# 200-Mile Limit Target Of Most 'Wars'

## Chaos Is Brewing On High Seas Among Fishermen

**EDITOR'S NOTE**—The 200-mile limit is more in vogue than ever as a means of protecting a nation's fishing industry. But the attempts around the world to enforce sovereignty over coastal waters result in any number of little fishing wars.

There is growing chaos on the high seas among fishermen. Icelandic patrol boats have fished with British trawlers in the stormy north Atlantic. Burmese gunboats attacked Thai fishermen last year off the Burma coast. Italian fishermen fled under gunfire from Tunisian patrol boats.

All over the world, tempers flare, boats are seized, and the oceans are subdivided like some suburban tract. The coastal waters of many nations, where the beautiful fish breed and multiply, are too crowded with fishermen.

Now the House and Senate in the U.S. Congress have fired a shot across the bows of foreign fishermen by passing bills that would extend American fishing jurisdiction to 200 miles of sea or next. The present limit is 12 miles.

And Prayda announced this month that Russia, too, would support a 200-mile zone for coastal nations, although Russian fishermen, along with Japanese, would be let the hardest by a 200-mile U.S. limit. This is the setting for the third United Nations Conference on the Law of the Sea, which opens Monday, March 15, in New York. The two previous attempts to work out an all-embracing treaty for use of the sea failed.

complain that China sometimes exacts a 70 per cent cut in payment for fishing in claimed waters. When some Hong Kong boats have tried to escape without paying, Chinese patrol boats usually capture them, confiscate their catches and detain the crews.

The 20-year-old British Icelandic cod war continues, with Iceland contending that its 200-mile limit is necessary to preserve dwindling fish stocks that spew off its rocky coasts. The Icelanders point to diminished catches as evidence that too many cod are being caught before they mature and spawn.

In the wild maneuvering there were a number of collisions, but only once were shot-fired. An Icelandic gunboat fired several 77 millimeter shells after a collision with a trawler, but there were no casualties reported.

**Baseball In San Francisco, When...**

The National League owners have taken a giant step towards keeping major league baseball in San Francisco this season. It will be the season ever gets started.

The owners, meeting for over four hours in Chicago Tuesday, approved the sale of the financially-troubled Giants to a group headed by San Francisco financier Robert Lurie and former Texas Rangers owner Bob Short.

"We'll keep the Giants in San Francisco forever," pledged Lurie. "If not, I wouldn't be kidding for the team. We have new ideas and promotions. I am willing to say right now that if we get the club, we'll double the attendance next season."

Assuming that season ever gets underway, Marvin Miller, head of the Players Association, said the owners' plan was a group of owners in Philadelphia to try to make some progress towards settling their dispute, which centers on the controversial reserve clause.

After a similar session in New York Monday, presidents Lee MacPhail of the American League and Chub Feeny of the National League said the differences between the owners and players over the reserve clause were too great to open the spring training camps as scheduled. The owners' plan was not to meet with the union unless the reserve clause was accepted, the National League owners would not be necessary.

The sale of the Giants for \$8 million — Lurie would own 50 per cent, Short 25 per cent and a Minneapolis conglomerate 25 per cent — was approved with the proviso that certain conditions involving both the purchasers and the city of San Francisco are met by March 1.

Feeny said if the conditions were not met, the National League would meet again soon to discuss expansion of the major league system.

**5-Minute Penalty To Be Five Years?**

**TORONTO (AP)** — A National Hockey League referee gave Tom Maloney of the Detroit Red Wings a five-minute penalty last Nov. 5 when he left wing slugged Toronto defenseman Brian Glennie. A Toronto judge and jury could wind up giving him five years.

For stacking the deck by knocking him to the ice during the Maple Leafs' 7-3 victory, the 25-year-old Maloney will stand trial on a charge of assault causing bodily harm. Provincial Court Judge Aaron Brown ruled Tuesday.

