

5,000 Low-Cost Houses Needed

Editor's Note: The Ad Hoc Committee on Low and Moderate Income Housing was established by the Seminole County Commissioners in mid-1974. Its purpose was to study the housing situation, identify the problems and come up with recommeded solutions to them. The committee finished its work this week and submitted a final report of its findings over the last six months. Today, the Herald reviews the report itself.

There is a serious shortage of both low and moderate income housing in Seminole County, according to a final report issued by an ad hoc committee this week.

And this shortage not only creates hard times for those seeking such housing, but it "retards the development of our human resources as well as the growth of our economy," according to the report. Yet, the solutions are not simple ones.

observer of county life. There are 4,000 homes that exist here within the low and moderate income range are shoddy dilapidated, substandard -- an insult to human

This finding is not a new one to even the casual

dignity. There are neighborhoods in practically every Seminole city that show signs of decay, that

harbor "homes" that are deteriorating, that have no adequate plumbing facilities. Of the 4,000 such dwellings that exist in the county, most of them are centered in the areas of Bookertown, Georgetown, Goldsboro, Midway, Oviedo, and Altamonte, according to the report. The substandard housing in all six areas is essen-

tially restricted to poor blacks.

"In some cases," the report notes, "new, medium-priced houses have been built in some areas." Yet, every home in these areas are considered substandard because of its surroundings. While there is a very real need for low cost housing, the majority of the type of homes being built is in the upper income family range.

"One factor influencing this situation is there is more profit to be made building the higher priced homes," according to the report. "In order to make a profit building lower priced houses, the builder must keep a tight schedule and control his costs.'

In a day and age where skill is not as important as the profit margin, the tendency in the housing industry - as in other large-scale industries - is away from quality and towards quantity.

But, besides an utilitarian-inspired complacency on the part of the builders, there are other factors

And according to at least one HARRY KWIATKOWSKI

"The day of the \$1,000 lot is gone in Seminole for land that has required utilities and a reasonable location," the report explains. Lot costs range from \$3,000 in a high density development, to \$5,000 in one of the lower density. This factor, alone, seems to "preclude the use of low density housing as a solution to the low and possibly even the moderate income housing shortage."

The price of a home with all costs (15 per cent for a lot, 60 percent for construction and labor, and 25 per cent for financing and other overhead items) has increased from \$17,000 with a \$15,000 mortgage. to more than \$31,000 with a \$25,000 mortgage in a few years. In addition, the interest rate on the mortgage has also increased, resulting in a 100 per cent jump in payments over a four-year period.

The report finds 5,000 low and moderate houses are needed from now to 1980. But, a thousand units per year, under present circumstances, is too much to hope for, since the housing industry produces only 6,000 units a year - most of which are in the higher price range.

Tomorrow: What can be done to improve this situation, and the reactions of county officials who are charged, by the report, with the responsibility for implementing them.

For each trial, jurors are selected by lot from

The lawyers for either side may reject any prospective juror "for cause" by stating some reason why he should not serve as a juror. For example, he may be related to one of the parties involved in the case.

Each side may also reject a limited number of prospective jurors, without stating any reason. This is called "peremptory"

Excused persons are replaced in the jury box, or seats where the jurors will sit, by new prospective jurors from the panel. These in turn may be rejected or accepted by the lawyers trying the case. The selection of a jury sometimes takes several days. Jurors receive a small payment for each day's







U.S. Recycling Plan Better

On the surface, the disagreement between the United States of America and the Common Market nations over recycling of petrodollars appears to be one of means rather than ends. The plan advocated by Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and the plan supported by Common Market finance ministers both would provide a pipeline for money to flow back to countries whose currency reserves are being drained to the danger point by heavy purchases of Arab oil.

The Europeans want to set up a facility to channel petrodollars back to oil-importing nations through the International Monetary Fund. This would give the recycling program a broad base involving the industrialized nations, the developing world and the Arabs themselves - all members of the IMF. Mr. Kissinger wants the recycling done through the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, a new group limited to industrial nations and also concerned with cooperative action on other aspects of the energy

Since the recycled dollars would probably get to the same needy nations by either plan, why all the fuss? Obviously the Europeans feel that the dominant influence which the United States might exert in the OECD would be diluted if recycling went through the IMF. Less evident, perhaps, is the fact that the Europeans are still uneasy about Mr. Kissinger's strategy of confronting the Arabs with an organized counterweight to their oil cartel, which is what he envisions the OECD to be.

The Western European nations have been cool toward the idea of a "confrontation" with the Arabs because they are almost wholly dependent on Middle Eastern oil. They are emphasizing cooperation with the sheiks. However, the Arabs, for their part, have shown no inclination to cooperate by establishing a more realistic price for oil which would be less crippling to the world

If the Europeans do not want to look at their plight as a confrontation now, how much deeper into debt to the Arabs must they sink before they do? Mr. Kissinger is simply looking farther down the road. Europe, Japan and the United States now have the economic strength to bargain with the Arabs, who need us as customers for their oil and who need the technology and manufactured goods that only we can supply.


