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U.S. Recycling Plan Better

On the surface, the disagreement between the United States of America and the Common Market nations over recycling of petrodollars appears to be one of means rather than ends. The plan advocated by Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and the plan supported by Common Market finance ministers both would provide a pipeline for money to flow back to countries whose currency reserves are being drained to the danger point by heavy purchases of Arab oil.

The Europeans want to set up a facility to channel petrodollars back to oil-importing nations through the International Monetary Fund. This would give the recycling program a broad base involving the industrialized nations, the developing world and the Arabs themselves - all members of the IMF. Mr. Kissinger wants the recycling done through the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, a new group limited to industrial nations and also concerned with cooperative action on other aspects of the energy problem.

Spanish Talks

American diplomats negotiating a new agreement for use of our strategically important military bases in Spain see no easy success in prospect. The five-year "agreement of friendship and cooperation" between the United States of America and Spain does not expire until next summer, but the serious problems already identified will probably require that long to resolve.

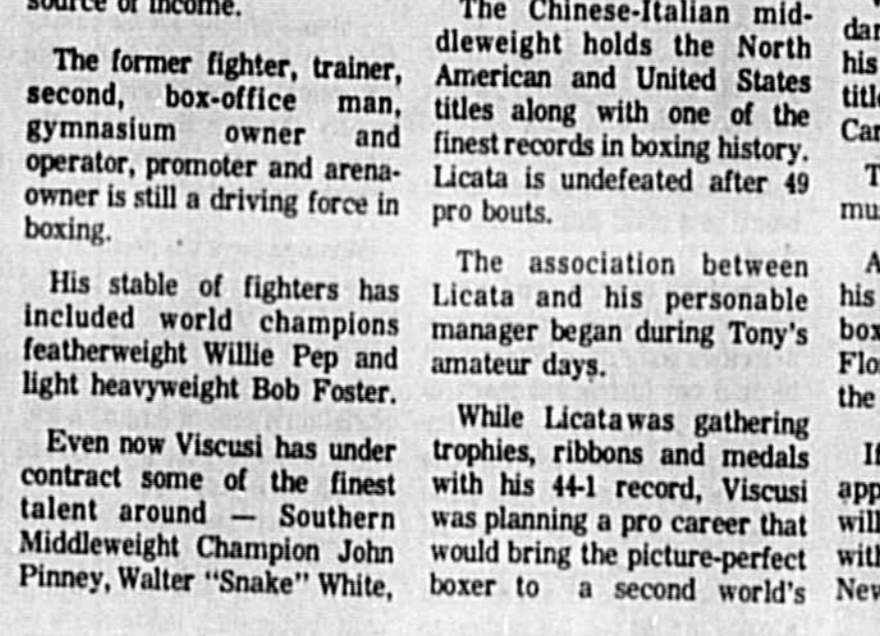

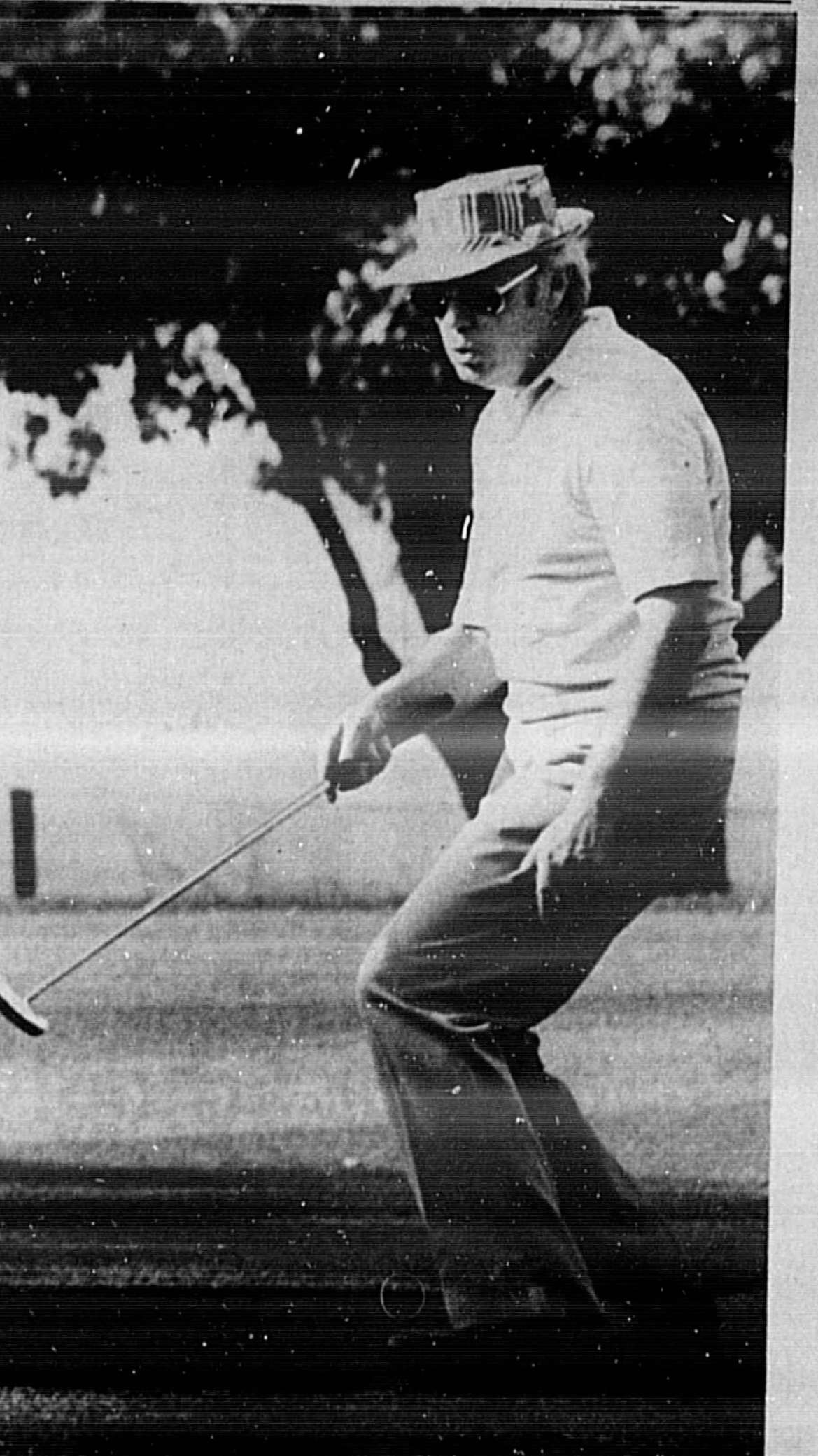

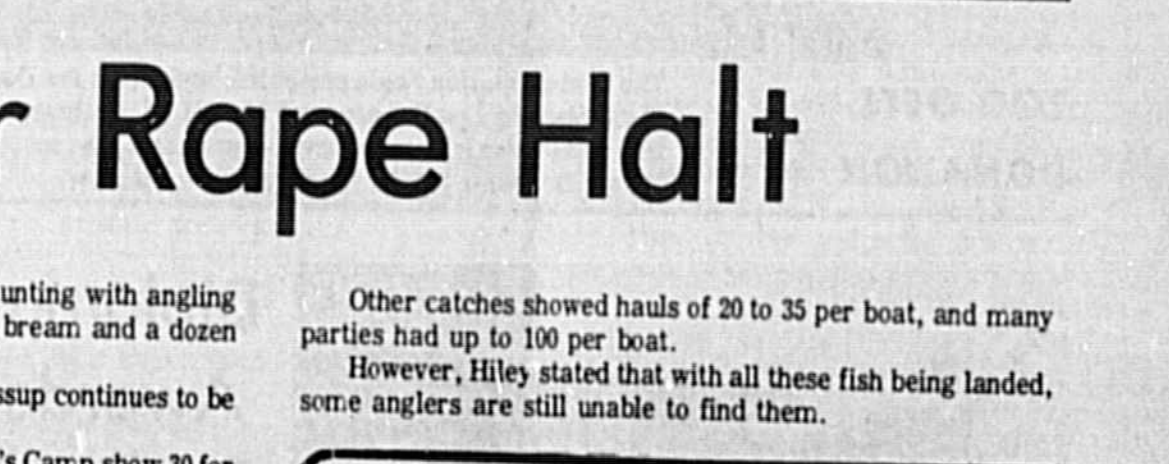
Lon Viscusi poses with his top fighter, Tony Licata of Luz. Viscusi is training Licata for a world championship bout with Carlos Monzon.

