An airlift will bring about 30 members of Heavy Attack Squadron 11 to the Sanford Naval Air Station tonight. The men have been deployed aboard the carrier USS Roosevelt since last spring. Five squadron aircraft flew to the station over the weekend.

The unit will be home only until repairs are complete on the Roosevelt which returned to New York from the Mediterranean after having propped problems. Repairs are expected to take about a week or so. The squadron is commanded by Cdr. Robert W. Kennedy and will return to the Mediterranean with the ship when it leaves New York.

The USS Independence, home carrier for VAH-11, Detachment 8, has assumed the Roosevelt's commitment in the Mediterranean during the repair period.

Those high waves spilling over the Lake Monroe seawall yesterday made a pretty picture but probably caused some concern with state officials. The seawall has taken virtually a perpetual pounding since the two recent hurricanes, the nor'easter and a couple of cold fronts moving down the state.

Seminole County Tax Assessor Mary Earle Walker said today her office will complete the 1964 tax roll this week and it will be turned over to Seminole County Tax Collector John L. Galloway.

Sales tax collections in Seminole County continue to rise, according to the latest data given by J. Ed Straughn, director of the Florida Revenue Commission. Last September the take was listed at \$88,931.90 compared with \$79,424.62 for the previous September.

And while in the statistical department, we're told that the gasoline tax take in the county for last September was \$109,022.97 compared with \$94,539.20 a year previous.

Isbell Blowing 50 MPH Squalls

MIAMI (UPI) — Tropical storm Isbell traveled slowly toward western Cuba today with 50 mile-an-hour squalls and assured storm-weary south Florida of its third day of rain.

Isbell sprang out of the western Caribbean Monday night and the Miami Weather Bureau said the storm was located about 450 miles southwest of Miami or 70 miles south-southeast of Cape San Antonio, Cuba, early today.

SNAS Begins Drive For United Fund

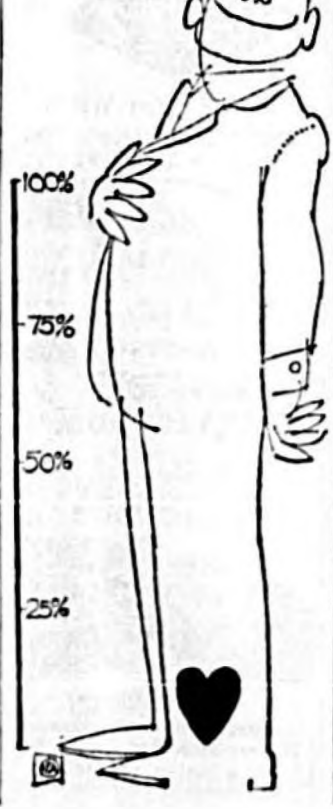
The 1964 United Fund drive was on the wing today at the Sanford Naval Air Station following briefing meetings and the receipt of material for workers in the four-week drive.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson returned to the White House today, elated by a 9,000-mile stump tour which saw him attract record crowds while campaigning on a "peace and prosperity" platform in 14 states.

The President ended his campaign trip in Boise, Idaho, Monday night very hoarse after the week-long trek. He resumes his campaigning in New Jersey Wednesday. Johnson announced plans Monday to campaign in Texas, his home state, this weekend.

CARACAS (UPI) — Air Force Lt. Col. Michael Smolen of Chandler, Ariz., told newsmen early today he was "relatively well treated" by the Communist kidnapers who held him prisoner for 87 hours over the weekend.

TOPEKA, Kan. (UPI) — Sen. Barry M. Goldwater today demanded "a major redirection" of U.S. space efforts in light of what he called "the shocking news" about a multi-passenger Soviet orbital flight.

County Sets New Garbage Policy

The Board of County Commissioners today established a new policy under which garbage collections firms must operate. In addition, the Commission voted to deny the ABC Garbage Collection Company further use of county dump areas and instructed attorney Harold Johnson to proceed to collect \$595 past due to the county for using the dumps.

Trio Aboard Described As 'Feeling Fine'

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union today brought its three-man space ship safely back to earth. The pilot and his two passengers were reported "feeling fine."

The space bus called Voskhod (Sunrise) orbited the earth 16 times in 24 hours and 17 minutes, traveling 437,500 miles. Then, on orders from the ground the biggest of all space vehicles came back to earth at 10:47 a.m. (2:47 a.m. EST). It landed "at the pre-assigned area after successfully accomplishing the set program of scientific exploration," said Tass, the official Soviet news agency.

Tass did not say where Voskhod was launched or where it landed. But it said it was designed to stay up 24 hours, although other sources indicated the space journey may have been planned for a longer period.

The feat of the three Soviet spacemen — pilot-commander Col. Vladimir Komarov, 37, scientist Konstantin Feoktistov, 38, and space surgeon Boris Vozgorov, 27 — raised speculation that Russia is ahead of the United States in the race for the moon.

James E. Webb, chief of the U. S. National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said in Washington Monday that the United States is "in a period of catching up." But he said the American Saturn V rocket "is designed to overcome that lead."

Ernest E. Grant, 22, was serving two five-year sentences on breaking and entering charges. He fled from a work gang on Highway 415, about five miles south of Highway 11 at about 1:25 p. m. Monday.

Casselberry today has a new alcoholic beverage ordinance, a new location for the sale of "off-the-premises" beer and new commercial property to accommodate two business firms. Town Council Chairman Edward Lunn, on all three measures, voted to break 2-2 deadlocks.