A trial date will be set April 5. Before the NHL player to be suspended, or worse, for the incident, the fourth NHL player to face criminal prosecution for excessive roughness during a game, faces a maximum penalty of five years in prison.

"In my respectful view," said Judge Brown, "it is both good law and good sense that the force and effect of the criminal law should apply equally and evenly inside and outside the sporting arena."

Maloney was released in his own recognizance pending the trial. NHL President Clarence Campbell said from his Montreal office that the league would not intervene in the case.

**Davey's Locker Claims One Yacht, 12 Others Disabled**

**NASSAU, Bahamas (AP)** — A \$100,000 yacht went down and a dozen others, including the strong contender Charisma, were disabled in a stormy racing of the Southern Ocean Racing Conference's Miami-Nassau race.

The battered SOREC fleet began staggering into Nassau Tuesday, about 20 hours after leaving Miami in the annual and normally swift 178-mile race. The time was several hours longer than in previous races.

The fleet was minus the sunken Mary E II, which eight-member crew was rescued, and a number of boats that turned back after running into gale force, contrary winds and rough seas.

"Before we got to the start, we saw four boats turn back," said Dr. Herb Virginia, team physician for the Miami Dolphins football team who was sailing in his boat, Family Affairs.

"After the start, we saw six more turn back. And when we turned, I saw another three boats following us. On my experience, I think we had 15-foot seas."

The SOREC, which does not declare race winners this year, released Tuesday.

