Power Failure Hits Sanford

The Sanford area was without power for seven minutes this morning.
Florida Power and Light Co. official Scott Burns reported the failure was caused by highline difficulties in the Sanford plant.
According to Burns, if it weren't for a new \$40,000 volt highline that was built between here and Cape Canaveral, the power failure might have lasted as long as 30 minutes.
Power Co. crews switched the feedline within seven minutes and cut off the power at the Sanford plant. The failure hit at 9:02 a.m. and power was restored at 9:09.

Record Cold Wave Racks Shipping

CHICAGO (UPI) — A record breaking November cold snap from the East and South today and threatened Great Lakes skippers with an early freeze-up.
Great Lakes freighters, trying to make up for time lost by the steel strike, battled gale force winds and heavy ice to get vital ore shipments to the recently-opened mills.

Florida Shivers

MIAMI (UPI) — Extreme Northwest Florida shivered under below freezing temperatures early today, but the cold was predicted by the U. S. Weather Bureau failed to push the mercury as low as expected.
Crestview's 29 degrees and Pensacola's 31 were the lowest temperatures recorded in the state late Tuesday night and early Wednesday. A low of 26 to 35 had been predicted.
Weather Bureau spokesmen here said that a warming trend was expected by tonight due to winds shifting to the northwest. The Weather Bureau said that although cold weather would mean in North Florida today, it would not reach far into the southern portion of the state.

Citrus Standards Ordered To Halt

LAKE LAND (UPI) — The Florida Citrus Commission has been ordered to stop enforcing a new regulation setting minimum grade standards on citrus sold in South Florida.
Circuit Judge D. O. Rogers of Bartow signed the temporary injunction Tuesday on the Commission and the Agriculture Department.
William P. Floyd, president of Lake County Citrus Sales Inc. of Leesburg filed the suit charging the regulation was discriminatory. He said it prevented packing houses from selling low grade fruit but did not prohibit a grove owner from selling the same type fruit directly to consumers.

Area Farmers Told Way To Control Ant Spread

The southwest Seminole County area ant infestation can be kept under control as long as agriculture experts know where the ant mounds are, a Central Florida Pest Control district supervisor told county farmers last night.
More than 2,300 acres in the Sandalwood Springs area have been treated with anti-killing heptachlor U.S.D.A. official Carl Smith said.
The venomous insects appeared between Longwood and Forrest City about three weeks ago. The chemical treatment given by the United States Dept. of Agriculture and the State Plant Board is absolutely effective, Smith emphasized. It's just a matter of finding the red fire ants.

India Demands Halt To Nuclear Weapons Testing

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — India led a bloc of 20 nations today in demanding a halt to the nuclear weapons tests those countries fear are poisoning the world with radioactive fallout.
The General Assembly of the nation main political committee began debate on a resolution submitted by India, 18 other African nations, and Yugoslavia demanding that all world powers stop the tests.
It was believed the measure was aimed primarily at France, which insisted it will go ahead with a planned atomic test next spring in the Sahara, and Sweden, which has indicated strongly it may also join the "nuclear club."

ILA Back
NEW YORK (UPI) — The AFL-CIO today officially takes back the International Longshoremen's Assn., which it ousted six years ago as racket-dominated. AFL-CIO President George Meany was to present the ILA with a charter of affiliation in a ceremony at the Commodore Hotel.

Citrus Time Ripe

WAVERLY (UPI) — A short fruit supply in Europe makes the time ripe to crack the European market with American citrus products, a Florida citrus industry leader said Tuesday. President W. C. Pedersen of the Waverly Growers Cooperative said a drought has hurt the European crop.

Teachers Penalized

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Cabinet School Board revoked the certificates of five Florida teachers Thursday. They were Mrs. Vera Lee Smith of Escambia County; Frank L. Geinestad, Broward County; Earl L. McElveen and Walker I. Myers, both Polk County; and Wendell C. Tenney, Palm Beach County.

Small Arms Probe

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Treasury agents expected to complete an inventory today of an estimated million dollar "contraband" shipment of small arms and ammunition intercepted here. George Mulvanity, agent in charge of the Cleveland office, said serial numbers of all guns will be sent to Washington for a check.

Progress Report

LONDON (UPI) — West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan made so much progress in their cold war talks they called off today a formal working session. They left their two foreign ministers and other experts to meet at No. 10 Downing Street and work out final details of their agreement on an agenda to be presented to the Soviets at a future summit conference.

Truman May Go With Ike On Trip

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — President Eisenhower "very shortly" will let Sen. Thomas J. Dodd (D-Conn.) know what he thinks of the senator's suggestion that he add former President Truman or another big Democrat to his entourage through Europe, the Middle East and Asia next month.

This was the expectation of acting White House press secretary Wayne Hawks as Eisenhower set up another high level conference today at his Augusta National Golf Club offices.

The President confers this morning with the Joint Chiefs of Staff on what the White House called "military plans and programs."

The Dodd proposal has been before the President since last Saturday. Hawks says the Democrat's suggestion is "under consideration."

"Under consideration," however, was far from any indication that Eisenhower will follow Dodd's suggestion.

In past international ventures, Eisenhower has welcomed bipartisan support but not participation in the sense of having his political opponents at his side. Such ranking Democrats as Truman and Adlai E. Stevenson, Eisenhower's opponent in 1952 and 1956, would shy away from any role that might circumscribe their freedom to criticize the Eisenhower administration on foreign policy at a later date.

Space Men Set Lunar Landing Timetable

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Space engineers disclosed today that they are working against a 1970 deadline to design "support stations" on the moon for the first lunar landing party.
These stations, automatically operated, would be the primitive precursors of inhabitable lunar space laboratories of the future. They would provide the pioneer moon visitors with such things as power and information about the lunar environment.
They also would supply radio guidance and navigational information for the return to earth. They would be rocketed to "soft landings" on the moon in advance of the first manned expedition.
The kind of "ground support equipment" that will be required on the moon was discussed at the American Rocket Society's 14th meeting by M. J. Nader and T. E. Walsh of Aerojet-General Corp. They gave this timetable for lunar exploration:
Mid-1960-First soft landing of an instrumented payload on the moon, followed by unmanned soft landings with return flights to earth.
1970-Target year "for the first manned lunar landing."
After that, they said, man will "go beyond the moon to land on distant planets of our solar system." But "for some time to come," Nader and Walsh said, the moon "will no doubt serve as man's primary space laboratory."
They said design of moon stations must keep pace with plans for getting man to the moon. They exhorted space engineers "to make sure that this man is an American with a valid roundtrip ticket."
The first men on the moon, they said, may find the surface coated with a layer of dust several hundred feet deep. That is a matter of conjecture.
But it is fairly certain that they will encounter conditions of high vacuum, intense solar and cosmic radiation, meteor storms, and extremes of hot and cold. They must be preceded to the moon with equipment capable of monitoring and reporting such conditions.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — State Democratic leaders have expressed confidence Florida will meet its national campaign quota to assure state delegates seats at the national convention.
Gov. LeRoy Collins said a \$12,000 assessment by the national party was an obligation which must be met and discharged. Florida still owes \$15,000 on its 1958 quota of \$27,000 and the entire amount of \$27,000 of its 1959 quota.

