

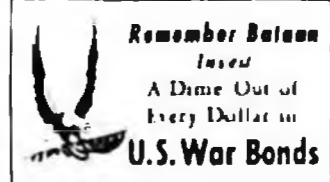

## U. S. Wins First Phase Of Battle In Solomon Isles

### Marines Take Strong Positions; Defeat Japanese In Air, Ashore And Afloat

(By Associated Press) In the 12-day-old battle of the Solomons, the Navy announced today the United States marines won strong positions in the Guadalcanal-Tulagi area after "rapidly" crushing Japanese resistance in the surprise landing on Aug. 7. The Navy clearly indicated the first phase had ended in defeat for the Japanese in the air, ashore and afloat.

The victory was not won without losses, a Navy spokesman made clear, but the Japanese, in addition to being forced to relinquish their air bases, suffered a value, lost at least 36 aircraft, suffered damage to their naval forces and had "a number" of troops taken prisoner.

The Navy carefully refrained from announcing the extent of damage to American forces, saying that such information would be of value to the enemy, but it had previously announced that one U. S. cruiser had been sunk and two destroyers and one transport damaged.

A Naval spokesman said the campaign "is continuing," the marines' immediate problem apparently being to clear the beach of Japanese forces, which were reported to be in the process of evacuating.
