duties.

In other business, discussion and adoption of a building code for the town, following specifications as outlined in the county code, were tabled until the Feb. 10 meeting, with stipulation that this item be number one on the agenda at that time.

Action on an occupational license fee schedule also was tabled for study at a work session which will be called by Board Chairman Ed Lunn.

The Board agreed to endorse that part of the proposed Metropolitan Telephone System which allows toll free service throughout the county. However, it was stipulated that this endorsement should in no way indicate that Casselberry approves the present rate structure of Winter Park Telephone Company.

The next regular meeting of the board will be at 7:30 p.m., Feb. 10, at the Casselberry Woman's Club on Overbrook Drive.

Culpepper Says Seminole Sites Lost In Shuffle

The proposed Adamucci site in Orange County for the new East Central Florida university will be recommended by the State Board of Control to the Cabinet Board of Education at next Tuesday's session in Tallahassee.

Dr. J. Broward Culpepper, executive director of the Board of Control, told The Sanford Herald by telephone this morning that his staff members "are equally in accord for the Adamucci site and the Tusawilla and Econlockhatchee sites in Seminole County."

Quered why he and his co-workers did not make any recommendation at the Orlando meeting last Friday, when the Board members selected Adamucci, Dr. Culpepper said, "The Board moved so fast we didn't have an opportunity."

He then added they would have recommended any one of the three sites. The Board split 33 on votes for the Martin, Adamucci and Tusawilla sites before finally deciding on Adamucci.

Dr. Culpepper said this morning that should Orange County fail to deliver the Adamucci site, the Board "will start over again and we will recommend the Tusawilla and Econ sites."

Seminole County Commissioners met Monday evening with Chamber of Commerce university site committee members to discuss the "university site situation" and decided to take a "wait and see" attitude before proceeding any further in efforts to have the university placed in Seminole County.

Missing Boy Just Asleep

Sanford police launched an all-out search for a three-year-old boy Monday afternoon when his mother, Mrs. Harold Mirtland Sr., reported him missing from their home at Bailey Street and Omara Road.

The search ended when police found Harold Jr. asleep under his mother's bed.

Septic Tank Bilkers Out

Sheriff J. L. Hobbs warned today that the out-of-town "septic tank operators" are in this area again.

A local resident reported to Hobbs he was billed for \$173.68 for having his tank cleaned, only to learn he could have had a local firm do the job for between \$25 and \$40.

A masked bandit armed with a "long chrom revolver" held up and robbed Robert d'Aversa, owner of the Rex liquor store at Pinecrest shopping center, of about \$300 at 8 p.m. Monday.

Chief of Police Roy Williams said d'Aversa described the thief as about six feet, weighing 160 pounds, dark brown hair with a crew cut. He was wearing gray trousers and shirt, a suede jacket and gloves, with a mask made from a woman's stocking.

The thief forced d'Aversa into a rear room and locked him in. He also tore two telephones from their connections.

Witnesses told police the bandit entered a yellow car, with two other men, when he fled.

Cop Tells Of \$10,000 Offer At Hoffa Trial

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. — (UPI) — A Nashville policeman testified today he was offered "at least \$10,000" if he could contact one of the jurors in the 1962 kickback trial of labor leader James R. Hoffa.

Over the vigorous objections of defense attorneys, policeman James T. Walker told a federal court jury hearing charges of jury tampering against Hoffa and five others that the offer was made by one of the co-defendants in the case.

Defense attorney Jacques Schiffer argued that Walker's testimony was "hearsay."

Walker testified that Thomas Parks, a former business agent for Hoffa's Teamsters Local 299 in Detroit, approached him about contacting juror Gratin Fields, during the 1962 trial in Nashville.

John J. Hooker Sr., special government prosecutor, asked Walker if "Parks ever mentioned a sum of money to you during his conversation in regard to Gratin Fields."

Walker testified that Parks told him "he would be willing to get at least \$10,000 for me if I could contact Mr. Fields."

