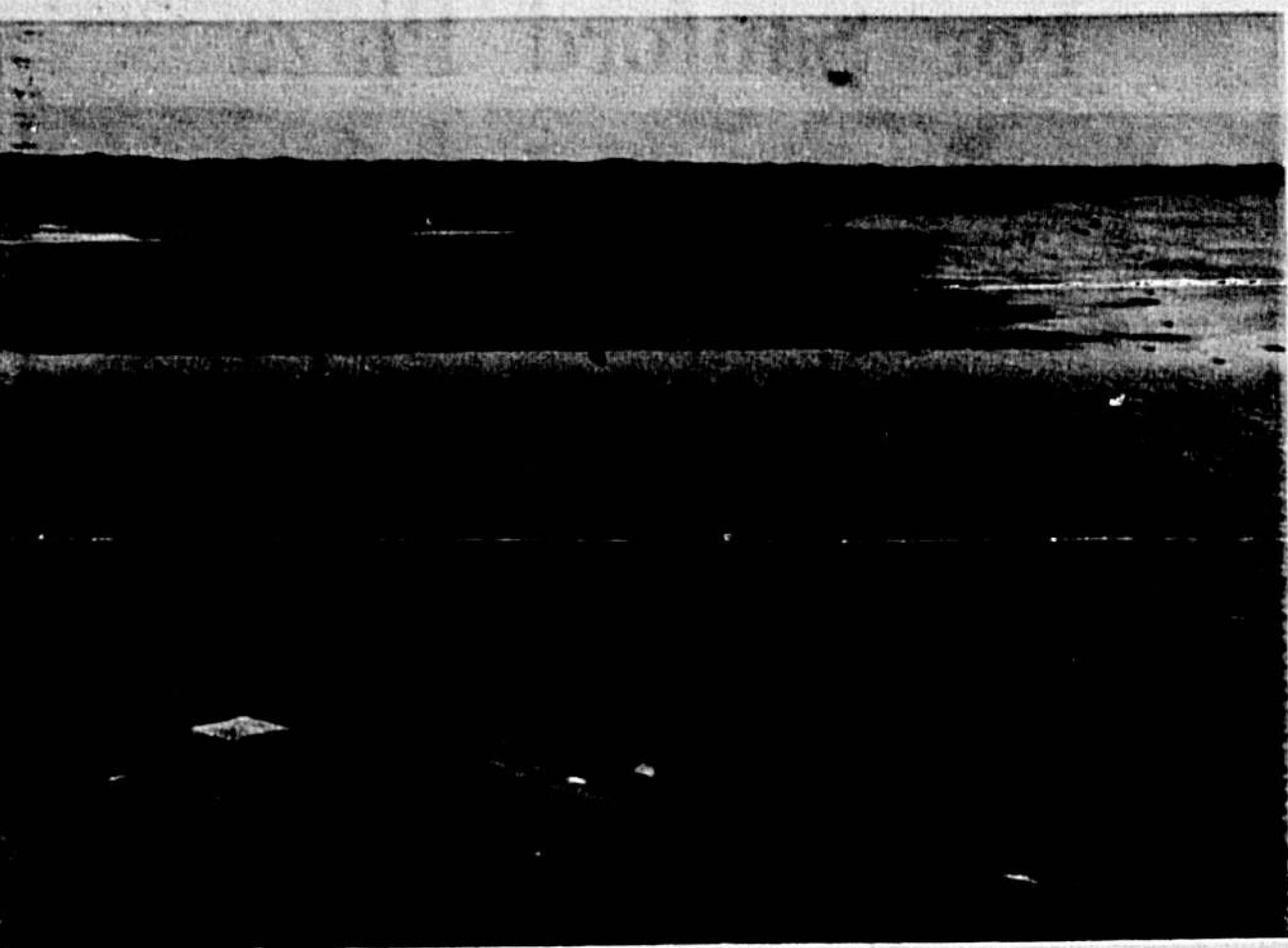

MIAMI (AP)—After a two-month drought that killed animals and greenery and led to the burning of more than 100,000 acres of forest, South Florida received torrents of rain Wednesday.

