Driver Killed In Accident

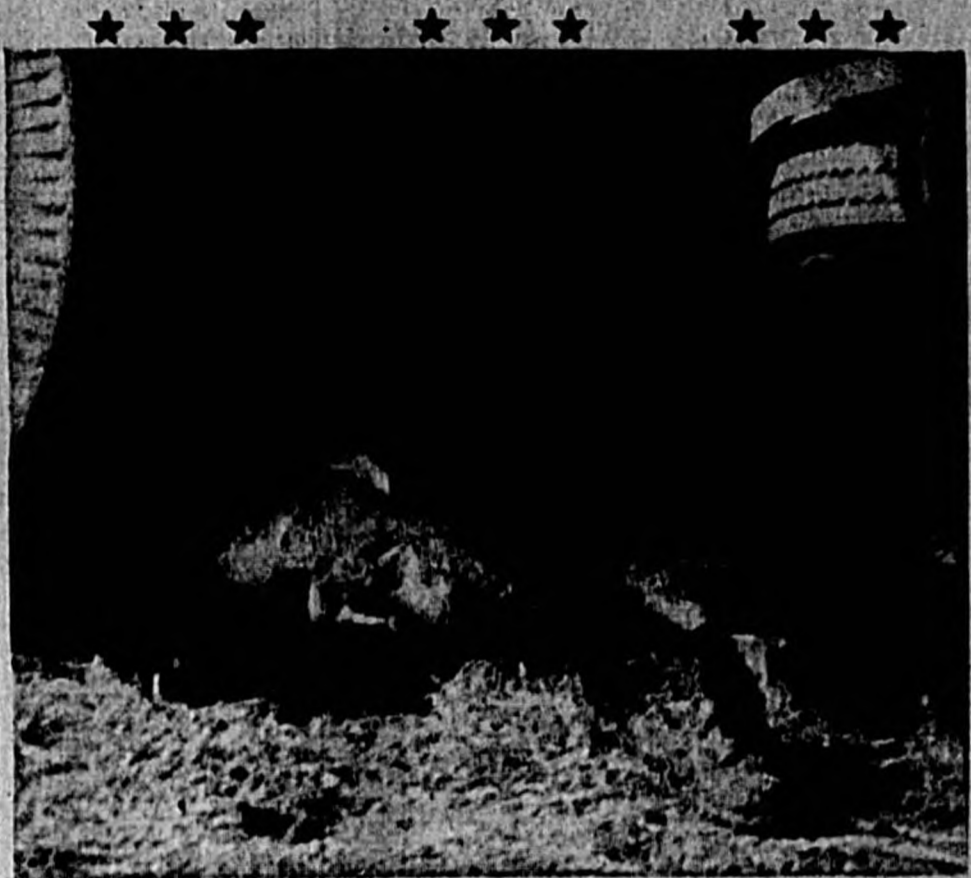

Looks Like Court To Get Apportionment

Former state legislator Gordon Frederick said today that federal courts will probably apportion Florida's 13 congressional districts.

Frederick blamed the Senate for the impasse, declaring "they have failed time and time again to resolve the issue." Frederick said the House has developed an attitude that the "responsibility for the apportionment failure lies within the Senate, which has not come up with any kind of formula."

The former legislator also said he felt confident that the courts will have a more "thorough" issue than they anticipated to come up with a fair reapportionment that could please both the little and big counties.

The Senate, fighting to keep Florida's reapportionment middle out of the courts, set up a multi-faction committee of senators today in a last desperate attempt to work out a compromise before the special session expires at midnight.

When the lawmakers reconvened for the final day of the so far futile 30-day session, they had a more "thorough" issue than they anticipated to come up with a fair reapportionment that could please both the little and big counties.

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Searchers Seek 97 Crash Bodies

LIMA, Peru (UPI)—Searchers on the ground today for the crash site of the plane that crashed into the side of Las Cruces Hill to recover the grim task of collecting the bodies of 97 persons killed in Tuesday's Peruvian airliner crash.

