

Police Seek Three Men In Death Of Editor

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Police are looking for three men they believe robbed and stabbed to death John Shively Knight III, newspaper editor and grandson of the founder of the Knight publishing empire.

Knight, 30, was found tied up and stabbed five times Sunday morning on a bedroom floor in his luxury apartment overlooking Rittenhouse Square. One of two house guests was also stabbed as she tried to escape from the robbers.

Police Capt. Donald Patterson of homicide said the assailants are believed to have spent almost four hours in the 23rd story apartment, carefully searching and ransacking the five rooms.

Ford Calls Trip Beneficial

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford turns his attention to domestic matters this week after proclaiming his Asian trip "beneficial" and indicating that plans are in the works for a trip to the Mideast.

Ford : Jurned to the White House early this morning after a 21,000-mile trip that he said contained "no minuses and many, many plusses." He climaxed his journey in Honolulu with a declaration of a six-point "Pacific Doctrine" for U.E. foreign policy and held out the possibility of future U.S. friendship with Vietnam and Cambodia.

Chatting with reporters just before his jet landed at nearby Andrews Air Force Base, Ford was asked if he felt it had been necessary for him to personally make the long journey to China, he replied: "The discussions we had in Peking were mandatory at my level."

Glatt Plan To Be Presented

DAYTON, Ohio (AP) - Today is a special day in court for Charles Glatt, a desegregation planner who was shot to death Sept. 19.

"I don't want Charles to have died in vain," said his widow, Johena. She and several friends finished the school integration plan he was working on when he was killed and were expected to present the 180-page project in

Glatt was appointed July 7 by U.S. District Judge Carl Rubin to design a plan for Dayton schools. Brt he was shot to death by a divorced father of seven who told authorities. his youngest son was to be bused and that he shot Glatt because "God made me do it."

Confirmation Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) - As Congress takes up the nomination of John Paul Stevens to the Supreme Court, all signs point to his confirmation to succeed retired Justice William O. Douglas.

In advance of today's open hearing before the Senate Judiciary Committee, Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss., said he planned a brief executive session to discuss the handling of tax returns and financial and health statements submitted by Stevens.

Some members want Stevens' state and federal income tax returns for the last 10 years and his financial statement to be analyzed by the Joint Committee on Internal Revenue Taxation.

Second Coming Awaited

GRANNIS, Ark. (AP) - "We don't have any special plans for Christmas," says Elizabeth Nance Bard. "We just think maybe we won't be here." She is one of 25 persons who are closeted in a small brick house waiting for the second coming of Christ and the

world to end. The vigil began 70 days ago with believers abandoning their homes and jobs. Mrs. Bard says the group is "in no way discouraged. We just keep praying and studying and

waiting for the end to come. "Christy as, of course, is a special time," she said. "But what we're doing is even more important."

More Filibustering Predicted

WASHINGTON (AP) - The filibustering as it decides whether to come up with \$2.3 billion to pay for the emergency loans to New York City that the lawmakers authorized over the weekend. The actual money is contained in a \$10.3-billion supplemental appropriations bill before the Senate Soday.

The bill authorizing propriating the money, was approved 57 to 50 by the Senate early Saturday. The House had approved the loan earlier in the week following President Ford's statement that he would sign such a bill

Face-Saving Device Eyed

WASHINGTON (AP) - A fight between President Ford and Congress that could mean higher laxes for most Americans next month may be resolved in a way that would allow both sides to save face.

The answer may become evident Wednesday when the Senate Finance Committee begins work on a Housepassed bill carrying \$13 billion in individual tax cuts. mainly extensions of tax cuts in effect this year. Unless that bill becomes law by the end of the month, most Americans will see their take home pay reduced starting in January.



Don Crabtree, chairman of the Committee to Resist Oppressive Politicians (CROP) has protested the sealing of the indictments in a telegram to the Florida Supreme

The telegram said: "We respectfully request that you take immediate action to stop double standards set by Judge Volie Williams of Seminole County regarding the sealing of indictments of elected officials. If the action of Judge Williams is permitted to go the whole fifteen days a legal precedence will have been set in this state. Please protect our Grand Jury System and order those indictments to be acted upon at once. We are more than 400 family members of the Committee To Regist Oppressive Politicians."

Also, some citizens groups are forming lobbying efforts to try and pressure the county commission into creating a legal department.

Creation of a county legal department was proposed earlier this year by Commissioner Dick Williams. Williams said at that time it would "take politics cut of the county attorney's position" and would save money for the

Sex Stereotypes Opposed

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - It may take as long as five years, but feminists - including some state officials - say they are determined to purge textbooks of sexual stereotypes

"We don't want to burn books," says Diane Conklin of the National Organization for Women, "and we're not against motherhood. But we don't want motherhood to be the only option to be presented for girls in textbooks. "We don't want boys to be presented in textbooks as the strong, silent type," says Ms. Conklin, the title she prefers. "We want boys who can cry. We want girls who can be attorneys."