The Council adopted a new alcoholic beverage license to replace the "gentlemen's agreement" under which stores have been operating. It also approved a license for the sale of beer on an off-the-premises basis to Robert Newell, operator of the Elk Service Station on U.S. 17-92 and the Seminola Boulevard cutoff.

The Council approved retaining "commercial" certain sections of the Normandy Addition to permit the construction of buildings to house Hirsch Chemical Company and Advance Design Associates. This action is contingent upon an agreement by Seminole Little League, Inc., which now holds a lease from the Town of Casselberry.

This is Newspaper Week. Instead of telling you how good newspapers are, we think you are entitled to know what a newspaper tries to do.

Its goal is to try to help you understand your environment and to help you change that environment when this seems wise.

At this modest-sized newspaper there are 96 men and women attempting to pass a long the facts you should know. You are made aware of regulations like leash laws, trash-burning laws, and zoning ordinances so that you can keep out of trouble. You are told how to get your garbage picked up, where to dump your trunk, what's on at the movies, and what the title of next Sunday's sermon will be.

You learn the hours of the post office and the courthouse, the time you pay your taxes without penalty, and about any contagious disease in your neighborhood.

You also discover proposed chan-

ges in school programs, mill levies, employment prospects, and recreational projects. You can turn to your newspaper for reliable shopping news.

If something goes wrong in the community, most people look to their local newspaper for a remedy. Courageous newspapers respond to these situations and generally get them corrected—often losing thousands of dollars in business during the crusade.

Newspapers are human institutions guided by a great tradition. Unlike the press in most countries, the American newspapers are self-supporting organizations. They don't depend on a political party, a church, or an industrial corporation to stay alive. Consequently, the United States newspaper is as free to communicate with its public as any on earth.

This is not to claim perfection. The press, when it is wise, listens to critical comment as readily as it expresses critical comment of others.

Keep Letters Clean

Letters to the Editor of The Herald have, in some instances, ranged far beyond the boundaries of decency and fair play set up by this newspaper.

Such letters will be dismissed by the Editors and will not appear in print. In the past, some have, due to The Herald's effort to allow both sides of all issues to be aired on an equal basis.

The practice of some persons to switch the political fight from political issues to personalities is neither condoned nor allowed by Herald Editors.

We will print ALL the letters from ANYBODY on both sides of

political issues as long as they are in good taste.

The Herald repeats its policy of insisting that all letters to the Editor must be confined within the boundaries of decency and fair play. None others will appear.

Dr. Crane's Worry Clinic

Alan was bitten by a stray dog. Was it rabid? What should you do if you are bitten by a strange animal, or even your own household pet? Scrapbook this case for it gives you the simple a-b-c procedure to follow to protect human beings. Don't panic but be sure the animal is checked for rabies!

CASE U-402: Alan D., aged 5, likes animals.

"Dr. Crane," his frantic mother telephoned me, "Alan saw an Irish setter eating from our garbage can in the alley."

"So Alan went over to pet the dog on the head. But it bit him."

"One of the dog's fangs went almost clear through Alan's wrist."

"So what should I do? The dog fled when Alan screamed and I ran out to see what was wrong."

"Suppose the dog had rabies. Should I take Alan for anti-rabies shots or what?"

"Mad Dog Strategy. Dogs, squirrels, skunks and many other creatures may have rabies."

But when a human being is infected, it requires 4 to 8 weeks incubation time.

So the usual procedure is to have the wound swabbed out with disinfectant.

If the animal is a pet, then the dog is usually caged for 14 days to see if it really has rabies.

For a rabid dog will die within 14 days.

If it doesn't die after two weeks, then you don't need to fret about rabies.

And you can thus save yourself or your youngster the somewhat painful process of many daily vaccinations.

But if the dog dies, its head should then be examined to make sure of the diagnosis.

If the dog dies within 14 days and the laboratory report comes back "Rabies," then you should immediately start the daily vaccinations!

Remember, you still have

about a month to build up immunity in your child to rabies.

However, if the bite is near the brain, as on the child's face, then the time is less.

So the farther away the bite occurs, the more time the victim has before rabies will affect his brain.

In Alan's case, the dog belonged to a family in the next block.

Other children identified the animal and its owner sent him to the veterinary hospital for 14 days of observation.

Luckily, the dog was still alive after the end of that 2-week period, so Alan didn't need to go through the lengthy vaccination procedure.

But suppose the dog was a stray and couldn't be located! Then you would never know for sure if it was rabid or not.

In which case, you should immediately contact your physician and start the anti-rabies vaccinations.

"I'll kill that dog," Alan's father had angrily exclaimed as soon as he heard of the accident.

But that's not smart! Instead, adopt a watchful waiting policy with the dog penned up till you see if it is still alive after 14 days.

For millions of people get bitten, including many post-men. But those animals are usually not rabid.

So it is cheaper, simpler and less painful to wait 14 days, since you then have

Political Notebook

NEW YORK (NEA)—Both the private pollsters and the private comments of certain knowledgeable Democrats make a continuing puzzle of the New York race for the U. S. Senate between Sen. Kenneth Keating and Robert Kennedy.

Private samplings put the two candidates very close, with a very large undecided vote still indicated.

Some veteran Democratic appraisers say in one breath that Bob Kennedy is in grave trouble in a lot of places, and in the next that their hunch is he will win in November.

Let's look first at what they consider some of the bad trouble signs.

One Democrat says he knows 15 district leaders in his own party in New York City who report they are planning to vote for Keating. More than a few of these are in Brooklyn, and a majority are NOT reform Democrats—as one might expect.

