Lake Mary meets tonight

The Lake Mary City Commission will proclaim the upcoming city election, report on meetings held on the Sanford land use change amendment, hold a second public hearing on amending rules and regulations for the use of city facilities, and discuss two items with regard to Primavera at tonight's city commission meeting.

In a work session prior to the meeting, representatives of Ivey, Harris and Walls, the engineering firm chosen to prepare the Evaluation and Appraisal Report of the city's comprehensive plan, will be present to introduce their firm and orient the commissioners to the task ahead.

The work session begins at 5:30 p.m. and the regular commission meeting begins at 7, or as soon thereafter as possible. Lake Mary City Hall is located at 100 N. Country Club Rd.

Seat belt law has changed

All children under the age of 16 must now wear their seat belts when they are sitting in the back seat of an automobile, due to a change in the Florida Statute that regulates the seat belt law.

"Because dual air bags are becoming a standard feature in many new cars, it's more important now than ever to make sure kids are buckled up in the back seat," said Rena Callahan, manager of Public and Government Regulations for AAA Florida. AAA Florida has been working to promote awareness that the only safe place for children, in cars with dual air bags, is in the back seat. Callahan said that air bags are valuable safety devices but have been blamed for the deaths of more than 30 children, according to National Highway Transportation Safety Administration statistics.

The wearing of seat belts by front-seat passengers became state law in 1986. "This new legislation will help remind parents that it's important to wear your seat belt whether you're sitting up front or in the back seat."

Sanford continues fight against nude clubs

Mayor Larry Dale isn't pleased that Sanford someday could become the future home for adult-entertainment industry - a so-called "combat zone."

More than half of the 22 targeted areas for future adult entertainment businesses made by the Seminole County Planning Department are

in or around Sanford.

Sanford - and the northern portion of the county - happens to meet most of the zoning criteria required for possible expansion of the adult entertainment industry currently centered along U.S. Highway 17-92 in the Fern Park area.

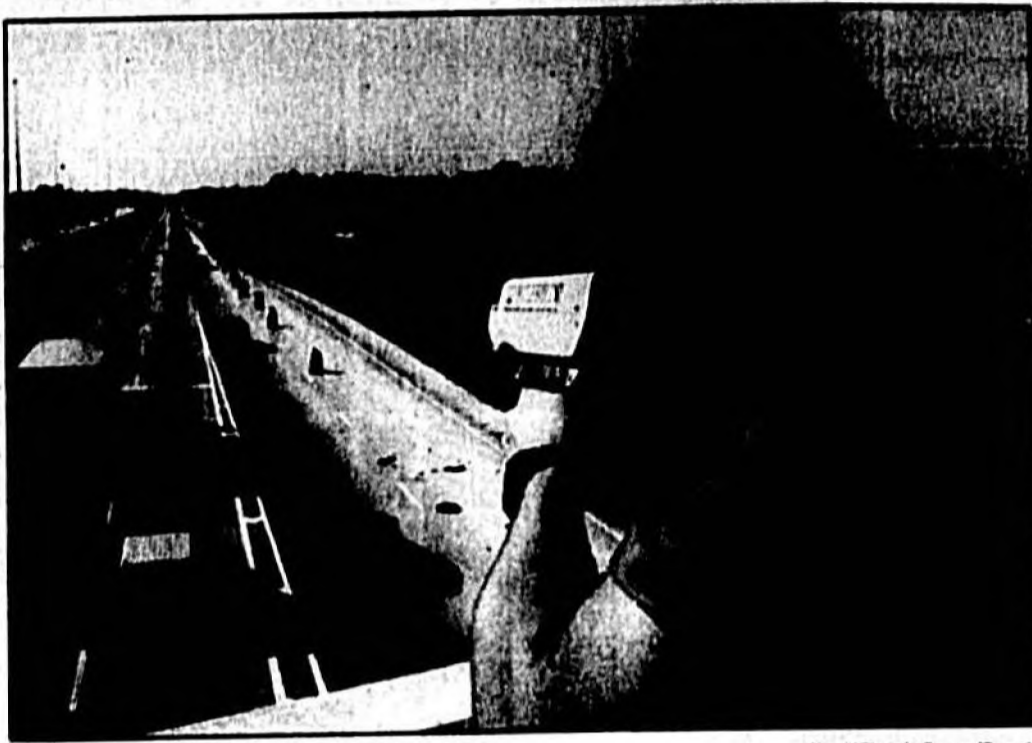
"There's no magnet pulling it to this area - it just happened that many of the sites that met zoning requirements are in the northern part of the county - not exactly in Sanford but a

mile to five miles away," said Seminole County Commission Chairman Randy Morris.

