

Ideal Weather Prevails In Florida During Last Week, Government Report Shows

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Mar. 18 (AP)—Ideal weather, typical of Florida's celebrated climate, prevailed during the week ending Mar. 15, according to the weekly weather and crop bulletin issued here by the government weather bureau.

The complete bulletin follows: The weather during the week was warm and relatively dry, the temperature departures averaging from 3 to 5 daily, above the normal with departures in precipitation general. Although there was but little rain, the percentage of sunshine was less than usual for the period—especially over the extreme northern counties.

The warm, and comparatively dry weather stimulated germination and growth, except that the former was delayed on uplands where soil moisture was deficient. As a whole however, late planted corn and melons, are up in good stands; the early planted made fair progress, where not severely damaged by the frosts of the first week of the month.

The planting of corn was general throughout the section; some delay was noted in the western and northern divisions. The planting of cotton continued, and some velvet beans in the north and west. Oats did very well, although

more moisture would prove beneficial on uplands. Tobacco plants in Suwannee, Madison, Gadsden and other counties are in good condition. The work of transplanting will begin in a few days.

The planting of potatoes continued in the north and west, they are doing well generally, although some in the north still show the effects of frost during the first part of the month. The shipping of beans continued in car lots from the Everglades district; also other truck in goodly quantities, especially peas. Car-lot shipments of tomatoes continued from the Miami coast district. The setting of sweet potato slips was more active in peninsula counties. Citrus groves were worked and fertilized—Many show heavy bloom. Rain is needed generally on uplands.

"The late planted corn and melons are up to good stands; the early planted are fair good—some still showing the effects of recent frost. Strawberry shipments increased; potatoes and other truck are doing well. Citrus were worked and fertilized. Tobacco plants and oats improved.

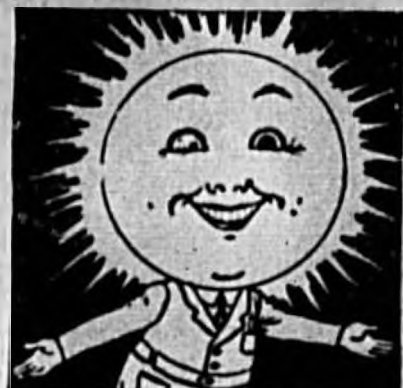
