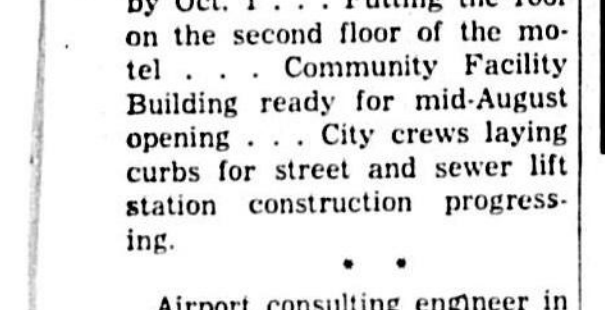
We imagine now that the Civil Service hearing on Joe T. Hickson is over the City Commission will call in Capt. Arnold Williams... Need I say more?

Butler Backed Appeal Set

The Sanford Civil Service Board today refused to reinstate Ex-Police Lt. Joe T. Hickson to the police department. Hickson had been with the department for 18 years. He was fired in March and filed an appeal in April.

Board Chairman Morle Warner said in a public statement that after many hours of deliberation, "The dismissal of Joe T. Hickson by Police Chief Ben Butler on March 21, 1967, is hereby affirmed."

At the final hearing this morning were members of the City Commission, Hickson's attorney Gordon Frederick, Butler as City Manager W. E. Knowles, Hickson was not present.

Frederick, after the verdict was read, told the Herald he "would take appropriate action" to get justice for his client. "We'll appeal it to a higher court," Frederick said, indicating a Circuit Court trial.

"Their actions were contrary to law. They had no evidence to back up their decision," Frederick charged.

At the same time Mayor Joe Baker complimented the Civil Service Board for, "their pursuit of justice. I feel they have done a good job," the mayor said.

Hickson was fired in March charged with neglect of duty and conduct unbecoming a command officer. The board started its inquiry in the Hickson case in May and listened to some 1,400 pages of testimony. Some 25 witnesses were subpoenaed and the board held eight hearings spending a total of some 63 hours listening to all the testimony.

After the hearing this morning, Warner told the Herald the board was unanimous in its decision. They started deliberating for 90 minutes Tuesday night and reconvened at 8:30 this morning. They reached a decision 30 minutes later.

Jets Pound Railroads, Steel Mills

SAIGON (AP)—U. S. forces reported killing 143 Communist troops in two battles in the central lowlands Wednesday while waves of U. S. jets ranged over a wide area to pound North Vietnam's rail network and its biggest iron and steel works.

American casualties in the lowlands battles 300 miles north of Saigon were six dead, 26 wounded and four missing, the U. S. Command said. It said there was light, scattered contact in 21 other U. S. and allied ground operations.

With good weather prevailing, U. S. Air Force and Navy pilots flew 133 missions against the Communist North. They hammered 11 railroad yards and inter-rail lines from the demilitarized zone to more than 50 miles above Hanoi.

The attacks on the rail network were a continuation of a two-month-old campaign against Hanoi's rail network. U. S. planes rained the Thai Nguyen steel works north of Hanoi for the eighth time, and a U. S. spokesman said an Air Force RF101 reconnaissance plane was shot down, the 367th U. S. combat plane reported lost over North Vietnam. The pilot was rescued.

Hanoi Radio claimed three U. S. planes were shot down Wednesday, including two pilotless reconnaissance craft.

The U. S. Command announced that 143 Americans were killed in combat last week, the lowest for any week since early February. American casualties for the week totaled 1,112—seven less than the week before.

The U. S. Command reported a big jump in Communist dead, from 143 the week before to 1,822. The South Vietnamese government reported 213 of its troops killed last week, 236 wounded and 14 missing, compared with 215 killed, 496

JACKSONVILLE (AP)—There will be no checks for the 250,000 people on Florida welfare rolls until the Legislature and the governor agree on a state spending bill.

This was the word today from the State Welfare Department.

The U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare has notified the state agency that no federal funds will be available to help Florida pay old age pensions and other welfare checks until a state matching funds agreement is available.

Howard Croom, assistant state welfare director for administration, said in Jacksonville that the federal notification came in a telephone call from Washington.

Croom said he was told no federal welfare money will be forthcoming "until we can give assurance in writing that matching (state) funds have been appropriated and are available."

