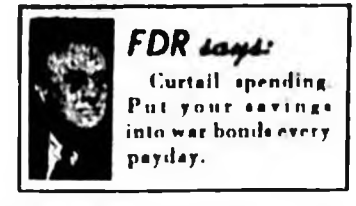

Allied Heads May Name New Commanders

General Eisenhower Is Mentioned As Leader For New European Offensive This Fall

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. (AP)—The prospect of new Allied offensives in northern Europe and southern Asia in the next few weeks apparently poses for President Roosevelt and Winston Churchill the problem of selecting some new commanders at the Quebec conference.

Most important is that of the commander-in-chief of the European theater because of its direct bearing on the drive for final victory in Europe.

Next is the commander of the forces which—probably this fall—will have the task of reconquering Burma from the Japanese.

Possible European commanders are: Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, Eisenhower's deputy, Gen. Sir Bernard Montgomery, chief of the British forces in Africa and Sicily, Lieut. Gen. Joseph Stilwell, who has been mentioned to head the Burma campaign.

Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt will meet in Quebec later on for concentrated war discussions and a meeting of British-American chiefs of staff.

Churchill left here late Wednesday night and showed up this morning at Blair House. He was viewed the scenic splendors of the giant tatarus on the Chesapeake Bay.

Lawton Reveals Mann Suggests Schools To Open County Survey On Curing Of Meat

1943-44 School Budget Is Approved By Local School Board

Schools of Seminole County will open on Wednesday, Sept. 8, instead of Sept. 7, it was announced today by Supt. T.W. Lawton, following a meeting Wednesday of the County Board of Public Instruction. Teachers will be on hand at the schools, Thursday and Friday, Sept. 2 and 3, in order to enroll new children and answer questions, Mr. Lawton said.

The annual school report for the fiscal year, July 1, 1942 through June 30, 1943, was made at the meeting and the school budget for 1943-44 adopted.

An increase of 1% mill levy for the general school fund has been necessitated in order to increase salaries of teachers, bus drivers and school janitors, which increases were brought in public attention at a meeting held July 24, which was attended by citizens and school officials, Mr. Lawton stated.

The Board of Public Instruction had hoped that this increase in school millage would be limited to one-half mill, but the County Commission has voted three.

U. S. Is Seen As Leader In Foreign Trade

Shipbuilding Program Plus Airplane Superiority Aids Post-War Trade Planning

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. (AP)—Rear Admiral Howard I. Vickery last night pictured a post-war America as queen of the foreign trade routes through a gigantic shipbuilding program completely dominated by United States controlled airplanes.

The soft spoken vice chairman of the United States Maritime Commission, who also is chairman of the commission's post-war planning committee, outlined a program of shipbuilding and ship reconstruction designed to place this country into the front rank of world commerce.

Asserting the post-war planning of the Maritime Commission is not just an overnight development and visionary effort, Vickery emphasized.

There is no cause for worry on the part of the American people about sending 150 to 200 Liberty ships to England, he said. The United States must begin now to get her merchant ships back on the trade routes.

Air transportation, both freight and passenger, must be coordinated with water routes under one jurisdictional head.

The United States will have the largest fleet of fast shipping vessels in the world when hostilities cease.

Organization efforts within the Maritime Commission and War Shipping Administration will serve to avoid the pitfalls of 1918-1919 in the transition from war shipping to peace-time merchant marine.

Rome Is Again Attacked By U. S. Bombers

Nazis Driven Back In Sicily As Two More Towns Are Taken; Kharkov Fall Near

Massed fleets of American bombers attacked Rome again today on the heels of the RAF's mightiest raid on northern Italy in twin blows to knock that country out of the war.

In Sicily Allied troops battered back rear guards on all sectors with two towns falling to the Americans in the north and fierce naval bombardments pounded enemy defenses protecting the steady Nazi evacuation of the bomb and shell wrecked island.

The number of bombers over Rome is said to equal those that raided the Italian capital on July 19 when 600 heavy bombers and 200 fighters took part. So far as is known no statement of explanation was radiated the Italian people this time.

Rome also was struck last night as knockout aerial blows were aimed at the Axis. In Russia the Soviets closed the trap tighter on Kharkov with its fall inevitable and drove down toward Bryansk.