At least 15 of the dead were American.

Eighty-six bodies had been

recovered in a small Tuesday, when searchers found the wreckage of the plane. The only bodies identified immediately were those of Maj. Gen. James Helguy, agriculture minister in Peru's military junta government, and his wife.

The crash brought the five-day, worldwide toll of air

crashes to 176 since the crash of a plane in crashes in Maryland, Spain, France and Portuguese Africa.

The plane that crashed Tuesday, a 191 jet operated by Brazil's Varig Airline, was on a flight from Rio de Janeiro to Los Angeles. Lima was to have been its first stop.

The giant jet was only five minutes from the Lima Airport when it slammed into the side of Las Cruces Hill, which rises 2,000 feet from the coastal desert 17 1/2 miles south of Lima.

There was no immediate explanation for the crash. The pilot had reported nothing amiss when he was in radio contact with the field shortly before the plane struck the hill.

The dead included an 11-year-old girl from Cuba which was returning from an international conference in Rio. The child's father was Juan Carlos Varela, president of the Cuban National Bank.

Compulsory Retirement Has Adverse Effect On People

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Compulsory retirement adversely affects the health of aging persons and there are no adequate measures identified with the aging process.

The American Medical Association committee reported today.

The AMA committee on aging presented results of a scientific study at a scientific session in the third day of a three-day clinical meeting here.

The presentation was made by committee members from a prepared script in the form of a mock hearing which included interpreters and witnesses.

The committee stated: "Older persons are much better off economically, socially and physically than some people seem to think. Those with special health, social or financial situations are an exceedingly small group, whose needs can be met by their families, their communities, their states, and only when all these fail, by the federal government—but only in conjunction with other levels of government."

The findings coincide with

policy of the AMA against government controls or socialization of medicine.

On the subject of retirement for persons over 65, the committee said:

"Compulsory retirement is a waste of human resources that this nation can ill afford. It contributes measurably to ill health resulting from lack of work, exercise and responsibility."

Monday's session included an exhaustive discussion of suicide and means of prevention. Suicide was labeled a major health problem in the United States.

Detection of emotional stress was cited as a means of preventing potential suicides from carrying out self-destruction. The experts, however, said there was no "basic character trait" which would give a clue to persons secretly bent on suicide.

Nine states (a two-thirds majority) had to accept the U. S. Constitution before it could become effective.

Bankers Urge Supersonic Air Transports

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—The National Investment Bankers Association stressed Tuesday that the aerospace industry is one of the world's most important businesses and asked the government to furnish funds for a supersonic commercial transport.
The group was scheduled to hear a report today on federal taxation by William L. Cary, president of the Securities Exchange Commission, at its convention here.
The IBA said Tuesday that Britain and France are currently working on a joint project to build such a plane and that Russia may also seek to develop such a plane at the cost of U. S. prestige.
The aerospace committee of the IBA concluded that the venture would be far too expensive for an individual company to undertake but said a team of companies could repay the federal government once such an aircraft was in use and had begun making money for them.
The committee reported that the aerospace industry now has a total sales of \$15 billion annually and predicted an expenditure of close to \$100 billion a year on military and civilian space projects by the end of the 1960's.
The industry is growing fast, the committee noted, and commercial airlines "appear on the verge of significant earning improvement."
In other action Tuesday, the DuPont company told convention representatives that it would increase expenditures by almost a third during the coming year.