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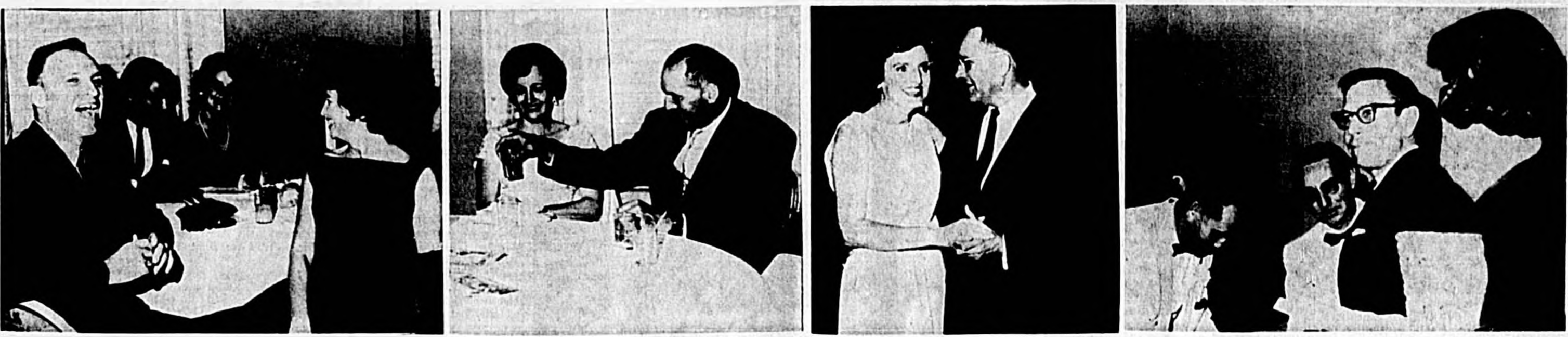

Train The Unskilled

The initial steps toward the establishment of an area technical and vocational education center in Seminole County are now being taken jointly by the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction in cooperation with the Sanford office of the Florida State Employment Service.

These two agencies are conducting a survey of industry, business and agriculture to determine the need for this type of center. Questionnaires are being sent to some 500 employers in Central Florida. This area includes Orange, Volusia, Brevard and Seminole Counties.

Recently President Johnson signed a new vocational education bill. It has passed both houses of Congress by top-heavy majorities. This bill, commonly known as the Perkins Bill, provides federal aid for a vocational and technical education amounting to \$60 million the first year. This amount will gradually be increased to \$225 million per year over a period of five years, after which it will remain at this level. This appropriation is in addition to the \$56 million already provided under the Smith-Hughes and George-Barden acts.

Since these types of schools are extremely costly to construct and equip, 25 percent of the funds are earmarked for construction purposes. Before these funds can be released the results of the survey must be known and a survey team will visit Seminole County to make their recommendations.

This center will serve high school students during the day and classes for adults will be offered in the evening hours under the direction of E. S. Douglas, head of vocational and adult education. Plans are now being made to offer courses in such fields as automotive mechanics, cosmetology, sheet metal work, appliance servicing, commercial art, dry cleaning, industrial electricity, industrial electronics, instrument repair, machine shop and practical nursing. These courses will be in addition to the technical and vocational pro-

grams already established in Seminole County.

The local general Vocational Advisory Committee, under Chairman Brock Perkins, has already passed a resolution urging the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction to take the necessary steps to establish the center in this area. Superintendent R. T. Millwee and the members of the board have approved the resolution.

Now, the School Board and the Employment Service need the wholehearted cooperation of the industrial, business and agricultural people in this area. When questionnaires are received they should be completed and returned as quickly as possible.

When the questionnaires are returned the needs of various fields will be determined. Results will be compiled and a request will be made to the State Department of Education for funds to build the center on a unit basis. The number of initial units will, of course, be determined by the survey team.

The Herald urges all of Seminole County's people who are associated with this program to continue their efforts in this major field of endeavor. The Herald is convinced that progress in this area is a necessity in this day and age when an individual must be thoroughly educated or trained in a specific field in order to be employed. It is obvious that in the near too distant future that the classification of non-skilled workers will be extinct.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — A man to watch more and more in President Lyndon Johnson's sprawling family of aides and friends is Horace Busby.

Short, stocky, quiet-spoken, the 39-year-old Washington public relations consultant is perhaps the least heralded of the President's close associates. This seems bound to change.