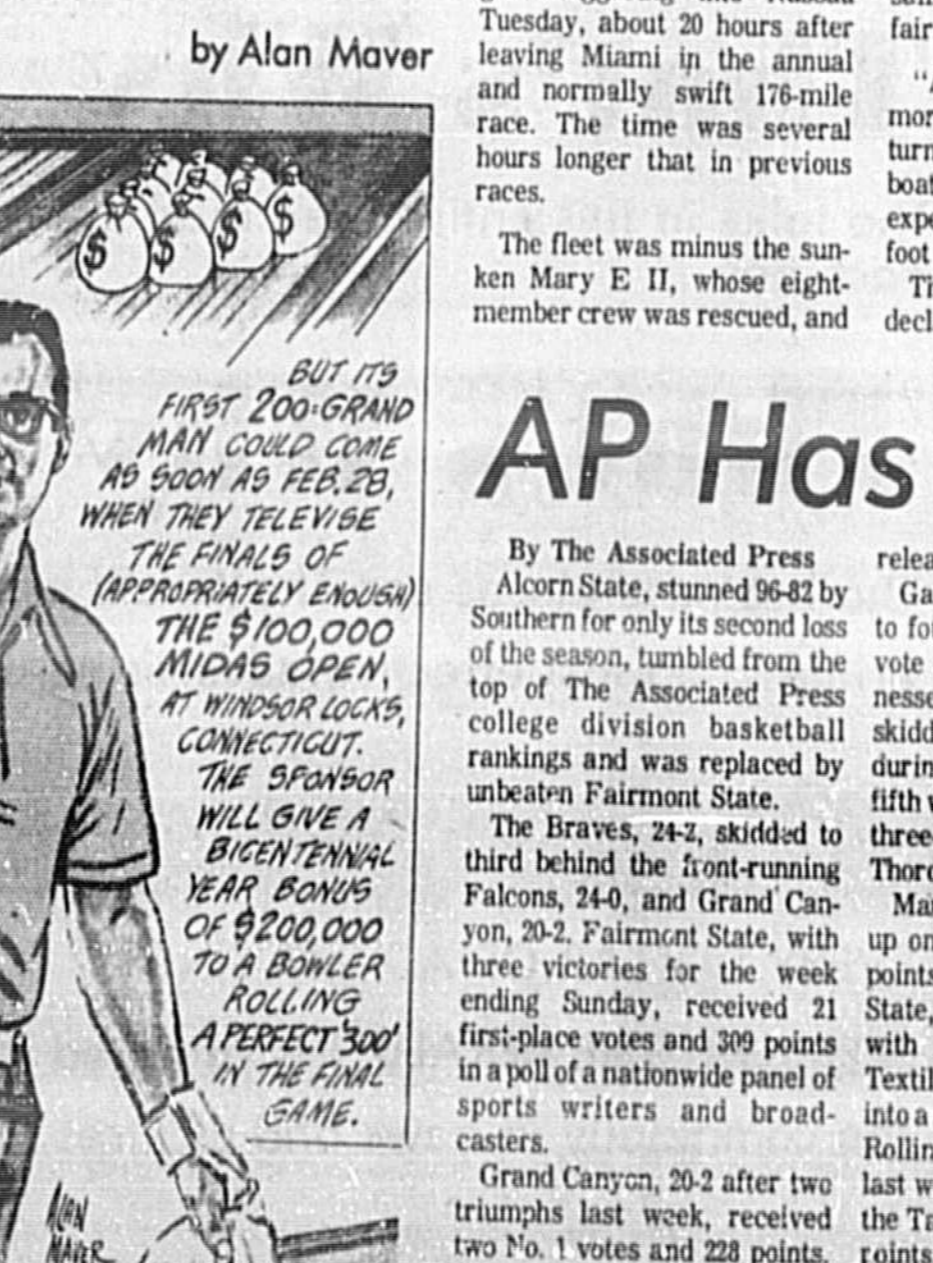

Chenier scored seven straight points, then added another basket within a three-minute span in the third quarter, lifting the Bulls to a 70-61 advantage over Chicago. Bing then teamed up with his backcourt partner to give Washington its biggest lead, 86-73, midway through the final period.

Mickey Johnson topped the Colonels with 33 points.

# Lockheed Sued By 7 Widows

ROME (AP) — Seven Italian air force widows whose husbands died in Lockheed's crash-prone Starfighter jets are suing the American aircraft company for \$2.5 million.

The women will be represented in U.S. courts by attorney Melvin M. Belli, who said he got \$1.2 million for relatives of 32 West German pilots in last October.

Belli is in Italy to meet with the seven Italian women and contact other widows with Starfighter crashes. He plans to search out other Starfighter widows in The Netherlands, Japan and Turkey.

"We have been selling so much material to foreigners that they should know they can have a suit for breach of warranty in the United States," said the 62-year-old lawyer in an interview.