And now there are complaints about the rain.

The dried Everglades National Park, South Miami and Coral Gables received more than four inches of rain. Fort Lauderdale, Key West, Pompano Beach, West Palm Beach and Fort Myers all drew measurable rain by 7 p.m. but less than one inch.

"I think you can say that the drought is over," said U.S. weather forecaster Joe Pelissero. "We shouldn't go back to a dry pattern but it will probably be clear for a day or so. We should be getting some more rain sometime next week."

While fire watchers took their first rest in weeks, emergency electric crews rushed to restore power in black out sections, phone companies patched scrambled lines and police began untangling dozens of accidents caused by slippery streets.

Everglades Park rangers said the four inches in the National Park eased the fire hazard but was not enough water to replenish dried-out waterholes for birds and animals. The drought killed thousands of fish in the Everglades, robbing food from all the wildlife except the buzzards.

The rains came after Governor Claude Kirk and Agriculture Commissioner D. Kyle Connor surveyed a drought-battered rangeland on horseback and announced an emergency program to save starving herds.

Kirk—who wore a bright Seminoles jacket—said he immediately petitioned the federal government to release at least \$50,000 to buy water in pastures which he had dried out.

"They're putting \$5 billion dollars into the poverty program," Kirk said. "We need \$50,000 right now."

Kirk asked private industry to pitch in and dig the holes where they were needed. "Feed we can get," Kirk said. "Water is the problem for us."

Connor said half of Lee County's feed grass was so starved for water that even the 39 inch of rain which fell Wednesday night wouldn't help.

Throughout the day the drought seemed ended—at least for the state's southern tip—representatives of state and federal agricultural agencies met in the State Capitol building to plan ways to combat effects of the drought.

Solons Support Newspaper Advertising

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A legislative amendment to sharply restrict newspaper liquor advertisements was beaten 6-3 today as a Senate committee moved final vote on bills to help Florida's small, independent liquor dealers.

The news paper advertising proposal was defeated when a majority of the members of the Senate Ethics and Privileges Committee voted to support the measure.

The bill restricts the number of liquor licenses one person or corporation could hold to 25 state-wide and to 10 in a single county.

Highest Award Granted By Jury

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—A 124-year-old former mortgage company executive has been awarded \$1.5 million for injuries suffered when a paroled felon on his car, leaving him paralyzed from the neck down.

The judgment for Timothy M. Bieak, a bachelor who had been assistant vice president of Pacific Western Mortgage Co., was believed to be the highest ever awarded in a personal injury suit.

Bieak, who lives now with his wife, Lady Sylvia Douglas, the former wife of Douglas Fairbanks Sr. and Clark Gable, had asked for \$1 million in general damages and \$60,000 medical expenses. A jury returned with the highest verdict.

Defendants were the city of Beverly Hills and builder Herbert A. Kronish and his wife. Hazel City Atty. Allen Grimes said he will recommend that the city appeal the verdict.

Home For Aged Bill Watered By Solons

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A weakened bill to remove the tax-exempt status of homes for the aged was approved by the Senate Finance and Taxation Committee Wednesday after weeks of deliberation.

Instead of a frontal attack, the committee decided to toss the issue to county tax assessors.

"We will determine whether retirement homes should pay taxes under the revised bill," Sen. Harold Wilson, R-Clearwater, sponsor of the bill, said. "The committee avoided the issue with its substitute proposal and maintained that exemptions for such homes is bad."

"The point we've got to face is whether these people who are admittedly able to pay their taxes are going to or not because they are gathered into non-profit organizations," he said.

Wilson said he had letters from tax assessors complaining that luxury retirement homes charge high rents and founders fees, yet pay no taxes.

The weak bill amendment was offered by Sen. Lee Weisenborn, D-Miami.

Air Line Covers Cost Of Opera

NEW YORK (AP)—Eastern Air Lines has promised the Metropolitan Opera \$500,000 to cover the cost of a new production of Wagner's dramatic four-opera cycle "Der Ring des Nibelungen."

"We feel we owe something to the communities we serve and to the support of the arts," the opera's president, Floyd D. Hall, said Wednesday in announcing "the largest single ongoing commitment" his company has made to a non-business cause.