South of Quantico, Va., in neighboring Binh Dinh Province, a company from the 1st Cavalry Airborne Division ran into an estimated battalion of Communist troops, perhaps 200 to 400 men, in well fortified positions.

Two other companies were rushed in while jet bombers and artillery pounded the Communist positions. The U. S. infantrymen reported 73 Communist troops killed in the day-long battle, while American casualties were six dead, 22 wounded and four missing.

The aircraft carrier Intrepid, one of the last ships to pass through the Suez Canal before the Middle East war closed it, returned to the Vietnam war in its planes attacked a rail yard 28 miles southwest of Thanh Hoa.

Kirk's Budget Up For OK

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Gov. Claude Kirk's original budget proposal of \$1.538 billion is in final passage in the House today—ironically with Republicans charging that Democrats are attempting to "railroad" it through.

Also expected to be acted on is a supplemental spending bill of \$188 million the difference between the GOP governor's original bill and the one he vetoed.

Democrats intend to "put him on the spot" by forcing him to specifically veto down the usual money for teachers and junior colleges.

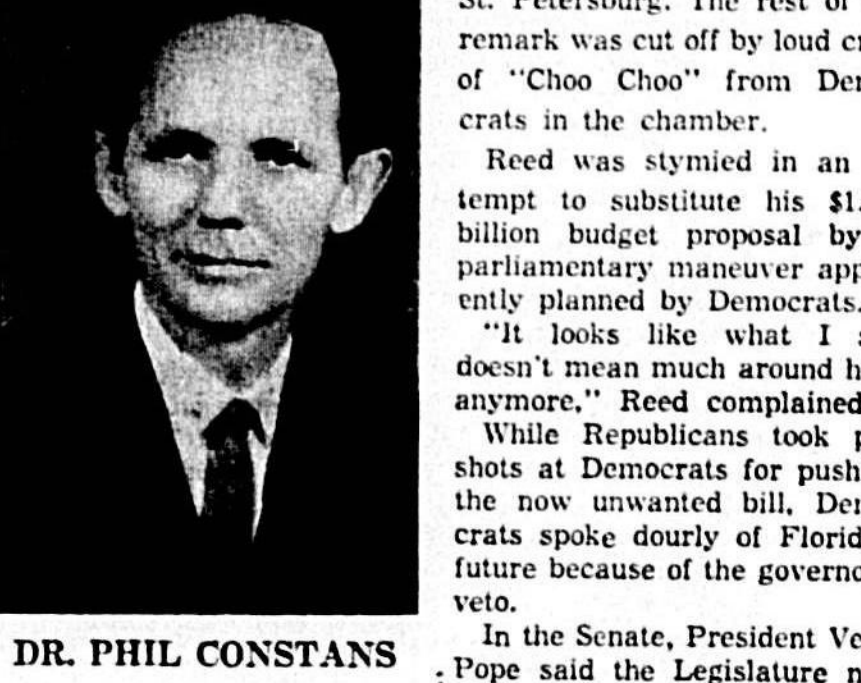
In the face of Kirk's veto of the Democratic-backed \$1.538 billion general spending bill, the Democratic leadership Wednesday moved Kirk's budget message proposal quickly through the appropriations committee, rules committee and to third reading on the floor before any Republicans managed to halt it.

"New information," claimed House Minority Leader Rep. Donald Reed, has developed Republican and presumably gubernatorial, backing for a \$1.377 billion appropriations bill, some \$39 million higher than the original.

Reed said Republicans wanted to give the junior college system an additional \$21 million, another \$50 on quarter tuition to finance it, \$6 million to raise the salaries of aides at state institutions, \$2 million for the Board of Forestry, \$3 million for construction additions, and \$1 million in extra money for the Little Dixie Store located on the corner of SR 427 and SR 426 earlier in the week for the second time in less than two months. At the same time the offices of the local constable and justice of the peace were also broken into and looted.

In other police business, Democratic leaders blasted the Republican position.

Just before the futile attempt to override Kirk's veto, Rep. Fred Schultz, D-Jacksonville, warned of an "agitating sumner" served at a state police chief of the City of Longwood.

Teachers Brand Kirk 'Showman'

(This is the second of three articles on sanctions involved by the National Education Association and the Florida Education Association against Florida.)

