

World Looks To U.S. For Leadership

WASHINGTON - (NEA) - If U.S. prestige is declining in the world, it's our own doing, For wherever one looks, influential leaders behind the scenes are urgently begging this country to take over leadership. This is true in Japan, West Germany, Britain, Italy, Egypt, Israel and the Middle East, much of Latin America and in some of Africa.

Statemen from London to Bonn to Rome have made clear that if the U.S. economy falters badly, West Europe will go down. The Japanese echo this concern. Equivalent messages come in from much of the underdeveloped world. A new piece of research illustrates with astounding clarity the heavy economic dependence of the non-industrialized nations on the American market, technology and leadership.

A series of reports attest to the fact that major Arab nations, beginning with Saudi Arabia, are more confident in the U.S. future than in that of any other nation. This is evidenced by the growing number of Arab investments in the United States, by the deposit of Arab funds in American banks and the growing desire of Arab governments to secure the services of American technology. Since most of the oil-rich lands will be dependent on these investments when their petroleum resources are depleted, the Arabs obviously are tying their economic future to that of the United States. Therefore, other nations wishing to share in the petrodollar pool, apparently will need to borrow through American

For the time being at least, the Chinese fear the Russians and the Russians the Chinese. Both thus need this country. Which major country, other than the United States can be trusted by both the Israeli and the Egyptians? That terrible word has become a "no no" for the typical American family in meeting expenses, but what of the high school athletic director whose plight is to operate an acceptable athletic program hopefully without going into the red?

Ed Buckner of Lyman, Ralph Stump of Oviedo and Jerry Posey at Lake Brantley all have one thing in common: They must face the economic pinch of running an expanding athletic program due to that word inflation.

No School Board Money

But one very important aspect must be taken into consideration as the athletic directors attempt to fullfill the needs of the students. No money for transportation, equipment, or official fees is available from the Seminole County School Board. Each school must support its own athletic program from gate revenues, although the newer schools, Lake Brantley and Lake Howell, did receive initial capital from the school board to begin their athletic program. But the money was a loan and must be

To combat the situation, the three schools had to increase their admission prices at the gate, although advance tickets can be purchased at the school at a lower price.

Lake Brantley, was off in advertising sales for its football program this year therefore the price

The cost of uniforms (material), transportation, change for all the atheletic directors.

Stump of Oviedo revealed that official fees have risen this year to at least \$4 per man and the gas mileage each official charges the school has risen from 14 to 20 cents per mile.

The cost of portable stands used at the Oviedo football field also have risen 33 per cent, according With an annual athletic budget of \$15,000,

Stump said the cost has jumped at least 50 per cent in recent years, but the program is expanding and pointed out," we're just spending more money."

Oviedo has an excellent Boosters Club which brought in \$4,000 last year, which helped the program, said Stump.

Football Supports Program

They operated two football teams, and that supports the other sports at the school except pasketball. Although the football attendance has risen in recent years at the school, Stump admits the program is in the red.

He realizes the football team has to support the majority of the program, and he's of the opinion if a team is constantly losing it will also lose at the gate, and some schools are going to have to take a hard look at their program.

Buckner of Lyman said his school operates on an annual athletic budget of \$12,500 with 11 sports, including three football teams, the most expensive

Able to charge admission to its wrestling, soccer as well as its basketball games, Buckner said these sports are self-sufficient, but football

revenue supports the other seven. Buckner said the athletic program is expanding at Lyman, but the rising costs haven't hurt

"Athletics are part of the school and it gives

At Lake Brantley where Jerry Posey is the athletic director the school is in its third year, but already has a new football stadium, entirely funded by the Boosters Club.

The stadium is near completion but the Patriots are using the facility. Brantley also has 11 sports of which football is the big money producer, but Posey revealed that he expects basketball and wrestling to be selfsufficient this year. "Basketball would have been

last year but we had to purchase new uniforms." He said the inflation spiral has slowed the athletic program down, but says the school won't skimp on safety. "We buy the best equipment.,"

He felt the larger schools could suffer more due to rising prices, but thinks high school athletics will never be affected that much, "There's a demand for it." Buckner summed it up.





MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) - James Earl Ray was placed at the scene of the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. by a man who was too drunk to stand up 15 minutes before he said he saw Ray, according to testimony in a hearing on a motion for withdrawal of Ray's guilty plea.

James McGraw, a taxi driver, told a federal court hearing he was to pick up Charles Quitman Stephens, the state's key witness against Ray, about 5:45 p.m. on April stand in an upstairs bedroom of a rooming house.

Stephens identified Ray as a man who ran from the upstairs bathroom of the rooming house shortly after King was shot as he stood on the balcony of the nearby Lorraine Motel about 6 p.m. Authorities say the shot was fired from the bathroom.

The report does not explain what it means by independence, but U.S. energy officials previously have defined the concept as holding oil imports low enough to avoid the possibility of blackmail by a foreign oil cutoff. This specific level has not been established.

The study, some 1,100 pages stamped "Limited Official Use," was still being circulated in draft form for comment among federal agencies today, but a copy was obtained by The Associated Press.

A revised final version is to be made public around Nov. 7. It appeared unlikely that the major conclusions would change. How much the nation must do depends heavily

on the world price of oil, the study says.