The Met last put on one of the operas in 1962 with sets and costumes designed in 1948. The "Ring" operas are seldom performed in this country because they require strong voices, large casts and normally elaborate sets and costumes.

Herald Ring, general manager of the Met, hailed the gift as perhaps ushering in increased corporate support of the arts.

The operas "Das Walkure," "Das Rheingold," "Siegfried" and "Gotterdammerung" will be introduced one at a time in the next four seasons, so that by 1970-71 the Met will have the complete cycle.

Red Envoy Defects To U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Mystery surrounded the whereabouts today and motives of the highest-ranking Communist diplomat ever to defect in the United States.

State Department officials said James Radvanyi, Hungarian charge d'affaires who sought and promptly received refuge here, has asked that his decision be attributed to personal reasons.

But the State Department refused to go into any further detail at this time, meaning where he is or when he may give out his story.

In a brief, dramatic announcement Wednesday afternoon, Robert J. McCloskey, press officer, said Radvanyi, the top diplomat at the Hungarian Embassy here, had been offered a letter of resignation.

The envoy, 45, thus became the first chief of a Communist diplomatic mission in Washington to defect. He had been slated Tuesday night that he wants to live in America permanently and is sending his government a letter of resignation.

His position will, of course, be in accord with the American tradition of extending refuge to those who seek it," McCloskey said.

Also granted asylum were Radvanyi's wife and their son, who has been attending a District of Columbia public high school. A married daughter lives in Hungary.

Informed sources suggested that besides any personal motives, Radvanyi had become fed up with Communist rule and the loss of his family in Hungary.

Appropriations Bill Presented To House

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—The House's \$1.223 billion main appropriations bill (H.R. 100) was introduced today after six weeks of committee work.

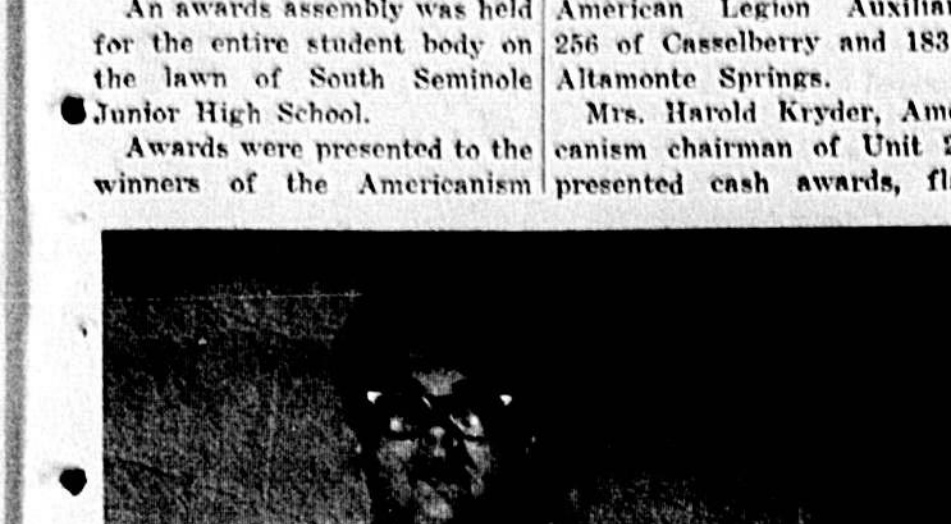

Israelis Counter Egyptians

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP)—The Israeli army announced today that it has taken "suitable steps" to counter the movement of Egyptian troops into the Sinai Desert on Israel's southern border.

An Israeli army spokesman announced: "Following the move of considerable Egyptian army forces into the Sinai peninsula, which has increased tension in the area, the Israeli army has taken suitable steps."

The spokesman did not elaborate, and no further information was immediately available. But it was assumed that Israeli forces had reinforced the southern frontier.

Israelis in general remained calm in Syria and the United Arab Republic moved troops up to the borders in preparation for the Israeli attack they claim is coming.

"Why should we get excited?" asked one Israeli taxi driver. "It has happened dozens of times."