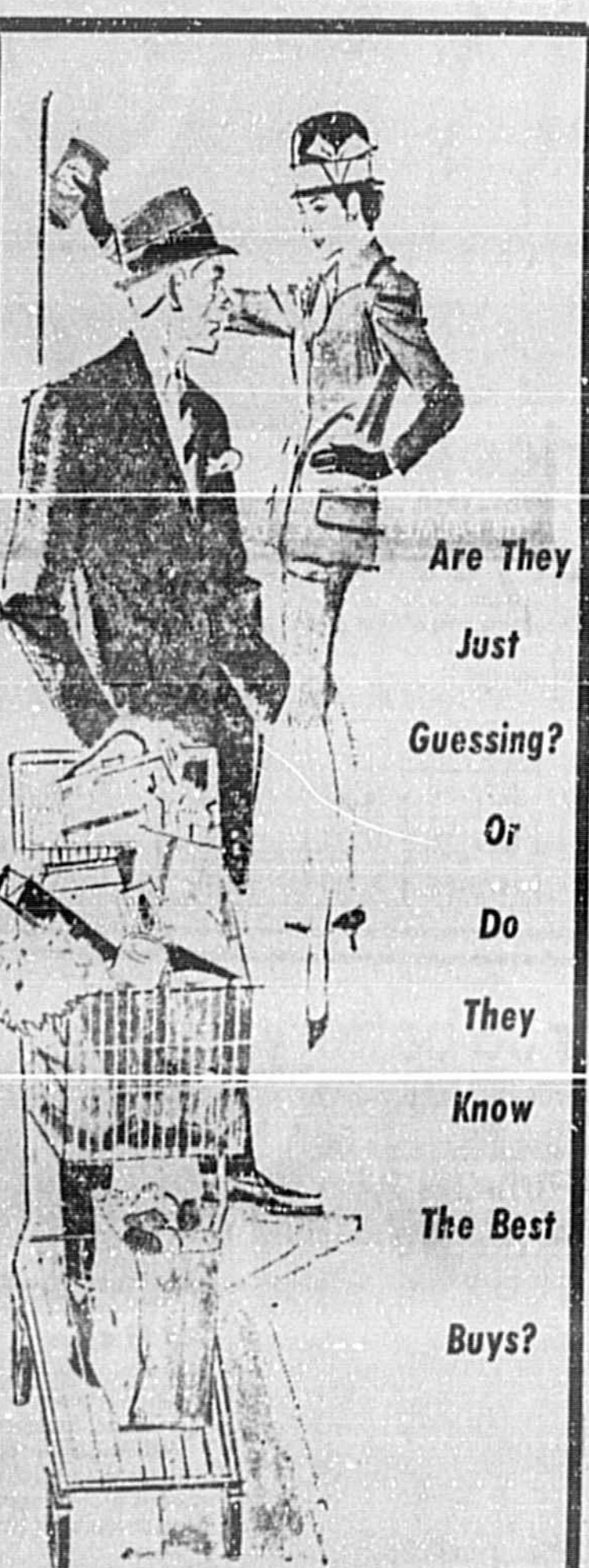
He noted that approximately 250 of West Germany's 750 Starfighters crashed, and he said, "You would certainly think that an impartial government board would have had an investigation and sued for their own nationals. And here the Italian government should be suing, but it isn't."

Italian newspapers have accused two former defense ministers and other high-ranking government officials of receiving payoffs from Lockheed during negotiations for the purchase of 14 Hercules cargo planes in 1970. No such charges have been made in connection with Starfighter purchases by Italy, but the company has been accused of paying \$15 million in West Germany to Franz Josef Strauss' right-wing political party in the early 1960's while Strauss as defense minister was buying Starfighters for the West German air force.

Belli refused to name the Italians suing Lockheed. He explained that the West German government had tried to stop his first suit for a German widow and even threatened to block his clients' air force payments.

He said he had been invited to Italy by the brother of an air force major who died in a Starfighter and who read about the Germans' suits.

Belli said he would begin proceedings early in March and "it'll probably take about a year to get into court." He said six of the Italian cases would be tried in federal court in San Francisco and the seventh, involving a death in the 1960s, probably in North Carolina.

# Will Replace Daniel Moynihan William Scranton To Get Top U.N. Post

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford today is naming William W. Scranton, former governor of Pennsylvania, to be U.S. ambassador to the United Nations.

The President invited reporters to a 10-30 a.m. EST meeting in the Oval Office at the White House with Scranton and Daniel Patrick Moynihan, who has resigned as U.N. ambassador.

There was no immediate announcement of Scranton's appointment, but administration sources said the former governor would be named to the U.N. post at that time.

Moynihan, whose outspoken speeches at the United Nations aroused controversy, submitted his resignation Feb. 2, citing a desire to return to teaching at Harvard University at the end of this month to avoid losing his tenure.

But Moynihan also indicated privately that he was not happy with what he regarded as lack of support in Washington, especially at the State Department, where he said some officials were displaced by his tactics.

However, Ford has said that Moynihan's successor at the United Nations would "follow the same policy of challenging some of the third or fourth world powers, calling a spade a spade."

"Obviously there aren't many Pat Moynihans when it comes to flair and flamboyance, but the basic policy will be identical," Ford told reporters earlier this month.

Some Moynihan critics said that his caustic language, especially against developing nations, was often counterproductive to the American objective of breaking up block voting at the United Nations.

