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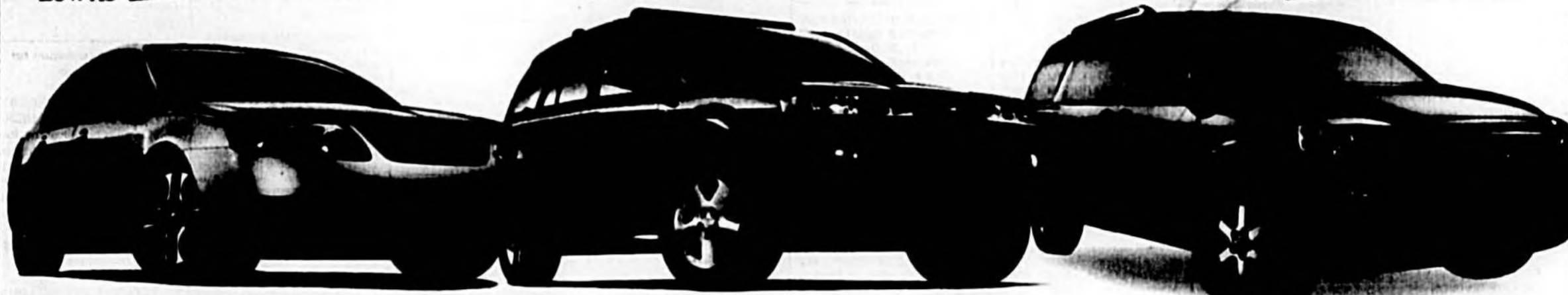

SANFORD — Some of the recovered property from a Sanford Police Department search warrant conducted in the beginning of March will be open for public inspection on Tuesday, March 22 from 4 to 7 p.m. at the Public Safety Building.

Eye in the sky



'85 Charley Pop' ready for takeoff

SANFORD — You should see First Street from 3,000 feet up. The red brick and grey trim appear bright and perfect from up here.

I'm on a free flying lesson with Avion Air Academy. Until I asked my instructor Gary Carter to take the controls while I snapped a few photos, I actually flew the Cessna 172R SkyHawk the whole time.

A nationwide program called, "Be A Pilot," has sparked interest in learning to fly. For \$49, the non-journalist can take an introductory lesson. Let me forewarn readers, however. My experience left me yearning to return to the sky. I want to fly free like the eagles that Carter sometimes spots near the Orlando Sanford International Airport.

To actually become a pilot takes time, commitment and about \$4,500. The introductory lesson will cause you to seriously contemplate becoming a pilot.

For some, the idea of flying in a single-engine, propeller-driven plane might produce butterflies that churn in the stomach. I don't deny that nerves triggered some discomfort for me. The enthusiasm and professionalism of Carter, however, quell

Sheriff's Office employee resigns amid sex allegations

SANFORD — A civilian employee who registered felony offenders at the Seminole County Sheriff's Office was placed on suspension without pay pending the results of an investigation and has since resigned after soliciting for sexual favors in return for payment to a female registered offender.

The woman, whose name has not been released, came to the felony registrar office on Feb. 11, and was allegedly propositioned by Joseph Scutero, 61, who has worked with the Sheriff's Office since 1986.

The woman reported the incident to officials and between Feb. 16 and 17, surveillance and monitoring equipment was installed in Scutero's office. The office door is usually closed when felons are reg-

istered. The equipment monitored a second appointment made by the woman for Feb. 17.

During the meeting the female asked if Scutero still wanted to take her picture, something she had alleged was asked in her previous encounter with Scutero, the Sheriff's report said.

Conversation ensued and Scutero offered the female \$100 in return for sexual favors. During a post Miranda interview with Scutero, the report said: he "stated that he did agree to spend one hundred dollars for the sex act but it was just in the course of conversation with the [female]."

Within a few days, a capias was sent to the State Attorney's office on a misdemeanor charge of procure for prostitution-solicit another for lewd acts.

The State Attorney's office opted

for pre-trial diversion, meaning Scutero will not be prosecuted or brought to trial.

Sheriff's Office spokesman Steve Olson said that Scutero's legal counsel negotiated with the State Attorney's office so that it did not go to trial.

Scutero must meet certain conditions in a 6-month period, Olson said.

He must complete 32 hours of community service, attend an HIV awareness class, never seek law enforcement employment or certification again, and pay for program and prosecution costs.

Along with Scutero's investigation, a survey involving female felony registrants dating back to the time Scutero started working as a registrar in 1998, found further

Rezoning lawsuit rejected

Second lawsuit could halt Plan Z2 again

SANFORD — An administrative judge dismissed a lawsuit Thursday brought by Sabal Point and Tusawilla parents challenging the Seminole County School Board's decision to rezone nearly 5,000 high school students.

Early Friday morning, the School Board held a special meeting to adopt emergency procedures to implement the plan known as Z2. A public hearing and final adoption is scheduled to take place at the April 26 School Board meeting starting at 7 p.m.

Within minutes of the School Board's unanimous approval of the emergency measure, a Sabal Point parent handed the school attorney Ned Julian another law-

suit saying the Board violated open government laws.

"The School Board did nothing to violate Sunshine laws," Julian said after the special meeting. He had not read the complaint yet, but cited a similar case against the Orange County School Board in which the school district eventually prevailed.

The lawsuits were both brought by SC READ Inc., and parent Jennifer Finch who is one of two officers for SC READ.

She said there were numerous violations of the Sunshine laws that came out during the first lawsuit hearing. Two examples stand out, Finch said.

First, the public could not hear what was happening at two of the three Core

Mitchell gains rival's support

SANFORD — Former city commission candidate Hank Dieckhaus isn't sure whom his 143 supporters will vote for in the upcoming runoff election, but he is wholeheartedly throwing his support toward Bernard Mitchell.

"I just don't know," Dieckhaus said of his supporters.

The runoff will be between incumbent Art Woodruff and candidate hopeful Mitchell. They gathered the most votes in the March 8 election for District 1 commissioner, but neither received more than 50 percent of the vote.

Out of the 143 votes cast for Dieckhaus, he isn't sure what his supporters will do now.

The former candidate suggested Woodruff supporters who voted for Dieckhaus will go back to Woodruff. People who wanted Woodruff out of office would most likely pass their votes to Mitchell, Dieckhaus said.

One thing Dieckhaus knows for sure is which runoff candidate will receive his endorsement.

"I'm backing Bernard," Dieckhaus said. "I can't tell people who to vote for. But I'm endorsing Bernard. I have no problem with Art. It's not like he's the candidate from Hell, but I'd like to see a change."

The runoff election between Mitchell and Woodruff is scheduled for March 29.

Police arrest murder suspect

SANFORD — Sanford police captured a murder suspect after the man gave police a false name and escaped for a short time. Officers apprehended the 20-year-old man in a pond near Charleston Club Apartments.

Charles Lee Thomas of Sanford was arrested Wednesday for resisting an officer and for giving a false name to a law enforcement officer. He is wanted in Belle Glade for first degree murder that occurred Dec. 23, 2004.

Based on a tip from Belle Glade police, Sanford police and K-9 units responded to 2207 Logan Heights Circle to try and locate Thomas.

Officers saw a person matching his description walked behind the apartment building. Booking photos confirmed Thomas's identification, according to police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen.

Thomas identified himself to police as Demonte Brown, the arrest report said, and he said he lived at the address with his sister. While police questioned him, Thomas ran and additional officers joined a pursuit and set up a perimeter. The Seminole County Sheriff's Office also took part.

The Sheriff's Alert-1 helicopter spotted Thomas in a pond behind the pool area of the apartments. He was arrested and transported to the John E. Polk Correctional Facility.

alleged inappropriate behavior.

"Before 1998, Scutero was a bailiff downtown at the courthouse. He was part of court security," Olson said.

That part of the investigation found four other females who had encountered what Olson called inappropriate and suggestive comments and language, but none of the female's chose to report the incidents, nor wished to pursue them now, a Sheriff's Office news release stated.

"The impression we got from the other four [females] was that it did not rise to the solicitation level," Olson said.

In a Feb. 17 letter to Scutero, Sheriff Don Eslinger called the man's conduct appalling.