None, he said, have been approved or may be approved by the Board of Commissioners. "They have been identified by our planners, who were directed to do so to meet our legal obligations."

A number of designated sites are near the Orlando-Sanford Airport, off U.S. Road, off State Road 46, and the corner of Celery Ave. See Fight, Page 4A

Crackdown on speeders

Law enforcement agencies from Lake Mary, Sanford, Winter Springs and others combined efforts to crack down on the speeding problem in conjunction with the Interstate 4 construction. Overall, 80 speeding citations were issued in Wednesday's crackdown.

The average speed of drivers in the area ranged between 70 to 80 miles per hour. The posted speed is 55. Fines that were levied were in excess of \$300 in some cases. The operation went from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. There were 20 tickets issued for other violations besides speeding.

Over 40 accidents have taken place in the construction zone on Interstate 4 since August 1996. George Martinez, 28, of See Speeders, Page 4A

Going by the book

Students' recycling efforts to earn money for schools

Seminole County schools will benefit from outdated telephone books.

Under a pilot recycling program, students may turn in the phone books and help their schools earn money between Oct. 20 and Dec. 19. This contest is open to all private and public schools in the county.

"We see this as a great educational experience for students," said Dede Schaffner, coordinator of community involvement. "They will learn about recycling and students will also have the opportunity to hone in on math skills."

The idea for expanded recycling for outdated directories came from school board member Larry Furlong.

Schaffner said she has notified principals in all the schools of the program. Existing bins currently used to collect cardboard will now be used for the phone books, she said. The bins will be emptied three times a week by BPI Waste Systems.

Each student will be given a tally sheet, listing the weight of phone books, which will be counted and weighed and separated into categories of either white pages or yellow pages. Only dry books will be accepted. Another advantage of this expanded recycling program, which is being conducted in cooperation with the Seminole County Solid Waste Division, is that the program is open to students living in single family homes, apartments and condominiums.

Sanford Police score high marks on audit

Sanford Police received high marks in a state audit checking the accuracy of entering criminal histories and other information into the computer system.

The recent audit was conducted on the usage of the FCIC/NCIC system and the handling of criminal history information.

The results were supplied by Police Information Officer Tom Skiba. The audit took place on August 27.

The audit is used to confirm if the department is in compliance with FCIC (Florida Criminal Information Center)/NCIC (National Criminal Information Center) requirements. But it is also a test on the accuracy of entering information into the computer system.

The system allows officers to retrieve information depending on a particular case.

The auditor, according to Tracie Jackson of the Sanford Police Records Office, will randomly choose entries on licenses, missing persons, serial numbers for guns, vehicle registration numbers, boat registration numbers, etc. The

auditor then compares the entries to corresponding case files to see if the numbers are entered correctly. For example, out of six case files on boat registration numbers, all six were inputted without error. Only one error was found in the auditor's research. (A gun had been entered with an incorrect serial number.) Not all cases are See Audit, Page 4A

Call it Kitchen-gate

WASHINGTON—As the Clinton administration tries to clear its name in the uproar over campaign finance abuses, another White House scandal continues to simmer. Call it Kitchen-gate.

Former Executive White House Chef Pierre Chambrin, fired along with most of his staff in 1994, said in court papers made public just last week that the reason the Clintons dismissed him was that he was too fat and too French. And the Washington Times recently reported that Chambrin was given a secret payment of \$37,028 by the White House so that he wouldn't discuss his "resignation" with the press.

We've been following this story since July 1993, when then-assistant White House Chef Sean Haddon told us that though President Clinton is allergic to dairy products, Chambrin had refused on several occasions to remove the cream from his vaunted French recipes. The president, Haddon alleged, had suffered several allergic reactions from Chambrin's creamy dishes.

