Misinformation On Hepatitis

DEAR DR. LAMB - Would you please answer some questions on hepatitis? There is so much of it around now and also a lot of misinformation about it, too. I would like to know what hepatitis is. Why is it that medication is not given for it, just rest and good food? Is it contagious until the patient's blood tests are normal? Why does it take so long to recover from it? Does it come slow down the recovery? Why is it that even an occasional beer is forbidden during recovery? How soon after recovery can a person have an occasional beer?

There is abundant evidence that alcohol is a toxin to liver cells. This is not dependent upon a poor diet or anything like that. It is a direct toxic reaction to alcohol. Obviously, when the liver cells are already damaged and trying to recover, you don't want to take a chemical that damages the liver.

Alcohol should be strictly forbidden until there is good evidence that the liver has completely recovered. This is judged by various tests of liver function and other clinical information the doctor gets from his examination. The length of time it takes for the liver to recover from hepatitis varies greatly, and depends also on how much liver damage has occurred. Obviously, it can be months before a person with severe viral hepatitis can safely drink alcohol again. And, if there has been extensive liver damage, any amount of alcohol poses some hazard.

It is possible that a person infected with viral hepatitis will harbor the virus for a lifetime. Such an individual may not be contagious unless his blood is used for a transfusion, or in the preparation of serum. Anyone with a history of infectious hepatitis should never give blood. The blood is tested at the bank for any