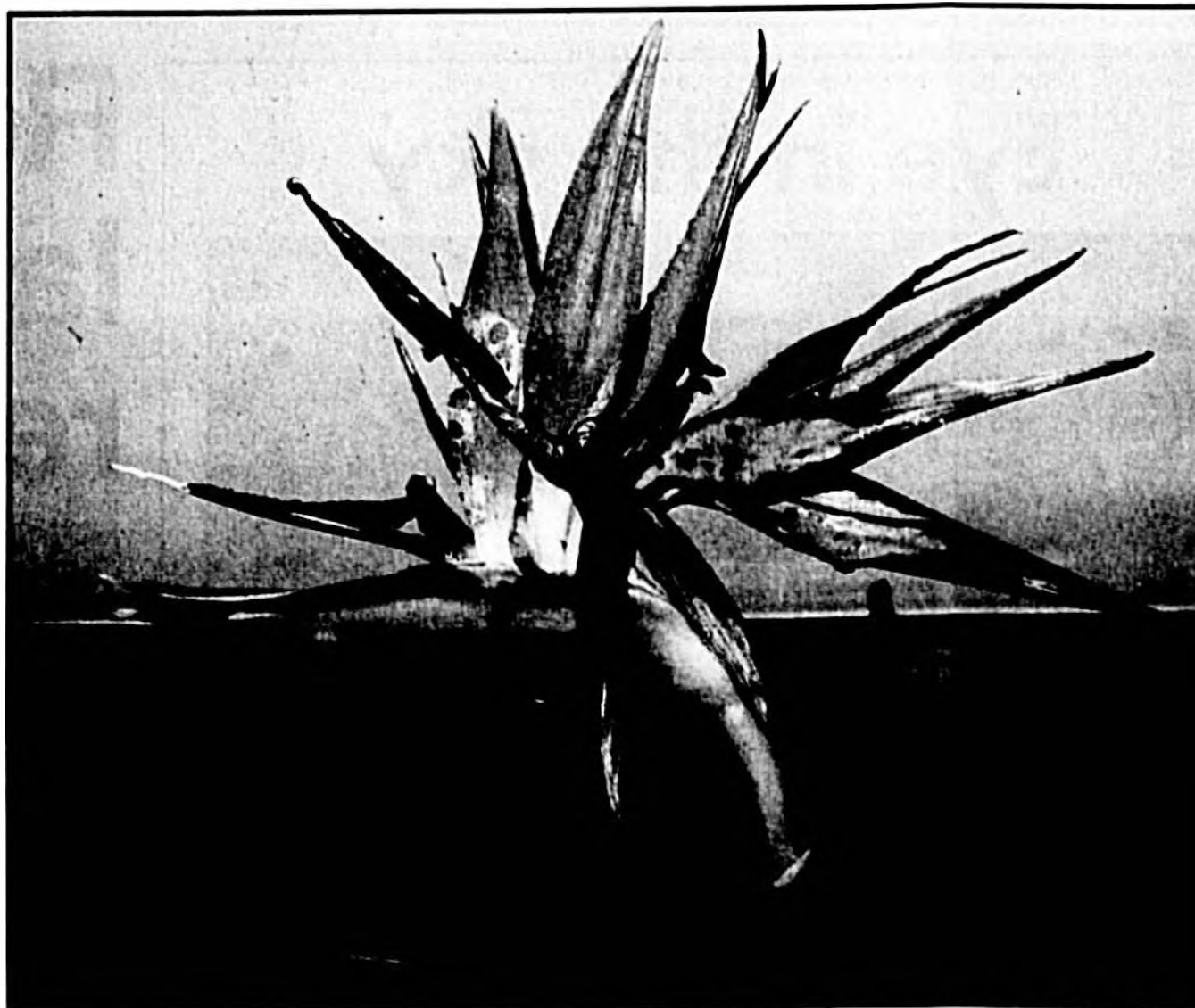
"You abused your position of authority to intimidate [said female]. Your actions were not only professionally unacceptable but immoral and lewd," Eslinger wrote.

"Due to this incident, you have not only embarrassed yourself but the agency as a whole. It is evident that you have no regard for the values and organizational philosophy of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. Your conduct cannot be tolerated."

The felony registrar office is now an open door office, Olson said, due to Scutero's actions.

"Nothing will be done behind closed doors," Olson said.

Buckle up

While this column generally reflects some of my own thoughts on a particular subject, I relinquish that this weekend, in order to report on a new project by AAA Auto Club South.

The program is called "Loved Ones Lost - And Lives Saved." It alludes to Florida's Safety Belt Law which AAA says is our weakest state traffic law. AAA has, in the latest press release, has compiled items from various newspapers around the state dealing with those who lost their lives, and those whose lives were saved because of seatbelts.

From the Sun-Sentinel in Fort Lauderdale, there comes a report of four teenagers who were in a two-vehicle accident. One died at the scene, one on the way to the hospital, and a girl, taken to the hospital, is paralyzed from the waste down. Police said none of them were wearing a seat belt.

On March 3, the Palm Beach Post reported that 80 percent of drivers who died over the Christmas weekend in 2004 crashes, and 90 percent of those who died on the New Year's weekend, were not using seatbelts.

On March 4, the Fort Myers News Press reported a 12-year-old boy was killed and an 18-year old girl was severely injured in a collision in that city. The Florida Highway Patrol said no one in the car was wearing a seatbelt.

The Southwest Florida News-Press in Lee County, in the March 9th edition, said law enforcement officers were fed up with the number of fatalities in that county. As of March 6, police reported at least 31 people have died in traffic crashes thus far this year. That compares to 20 last year and 23 in 2003 in the same two-month period.

Unfortunately, they reported the majority of the 31 people were not wearing seatbelts. The deputies and Florida Highway Patrol are organizing a crack-down on motorists in that county and will no longer issue warnings - rather they will ticket offenders.

AAA tells of a Central Florida mother who lost control of her vehicle and it overturned three times. All of the occupants were thrown out of the vehicle and crushed. No one was wearing a seatbelt. They also told of a young man driving on a rural road who ran off the edge of the road. When trying to correct the maneuver, he slammed into a pine tree. He was not wearing a seatbelt and was killed instantly.

On the other side however, a 23-year-old woman was run off an interstate highway by a man who was intoxicated and driving with a suspended license. The woman's jeep spun out of control and landed in a ditch. The jeep was totally demolished, but she walked away with only a scratch on her foot and some bruises. Her seatbelt saved her life.

Working where I do, I have, for years, written about auto accidents. While I will admit, that years ago, I often failed to buckle up. After writing about highway fatalities time after time however, I started putting on that seatbelt as soon as I got in the car, before I would start the engine. There are occasions where I have to unbuckle, when I am backing up, because the seat is so tight I can't turn around to see behind me, but as soon as I back up, that seatbelt goes back on.

Time after time, when I take someone with me in the vehicle, I have to tell them to buckle up. Some are hesitant, but they will comply with my wishes. No one rides with me without putting on a seatbelt. I commend AAA for this drive to help eliminate highway deaths caused by not using seatbelts. They aren't going to cut down on accidents, but a seatbelt will do a lot toward cutting down on deaths.

For AAA, and all of us, "Loved Ones Lost - And Lives Saved" is dedicated to those killed and critically injured and most of all, to the loved ones who must go on. I urge you - buckle up.

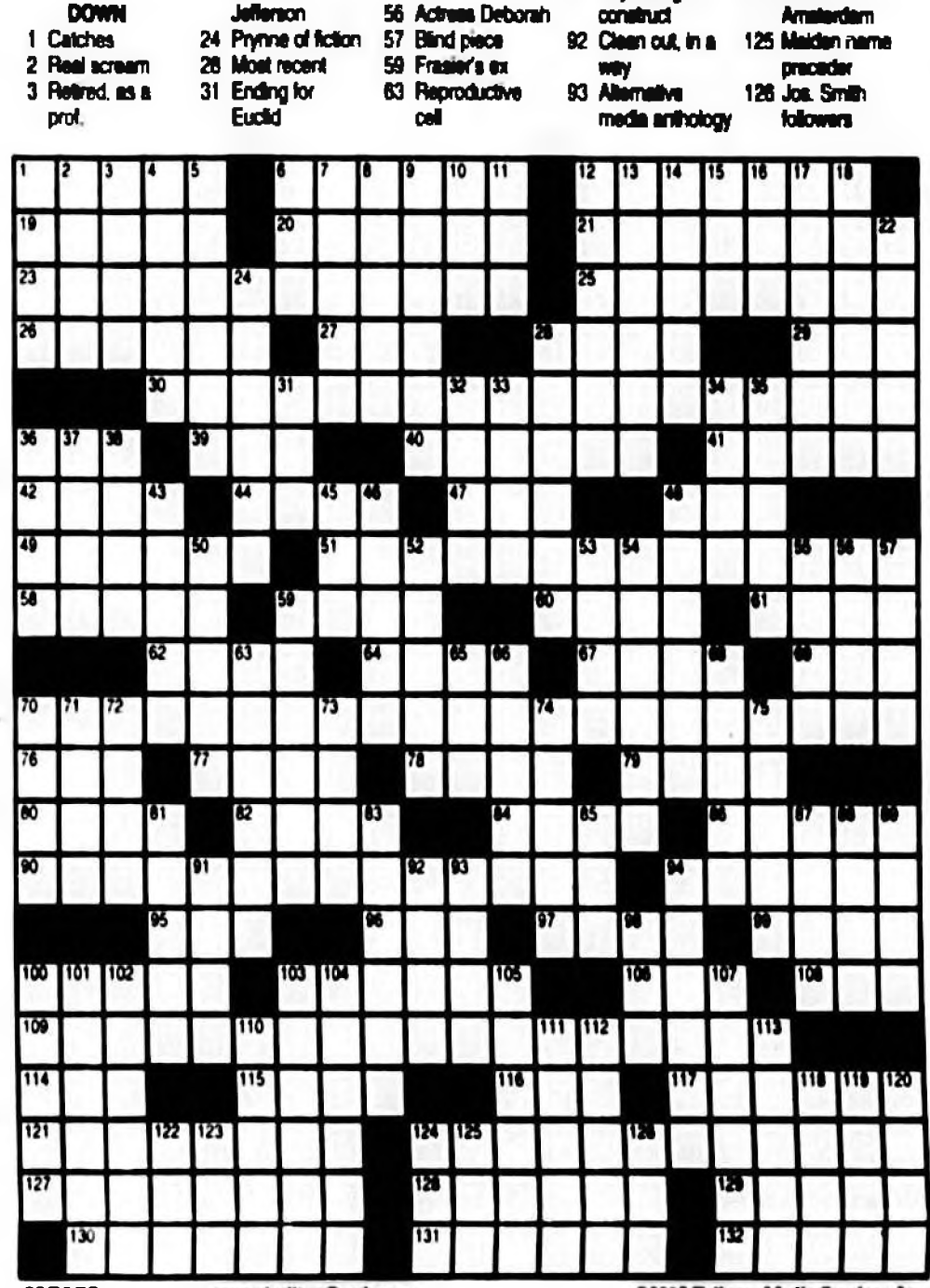

Woodruff, who received 568 votes against Mitchell's 358, only received 40 percent of the overall votes, which in the city of Sanford by-laws requires a runoff election. A candidate running for office in the city of Sanford must receive more than 50 percent of the vote.