Medicaid Savings Sought

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - State officials, facing a \$10-million deficit in the Medicaid program, are seeking ways to save money on benefits ranging from aid to

dependent children to care for the elderly. "It looks like we are in a bind where we may have no choice but to cut services." said Sen. John Vogt, vice chairman of the Health and Rehabilitative Services Committee, "... we can't fund all the good programs everybody wants."

The actual cost deficits for a two-year period in the program, which provides health services for about 424,000 needy persons, are projected at \$24 million. The federal government picks up about 60 per cent of the overruns, but the state still is left with a \$10-million problem.





Arab-Israel Split **Becoming Wider**

Palestinian guerrillas were quick to claim responsibility for the deaths and injuries of innocent civilians in the explosion of a bomb Nov. 13 in the busiest intersection of Jerusalem.

These guerrillas come under the umbrella of the Palestine Liberation Organization, which the United Nations General Assembly four days earlier had elevated to the status of a full participant in a new U.N. effort to work out a solution to the Palestinian problem in the Middle East. We leave it to the U.N. delegates who supported that move to reconcile the slaughter on the streets of a city holy to Moslems. Christians and Jews with the supposed commitment of the U.N. to peace and justice. Events clearly have pushed the Arab-Israeli

dispute back on a path toward crisis and confrontation and further away from the goal of a negotiated settlement.

As the General Assembly was puffing up the stature of the PLO as the representative of the Palestinian people and passing its repugnant anti-Zionism resolution, the Soviet Union was calling for reconvening of the Geneva Conference on the Middle East with the PLO in attendance. This simply defies Israel to change its policy of refusing to recognize the PLO as a negotiating party.

The Arab League meanwhile announced that ships which traverse the Suez Canal carrying Israeli cargo will be boycotted at Arab ports. This is a slap at President Anwar Sadat of Egypt, whom the more militant Arab leaders are condemning for his agreement with Israel in the Sinai.

It is the Sinai agreement which offers some proof that progress can be made through negotiation to resolve the territorial disputes arising from the 1967 war. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger has been hoping to move from that success into the tougher area of negotiating a similar agreement between Syria and Israel over the contested Golan Heights.

Since the U.N. General Assembly has earned a reputation for adopting resolutions that stand no chance of implementation, the recent Arab successes might be dismissed as purely propaganda victories. The trouble is, if Arab leaders start believing their own propaganda about Israel, and the Israelis see themselves facing an enemy dedicated to the destruction of their nation, then the long miles traveled by Mr. Kissinger in pursuit of a negotiated settlement will have come to

King And The FBI

It is disheartening to study the disclosures about the tactics used by the Federal Bureau of Investigation against Martin Luther King.

J. Edgar Hoover described King as "no good" in a 1962 memo. Thereafter the bureau bugged King's bedrooms, tried to discredit King and wrote ar anonymous letter threatening him and suggesting that he commit suicide before receiving the Nobel Prize for peace in 1964.

The vast powers of this federal police agency were used against King not because he was suspected of having violated any federal law but simply because he had incurred the disapproval of the agency's director.

We always knew that there was great potential for abuse in the central government's semi-secret investigative bureau, especially when it was administered by a man who had become so powerful in the Washington bureaucracy that he was virtually independent of control by elected officials,

But disclosure that the agency's powers were actually misused with such pettiness and vindictiveness comes as a shock. It is another blow to confidence in government The President and Congress must strengthen their control over the FBI to make sure no future director wields such ar-

bitrary power.

DON OAKLEY Solution To Energy Problems?

The only certainty in the uncertain energy situation is that Americans will be using more energy tomorrow than they do today. And given the shift away from natural gas and oil, more and more of that energy will in the form of electricity produced from coal and-or uranium.

The Edison Electric Institute, a national trade association of electric utilities, predicts that while total energy consumption will grow by 3 per cent over the next 25 years, consumption of electricity will go up at nearly double that rate any where from 5.3 to 5.8 per cent a year. This is a "moderate" estimate.

Often overlooked is the fact that not only will we be using more power, we will be using more land on which to build plants to generate that power. Because of this, an idea increasingly being discussed by planners in and out of government is the "energy park."

This is the concentration of several power plants in a small and relatively remote geographical area, in contrast to the additional practice of scattering them all over a state or region, usually in or near crowded cities where land and water are now scarce and costly to develop. Power from energy park plants would be transmitted great distances over very high-

In Pennsylvania, where the idea seems to be farther along than elsewhere, four large utility companies are promoting public discussion of a scheme for an energy park that would feature

According to project manager John Saeger. the park approach offers such advantages as standardized engineering and construction and employment of a stable labor force, a as well as efficient land use. These factors "can potentially reduce the installed cost of new plants by 10 or 15 per cent," he says.