Much has rightly been made of possibly crippling defections among New York's sizable Jewish bloc. This is a source of real worry to the Kennedy forces. But some Democrats say Kennedy's evident weakness with Italian-Americans, the state's largest single voting bloc (18 per cent of the total), should be cause for at least equal worry.

At a recent Tammany Hall meeting in Manhattan, leaders from the Lower East Side and from both Irish and Jewish sectors of the Upper West Side sang the Kennedy blues.

What they said in effect: "Don't blame us if he takes a cuffing in our areas."

A careful poll of 600 persons in part of Republican Rep. John Lindsay's Manhattan congressional district showed President Johnson 5 to 1 over Sen. Barry Goldwater. But Keating led Kennedy 3 to 1, though the normal GOP margin there is

around 5 to 4. A reform Democrat, loyal party though admittedly no friend of Kennedy's, says: "I fear there could be a mammoth secret vote against him."

It is generally assumed, of course, that Kennedy must take New York City by a margin of around 700,000 or more to triumph state-wide. Really heavy defections among Jews, Italians and other ethnic groups could prevent that vital buildup.

With all this gloom-mongering, what gives these Democratic appraisers the notion Robert Kennedy will, in the end, be elected?

One big thing is their growing belief that the President may take New York by soaring margins up to two million, perhaps surpassing Dwight Eisenhower's 1954 record margin of 1.6 million.

The feeling is that such a Johnson victory inescapably would exert a substantial lift to Kennedy's shaky fortunes.

Says one Democratic politician:

"If Johnson should win by two million, slightly more than one million voters would have to split their tickets to elect Keating. Nothing like that has ever happened in this state on such a scale."

Another idea, often only fursuilly articulated, is that it is a mistake ever to underestimate the resourcefulness of a Kennedy.

Kennedy's managers, and the candidate himself, know

their problems full well. They are hard at new approaches to the difficult matter of identifying him better with New York and cutting off the damaging image some have of him as a power-hungry young man eager to hitch the New York wagon to his personal star.

To the crucial Jewish voters, many of whom originally disapproved the late John F. Kennedy but greatly liked his administration, Bob Kennedy's advances may pose this:

"If you approved the late president's administration, how can you now wish to penalize Robert Kennedy, who was at his brother's shoulder, deeply involved in the decisions you like?"

The effectiveness of such approaches as this might be decisive in this most significant of all 1964 U. S. Senate races.