Vance Taylor and Lindsay Oyewale also vied for the city commission seat.

Taylor, who received 15 votes, said his support would not make a big difference, but is still endorsing Woodruff.

"I probably would want to keep Art in because of his past experience," Taylor said.

Oyewale, who came close to edging out Mitchell with 321 votes, did not return phone calls.

If everyone who voted in the March 8 election voted again, that would leave 479 votes up for grabs.

"I think most of those people want a positive change and are looking for a candidate who is reliable, dependable and honest and who will be there when crucial events arise," Mitchell said of those votes.

On Wednesday, Mitchell said he is standing on his initial platform to preserve the historic district, adhere to strict code enforcement, redevelop and

attract businesses downtown, ensure public safety, further development of the airport, create smart growth management, better the city's infrastructure, and create community programs for seniors and youths.

Woodruff has a similar platform including furthering good development standards, fixing the system so that code enforcement is effective, increasing neighborhood groups, continuing public safety protection, creating a comprehensive approach to infrastructure, increasing educational and recreational programs, and increasing property values while decreasing the tax rate.

In a recent interview Woodruff said he is knocking on doors and trying to educate the voters before the runoff election.

"A lot of people don't even know there is a runoff," Woodruff said.

The runoff election is scheduled for Tuesday, March 29, with early voting beginning Monday, March 21.

The Sanford City Commission will hold a special meeting March 30 at 1 p.m. Commissioners will review the runoff election results and establish a special meeting for April 5.

The Way We Were: Clyde company to up dock fees

The following was edited from the Wednesday, July 16, 1924 edition of *The Sanford Herald*. The paper at that time was published six days a week with Roland L. Dean as editor and R. Howard Berg as manager. Cost was \$7 per year. The majority of news in this edition was from Associated Press with several local items included.

The following items show that Sanford was experiencing a building boom and we are given some information on plans for buildings you may recognize even though some have been demolished.



Grace Marie Stineciper Clyde Company Will Increase Dock Facilities.

It has been learned that morning that the Clyde Steamship company was completing plans for a 100 foot addition along the entire east side of their present warehouse and dock at the foot of Palmetto Avenue. Cost would be approximately \$15,000.

Mrs. J.B. Calder, representative of the company here stated that the office and waiting rooms would be moved into the new addition and the part they now occupied would be used for storage and warehouse space.

Mrs. Calder further stated that representatives of the company would be meeting with S.O. Shinkholer, contractor, in regard to the construction of the building.

Meriweather Business Block
Surveying and digging at the site of the new Meriweather business block located at the corner of Magnolia Avenue and Second Street would soon be completed and the pouring of the concrete foundation would start on Monday.

It was understood that work on this building would be rushed, as several of the store spaces had already been rented. The structure would be similar to the one it would adjoin on the north side, also the property of Mr. Meriweather.

Meisch Block Almost Complete
The new business block of the Meisch Realty Company would soon be ready for occupancy it had been learned that morning. This building was located on First Street between Sanford and Palmetto Avenues, and comprised of three store spaces which were equipped with modern conveniences.

A large addition was also being constructed to the Ford Garage on Palmetto Avenue between First Street and Commercial Avenue. This was to take care of the steadily increasing business of this concern.

Plans Adopted for New Municipal Building

The City Planning Commission had passed a resolution adopting plans for a new municipal building or city hall which would be built in the near future. These would be sent to the City Commission for approval.

Drawings of three sets of plans had been submitted by Architect Edson Moughton. The one adopted would be of Spanish architectural design, two stories high, and would have a tower.

It would be constructed on the lakefront property facing Park Avenue. The property was below Calhoun Street, now an imaginary one, (Presently Fulton Street), extending back to the tracks of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad and north to Lake Monroe.

According to Mr. Moughton, the tower would show up extraordinarily well from the lake. It would be seen at a great distance and would attract the attention of those coming in boats.

The building would contain a large space for the fire department which would face Calhoun Street. The first floor of the building would comprise offices for the mayor, city commissioners, city clerk, city manager, etc.

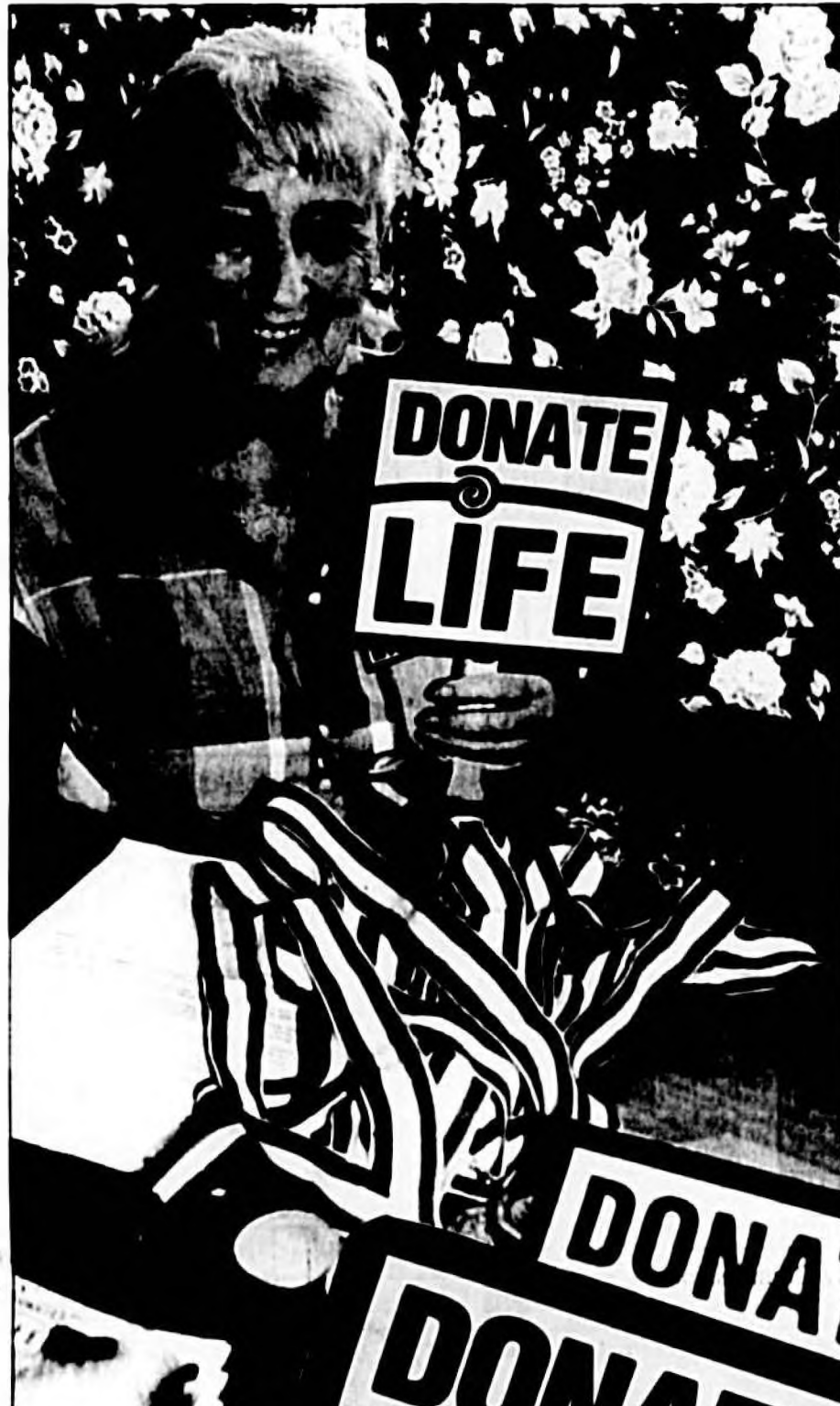
The front part of the second floor would serve as sleeping quarters, a reading room and exercise room for men of the fire department. Behind this would be an auditorium to have a seating capacity of 1,000 people. It would also serve as the city court-room and site of city commission meetings.