Chambrin dismissed Haddon's allegations as "garbage," and told us that "if you believe Haddon, you believe the moon is brie cheese."

Nevertheless, our 1993 column, which detailed Haddon's charges, caused a stir at the White House. Roy Neel, then-White House deputy chief of staff, fired off a memo to all executive residence employees: "Discussions by staff members of the first family's personal activities of any kind, or any other matter that breaches their privacy, with anyone outside of the immediate staff is prohibited."

But Haddon insisted that the publication of our column was beneficial to Clinton. "You saved the president a lot of rashes," Haddon told us. "Pierre was still using cream until your column. I know because I work right next to him."

Haddon has his own personal bone of contention with the White House that goes beyond menus and meals. Back in 1993, Haddon, who is white, believed that he had

been passed over for a promotion because his wife is black. So Haddon filed a complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, and was subsequently fired. He then filed a lawsuit to try to win his job back.

It is in conjunction with Haddon's lawsuit that Chambrin was ordered to give a deposition to Haddon's attorney, Rodney R. Sweetland III. In his testimony, Chambrin said he "didn't fit the profile of an American chef politically. You know, I'm overweight and I have a strong French accent, and the president wanted to put...an American-born chef" in charge of the White House kitchen.

At the time of Chambrin's dismissal, a spokesman for first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton said the firing gave "the Clintons an opportunity to bring in someone who's training was American."

Ironically, when Haddon asked chief White House usher Gary J. Walters in 1993 why he missed the promotion, Walters responded: "I do not want American food, California Nouveau, or eclectic cooking in the White House."

Apparently, though, the Clintons had very different tastes than their predecessors, George and Barbara Bush.

The county adopted a strict new adult entertainment code this summer that it hopes will diminish the number of existing clubs and discourage other sexually-orientated businesses from opening.

By law, however, a sufficient number of sites must be identified by the county for future adult entertainment establishments - so many per one thousand residents. Thus, the scramble by the county planners to name a sufficient number of potential sites.

The Sanford City Commissioners chose the mayor to represent the city with the county planners and county commissioners. He's been in daily contact with both.

"We're going to fight this tooth and nail," Dale said today. "We're concerned that Sanford is getting the brunt of the hit - too many of the targeted sites are in our area."

Dale said he is optimistic that the county commissioners will make the proper call. "Commissioner Daryl McLain, who represents District 5, is very concerned with what's happening and has vowed his support," Dale said. "When all this gets settled, we expect a fair decision. Until, then we're going to voice our opinions."

The issue was addressed at workshop Wednesday night by the Planning & Zoning/Land Planning Association. Seminole Community College instructor Paul Tremel said the main thrust of the workshop concerned M-2 zoning requirements - not specifically identifying or ranking sites.

"There are eight existing adult-entertainment businesses in the county," Tremel says. "And maybe that's all there will be. That these will satisfy the market. But the law requires so many sites be identified for each thousand people."

Bob West, another committee member, said he was hopeful that the county's new adult-entertainment code would diminish any future clubs being opened. "The Grook (assistant county attorney) says the legal requirements. How many sites need to be identified?"

Among the possible zones identified by the county planners are at the East Lake Mary Boulevard extension between Marquette and Sipes avenues, at the entrance to the Orlando Sanford airport, 149 acres; corner of Celery Ave. and Sipes St., half acre; West side of Upsala Rd., one mile south of S.R. 46, 3.61 acres, and both sides of the Reinhart Rd. extension about a half mile north of Paola Rd. and three-quarters of a mile south of S.R. 46, 96 acres.

Students may collect the outdated directories from family, friends, and businesses, and bring the books into school. However, Schaffner said, for safety reasons "we do not want kids knocking on doors."

The school that collects the most total pounds of directories will receive \$1,000. Also receiving \$1,000 will be the school that collects the most pounds per enrolled student.

Schools collecting a minimum of 100 outdated phone books will be entered in a drawing for five of the \$200 wild card prizes. Schools will receive one entry for every 100 books collected.

In addition, plaques will be awarded to student groups that collect at least 500 books, and certificates will be awarded to individual students that collect at least 100 books.