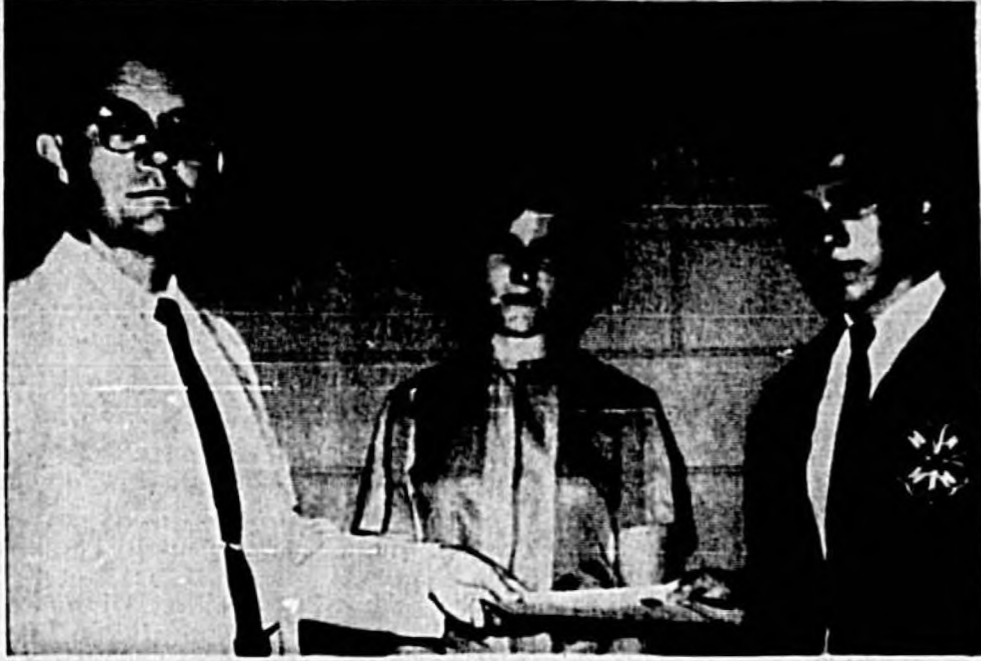

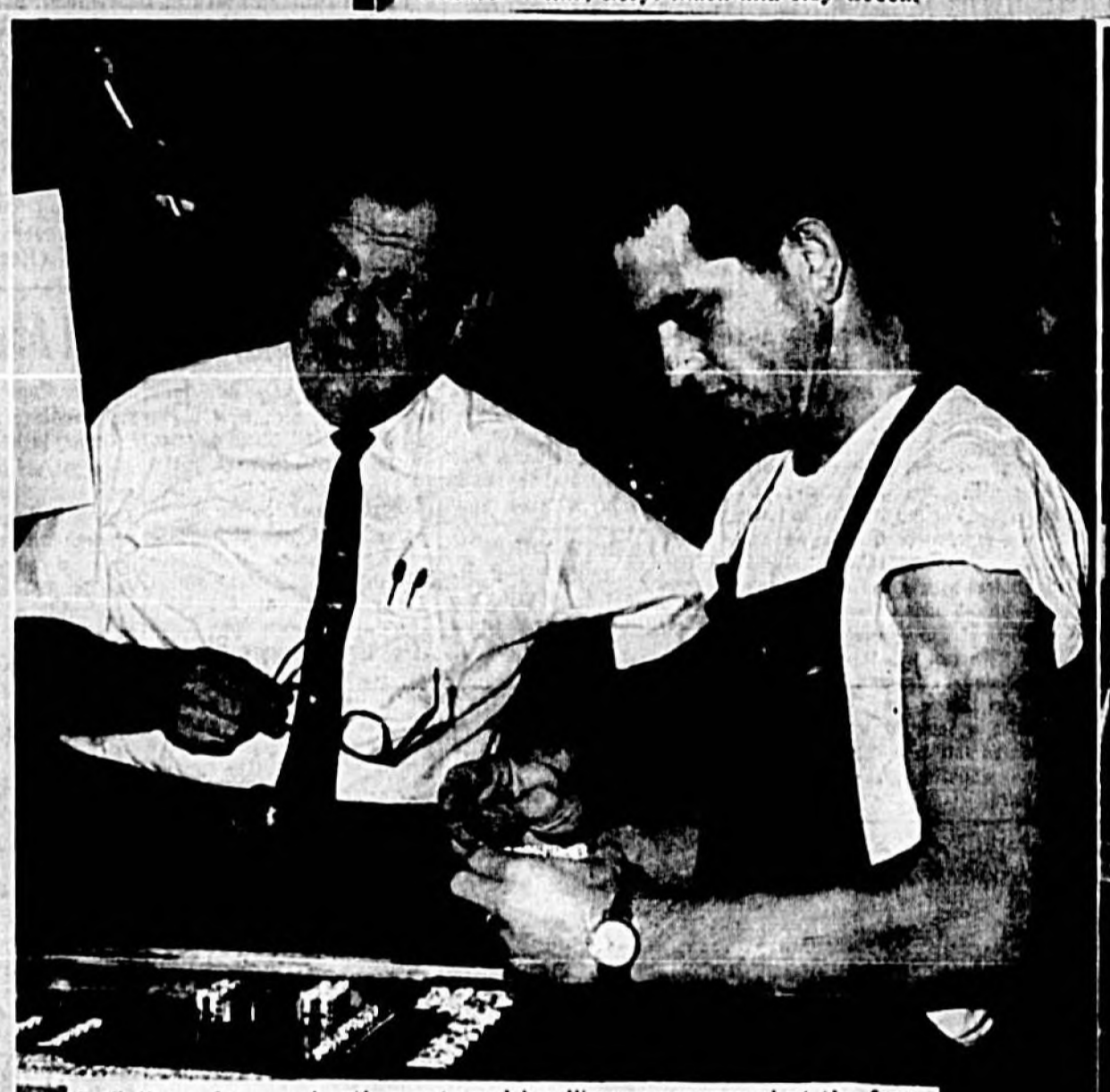

The Story Of A Story

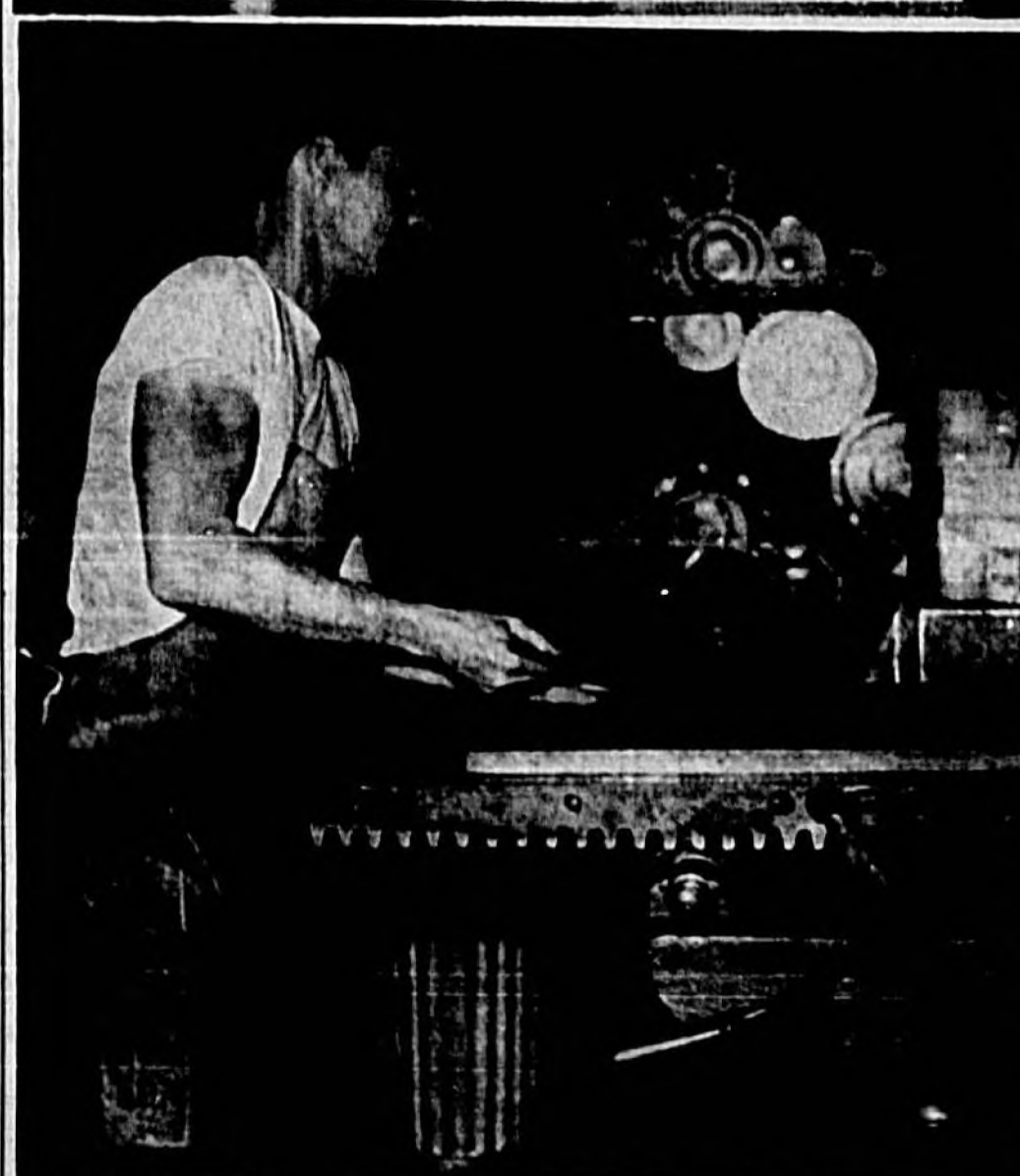

In observance of the occasion, The Sanford Herald would like to make its readers aware of the "story behind the story" . . . how a newspaper story is brought to you, from the time the reporter becomes aware that a story is coming up, to the time that you the subscriber "read all about it" in the evening. All of the Herald's 95 employees have a hand in it. The main office of the Sanford Herald on First St. is open to the public every day. But behind the scenes the news department keeps on working . . . 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, in order that you the reader may be made aware of what is happening . . . here, when, what, and how. Shown on this page is a pictorial "behind the scenes" expose of a story and picture which appear on today's front page concerning one of the city's most vital current issues, the progress of the waterfront development plan. The Herald's City Editor, Dottie Austin covered the story. Here's what happened from the original interview until the present moment.



