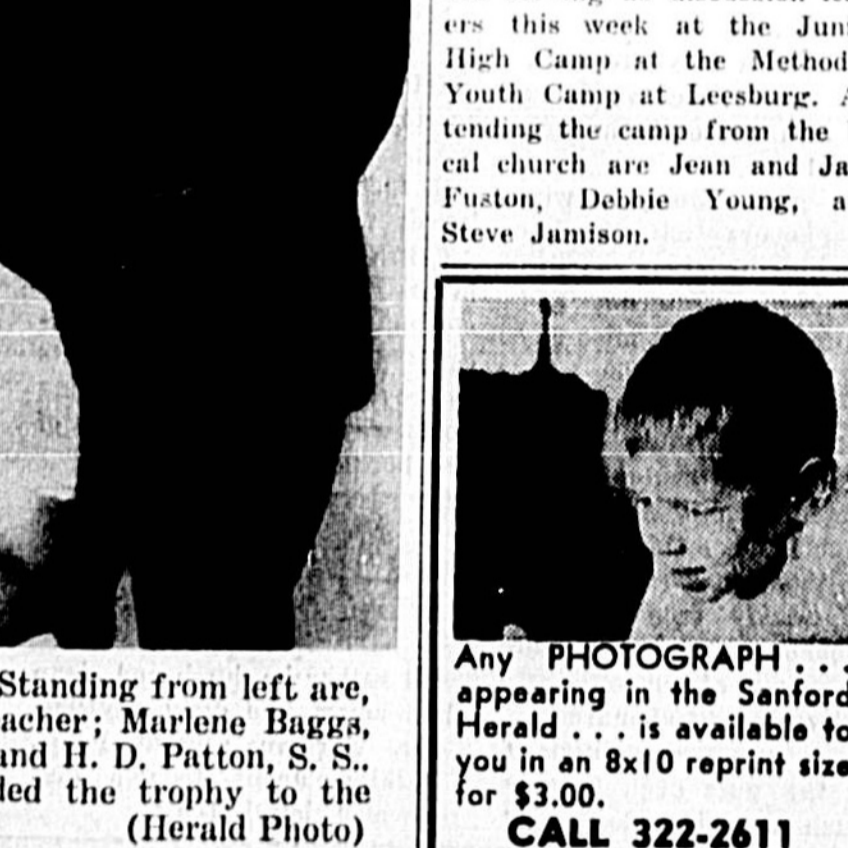

Capital Improvements Spur Citizen Action

If it takes statistics to attract the attention of Sanford citizens, then the \$7.2 million capital improvement program now confronting the City Commissioners ought to do the trick.

These are: drainage system, street paving, sewer plant, zoo relocation, fire station, library, city hall and security complex.

However, in one of these categories—the security complex—has contained a lesson which has more than limited meaning for our city but which could be helpful to all of our cities, indeed our counties, as they look into the 1970s.

This is not a far-off issue. It is as near as our schools and comes in all sorts of costumes to attract the young who, through this defection, are becoming a whole new class of recidivists (repeater law-breakers and convicts).

To John Ivey!

When John Ivey closes the door of his fine shoe store on First Street, most of the residents of our inside city will see it as the wind-up of a merchandising career which exceeds three decades.

But this would be a great under-estimation of John Ivey's contribution as a resident official, civic leader and generally fine Christian gentleman.