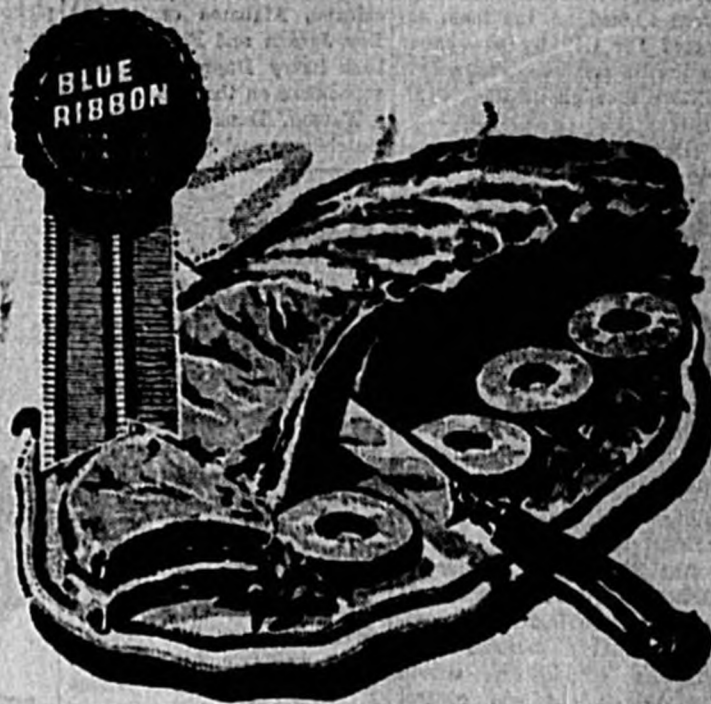

ATLANTA (UPI)—The Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets, enjoying their best season since the mid-30s, dominated the 1962 United Press International All-Southeastern Conference football team announced today by placing four men among the first 11.

Triples threat quarterback Billy Lovelace, and Billy Martin and guards Rufus Gethrin and Dave Watson of Tech were named on the team selected for UPI by newspaper and radio and television sports editors throughout the Southeast. High-ranking Mississippi and Louisiana State each had two representatives with Alabama, Florida and Kentucky had one each.

The selection of Tech players was a surprise to many observers from the 1961 All-SEC team. Quarterbacks moved up from last year's second team to mark the first time UPI has ever listed two All-conference quarterbacks from the same school.

Jordan, a 220-pound center from East, Ala., and the heart of Alabama's highly regarded defense, was the leading vote earner on the team, coming within one point of unanimous acclaim. He was picked as the first team center on every ballot except one and was second team choice on that.

Stovall, a 190-pound senior from West Monroe, La., was the year's first 11 line up with eight centers, two juniors and one sophomore. The line averages nearly 235 pounds with Hutchinson, at 185, the smallest member of the forward wall.

Biggest surprise in the balloting, was that Alabama which won four berths last year, placed only Jordan this time. However, the Crimson Tide had two men on the second team and one on the third.

Stovall, Lovelace and Gethrin were the backfield pass by wide margin. Bill Dupree, the first sophomore chosen in recent years, barely won the fourth berth over sophomore quarterback Joe Namath and senior halfback Cotton Clark—both of Alabama.

Namath, SEC passing and total offense leader, and Clark, the scoring leader, headed up the second team backfield which included junior quarterback Larry Rakestraw of Georgia and junior halfback Mallon Faircloth of Tennessee. Friend Of Hoffa Captured By FBI

MIAMI (UPI) — Benjamin Dranow, long-time associate of labor leader boss Jimmy Hoffa, is in Dade County jail today pending removal to Minneapolis.

Dranow, 35, was captured by the FBI Monday in the maid's quarters of a luxurious home on Keystone Point. The FBI said Dranow had shaved his head and had assumed the name Bud Smith.

The FBI had been hunting Dranow since Oct. 18, when he failed to appear in a Minneapolis court. He was free on \$20,000 bond pending appeal of his conviction for mail and bank fraud, the FBI said.

Dranow is also awaiting the outcome of an appeal of his conviction for income tax evasion, Miami FBI Chief Wesley Grapp said.

Control Passed On Concentrate

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The legislature completed action Monday on a measure authorizing creation of a citrus concentrate quality control committee.

The bill, approved 38-0 in the Senate, now goes to the governor.

