NO REDUCTION OF WAGES

Washington, Nov. 13.—The railroad administration plans no reduction in railroad employees' wages under peace conditions, and likewise no material lowering of freight and passenger rates, it was stated authoritatively today.

Both are likely to remain at their present levels, although with many adjustments, during the period of changing the nation from war to peace.

Even with recent advances, railroad wages are not as high as those paid for similar service in war industries, it was declared, and consequently railroad administration officials feel that there is no war bonus to be taken off the wages of rail employees.

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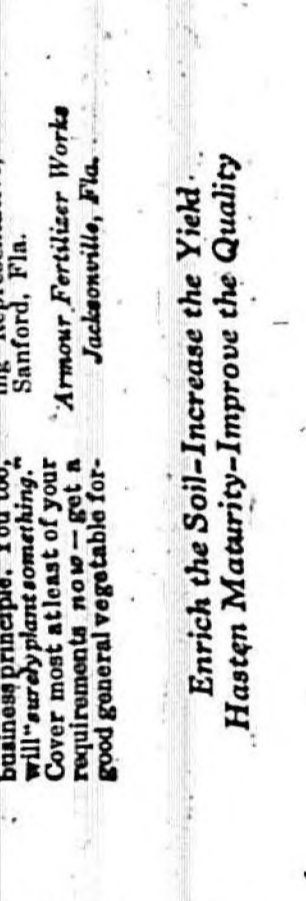

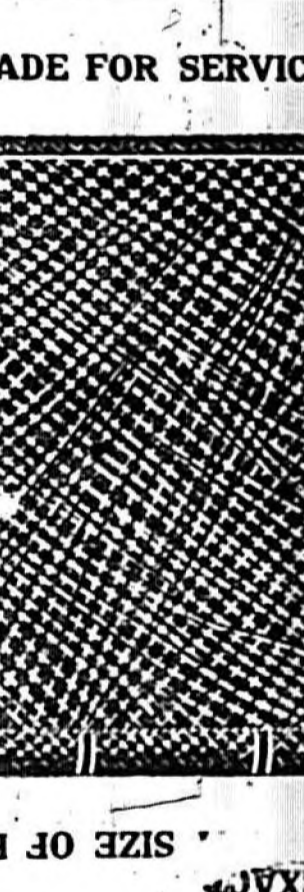
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