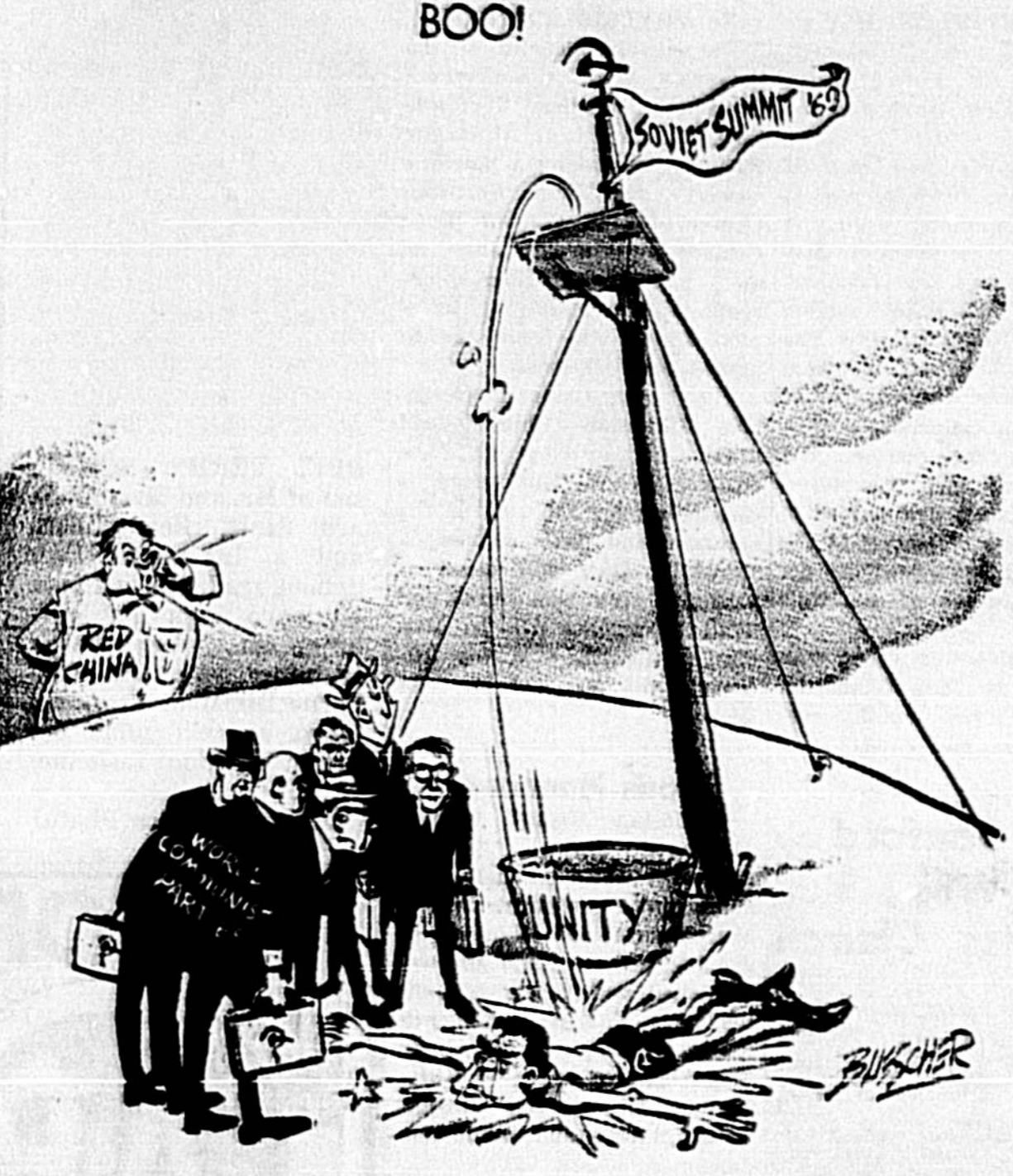
The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce was another organization which attracted his attention. Former president, member of the board of directors and the important finance committee, he left his mark there.

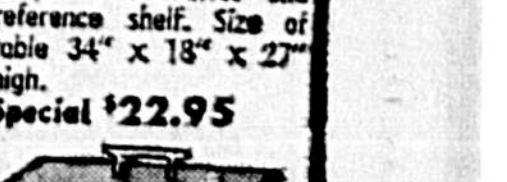
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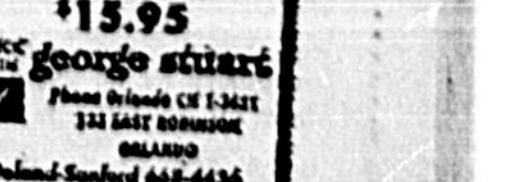
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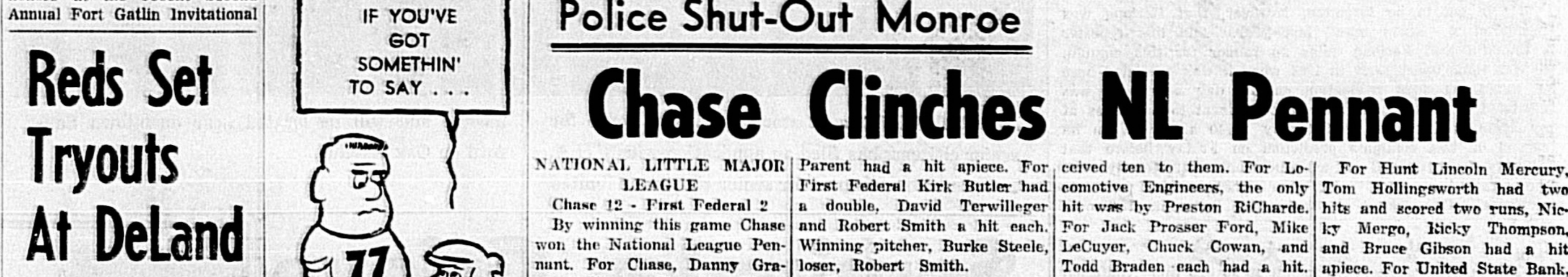
500 To Compete Sanford's Annual Swim Meet Today