Operating out of an office just a few blocks from the White House, Busby right now finds a good many of his days pre-empted by presidential command. Recently he and his wife were on the limited guest list when Johnson spent a weekend at Camp David in Maryland.

Busby usually is described as a speech writer, and this he has often been. But his usefulness to the President appears to be a good deal broader — and in the policy-making area.

Acquaintances label Busby as close-mouthed and not eager for attention. Biographical details on him are hard to come by.

The available evidence suggests, however, that his link to the President may be marked resemblance to the tie between the late President John F. Kennedy and the gifted Theodore Sorensen, who has announced his resignation from the White House staff effective Feb. 28.

For one thing, Busby has tremendous seniority with Johnson. His working association dates back to the President's days in the House. He helped in Johnson's successful 1948 campaign for the

Senate and stayed with him for a time thereafter.

Then the bond was broken for a time, but Busby frequently was summoned in subsequent years to serve as a consultant to the Senate Preparedness subcommittee which Johnson headed.

During the nearly three years of Johnson's service as vice president, Busby continued to answer the call whenever it was given.

On his several missions abroad for Kennedy, Johnson took Busby along and kept him at his elbow in important meetings and conferences.

Some who have observed Busby see his value as this: In a fashion different from Walter Jenkins, the President's close-in administrative aide, Busby seems able to grasp the mode and trend of Johnson's thinking. More than most, he is a perceptive judge of the President's manifold complexities.

It used to be said of Sorensen that he functioned almost as the other half of Kennedy's brain. This early, no one is saying this of Busby. But he is clearly a candidate for such a role.

Nor are Busby's writing talents small. One who knows him rates him a "very facile man at the typewriter." With Sorensen's writing skills lost to the President a few weeks hence, the prospect is good that Busby will have a considerable hand in helping to prepare Johnson's public utterances in the time ahead.

Himself a former Texas newspaperman, Busby is, of course, in easy sympathy with the President's basic speech style.

All these things considered, it is odd that this young man has thus far been largely overlooked in the voluminous speculations about who does what for Lyndon Johnson. Time—and perhaps the President himself — will remedy that.

Later she married a fine young man and they had three children, all of whom were now grown and married.

Her husband always stopped at the hospital to visit with her en route to his office. Both of them knew her case was hopeless. But Kathy seemed as cheery as usual on this particular morning.

Her husband sat down beside her to read the Journal Gazette.

"Oh, put your paper down and let's talk," Kathy protested.

He ignored her a couple of times until she finally pulled the newspaper away from him. They talked for a few minutes and he patted her hand.

"By the way," Kathy said, "you were supposed to telephone the Browns today."

"Well, I'll do that when I get to the office," her husband replied.

"No, go and do it right now," Kathy protested.

He still argued that he could phone them from the office but when Kathy kept insisting, he finally got up and went out to a pay phone booth in the corridor.

"Dr. Crane," her husband told me later, "I wasn't out of Kathy's room more than 3 minutes.

"Yet, when I got back, she was dead!"

"Apparently, she knew she could let go and drift off into the next world as soon as she could get me out of the room."

"But she didn't look any worse today than for the past week. And she chatted as cheerfully as ever."

"So how could she let loose from the thin thread of life so quickly?"

"And what is it that permits

people to die when they want to do so?"

"How could she know that within a couple of minutes she could be dead while I was trying to put through that phone call just down the corridor from her room?"

Power of Mind

Many people feel an "all gone" sensation deep inside when they are very low in physical health.

In fact, they almost teeter on the brink of eternity and can go either way, depending on their mental outlook.

If they give up and let go, they can be dead in a few minutes, as was Kathy's case.

If her son had been coming home from the Army and she knew he was due the next day or even the next week, she might have forced herself to hang on.

For many people cling to life as long as they feel needed (See tomorrow's case). Others give up and die because they lack incentive to live!

197 Receive Eye Tests In DeBary

A total of 197 DeBary residents received tests for glaucoma last Friday when the Daytona Beach Glaucoma Eye Clinic, under direction of Mrs. Ella Green of Daytona, visited the community. Mrs. Green's staff includes two technicians, plus equipment, and Pink Lady assistants.