The city jail would be built separately, probably behind city hall.

Welcome to Stetson's Corner, where weekly we hope to share a bit of what is good about the Village of Geneva. This column is dedicated to a man who did the same - Deputy Sheriff Gene "Stetson" Gregory, who was killed in the line of duty July 8, 1998 in the place he was sworn to protect, but which could not protect him. Geneva will never be the same because of Deputy Gregory... it will be better.

Just when I was feeling like the rural areas of Seminole County were getting the attention and recognition that they deserve, a meeting of the Seminole County Board of County Commissioners made it clear just how backward-thinking some 'county' people still are when it comes to those of us in the 'country.'

The meeting was a regular session of the Commission held Feb. 8. On the agenda was an update on the Eugene "Stetson" Gregory Law Enforcement Memorial Park, an endeavor supported by this community for several years now, even though progress has only been made behind the scenes and not actually on the property to this point in time.

Apparently, the owners of the property, who originally provided Seminole County Sheriff's Deputy Todd Madson a letter of intent to

donate 20 acres of land on which to build the park, have now added a stipulation to that donation. They are asking the county to purchase an adjacent 40 acres for \$187,608 in order to receive the 'donated' land.

Given, this constitutes a major betrayal of trust on the part of the landowners. Given, the money is not inconsequential in spite of the fact that it is well below market value for the acreage. Given, the park is not located in central Seminole County where throngs of folks will visit. Given, in a perfect world such things would not happen.

But, happen it has. To scrap the plans now and move the park would constitute a major betrayal of trust on the part of our elected county commissioners. Well, some of them, anyway.

A few quotes from the meeting ought to help readers sort out who is on which side:

"What bothers me about this is that I questioned the wisdom of placing it out there in the first place." "This changes the whole ball game as far as I'm concerned." "I don't like that position quite frankly." "I don't know that I could support that." -Carlton Hanley

"How many people have ever visited a memorial park in such an isolated area?" "I'd rather see it where more people could participate, not literally in the middle of nowhere." "Perhaps at a more high traffic place such as Red Bag Park on a small portion of land." "Natural Lands ... should be where people could enjoy them without hav-

ing to drive 30-40 miles." "Sometimes you just can't make things work." "There is an alternative." "The fact of the matter is that the public are clueless as to who a road, park, etc. is named after." -Randy Morris

"I'm a little more than upset that the owner would do something along this line, but the fact is that there has been much work put into this donated piece of property for improvements." "The public has spoken volumes and given much support." "The issue that needs to be discussed is that if we don't move forward, what will happen to all that funding and hard work by the Sheriff's Office and volunteers that has been done?" "I'm kind of disgusted that the intent has changed at this late date, but I'm more inclined to move forward." -Bob Dallari

"We've discussed and supported this project." "The public has supported this project in a major way." "The additional land is under appraised value." "Many projects often include cost overruns." "The issue is that this last minute change in real estate is going to cost us some money." "I don't think any of us are happy at this situation." "This will be a benefit to the community." "I don't see how at this hour we can back off this project." -Dick Van Der Weide

"This is a great effort." "It is a shame that things had to change." "I recently talked with residents about problems in that area." "The community has poured out a lot of support for this, and I support this project as well." "As the district commissioner, I would like to make a motion to continue this to a period of time to have staff go and try to negotiate either the purchase of the 20 acres or some other alternative in the purchase of the land." "Kudos to you, Todd, for the great job you have done and hopefully we can come up with something that will be acceptable to everybody." -Brenda Curry

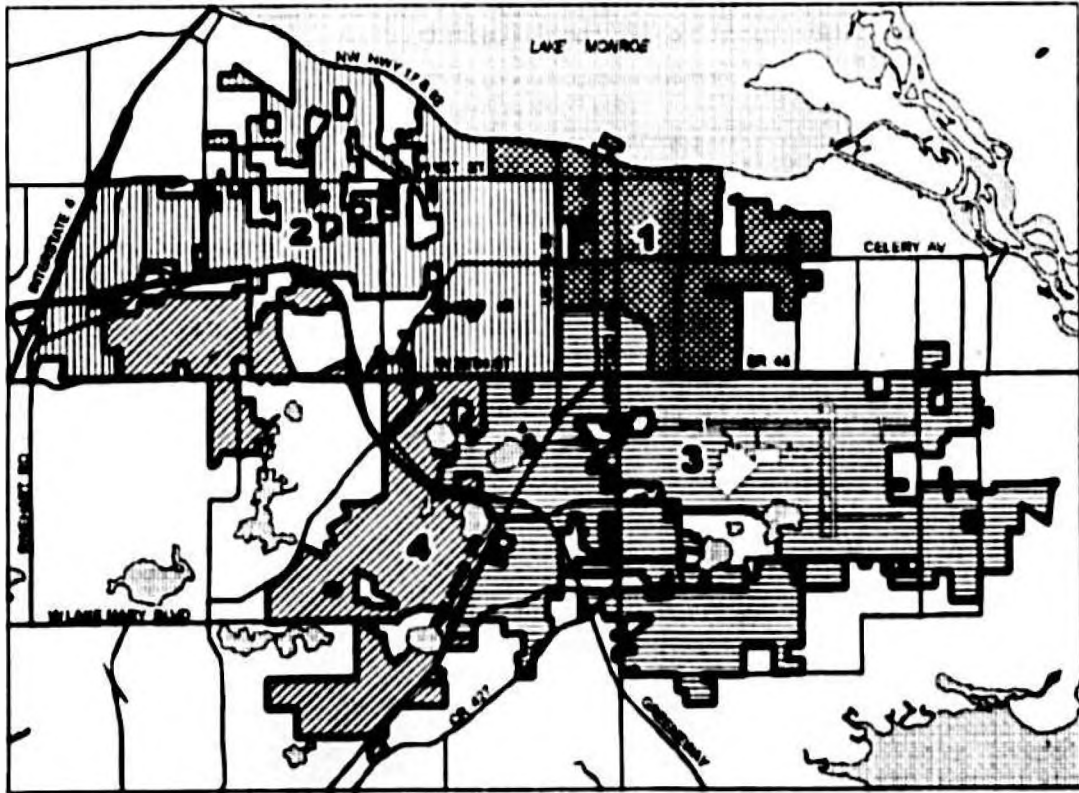

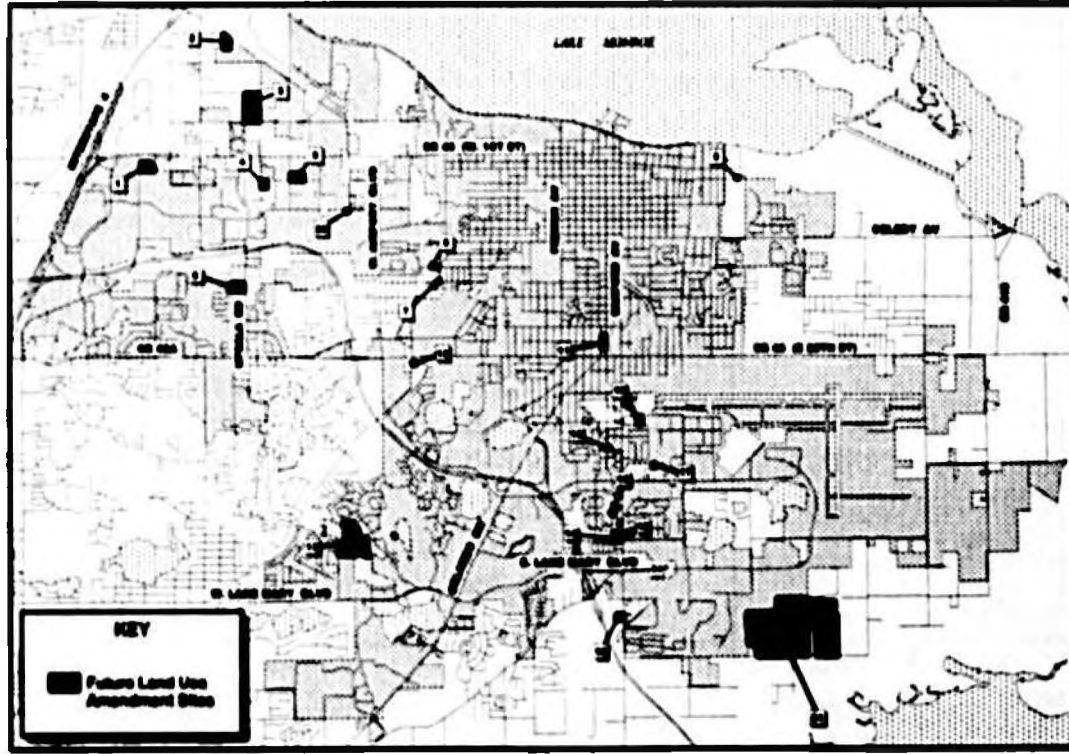

any fears. Carter is a 20-year veteran who makes his living trusting people like me to fly a machine about which they know practically nothing.

Despite his lengthy experience, Carter methodically runs through checklists. Safety appears paramount.