9. Galleys of type, advertisements and headlines are arranged at the form by Ralph Hays, assistant shop superintendent as Associate Editor and sports writer Julian Stenstrom watches.



10. Headlines are cut on the Ludlow typograph machine by composer Clyde Walls, who sets each letter and lines it up on the "stick."



11. Pressroom Foreman Ray Stevens "rolls the mat" after all type is set into the form, preparing it for the casting machine. The mat is pressed into an image of the page being cast.



12. Sterotypers Tom Evans and Bill Hraswell check the casting after it comes out of the casting box. It will now be trimmed and clamped on the press.



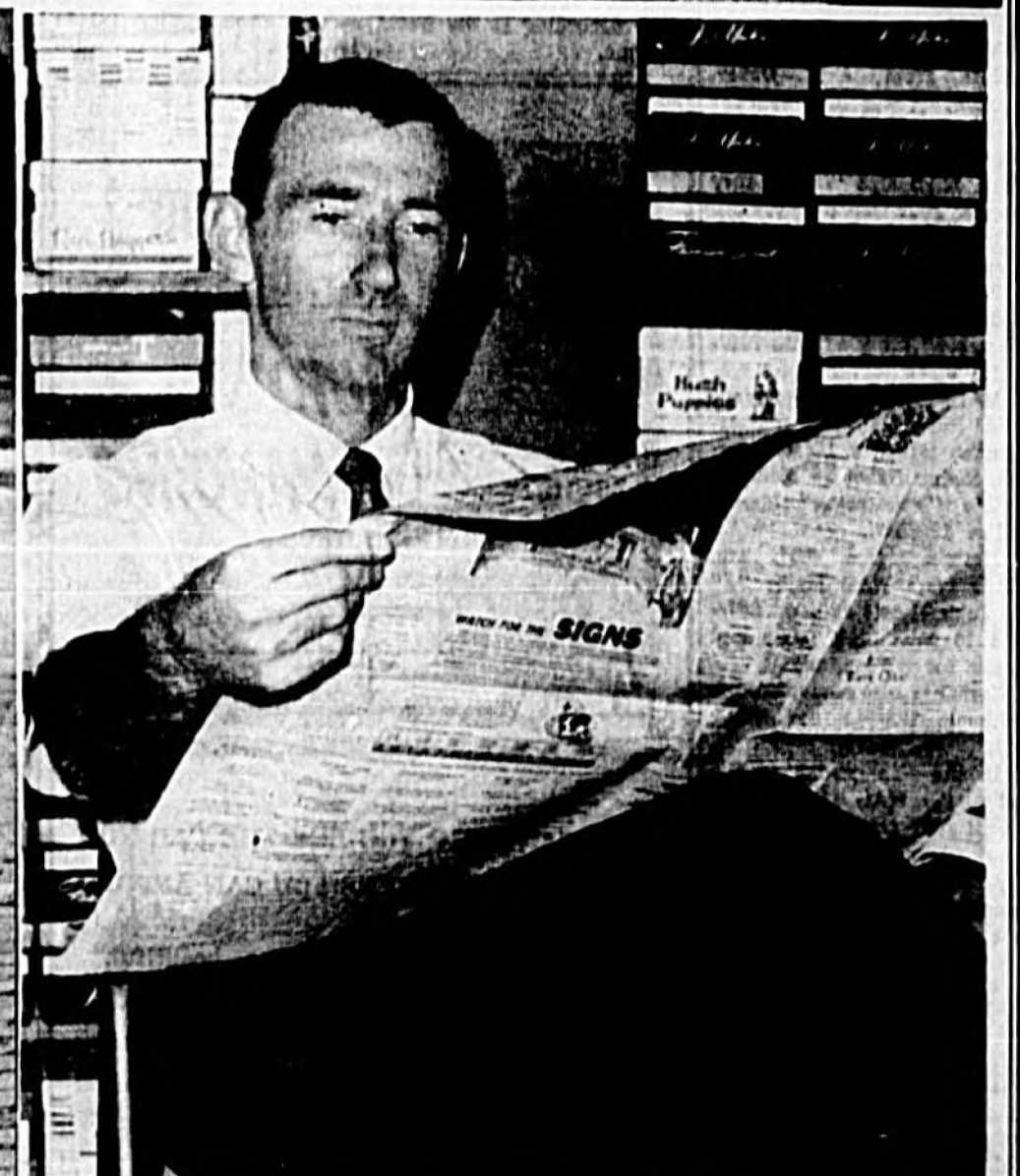
13. Circulation Manager Frank Voltolne catches and stacks the papers as they come off the press all folded and ready to be picked up by the carriers for distribution.