Israeli leaders were watching developments closely, but the Jewish community believes the troop movements are merely for Arab propaganda. The Israelis doubt that Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser, with 50,000 of his frontline troops tied down in Yemen, is ready for a second front.

Except for its western border on the Mediterranean, Israel is surrounded by Arab nations—Lebanon on the north, Syria on the northeast, Jordan on the east and the United Arab Republic on the southwest.

Jordan said Wednesday its armed forces have been put in state of alert and Lebanon's foreign minister, George Bakim, said his country stood by Syria against any Israeli aggression. He said it was the United Nations' responsibility to stop such an attack.

Other Arab countries also have declared their support for Syria, and Iraq said it was prepared to extend every possible assistance.

In no Arab capital, though, has there been official urging for an aggressive war against Israel. The implication has been that Israel would have to strike first.

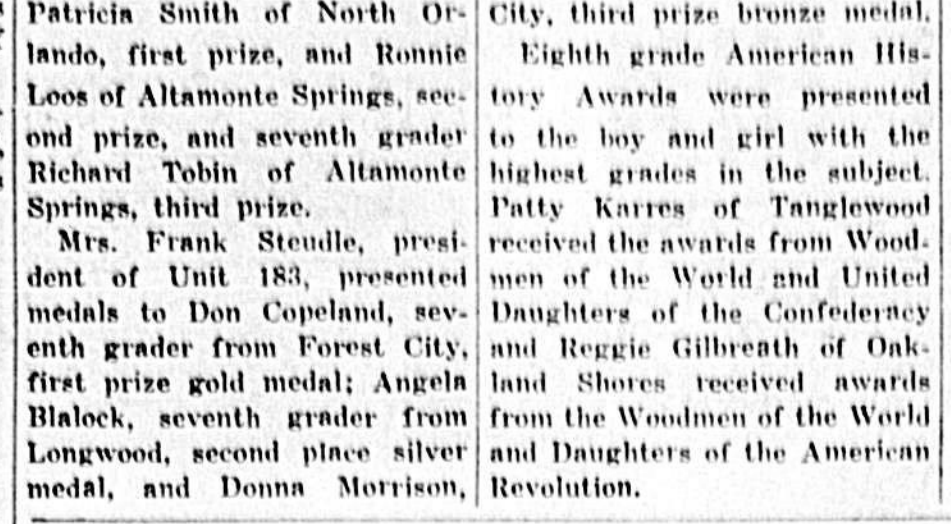

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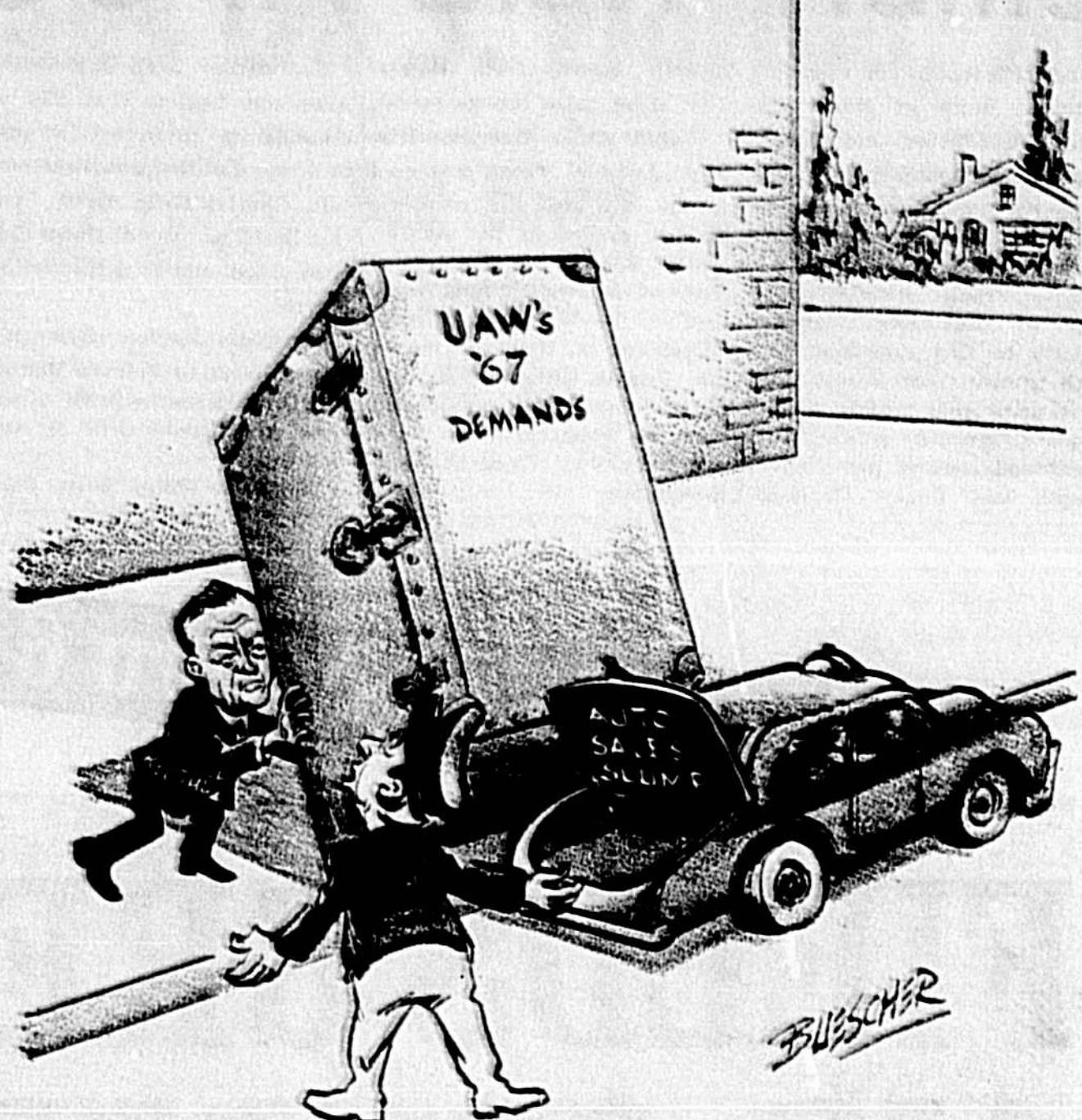

Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — This is going to be a hard year to remember, unless something happens before the end of it.

The war has been pretty much like last year's war: it has not steadily moved slowly and Congress has been busy dawdling instead of doing it's been talking about it.

President Johnson has been photographed shaking hands, or talking to the press, or walking to a plane. But he has said extraordinarily little for a President in wartime, particularly with the war being criticized so much.