First he checks for water in the aircraft fuel. He takes samples from both wings and the front of the plane. He explains that water will separate from the light blue fuel the same way oil and water do so in salad dressing.

Carter walks slowly around the plane looking at the list and grabs what looks like an important part in the back of the plane.

"I'm just making sure everything's attached correctly," he says, noticing my concerned appearance. I wonder if he's joking.

We climb inside and buckle in. Photographer Tommy Vincent remains outside. Vincent hands me the digital camera to take some shots of our trip. He's not coming with us. His choice. I am handed a headset and we check the microphones.

Carter explains everything that will happen. He tells me about the steering wheel, called the yoke. I note there are two, and I'm very happy about that. The foot pedals will guide us on the ground, he says, and he hands me the keys.

The engine starts right up. A few more checks and we are moving.

Working the foot pedals gave me the biggest fits.

The plane meanders from side to side as I taxi the Cessna down the Sanford runway to take my first flying lesson.

Carter calmly tells me that, just like on a highway, it's not a good thing to cross the solid yellow line in the middle of the runway.

The tendency for a car driver like me is to turn the steering wheel, or yoke in front of me. Carter reminded me a couple of times, always in a pleasant manner, that steering with the yoke on the ground is useless.

He calls the tower to say we are getting ready to take off. By the time we reach a point called Romero, I have figured out the foot pedals and pull to a stop.

Do I want to call the tower, Carter asks. Sure. He tells me

what to say.

"Sanford tower this is 85 Charley Pop. We are at Romero," but I hesitate and look at my instructor. Carter claps his hands together and makes an upward motion. "Ready for takeoff." The tower gives us an OK, and we move onto the runway facing west.

I'm told to push in the gas. We accelerate and he reminds me to pull back gently on the yoke. A little more. We are lifting off the ground. Now push it slightly forward. The nose levels off. Now pull back again.

I forgot to mention the wind. Near the ground, the wind is gusty and the small plane bounces around. I wonder if that is normal and I mention it, but Carter seems OK with the turbulence.

Before I know it, we are over Sanford heading for Deland. My instructor says I'm doing great. He says he didn't help at all on the takeoff, which astounds me. I start breathing normal again as we gain altitude and the bouncing settles down.

I am flying the whole way. Do I want to go left or right, Carter asks, because if we go straight we will head into restricted air space over the Daytona airport. I say right, and turn the plane east.

Carter shows me how to adjust the trim. I can't explain how that works, but it stabilizes the ascent. Then he suggests experimenting. Take some turns, he says. Remember the foot pedals, they also control the rudder in the back. Combining the pedals and turning the yoke allows the pilot to maintain speed when banking right or left. He compares it with NASCAR when the cars hit the high bank turns at Daytona.

So I take some tighter turns and feel the force of gravity working on my stomach a bit. The plane maneuvers so easily I wonder why everyone doesn't fly to their destinations.

We cruise over Lake Ashby in Volusia County and in no time we are over New Smyrna Beach.

Carter points out other planes, not just because we need to know their location to avoid any unfortunate events, but because they are practicing stalling out. Stalling out, I exclaim. Why would they want to do that? It's part of training. An engine failure

could happen and a pilot has to know what action to take. If our plane were to stall out, he reassures me, we could easily glide to small airports nearby or pick out a node to land on. I wasn't worried.

We are almost back to Sanford when I realize I haven't taken any photographs. I'm reluctant to give up the controls to Carter, but I should take some since Tommy gave me the camera.

He tells me to open the window if I want, so I do to get clear shots of roads that I can't identify. The veteran pilot flies over The Sanford Herald building on French Avenue, then I ask him to fly over downtown so I can take some aerial photos of the newly renovated First Street.

First Carter calls the Sanford tower to say we will fly over the city and then approach the airport. The air traffic controller confirms and wants us to tell him when we are a mile out.

First Street is beautiful from the air. The pictures won't do it justice, but the red brick gleams from 3,000 feet.

As we head back to the airport, Carter tells me how much he loves his work, and it shows. He commutes from Deland. He recently brought his 5-year-old son and 3-year-old daughter on a flight. The little girl grabbed the yoke and yanked it wide left and

right, he said, clearly enjoying the memory of an experience her dad hopes she will have throughout her life.

He doesn't have his own plane, Carter says. He is an instructor after all.

He tells me that to earn a pilot's license takes at least 40 hours of flight time, and most people take 55 to 60 hours. The cost amounts to about \$4,000 to \$4,500, but can be done in as little as two or three months or, like Carter, over a three-year time period.

Almost a quarter of a million people have taken these introductory flights across the country since 1997. Carter said all types of people take them. A lot of people buy them for Christmas presents, he assumes, because Avion has a lot of introductory flights in the beginning of the year.

Anyone who wants to try flying can register on-line at www.beapilot.com or call toll-free 888-BE A PILOT. More than 2,100 flight schools participate in the program. For more information about Avion Air Academy on Flightline Avenue in Sanford, call 407-328-9997.

On our approach to Sanford airport the sky looks dark to the west. The tower says another plane is arriving. He asks if we can perform a short landing. Having no clue what that might

be, I gladly give Carter the controls. He explains that the controller is doing us a favor by letting us land first. We descend to a smooth landing.

As we taxi back to Avion, Carter looks at me and says, "Well?"

I loved it. The pressure change hurt my ears somewhat, but that didn't last long. I would do it again in a minute, I admit. The

flight has taken about 45 minutes, but we have soared all the way to New Smyrna and back with a couple of circles above Sanford.

I have told everyone about the experience.

I notice the planes taking off around the airport. I never knew so many people flew around Sanford. Every time I see a small plane overhead, I think: I can fly one of those.

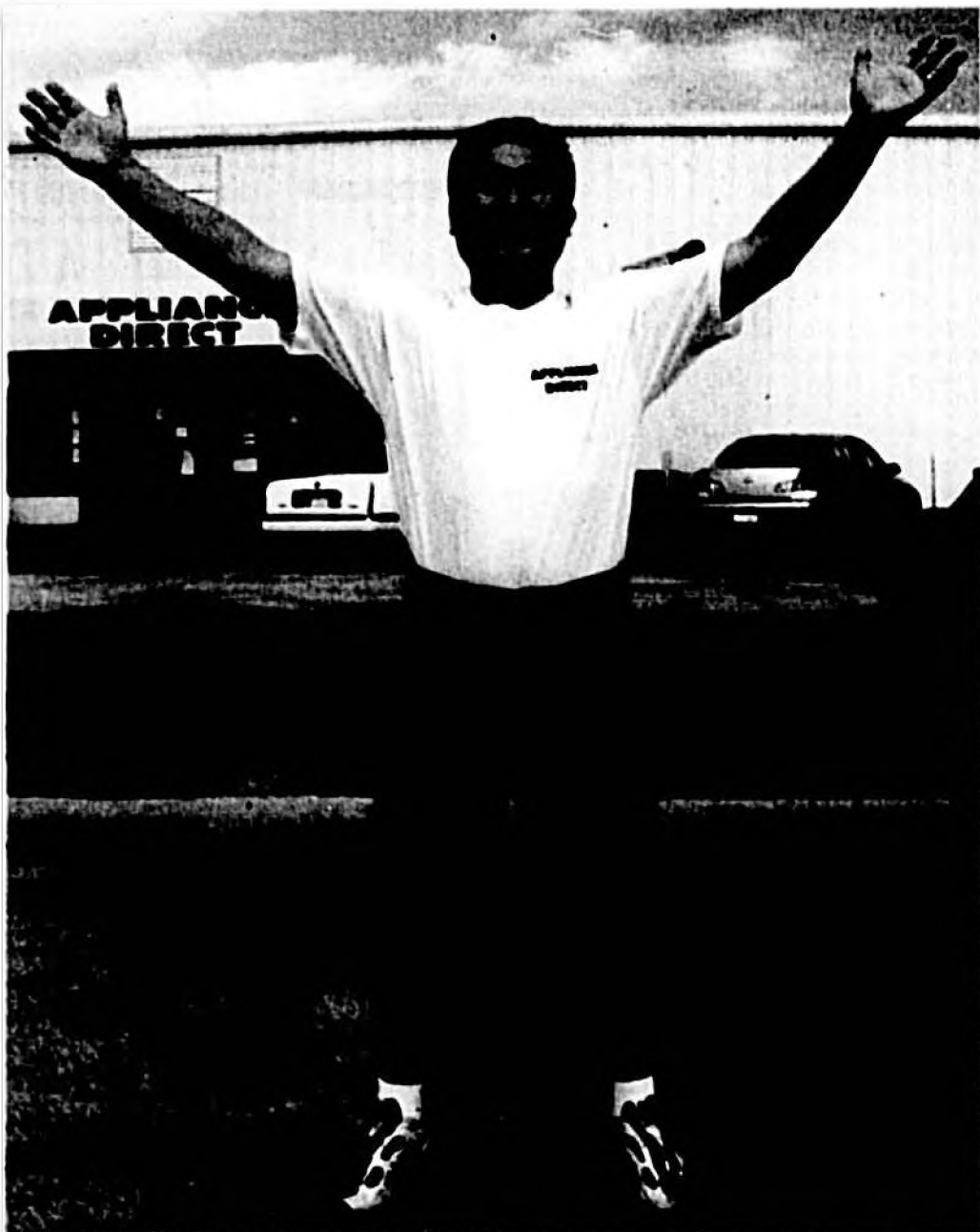

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Appliance Direct: An Immigrant's Story

Appliance Direct

In storybook style, entrepreneur Sam Pak has worked for, and achieved, the American Dream. Since coming to the United States 31 years ago, Pak has built a retail appliance business that is now #1 in Central Florida, and growing. It's a true Horatio Alger tale of a man who pursued his dream and succeeded despite adversity.