The project was sponsored locally by the Civic Association under the supervision of Mrs. Theodore Davis, civic welfare chairman. DeBary Pink Ladies assisting were Mrs. C. E. Butler, Mrs. Chester Heirick, Mrs. Harry Raup and Mrs. Claude Trussell. Civic Association members serving as assistants were James Asker, Albert Salisbury, Ivan Walker and Earl Merrill.

Mrs. Green stated that facilities and good local organization enabled her team to handle almost double the number of persons originally scheduled for the tests. Six of the 197 examined were advised to consult an eye specialist and 12 others showing evidence of glaucoma were instructed to report for a next DeBary test date for a second check.

The second clinic program is scheduled at the DeBary Community Center for Wednesday of this week, beginning at 9:30 a.m., when 150 applicants (25 per hour) will be tested. An additional 75 applicants will be examined at a later date.

Other persons in DeBary and nearby communities who desire the test should phone or send their names and addresses to Mrs. Theodore Davis, 153 Eldorado Drive, DeBary, or to Earl Merrill, 21 Azalea Drive, DeBary. Enrollment may also be made at this week's clinic.

The necessity of advance registration was stressed by Mrs. Davis who pointed out that in order for the program to proceed efficiently, it must be known how many persons desire the examination.

The eye clinic service is made possible through the Florida Society for the Prevention of Blindness and other cooperating organizations. The service is free. Donations are accepted for furthering the work.

The 66-year-old lady senator from Maine started her campaign for the presidency assured that she would receive her home state's 14 delegates

in announcing her candidacy Monday before the Women's National Press Club, the white-haired widow said she would enter the March 10 New Hampshire primary and the April 14 Illinois primary. She said she also might enter the Oregon and District of Columbia primaries.

Her candidacy was welcomed as "very refreshing" by Sen. George Aiken, R-Vt., and as "splendid" by Esther Peterson, President Johnson's appointee to head consumer affairs.

Republican National Chairman William E. Miller said he was "delighted" she had entered the presidential sweepstakes and predicted Mrs. Smith would receive a "great response."

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., a leading supporter of Gov. Nelson Rockefeller for

the Republican nomination, said Mrs. Smith was a "stellar performer" who would make the pre-convention battle more lively.

Mrs. Smith's decision to run was based on thousands of letters from all 50 states asking her to enter the presidential race.

She is the first female aspirant for the presidency from a major party and the first woman candidate since Belva Lockwood of the Equal Rights party tried vainly in 1884, before women even had a right to vote.

Jobs For Breadwinners LBJ Goal

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson said today the nation must start the war against poverty by doing more to help find jobs for unemployed family breadwinners.

Johnson made the comment as he made public a Labor Department report indicating that the welfare of 6.3 million

Americans is adversely affected by joblessness among the main wage-earners in a family.

The President called attention to the serious impact on children when unemployment forces a reduction in family spending for food, housing, medical care and other necessities.

"The cycle of poverty begins here," he said in a statement. "If we are to wage a successful war against poverty in the United States, then we must begin by helping all workers with family responsibilities to find a productive place in the American economy."