For households without a child, phone books may be taken to the Central Transfer

Station, 1634 State Road 419, Monday-Saturday, from 7:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m.; the landfill, 1930 Osceola Road, seven days a week, from 7:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m.; BFI recycling facility, 900 Recycling Point in Longwood.

The program is being funded by BellSouth, Sprint, and BFI, and coordinated through the county with the cooperation of the cities of Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Lake Mary, Longwood, Oviedo, Sanford and Winter Springs.

searched through, however. In the case of vehicles, there were 138 entries, but the auditor only chose 10 of those for testing.

"The Sanford Police Department could be held liable if the information was not put into the system correctly," said Jackson. She and Cleo Cohen, an employee with the department, were commended in the recent letter sent from the Florida Division of Law En-

forcement to Chief Joe Dillard. They were praised for their "fine cooperation and knowledge of the subjects reviewed in the audit". The letter said, "The degree of professionalism found at your agency made this audit a pleasure."

"I'm extremely proud. [The employees] do a tremendous job on the number of reports that are to be handled," said Sanford Police Chief Joe Dillard. "I can't say enough about them."

Why Seminole County is really talking trash

Nice going, Seminole County residents. Give yourselves an A for recycling. The county's residents recycled more than 112,000 tons of material in the past year.

In response to a Florida mandate, Seminole County began a comprehensive, integrated solid waste and recycling program eight years ago.

In 1994, the county's Central Transfer Station in Longwood was named the top transfer facility in the nation by the Solid Waste Association of North America.

The county's innovative program includes the separation of yard waste, used oil, waste tires, major appliances and recyclables from landfill garbage.

The state's recycling goal of 30 percent was surpassed in 1996, says Sherry Newkirk, the program coordinator for the county's solid waste department. Seminole recycled 32 percent of its solid waste. That's up from 29 percent the previous year.

"This is our best effort yet," Newkirk says. "The key is educating everyone about what they can do to help. We're very active with neighborhood associations and with youngsters in our schools."

"Just about all our schools works the issue of recycling into classroom activities - into

the math, science and English classes. The children have written some nice essays on recycling."

Newkirk, who's been at her job since 1989, has written about it, too. Chances are you've received or will be receiving a 16-page recycling booklet on recycling that has been mailed to residents of unincorporated Seminole County.

Hang on to the booklet, Newkirk advises. (You can recycle it in two or three years when a new booklet is issued). For the time being, the new publication answers just about all there is to know about recycling and solid waste.

Some facts:
• Major appliances, furniture or other large bulky items are collected curbside if you call your hauler three working days in advance to arrange for collection.
• Tires are not collected

curbside. You may bring up to four tires to the Central Transfer Station at 1834 State Road 419 in Longwood, which is open from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday. There is a \$1 disposal fee for each tire.

• Free mulch from residential yard waste is available for free to all residents at the County Landfill at 1930 Oaccola Rd., Geneva.

• Unacceptable items at the County Transfer Station include medical waste, biologically active material, gas cylinders, shingles, large tree stumps, concrete and radioactive material.

• Items that can be brought to the Central Transfer Station include used oil, paint, solvents, anti-freeze, pool chemicals, glue, automotive fluids, mercury containing devices, propane tanks 25 lbs. or less, and fluorescent tubes. Haulers do not accept these household hazardous waste items curbside.

• The solid waste information number is (407) 330-9539.

Remember this, too. The Department of Agriculture found a way to turn chicken feathers into low cost absorbent paper for disposable diapers.

Now, that's recycling.

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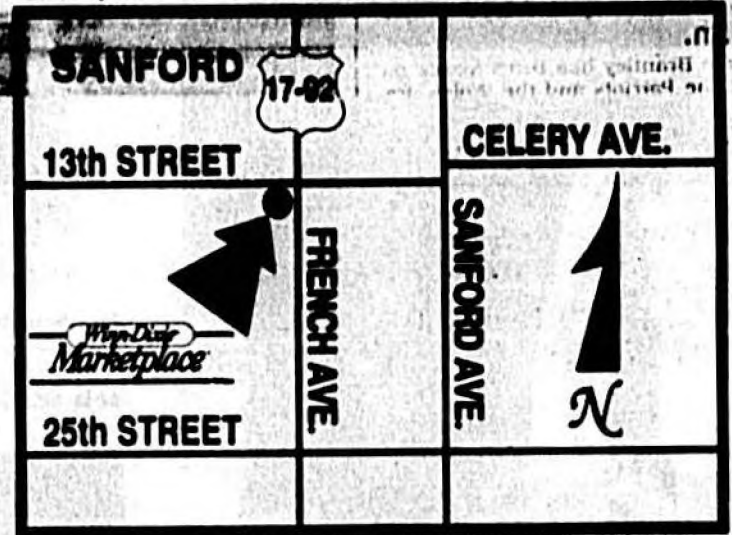