Cienfuegos May Consider Asking Political Asylum

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI) — A prominent American historian and former political leader here claimed today that missing Cuban army commander Camilo Cienfuegos is hiding out in Tampa.

The informant, who asked that his identity be withheld, said he has talked with Cienfuegos recently. He said the officer, a right hand man of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, has shaved his beard and is living in Ybor City, Tampa's Latin Quarter.

Kiward P. Ahrens, district immigration supervisor in Miami, said "I've heard nothing about this up to now." But Ahrens said he would start an immediate check on the United Press International source to determine authenticity of the report.

The historian said Cienfuegos was considering filing papers with the Immigration Department for political asylum in the United States. He might go to Miami to make the request.

The first word that Cienfuegos was living in Tampa came Tuesday from W. W. Chapin, former NBC news commentator who now works for a small Bradenton radio station. Chapin insisted his sources were authentic.

The historian, an American of Cuban descent, said Cienfuegos was "very unhappy" about reports of his arrival in Tampa. He said the officer "wanted people to think he was killed in a plane crash."

Cienfuegos disappeared after a flight across Cuba last month. A large scale search has been under way since.

The informant said Cienfuegos decided to flee Cuba after an argument with Castro over his brother, Raul Castro. Cienfuegos is alleged to have charged that Raul sold out to the Communists.

The historian said Cienfuegos decided to make his break on the 300-mile flight to Havana from southern Cuba. Since he had only enough fuel to make it to Havana, the source said he landed at an abandoned airstrip at Cayo Largo, east of Havana.

Moss Signs Pact With Canada Team

MONTREAL (UPI) — The Montreal Alouettes today signed 33-year-old Perry Moss as coach and general manager to a contract "for more than one year."

Moss, head coach and athletic director of Florida State University, confirmed the signing by telephone from Tallahassee this morning, shortly before he was scheduled to step down as athletic director.

The much-traveled, former University of Illinois quarterback will continue to coach the FSU Seminoles through the team's final two games against Florida and Tampa.

Man Is Freed On Assault Count

Lake Mary resident Jean Hauser was found innocent of assaulting a 13-year-old girl in a circuit court trial here yesterday. Hauser gave his age as 34 and his address as P. O. Box 155, Lake Mary.
The assault was alleged to have happened May 3 near a small Lake Mary pond called "Biscuit Lake." Four 16 year old boys said they had had previous relations with the girl after picking her up at the Sanford Civic Center.

Bad Weather Hampers Crash Victim Search

GULFPORT, Miss. (UPI) — Bad weather which engulfed a downed National Air Lines plane with 60 persons aboard continued today to hamper the search for bodies and wreckage.

Eighteen-foot waves and winds up to 50 miles an hour at the crash scene, 84 miles east of the mouth of the Mississippi River, slowed Coast Guard ships and prevented amphibious planes from taking part in the search.

Five of the nine bodies recovered so far were identified today by FBI fingerprint experts. They were: H. W. Bumpas, Dallas, Tex.; Arthur Hiram Fraser, Tampa, Fla.; Leon Renfro, Orlando, Fla.; Joel Hurt Bickerstaff, Orlando, and Donna Osborn, Miami, junior stewardess on the craft.

The bodies and several hundred pounds of debris from the DC7B which plunged into the Gulf early Monday had been brought here Tuesday.

Civil Aeronautics Board investigator Charles E. Collar said examination of the wreckage hasn't turned up any idea yet as to why the plane crashed, although pathological examination has not yet discovered whether the victims were dead when the plane hit the water—perhaps from fire or explosion—or whether they were killed by the crash or drowned.

None of the bodies were wearing life preservers, rescue workers said, although a number of preservers were found floating loose at the scene. Some were inflated and some were still in their original packages.

Collar said, "There is such a small amount of wreckage we can't pin anything down. There are no indications as yet of sabotage, but we don't have enough to go on to establish a cause. We haven't learned anything of significance yet and don't expect to until we find the wreckage."

Collar said the Navy was being called in to furnish magnetic equipment in an attempt to find the main piece of wreckage.

Court Throws Out Citrus Damage Suit

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Florida Supreme Court today threw out a \$40,000 damage case brought against the State Plant Board by a grove owner whose citrus trees were destroyed in the push and treat program to get rid of spreading decline.
Mr. and Mrs. James L. Cunningham of Polk County said they refused the Plant Board permission to destroy trees in their grove, but on Sept. 1, 1958, agents of the board destroyed trees on about 10 acres of their land.

Nikita Boasts Of Giant Red Nuclear Stockpile

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev said in a speech made public Tuesday night that the Soviet Union's stockpile of rockets and hydrogen atomic warheads could wipe "all our potential enemies" off the face of the earth.

He told Soviet journalists that he visited one factory where 250 rockets with hydrogen warheads were turned out "on an assembly line basis within a year."

Khrushchev's speech to the newsmen in the Kremlin last Saturday was released by the official Soviet news agency Tass Tuesday night.

While stressing the "invaluable might" of the Soviet armed forces Khrushchev reiterated his appeal for total disarmament.

Khrushchev noted progress in Soviet-Western relations.

As for his talks with President Eisenhower, Khrushchev said he told Eisenhower "his position differed from mine."

"I was authorized by the Soviet government, in conformity with the desire of our people, to sign

immediately an agreement on disarmament, on the discontinuation of arms production and on their destruction," Khrushchev said.

"I believe the President also wants this, but apparently he cannot do it because there are still strong quarters in the U. S. A. opposing disarmament. We must not be deceived in this respect."

Khrushchev criticized Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York for a recent speech the premier said "expressed the desire on the

part of definite circles to turn back the pointer of the barometer which is tending toward the lessening of international tensions from 'rain' to 'fair' and which the exponents of the cold war are pushing in a different direction."

"But Messrs. Imperialists, if you try to return to the position of the cold war, Rockefeller will not save you just as the late U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles could not save you," Khrushchev said.

Driving In Style

Seminole High driver training students now dart about in a sleek-topped Renault Dauphine. The car has been turned over to the school by Bob McKee of McKee Motors for use in the driver training class.

The car will be used by nearly 200 students who take the required course, Principal Andrew Bracken said yesterday. The little auto will have a form of dual controls and will replace the outdated 1953 car which has been used for the school's driver training classes. State law says a car older than 1954 may not be used in the course.

Seville Presents Spain's Economy

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of articles by A. M. and E. H. Washell who are now in Europe.)

Seville, Spain—We spent an interesting three hours this morning exploring the city with a horse-drawn carriage, driver and an English speaking guide. The cost, plus tips and admission to two churches, was approximately \$2.10, which is little money for the time of two men and one horse.