Approved by the House last week, the bill also drew a unanimous okay by a Senate committee and was sent to the calendar, only to be stalled by debate on reappointment.

It was approved by the legislature following Gov. Farris Bryant's broadening of the session, which was sought by the Florida Citrus Commission.

Officer Charged In DeGaulle Plot

PARIS (UPI) — Police today accused a former naval officer of planning to kill President Charles de Gaulle at a military parade last July 14.

Lt. Jean-Paul Gras, a deserter from the marines, and a companion, Marc Thibault, appeared before an examining judge on charges of plotting against the security of the state.

Police said Gras confessed that he intended to assassinate De Gaulle during the parade but dropped the plan because the Secret Army Organization gave him only two hand grenades. He said he thought this was not enough to do the job.

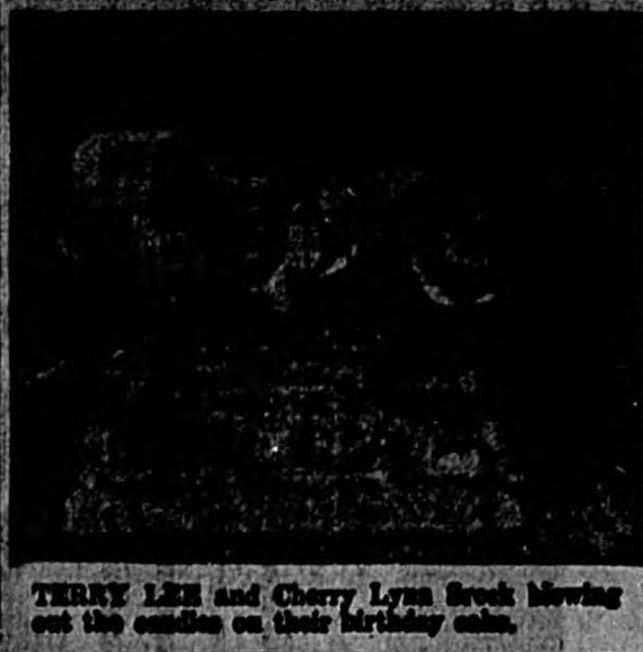

Don't Forget To Check Those Yule Lights

It's important to check last year's Christmas tree lights and strings well in advance of tree-trimming time.

Be sure to inspect them carefully. Plug each string in separately. If lights flicker after you've tightened all the bulbs it may mean that sockets are loose or there may be a short in the wire. Examine the strings carefully (while disconnected) for broken, frayed spots. Replace any defective strings and bulbs you may find.

To estimate the power load you need, multiply the number of bulbs by the wattage for each. The smallest bulb used in strings connected in series (when one bulb goes, they all go out) is rated at five watts.

