## BLACK OFFERS DRASTIC PLAN FOR CONGRESS

### Proposes Measure To Safeguard Right Of Poor Man To Become Federal Lawmaker

Campaign Cost Is  
Said Prohibitive

Corrupt Practices Act  
Is Rapped As Being  
Too Often Violated

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—(INS)—Declaring that the country "does not want a millionaire congress," Rep. Loring M. Black (D) of New York today proposed drastic amendments to the corrupt practices act to safeguard the right of a poor man to become a law-maker for the nation.

Rising campaign costs, he declared, is steadily taking a toll of poor members of Congress and there is an increase of wealthy candidates.

While the Senate has frequently been referred to as a "rich man's club" the House has until the last few years been heralded as the opportunity of the poor public servant. Changing conditions, the increased population of congressmen, higher living costs and lax corrupt practices laws have all combined to bring about conditions which must now be changed, he said.

He proposed a measure which would limit the amount of money that can be spent in a congressional campaign. This should be changed so that no candidate could spend more than \$3,000 for all purposes in a congressional district.

Black pointed out that under the present corrupt practices act a congressional candidate must report expenses for newspaper advertising and bill posting but that everything else is exempt.

Among the exemptions, he said, are printing, mailing of letters and use of radio. It costs \$4,500 for a congressional candidate to write a letter to every voter in the congressional district, he said.

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## MAD AT HOTEL SAYS SHE WILL REVEAL KILLER

### Park Central Servant Declares She Will Squel On Murderer Of Arnold Rothstein

Infer McManus  
Is Not Culpable

New York Police Head  
Tenders Resignation  
After Much Criticism

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(INS)—Questioning of Bridget Fahy, chambermaid at the Park Central Hotel here where Arnold Rothstein was shot on the night of Nov. 4, today featured the investigation into the slaying of the master gambler. District Attorney Joseph Stanton was to grill the maid concerning the witnesses in court yesterday that she knew who killed Rothstein and "was going to squeal on him."

The exact status of the chambermaid has been shrouded in mystery since she was detained as a material witness. At that time it was said she had seen several men pass in and out of room 304 on the night of the shooting, and was being held in jail because threats had been made against her life, presumably by friends of the murderer. Later, however, the woman declares she was being held against her will, and later yesterday she sought her freedom in court on a writ of habeas corpus.

With her Celtic amiability and her involuntary imprisonment and the action of Justice Wassersorg in denying her application for liberty, Miss Fahy turned to the assistant district attorney and shouted emphatically: "I know who did it, and I'm going to squeal on him, but if you men offered me money to tell what I know, and I told you to run up a tree, George McManus is one of my friends, and if he dies I'll die with him. Then she added wistfully, "Damn it, I wish I was back in Kerry."

McManus, with three others, is under indictment for the murder in stating that the big-time bookmaker was her friend and that she would reveal the identity of the murderer, he said as much as he could that she did not "squeal" he committed the crime.

Criticism was aimed at the District Attorney's office from several quarters today for his policy of detaining Miss Fahy against her will. Other public criticisms of the conduct of the police department in the case will result in the removal of Joseph A. Warren as police commissioner on Saturday.

## Chain Store Head Believes '29 Will Be Great Year For Industry And Retail Sales

### President Of Woolworth Company Declares He Is Confident That Prosperity Will Increase During Year

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(INS)—"I believe that 1929 will be a banner year both in industry and in retail selling," said H. T. Parsons, president of the F. W. Woolworth Company, to International News Service today.

As head of the Woolworth chain of 1,723 stores, situated in strategic positions in the retail centers of the country, Parsons is admirably situated to estimate accurately the buying power of the American people. Last year the Woolworth stores sold \$277,000,000 worth of goods at retail, and in the current year they are expected to pass over their country a total of \$287,000,000, retail prices.

"From every standpoint, I am confident that we are in for a good business year directly ahead," said Parsons. When asked to summarize his reasons for arriving at that conclusion, he said: "First and foremost, because of the high rate of earnings of industry and business, this year the crops of 1928 were good, and marketed at better prices than before, which will mean that that money carries over into 1929 to stimulate business."

"Unemployment is gradually decreasing, as each month since the first of September shows a gradual decrease in unemployment, and an increase in the per capita wage, which will give added buying power."

HOOVER MAY ACT  
AS MEDIATOR IN  
BOLIVIAN FRACAS

President-Elect's

Argentina, Dec. 12.—(INS)—Wallo President-elect Herbert Hoover, on his goodwill tour of South America, has remained strictly aloof and silent upon the territorial quarrel between Bolivia and Paraguay, the circumstances, as they exist today, may result in the possibility of Mr. Hoover becoming a peaceful mediator to avert the United States government's decision to take the case for international arbitration.

As Mr. Hoover is making his goodwill visit as a private citizen, this fact would enable him to act without directly involving the high office to which he has been elected. So far, since the cessation of diplomatic relations between Bolivia and Paraguay, he has filled the role of silent spectator.

The fact that the League of Nations, acting upon representations from Paraguay, has to some extent, intervened brings about an unprecedented situation in the Americas which may induce Washington to take direct action.

Not since the outbreak of the World War have the South American diplomats been called upon to wrestle with such dangerous problems as those involved in the dispute between Bolivia and Paraguay over the future nationality of the Grand Chaco district lying between the two republics.

## KING'S HEALTH REMAINS SAME SAYS BULLETIN

### Monarch Retains His Strength After Operation To Drain Off Poisons

Pulse Of Ruler  
Remains Steady

Feeling Of Hope And  
Optimism Prevalent  
In Royal Household

LONDON, Dec. 12.—(NS)—King George was progressing as satisfactorily as could be expected today following the probing and operation to drain off poisons.

The King had some sleep during the night, the local conditions and considerable toxicemia. The Majesty's pulse remains steady and he is not losing ground, the bulletin read. The bulletin was signed by Sir Stanley Hewitt, Sir Hugh Bigby and Lord Dawson, of Penn. It was timed 10:45 A. M.

A feeling of hope and optimism prevails in the royal household, it was stated. The hope expressed throughout England today was that Sir Hugh Bigby's operation upon the King for empyema after the lung had been probed and removed, would result in the King's condition being satisfactory. The bulletin was signed by six physicians.

It was authoritatively understood that the draining process is likely to continue for a week or 10 days at the least before all the infectious matter has been removed. Immediately after the successful operation an official bulletin was issued which stated that the operation had been successful and that the Majesty's condition was satisfactory. The bulletin was signed by six physicians.

All the physicians left at 11:30 o'clock last night with the exception of Sir Stanley Hewitt, who, as usual remained throughout the night. Upon leaving, Lord Dawson, one of the two physicians who had been attending the King since the beginning of his illness, stated: "The King's condition is satisfactory. He is resting easily."