I gave a rather good picture of the economic face of life in Spain. The guide was a college-educated school teacher. His field is languages. Since he would have to teach in several places if he were working for the city school system, he could not work more than five hours a day. For this he would receive \$50 a month. He works as a guide by day and at night he and two friends have organized a school to teach French and English. They have 60 pupils.

Hard as things are now, they are much better than when he was growing up. He told us of the "starving times" right after the war when his family gave potato seedlings to their less fortunate neighbors, rather than feeding the scraps to their pigs. It was, literally, a means of preventing the death of human beings. People were so hungry that they would dig up seed potatoes planted by a neighboring farmer if he was not there to protect them.

This guide told us that as a teenager he didn't believe stories

told by his elders about being able to go into shop and buy whatever one wanted—as it had been before the civil war.

On our tour this morning he took us to a church which had been built during the period of persecution. It was endowed by one of Franco's generals who is now buried there. This man had come to the Seville area without money and had become fabulously wealthy through his official connections. The Virgin on the high altar of this church has jewels valued at \$1 million.

He told us of teaching school in a country town with a population of 1,000. It was part of his job to take the boy students to church on Sunday. He said the normal attendance would be 100 women, with him the only adult male.

The cathedral here is said to be the wealthiest in the world. We saw part of the treasure there. It became obvious what happened to a large part of the wealth that came from the mines

of Spain's American possessions. There are statues weighing hundreds of pounds of pure silver and gold. There are also priceless pictures by famous artists, most of them in shocking condition from age of neglect.

We had a chance to see the yearly exhibits of the artists of the area. Some of them were astonishingly good, but those which won the prizes were of the magazine-cover school.

The parks of the city are very fine, as is the ever in most countries where there is a low wage scale and much hand labor available. We saw elderly men using scythes to cut the lawns, because this was less expensive than buying a lawn mower.

Spain has a compulsory health insurance law. When one is ill he goes to the insurance office and gets a chit to see a doctor. The doctor, after making an examination, gives the patient a chit to get drugs from a pharmacy. The only rub is that the doctors have been prohibited to order the more expensive drugs. That, at least, was our guide's story.

Seville is in the midst of the most prosperous agricultural area of Spain. It is also a center of the cloth making and shipbuilding industries. Ocean ships up to 15,000 tons come up the river to dock in the midst of the city.

We have been here for two days and as yet have seen a beggar. That does not mean there is not great poverty, alongside the Palaces of the very wealthy. They are just that and are called palaces.

There are still in existence some of the city walls built by Julius Caesar and extended later by the Moors. There is, of course, a tremendous Moorish influence to be seen in the city's buildings, both public and private. In going along the streets one has a chance to see many delightful garden courtyards.

Perhaps even more than in the Madrid area, the population spends its evenings in strolling about the streets. Dinner can be had earlier here than in Madrid. It is possible to get into a dining room as early as 8:30 p. m.

Threatened Strike At TWA Averted

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — A threatened strike today against Trans World Airlines was averted when union and management negotiators agreed to submit their strike issues to a neutral mediator.

Roland Quinn, president of the Airlines Stewards and Stewardesses Association (AFL-CIO) said in Kansas City Tuesday night "there will be no strike."

The union had stated earlier that 1,100 TWA employees could strike today. The strike would have grounded all of the company's domestic and overseas flights since members of other unions were expected to observe the picket lines.

The arbitration agreement was signed by Quinn and John P. Mead, a top TWA official.

Quinn said the agreement named as mediator David P. Cole of Patterson, N. J. described as "an eminent arbitrator in the airline industry."

The '59ers Face Rough Winter In Alaska Home

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UPI) — The sourdoughs are predicting a rough winter ahead for the Michigan '59ers who migrated to Alaska in a motorized caravan to homestead in the 49th state.

The original group headed for the Kenai Peninsula southwest of Anchorage to take up their land. In the months since their arrival last March, however, the families have spread out.

Some remained in the Kenai area. Some abandoned their homesteads and moved to Anchorage as construction workers. One group of seven families took up acreage near Talkeetna on the Susitna River, 118 miles northeast of Anchorage. And some have gone back home to the Middle West.

Marino Sik, who finally ended up as trail boss of the original group of '59ers, now heads the community of Talkeetna. He said the families had built a community barn and four cabins to see them through the winter.

"We're doing pretty well," Sik said, "and I think we'll have enough food for our livestock due to the generosity of our neighbors who let us use some of their stored land last summer to grow hay."

The homesteaders were blessed with unusually warm weather in the early fall, and were able to get their living quarters in fairly good shape before winter arrived.

But veteran railroaders who know the Talkeetna area said the region they have chosen to home-

stead gets some of the worst weather in south central Alaska with high winds, bitter cold and extreme icing conditions.

The sourdoughs are also critical of the location of the Talkeetna homesteaders. They pointed out that the seven families are living across the river from the village, cutting themselves off from all communication except in mid-winter when the river freezes.

"There are no bridges across the river in their area," one sourdough pointed out, "and they have to ferry everything into their places, and ferry themselves out when they get into trouble."

Unusually heavy rains in the Kenai Peninsula discouraged many of the '59ers when they first tried to settle down this summer. The weather, plus the difficulties involved in clearing the land on the Kenai, caused Sik and his group to move to the Talkeetna area.

