Tanning Devices Seen To Cause Cell Mutations

By Jan Ziegler **UPI Science Writer**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The latest route to a golden tan without burning may still cause cancer and other long-term damage, says a study_of_indoor_tanning_devices_that_emit ultraviolet A light.

C. David Lytle, a Food and Drug Administration biophysicist, said Monday the study suggests the UVA radiation emitted by many commercial tanning booths and beds can cause mutations in animal cells, a sign cancer may develop in the future.

When they first came on the market they were assumed to be safe primarily because there wasn't any evidence they were dangerous," Lytle said of UVA tanning de-

longest wavelength o UVA has the potential to cause skin cancer.'

The longest wavelength of sunshine is visible light. Ultraviolet A is slightly shorter in wavelength and ultraviolet B is even shorter. UVB, emitted by many older model tanning booths and beds, penetrates only the surface of

Sunlight is mostly UVA radiation, and sunburn, the reddening of the surface of the skin, is caused by the small percentage that is UVB. UVA is safer in the sense it does not burn, but more dangerous because it is believed to damage deeper-lying cells.

Damage is believed to be cumulative - the more exposure, the more harm - and undetectable for many years, said Lytle, acting director of the FDA division of life sciences.

Indoor tanning, in use more than a decade in Europe, has become increasingly popular since its introduction in the United States about five years ago. One physician's study estimated

Longwood Disregards Historic Panel

Police Station Design Sticks

The Longwood historic board's appeal for the exterior of the proposed police building be changed to fit in with the historical district went unheeded by the Longwood City Commission Monday.

"We feel like violated virgins," Richard Zartman, chairman of the Longwood Historical Commission told the city commission Monday night at a joint worksession. "The Historical Commission has to deal with the public and force them into a mold when our own city isn't conforming with the Historical Dis-

The archeitect, Keith Reeves of Architects Design Group of Florida, said the firm is within 10 days of having the drawings completely

done and ready to go out for bids. "It's a hell of a time to repunt," he said.

"We are particularly concerned about the police building." Lynette Dennis, vice chairman, said, "We went over the plans and although it is not in the district legally it is physically a part of it. It is shortsided to go with that particular design. You have to look at the whole area. not just the police building itself. It needs to blend in.'

The site for the police building is on Jessup Avenue just outside of the Historic District separated from the historic Christ Episcopal Church by a baseball field.

"It holls down to cents," said Police Chief and Acting City Administrator Greg Manning. "It would cost a lot to make it look historic and it costs more than we had anticipated anyhow."

'We are talking about a working 24-hour facility and speaking for myself I believe with the landscaping and brick it will look more like it (historical) than people think." Manning said.

City Commissioner June Lormann, a member of the Historical Commission, asked Reeves, "Around the front where it is plain, can't you just put a little gingerbread?"

Reeves said there is a big difference between preserving existing buildings with historical value and putting a false facade on new buildings to make them something they are not. He called the design for the police building "Nothing starkly contemporary and a very honest

Reeves said they tried to make the building blend in with most everything around it. It will be heavily landscaped and have a brick facade at an extra \$30,000 to \$40,000.

Another concern of the commission is what is going to happen to the nondescript structure now used as the city's police station. The building is located between the Historic Longwood Hotel building and city hall.

The commission also asked that the area around the landmark water tower on County Road 427 at Bay Street be cleaned up and the tank, no longer in use, be repainted. City Engineer Charles Hassler said he was planning on recommending the tower be torn down. "It will cost

Money Motive For Treachery **Prosecutors Say In Spy Trial**

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (UPI) - Former Army counterintelligence agent Craig Smith, accused of identifying six U.S. double agents to the KGB for \$11,000, made a "straight trade - money for information," the prosecution charged in the opening day of his trial.

"The salcable item he had was U.S. intelligence information and the only buyers were the Soviets." U.S. prosecutor Joseph Aronica told a jury of nine women and three men Monday in federal court. "They made their offer and he took it."

The government called four witnesses from the FBI and CIA who testified that Smith had acknowledged he met with KGB officer Victor Okunev in 1982 and 1983. Two special FBI agents said Smith at first told them he had gotten the money without divulging any information.

