

48-Hour Week Begins in N. J.; Workers Quit

Employees Start Exodus To Evade Order By New York Jobs

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 27.—The 48-hour week began today in Essex County and in the industrial and waterfront areas of Hudson, Bergen and Union Counties, and no sooner did the extended work week get under way than the War Relocation Commission received reports of a threatened exodus of workers to New York to evade the longer hours.

Officially, less than half the employees in the Newark critical labor-shortage area were put on the new schedule. Major Howard J. Lepper, acting director of the W. M. C. for the area, said that 243,000, or 43 per cent of the area's 750,000 workers, began the longer work week and that there still is considerable paper work to be done before all workers are under the mandatory 48-hour-week regulation of the W. M. C.

India's 10-Year Population Rise Is 50,000,000

Total Was 588,997,955 In 1941; Increase Laid To Death Drop

LONDON, Aug. 27.—The population of India has increased by 50,000,000 in the last ten years, according to 1941 census figures released this week by the India Office.

The increase represents more than the combined population of England, Scotland and Wales and is more than the population of any European country except Germany and Russia. India's population in 1941 was 588,997,955, of which about 50,000,000 was urban and the rest rural. Sixty-six percent of the total was Hindu, 21 percent Moslem and 6 percent of tribal origin. Europeans numbered 135,000 including British soldiers, or about one for every 3,000 of population. The large ten-year increase in population was due, according to the India Office, to reduction of material and child mortality and decreased in death rate among Indians from such diseases as cholera and plague.

In twenty years, it was said, the infant mortality rate has gone down from 195 a 1,000 to 160, while the general death rate has dropped from thirty-one to twenty-two. There are 935 women to every 1,000 men in India. In British India only the Madras Presidency and Orissa show slight excesses of females over males, while Baluchistan has only 703 women for every 1,000 men, and the Punjab 847.

The 1941 census was the eighth in a series. One million enumerators were employed. In the past the test of literacy in the Indian census was ability to read a letter and write the answer. In the 1941 census the test of literacy was ability to read only. There was a 70 percent increase in literacy among the Indians on this basis in 1941 over 1931. The male increase was 80 percent and the female 150.

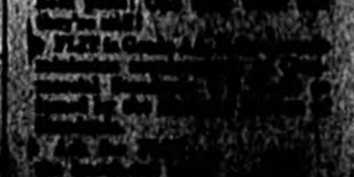
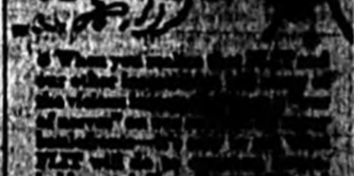

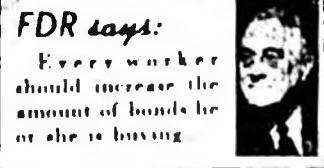

Knex Hints At New Assaults Against Japan

Hornet Is 12th Aircraft Carrier To Be Launched Since Beginning Of War

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Aug. 30. (AP)—The aircraft carrier Hornet was launched today amid cheers of spectators who heard Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox hint broadly at plans for large scale aerial blows against Tokyo. The ship replaces a flat top of the same name sunk last year in the Santa Cruz Islands.

The approximately one dozen new combat aircraft carriers launched since the attack on Pearl Harbor will help "smash the Jap into complete defeat." This was reported by the navy yesterday—the 30th anniversary of the establishment of the naval aviation arm by order of Admiral George Dewey of Manila bay fame.

One of the new carriers, the Hornet, was launched at Norfolk, Va. today. It succeeds the old Hornet, from which army planes took off to bomb Tokyo. In addition to the giant carriers, the navy said undisclosed numbers of "baby flat-tops" are in action or approaching readiness for battle.

Poised For Drive
"High tank forces, spearheaded by carrier-based aircraft, are poised for new pilot driver blows against the enemy," said Vice Adm. John S. McCain, deputy chief of naval operations for air, in an anniversary address.

"The navy has always sought to bring all its weapons to bear against an enemy simultaneously," he said. "The most effective way of attack is the most effective."

"Naval aviation has become an extremely powerful weapon, capable of the most powerful blows against an enemy's land forces," he said. "The navy is now in a position to strike at the enemy's rear, to cut off his lines of communication, and to strike at his heart."

Grew From Small Growth
All of the navy reported, grew from 15 aircraft carriers in 1918 to 103 enlisted men and 54 airplanes at the outbreak of the first world war.