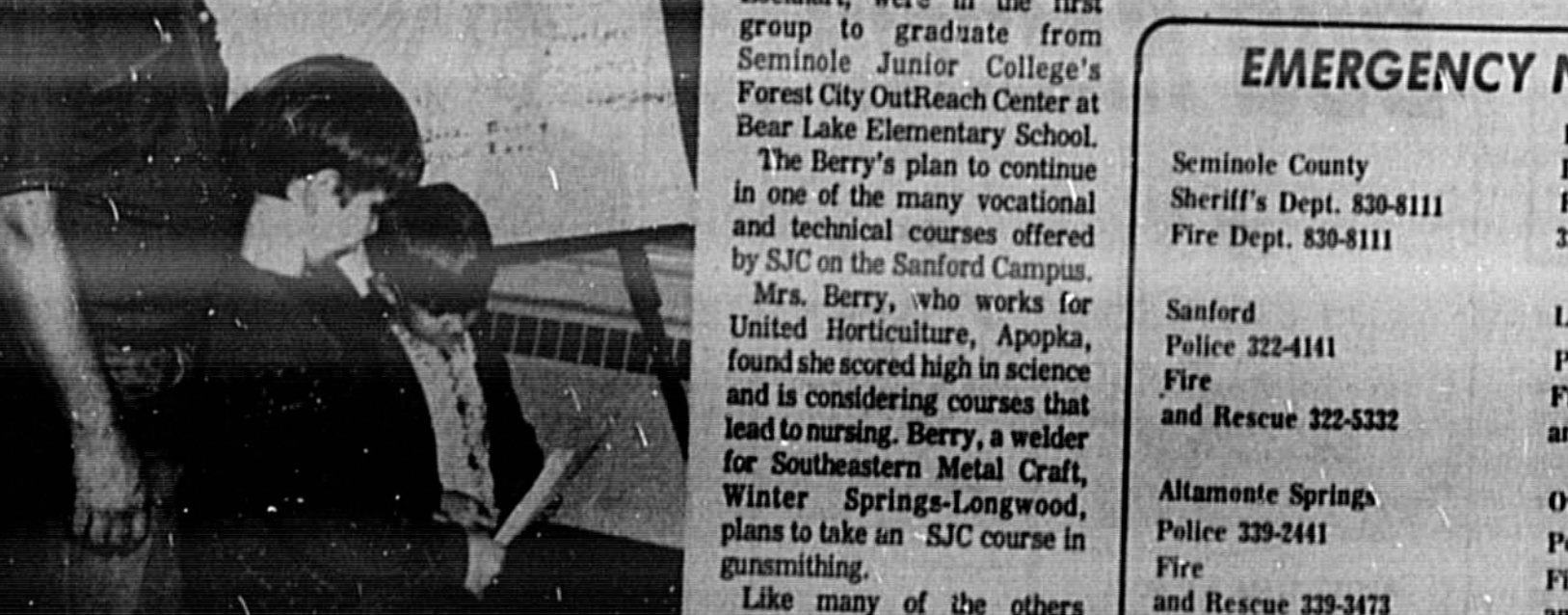
School and health officials disagree as to the degree of contamination in the lake, but they agree that whatever hazard exists, it is not sufficient to warrant any priority action.