Turn back the calendar to 1973. Pak's Korean family is befriended by a U.S. Army officer who helps Pak in his efforts to come to the United States. Pak, then 17, arrives in Florida, stays temporarily with a sister already here, and three days later enrolls at Satellite Beach High School. Three days after that, he lands a job working in the warehouse of a retail appliance firm.

There was just one problem. Pak didn't speak or read a word of English. Despite that, six months later, Pak moved up, and began delivering merchandise. He still couldn't read, so to compensate, he memorized the symbols of the alphabet and matched those to the streets in Brevard County. Because of his phenomenal memory, everyone received the appliances they were expecting. In fact, Pak and his co-worker were so efficient that the appliance company cut its delivery staff from four to two. "We should have asked for a raise," says Pak, laughing. After two years, Pak, then 20, became a salesman, then a manager, and finally, the top dog, running the store.

But destiny was calling. At 29, he started his own company.

Today, that company owns 18 stores, 12 of which are Appliance Direct. Pak, now 48, is CEO; his wife, EunBee, is CFO, and Mark Salmon is President. Since 1998, when the three became partners, the business has grown from a \$4 million operation to one with over \$100 million in sales. And, in the meantime, they've built a successful business model for how to take on the big guys and win. Contrary to popular belief, "We are not in competition with the independents," said Salmon. "There is no money in that. They don't have the market share." The competition is Home Depot, Lowe's and Sears, and in Florida, Appliance Direct is winning. The market in "White Goods," the industry term for appliances, has changed dramatically in recent years, he explained. Dealers used to run on 30 points of gross margin, and some independents still do, "but Appliance Direct operates off a fraction of that margin."

Other factors are in play in the company's success as well. Stores are located outside the high-rent district. Trucks and delivery systems are company owned and operated. And, most important, Appliance Direct purchases direct from the factory, which is where the name comes from. No middle-wares,

no distributors.

"We buy single items by the truck-load, and that makes a huge price difference." That means there might be 400 microwave ovens or 700 cooktops, all one model, on a single truck. "That's truck after truck after truck. They convoy in like a freight train. It's crazy, just crazy," Salmon said, adding: "We like crazy."

The single-mindedness Pak showed in the beginning is evident in the way the company runs now. "Pak's idea of a good time is working or watching the TV show '24,'" said Salmon. He's devoted to the business and to his family. Like many immigrants, Pak's immediate family came to America one family member at a time, as they were able to - and eventually, his parents and six sisters all were here. His father has since died, but Pak stays in constant contact with his mother. He is active in his church, but not in politics - another misconception, said Salmon.

Eight years after coming to America, Pak decided to visit Seoul and his extended family. He arrived wearing blue jeans, without a suit in his bag, and in fact, without any of the old constraints of Korea. "That's when I realized I was an American," he said later. "I knew there was no going back." The trip proved fateful, however. His family repeatedly urged him to meet a Korean woman they thought would make a perfect bride. "No way," he told them. But finally they wore him down, and after meeting EunBee, valedictorian of a prestigious college and a professional ballerina, Sam Pak lost his heart. They've been married for 22 years, the same number of years as Salmon and his wife, Cena, a former electrical engineer, who is now a full-time mom.

"Sam is a good listener," said Salmon. "But he is Old Testament. If a line is crossed, one strike and you're out, although that's not the way he treats customers. EunBee is like the other side of him - humble, petite and polite, and willing to give everyone a second chance. But when it comes to handling money, she's a razor," said Salmon. This toughness has evolved into a company whose unwritten motto is: "It's Never Okay." Salmon explained: "When you think a job is finished, completed - no, it's not. It's never enough. It is never finished. You have to keep pushing yourself, because the market is always in motion."

Pak and Salmon meet for at least two hours daily, working at what Salmon called War Games. "War is about what we think our competitors are going to do. The company is constantly evolving." In 2001, when Circuit City got out of the appliance business, "Every dealer, including Sears, thought they had died and gone to heaven as we all ate up their market share." The reality was

that nationally, Lowe's was rising rapidly to become #2, a position they still hold. Sears maintained first place, Home Depot captured third, and Best Buy fourth. Pak and Salmon predict that nationally Home Depot eventually will be the dominant player in the appliance business.

Yet, in Florida, Appliance Direct is on the top rung. David vs Goliath, and David is doing okay. Pak and Salmon is happy to be in a business dominated by America. "White Goods are the last great American-dominated manufacturing category. The biggest companies are Whirlpool, GE and Frigidaire - and most of their stuff is made in America." They comprise the second-largest users of steel behind the auto industry, and Americans buy these brands, not because they are being patriotic, but because the products are better, said Salmon. "Everything else has been taken away from us. But in appliances, we still do it better than everybody else. I wish everyone would think about that before they buy some foreign pieces." And then he expounds about what's truly scary about some foreign brands: "American stuff is better. Period."

Yet, he welcomes competition. "Anyone living in a competitive market is lucky. It keeps you and your weapons sharp. And ultimately, that is your best security and opportunity." As an example, he cites a Southwest Florida market with little appliance competition and prices 15 percent higher, on average, than one would pay in Orlando. "Ultimately, they are at risk, from us or Home Depot or Lowe's. With competition, you're forced to keep yourself, your staff and your knives sharp."

You wouldn't expect such a tough guy to be a romantic - but Salmon admits, "The truth is, Sam and I both married up." And he offers this advice for those working to succeed: "First, find somebody you love. And second, hope it's a person who inspires you to take on the world, someone who will never let you stay down."

"Both Sam and I have been down at times in our life. But we got up again. That is largely due to our spouses and the way they make us want to feel."

So what's next for Appliance Direct? The entire country? The world? "I'd better let events as they unfold answer that one," said Salmon. "Meanwhile, I guess we're doing okay for a couple of guys flying by the seat of their pants."

UCF and Conference USA have announced the Golden Knights' 2005 football schedule. The schedule features four home games vs. Conference USA competition along with a national television appearance at South Carolina to open the season on Thursday night in primetime on ESPN.

The 2005 schedule for the Golden Knights features 10 games to be played

The Golden Knights will host Marshall in first C-USA game

on Saturday, with the only mid-week game set for Thursday, Sept. 1, on national television.

"We are very happy about the new schedule and are anxious to play in Conference USA," stated UCF head

coach George O'Leary. "Obviously, you would always like to see more home games, but I think we have an outstanding schedule against strong competition in 2005."

"As we start out in a new conference,

we appreciate how accommodating Conference USA was to our unique situation with four home games," commented UCF athletics director Steve Orsini. "We are pleased with the schedule and that the four games are not spread out over an extended period of time, which is an asset both to our players and our fans."

Jones, Harris All-State SCC has 12 honored by conference

SANFORD - With success comes recognition and such is the case for the Seminole Community College basketball program.

With the men's and women's teams both advancing to the Florida Community College Activities Association's (FCCAA)/National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Region VIII Basketball Championship Tournament together for the first time, the coaches in the Mid-Florida Conference took due notice and rewarded the teams and coaches for their efforts.

Veteran men's coach Stan Cromartie was named the Mid-Florida Conference Men's Basketball Coach of the Year after the Raiders won the conference title and a spot in the State Tournament for the first time in 16 years.

But Cromartie received an even bigger honor as he has been nominated for the Florida Community College Activities Association Men's Basketball Hall of Fame.

Cromartie was the starting point guard on back-to-back State Championship winning Manatee Community College teams in the early 1980's and can't be more than a few who have played and coached in the State Tournament.

SCC had two All-State picks in TJ Jones and Kirsten Harris.

To make the All-State Team you have to be one of the top three vote getters in the conference voting.

Jones, a sophomore shooting guard from Orlando who has signed with South Carolina State, wound up the sixth best scorer in the state with a 20.2 points per game average, was 15th in three-point field goal percentage (40-percent), tied for 19th in steals (1.5 per game) and 12th in assists (3.9 per game).

Harris being selected on the women's side shows how much the coaches thought of her ability and her leadership because her individual statistics, on paper, would not be that impressive since no single player on

"Open date" back in football

The Florida High School Athletic Association Board of Directors has approved a revision of the FHSAA sports calendar, expanding the football regular season to 11 weeks and reinstating the "open date" so that a maximum of 10 games can be played in 11 weeks, and making a variety of changes to certain other sports.

Those changes include:

- Fall season - moving beginning dates up one week for football, girls volleyball, swimming & diving, golf and fall soccer. The FHSAA State Golf Series will be played one week earlier, while the state cross country series will occur one week later.