Continued from page two: resistance immediately as Danish naval forces scuttled most of their fleet in a battle with German troops.
Forty-five ships were scuttled as the battle raged in Copenhagen harbor with Nazis storming in vainly trying to prevent the destruction and one Danish battleship who escaped to Sweden. Fighting also was reported in Copenhagen barracks between the German and Royal Guard this afternoon.
Fresh German troops, planes, tanks and armored cars were being flown into the strategic kingdom swept by rebellion and sabotage.
Proclamation Martial Law: Nazi Gen. Hermann von Hammerstein proclaimed martial law, threatened ruthless enforcement of his terms.
Some Danish ships, two small destroyers, six torpedo boats, and a minesweeper fled to Sweden, escaping the Nazi search.
The nation of 4,000,000 people who occupy the peninsula and islands dividing the North and Baltic Seas.
The Germans were taking no chances of being cut off in this country which affords the shortest invasion highway by land to Berlin.
King, Interested: Venerable King Christian X, who will be 77 next month, was interned in Sorgenfri castle outside Copenhagen and other government leaders, captured and were arrested after scorning an eight point German ultimatum, said advisers speaking through a strict communication blackout.
The Danish scuttling followed on a smaller scale the blazing French example when the Germans poured into Paris last November to overrun all France in a vain bid to seize the French fleet.
Violent explosions shook the Copenhagen harbor area in the night, produced a great amount of smoke and blasted holes in ship hulls to sink them to the bottom.
The detonations drowned out machinegun and rifle shots and the rattle of tanks as Danes and Germans clashed on the shore.
Fires started by the explosions cast a thick smoke pall over the harbor.
"Denmark's Fighting Ships" lists the Danish navy as having 590 coastal defense ships—the Niels level of 3000 tons and Peder Strøm of 1500 tons which lie between a destroyer and cruiser in size, 34 torpedo boats, 12 submarines, three minesweepers, and other patrol and depot ships.
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, North Africa, Aug. 26, (AP)—Danish forces carried out 12 crushing new attacks on Italy Saturday extending all the way from north

of Rome where 100 planes of the Terzi rail junction to the southern Italian coast, which reconnaissance revealed was a lead and deserted area. Allied fighters and bombers shot down 32 more German planes for a total of nearly 600. An aircraft destroyed in combat on ground in nine days of the campaign.

The new attacks included the first since the beginning of the struggle over Italy on the Adriatic coast after nearly all lines to the south had been temporarily paralyzed.
Between 45 and 50 enemy fighters swarmed in to break up the landing but with the help of the fighting escorts the Fortresses forced through to carry out a five-minute attack that was of record intensity for this theater. Lines of high explosives cleared the railway tracks, and blasted a gas works, an electrical works, the railway repair shops and the naval arsenal.

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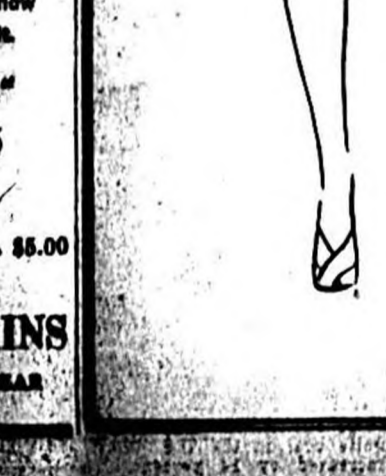