No Constitutional **Perfect Trial Promise**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The terim confirmation and approv-

Supreme Court said Monday al. even though the rates are that denying a criminal defendant the fundamental right to cross-examine a witness could be a "harmless error," holding there is no constitutional promise of a perfect trial.

The court, in a 7-2 decision, said that while a Delaware judge voilated a defendant's right to cross-examine a witness in a murder trial, the error may not have been severe enough to justify throwing out the convic-

Justice William Rehnquist, in his opinion for the majority, said previous Supreme Court decisions have established that not all constitutional errors require a reversal of a conviction.

"As we have stressed on more than one occasion, the Constitution entitles a criminal desendant to a fair trial, not a perfect one," he said.

The court's decision overturned a ruling by the Delaware Supreme Court that threw out the conviction of Robert Van Arsdall because his attorney was not allowed to show during cross-examination that police had dropped a drunkenness charge against a witness in return for his testimony against Van Arsdall.

The court, saying that limiting the questioning of the witness may have been a "harmless error," sent the case back to the state court to determine whether the testimony could have affected the outcome of the trial.

NATIONAL FORECAST: Severe thunderstorms roamed the nation's midsection today west of McCune. No injuries after hurling hail as big as baseballs and unleashing tornadoes that caused damage estimated in the tens of thousands of dollars in Kansas. The National Weather Service posted a severe storm watch for central and southern Arkansas and sections of northwest and central Mississippi as heavy thunderstorms pounded the re-gion early today. A tornado struck north of Hopewell, Ark.. early today, overturning a mobile home, damaging a house and downing trees and power lines, the NWS said. A flash flood warning was in effect across Benton and Madison countles. Thunderstorms also swept east from Colorado, Nebraska and Kansas across southern Missouri, southern Illinois. western Tennessee and Kentucky, and northern Alabama. Showers were scattered over the central high Plains and from western Pennsylvania to Vermont, with snow over northern Maine. More rain was scattered from northern California to southern Idaho and Wyoming. On Monday, tornadoes raked Oklahoma and Kansas, overturning a car in Adair, Okla., and damaging three buildings and two airplanes at the Yates Center airport in Kanaas. Damage at the airport was estimated

at \$100,000. Elsewhere in

Kansas, twisters struck in East Virgil, West Mineral, Girard and were reported from any of the tornadoes.

The result is a mirror image on the computer screen of the robot, the objects to be moved and all the surrounding obstacles. But with their computerized mirror, not only can you look into the future, you can also undo mistakes after you've made them.

"The operator sits down at an off-the-shelf computer graphics terminal," said Crane. "He in-structs the video camera to scan the workplace, identify all objects and put them in the computer's memory. The workspace, including the robot. appears in contrasting colors on the screen in three dimensions.

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Decision Flawed But Not Dumb

The U.S. Supreme Court has now ruled that although a citizen can never sue a judge for a bad decision, no matter how capricious or unjustified, he can sue a police officer for false arrest, even if the arrest was made with a warrant issued by a magistrate.

The decision is not at dumb as it sounds. Judges should have great protection in their official duties: the alternative is a judiciary looking over its shoulder in fear that it will be hit with personal injury suits and making judicial decisions accordingly. Conversely, the threat of personal damage suits should deter officers from flagrantly and illegally misrepresenting facts in order to get a warrant and make an arrest. In its decision the other day, the Supreme Court made no ruling on the merits of the suit brought against the defendant police officer; it only ruled that the plaintiff had a right to take his case to a jury which, in turn, could evaluate the claim against the officer. And given the constraints indicated in the court's language. it may be hard for a plaintiff to win such a

Police organizations argue legitimately that the decision could have a chilling effect on officers, some of whom may now think twice before taking evidence to a magistrate in order to get a warrant. "It's a heck of a situation," said the executive director of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, "when the police officer gets sued or held liable, and the judge or magistrate gets off the hook."

Yet even where suits are filed, juries are not likely to award damages against individual officers except in cases in which facts were maliciously and grossly misrepresented, and the courts are not likely to uphold them if they do. Writing for the court, Justice Byron White said that officers enjoy a "qualified immunity" from damages unless they "knowingly violate the law" or take other actions that "no reasonably competant officer" would consider legal.