Scranton, who made an unsuccessful bid in 1964 for the Republican presidential nomination, has been described as a moderate in foreign and domestic policies.

He served as an adviser to former President Richard M. Nixon and helped Ford set up his White House staff when he succeeded Nixon 18 months ago. Scranton has turned down previous Ford offers of positions in Washington.

He and his wife live in a mansion built by his parents in Scranton, Pa., which is named for his forefathers.

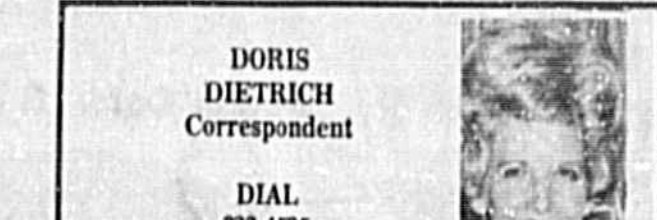

**GARLIC CHICKEN**  
2 tablespoons olive oil  
1/2-pound round steak, chicken, cut up  
Salt and pepper  
1/2 cup minced fresh parsley  
Peeled whole cloves from 1 head garlic  
1/2 cup dry white wine  
Four the oil into a heavy 3 or 4-quart casserole with a tight-fitting cover. Sprinkle the chicken with salt and pepper and arrange it in the casserole (breast portions at the top) with the parsley and garlic cloves between the layers. Add the wine. Cover. Press a strip of foil around edge of casserole to help seal it tightly. Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven until chicken is tender - 1 1/2 hours. Serve with the thin sauce and the garlic cloves which will be extremely mild in flavor. In French fashion, they may be spread on bread. Makes 4 to 6 servings. Any leftover chicken is delicious sliced cold for sandwiches because it is flavorful.

**DINNER FOR FOUR**  
Potatoes Green Beans  
Orange Grapefruit  
ORANGE GRAPEFRUIT  
3 grapefruit  
1 orange  
1 cup sugar  
Over a bowl, cut peel away from grapefruit so no white membrane remains; cut sections away from dividing membranes. Squeeze juice from flesh attached to inner part of grapefruit peel into the bowl. Drain grapefruit sections, reserving juice. With a swivel-blade vegetable peeler, remove orange part only from the rind of the orange; cut this rind into extremely thin long strips. Over low heat stir together 1/2 cup of the reserved grapefruit juice, the orange rind strips and the sugar until sugar dissolves; boil gently, without stirring, about 8 minutes - mixture will be very thick. Mix carefully with drained grapefruit sections; chill. Makes 4 servings. (Use any remaining grapefruit juice and the orange rind in the yellow rind some other time.)