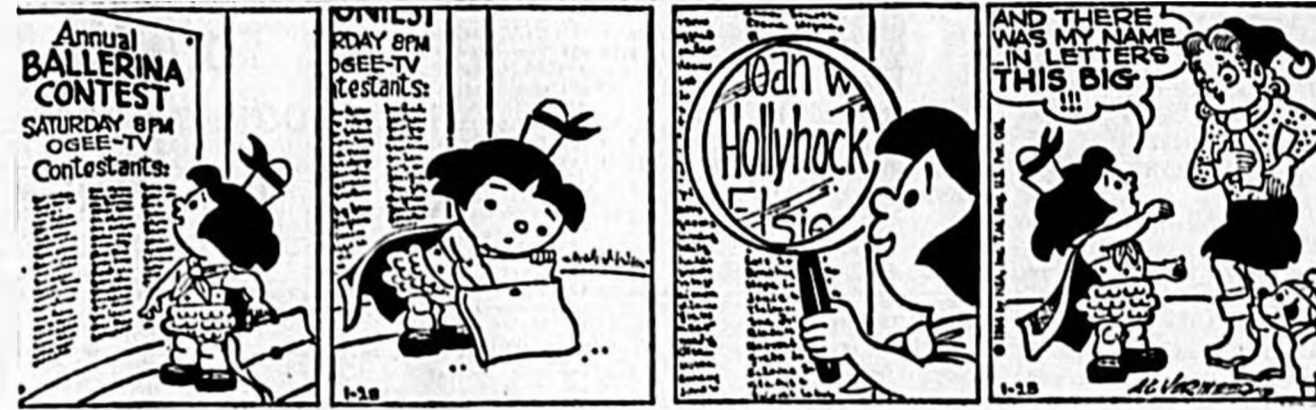

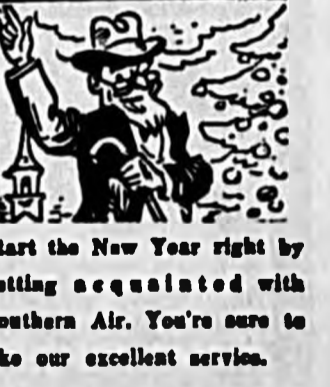

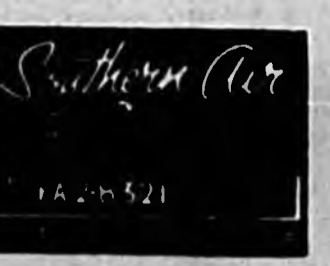

There is no telling how much blood, sweat and tears could be avoided at the bridge table if players would only think before they make their mistakes and not afterwards when all they can do is to slough up the game.

The best place for declarer to do his thinking is before playing from dummy to the first trick. Even if there is no problem with that play there is no better time to plan your whole campaign.

South did not believe in using up valuable time this way. He played the jack of hearts almost before he had seen the rest of the hand.

East was in no such hurry. He looked carefully at that long diamond suit and decided to save his king of

queen and West led another heart. This time East was through with his conservation program. He covered the queen of hearts with the king.

Now declarer started to think. He worried, fretted, fumed and generally tried to salvage something from the wreck, but all to no avail. There was no way left for him to make his contract.

How much easier matters would have been if South had done his thinking at trick one and played dummy's three of hearts.

He would have won the trick with the ace and set up dummy's diamond suit. Later he would force East's king of hearts and be able to enter dummy with a heart and cash the rest of the diamonds.

French officials said De Gaulle is convinced his action was correct regardless of possible repercussions in the Western alliance and from Nationalist China.

A primary motive behind De Gaulle's decision to recognize Red China, many diplomats here believed, was to demonstrate France's independence of the United States

in international affairs.

France's announcement that it would establish diplomatic relations with Peking caused widespread reaction across the world and opened the way for an end to the 15-year isolation of Mao Tse-tung's regime. The decision, known for some time, was announced officially Monday.

In the bold and independent

stroke that could alter the balance of power in Asia, De Gaulle apparently aimed at taking over Western leadership in the Far East from the United States and restoring some of France's old grandeur.

Officials said De Gaulle, in making the move, was prepared for an open breach with the Nationalist Chinese.

The Nationalist Chinese charge d'affaires in Paris de-

livered a stinging protest to the French Foreign Office, charging France with an "unfriendly act." But the first Nationalist reaction did not include a break in relations.

French sources were inclined to believe that President Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist

government on Formosa eventually would break with Peking without having to break with the Nationalists.

The United States was reported to have urged Taipei to retain its consular ties.

Informed sources said the Chinese Reds apparently dropped earlier insistence that France should break with the Nationalists if it wanted relations with Peking.

The sources added, however, that there appeared to be no firm deal under which Paris could maintain formal

ties with both Chinese governments.