That ought to be of considerable assurance to the police. But to the extent it is, it also vitiates the court's causal suggestion that suing officers is a better way to protect individuals from improper searches than excluding evidence at trials. The court thus seems to be justifying further limits on the scope of the exclusionary rule, which requires the suppression of illegally seized evidence. If the court really believes that, it's badly mistaken. The notion that personal lawsuits against individual officers, with all their expense and uncertainty, are an effective way for a poor defendant to protect his privacy is simply absurd. The decision, in short, is not nearly as dumb as what the court thinks it will achieve.

Cold Cash Frozen

The Swiss government deserves praise for freezing all of the Ferdinand Marcos family bank deposits in that country.


The Marcoses have as much as \$800 million stashed away there. It is tainted money that the new Philippine government, under President Corazon Aquino, seeks to regain, because it rightfully belongs to the Filipino people. The Filipinos have asked Switzerland for help, and this week the freeze order was sent to six Zurich banks.

The financial community in Zurich was taken aback by the government action. Swiss bankers are a powerful group. They add more than \$150 million (eq) each year to Switzerland's national income by providing secret, numbered accounts for the rest of the world. These secret accounts and Switzerland's sound currency have made Zurich a leading banking center for many, including crooks.

The Swiss government has been concerned for some time about the secret accounts. It brought the matter to public vote in 1984. However the virtuous Swiss, who enjoy the highest living standard on earth, rejected the ballot measure that would have opened banking records to authorities investigating tax evasion.

Thus the Marcos freeze order is a strong and unprecedented step. We hope there are more to follow and that sometime Zurich will no longer be a haven for dirty money.

Marriage: Denied Or Logically Delayed?

That distinguished sociological journal. People magazine, has frightened a lot of young college-educated women — all unmarried. People, featuring cover photos of the likes of Diane Sawyer and Linda Ronstadt (both unmarried), reports flippantly on a serious study by three professors from Yale and Harvard.

The thesis — as developed by Dr. Neil Bennett and Dr. Patricia Craig (Yale) and Dr. David Bloom (Harvard) — is roughly this: College-educated women, pursuing careers, are likely to postpone marriage. They keep postponing it. And then they are likely to end up not getting married at all.

The study examines the marriage patterns of today's young women thus far, and relates these patterns to those of older women. It then projects future marriage patterns. The key results: If you're a white female college graduate not married by age 25 — you've only got a 50 percent chance of marrying. If you're not married by age 30 — you've only got a 20 percent chance of marrying. At age 35, the rate is down to 5 percent. And age 40 — forget it — the rate is 1 percent!

Will all this prove to be correct? There is a root of real truth to it. There will be somewhat less marriage. But my sense is that it will all turn out to be much overstated.

After all, these projections are based on the idea that future rates will resemble a variety of past rates. (The study uses data from 1976, 1978 and 1982.) But our present is different from our past. We have gone through a major social discombobulation. Women are going to college and are going to work at rates never seen before. Some now feel they don't want to marry. Men are facing women with different attitudes and different status.

Why should we think future marriage patterns will resemble past ones? In the old days, it's true that a large proportion of women were married by age 30 or 35. Under the social standards of that time, those few who weren't married, weren't ever likely to. But to compare the data of those few unmarried women of yesterday, with today's many unmarried women in a new social circumstance, is probably flawed.

Marriage delayed will not necessarily prove to be marriage denied. All we know is that many college-educated women have not married yet. We don't know the future — yet.

My skepticism of the projections is based on humanity, not statistics. At a certain point in time, this new college-educated generation will have to make a choice. For both women and men it will not be a choice about getting married now or later. It will become a choice between

getting married soon - or never.

Saying "never" means, for most intents and purposes, that a young person must say, "I have decided never to have a husband (or wife), a child, a family, grandchildren or a posterity."

That is a cosmic choice. There are billions of years of genetics and human emotion working against it, factors more potent than the current lure of a fast-track career. More recently, there are scores of studies showing that people who marry are much happier than those who don't.