And there hasn't been one truly colorful or distracting character in government or politics. There has been one to compare with the attention a Barry Goldwater or a Sen. Joseph McCarthy got, in fervor or hostility before they start since the kind of appeal is getting shown before they start. And reason, is something that depends on who's doing the talking.

Hal Boyle Says:

NEW YORK (AP) — One of the chief sources of man's greatness is his ability to share his memories.

Search Ending For Missing Hannibal Boys

HANNIBAL, Mo. (AP) — With clues in the whereabouts of three missing boys in Hannibal exhausted and hope for their safe return almost nonexistent, searchers have virtually discontinued their efforts.

A final effort to find Billy Hoek, 11, Joey Hoek, 13, and Craig Dowell, 14, proved less than a massive power shovel stripped tons of earth and stone from the road bed of U.S. 8 with no results.

Mayor Harry Musgrave admitted after the excavation, "We have to announce that all leads have been exhausted." Rescue workers from all over the nation poured through the site, hoping to find the boys, missing since the evening of May 10.

The youths were seen entering Murphy's Cave. Another report had them spotted in an area known as "Lover's Leap." Throughout the search there was speculation that the boys might have entered some hole later covered up by construction work on the highway.

With the operation moving into its second week, rescue workers began drifting away. Leaders announced that only a token crew would remain after today.

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — A committee also approved the negotiation bill for teachers after refusing a motion to put off final action on the bill and after defeating a recommendation to require a certain percentage of the teachers to belong to the organization before the negotiation.