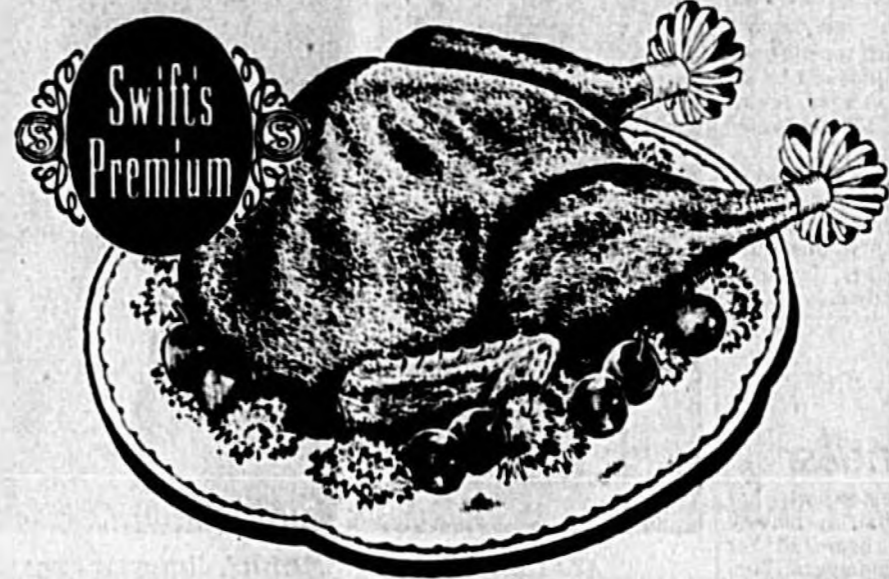

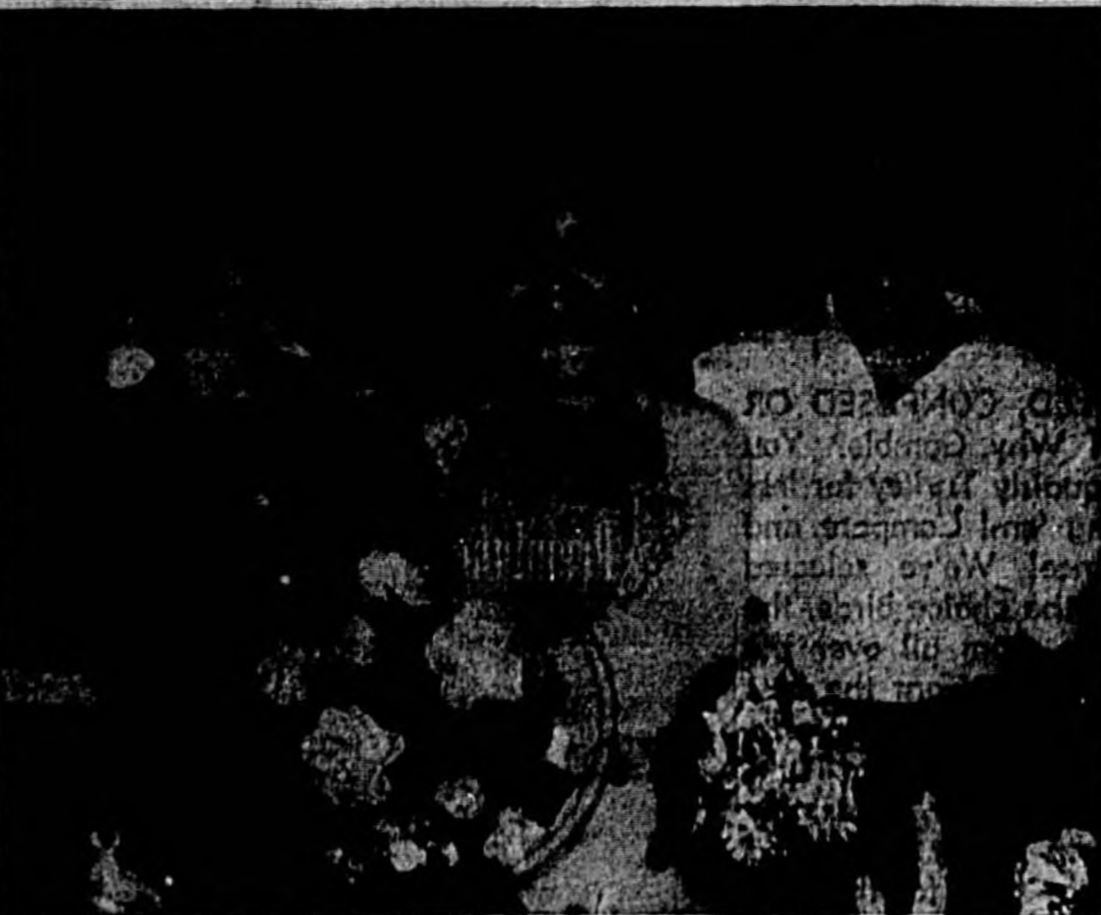

German Boss Hopes To Patch Up Old Quarrel

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer went to London this week to patch up an old quarrel and to prevent the possible outbreak of a new one.

The old one has been well-publicized and centers around Adenauer's distrust of British intentions toward the defense of West Berlin and a proposed policy of "disengagement" between East and West which Adenauer believes would disastrously weaken West's defenses.

The possible new quarrel springs from Britain's intense dislike for the European common market, which has divided Europe into two economic camps, and in which West Germany is a key.

They now are described by the euphonious titles, "Inner Six" and "Outer Seven." The euphony ends with the titles.

The titles relate to geographic descriptions. The "inner six" comprising the European common market are West Germany, France, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

The "Outer Seven" are Britain, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Portugal, Austria and Switzerland.

Right now there is more food in the lunch box, more automobiles on the road and more money in the pockets of West Europeans than at any time in their history.

But within the two economic blocs are the germs of a trade war which many economists fear could be disastrous.

The six nations of the common market signed their agreement in Rome in March, 1957, and the treaty came into effect Jan. 1, this year. The "Outer Seven" were organized by Britain as a frankly defensive measure against the "Inner Six" and organization meetings still are going on.

The birth pains of the "Inner Six" were considerable because of sacrifices required of home industries who lost tariff protection to more advantageously placed opposition outside.

Similarly, Britain refused an original invitation to join the "Inner Six" because of prior commitments to Commonwealth members.

Other nations, such as Denmark, Belgium and The Netherlands, entered either group only with reluctance because they regard themselves as "Atlantic" nations, with strong ties to the dollar group.

So the partial solution of one problem has created another. The United States strongly backed the creation of the common market, as it did the European defense community as a means of uniting Europe as to make another European war impossible.

The unforeseen danger that now arises is that, as each group reduces trade walls within its own area, they will at the same time erect ruinous tariff barriers against the other.

And Britain, at one time a strong advocate of European unity, now fears that as the "Inner Six" move closer to political as well as economic unity, she may find herself cut off from the continent altogether.

① Remove the Wing Tip and First Joint. Grasp the wing tip firmly, lift up, and sever between the first and second joint. Remove the second joint attached to the bird.



② Remove the Drumstick. Grasp the end of the drumstick and lift up and away from the body separating it from the thigh at second joint. The latter is left attached to the bird. Hold the drumstick upright at a 90-degree angle and cut down toward the joint, parallel with the bone, leaving the drumstick to make uniform slices.



③ Removing the High Bone. Anchoring the fork where it is most convenient to steady the bird, cut slices of thigh meat parallel to the body until the bone is rounded. Remove the bone. Then slice the remaining thigh meat.



④ Slitting White Meat. Begin at the front end of the turkey and slice until the wing socket is exposed. Remove the second joint of the wing. Continue slicing white meat until enough slices have been provided.



⑤ Removing Stuffing from the Hole cut into cavity under thigh. Cut the hole close to the thigh region and make an opening large enough for a serving spoon.

Stiffer Penalty In Lynch Cases Being Studied

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Eisenhower administration, angered by Mississippi's failure to take any action against the Mark Charles Parker killers, may ask Congress to set stiffer federal penalties in lynching cases.

The Justice Department is considering a variety of civil rights proposals, including a federal anti-lynch law.

Att. Gen. William P. Rogers told a news conference Tuesday that Mississippi's failure to obtain indictments in the lynching of Parker was "so flagrant and calculated a miscarriage of justice as I've ever seen."