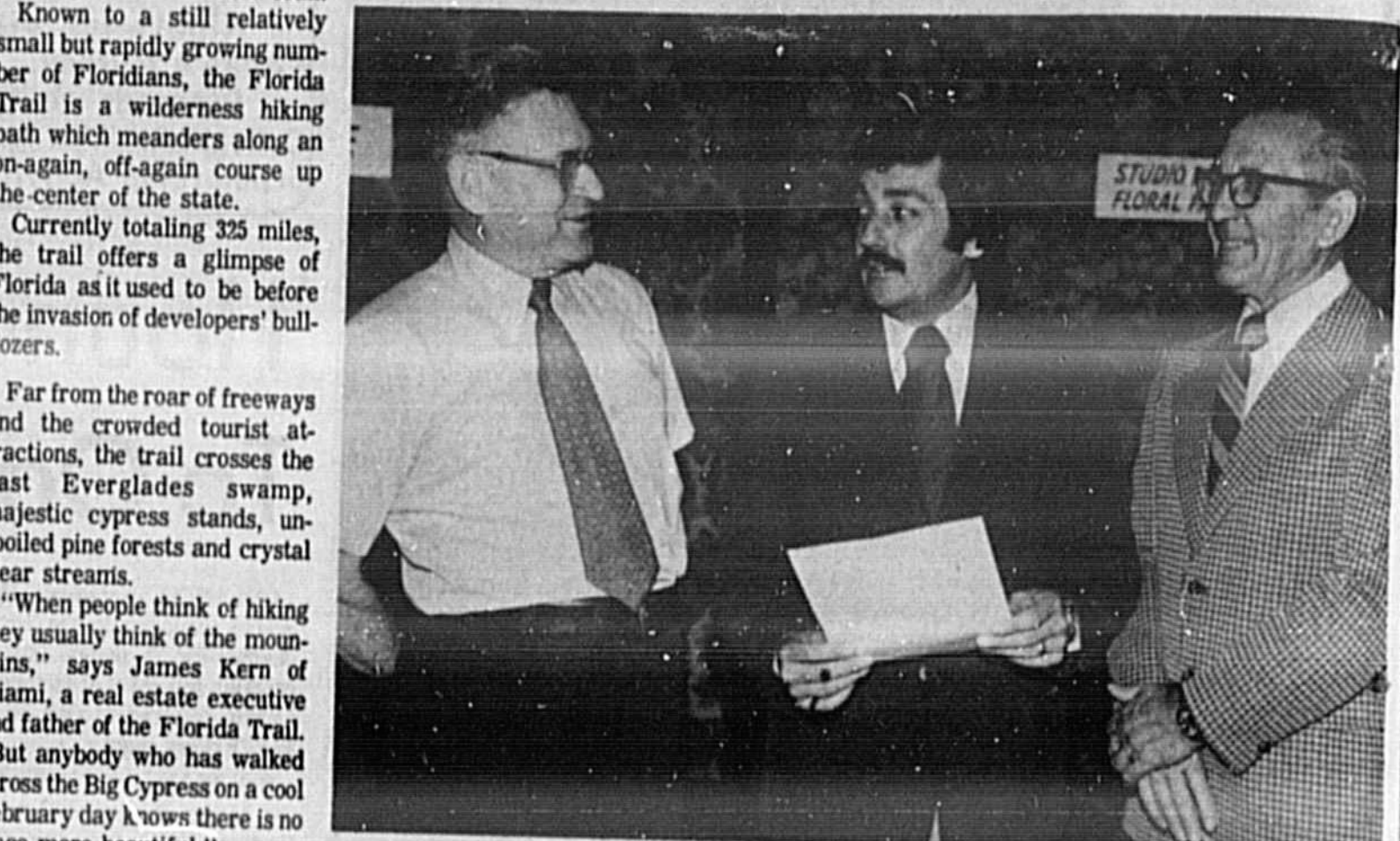

Fuller raised some interesting questions about the law's effect. "If an employee in the Capitol on the first floor takes sick and goes to the legislative clinic under this law they'll have to register or have the time deducted from their pay," he said.

Except for his exemption, Fuller said he would have to file a time card to take his wife, Audrey, a House committee staffer, out to lunch or go to their car in her House garage parking place.

Kiser said he had no objections to a few persons in each agency such as Fuller handling legislative affairs, but he was trying to halt the practice of dozens of employees from one agency registering as lobbyists.

He noted that it was not unusual for 20 or 30 agency "monitors" to show at committee meetings or sit in the galleries watching the Legislature in action.

For "the ladies" have special significance to those in the 3HO.

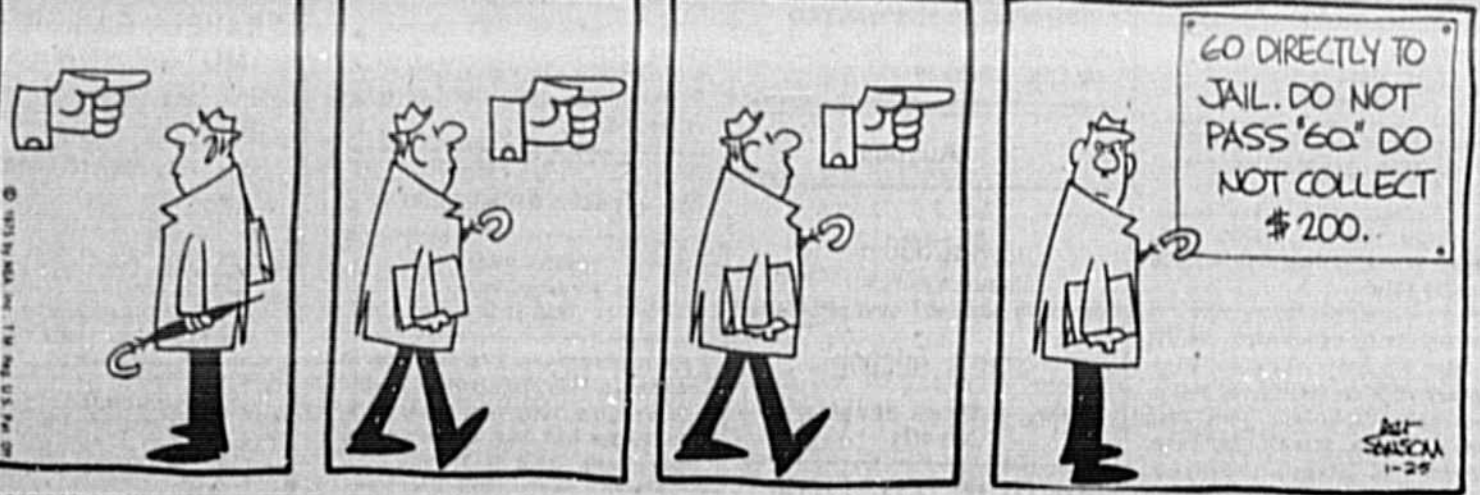