So I say most of the young women and men in question will decide to marry, albeit at later ages than we've normally seen. Eligible mates, now sensed to be in short supply, will materialize.

There is still a problem, however — but with births more than with marriages. A woman marrying after 30, certainly after 35, is less likely to have a large family and more likely than in earlier times to have either one child or perhaps none.

Such very low birth rates can yield a whole series of national problems in the years to come, from a long-range short-fall in Social Security benefits to the return of the peacetime draft. But these are society's problems more than the problem of people seared by People's popsociology. On an individual level, fear not — for most, it'll all work out all right.

Contra Dollar Aid Too Late

Defeat in the House of the President's plan for modest aid to the Contras shut the door on an opportunity to let the freedom-fighters deal with the communist threat by themselves.

Though Mr. Reagan still) popes to win congressional approval for his aid package, thoughtful Americans soon will realize that only direct—U.S. intervention will prevent establishment of a full-fledged Soviet beachhead in Nicaragua.

As the Soviets have poured \$500 million in arms into Nicaragua. including sophisticated helicopter gunships, the rebels haven't a chance of maintaining their resistance. The congressional ban on arms to the Contras, imposed in 1984, has left the rebels helpless against Soviet-supplied firepower. While the handful of American advisers in El Salvador have been denied permission to train the Contras, Cuban pilots man the Mi-24 gunships. A Cuban general. with combat experience in Ethiopia. directs the Sandinsta forces.

Ironically, therefore, the House vote against aid to the Contras hastens the day of direct U.S. military intervention. No alternative is left. Communist regimes don't enter into political negotiations which reduce their control over captive peoples. Anyone who believes that a negotiated solution is the answer to Nicaragua should look at the Marxist regimes in power in Cuba. East Germany, Hungary. Angola and elsewhere. They won't relax their total control over their populations. They give total loyalty to the Soviet Union.

Some of the congressmen who voted against Mr. Reagan's modest aid plan admitted that the Nicaraguan regime is a grave threat to the United States. But they didn't have the courage to face up to the significance of that threat. Indeed the entire nation must now face up to it.

Please, Mr. Ortega

The Nicaraguan dictator Daniel Ortega is sending his liberal friends in the United States a clear political message. The only trouble is, they are not receiving it.

In the midst of the most recent flap over the fighting between Ortega's Sandinistas and his Contra opponents inside Honduras. Tip O'Neill blew his cork. Here O'Neill and his Democrats had been laboring long and hard to stall the president's aid to the Contras, and had barely succeeded in doing so by a few votes in the House. On behalf of Ortega, at least indirectly, they had laid themselves open to all sorts of attack now and in November for being soft on totalitarians. That is no light price to pay.

And what does Ortega do? He sends his troops into Honduras. The man just has no sense of timing, let alone of PR. Ortega, what in hell is the matter with you? O'Neill must have wondered. Anyway, his initial response was a collector's item. O'Neill called Ortega an "incompetent communist."

One got the distinct impression that it was the incompetence that O'Neill particularly objected to, having never objected to Ortega's communism in itself in the past. If only Ortega were a "competent" c o m m u n i s t, t h e w h o l e Sandinista-O'Neill front could go forward smoothly.

And, confound it, this was the second time Ortega had done it. Last year, at just about this time, the Democrats had Contra aid blocked, they thought, and what did that fool Ortega do? He went to Moscow, that's what. The Soviets publicly promised him aid. For all

their efforts. O'Neill and the Democrats had to run for cover and Congress put through the Contra aid.

Not long before that, the famous "Dear Commandante" letter caused quite a stir. A group of congressional liberal Democrats wrote directly to Ortega over their own signatures asking him to cool things a bit. Ortega was making life tough for those liberal Democrats by closing down newspapers, sending opponents into exile, making war on the church, putting the familiar mechanisms of communist oppression into place. Oh, the liberal Democrats fully understood the necessities of Ortega's position, but could he not be just a bit less blatant? Molecular Warlords Survive

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Molecular warlords waging a microscopic battle for survival may be the reason why people with gonorrhea no longer respond to penicillin.

Scientists—at—the—University of Southern California looking into the phenomenon of "jumping genes" say a chemical battle is being fought by the genes of bacteria that defend themselves against antibiotics.