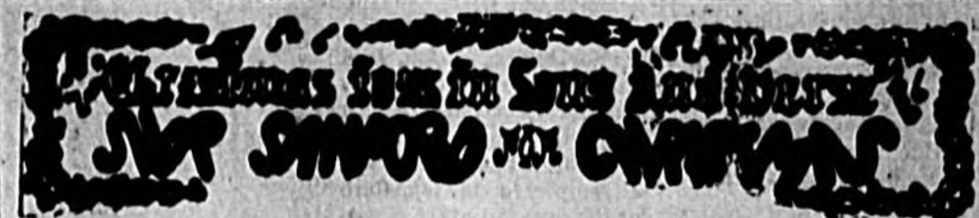

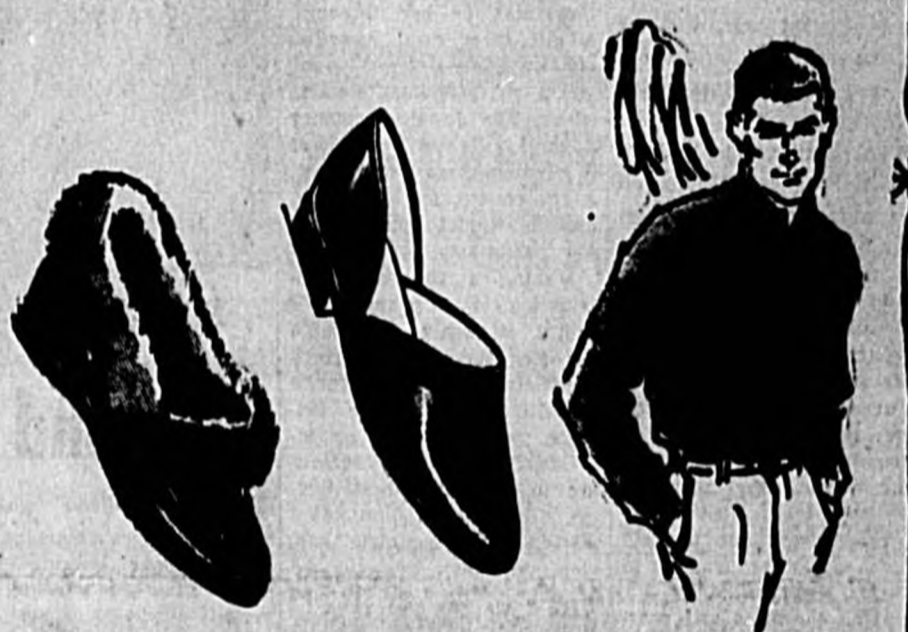

Pendants can be worn on necklace chains or as charms on bracelets. Diamond-paved hearts, in sizes comparable to a French green pea on up to half-dollar size, cost anywhere from \$35 up the scale depending upon the number and quality of diamonds.

Four-leaf clovers, petaled buds and gracefully engraved scrolls — all set with tiny round diamonds — can be worn either alone or in combination with a pearl necklace. The sparkling pendant should be suspended in the center hollow of the neck.

"Anniversary" rings, always worn on the fourth finger of the right hand, should be selected carefully. Since a woman's hand shape determines the over-all size of the ring, the design should be selected according to the size of her hand and the contour of her fingers.

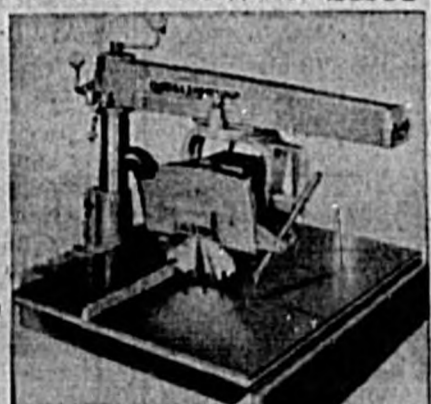

There is a doll house that can be expanded for a growing family; and for the girl horse-lover there is a kit of "Blaze King," the TV show's equine star, with a real hair mane and tail that can be combed and groomed, plus complete equipment for saddling up and a miniature greenhouse for raising miniature plants. Big Storm Eases Off East Coast

MIAMI (UPI) — A fierce storm moved farther into the Atlantic today and chilly tourists along the Florida Gold Coast hopefully began shucking coats.

"Temperatures probably will go up into the 70s in southern Florida today," said the Miami Weather Bureau, "and unless the storm changes direction, the seas will subside some."

Gale warnings which had been in effect from Daytona Beach north were taken down, but small craft warnings remained in effect for rough seas the length of the Florida coast.

White-capped waves and high tides made Florida coastal highway A1A impassable in some spots Wednesday, and dumped water and sand into front yards and cabanas of plush resort hotels.

The storm also sent temperatures plunging into the unseasonably low 40s all along the east coast.

Neil Phillips Given Air Force Honor

Airman 1/C Neil C. Phillips of Sanford has been awarded the Airman's Medal, one of the highest awards given during peacetime, for "outstanding courage."