He said the case might prompt the administration to seek new laws to permit the federal government to intervene in such cases. He also said a review of federal civil rights laws was necessary "if a state doesn't honestly believe in the administration of justice."

The only basis for federal prosecution of Parker's murder, Rogers said, are two old Reconstruction era civil rights laws providing a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison plus fines.

He said these penalties seemed "inappropriate to this kind of brutal killing."

Informed sources said the Justice Department is working on proposed legislation which would provide stiffer penalties in civil rights cases such as the Parker lynching.

Parker, a 23-year-old Negro truck driver, was charged screaming from his Poplarville jail cell last April by a band of white men. His body was found in the Pearl River. Parker was awaiting trial on charges of raping a pregnant white woman.

Rogers described the FBI inquiry as "one of the finest, most complete" investigations he had ever seen. He said no agents were used at a cost of \$80,000.

The FBI report was not considered by the Pearl River County grand jury when it met earlier this month. It adjourned Nov. 3 without returning any indictment in the case. The Justice Department then announced it would present the matter to a federal grand jury in January.

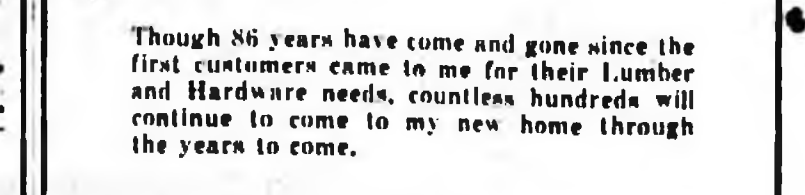

LONDON (UPI)—Butch is on the road back.

The four-year-old boxer who became a juvenile delinquent because of an unhappy puppyhood showed every sign today of responding to psychiatric treatment and returning to a normal dog's life.

Dog psychiatrist Robert Horsfall was overjoyed at Butch's behaviour the first day of treatment and predicted his inferiority complex would vanish as he learns that all dogs don't bite.

Horsfall almost shuddered as he recounted the misadventures that started Butch off on a life of fear and mistrust that led to a well-developed persecution complex.

"As a puppy he went up to a black mongrel on Shoreham Beach, furiously wagging his tail, and was promptly bitten," Horsfall said.

"Two months later he was bitten in the leg by a golden retriever. Shortly after, the black mongrel chased him into his garden and tore his throat."

"Ever since he has either cowered from other dogs or attacked them. But we can cure him."

"Now he's full grown. He sees dogs and says to himself, 'I'm not afraid. If they want to go at me, I'll have a go at 'em first.' So he goes out and bites other dogs."

Ike Getting In Shape For Middle East Tour

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI)—President Eisenhower is training like an athlete for his 20,000-mile aerial grind through Europe, the Middle East and Asia next month.

He would be the last person to call it serious "training," but if it is possible to store up health and energy, that is what he's doing here in Georgia.

Eisenhower is 69 years old, but he puts in about four hours a day on the golf course, sometimes more. He plays a minimum of 18 holes and when he goes 27 holes the people around him try to keep it quiet because there are those who make known their feelings that he may be overtaxing his strength.

He has been at the Augusta National Golf Club since last Thursday and he is expected to remain here through most of this week, possibly longer. He leaves for Europe Dec. 3 and will fly back to Washington by the evening of Dec. 22 after having visited with the leaders of 11 countries and participated in a Western summit meeting at Paris.

Last month at Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington, Eisenhower underwent an annual "head-up" physical examination. The examining doctors reported afterward that he was in "excellent" shape, although he is bothered by recurrent, mild bronchitis.

He had a cold in the late summer and it hung on for several weeks, but according to members of his staff, all symptoms, even of the slight bronchial cough have disappeared.

Since he has been in Augusta, he has been setting up a trifle later than he does in Washington, showing up in his tiny office above the golf pro's shop between 8 and 9 a. m. He works until about noon, has an early lunch and devotes his afternoons largely to golf.

He plays bridge in the evenings and usually is asleep before 11 o'clock in the second floor bedroom of a comfortable cottage, overlooking the 10th hole of the Augusta National.

The President spares himself walking when he feels like it. For example, he frequently uses an electric golf cart to take him to his cottage to his office, a distance of about 200 yards.

On the big championship golf course with its rolling fairways and sloping greens, the President travels most of the way in an electric cart but walks between some shots.

Naturally, the President's wife

doesn't like the idea of the rigors involved in his December trip and she has discussed it with local store clerks, but not in a truly serious vein.

After Mrs. Eisenhower's witty opinions broke into print through the courtesy of some highly impressionable sales clerks, the White House was asked formally about her apparent concern and what it meant.

Acting Press Secretary Wayne Hawks told reporters that to his knowledge, there was no medical opinion existing that the trip next month would be "too much" for the President.

Diplomat's Son To Be Sent Home After Accident

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A student advisor at the college attended by David P. Hearne, son of the Irish ambassador, said today the youth's father "knows Ireland" in sending him back to Ireland.

Assistant Dean Charles Van Way Jr., of American University, said he had scheduled a "talk" with 21-year-old David but called it off when Ambassador John J. Hearne announced that his son would be sent home in the near future to continue his education.

Van Way, the university foreign student adviser, declined to say whether he had planned any disciplinary action. He said he thought it would be a good idea to talk with the student, who has been involved in several scrapes with police.

Young Hearne's car struck and killed a 34-year-old Negro woman last Wednesday on a Washington street. He claimed diplomatic immunity and authorities said it was useless to hold an inquest into the woman's death.

Van Way said that Hearne was considered on the campus as just one of the 500 foreign students. During a talk with the Irish youth, Van Way said, David seemed "respectful and quiet."

Young Hearne had been enrolled in the university only since September. Too short a period has passed to judge his record scholastically, Van Way said.

"But I feel he's a boy of basic worth," said the dean sympathetically.

Congress Opens Disc Jockey Financial Probe

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A congressional investigator said today that it is "deceptive" for disc jockeys to hold secret financial interests in record or music publishing companies.

Rep. John R. Bennett (R-Mich.) top GOP member of the House subcommittee which exposed TV quiz show scandals, said he favored "getting rid of all deceptive practices in broadcasting."

Subcommittee staff investigators have been looking into charges that outside financial interests have influenced disc jockeys in their selection of music that is broadcast.

The House group has sent an investigator to Philadelphia to "look into a situation" involving TV star Dick Clark, idol of teenagers.

The American Broadcasting System, which carries Clark's show, said a network investigation showed that Clark was not guilty of taking "payola"—a music world expression meaning payoffs to plug songs.

ABC said, however, that Clark had agreed in accordance with new network policy to divest himself of his music publishing and record companies in order to avoid a conflict of interest.

Bennett declined comment on Clark, saying he was not passing judgment on the merits of any individual case. But he said the subcommittee's inquiry was in the public interest.