The problem is of particular concern to doctors treating hospitalized people who require extensive antiblotic therapy for a wide variety of diseases brought on by bacterial infections.

special enzymes can resist the killing power of an antibiotic by manufacturing a gene-blueprint for a specific ensyme and dispatching those copies to fellow bacteria.

Apparently, some bacteria with

Those blueprints are then moved from cell to cell arming the bacteria for survival.

"The term jumping gene is the popular expression for something called transposable genetic elements," said molecular biologist David Galas describing the capability of entire segments of DNA to move from one position to another on a chromosome.

The phenomenon of gene mobility, first discovered in corn in the 1940's by New York geneticist and Nobel laureate Barbara McClintock, is the reason why cells can take on brand new identities.

"Among bacteria there is a microscopic war going on at all times," Galas explained. "We see this all the time in the bacteria of soil."

Because the bacteria are more or less fighting for survival they continue producing enzymes that destroy their enemies.

"The biggest danger occurs in environments where people are constantly exposed to infections."

Galas said.

He cited hospitals as one of the most likely sources of infections by

drug-resistant bacteria.
"Sometimes there are plasmids in wild bacteria that are packed full of genes that code for resistance to certain antibiotics, primarily the tetracyclines and penicillin." Galas

explained.

He said the most dreadful prospect of jumping genes is the possibility of rendering resistant to attack those bacteria once thought

conquered by antibiotic drugs.

Constitution's Birthday Plans Odd

WASHINGTON — In nearly two years of bureaucratic wheel-spinning, the Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution has yet to accomplish anything more substantial than creating an occasional controversy.

First the commission angered the press and other interested parties by closing its meetings to the public. Then, as we reported recently, historians were outraged at a commission staff proposal to erect a \$150 million monument to the Constitution on the already overbuilt Mall in Washington—even though the precious document's existing repository, the National Archives, is badly in need of repairs.

Now the commission is beset by

rumors of another strange plan: sending an actual page of the Constitution aloft in the space shuttle. ("To see if it would fly." cracked one bemused rumormonger.)

A commission spokesman told our associate Donald Goldberg he had no knowledge of such a proposal, but added. "That doesn't mean it didn't happen." National Archives officials acknowledged having heard the bizarre rumor, but no memo or formal proposal was ever received from the commission or the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

But an internal Archives memo indicates the idea was taken seriously, if only for a short time. "This is not to say that NASA was

not interested in the idea," the memo states in reference to a Dec. 10 interagency meeting sponsored by the commission. "At that meeting a woman representing NASA suggested that her agency might like to borrow a page of the Constitution to send up in the space shuttle. ... There was no discussion of her offhand remark."

According to the Archives memo and interviews with a number of officials, the commission prepared a fall-back position for a spaced-out Constitution: sending posters of the document up in the shuttle if Archives declined to make the real thing available.

The proposal almost got off the ground. Commission staffers contacted Archives production officials about the possibility of obtaining 100 copies of the Constitution poster that tourists have been buying for years. The posters would be sent up in the shuttle, then autographed by the astronauts and "other dignitaries" on the shuttle's

return.

The signed posters would be distributed to state governors for display in their capitol buildings; commission members would also get copies for their recreation room or office wall. Colortone Press, a Washington printer, was contacted about providing the posters and agreed to do it for free.

Unfortunately, the posters are printed on heavy stock, and would have taken up too much room. Officials could not say whether consideration was given to an obvious alternative: printing smaller, lighter posters.

Archives officials say that's the last they heard about the aborted project. "To the best of our knowledge," the memo writers stated with evident relief, "that is the extent of (Archives') involvement in the 'Constitution in Space' flasco."

Ballesteros Shuns Controversy, Aims For Third Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) - Seve Ballesteros, who qualifies for PGA events these days through exemptions. anticipates another exceptional week at the Masters.