Phillips son of Mr. and Mrs. Neil C. Phillips Sr. of Sanford, is stationed with the Tactical Air Command's 15th Field Maintenance Squadron at MacDill AFB. He was presented with the medal by Col. George L. Jones, commander of the 15th Tactical Fighter Wing in a special ceremony at Tampa.

The citation notes that Phillips distinguished himself by voluntary risk of his life June 3, 1961, while stationed at Goose Bay Air Base, Labrador.

Phillips was engaged in recovering an L29 aircraft after its forced landing on the Kenana River. The mooring ropes had been torn loose and the aircraft was drifting on the flood-swollen river.

Although instructed to abandon the aircraft and escape by an available rubber raft, Phillips, with disregard for his own safety, elected to stay aboard and attempt to save the aircraft from destruction in the rapids downstream.

He guided the aircraft for two miles through a series of rapids, then paddled it to shore without further damage.

Too Tight

NOTTINGHAM, England (UPI) — Dr. Ronald Sprenger, chief medical officer for Nottingham schools, said one teen-age boy told him he wore his skin-tight jeans to bed at night. He said it was too much of a struggle to get them off.

Legislators Give Up-Go To Party

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Florida legislators flew to Miami today for a big weekend party after winding up a futile 30-day special session on reapportionment.

The Legislature's dismal failure "tossed the reapportionment ball back to a three-judge federal court in Miami. The court is expected to set an early hearing."

Gov. Bryant said today he would not call the legislature back on reapportionment unless he was convinced it could accomplish something "and right now, I don't see any great possibility of that."

Bryant said he will be in Miami this weekend and will contact the leadership to see what the prospects might be for another try at the knotty problem.

"I would do anything honorable to effect a solution to this dilemma," he said.

The Legislature could call itself into session under a self-starter provision of the Constitution, but a number of key members, including Senate President Wilson Carraway, doubted if the pro-

blem ever can be solved by the lawmakers.

House Speaker Mallory Horns, however, said a "cooling off" period might ease some of the bitterness and give the legislators a new outlook.

He said he will ask the federal court, which threw out Florida's present apportionment and ordered a reshuffle to give more representation to the urban areas, to allow him to argue the Legislature's side of the problem when the hearing date is set.

He said he would like to appear as a "friend of the court" to tell of the problems that would be presented by a House enlarged substantially beyond the present 30 members.

He said he will also tell the court he has the necessary 37 signatures of legis-

lators to start a poll of members to see if they want to come back early next year and try again.

The session ended on a bitter note, with the House blaming the Senate for the failure and the Senate calling the House stubborn.

Most legislators expect the court to reapportion the Legislature and used this warning as a major argument in urging a compromise.

There must be a main artery of traffic running right through Sanford if the community is to survive, John Krider, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, told Kiwanians Wednesday.

"Are we going to sit here without one little piece of major highway?" he asked, and went on to warn that "Hwy. 17-92 will be reduced to a strictly local highway unless something is done."

The "something" to be done is the proposed causeway across Lake Monroe, from the foot of French Ave. through Enterprise and past the new Deltona development being built by the Mackle Interstate.

"No plans now under consideration by the State Road Dept. take in four-laning any further than the Lake Monroe bridge," Krider said, emphasizing that "now is the time to ask for what we want."

"We must do everything and anything we can do to preserve traffic through the city. Local shopping and retail sales stores need the boost and the requirements of any industry demand that good traffic arteries be maintained or bringing in of supplies," he said.

In the line of scenic attraction, Krider mentioned that "there's nothing to see on a super-highway, but people will drive for miles to go over a causeway."

He also explained that the Chamber of Commerce had proposed the pumping of two 50 acre recreation parks along the causeway.

Krider said that the causeway would be strictly a state-federal deal and would not involve county road funds.

He commended former state senator Douglas Stenstrom for Stenstrom's recent remarks concerning the four-laning of east-west highway to the Cape and said that Stenstrom had "done more to unify the county than anyone else in the last few years."
