## BASEBALL TRADE RECORDS BROKEN BY RECENT DEALS

**George Kelley Goes To Reds In Exchange For E. Rousch To Climax Season Of The Biggest Trades In History**

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—All standing and sitting records for player turnover in the major leagues were broken beyond recognition today with the announcement that the New York Giants had taken title to Ed Roush in consideration for the passing of George Kelly to the Cincinnati Reds. That one just about closed the book, unless and grossly in error in the notion that the Yankees are not seriously considering transfer of Babe Ruth to the Phils, and that the Senators aren't likely to send Walter Johnson to Fort Wayne for further seasoning.

They are, with the sole exception of George Sisler in St. Louis, the only ranking figures of the profession who have remained, as is, during the exigencies of this most sensational of all off seasons.

Suppose you are informed of the conclusion of the last world series that the winning manager, Rogers Hornsby, would be traded to the New York Giants before another season began. You would have laughed in great glee. Suppose it was added that Ty Cobb, Detroit institution and greatest player of the day, age, generation and time without memory, would appear during 1927 in the uniform of the Philadelphia Athletics. Suppose that Tris Speaker, deft native genius and great hitter, would leave Cleveland for Washington. You would have been entitled to punch your informant full on the nose on general principals. But you've got to go back now and apologize like a little gentleman.

However, if you still were conscious after the Cobb-Speaker shock, the next thing would be to demand bigger and better pads of cells after you were detected that Eddie Collins would leave Chicago for the Philadelphia Athletics; that Frank Fish would leave the Giants for the St. Louis Cardinals; that Zack Wheat would leave Brooklyn for the Philadelphia Athletics; and that Burleigh Grimes would leave Brooklyn for the Giants.

By that time, any sensible man would wish to leave the vicinity for the sake of his health.

And now Kelly for Roush. I suppose that, even at this immature moment, forecasts are being aired to the effect that the series of deals has "made" the Giants and Athletics and that John McGraw and Connie Mack have been detected again in a lot of deep thinking. Time alone will tell that story. With temperamental lads like Hornsby, Roush and Cobb involved, it would seem to be smart business to see more and say less, pending developments.

For years McGraw has tried intermittently to land either Hornsby or Roush. Now he has both at one and the same time and that should be eminently satisfactory, at least till the end of the season.

Roush, of course, will play center-field, giving McGraw his first real-star in that position since Donlin's day.

## 3 THEATER RAIDS LEAD TO ARREST OF 41 IN GOTHAM

Acting Mayor McKee Acts In Effort To Curb Licentious Plays: 'The Captive,' 'Sex' And 'Virgin Man' Raided

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—(INS)—Raids on three Broadway plays, in which 41 actors, producers and managers were arrested last midnight, will be repeated if the theaters open their doors today, acting Mayor Joseph McKee announced.

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