Petrodollars can probably be recycled as well through the IMF as through the OECD, but recycling must be coupled with a concerted effort by the major oil consumers to break the monopoly which the Arabs are now exploiting exclusively for their own economic and political aggrandizement. If it is not, the consuming nations eventually will discover that it is their own political and economic independence which has been recycled into Arab

The "vague and loosely worded" 1947 statute creating the Central Intelligence Agency is the kind of stuff lawyers feed on. Yet it is clear that domestic intelligence activities by the agency are not authorized by federal law. So states The Research Group, Inc., a legal research service for attorneys.

"We have researched the enabling legislation governing the CIA's operations, and while the statutes are vague and even loosely worded in parts, still the only interpretation possible is that the agency is barred from domestic intelligence activities," says James L. Arnold of The Research Group's Charlottesville, Va., office. A federal law of July 26, 1947 gave the CIA power "to correlate and evaluate intelligence relating to national security" but stressed that "the agency shall have no police, subpoena, lawenforcement powers or internal - security func-

\$200 Million Deficit Feared

MONTREAL (AP) - Staging the 1976 Summer Olympic Games in the best facilities possible has become a matter of honor, but the price of honor remains to be established Despite continued assurances from Montreal Mayor Jean Drapeau that the Games would be self-financing, the Quebec government now has accepted that a deficit of more than \$200 million will result.

Before hearings by the national assembly's standing committee on municipal affairs in Quebec City this week, Premier Robert Bourassa formally undertook to find ways of covering the deficit. He suggested that since Montreal would inherit about

The premier's commitment to finance part of the deficit perhaps was foreshadowed by a fateful coincidence May 12, 1970. In Amsterdam, Montreal was awarded the 1976 Summer Games by the International Olympic Committee. In Quebec City, Premier Bourassa's new Liberal government was sworn in.



After a turbulent decade fraught with talk of revolution, flower power, acid highs and freaked out scenes, Western youth has turned its face East, seeking to find itself, its place in this teeming, oft time troubled technological

Dropouts are dropping in again — albeit some through an unusual and unconventional

From the East and its mystical religion some of our young people are finding the inspiration, the spiritual strength to cope with and participate more fully in the life of the Western world.

Adults, too, are finding Eastern thought and yoga an aid to handling the hassles of modern life, and facets of contemporary movements

in psychology are drawing on Far Eastern precepts and practices to develop new techniques and theories of therapy.

But it may be the young people who are most deeply and dramatically involved in creating total new lifestyles for themselves based in part on Far Eastern religions.

mysticism and yoga, they are forging new fashioned vitures of work, home, motherhood and love of God and country - with dedication and self-imposed discipline that far exceeds what the "straight world might have expected of them.

One such group of young people - now in their mid-twenties - lives in Altamonto

This is their story - or at least part of it.

Healthy, Happy

And Holy Lives

Wha Guru Welcomes You

Or are they?

Incongruously, this handmade and rather exotic looking sign stands beneath the mammoth blue column of the ordinary looking water tower in Altamonte Springs. It stands in the yard adjacent to the tower, and is the first hint there is something different about the large plain white house which sits in the middle of the neat, grassed

This place is an "ashram" for the Sikh Dharma Brotherhood of the 3HO. "Ashram," in Christian terms, would mean a kind of temporary retreat of a religious nature. To the 3HO, it is a spiritual center where yoga is practised and members

live communally and monogamously. "3HO" stands for Healthy, Happy and Holy - the aim of the 25 people who live inside the ashram. These people (young men and women with their children) are Americans from all walks of life who have chosen to adopt this neo-Eastern religion and way of life.

Their goals are surely almost identical - to lead healthy, happy, holy lives. Simply, they go about achieving them in a different fashion. The movement they belong to has its roots in the 500-

And they are no more weird than you or I.

year-old Sikh movement of India, formed of both Hindus and Moslems - otherwise antagonistic religious groups. "Sikh" means student, seeker, says Sampuran, the young director of this ashram. The modern American Sikh movement is a worldwide organization headquartered in Los Angeles. It has more than 100 centers throughout the Western world.

The basic principles of the 3HO, Sampuran says, include a belief in one God, living righteously, giving selflessly, working, sharing the fruits of one's work, and keeping one's self in a natural, pure condition.

The tracts of the movement also prescribe an almost puritanical code of sexual behavior, a belief in man as protector and provider, marriage as sacred and divorce as tragedy. "Sex is a creative act" and ". . . overindulgence in sex is sheer folly . . ." read some of the writings of the movement.

And while women work, and may pursue careers, the movement teaches that "with sweetness, gentleness, tact and humility, woman can rule the world by ruling her

All of the members of the group have adopted Eastern names, symbolic in part of their starting completely new lives. Reluctant to talk about their personal backgrounds, they are eager to talk instead about their present way of



life and where they hope it will lead.

