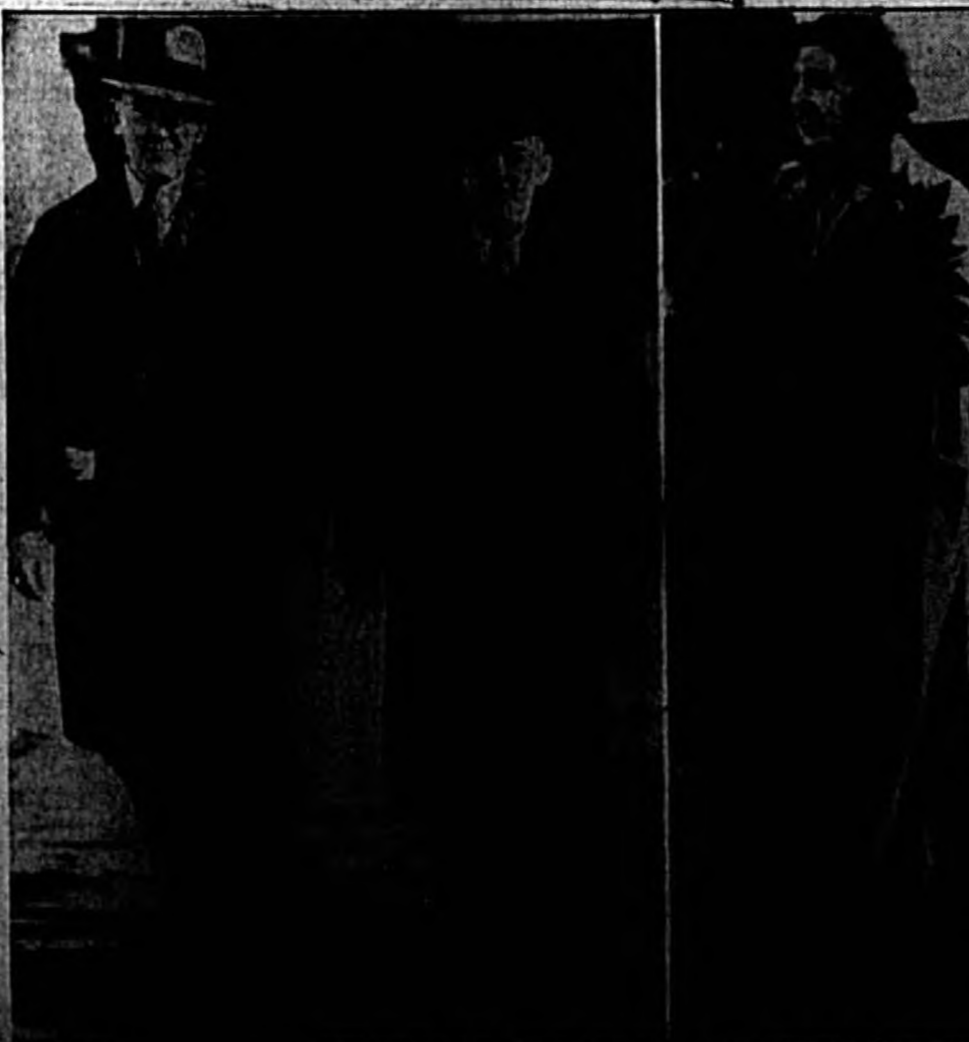

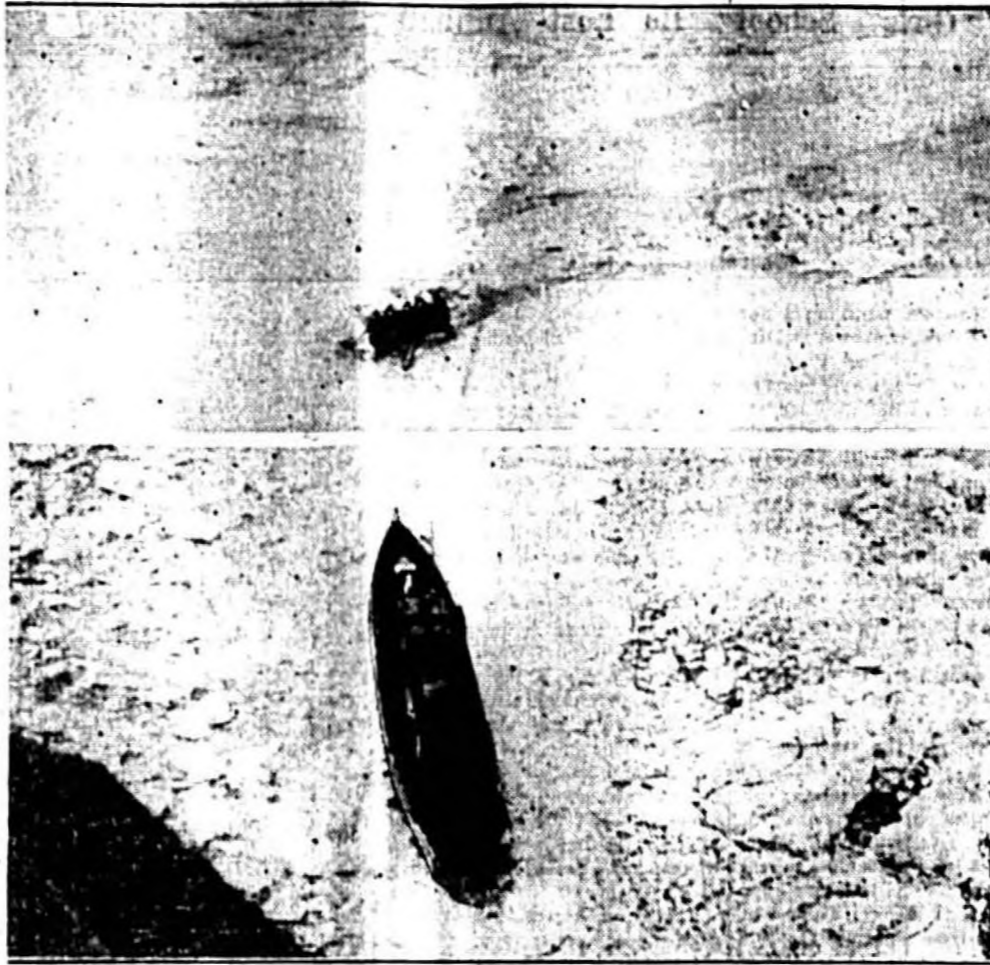

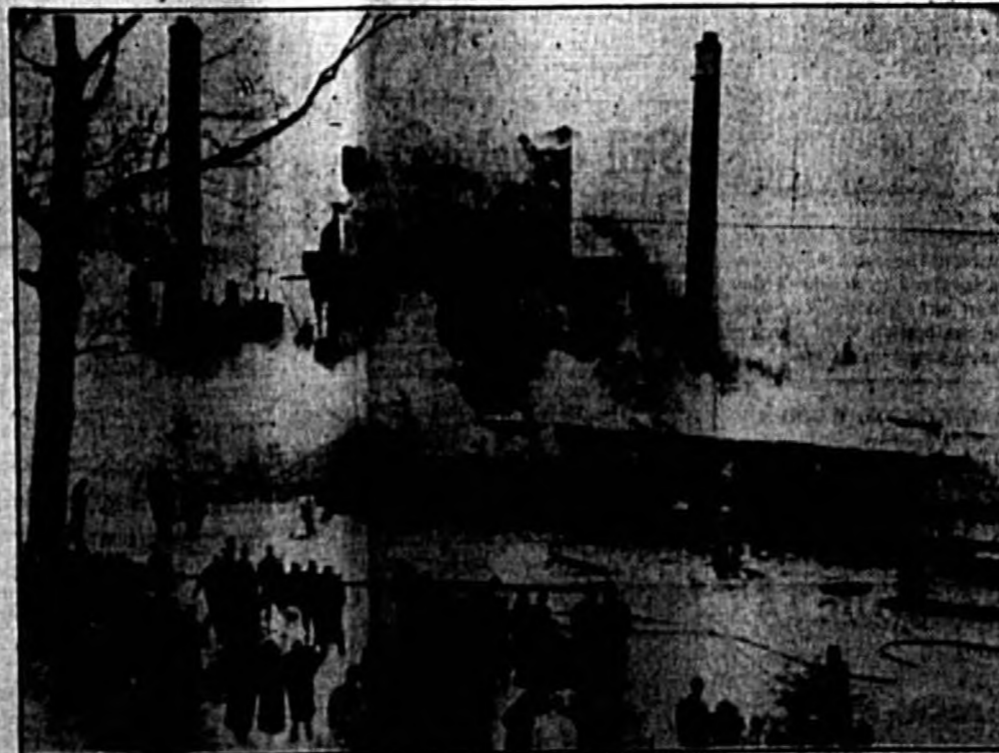

to public and physicians. Dr. Russell L. Cecil, chairman of the pneumo committee, writes: "The layman must be warned of the danger of an acute cold or cough with fever. He must also be taught that when he has fever with a cold, he should remain in bed and call a physician."

Pneumonia, now ranks with heart disease and cancer as one of the three most prevalent causes of death in the United States. The prevention of pneumonia is closely tied up with prevention of the common cold. As Dr. Cecil states, "Primary pneumonia with any preceding cold or grippe attack is rare. Prevention of the cold infection would reduce greatly the incidence of the pneumonia infections."

Prevention of acute infections of the nose and throat may seem an almost hopeless task, because of our constant exposure to infected individuals in everyday life. However, there is more to the prevention of coryza and grippe (the common cold) than merely dodging the micro-organisms that cause them. The general health of the individual and hygiene of throat and sinuses are important factors, and a proper balance of vitamins may be influential.

Most important to the prevention of exposure to wet and inclement weather. Fog exposure is cold in the current way to catch a cold.