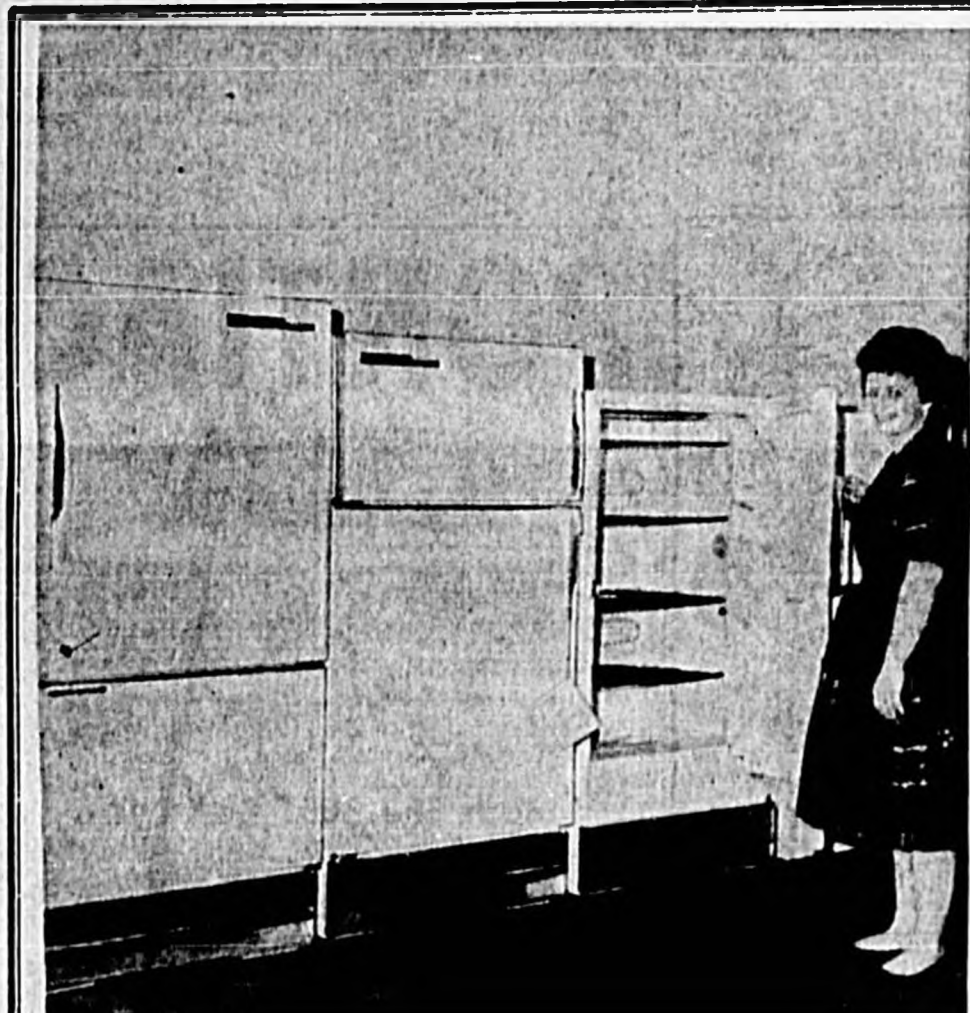

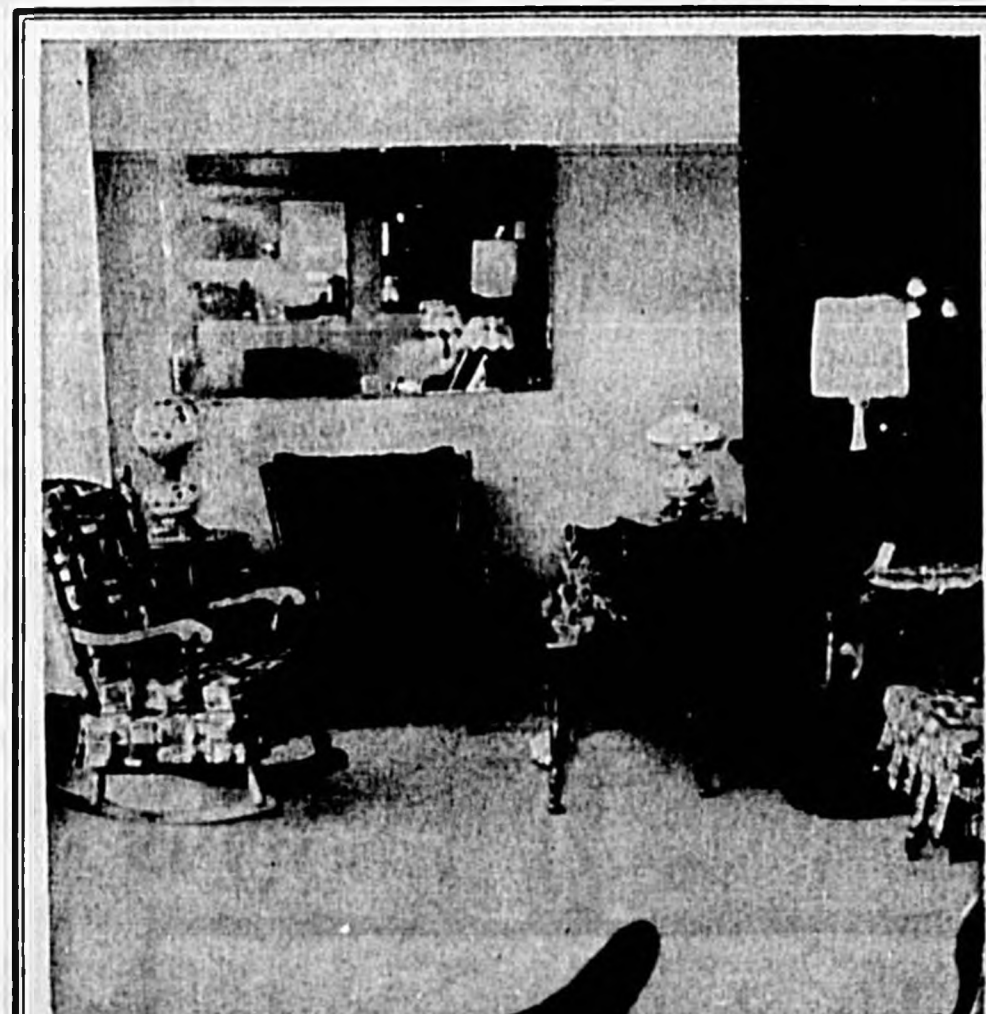

MOSCOW (UPI)—A Soviet jet fighter Tuesday forced down a jet trainer 62 miles inside East Germany and the bodies of all three American airmen aboard were later found in the wreckage, the official news agency Tass said tonight.

Plane Believed Downed By East German Reds

WIESBADEN, Germany (UPI)—A high-ranking U. S. Air Force officer said today Communist jet fighters "probably shot down" an unarmed American jet training plane with three men aboard after it strayed into Communist East Germany.

The Soviet Embassy in East Berlin said Russian military representatives will begin "immediate contacts" with the U. S. military mission in Potsdam to determine what happened to the T-39 jet and the three officers who were aboard when it disappeared.

A spokesman for the Soviet Embassy said he knew nothing about the fate of the missing plane.

"The organs of the Soviet armed forces at present stationed in the German Democratic Republic will take up immediate contact with the U. S. mission in Potsdam to clarify this matter," the spokesman said.

A spokesman for the East German foreign ministry said, "We know nothing about this case."

The Soviet statement was in reply to a demand for information filed by the U. S. Embassy in Bonn with the four-power Berlin air safety center and the Soviet military headquarters in East Germany.

Firm Head Denies Plans To Move Unit

WINTER PARK—Benjamin Naven, Chicago industrialist and chairman of the board of Dearborn Electronic Laboratories, Inc., said at noon today that the firm is making every effort to resume operations as near as possible to the location of the plant destroyed last Monday by fire.

Naven, appearing at a press conference here, stated that he did not know the origin of rumors that the firm had anticipated a move to California. He said "if operations can be resumed in this locality to take full advantage of the trained employees."

F. X. Dorian, executive vice president and general manager of the Dearborn laboratory on U. S. Highway 17-92, said that the cause of the fire had not been pinpointed. However, he did indicate that the blaze may have started in the ceiling area and due to some of the air conditioning and air filtering devices. The fire was so well underway by the time it was discovered it was impossible to bring it under control.

Naven estimated the damage to the building at approximately 97 per cent of its total value, placing the loss at better than \$400,000. In addition, equipment damage has been estimated in a range between \$250,000 and \$300,000, and the same figure has been placed on the loss of inventory. Much of the test and research equipment, on which no price tag can be placed, is in addition to the losses.