And why shouldn't he? The Spaniard has won two Masters championships in the past six years and ranks among the favorites again this

Ballesteros lost his PGA Tour card because of his refusal to play in at least 15 U.S. events each year. The way he saw it, he was making a bundle of money on the European tour (nearly \$250,000 last year) and he didn't want to become liable for U.S. taxes on his

Thus, he's made only one PGA appearance this year, receiving a special exemption into the USF&G Classic at New Orleans last month as

the tournament's defending champion. He missed the cut in New Orleans. but Ballesteros, who won the 1980 and 1983 Masters and also the 1979 and 1984 British Opens, insists he is ready for this week.

'I'm really not concerned about all that controversy over whether I play in the States or not." Ballesteros said Monday. "I'm here to try to win."

Ballesteros, known for his long, sometimes erratic drives, has a game well suited for Augusta National with its wide and virtually rough-free

'I have many memories here," said the two-time champion, who turns 30 Wednesday. "But, I could have won five times and would have had many more memories.

Ballesteros almost won in 1982 when he wound up one shot off Craig-Stadler's winning pace, and last year, when he was two shots off the winning pace of Bernhard Langer of West

The Masters' foreign delegation has won four of the last eight Masters with South Africa's Gary Player, the only foreigner to win at Augusta prior to the

80s, picking up his third championship in 1978.

Add Sandy Lyle of Scotland to the list of foreigners with a chance to win this week. Lyle picked up his first U.S. victory Sunday in the Greater Greensboro Open. He said that triumph gives him the confidence to do better at the Masters than in the past. He has never finished better than tied for 25th in four previous appear-

"I wasn't sure I could win in this country," said Lyle. "Now, I would like to win again right here."

With five-time champion Jack Nicklaus and two-time champion Tom Watson not playing up to their former prowess, Ballesteros figures his chances are better than most.

He was in the top 10 in all but one of the 11 events he played in on last year's European tour, winning five of them. And he played at New Orleans shortly after the death of his father.

"I feel ready, ready to win," said Ballesteros after a practice round over the lush Augusta National where the 50th Masters begins Thursday. "You can't be sure 100 percent, but I'm

Ballesteros says the 90-man Masters field, including amateurs and some long-since-faded Masters winners, isn't that much tougher than the ones he faces in Europe.

"There are some players on the European tour who were not invited," he said, "who are better than some golfers who were invited."

No black golfer has ever won the Masters and there are only two entered in this year's Masters. Heading that short list is Calvin Peete, who has won a dozen U.S. Tour events including two this year. The other is Jim Thorpe who won twice last year.

The Edmonton Ollers will leave it to average teams to wait for the law of averages.

The Stanley Cup playoffs begin Wednesday with eight best-of-five division semifinals and the rallying cry of overmatched teams has been that all futility streaks must end sooner or later.

But the only statistics that interest the Oilers. primed to capture their third straight Cup as they open at home against the Vancouver Canucks. are goal differentials, power-play conversions and home-ice winning percentages.

Edmonton finished the season 56-17-7 to tie the team record they set in 1983-84 of 119 points -

more than double Vancouver's total of 59. The Canucks' winning percentage on the road was .250, while the Ollers were .825 at home.

"I think the pressure will be on Edmonton," Vancouver goaltender Wendell Young said. "What have we got to lose? If we win it's a big upset. If we lose, people will say it should've happened anyway."

As league champions, the Otlers will have home-ice advantage as long as they last. In other Campbell Conference best-of-five series: Smythe runner-up Calgary hosts third-place Winnipeg: and in the Norris Division, first-place Chicago will have home ice against season-long nemesis Toronto, and Minnesota will host St. Louis.



CINCINNATI (UPI) - A young man paced inrough the crowded noontime streets o Cincinnati Monday, shouting "Any extras? Any extras?"

A bewildered woman asked him, "Extra what?"

The young man rolled his eyes and replied. "Where you been, lady?"

Obviously, she's never been in Cincinnati

on Opening Day. The start of baseball season always brings demand for tickets for the first game of the

season and Monday was no exception. As the annual pre-game parade wound through the heart of downtown, people roamed the sidewalks carrying cardboard signs saying, "I need two tickets" and "I

need four tickets." A standing-room only throng of 54,960 the largest regular-season crowd in Cincinnati history - turned out at Riverfront Stadium. The Reds' 100th Opening Day game had been sold out for two weeks.