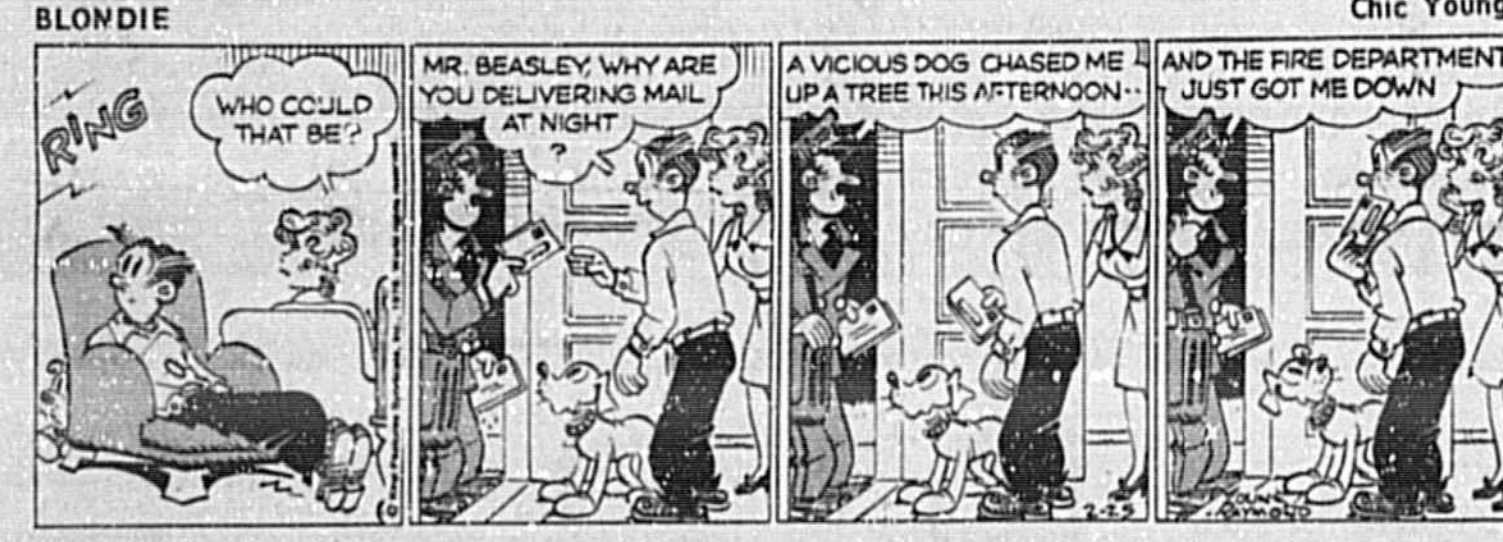
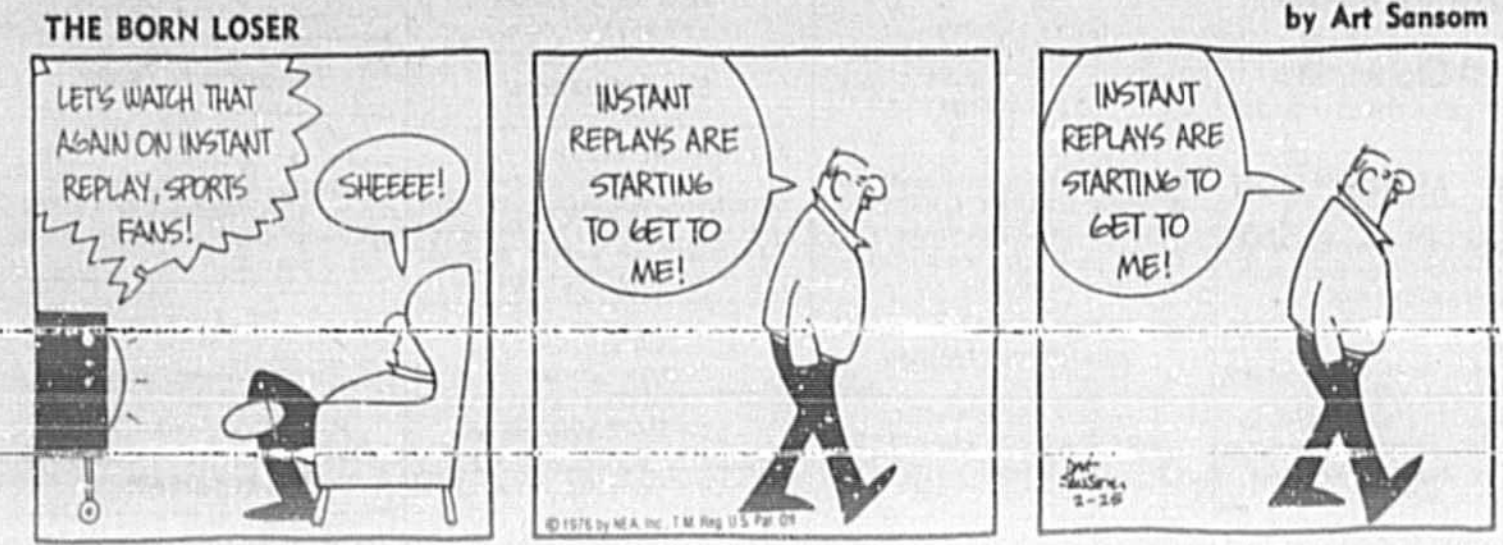