Rep. Phil Ashler (D-Pennsylvania) said he couldn't go along with requiring the school boards to negotiate with the organization's attorney.

Following the meeting, FEA President George Dubs, of Altamonte Springs, said he had "no comment" on the request for the film and would wait until after he could talk with the organization's attorney.

The committee also approved a bill supported by the FEA which would require county school boards to negotiate with groups representing teachers and school administrators.

"I think the honor of a member of this committee is at stake," said Rep. Robert Mann, speaking of Republican William Pierce, of St. Petersburg. Earlier this week, Pierce told House members that the film was strongly emotional.

FEA associate executive secretary Phil Constantis replied in statement saying that Pierce's comments were insulting and ridiculous.

"It is regrettable," Constantis said, "that some members of the Legislature would use a film of me as an excuse to vilify teachers."

Rep. Richard Pettigrew said he didn't see any relationship between Pierce's education and the work of the education committee.

Red Rockets Kill 11 GIs

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Marines moved out in search of the North Vietnamese below the demilitarized zone again today after another night of deadly bombardment that killed 11 Americans and wounded 41.

For an hour before dawn Communist guns, mortars and rockets rained more than 300 rounds on Dong Ha, Gio Linh, Camp Carroll and Cam Lu, four of the Marine outposts just below the division between North and South Vietnam.

At dawn Marine companies struck out from the nearby post at Con Thien in a new attempt to hunt down the Red forces that have been battling in the northernmost part of South Vietnam for weeks. There was confusion that the North Vietnamese were preparing for some dramatic show of force in honor of the Old Man's 7th birthday Friday, and the Marines were determined to blunt any such attack.

The heavy night shelling and hard fighting in the Marine sector was reflected in weekly casualty figures announced today. The U.S. Command said 253 Americans and 1,941 enemy were killed last week. The American toll was slightly less than the 274 killed the week before, a record for the year. The enemy toll, while no record, was slightly more than the 1,983 the previous week.

The heaviest damage came from big 160 mm rockets, one of the heaviest weapons in the Communist arsenal. The Reds unleashed 150 these rockets on the 3d Marine Division base at Dong Ha.

Although the daily damage was limited to minor damage to the camp, Air Correspondent George Esper, who was injured when he dove for cover during the shelling, said the command post at the center of the camp was burning furiously after the shelling. One shell hit the quarters of Brig. Gen. Ike Ryan, the assistant division commander, but he was otherwise unharmed.

Throughout the shelling, American artillery pieces and mortars continually hurled counter fire at the Red guns, and deep into jungle lairs to the north.

U.S. warplanes were also in force blasting Red artillery positions in the buffer zone to the north. Pilots reported downing one of the Red guns and 11 anti-aircraft batteries inside the demilitarized zone or just north of it.

B52s struck at suspected enemy concentrations southwest of Con Thien and about 40 miles north of the demilitarized zone. For the seventh day the bombers struck at the Red gun positions, possibly because of reports that the North Vietnamese are moving surface-to-air missiles toward the area.

Emphasizing the threat from the 35,000 or more North Vietnamese troops reported manning the northern area of South Vietnam, U. S. headquarters said almost all of the 137 missiles flown against North Vietnam Wednesday were directed against the targets in the southern panhandle just above the demilitarized zone.

An exception was a night attack on a rail yard 103 miles up the Red River from Hanoi.

"Teller" Father Bernstein set the sequence camera in motion when the man stepped to her counter with a manila envelope bearing the scrawled words: "Money on your head." There has been at least one prior joltup in the Miami area with the same telling camera.

The FBI distributed the hand's picture Wednesday night.