Florida legislators pay a state base under public school financing in 1967 by establishing the Minimum Fundation Program.

It was updated in 1965, but the rapid growth of population has out-distanced support for education to such an extent that the entire state has come under sanctions by the National Education Association and the Florida Education Association.

Florida's Minimum Foundation School Law established the principle that the state should share with the 67 counties in paying for public education.

The state pays a minimum amount for each instructional unit, each construction unit and each new building or major addition, based on a variety of formulae. Each county must contribute 25 per cent or more of the cost of its schools.

The state has set a minimum salary of \$4,000 for teachers on a continuing contract (tenure) and \$3,000 for those with 10 years or more of efficient service.

Teachers are asking \$1,800 increases.

They say they have been put off too many times during the build up toward sanctions.

The 1965 Legislature temporarily reduced the claim for substantial teacher pay raises and other educational improvements by promising that 1967 would be the "taxing session for education."

"I have never seen a railroad train coming down the track..." protested Rep. Ray Osborne, R-St. Petersburg. The rest of his remark was cut off by loud cries of "Choo Choo" from Democrats in the chamber.

Reed was timid in an attempt to substitute his \$1.377 billion budget proposal by a parliamentary maneuver apparently favored by Democrats.

"It looks like what I say doesn't mean much around here anymore," Reed complained.

While Republicans took potshots at Democrats for pushing the now unwanted bill, Democrats spoke daily of Florida's future because of the governor's veto.

In the Senate, President Verle Pope said the Legislature now has no alternative but to pass a bill based on the governor's recommendation.

It requires that all plans for medical assistance be subject to Budget Commission approval and creates a medical assistance advisory committee appointed by the governor.

The bill becomes effective Jan. 1, 1968.

Fisher, who sought to pass this date back, as did fellow physician Sen. David Lane, R-Port Lauderdale, contended that Florida would be faced with what he termed a "migration" of indigents from other southern states if it became the first state to implement the program—which provides federal matching funds to state appropriations.

"This is a federal law and as such there is no residency requirement. This is going to cause a migration of indigents to Florida. I don't want to make the gold rush of 1849 look small by comparison," said Fisher.

Chances of the bill even reaching Kirk are uncertain. A similar measure has already been beaten in the House.

State Medicaid Faces Veto, Senator Avers

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A senator-physician says that Democratic Gov. Claude Kirk has a "political football" out of the \$44 million Medicaid bill approved by the Senate Wednesday and that it faces a sure gubernatorial veto.

"They're kicking it down to the governor's office and he's going to kick it right back," said Sen. John Fisher, R-Jacksonville.

Fisher said the bill became a "political football" when Democrats lost out on efforts to delay the effective date of the bill and time for appropriation of the funds for one year.

Had the appropriation been delayed the bill might be acceptable to Gov. Claude Kirk, Fisher said in an interview.

The measure, approved 33-10 after a two-day struggle, provides for a state plan of medical assistance for certain low-income persons and others required or permitted by the federal Social Security Act, to be administered by the State Department of Public Welfare.

Johnson, Kosygin Keep World Puzzled

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—France does not consider an U.N. debate on the Middle East today as President Johnson and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin kept the world wondering whether they would meet during the Soviet leader's brief visit to the United States.

French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville's speech to the U.N. General Assembly was expected to expand on a statement by President Charles de Gaulle Wednesday which paraded out support to both sides in the Arab-Israeli dispute.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko discussed summit possibilities at a three-hour dinner meeting at Rusk's Waldorf Tower suite Wednesday night. But they left the final decision to their chiefs.

Gromyko told newsmen Kosygin would return to Moscow soon but probably not before Friday. Johnson had a full schedule in Washington today and it appeared that if even a brief courtesy meeting was arranged, it would be Friday or during the weekend.

In the General Assembly Wednesday, Israel quickly rejected Britain's warning not to claim all of Jerusalem as a prize of war.

British Foreign Secretary George Brown declared Israel would isolate itself from world opinion if it held onto Old Jerusalem wrested from Jordan. Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban replied that his government had expressed determination to see that Jerusalem would never again become a divided city and a war arena.

The Need For Helmets

There was a lot of talk around Sanford a few months ago about the City Commission adopting an ordinance requiring all "cycle" riders wear a safety helmet.