It estimates that the world price might drop from \$11 per barrel to around \$7 per barrel - but ironically, the lower price would be harder to cope with, because it would encourage greater

Woman Leading Governor's Race

HARTFORD Conn. (AP) - Glasses perched on a head of tousled short brown hair, Ella Grasso is smiling and handshaking her way to a predicted Democratic victory in Connecticut's grand jury's indictment of Board of Business Regulation. "Hello, my dear!" the 55-year-old congresswoman says in greeting elderly elevator operators, fellow politicians and virtually everyone else encountered on the campaign trail. U.S. Rep. Robert Steele, 35, Mrs. Grasso's Republican oppo-

nent, trailed by 18 points in a public opinion poll taken in late September. Many political veterans of both parties expect Steele to carry only his own congressional district in rural eastern Connecticut and the traditionally Republican bedroom suburbs bordering the New York metropolitan area. Mrs. Grasso would be Connecticut's first woman governor and

the first woman in any state to win the office without help from her husband's political coattails. But her sex isn't an issue in this

"I thought this might have been a factor because I had been told it would be," she said early in the race. "The phenomenon seems to be discussed more in the national press than in Connecticut." Steele, a two-term representative known for a painfully firm handshake and a keen understanding of how to develop a desirable image in the news media, is cautious in attacking Mrs. Grasso personally. "He knows that if he looks like he's hitting a lady he's going to

lose a lot of votes," said one key Republican. Mrs. Grasso emphasized her 22 years in government, as congresswoman, Connecticut secretary of the state and state legislator. But past ties also are a liability.

Steele has linked her to deficit spending of previous Democratic administrations and has said the current Grasso platform would force a higher state sales tax or a state income tax. Steele's charges of Democratic overspending and higher taxes kept Mrs. Grasso on the defensive during August and September. But on Oct. 3 she leveled charges that the state Public Utilities

Commission has allowed power companies to charge customers \$19 million too much to cover the rising cost of oil to generate electricity. The utilities and the commission deny there have been overcharges but admit that the oil has not cost as much per kilowatt

hour of power as customers have been billed for.

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) - When George Nalley wheels his congressional campaign into high gear, chances are good that he is talking about having his wheelchair pushed

The Republican member of the Tacoma City Council is battling five-term incumbent Floyd V. Hicks for the state's 6th Congressional District seat. Crippled in a sturfing accident while serving in the Marines during World War II, Nalley is meeting the issue of his handicap head-on-and is attempting to turn it into

"I don't want to hide it," Nalley, 51, said in a recent interview. "I can't. But we decided to really publicize it

Nalley's brochures are filled with photos of him in his wheelchair. One brochure says, "George Nalley sits in a wheelchair. So what makes him think he can be elected to It lists his qualifications and ideas on top issues as an

answer to his own question. "My biggest handicap is that people think I don't get around," Nalle, says. "But I'm very active. I go to all the fairs, I visit the ports and all the shopping centers." Nalley, who retired il years ago from his family's food company, admits his handicap causes some campaign

"The first question my staff has to ask when we're asked to speak is, 'How many steps are there?'" he said. "We have to turn down some events because we simply can't get into the building or room." Nalley says he's detected no backlash by people who think his condition might keep him from doing a

congressman's job. "You don't have to get hollow-eyed and watch television all day just because you are crippled," he said. "You don't have to be institutionalized.'

He said that if he is elected in the heavily Democratic district, his first priority as a congressman will be aid to

Money Rates Decline

Additional declines in money rates greeted the money markets last week with Fed funds down 61 basis points (.61 per cent), 4-5 month commercial paper rates down 30 basis points (.30 per cent), and 90 day CD-S down 59 basis points (.59 per cent). Only the 90 day Treasury bill rate moved contrary to the market, rising 28 basis points (.28 per cent) to an average of 6.92 per cent for the week ended Oct. 11, 1974. In our opinion, the decline in bill rates can be at least partially attributed to a \$617 million increased in foreign central holdings of US government

securities. In recent weeks we have identified an improvement in bank liquidity. Thus far however, the improvement is soley the result of a slowdown in the rate of increase in total bank loans. The improvement will be significant only at such time as total deposits begin rising. Until such time, we continue to believe that money rates will remain on a high level and only a gradual easing at best is expected.

Our index of money velocity deteriorated further during the month of September. The decline in velocity appears to be gathering momentum, as the index declined at the annual month based on weekly data. The rate of decline is similar to that experienced in the 1920-21 credit cycle. Based on the nature of the economic contraction that developed in 1921, we have reason to believe that the decline in current business activity may build momentum over the months ahead.

While the market gave a most auspicious performance during the past week, there is as yet no confirmation that a new (bull market) has begun. It will take probably another two or more weeks and a possible (test) at the 620 Dow level before the pattern of action for the long term becomes descernible. There exists today ubstantial numbers of high quality common stocks offering historically high yields. These yields, coupled with anticipated long term earnings growth, could offer total returns of 10-15 per cent per year over the next several years. We feel that it is those securities which offer the combination of high dividend yield, low price-earnings multiple and earnings growth that can be expected to outperform the market.