"The subcommittee is very properly going into the area of disc jockey to discover what kind of practices have been practiced on and to get rid of them," Bennett said.

The staff investigation, which has been under way in the field for some weeks, is expected to lead to a subcommittee decision to hold public hearings, probably early next year.

In concluding hearings on the rigging of TV quiz shows 11 days ago, the subcommittee Chairman Owen Harris (D-Ark.) placed in the record a complaint from song writers that the selection of music for broadcasting has been influenced through a number of irregular practices by song pluggers, including bribery of disc jockeys.

Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers told a news conference Tuesday that some prosecutions might result from the Justice Department's investigation of rigged TV quiz shows.

Rogers said his department expected to make a report to President Eisenhower by the end of the year on the fixed quiz shows and "other deceptive practices" on radio and TV.

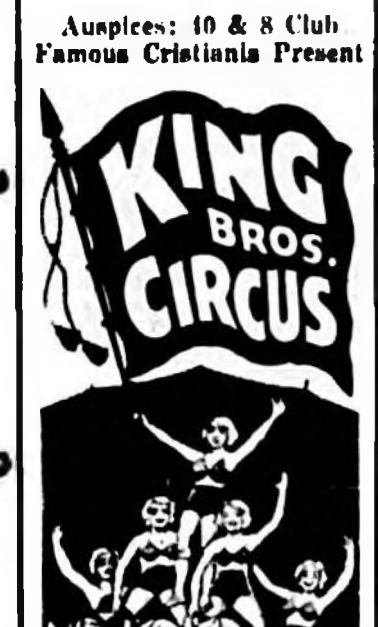

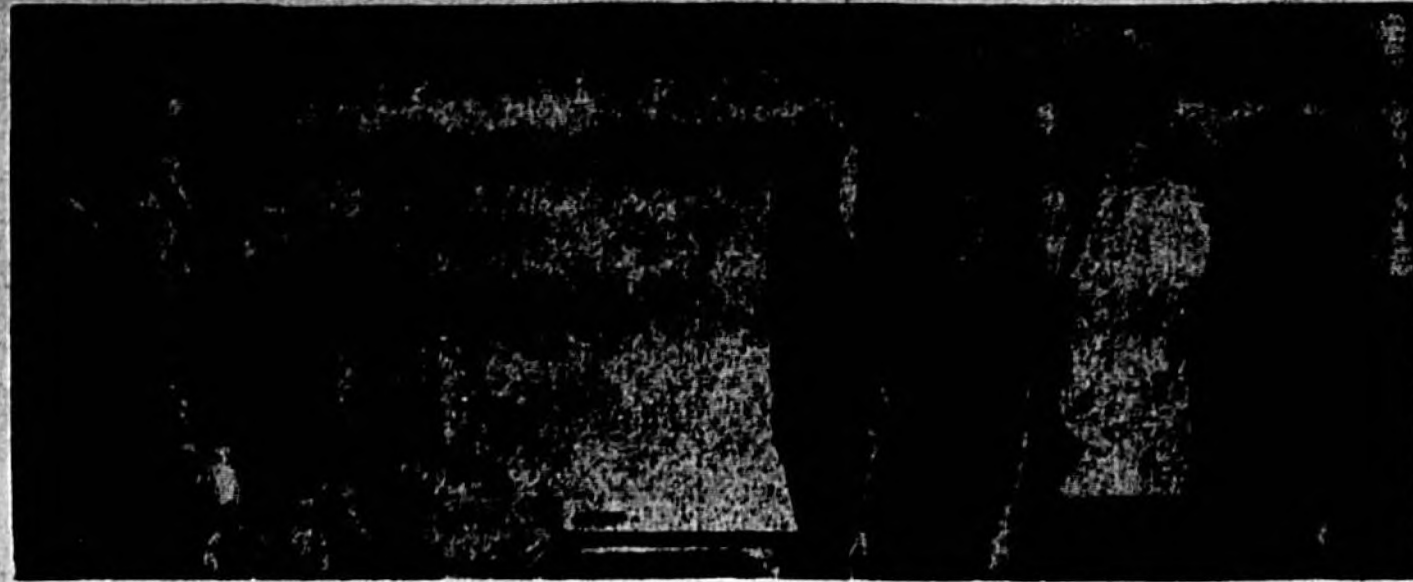

Government Stirs Around Waterways

Every now and then there is another small indication that the cross state canal and other waterway projects important to this area may get out of the talking stage.

A clue comes in a report that the federal government is looking into "quick completion" of the intercoastal waterway system on both sides of the state. An official is quoted as indicating this will lead to fuller use of the waterways and possibly quicker approval of the cross state waterways, including the Sanford-Titusville link.

The fact that pressure by the committee pushing the canal and our members of Congress has stirred increased activity among the people who hold the keys to waterways approval is encouraging.

Emergencies this year in many sections plagued by high water also have helped focus attention on the state's water problems and it is to be hoped that the flood control programs will get a little more attention, too.

Nikita May Go Along With West On Meeting

From the foreign editor's notebook:

Soviet Diplomats in East Berlin hint that Khrushchev will go along with the idea that a big four summit meeting among the United States, Britain, France and Russia should be put off until around the middle of next May. The reasoning is that Khrushchev prefers a personal meeting with President Charles DeGaulle before rather than during a summit session too hastily convened over French opposition. This reasoning takes into account the fact that France wants to become a member of the atomic club before the summit meeting is held, and thus to meet with the others on a basis of unquestioned equality. The opinion is that DeGaulle wants a Western summit first, then a talk with Khrushchev and then another Western meeting before the big summit is reached.

For the police to exercise virtually unlimited powers has been standard operational procedure in many Asiatic nations. Now North China is starting a new experiment in human rights. A 25-year-old farmer has become the first person to file suit against the government under a new law providing compensation for wrongful detention and conviction. The farmer claimed he served 361 days on a manslaughter conviction before a higher court acquitted him. A justice department board opened study of his claim this month.

Nationalist China's president Chiang Kai-shek, still determined

to return to the Chinese mainland, wants to build Formosa into a model Chinese province to prove the Nationalists are capable and worthy of ruling the mainland. There is more and more talk of industrial development of Formosa. This talk includes plans for a modern steel mill, expansion of the shipbuilding industry, and other projects.

West German parliamentary deputies recently received by Pope John say from certain remarks he made them believe he may next year begin traveling around Italy, beginning with his favorite city Venice. They doubt he will travel outside Italy, however.

Europe Aid Asked In Economic Effort

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Christian A. Herter said today the time has come for a prosperous Western Europe to share more fully in helping underdeveloped nations in their efforts at economic advancement.

Western Europe has achieved unprecedented prosperity and with it, the opportunity for "broadening and expanding the world leadership which Western Europe has traditionally exercised," Herter said.

This prosperity has contributed, he continued, to the present "substantial deficit" of the United States in its international accounts. "Naturally we are concerned to correct this imbalance," the secretary said.