"I'm a 79-year-old retired Cincinnati lawyer, this is my 51st Opening Day and I love baseball." proclaimed Lester Gottlieb. soaking up the sun and enjoying the 72-degree temperatures from his seat behind third base.

"This day is as beautiful as any summer day could be," he said. "On a day like this, there is absolutely no better place to be than at the ballpark."

"I've been to 15 or 20 Opening Days in a row and I always keep score," said Schnur. "I love Opening Day because so many people come to the game. It makes for a lot of excitement, a real good baseball atmosphere.

Sitting a few sections away was a former Reds' star, Gus Bell, who had an unusually keen interest in Monday's opener. His son. Buddy, after a logg American League career, was taking part in first opener in a Cincinnati uniform. Bell was traded by the Texas Rangers in the middle of last season.

"Having played in Cincinnati myself, it's a real special feeling for me to watch my son play for the Reds on Opening Day," said Gus. "I had always hoped Buddy would wind up here. Just a year ago he told me. 'Dad, I've just got to play here.'

Gus Bell, like a lot of Reds fans, was concerned about Cincinnati player-manager Pete Rose.

MOSCOW (UPI) - Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev. cultivating the political grass roots along the Volga River to nurture his economic revitalization campaign, paused in Kutbyshev to speak with residents. "How do you live?" Gorbachev asked a crowd of bystanders.

"No worse than others," answered a woman. "It is a good answer," said Gorbachev. "When people say 'well.' I don't believe them."

Accompanied by his wife, Raisa, Gorbachev was shown on the national television news program Vremya Monday talking on the streets with residents of Kulbyshev, a scientific, industrial and agricultural center of 1.3 million

His "walkabouts" contrast sharply with the practices of past leaders, who hid behind Kremlin walls. Gorbachev has also departed from past practices of lauding everything Soviet and made honesty and criticism a hallmark of his tenure - and of his campaign to revive a

"We discussed the housing problem at the Politburo," Gorbachev said, referring to the nation's ruling body. "There are several problems which must be given priority - housing, food, the quality of goods. There are also many other questions such as city transportation, medical institutions. All this must be improved.

"There are some among us who manage to live beyond their means, both you and I know them," he said, "By the way, we discussed this at the Politburo, and for the first time I betray a secret: Soon acts will be issued on unearned

MANAMA, Bahrain dictate to countries (UPI) - Vice President George Bush ended a visit to Saudi Arabia Monday without an agreement on oil pricing strategy and declared the Reagan administration would not dictate to other countries "what the price of oil should be."

Bush, asserting "no change in administration policy," espoused free-market principles as he wound up his Saudi Arabia visit and flew to the Persian Gulf capital of Manama for the third stop on a four-nation tour of the

Arabian Peninsula. "We don't have any plan for stabilizing

prices," Bush said. "We didn't go in there to lean on somebody to do one thing or another," said Bush in reporting on his talks with King Fahd and other Saudi officials, who control 25 percent of the world's proven

oil reserves. Bush's visit to Saudi Arabia, Bahrain, Oman and North Yemen comes amid an escalation in the Iran-Iraq war and a sharp fall in

oil prices. Saudi Arabia, the world's largest oil exporter and OPEC's largest producer, several months ago decided to double their oil production - a move widely interpreted as a bld to drive down prices to punish other

producing countries. Bush, however, absolved the Saudis of blame for the recent price plunge that has put the domestic U.S. oil industry into a tailspin and wracked the oil-producing states

of the Southwest. "It seems to me difficult to blame one country whose production is historically down when others have raised their production," he said. "even though (that) one country is the dominant producer in OPEC."

However, he reported no U.S.-Saudi consensus on a "common solution" to instability in the oil market.

During a morning appearance before members of the American business community in the Saudi city of Dhahran, Bush spoke of the drop in oil prices as "a two-edged sword" that benefits consumers but at a certain level becomes a threat to a domestic oil industry whose strength he called "absolutely essential to the national security of the United States.

While indicating U.S. interests would be served by an end to the price "freefall" of the last few months. Bush refused to specify at what level "the balance" between consumers and producers would be achieved. "This isn't the role of