Oviedo (3-1, last week lost to DeLand, 14-7) at Lyman (1-3, last week lost to Lake Brantley, 55-7), 7:30 p.m.

That sound you heard last Friday night wasn't the space shuttle re-entering the atmosphere. It was the Lyman football team crashing back to life.

The Greyhounds were off to a 1-2 start that could have easily been 3-0. Coach Larry Baker had his team plying tough, winning a close one over Lake Mary and coming up just short in two others. Then, the Greyhounds had a shot to reach .00 and get back into the playoff hunt with a game against winless Lake Brantley.

Instead, Lyman got pounded, giving up 34 points in the second half. Fortunately for the Greyhounds, running back Brad Harris continued to be a sparkplug for the Greyhounds, rushing for over 100 yards in three of his last four outings.

Lyman quarterback Brian Krause continues to play steady and kicker Mark Lewis, despite a miscued 28-yarder last Friday, may be the best in Central Florida.

Oviedo remains in the driver's seat for the district ace despite a loss to DeLand last weekend. The Lions led after a scoreless first half but gave way to DeLand's 14 second half points. The Lions piled up yardage on offense behind quarterback Josh Cullen and lead rusher Leroy Jackson, but couldn't convert the yardage to points.

For Oviedo, it was the first loss for rookie coach Greg Register.

It should be a fired-up Oviedo team that takes the field, bent on getting the driver's seat back and, if Lyman can't recover from its demoralizing loss, it could get ugly. That would be too bad for a Greyhound team that has improved greatly over its past few seasons.

Lake Brantley (1-3, last week beat Lyman, 55-7) at Seminole (4-0, last week beat Spruce Creek, 35-7) 7:30 p.m.

Even though Lake Brantley has three losses on their record, both the Patriots and the 'Noles are on a roll.

Last week, Lake Brantley defeated Lyman, holding the Greyhounds to one touchdown while the offense racked up 46 unanswered points on their way to a 55-7 win.

It was the first win for first year head coach George Clayton, who replaced long time coach Fred Almon, who retired for health reasons after the Patriots lost in the second round of the playoffs last season.

Brantley's win was earned by the offense who took one of their most definitive stands of the season. No defense so far has contained them and if Lake Brantley wants to keep the Tribe out of the end zone, they will have to stop the running game. This unit will face their former defensive coordinator, Bill Caughell, who left Seminole last year to take the same position with Lake Brantley and are looking forward to showing off.

Then there's the passing game.

A new one-two punch has formed at Seminole. Sophomore quarterback Garrett Smith and senior wide out Erick Smith have teamed for quite a few passing yards and three touchdowns in last weeks game alone. Add in the special teams and defensive play of Raines and the Tribe is loaded with weapons.

"I like to mix up the offense as much as possible," Seminole coach Jim Worthington said. "If the running game is working, however, I don't want to throw the ball just for the sake of passing. Garrett has progressed very well. He's had a lot of the pressure removed from him in the first games of the season, but I think he's ready for a little more, whether we run the ball or put it in the air will depend on what's happening in the game."

The battle for bragging rights in the Seminole Athletic Conference is always a heated one and this game shouldn't be any different. The winner of this contest will be the one who can contain the running game. Whichever team is able to that will have a foothold in the battle for Seminole County pride, at least until the end of fall break.