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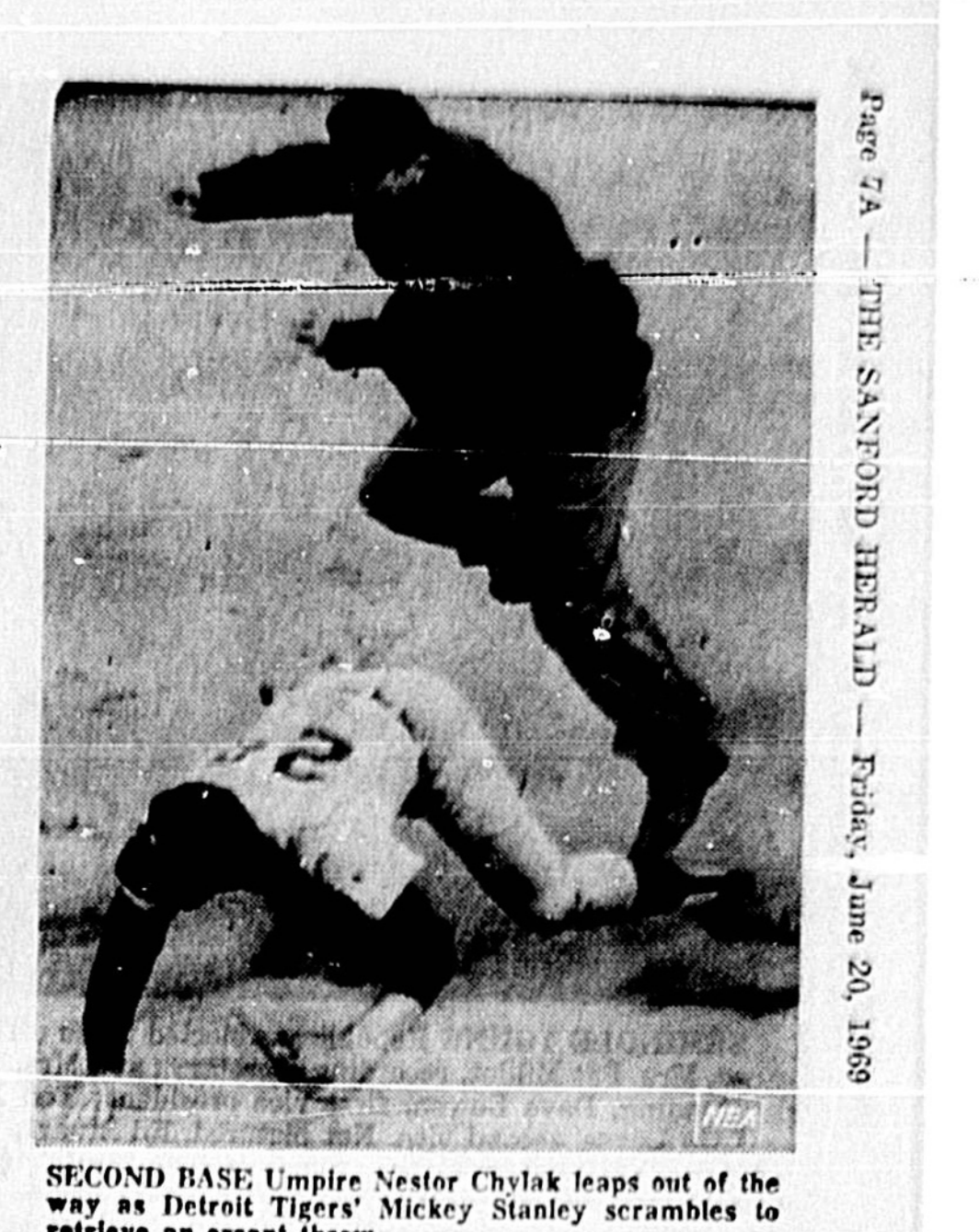

Arms Race On In U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of the two new suppliers of M16 rifles for the Vietnam war is scrambling to catch up with the Army's delivery schedule and stay in the running for huge new rifle contracts to be awarded this summer.