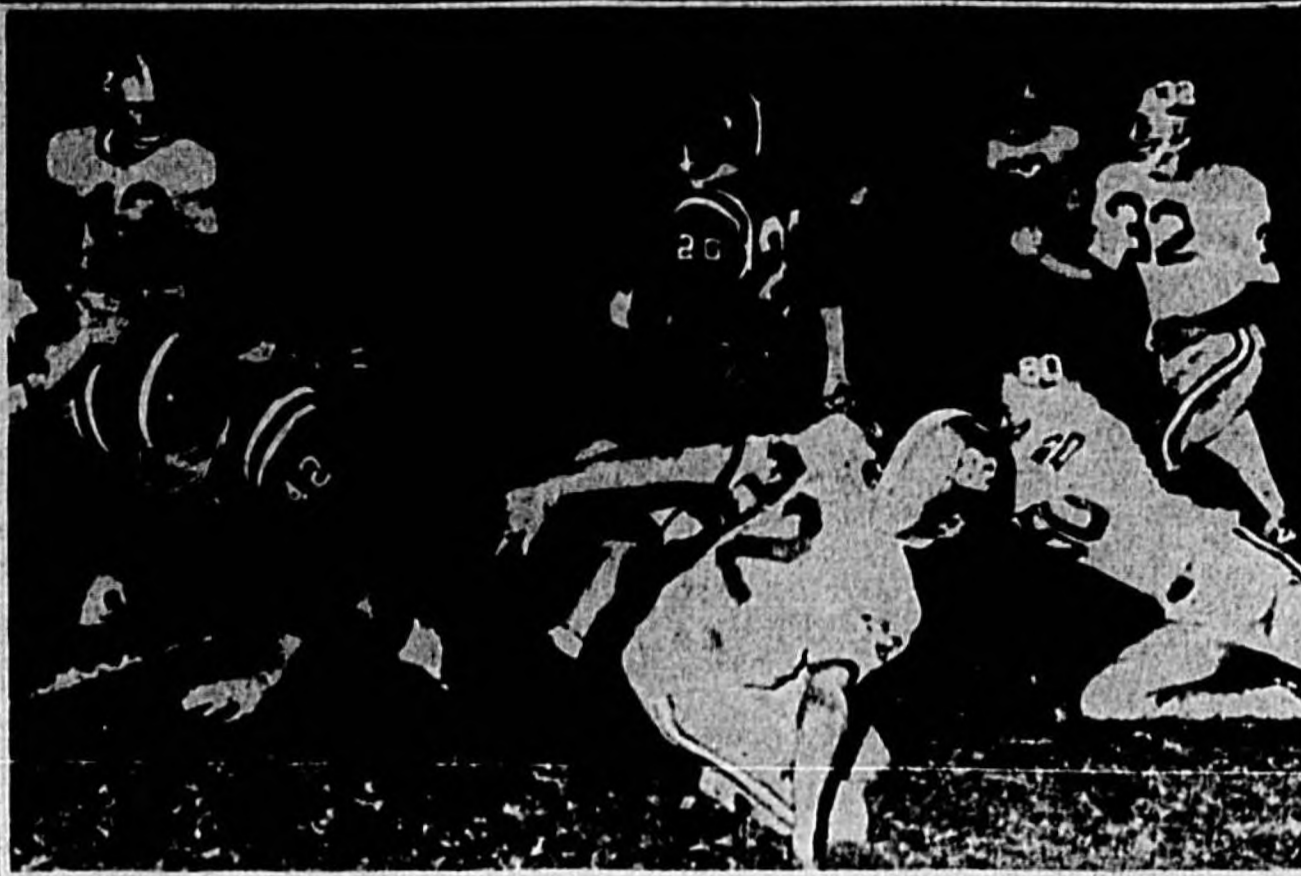
Hatwing One "B" won three from NAS Maint "A" as John Harris churned 257/686 to take high game and series for the league.

McCarver's Bat Makes Cards Series Choice

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — The St. Louis Cardinals, transformed from underdogs to favorites by one magic swing of Tim McCarver's bat, returned home today confident they will crush the Yankees and make St. Louis the first National League team in history to win seven world championships.

This was a day off for travel in the World Series. The classic, in which the Cardinals now lead the Yankees by three games to two and need only one more win to wrap up the title, resumes here Wednesday.

With the Cards on top, and the sixth and seventh (if necessary) games both scheduled in the Cards' home ball

yard. Oddsmakers who have astoundingly made the Yankees the series favorites ever since it began switched today and named St. Louis the 11-5 pick.

If the oddsmakers are right at last, then St. Louis will strengthen its tradition as the most successful National League club in World Series. At present the Cardinals are the only NL team to win six world championships, one more than the San Francisco (formerly New York) Giants.