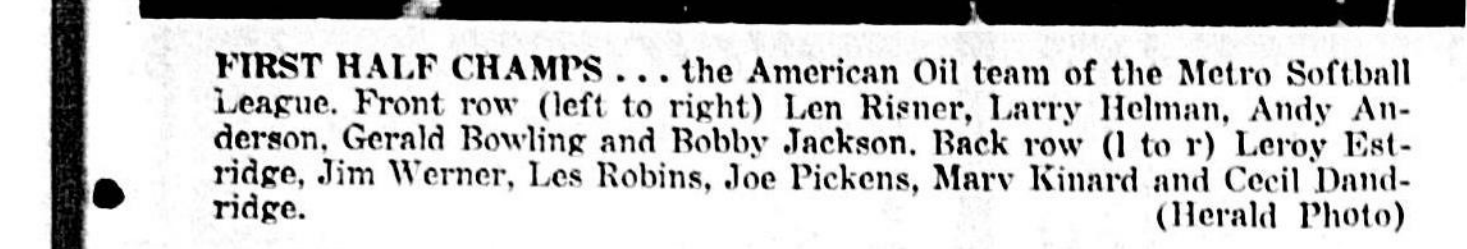

1 cup oats (quick or old-fashioned), uncooked, 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted, 1/4 cup flour, 1/4 cup packed brown sugar.

Filling: 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 1/2 cup sifted flour, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1/2 tsp. vanilla, 1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped.

For crust, heat oats in shallow baking pan in preheated oven at 350 degrees for about 12 minutes. Combine oats and brown sugar. Add butter, mix well. Press firmly onto bottom and sides of 8 inch pie plate. Chill.

For filling, combine brown sugar, flour, salt and milk in saucepan. Cook over medium heat until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Stir in butter and vanilla. Place in medium sized bowl, cover with wax paper. Refrigerate 1 hour or until cold. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into pie shell. Chill until set. For topping, whip 1/2 cup whipping cream. Decorate pie with dollops of whipped cream and pecan halves. Makes 8 inch pie.

Here's a method for preparing dried chestnuts that some cooks like: Add a quarter teaspoon of baking soda to a pound of chestnuts and cover with boiling water; let stand overnight. Next day, boil the chestnuts in 1 1/2 water in which they were soaked until they are tender.

Housewife's Worth Fixed At \$8,300

CHRISTOPHER MINICLER, NEW YORK (AP) — What is a wife worth?

She is priceless," many a happily married man might respond.

A survey released Tuesday attempts to be a bit more exact. If your wife is an average housewife she is worth \$8,300 a year, based on a wage survey of 12 occupational roles she fulfills.

An awesome thing for her to keep in mind when she asks for a new fur coat.

However, if her husband is an ambassador she is worth more because she works longer hours or fulfills more roles, but because the extra job she does assume pays more.

These conclusions are drawn in an article appearing in the first edition of *Envy*, a new monthly magazine published in New York for the diplomatic and consular community.

Envy related the role of Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. economist, the Chase Manhattan Bank, and the Restaurant & Hotelmen's Agency to compile a table of hours worked in different tasks and wages which would be paid for these tasks.

The average American housewife served 44.5 hours a week as a nursemaid, 12.1 hours a week as a cook, 12.5 hours as a housekeeper and lesser periods as a dietitian, food buyer, dishwasher, laundress, seamstress, practical nurse, maintenance man, gardener and chauffeur. The study said.

Her highest salaried roles are dietitian, seamstress and cook at \$2.10 an hour. Even in the worst of times she works only 1.6 hours a week at these tasks. Her major role is nursemaid, 44.5 hours out of a 99-hour work week, pays only \$1.25 an hour.

The survey concluded that a housewife does not serve as a compensable housewife.

Turning to the ambassador's wife, the survey deleted the rules of dishwasher, laundress, seamstress, maintenance man, gardener and chauffeur—on the theory the ambassador's wife would have domestic help. It was assumed she would do a substantial amount of entertaining—rated at 12 hours a week at \$3.57 an hour for a hostess.

The survey concluded that the ambassador's wife worked only 92.2 hours a week, but earned \$6,700 a year, thanks largely to her hostess role.

The least-valued woman in the survey was the diplomatic attaché's wife. Assigned a hostess salary of only \$2.15 an hour and deprived of the payrolls of dishwasher, laundress and seamstress, she would earn only \$8,000 a year for 94.5 hours a week.

The survey noted that education, common sense, and discretion were among the less financially measurable, but vital attributes of any wife.