What happened to it?

A safety helmet law would apply to all riders of motorbikes, motor scooters (a 15-year-old boy was killed in Sanford a few weeks ago... he might have been saved with a helmet) and motorcycles (passengers included).

Head injuries are far too common in cycle accidents and these safety or crash helmets would afford needed protection from skull fractures and other like injuries in the event of a fall or when struck by another vehicle.

This law if passed would have "teeth" in it and we trust all parents will see to it that their sons or daughters have on a helmet every time they climb onto a motor propelled bike, rather than onto a moped to accompany them to court on a violation charge.

Possibly some don't see the need for this law to apply to motorbikes... but the need exists whether they see it or not... and all should be thankful for the passage of such a law.

This should not be just another law on the books of Sanford... if it is passed... it must be enforced, for your own safety and protection and it will just that, as has been proven time and time again.

Thinking About The Fourth

As we approach July 4, people throughout the world will reflect on the significance of that date in the history of this nation: you, and of the world. For in the birth of this nation was also born a freshly stated concept that stressed the dignity and the importance of the individual in all phases of life, but particularly in 1776 in his political relation to this new domestic nation.

History has watched the growing strength of these United States and their influence on the world. People and their governments around the globe have sought our help in a variety of factors that influenced their destiny at home or their relations with other social, economic or political groups.

This growing respect for an increasingly powerful nation stemmed from many sources. But the system of "checks and balances" set up between the legislative, executive and judiciary in the constitution that philosophically came after the Declaration of Independence brought confidence in our system of laws.

In recent decades there has been a transition in the operation of this basic American principle of government.

Law, it has been said, is being made not only in the legislative halls, but in the other two branches of government as well. And from this has sprung unrest, indecision and in some cases actual flouting of the laws. Rightfully so, staunch Americans have called for a return to the personal respect for "the law of the land." However, it is well to bear in mind that regulatory provisions, in effect, are the law of the land and should be respected as such so long as they exist. Any group's failure to do this can quickly erode predictable dis-

order, but the seriousness of which is unpredictable.

Supreme Court Justice Charles E. Whitaker recently emphasized the essential upholding of law. He said, "No disorderly society in all recorded history ever has survived. The paths of history are strewn with the bones of fallen societies."

"Some of them," he continues, "were once as great, in many ways, as ours is now. That history also shows that, in each of the first centuries of recorded history, a society's decay appeared in its toleration of disrespect for and violation of its laws. There is no good reason to believe that similar tolerations will serve us differently."

On Law Day, May 1, this year President Johnson asserted anew the American concept of lawfulness and pleaded for respect not only of our laws, but of the officers whose responsibility it is to uphold and enforce them.

"Respect for law is the central idea of American democracy... I ask every American to take the law into his heart—not into his hands... America's fidelity to law must be eternal," he said.

We proudly honor the birth of this nation on July 4 and pay fitting tribute to those patriots that so boldly fathered it. Let us also bear in mind that the same staunch love of country now is demanded of each of us. We must work equally as fervently to uphold the laws upon which our liberty—the freedom we reverse so much—is established.

May this anniversary of our declaration of independence truly be a glorious law-abiding, law-supporting, American Fourth of July.

GOP Leaders Eye Top Jobs

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Republican legislative leaders are planning, with some confidence, for a course to take over the 1968 Senate presidency and House speakership.

Senate Minority Leader C. W. Bill Young of Pinellas Park and House Minority Leader Donald Reed of Boca Raton, hopeful of big election gains in 1968, have asked their colleagues to stay uncommitted.

Republicans now have 20 of 48 Senate seats and 39 of 119 House seats.

Reed, 34, said he does not aspire to the House speakership, but concedes he would "seriously consider" seeking it should the party lineup change dramatically.

Young, 36, says "most of the Republicans have suggested I should begin to get things lined up."

Reed said he has "no doubt" that the GOP would hand leadership in the House.

House Republicans, he said, "collectively made a decision" not to pledge their votes to any speaker candidates until after the 1968 elections.

In the Senate, said Young, the Democrat who appears to have things wrapped up for the 1969 presidency, John E. Mathews of Jacksonville, has agreed to release any GOP pledges should Republicans gain a majority.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — general Russian military help but perhaps planes, pilots, technicians thrown in by the Arab side.