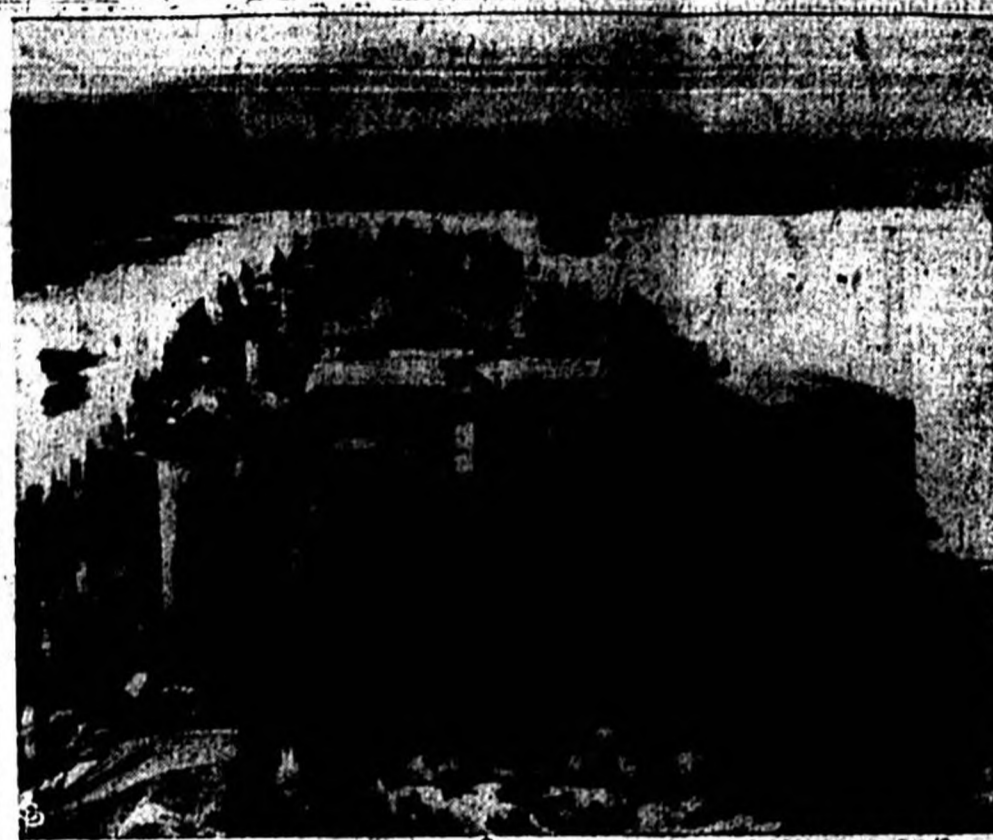

Allies Were Caught Unprepared For Recent Collapse Of Fascist Regime

The Allies were caught unprepared by Mussolini's downfall. We blundered in our political warfare. We were not prepared, as a result, to take immediate advantage of the chaos in Italy following Mussolini's fall because our diplomats were determined that there should be no real democratic revolution in state treasury. NEW YORK—As the baseball season turns the August corner and rolls into the final month, owners, managers, coaches and players are breathing a lot easier than they did earlier this year. Business hasn't been too tough. The war didn't take too many of the game's stars. The sport escaped the non-deferrable draft jobs list, and things are looking up for next year.

It wasn't so many months ago that pessimists were warning like banshees that baseball would never last until Labor Day. They moaned that the baseball fan wouldn't be interested in the quality of the games this year; that he would be too busy in war jobs, or victory gardens; or he would prefer to go out to see the greatest gallop.

As it turned out, it was a lot of little changes. There was a slight decline in attendance early in the season, but that was due more to the weather than anything else. Some of the teams will lose money to be sure, but try to name a year when one or more clubs didn't use red ink in their books.

As a matter of fact, the baseball fans have been coming back in such droves—if they were really missing earlier in the season—that attendance records in several cities are even surpassing last year's figures. The Browns Athletics and Phillies have been drawing better than they have for years.

MAY TRAIN IN SOUTH AGAIN! With their problems for this year fairly well settled, outside of the world series—and the Yankees and Cardinals will take care of that—baseball owners are already making plans for next year. **THERE ARE PLANS TO RETURN TO SOUTHERN TRAINING CAMPS!** If you talked to a baseball team owner a few months ago about going back down south to train, he would have slipped all-ways with a faint sh-h-h on his lips. They were given to understand that it was against the government's wishes, and they didn't want to do anything that would rile Uncle Sam.

Along around time for the All-Star game, word got about that the government had never said

that the majors couldn't train in Florida last spring. Then the magnates woke up to the fact that it wasn't any OOT order that had deprived the teams of a trip south and loss of revenue, but a voluntary suggestion by Judge Landis, The Office of Defense Transportation simply asked that baseball reduce its transportation and cut out some of the exhibition games. It was then that the high commissioner solemnly made his patriotic gesture and said that there would be no spring training south of the Potomac or the Ohio in 1943.

Taxpayers To Be Given Assistance In Filing Estimated Income Report

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 30. (Special) John I. Faha, Collector of Internal Revenue, has announced that every possible assistance will be given to taxpayers required to file a declaration of estimated tax on or before Sept. 15. The Internal Revenue Office located at Orlando will remain open each week day from 8:30 A. M. to 5:00 P. M. from now through Sept. 15. Deputy collectors will be available to assist taxpayers in filing their declarations of estimated tax.

Deputy Collector Harry C. Hannah and Deputy Collector John K. Hill will be at the Chamber of Commerce on Sept. 8 and 9, to assist taxpayers in Seminole County and vicinity.

Taxpayers are advised, however, that in order to complete this declaration they must have certain information that has not been heretofore required in the preparation of income tax returns. The following is an outline of the information required and local deputy collectors have requested taxpayers to be sure and bring this information with them when requesting assistance:

1. ESTIMATED VICTORY TAX WITHHELD. This is the 8% tax which has been withheld from wages between January 1 and July 1, 1943. If the taxpayer has not kept a record of these amounts or has not retained his pay check vouchers showing the amounts, it will be necessary for him to secure this information from his employer. This information is not available at the Office of the Collector of Internal Revenue.

2. ESTIMATED INCOME TAX WITHHELD. This is the new withholding tax which took effect on July 1, 1943. In most cases, the amount can be ascertained at the time the amount was withheld from any one payroll period and multiplying this by the number of such payroll periods occurring during the six months period from July 1, 1943 to December 31, 1943. Persons who do not know how much is being withheld from their current wages should secure this information from their employer.

3. COPY OF YOUR INCOME TAX RETURN (1940 or 1940A) AND FOR 1941. This copy will be of assistance in estimating taxpayer's 1943 liability and will also furnish the information as to

which year's liability is greater, 1942 or 1943.

RECORDS OF PAYMENTS DURING 1943 ON 1942 INCOME TAX. This information is necessary in order to fill out Line 4, Form 1040 ES. In most cases, if the taxpayer has paid his 1942 tax in quarterly installments, the amount will be one-half of the amount shown on Form 1040 or 1040-A. However, in cases of doubt, it will be advisable to locate cancelled checks or other receipts of payments.

TAX PAID AT THE SOURCE ON TAX-FREE COVENANT BONDS. This is a two percent tax, with respect to which ownership certificates are filed by the bondholders. Most taxpayers owning tax-free covenant bonds have a record of the tax withheld at the source during the first six months of 1943; the total for the year would be twice that amount.
