



# Fire Extinguishers

Many home-dwners keep some sort of fire-fighting equipment on hand to protect themselves in an unforescen emergency should a fire break out on the premises. But apparently there are fire extinguishers on the market which in themselves constitute household hazards by endangering the health. if not the life, of the user.

Some metroportion fire authorities assert that minia ture fire extinguishers containing certain halogenated chemicals nave been found to expel gases which have fatal effects on people as well as on fires, inhalation of the vapors may produce asphyxiation or chronic poisoning which
can seriously damage the lives or other organs. A "halogenated chemical" to translate the technical speech of the