"It has to look good from here," admitted Cardinal Manager Johnny Keane as he led his men home by plane immediately after Monday's 5-2 conquest of the Yankees in New York.

That went into the books today as one of the most dramatic games in series history, a contest that first saw Tom Tresh save New York from defeat in the ninth inning by hammering a two-run home run with two out—only to see McCarver top that with his three-run homer in the top half of the 10th to win it for the Cardinals.

The Cards, having won two straight games in enemy country after trailing 2-1 in the series, came home with

their spirits higher than ever, convinced by this comeback as well as their amazing National League pennant victory that they are a "team of destiny."

The series leaders planned to work out at Busch Stadium today, while the Yankees remained at home in New York where they planned to drill in Yankee Stadium.

When the series resumes Wednesday, it will be southpaw Curt Simmons on the mound for the Cardinals and probably righthander Jim Bouton for the Yankees. They were the third game rivals in New York and Bouton got a

2-1 victory on Mickey Mantle's ninth-inning homer off relief pitcher Barney Schultz.

There's just a chance the Yankees would switch to Whitey Ford, if Ford's damaged heel improved unexpectedly. Although the Cards now are favored to win the series, the Yankees remain slight choices to win the sixth game—by 6-5 odds if Bouton hurls, 13-10 if Ford goes.

"We can win it out there," insisted Yankee Manager Yogi Berra in New York, with a look in his eyes that dared you to suggest he may be whistling past a grave.

Clark Praises SSSH On Contest Against Braves

Capt. Allen Richey, an end, is out of action and probably he will be replaced by Leonard Hollis.

A JV tilt will get under way tonight at 5:30 and the main event is slated for 7:30.

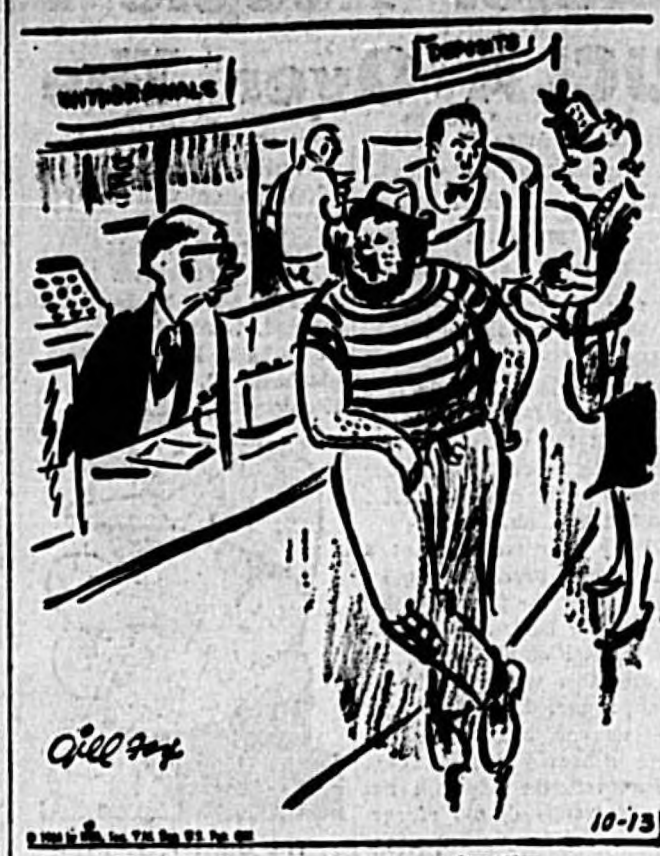

80 MPH Winds, Heavy Rains Batter Keys

MIAMI (UPI)—Hurricane Isbell, leaving at least four dead and heavy property damage behind it in Cuba, moved through the Florida Keys with 80 mile an hour winds and heavy rains today.

Peak fury of the season's sixth hurricane hit the nearly uninhabited Dry Tortugas Islands about 10 a.m. (EST).

Top Paper In Miller Area Endorses LBJ

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y. (UPI) — The Niagara Falls Gazette, leading newspaper in the home district of Republican Vice Presidential Candidate William E. Miller, Tuesday endorsed the Johnson-Humphrey ticket.

It was the first time in the newspaper's 110-year history it endorsed a Democratic candidate for president.

In an editorial, the Gazette said, "we believe Mr. Johnson proved his stature when he rose to the challenge posed by the assassination of President Kennedy. He guided the nation through a severe crisis and since then he has been a good president. He deserves election in his own right."

The paper said of Miller, "Mr. Miller has somehow become the victim of unwise campaign planning. He has acquired a reputation for hitting below the belt politics, not an attractive image earned or unearned for one who aspires to the vice presidency."

The Gazette supported the election of Miller to Congress in the past.

Board Votes Fund For County Census

Seminole County will have another nose-count soon but without the actual counting being made.

County Commission yesterday agreed to supply "up to \$300" for cost of the census which may pave the way for additional circuit court judges to serve the Ninth Judicial Circuit.

Population increases in the seven-county district since the 1960 census caused bar associations in each county to call on Gov. Farris Bryant to give an executive order for the count.

Carl R. Schilke of Sanford will head the Seminole poll.

Schilke said the governor has called for each of three census commissioners to "obtain from the U. S. Census Bureau an outline of proper criteria other than by actual counting of individuals . . . to determine the population of the circuit."

A public hearing will also be held by each commissioner

Sanford C. of C. Conservation Activity Begins

The Sanford Chamber of Commerce Tuesday began preliminary observation of the Florida Conservation Week activities scheduled for Oct. 26-31 with presentations of awards to movie producer Walt Disney and Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas.

