

SupremeCourt Upholds TVA By 8 To 1 Vote

Surplus Power Made At Muscle Shoals Can Be Disposed Of By Government

Decision Limited To Only One Case

Dismissal Of Action Was Favored By 4 Members Of Court

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.
—(AP) —The government won a major victory in the Supreme Court today when the justices by a vote of eight to one held that TVA could dispose of surplus power manufactured at WIIson Dam at Muscle Shoals. Chief Justice Hughes handed down the detailed ruling bevers and members of Congress. had been sold by the TVA. The justices held that federal disposition of power was a question for Congress to answer, not the Courts. The Court upheld the rights of the government to dispose of all surplus power made at dams intended to promote bayigntion or sid national defense. The government owned the property, said Hughes, and there was nothing in the Constitution to limit the government's disposi-