Sampuran acknowledges that some of the members found their way to the 3HO movement through revelations experienced by taking drugs, revelations of "unity" and "oneness" and a desire to find more meaning in life than a purely materialistic one.

But to turn to 3HO, means to turn away from drugs. For 3HO demands strict abstinence from all drugs alcohol, coffee, cigarettes, as well as the drugs of the now defunct Hippie subculture.

"We're a spiritual movement, but we want to serve in the community," says Sat Ha Na Man, "We've been reinspired in true patriotism, we believe that by serving God we can serve the nation.'

A member of a war-protesting generation, he says he is now interested in joining a military reserve unit. Not all have taken the "drug route" to 3HO. Many found their way to such a movement because it was an antidote to the anxiety and alienation they experienced

They sought a spiritual base for their lives and the 3HO movement spoke to them. During this interview, Sampuran were a white turban

trying to fit into the fast-paced, materialistic modern life

and the white "kurtas" and "churidas" - shirt and pants - that are the mark of the men in this sect. While they wear other clothes for normal, work-a-day situations, the followers of 3HO believe in covering their hair whenever practical -- the men, with turbans; the women, with white "chunis" or veils. Nor do they cut their

The long hair and coverings are symbols-reminders to themselves and to the world that they are trying to live a spiritual life as well as a worldly one.

And while the practice of Kundalini yoga is an important part of life in this ashram, Sampuran stresses, "We don't spend all of our time trying to be in deep meditation, we don't withdraw, hide out or escape from

Instead, yoga seems to be a means of helping them cope with the world . . . "to keep up positive vibrations so that when we are dealing with hassles we can still be relaxed, calm," says Sampuran.

Each day they rise at 3:30 a.m., take cold showers. and take part in the "Sadhana" - two hours of yoga exercises and chanting and meditation. Then, off to work like the rest of the world to support

themselves and their ashran. Members of the ashram have started a landscaping business called "Nanak's," named after the first "guru" or teacher. Those who do not work in the landscaping business have other jobs and contribute their earnings to

the ashram. "The ladies," as Sampuran always refers to women wirk as demestics, but not in the landscaping business. "It just wouldn't be right for them to be digging and hauling sed and doing things like that," says Sampuran.

For "the ladies" have special significance to those in "God is called by a female name, Adishakti . . . ;

female force, the primal energy of creation," Sampuran explains. Women, as bearers of children, are "the hope of humanity," to the followers of this religious movement. "We believe women are more powerful, more graceful, more important than men," Sampuran adds.

He says they hope to expand their business someday to include a nursery or a greenhouse where the ladies can work. An ultimate goal is vegetarian restaurant. For all the exotic rationale behind Sampuran's discussion, a newly born practicality is evident.

He says he is studying accounting now. "Before I put down studying things like engineering and accounting." Mahan Kirn Kaur is a quiet, flaxen-haired young woman expecting her first child in June. Like the other women in the ashram, married and single, she works several days a week as a domestic, then at least two days in the communal nursery in the ashram, the "Khalsa school." The women also teach yoga to the public at the

ashram, every night except Wednesday and Sunday. "Khalsa" means "pure ones," and children, to these young men and women, are something very special. "We see them as God's children, and we relate to them not so much as babies, but as individuals with higher consciousness," Mahan Kirn explains. "We are taught to put

But they are also taught not to over-protect or smother the children. Infants live with their parents in separate quarters, but must spend their days in the nursery, not only for practical reasons, but also because they need to be free of their mothers, to "grow up free and clear of neuroses," and not too dependent upon their mothers, according to Sampuran. The one child in the ashran who is old enough, attends a regular public school. Mahan Kirn plans to have natural childbirth at the ashram, with the aide of a midwife and members of the ashram. Several children have already been born there in this manner, with husbands assisting. This is a matter of

choice, not religious dogma or rule. As we leave, we are curious about the future of the

Baba Siri Chand Ashram - now two years in Altamonte Springs - and these young men and women who, in their own way, are finding their way back to the main stream. And we puzzle at the sign: Sat Nam, Wha Guru Welcomes You.

Sat. . . Truth is His Name. Wha Guru. . . Oh ecstacy, Teacher.

We think that's what the sign means; we think we understand something of what we have been told by Sampuran and the others. But we wender if, being only an ordinary, more-or-

less conventional product of our day and age, if we have any idea what all this really means. . . to live a Healthy, Happy, Holy life as these young men and women are trying to do.

sunlight and well-drained soil for best performance. It is often damaged by temperatures pruned immediately after within bounds.

These vines are often used cover a fence, an arbor, or unwanted tree. A word of caution should be added! The flame vine is capable of covering everything in sight and may even kill trees b excluding light as it covers the tree's canopy.

Flame vines may be propagated by soft wood cuttings or simple layerage. Most nurseries in the area have