Portugal Proves Enchanting Country

(Editor's Note: This is the 20th of a series of articles by A. M. and R. H. Haskell who are now in Europe.)

Seville, Spain . . . This is a story about Portugal, a small country as nations go, which seems to help prove the saying that good things come in small packages.

It is a charming and varied land. As a matter of fact this story has been delayed at least two days as we tried to analyze our thoughts so we wouldn't seem to be press agents. We have been feeling about it a little as friends of ours, native Georgians, feel about Atlanta: When they died they hope they will have been good enough so they will be sent to Atlanta, rather than hell.

It doesn't seem possible one small nation can contain such variety in scenic wonders. It ranges all the way from lush mountains and valleys to wind and sandstorm-swept areas which are so stark as to be frightening. It has rock cliffs and fine sand beaches. It has sophisticated cities, such as Lisbon, with some of the world's finest hotels and plush night spots and casinos. It has small, clean and interesting country towns.

In driving about the country one becomes wistful as he does in a museum, looking at too many pictures. There are so many beautiful or interesting vistas that after a time they fail to register.

Portugal is a marvelous place for a visitor. The food and wines are good. The hotels are clean. The people are friendly. There is much to see and to do.

From the standpoint of the native, it can be either a fine life or a very hard one. There is a middle class, which has its basis largely in land holdings, although professional and business people are now joining this group. The country people and the fishermen have a hard fight to make ends meet. For them life must be drab, although they seem to face it with a degree of good cheer which is hard for an American to understand.

As one example of their poverty, except in the most rocky areas of the country one almost never sees a farmer in shoes. You might see him with shoes tossed over his shoulder on the way to town Saturday afternoon, the shoes to be put on when he arrives. This is despite the fact it is against the law for him to be on the public highway barefooted. He just can't afford them. Some of the Portuguese we met said it wasn't entirely economic, that it was due to an in-born conservatism—that if his father didn't wear shoes, the son wouldn't either. We are inclined to believe, though, that the lack of money is the chief factor.

Portugal is strongly Catholic and the Church has official ties with the state. We spent some time in the house of a Portuguese who has been associated with newspapers in the United States for the last 25 years. He had his own private chapel.

There is now a law that children must go to school until they are 11. In many rural areas it seemed to us that the law was not observed. It is, at any rate, true that there is a large percentage of the population which cannot read and write. A Portuguese lady told us this had certain advantages in that there would be no shortage of servants for the next three generations.

This attitude was carried over into other fields. Lisbon had quite a number of beggars. This lady felt it incumbent upon herself to give us a long lecture on how these beggars were all quite well off and could find honest work if they wanted to when we tried to give a few pennies to a young woman with a small child. She looked to us as if she needed the money.

Going south from Lisbon, we went through an area of large estates which are as near feudal as anything left in Europe. The master lives in a large house with farm outbuildings clustered around it. The farm "peasants" live in huts at the foot of the great house. In some ways these people are "well off" as the master of the plantation does assume responsibility for seeing they don't starve and that they get some care if they are ill.

Portugal's chief exports are cork and wine. The wine that we associate with Portugal in the United States, if of course, Port. We were told, however, that the chief wine export is regular table wine to France. Our informant said that France exported so much wine to the United States and Britain that it purchased Portuguese wine for home consumption. At any rate, Portuguese wine, at its best, is very good.

Before we drove back into Spain this afternoon, we had been wondering if we had been seeing things in too warm a light. As soon as we crossed the border, however, we could see a difference—and the advantage was all in Portugal's favor. Before we crossed back into Spain, most small towns had a hospital of sorts. The schools looked better and the towns were cleaner. Also the highways were smoother and there were more gasoline stations.

Portugal is a mild sort of authoritarian state. It has an active royalist party, but there seem to be men in the present government of enough stature so there will be no great problem to find someone to replace Dr. Salazar when he retires, and that is thought to be something which will happen in the near future.

If this sounds like a report from a press agent for Portugal, we are sorry. The truth is that we found it the most enjoyable place we have ever visited.

Area Officials Backing Trailways Interstate Move

Sanford and Seminole County officials gave their support to interstate Trailways bus operations from Florida at an ICC hearing in Jacksonville Thursday.

Seminole County Commission chairman John Krider, Sanford Mayor A. L. Wilson, Rep. Gordon Frederick and Jayce President Mason Wharton testified at the hearing that interstate Trailways operations provide a connecting link between Florida and other parts of the nation and would provide transportation to the many people now traveling to and from Florida.

Trailways was asking the Interstate Commerce Commission for permission to operate through Miami, Orlando, Sanford and Jacksonville to different points in the United States. A through line from Miami to New York was in the company's plans, Frederick said.

'Operation Noah' To Rescue Animals

LONDON (UPI)—There is one unchallenged distinction man holds among all the species of animals that have existed since the world began.

He alone has exterminated another species completely.

The dolorous toll of vanished birds and mammals and the lengthening list of species in danger of extinction are there for all to see at the office of the Fauna Preservation Society which is gathering itself for the second stage of "Operation Noah."

In December, 1958, the waters of the Zambezi River, dividing Northern and Southern Rhodesia, were dammed at the Kariba Gorge to provide power for the central African federation. An area of 2,500 square miles will eventually become Lake Kariba.

As the first waters poured into the rich game country, trapped animals retreated to islands above the waterline. Southern Rhodesia launched "Operation Noah" to save as many as possible and it has rescued thus far some 2,000 aardvarks, bushpigs, monkeys, lemurs and other mammals.

But thousands have drowned or died of exhaustion or hunger.

Northern Rhodesia, according to the society, did not seem aware of the great animal tragedy in the making and took no part in the first phase of the operation which ended with the dry season. Now, spurred by a gathering public opinion, it was all set to match Southern Rhodesia's effort when the new rescue season started with the rains of November.

The Fauna Preservation Society, which helped mobilize this public opinion, is modest about its activities.

"We've just bought a 10-ton 46-foot super-ark," said assistant secretary Kathleen Clark after some persuasion. "I suppose it is the first boat since Noah specially designed for animal rescue work. You see, there isn't too much time. The waters will finally ex-

tend another 100 miles and the water level will rise another 100 feet by 1965. We believe we have till 1962 or 1963—and there are many rich game areas in the danger zone."

The society's funds are helping to mobilize science in the greatest challenge the group has faced since it was organized half a century ago by big game hunters alarmed at the indiscriminate slaughter of game. (The anti-hunting groups called them "the benevolent butchers.")

As part of "Operation Noah," darts tipped with tranquilizers or sleep compounds will be shot into trapped animals to make them lethargic if dangerous or energetic if exhausted, as needed.

Man is so scared by some animals that they get high blood pressure when caught any may develop pneumonia from the shock. Two cow elephants on one island beat their young calves to death rather than let them fall into human hands, then they themselves swam to safety.