Dorian revealed that the plant, as well as its operation, was as well insured as possible. He said that the firm carried fire, occupancy and business interruption coverage.

As to when a decision will be made regarding resumption of operation, Naven declined to say. He pointed out the immediate problem is to fill the orders now on the books for defense and space products for Army, Navy, NASA and Atomic Energy Commission requirements.

Dorian stated if facilities in this area could be found to enable the company to utilize its present work force it might be possible to get into operation within a couple of weeks. The problem in relocating, he declared, is finding facilities with adequate humidity control and an air filtering system. He added if operations cannot be resumed in about six months, the local plant might as well be considered out of business.

Coroner Hugh Duncan ruled that Mrs. Ragan's death was caused by a broken neck and due to her own negligence.

Gramkow Funeral Home, in charge of arrangements, reported Mr. and Mrs. Ragan were married only a month ago. Mrs. Ragan also is survived by four children, James S. Jr., Ronald Joe, Vernon Ray and Shirley Gene Wagner.

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The United States, opening a two-day doubleheader, today launched its mighty Saturn-1 rocket in an attempt to orbit a "flying junkpile" as the world's heaviest satellite.

The 16-story tall Saturn-1, forerunner of rockets destined to take U. S. astronauts to the moon this decade, lifted from a massive concrete launching pad at 11:25 a. m. EST.

Scientists hoped to send the rocket's entire second stage—4 feet and 37,700 pounds of nose cone, burned out rocket casing and sand ballast—into an orbit ranging from 160 to perhaps 400 miles above earth.

It would be the heaviest satellite ever launched since the best Soviet Union has accomplished is estimated at about 15,000 pounds. It also would be perhaps the most useless. The Saturn-1 second stage carried nothing in the way of a working payload.

Scientists on a firing complex about two miles away were in the midst of preparations for the second half of the space doubleheader—a planned attempt Thursday to rocket an 808-pound Ranger probe more than 230,000 miles to take close-up pictures of the moon.

Living Costs At All-Time High

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Higher prices for food and housing raised the nation's living costs to an all-time peak in December, the government disclosed today.

The Labor Department said its consumer price index (CPI) climbed by two-tenths of one per cent last month to reach 107.6 per cent of average 1937-39 prices.

This meant that it took \$10.76 to buy the same goods and services that \$10 could buy a few years ago.

It was only the third time in the past 10 years that the index went up in December. The 1.7 per cent rise from the previous December in the consumer price level was the largest in five years.

Sharp increases were reported in prices for fresh vegetables, sugar and candy together with home owner costs and house-keeping expenses.

Public transportation, gasoline and movie admissions also cost more last month.

Turks Threaten Cyprus Attack

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI)—Turkey today considered military intervention in the deteriorating Cyprus crisis which is disrupting NATO unity and endangering peace in the Mediterranean.

The Turkish government said it was calling the Cyprus peace talks in London, and Premier Ismet Inonu warned Turkey might send troops to Cyprus if fighting erupts again between Turkish and Greek Cypriots.

The NATO partners of Turkey and Greece consulted on a British proposal for a multinational police force for the embattled island republic as both Ankara and Athens stepped up military preparations.

In Cyprus, the leader of the Turkish community accused President Archbishop Makarios of secretly seeking Soviet help against any Turkish invasion. Makarios himself toured the countryside to calm fears caused by reports in Athens that Turkey is preparing an invasion.

Oviedo To Get New Phone Lines

Southern Bell telephone subscribers in the Oviedo area (including Chuluota) will be able to call almost 30,000 additional telephones in the Winter Park area after 2 a.m. Sunday, it was announced today by Bob Sheddin, area group manager for Southern Bell.

Last-minute testing by Southern Bell and Winter Park Telephone Company technicians is now being completed over the more than 7 1/2 miles of new inter-office cable installed for the change-over by both companies.

With the completion of the Oviedo-Winter Park telephone hookup, Oviedo subscribers will be able to make local calls to a total of approximately 150,000 telephones. Oviedo subscribers have already been provided with telephone directories containing Winter Park listings, Sheddin said.