As of May 21, Harrington & Richardson Inc. had supplied 12,210 of the lightweight, rapid-firing weapons used by combat troops in Vietnam. The delivery schedule on the controversial contract the Worcester, Mass., firm received last spring called for supply of 10,000 rifles by that date.

The Army, stirred by a wave of congressional criticism a year ago when it awarded M16 contracts to H&R and to General Motors' Hydramatic Division. The House and Senate Armed Services Committee launched investigations after the Associated Press disclosed that the Army would be paying the new suppliers far more than it had to buy M16s from Colt's Inc. at Hartford, Conn.

It also was disclosed then that two other companies which had sought the contracts were prepared to supply the rifles at a lower price than either GM or H&R. The Army told Congress it

Sanford Marine Writes Home

Dear Ma,
 Just a short letter to let you know I'm still here. I'm alright — have practically no time to write letters — things have really been "happening!" So I'm afraid you and Joyce won't be getting mail from me very often — unless things cool off.

I spent 3 or 4 days in Okinawa, one day in Da Nang, and now I'm in An Hoa with my unit, which is about 30 mi. or so South of Da Nang. We're having a terrible time with the NVA (North Vietnamese Army) before they can get to Da Nang, which they want real bad. This camp here is surrounded by mountains and several regiments of the NVA. They're really pouring it on us. We lost 12 men today and last night. Everything here is "GO" — 24 hours a day — we're all on alert already. It's going to be a long 13 months of hell — and I'll be one proud and happy Marine if I get back.

There's one of buddy of mine in "G" Co. with me — but all the rest of the guys are new. It's so hot and humid over here — you wouldn't believe it until you lived through one afternoon.

Today it was 105 degrees — in the shade. Once the monsoon season hits — a few months from now — things will cool off.

I'm living for the day I can have something "ice-cold" to drink again — that's all you think about — something "ice-cold!"

It chills your bones and does something to you — to hear and see the incoming rocket and mortar rounds hit and hear everything up. You just pray you aren't within the 135 yard (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 4)

Fern Park P. O. Burglary Probe Is Continued

 Sheriff John Polk said today his department is checking out several leads in hopes of solving the burglary of approximately \$10,000 in stamps, cash and money orders taken Thursday by yeggs who opened two safes after entering the Fern Park Post Office, located near the Orlando Seminole Jail Annex near U.S. Highway 17-92.

Polk stated "If certain leads pan out, we might be able to make a quick arrest."

While not revealing the nature of the evidence, the sheriff said "certain pieces of evidence gathered by investigators at the scene and other reports on the background of possible suspects are being checked out."

J. Q. (Slim) Galloway, chief county investigator, said at least four persons were involved in the robbery, which was well planned.

Polk said walkie-talkie units were used by the burglars as several batteries, like the type found in the units, were found near the scene.

The sheriff said Postal Inspector W. R. Rifeho was also probing the federal offense.

Polk said the entire operation showed signs of professionalization by the yeggs, who took the contents of two safes and left a third, which they could not open.

Burglars Active On Weekend

At least three burglaries were successful and a fourth was thwarted during the weekend, according to Seminole sheriff's department and Sanford police records.

A child's scream apparently frightened away a would-be intruder who attempted to enter a window at the rear of the Barbara Wilson home, 1019 Cedar Avenue.

Sanford police investigating the report received early Sunday found a small foot print under the window, which had a screen and curtains removed.

Burglars had better luck in three other instances involving businesses.

Total collected locally in May from the stamp collections was \$21,918.55 compared with \$19,105.65 during the same month last year.

The stamp tax, levied on deeds, notes and other written obligations of payment, Dickinson said, is generally a good economic indicator as a whole.

The surtax is a separate tax imposed on realty transfers, and replaces a former wholesale sporting goods tax.

Market News Will Continue

The Sanford Vegetable Market news service will be resumed in the fall, it was learned today in a special dispatch from Tallahassee.

The market news service (published daily in The Sanford Herald until the end of the harvesting season last week) was to have been closed out permanently for the Sanford and Florida City markets because of economy budget cuts by the U.S. Congress.

However, Clarence Bivert, of the marketing division, Florida Department of Agriculture, at Tallahassee, announced today that the Congress has included \$202,000 in the appropriations bill for continued news service from the Sanford and Florida City markets next growing season.

Bivert said that U. S. Sen. Spessard Holland, Doyle Comer, state commissioner of agriculture, and the Florida Food and Vegetable Association were responsible for having the fund approved.