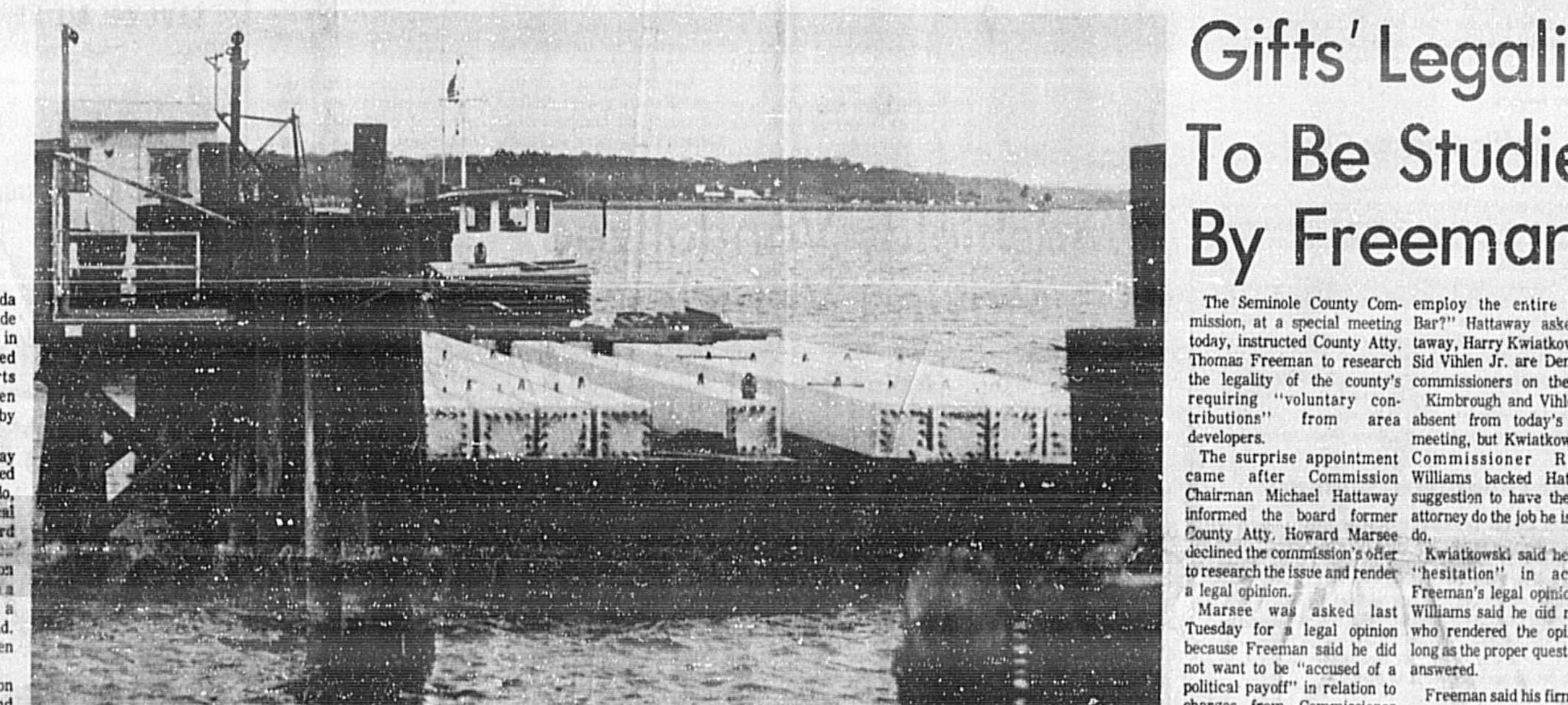