There are objections to the energy park plants - period. Even with conventional plants, say some critics, vast quantities of waste heat the spreading of pollution, or the threat of pollution to rural areas now free of it.

> **RAY CROMLEY** New York A Healthy Corpse New York is far from alone in its troubles.

New government studies indicate there are economic forces at work - over and above poor administration -- which insure trouble for a fistful of the nation's big cities, except where excellent management or special circumstances buck the trend.

Large cities, on average, however, are not noted for management excellence. Industry, a major source of taxes, has been noving out of big cities generally in an effort to ind cheap land for modern manufacturing lants and lower labor costs.

Where industries don't leave the state, they requently move to the suburbs. The trend is apparent through the North and

beyond. A fourth of the major cities apparently have been hit worse than New York. By contrast a number of large cities in the South and elsewhere have shown apparent gains.

Families, too, are shifting to the suburbs cutting into big city income. Here New York is better off than all but 10 of its sister big cities. If is difficult to tell, hewever, whether New York's relatively good position is real. It may be that middle level taxpayers, moving out, are being replaced by families below the poverty line.

Nationwide, two thirds of the 24 largest cities in 1970 had more than their proportionate share of families below the poverty line, as compared with the national average. Nine of the 24 were worse off in this regard than New York; only seven were significantly in better shape, meaning that the welfare drain on city income was rather widespread.

Because a third of its total taxes come from income, general sales and gross receipt taxes --which are especially hard hit by recessions, New York City's revenue suffered particularly heavy plows in the past several years.

WORLD IN BRIEF All-Out Street Fighting

Reported In Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Moslem and Christian gunmen reoccupied key buildings in downtown Beirut today in a new explosion of all-out street fighting, security forces reported.

Miltiamen from the left-wing Moslem "Ambushers" group fired rockets and mortars from the 40-story Mour Tower, an unfinished office building that was their deadliest redoubt in the last big round of Lebanon's eightmonth civil war.

Meanwhile, police said, the right-wing Christian Phalange Party's militia resumed control over the 500room Holiday Inn which was damaged by fire and rocket hits when it was a Phalange stronghold during fighting Security forces that had been occupying the buildings under a cease-fire agreement pulled out of the embattled city center, leaving the way clear for another major struggle for the seaside tourist hotels.

Moluccans Losing Courage

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands (AP) -- Some of the South Moluccan nationalists holding more than 30 hostages aboard a stranded train in northern Holland are beginning to lose courage after defying the Dutch government for six days, the leader of the Moluccan community says.

"I could read from the faces of one or two that they do not want to go on," said Johan Alvares Manusame, president of the self-styled Republic of the Moluccas, after boarding the train Sunday to plead with the young gunmen to surrender.

Scotland Yard: No Deals

LONDON (AP) - Scotland Yard says it will make no deals with Irish Republican Army gunmen holding a 54year-old postal inspector and his wife hostage in their London apartment.

Police said there were either three or four IRA men in the second-floor apartment near Regent Park. They said one of them was believed to be Michael Wilson, who is accused of killing Ross McWhirter, coeditor of the Guinness Book of World Records, on Nov. 27.

Timor Capital Falis

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) - Pro-Indonesian forces in Portuguese Timor were reported expanding their control of the former colony today with the support of Indonesian

Foreign Minister Adam Malik announced Sunday that factions friendly to Indonesia had captured Dili, the capital of Portuguese Timor, from Fretilin, the leftist Revolutionary Front for the Independence of East Timor, and declared the territory part of Indonesia.

Information Minister Mashur said Indonesian "volunteers" supported the attack on Dill, and a Fretilin broadcast said the Indonesians were pursuing the independence fighters in the hills.

There is no direct evidence that smoking is harmful to recovery from hepatitis, but it can't be helpful and even in a healthy person it causes some harm. If I had my choice, no cne would smoke.

There is abundant evidence that alcohol is a toxin to liver cells. This is not dependent upon a poor diet or anything like that. It is a direct toxic reaction to alcohol. Obviously, when the liver cells are already damaged and trying to recover, you don't want to take a chemical that damages the liver.

Alcohol shou'd be strictly forbidden until there is good evidence that the liver has completely recovered. This is judged by various tests of liver function and other clinical information the doctor gets from his examination. The length of time it takes for the liver to recover from hepatitis varies greatly, and depends also on how much liver damage has occurred. Obviously, it can be months before a person with severe viral hepatitis can safely drink alcohol again. And, if there has been extensive liver damage, any amount of alcohol poses some bazard.


