

Various Reasons Given

For Legislative Failure

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congressional Democrats have various explanations for their failure to legislate an energy conservation program for the nation. Some blame the londership for not knocking back souther to get agreement before the current recess. Others say the freshmen aren't following enough. And others, including Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, fault the committee system for permitting overlapping and com petitive jurisdictions within Congress.

'Violation Of Trust'

CHICAGO (AP) - Women raped by men they know suffer greater psychological damage than those raped by strangers, a University of Illinois medical school sociologist says. "It is certainly not surprising that when a woman is raped by a man whom she has known well and has probably trusted, her ability to function sexually is very likely to become impaired," Dr. Pauline B. Bart said. "To be raped by a stranger is a violation of your body; to be raped by someone you know adds an even crueler violation of trust," she said.

S. Vietnam Cooperating

WASHINGTON (AP) - The new head of President Ford's interagency refugee task force says the South Vietnamese government is cooperating with the United Nations in negotiating about refugees who wish to return to their home country. Julia Vadela Taft said in an interview that the names of those who wish to return are being submitted to the U.N. high commissioner on refugees, who will submit them to the new governments of Cambodia and South Vietnam.







The Memorial Day Meaning

Memorial Day has always been a bittersweet holiday in America. But it is especially sad when the occasion for special remembrance of those who have fallen in the nation's wars becomes a matter of what is convenient - or profitable - for the commercial community.

Persuaded by those who said that it made more sense to have a three-day weekend every year rather than have a holiday fall in the middle of the week, as it sometimes did, Congress several years ago changed Memorial Day from May 30 to the last Monday in the month. It also moved Veterans or Armistice Day from Nov. 11 to the last Monday in October for the same reason, as well as to put more distance between it and Thanksgiving.

Not all of the states fell in line with the change; a few have continued to observe the traditional dates. Some Southern states have always observed Confederate Memorial Day on different days in April and May.

If a lobbying campaign being conducted chiefly by former servicemen is successful. Veterans Day will once again be redesignated as Nov. 11. The U.S. Senate has already so acted. Other bills have been introduced in Congress to move Memorial Day back to its original spot on the calendar.

WASHINGTON - (NEA) - The United States Congress, being the flower of democracy, exercises freedoms of a scale going far beyond any other institution in the land, particularly concerning the freedom of speech. Though every other American from president to proletarian is limited as to what he can legally say, and about whom he can legally say it, federal legislators in session have naught but their own consciences to guide them.

And so it should be. Lawmakers muzzled would be lawmakers cowed, therefore the good of the nation suggests they be assured immunity from arrest or suit regarding opinions made during their deliberations. Occasionally, however, the obvious necessity of this immunity has called a former member a communist sympathizer - and the ugly matter raises the wonder of whether immunity should have its

Detente Aiding Soviets

The notorious wheat deal the Soviets negotiated with this country in 1972 could (if we may mix a metaphor) turned out to be small potatoes compared to the use they are making of supposedly canny American businessmen in the current era of "detente."

According to the columnist team of Jack Anderson and Les Whitten, while there has been a welcome relaxation of tensions between our two countries - which is what detente means the United States is paying a price that the American people haven't been told about in the form of a significant "technology drain" from the United States to the U.S.S.R.

Because Soviet technology lags years behind ours in the most important fields, including agriculture, deep-sea exploration, computers and aircraft and space science, they have little to offer but much to gain from the technological "exchange."

With the active encouragement of the State and Commerce Departments, and to the dismay of U.S. intelligence analysts, say the writers, American firms have already exported or are planning to export to the Soviet Union millions of dollars worth of technological information and products involving everything from wide-bodied jets to edvanced computers.

One U.S. company, for example, has signed preliminary agreements to help the Russians build plants for the manufacture of computers and associated equipment, a field in which the Soviets are at least 10 years behind us. American firms are also selling licenses and detailed information which will permit the Russians to build the various products themselves.

Actually, this is not the first time the Communists have found it immensely beneficial to do business with the very capitalists they are dedicated to overthrowing. Back in the 1920s, American engineering know-how helped bail out the Soviets in their early attempts to industrialize. What is different today is only the scope of the assistance.

It is one thing to pursue a policy of detente and to work for the normalization of trade and other relations with the Soviet Union. But as Anderson and Whitten point out, detente, at least as regards Soviet - American scientific cooperation, has so far largely been one way. It totalitarian and inimical to everything that

WORLD IN BRIEF **Powerful Earthquake Shakes**

Parts Of Spain, Portugal

TOLEDO, Spain (AP) - A powerful earthquake shook western Spain and central Portugal early ioday, the Toledo Geophysics Center said. There were no reported injuries.

The Toledo center said the earthquake was recorded shortly after 5 a.m. EDT and had an intensity of 7 8 on the nuchter scale. Its epicenter was believed to be between Gibraltar and the Azores Islands in the mid-Atlantic.

The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion as recorded on seismographs. Each increase in one number represents a tenfold increase in magnitude. Thus a quake of 7.8 is 10 times more powerful than a quake of 6.8 A reading of 7 indicates a major quake capable of causing widespread severe damage. The 1906 San Francisco quake registered 8.25.

Soviets Link Up In Space

MOSCOW (AP) -- Two Soviet cosmonauts linked up with the Salyut 4 space station today and began working on a program of research and other experiments ieft over by the first crew to visit the orbiting laboratory, Tass reported

The Soviet space program has been dogged by setbacks, but the news agency said Air Force Lt. Col. Pyotr Klimuk, 33, and his civilian engineer, Vitaly Sevastyanov, 40, "reported that all the systems of the station are functioning normally and they feel well."

The docking took place about 30 hours after the spaceship blasted off Saturday.

Russians Yield On Notice

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) - The Soviet Union has yielded to Western demands for advance notice of all major military maneuvers in an effort to clear the way for the mammoth summit conference on European security Leonid I. Brezhnev wants.

The Soviet climbdown, after two years of resistance, was disclosed by officials attending a conference in Dublin of foreign ministers from the European Common Market countries.