North Africa, Aug. 13. (AP)—German remnants were reported evacuating Sicily, Aug. 12, after American amphibious forces cut off their northern anchor at Cape Orlando and trapped a large number of rear guard forces in an eight mile outflanking movement by sea.

Rudely showing aside Italian troops, the Germans are getting off the island at about 1000 noon a day, front dispatches said, using heavily armed ferries, barbed and landing craft.

Most of the escape traffic was reported steaming across the narrow Sicilian straits where about 80 craft were snatching equipment, protected by a force of anti-aircraft fire sent up from both the Sicilian and Italian shores.

Some 750 longer routes were being used to transport supplies to the north coast to beaches on the top of the toe of Italy and their only protection from over-the-sea attacking Allied planes was dispersal and camouflage tactics. (Continued on page three)

Hearing To Be Held On Minimum Wage

ATLANTA, Aug. 12. (Special)—A proposed minimum wage of 40 cents an hour in two industries—the meat, poultry and dairy products industry, which employs approximately 400,000 workers, and the fruit and vegetable packing and farm products assembling industry, which employs approximately 200,000 persons, will be considered at public hearings on Aug. 21 and 22 respectively.

This was announced in Atlanta today by James H. Johnson, Regional Director of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Division, U. S. Department of Labor, who added that the hearings will be held in the Division's offices at 165 West 10th Street, New York City on the dates specified, he said.

Fabulous tales of exorbitant profits in the Sanford-Oviedo farming area not only are untrue but may result in irreparable injury to local farmers and business men...

To deny this is not to suggest that our farmers have not enjoyed a successful season. They had it coming to them and with very few exceptions they profited from the prices they received during the past year...

That farmer who is reported to have made a million dollars was probably not a farmer at all but a corporation composed of 15 or 20 farmers. By the time the profits are divided among the group, after payment of income, social security, and all other taxes, the amount each receives is not likely to warrant much comment...

And the fact should not be overlooked that this is the first time in ten years that the farmers have made any money. Year after year and year after year they have mortgaged their farms going more heavily and more heavily into debt each year to plant their fields and to harvest their crops...

But if these stories continue about the millionaires made overnight from the sandy loam of Celery Avenue and the black muck of Oviedo, the government will clamp a price ceiling on celery that will put the farmers right back where they were two or three years ago...

There should be no objection to telling the truth about the Sanford situation, but stories which magnify the profits and ignore the losses are not only misleading but can be very harmful.

That is a powerful indictment made by a woman who confesses to the strong pull of the first fifteen years of her life in the fatherland.