The award of the plaque to Walt Disney was made by Mayor A. L. Wilson and Sanford Chamber President A. B. Peterson Jr. who flew to Hollywood, California to make the presentation. It was understood that the presentation was to be filmed. Disney was named recipient of the award because of the many films he has made dealing with America's flora and fauna.

At the same time, State Rep. Joe Davis was to fly to Washington, D. C. to present a similar award to Justice Douglas in his chambers at 2:30 p. m. today. Justice Douglas is the author of many articles and books on conservation.

The awards consist of a wooden plaque, upon which is mounted a brass scroll. The scroll reads: "To promote and preserve our natural heritage unspoiled that future generations of Americans may experience the wonder of nature in balance."

Other awards were to be made to "Smokey the Bear," for fire prevention work; Governor Farris Bryant, proclaimer of Florida Conservation Week; Secretary of State Tom Adams, noted proponent of better conservation practices; Russell Mason, executive director of the Florida Audubon Society; Don McAllister, well-known television personality in the field of fish and game conservation and Field and Stream Magazine.

October 26th will mark the opening of Florida Conservation Week activities in Sanford, host city for the first annual seminar-exposition.

Main speaker for the opening ceremonies will be Tom Adams, with large displays from both private and government groups expected to fill the Civic Center. Outdoor demonstrations and exhibits will be staged at Lake Monroe Industrial Park.

Merchandising Seminar Scores With Sanford Area Businessmen

"Do we have the courage to meet the challenge of a change? Or are we static, complacent?"

"Talk at the level of the customer. The customer tells us what to merchandise. . . . tell us how to sell it."

"Create an on-the-ball store image; keep the display area fresh, neat in housekeeping."

These and many more expert bits of advice were given to more than 130 Sanford area merchants last night at a Merchandising Seminar sponsored by the Florida State Bank.

Bank President T. E. Tucker and his executive vice president, Loring Burgess, were hosts for the seminar which attracted many more merchants and retailers than expected. Last minute arrangements were made to serve additional dinners to the group during intermission midway through the program.

The speakers were three top officials of Jordan Marsh Orlando.

They were Henri Guertin JM vice president and general

manager; David Jacobs, JM sales promotion manager, and Richard Hedenberg, JM display manager. They were introduced by Burgess.

News media in this area had displays of their operations in the bank lobby.

Guertin cited several principles necessary for a successful business, urging local merchants to "determine the type of business you want to run" and "set a certain standard for your business."

"A booming economy" is no assurance of success, he warned, saying "competition walks in the front door when we sunbathe on the rear patio."

He urged his audience to "have faith in what you've got and sell, sell, sell."

"Do we have the courage to meet the challenge of a change?" he declared. "Change is the fun of a business. Do you invite the challenge?"

Some merchants, he said, "just ride the coattails of others. They'll do all right. But how much better they would be if they would take advantage of the opportunities."

The JM official urged his

listeners to "take advantage of your natural resources. Develop the undeveloped. Get your imagination to work."

By having three principles—a reason for the business' existence; a plan, and follow-up to see that the plans are happening."

The next speaker, Jacobs, urged merchants to be "honest with your viewers, listeners and readers" in their advertising. Talk at the level of the customer. The customer tells us what to merchandise

Letting the customer know he or she is recognized for the ability to think, creates a favorable impression, Jacobs said. "Use everyday language and talk right to the customer," he added.

Hedenberg called for an "on-the-ball store image" and urged merchants to keep their displays fresh and "neat in housekeeping."

He again asserted the need for "a plan" in businesses. "Unless the display is done well, there's no point in having it," he noted.

The display must have a theme or a story and he reported his group stresses the use of props such as related furnishings, manikins and "other reusable items."

Miami Herald Endorses Johnson

MIAMI (UPI)—The Miami Herald, which has backed Republican candidates in recent presidential elections, has announced it is supporting President Lyndon B. Johnson in the 1964 campaign.

The Herald said that the campaign "has been a dull, disappointing affair . . . indeed, the contest for the world's most powerful office is about as exciting as a sewing bee and twice as glib."

The center passed 39 miles to the west of Key West where 50,000 residents hastily prepared for the worse but apparently were spared any major destruction.

"It's raining like hell," a newsmen for Key West radio station WKWF said by telephone. "It's coming down in sheets of water. We just recorded a wind gust of 65 miles an hour."

The broadcaster reported no apparent damage. The streets of the island city were deserted, he said, as residents remained in their boarded up homes and in about a dozen shelters opened by the Red Cross, and civilian agencies and U. S. Navy, opened 44 shelters equipped to handle 10,000 persons.

The Navy entertained its personnel in shelters with returns of the old "Victory at Sea" movies.

As the hurricane crossed the island chain heading for the Everglades at the southern tip of Florida, Dry Tortugas reported winds of 80 mph at 10 a.m.

The Tortugas are the site of the Civil War's Fort Jefferson where Dr. Samuel Mudd, the physician who treated President Lincoln's assassin, was imprisoned.

Only a man or two connected with the national monument and possibly a few fishermen live in the Tortugas Islands.

As Isbell's winds moved into Florida Bay, the weather bureau extended hurricane warnings to Lake Okechobee and from Fort Lauderdale to Vero Beach.

King Gets Nobel Peace Prize

OSLO, Norway (UPI)—Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., American Negro civil rights leader, won the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize today.

King, the leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), became the 12th American and the third Negro to win the award.

King's candidacy was sponsored by political figures in Europe and the United States and by newspapers of all political leanings in Norway.