- Winter season - move entire seasons for basketball, winter soccer and wrestling up one week.

- Spring season - move entire seasons for baseball and softball up one week; begin practice for track & field one week earlier.

The Board of Directors also modified and approved a recommendation of the Football Advisory Committee to institute a mandatory running clock if the differential in the score is 35 points or more at the end of the third quarter or any point thereafter. The running clock will be optional in the third quarter at the request of the head coach of the team that is behind. The advisory committee had recommended a 40-point differential.

It was also announced that the Miami-Dade Sports Commission and the Greater Miami Athletic Conference will serve as host organizations for the 2005 and 2006 FHSAA Football Finals Presented by Dodge.

The Class 1A, 1B, 2A and 2B state championship games will be played at Florida International University's

UCF's Striegler, Hudson honored by Atlantic Sun

The Atlantic Sun Conference coaches have selected Georgia State senior guard Fatchia Hartman as the 2004-05 A-Sun Women's Basketball Player of the Year for the second consecutive year.

UCF also came up big in the voting as Gail Striegler won the A-Sun Coach of the Year award after leading the Golden Knights to the A-Sun Regular Season title for the third consecutive year, compiling a 16-4 conference record, and former Lyman star Celeste Hudson earned the A-Sun Defensive Player of the Year honor.

Also, Troy's Amy Lewis earned A-Sun Freshman of the Year honors, the second consecutive year a Lady Trojan has won the award and third time in the last six years.

In earning her second consecutive A-Sun Player-of-the-Year honors, Hartman finished second in the A-Sun in scoring with 16.1 points per game, as well as second in assists with 5.17 per contest. Hartman became just the fifth person in league history to win multiple awards and just the third to do it in consecutive years. The senior was also named first team all-conference for the second straight year.

The rest of this year's A-Sun all-conference first team is identical to both last year's all-conference team and this year's preseason team: Lipscomb's Courtney Boynton, Setson's Kristy Brown, UCF's Hudson, and Belmont's Beandi Miller.

The A-Sun all-conference second team selections include Belmont's Hollie Davis, Troy's

Laura Lee Holman, UCF's All Roberts, Setson's Nefertiti Walker and Florida Atlantic's Shortavia Williams.

Lewis led the group on the A-Sun all-freshman team, after finishing 13th in the A-Sun with 12.8 points per game. Joining Lewis is Campbell's Letitia Dickson, Florida Atlantic's Missy Glass, Lipscomb's Kaleigh Gossman and Belmont's Brooke Sunday.

Voting for all A-Sun honors was completed by the 11 conference head coaches.

The A-Sun also announced the women's basketball all-academic honorees with Lipscomb topping the list with 10 members earning honors. A total of 58 A-Sun women's basketball student-athletes received recognition.

Three-time all-academic champion Belmont was second amongst women's basketball teams with eight honorees, while Setson finished third with seven. Ten of the 11 A-Sun member institutions had at least four student-athletes earn at least a 3.0 GPA during the fall semester.

Gardner-Webb had six student-athletes named to the team this year, while UCF and Troy each finished with five.

For UCF, senior Roberts, junior Hudson and sophomores Kwanita Miles, Lashanda Slade and Courtney Stouss were named to the A-Sun all-academic team.

To be named A-Sun All-Academic, a student-athlete must achieve a 3.0 or higher GPA in the classroom. Belmont is the three-time defending champion of the all-academic trophy, which is given to the institution with the greatest percentage of student-athletes receiving honors.

Community Stadium on Dec. 2-3, 2005 and Dec. 1-2, 2006. The Class 3A, 4A, 5A and 6A state championship games will be played at Dolphin Stadium on Dec. 9-10, 2005 and Dec. 8-9, 2006.

"I am excited to announce that the FHSAA Football Finals will be played in Miami for the next two years," FHSAA Commissioner John A. Stewart said. "The FHSAA staff was fortunate to have five outstanding proposals from which to choose. The proposal submitted by the Miami-Dade Sports Commission, however, was far and away the most impressive. FIU Community Stadium and Dolphin Stadium both are outstanding facilities that will ensure all 16 state finalist teams have championship-caliber surfaces on which to play."

Said Mike Sophia, Executive Director of the Miami-Dade Sports Commission: "We are very pleased and excited to have the opportunity to host the FHSAA Football Finals in Miami-Dade County. We look forward to having the student athletes, coaches, administrators and fans come down to Miami to compete, to enjoy our facilities and hospitality, and to celebrate one of the great events in all of sports. We are truly committed to making this a very special event for everyone involved."

Organizations representing the cities of Fort Lauderdale, Gainesville, Orlando and Tallahassee also submitted proposals. The proposal submitted by the Gainesville Sports Organizing Committee, which has hosted the finals at the University of Florida six of the last eight years, was the other finalist.

Other cities to host the FHSAA Football Finals Presented by Dodge since the event was consolidated and moved to a central site in 1989 are Daytona Beach and Tallahassee. Miami last hosted a state football championship game in 1983 when Manatee (Bradenton) defeated Miami Southridge 27-21 for the Class 4A championship at Tamiami Stadium.

"Almost a quarter of our member schools and a third of our state's population are located in Palm Beach, Broward and Miami-Dade counties," Stewart said. "Thirty-three of the 116 schools that have reached the FHSAA Finals in the past 10 years have come from those counties. They have traveled to Daytona Beach, Gainesville and even Tallahassee and have not once complained that they had to do so. We think they are long overdue an opportunity to play close to home for a change."

Stewart said that the FHSAA staff will work closely with Miami-Dade Sports Commission and GMAC officials to ensure that the FHSAA Football Finals Presented by Dodge are a first-class experience for everyone involved. He is particularly pleased with many of the plans the two organizations already have proposed to assist the schools that advance teams to the event.

"It was clear from the start that Miami really, really wanted this event," Stewart said. "Key groups from the Miami-Dade County Commission to the Miami Dolphins organization itself have thrown their support behind the event. Just the possibility of hosting the event has created a buzz in their community. We're confident that this announcement will be met with even greater enthusiasm."
FIU Community Stadium is

located on the campus of Florida International University. The 17,000-seat stadium is home to the NCAA Division I FIU Golden Panthers and has a state-of-the-art AstroPlay artificial surface.

Dolphin Stadium, the home field of the NFL's Miami Dolphins, has a natural Prescription Athletic Turf surface. It was the site of Super Bowl XXIII in 1989, Super Bowl XXXIX in 1995 and Super Bowl XXXIII in 1999, and will host Super Bowl XLII in 2007. Dolphin Stadium also is the site of the FedEx Orange Bowl, which doubled as the 2000 and 2004 BCS national championship games.

The final football districts for the next three years have been released with the only change from the original line-ups being Lake Howell's requested reassignment from Class 4A-District 7 to Class 5A-District 3 being approved.

Part of the good news with the new set-up is that the Seminole Athletic Conference is nearly intact and is assured of at least two teams making the Class 6A regionals every year.

Lake Brantley, Lake Mary, Oviedo, Seminole and Winter Springs are the only schools in Class 6A-Region 1-District 5.

Lake Howell is joined in Class 5A-Region 1-District 3 by Lyman, Mainland and Pine Ridge.

Trinity Prep is the lone local team in Class 2B-Region 3-District 5 and will compete with Crescent City, Pierson-Taylor, the Villages and Wildwood for regional berths.

The rest of the Seminole County schools playing football are in Class 1B-Region 2-District 4. County entries Lake Mary Prep, Orangewood Christian and The Master's Academy along with Deltona-Trinity Christian and South Daytona-Warner Christian make up the district.

The Board of Directors also approved a reclassification plan for team sports other than football that divides the member high schools into six classes with a "108-108-108-80-80-All Remaining" breakdown for the upcoming commitment cycle. The Board made no significant changes to the classification policy currently in place for individual sports.

It will be easy to tell the district set-ups for most schools in the other sports as Lake Brantley, Lake Mary, Lyman, Oviedo, Seminole and Winter Springs will all be in Class 6A-Region 1-District 3 and Lake Howell will be in Class 5A-Region 2-District 5 in baseball, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, softball and girls volleyball.

Joining the Silver Hawks will be Mainland, New Smyrna Beach and Seabreeze.

The newest school in the county, Hagerty High in Oviedo which will open this fall with only freshmen and then grow one class every year, has been slotted into Class 4A-Region 2-District 8 along with Bishop Moore, Celebration, Eustis, Harmony, St. Cloud, Groveland-South Lake and Tavares in all of the sports.

But it gets a little complicated after that as different schools are in different classes, regions and districts in different sports.

Following are a listing of where Trinity Prep, Crooms, Lake Mary Prep, The Master's Academy and Orangewood Christian slot in in the different sports.