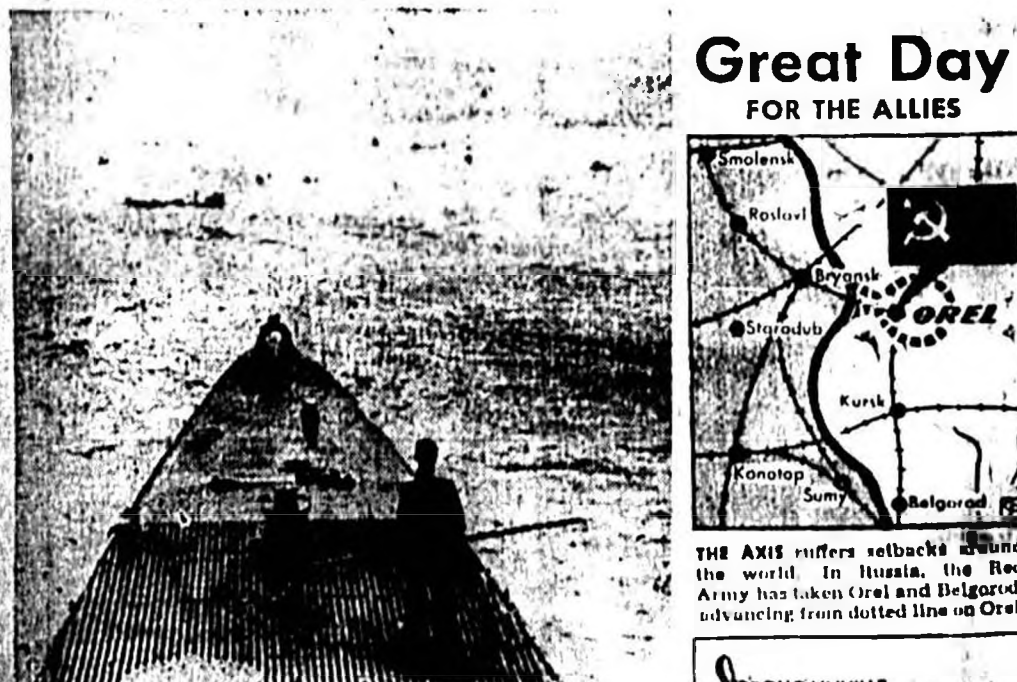

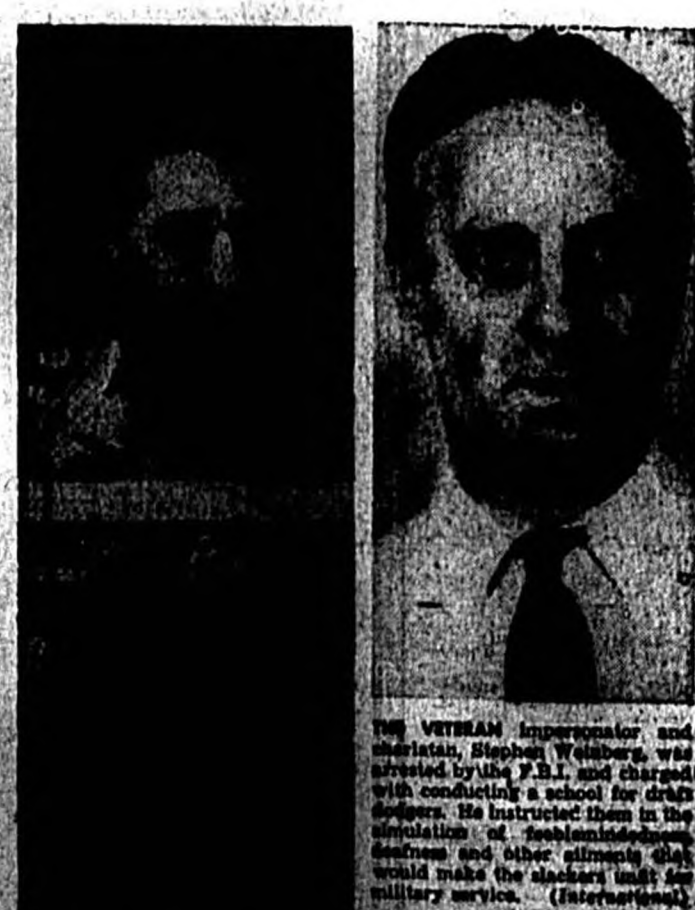

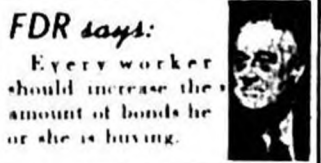
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Visit Is Made By Churchill To Hyde Park

President And Prime Minister Confer 3 Days Preparatory To Quebec Meeting

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16. (AP)—President Roosevelt returned to Washington today after a conference with Prime Minister Churchill and the White House said he would join the war conference in Quebec "this week."

QUEBEC, Aug. 16. (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill was back in Quebec today after a three-day visit with President Roosevelt at Hyde Park and the American Chief Executive is expected here shortly for the opening of their war strategy conference.

Allied military strategy for Europe presumably occupies the top spot among all matters the Allied leaders must examine. Other points apparently slated for consideration include the conduct of the war in the Pacific, and immediate and long range political problems.

President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill conferred for three days at the President's Hyde Park, N. Y., home.

The two Allied leaders issued a joint statement Saturday on results of the anti-submarine campaign against the Axis during the past three months. Churchill signed simply "Roosevelt, Churchill," suggested they had met in advance of their scheduled meeting with Allied staff chiefs in Quebec this week.

No hint was given as to the nature of the talks, but it was believed they gave much time to military or political matters at this early stage.

Churchill's visit to the United States is the first since he became prime minister.

The Prime Minister of Great Britain, with his daughter, has been visiting the President and Mrs. Roosevelt at Hyde Park for three days and has now returned to London.

The President is returning to Washington but he will join the Quebec conference this week. President Roosevelt's daughter, Mrs. Mary, a subsidiary in the British army women's auxiliary, helped to entertain the visit. The visit was said to be the first since Mrs. Churchill, who also accompanied the prime minister to Canada.

Information Sought On Game Reserves
