Good Schools To Select Good Students

This is the time of year for schools and colleges to send out their recruiting agents for the fall enrollment. The older institutions of good standing and the new ones that have reputations for being high class do not have to advertise for students.

Such schools—and unfortunately many inferior ones—are seeking new students. They send out literature and agents; and often are in such need of money, they will accept tuition fees from eminently undesirable young men and women.

And this brings us to the point. When a college is willing to waive entrance requirements for the sake of larger enrollment, or when a college is willing to shut its eyes to the moral delinquency of applicants, then that college is not the place for your boy or your girl.

Going a little further, every first-class school and college in the country should be limiting its enrollment to a number it can take care of with justice to every student.

Harvard University has realized that it must limit its enrollment. The big university not only has become unwieldy but it has lost its opportunity to discriminate as to the quality of the students it receives.

There will be criticism of this attitude. Many people will see in it a move toward snobbishness. But Harvard has turned out some great men during the years of its long life and there is little likelihood that it will sacrifice its high standing in the interest of "rich men's sons."

Other institutions of higher learning throughout the country will follow Harvard's example. Quality instead of quantity will be the aim of all the better schools.

And there is another side to the question, a most important side, that of the protection of these very young people who want to go to college and "make good."

How many people there are who talk just for the fun of talking and without meaning what they say.

There is no reason why any person should make remarks, express opinions or in any way give views upon a subject unless that person is sincere in what he says and is perfectly willing that his particular views be known.

Especially does this hold true with reference to questions affecting the public good. The rights of individuals to express their personal opinions is recognized everywhere.

It is well for every man to be absolutely certain of his ideas before giving his views on any subject. Once he has made his opinions public, he should be in a position to hold his ground, without being considered changeable.

Those who are unwilling to stand back of what they say should be unwilling to criticize. Everyone knows there are two kinds of criticism, one constructive and the other destructive.

FRANCE MAKES a new start with a Protestant, Doumergue, for president of the republic and a radical socialist, Herriot, for prime minister. The real power in France is with the prime minister.

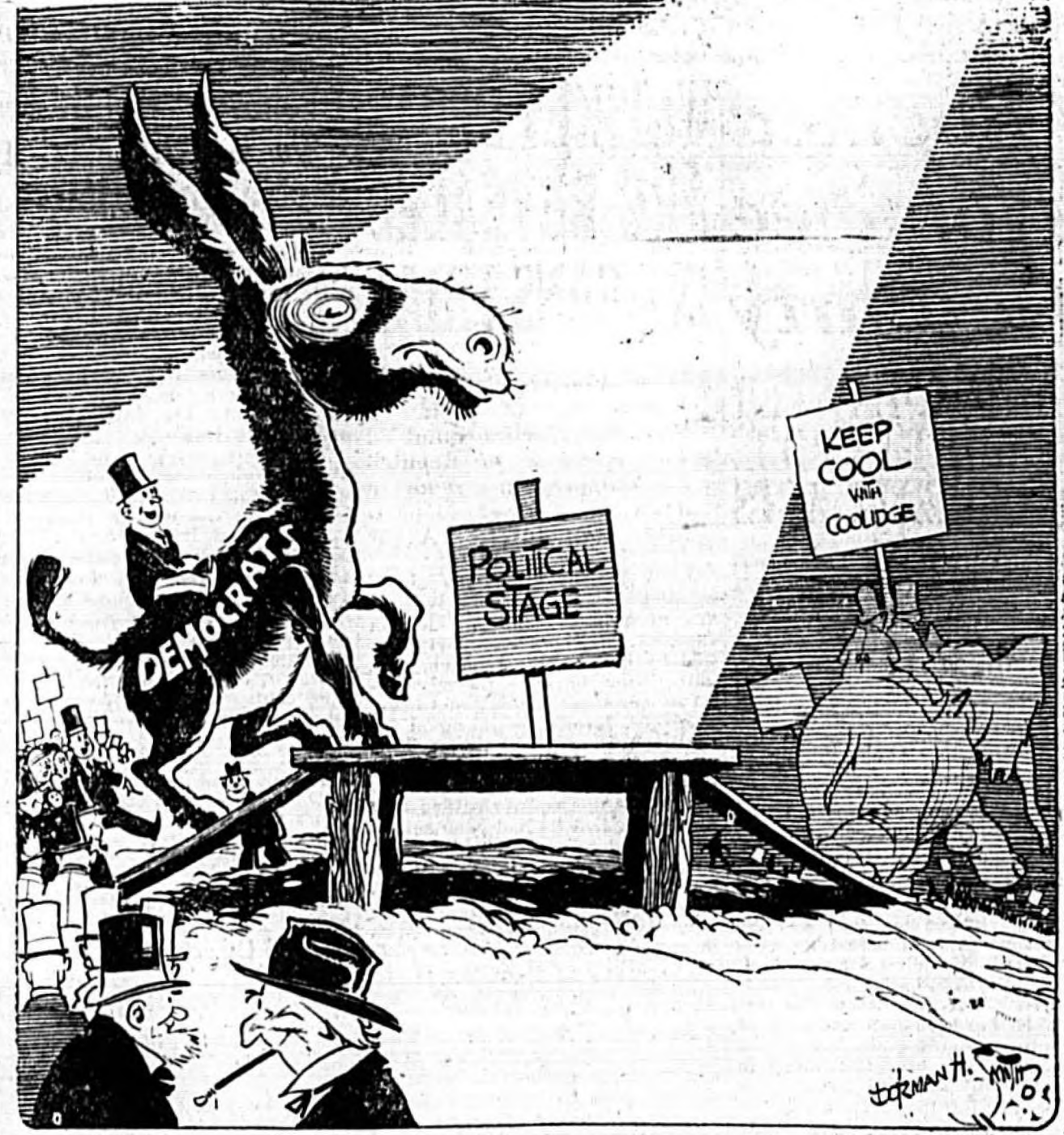