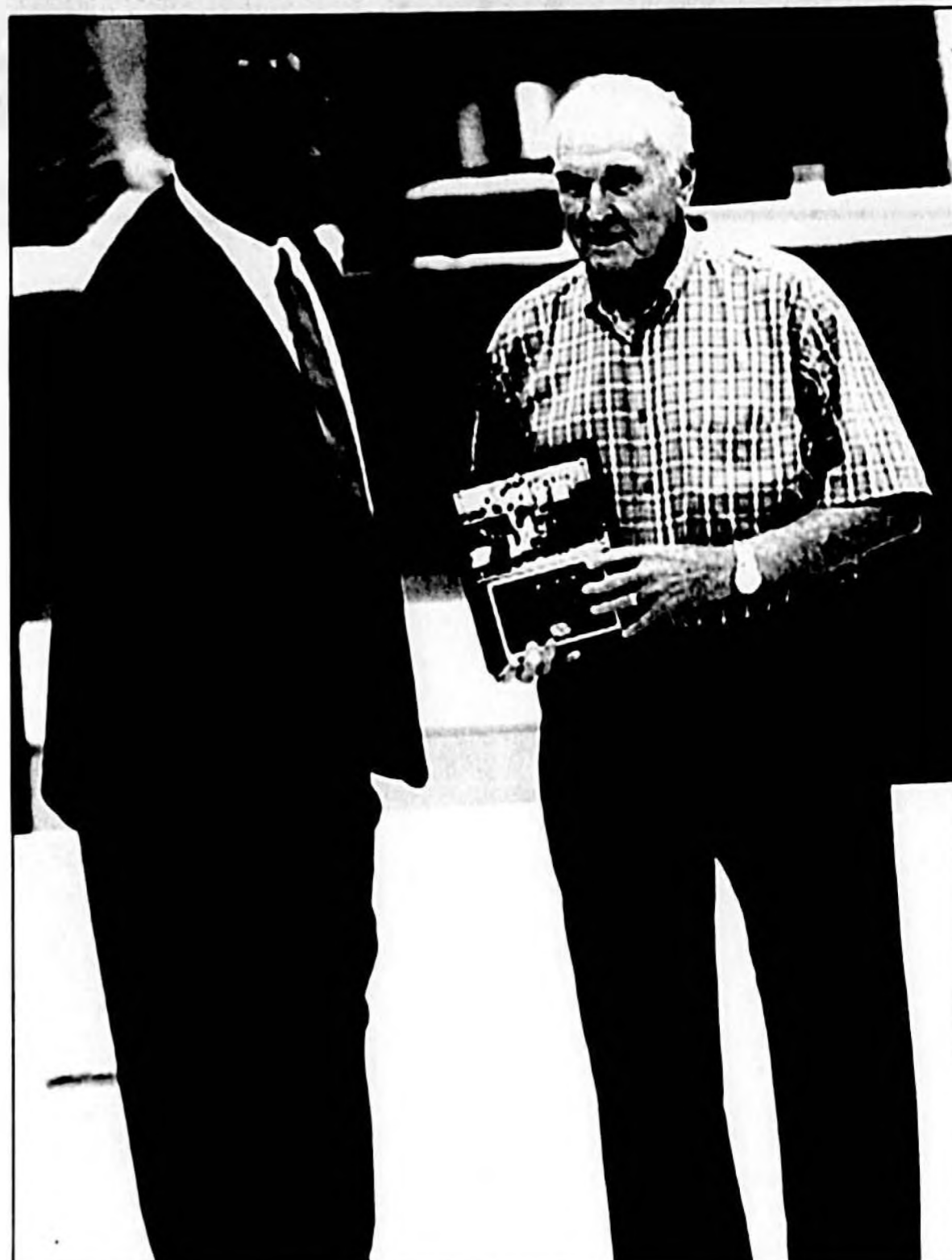

The Raiders roster, because of the team's outstanding depth, averaged much more than 20 minutes a game.

The 6-foot-1 sophomore from Ft. Lauderdale showed her worth in many ways as she was a starting power forward, but also filled in at center and started a couple of games at point guard because of injuries.

Sanford resident and Lake Mary High grad Lyndon Merthie was also a Mid-Florida Conference Men's First Team selection after his outstanding play the latter half of the season.

The 6-foot-3 guard / forward opened the season as a back-up to Jones but after he became a starter in December he became of the team's most feared weapons and was named the Player-of-the-Week for the final week of the season after scoring 28, 20 and nine points. In the final state statistics Merthie was 21st in three-point percentage (36-percent), 17th in free throw percentage (77-percent) and tied for 19th in steals (1.5 per game).

Three other Raider men, sophomore's Will Graham and Kemaime Samuels and freshman Lamont Houston, were named All-Mid-Florida Conference Honorable Mention.

Graham, the high-flying 6-foot-8 forward from Cross City, came on strong late in the season also, and wound up second in the state in field goal percentage (67-percent) and 10th in blocked shots (1.5 per game).

Samuels, the 7-foot center from Jamaica, was 25th in field goal percentage (54-percent) and third in blocked shots (2.7 per game).

Houston, a 5-foot-7 point guard from Bradenton, was the director of the offense and defense and finished third in the state in assists (6.7 per game) and 17th in steals (1.8 per game).

In addition to Harris, coach Lisa Nuxol's women also had three other All-Mid-Florida Conference First Team picks after a 21-8 regular season.

Sophomore Abena "Bobo" Bosia from Orlando teamed with Harris to give the young Raiders some experience and leadership on the floor. The 5-foot-11 forward carried the offense for the team early in the conference season.

The other two first teamers were freshman in 6-foot-4 center Lynette Jackson and shooting guard Ronke Allen.

Jackson, from Fayetteville, North Carolina, was huge in the middle off the bench for the Raiders this season, leading the team in scoring on several occasions, but she really made her presence felt on defense with her rebounding and shot blocking ability.

Allen, a lefthander from Miami, was the outside shooter counted on to take the pressure off Harris, Bosia and Jackson inside and did so very well. She also did an admirable job of filling in at point guard.

The final SCC selection was sophomore point guard Tiffany Scott from Port St. Lucie who had to carry the load at point after fellow freshman Irimar Hernandez was injured and missed most of the final three weeks of the season. More known for defense, Scott did a good job of running the offense in Hernandez's absence.

that were bowl-eligible in 2004, including the season-opener at South Carolina Sept. 1 in Columbia. The game will air on ESPN, marking the fourth consecutive season UCF has opened the year on ESPN. The showdown vs. the Gamecocks is also the first televised college football game on ESPN in 2005.

The non-conference portion of the schedule continues on Sept. 17 at regional foe USF. The highly anticipated match-up between the two schools is the first of a home-and-home series scheduled with the Bulls.

UCF begins a new era of football on Sept. 24 when Marshall visits the Florida Citrus Bowl in the Golden Knights' first Conference USA game. The Golden Knights and Thundering Herd have previously played the past three seasons as members of the Mid-American Conference.

UCF sounds out non-conference action Oct. 1 at Louisiana-Lafayette. The two schools have not met since the 2001 season when UCF blanked the Ragin Cajons 31-0 in Orlando.

The Golden Knights return to the Florida Citrus Bowl Oct. 8 when they host Memphis. The Tigers tied for second in C-USA with a 5-3 conference record and an 8-4 overall record including an appearance in the GMAC Bowl.

UCF visits Southern Miss for the first time ever Oct. 15 in Hattiesburg. The Golden Eagles also finished in a tie for second in C-USA in 2004 with a 5-3 record and ended the season with a victory over North Texas in the Wyndham New Orleans Bowl.

Tulane visits the Florida Citrus Bowl Oct. 22 for the first time. UCF won the only meeting between the two schools 36-29 in 2001 at the Superdome.

The Golden Knights continue their road swing in C-USA Oct. 29 at East Carolina. UCF has played ECU four times in school history, but the two have not met since 1996.

UCF closes the regular season with three games in November. Houston visits Orlando Nov. 5 while the Golden Knights head to UAB Nov. 12. The Golden Knights close out the 2005 regular season Nov. 19 at Rice.

The 2005 season also marks the first year for the Conference USA championship game. The winner of the Eastern Division (East Carolina, Marshall, Memphis, Southern Miss, UAB and UCF) will face the winner of the Western Division (Houston, Rice, SMU, Tulsa, Tulane and UTEP). The school with the best conference winning percentage for the season will host the championship game on either December 2nd or December 3rd.

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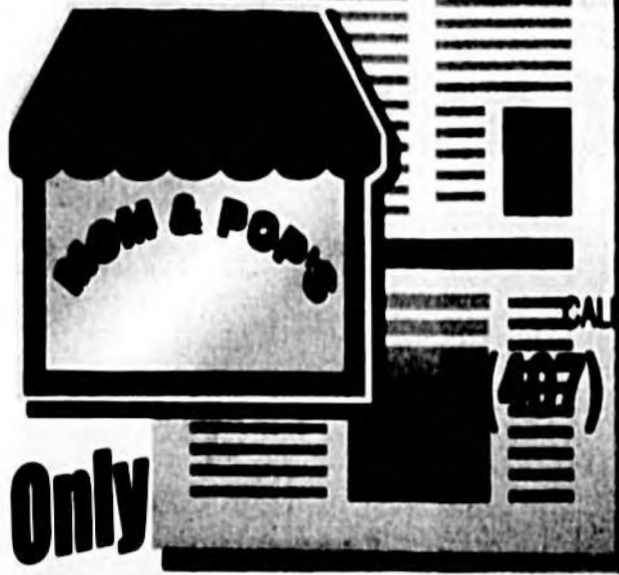