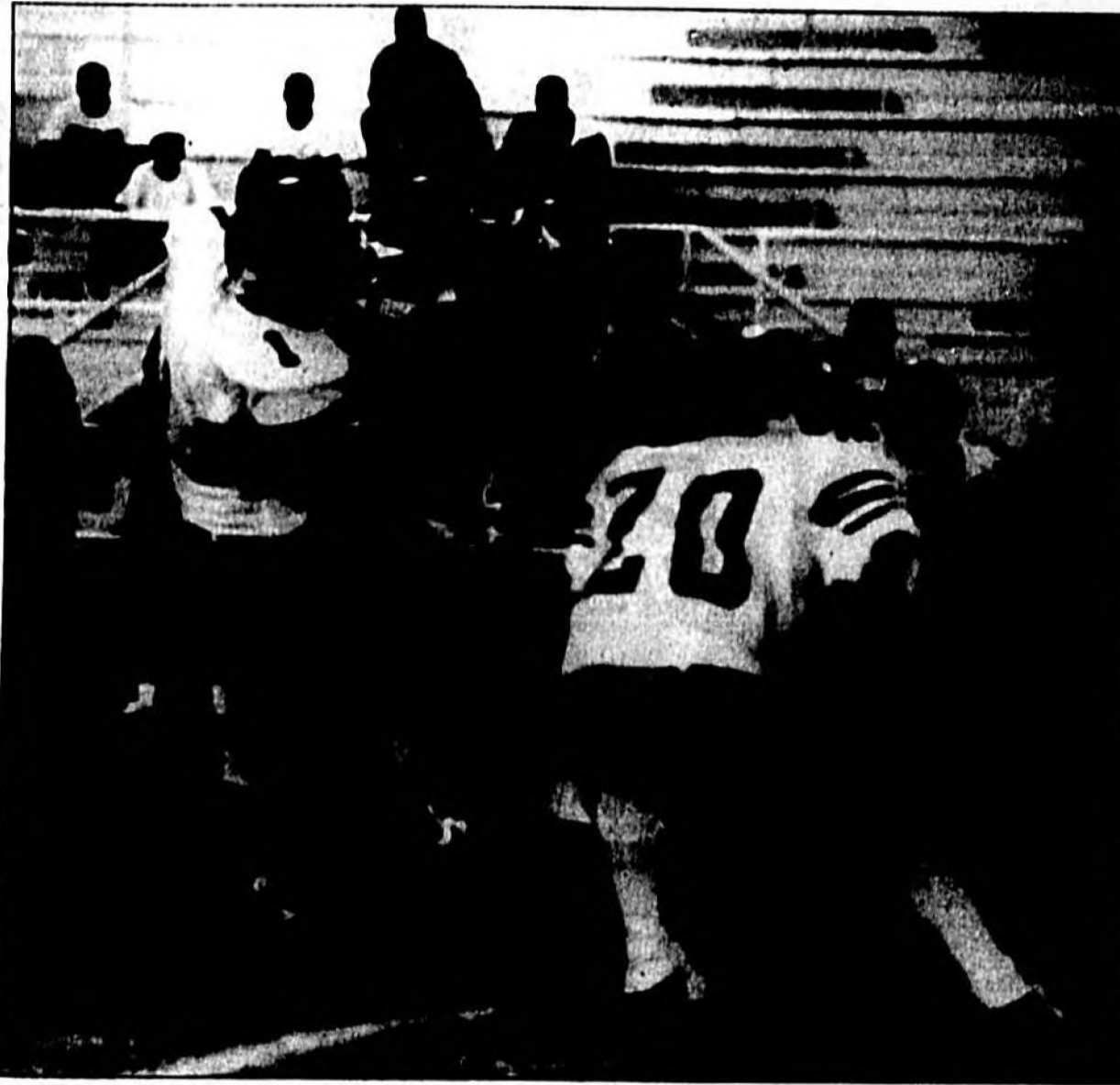
David Fritta and David Bradley also had big nights as hitters as Seminole continued its comeback. They trailed early in the third game

MEDICINE
PETER GOTT, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband just died, after having received unsuccessful radiation therapy for a malignant tumor of unspecified site. Why didn't his doctors use chemotherapy, too?

DEAR READER: Highly malignant tumors — those so cancerous that their origin cannot be identified — are the most difficult to treat. Chemotherapy is usually useless, and even radiation may have little effect. I suspect that your husband's doctors chose not to subject him to expensive and painful treatment that held no hope of cure. With some cancers, comfort-oriented therapy which relieves pain and suffering may be the most appropriate approach.