One curious sidelight of the flooding is that it has given new insight into the swimming ability of animals. And the best swimmer is that surprising catlike character, the leopard, who almost alone in Africa kills for pleasure. He can swim one-and-a-half miles, a stroke or two ahead of the waterbuck and the bushbuck.

Miss Clark's favorite true story from Kariba is of a great kudu whose huge horns were pulling down his head as he tried to swim from an island to safety. A kudu doe swam alongside and the exhausted male rested his heavy head on her back.

Then they swam into the sunset together and happily ended up on dry land.

Business To Continue Upwards, Bankers Told

Business trends will continue upward for at least six months, according to business and financial leaders of the country, it was reported by George Touhy, First Federal S&L Assn. executive, who returned this weekend from the national convention of the U. S. S&L League at Dallas, Texas.

Although labor unrest has retarded the steady upward trend that has placed this year half again above 1958, the economists speaking at the convention and "pretty generally all over the nation" believe the climb will continue well into 1960.

One substantiating factor for this forecast is the peak of a population trend that will see not only much higher population figures, but the family formation that creates strong demands for so many classes of products, Touhy said.

Swelling the wave of optimism that permeated the convention, the local S & L officer said, were the opinions of so many outstanding national personalities as they expressed their talks to the delegates. From the political field were Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, majority leader, being mentioned prominently in many sectors as presidential contender for next year's election; H. Row Harle, mayor of Kansas City, Mo., who is also a dominating figure in many business and professional fields; William B. Windall, Congressman from New Jersey and member of the House Banking and Currency committee.

Dr. Arthur M. Weimer, Dean of Indiana University School of Business and nationally rated econo-

mist, Ben H. Wooten, president of First National Bank, Dallas, and Dr. William H. Husband, Gen. Mgr. of the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. presented opinions from the business viewpoint.

C. H. Mitchell, Kansas City, was succeeded in the presidency of the U. S. S&L League by W. O. Duval, Atlanta, Touhy reported.

Citizens Told 'Stay Off Street' After 2 Attacks

TUPELO, Miss. (UPI) — City officials, shocked by the stabbings of three white persons by Negroes in two nights, warned townpeople today to stay off the streets at night.

One of those stabbed in the unprovoked attacks was in "very critical" condition, a hospital spokesman said.

The latest stabbing occurred on a sidewalk in a white section of Tupelo shortly after dusk Monday night. Don Morris, 20, said a young Negro jumped from behind a bush and stabbed him in the abdomen.

Attacks by Negroes upon white men heretofore were virtually unheard of in Tupelo or anywhere else in Mississippi. This city of 16,000 is only 50 miles south of Corinth, where eight white youths were charged with the Halloween night shotgun murder of a Negro teen-ager. But Tupelo police chief Robert Monaghan said he doubted that the violence here had anything to do with the Corinth killing.

Two other white persons, Alonzo Dobson, 48, and Andy Mills, 16, were stabbed by Negroes in separate incidents an hour apart on Tupelo sidewalks Sunday night. They were reported in fair condition today despite multiple wounds.

"Dr. Crane, I don't want to ride Dad's coat-tails," he may confess when I interview him privately. "I'd rather enter a field where I am not known. Then, if I succeed, it will all be due to my own efforts and I'll get the full credit. "But if I go in with Dad, people will always say he paved the way and I will then never get any praise."

So please remember two laws of Vocational Guidance, namely:
 (1) Get there fastest with the mostest.
 (2) Inflate your son's ego with your profession or he will NEVER like it.
WHY WE LIKE ANYTHING
 Everybody has this tattoo across his chest:
"I WANT TO FEEL IMPORTANT."
 When I recently interviewed a series of successful morticians as to how they first got interested in becoming a mortician, I found that the ambulance tipped the scales.
 "When I was a kid," was the usual reply, "I was befriended by our local mortician."
 "He asked me to help him one day when he was short-handed at a funeral."
 "And he praised me, saying I'd make a good mortician. Then he let me drive the ambulance on an emergency call."
 "And it was the greatest thrill of my life to whiz along with the siren screaming and the red light flickering."
 "Everybody got out of my way and I was the big shot on the highway. I never got over that thrill, so I decided to enter Mortuary College."

Moreover, I have found that the men who go into medicine or dentistry have often been predisposed in favor of those professions even before the age of 12 years.
 So our Vocational Guidance needs to move down into grade school, for it now is limited chiefly to high school and college age groups.

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — The nation's major steel companies announced a new proposal for settlement of their bitter contract dispute with the United Steelworkers today but the union promptly rejected it.

The USW action virtually doomed voluntary settlement of the history-making controversy during the 80-day truce ordered by the U. S. Supreme Court in the 116-day walk-out of 300,000 union members.

The companies proposed an economic package which it estimated would cost them 30 cents an hour per man over a three-year period. They coupled it with a plan of negotiation and arbitration for settlement of the thorny local working conditions issue, which appeared the chief stumbling block in the road of settlement.

Low Bid On Sanford Ave. Widening Is \$298,381

The county got a good price today on the widening of Sanford Ave. from 25th St. to Ginderville as the low bid of \$298,381.49 was one of three bids below the cost estimate for the job.

Bids were opened on the project at Tallahassee this morning and County Atty. Mack Cleveland Jr. reported that 11 firms bid on it.

Apparent low bid was submitted by R. B. Tyler Co. of Louisville, Ky. Two others below the original estimate of \$333,000 were placed by C. A. Meyer Paving Co. of Orlando at \$314,359.85 and by W. H. Armston Co., Inc. of Dunedin at \$317,359.67.

This project is in the budget as part of the county's \$1 million bond issue and the below-cost estimate bid was taken as an indication that "a little extra money" may be saved for application to other proposed improvements.

This project will result in the four laning of Sanford Ave. from 25th to Ginderville, giving access to the Naval Station and downtown traffic, which has increased greatly.

Construction will include paving of the street, plus all drainage lines and curbing involved.

Teamster Group Asks Federal Judge To Oust Hoffa As Union President

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A federal judge has been asked to oust James R. Hoffa as president of the Teamster Union and bring him to trial on corruption charges.

The request was made Wednesday to U. S. District Court here by Godfrey P. Schmidt, attorney for 12 rank-and-file teamsters.

The group asked Federal Judge F. Dickinson Lewis to name an impartial board of examiners to hear 164 charges of misconduct against Hoffa and report back on their verdict.

They said neither Hoffa nor the Teamsters' executive board had done anything about the charges

which were filed with the court months ago.

They said "no reasonable hope of substantial reform of the Teamster movement can be entertained while James R. Hoffa and his cronies control the administration of the international organization."

The rebel group argued that the union's general executive board, which normally would try union officers accused of misconduct, was not capable of being impartial in Hoffa's case.

Board members are "stooges" of the Teamster chief and would whitewash any charges against him, the rank-and-file teamsters said. They charged that Hoffa conspired to rig his own election to the \$50,000-a-year union presidency.