Although I am sorry for your loss, your husband may have experienced a more uncomfortable and prolonged death had his doctors continued to try various therapies doomed to fail.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My healthy 35-year-old husband has an embarrassing problem: At the conclusion of sex, he gets a severe headache. As you can imagine, this is not helping our marriage. What can we do?

DEAR READER: Known as "coital headache," this symptom does not reflect any health hazard or danger. The cause is unknown but is probably related to altered blood flow in the brain during sexual arousal.

My consultants tell me that coital headaches are more easily prevented than treated. Several drugs are used for this purpose. These include beta-blockers (Inderal and others), calcium-channel blockers (verapamil and so forth) and anti-depressants (such as Elavil). The medicine is taken an hour or so before having relations.

To rule out other causes of headache, such as migraine, your husband should be examined by his physician, who can prescribe the necessary antidote.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Why is it that I experience ringing in my ears after exposure to loud noises?

DEAR READER: The ringing (tinnitus) reflects the fact that the hearing mechanism has been damaged. Formerly believed to be a temporary affliction, this type of tinnitus is now known to be due to the permanent destruction of delicate nerve cells in the inner ear. Repeated, unprotected exposure to loud noises will eventually cause irreparable hearing loss, primarily of the so-called "mid range" or conversational range of sound. Thus, the first sign of damage is usually an inability to distinguish conversation in a crowd.

This afternoon, while biking, I came across a man in his 20s who was operating a jackhammer. He was big, blond and robust — and sadly, wore no ear protection. He probably figured

that he could "take it." After all, this is his job, and only sisies wear earmuffs or other protective devices.

He will probably be significantly deaf by the time he is 30.

The same holds true for young people who expose themselves to electronically amplified music. Since they are so young, they think nothing can

happen to them. But it will. As you know, we live in a noisy society, and we must, therefore, learn to protect ourselves. A sound may seem harmless, but if it is loud enough to be uncomfortable (or to cause tinnitus), it will cause damage. Consequently, I urge all people to protect their ears — with their fingers, if necessary — when in the presence of high-volume noise. This simple act could save the hearing of millions of people.

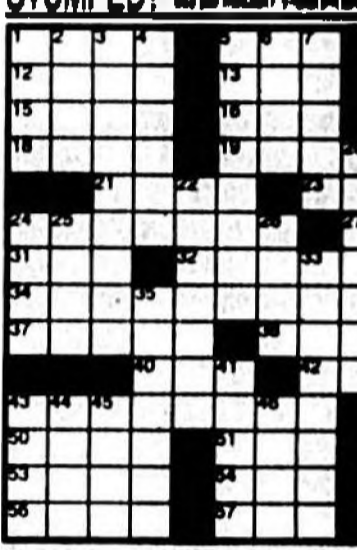

WIN AT BRIDGE

The greatest thrill

Looking for a quotation including one particular word, I chose one from Ralph Waldo Emerson: "By necessity, by proclivity, and by delight, we all quote." Well, which word was I searching for?

In today's deal, how would you play in four hearts after East has opened with a weak no-trump showing 12-14 high-card points? West starts the defense with the club king, club queen and club nine, which you ruff. This deal was played at last year's Queen's Birthday Weekend Congress in Canberra. (Yes, despite being independent, Australia still commemorates the Queen's official birthday in June. She was actually born April 21, 1926.) It was shown to me by Len Dixon, a leading player and journalist in the Australian capital. South had three losers (one spade

and two clubs), so had to play the diamonds for no losers. Yet East was marked with the diamond queen. Why?

Because declarer was missing only 17 high card points, and West had already produced five: his club honors. Before committing himself in diamonds, declarer drew trumps with his king queen. What now?

As East had only two hearts, he presumably had at least three diamonds. (Few players open one no trump with 4-2-3 or 5-2-3-4 distribution.) So, playing to drop the queen was futile. Instead, declarer played a trump to dummy and called for the diamond jack. When East covered with the queen, declarer won with his ace and played a diamond to dummy's nine. As the backward finesse had worked, declarer claimed his contract.

Naturally, South took delight in his performance.
