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EMT jet skis to the rescue

The Labor Day weekend water patrol in Seminole County produced nine citations for careless operations, 40 warnings and a first-ever on water rescue by a county emergency medical technician/paramedic on JetSki.

When the Sheriff's Office patrol stopped a

cruiser Sunday afternoon for speeding on the St. Johns River, it was discovered that a 10-year old boy named Jimmy had banged his head on the cabin door and required medical attention.

Quickly, emergency medical technician Belly Tyrrell arrived on JetSki and attended to the youngster. The boy was taken by a deputy sheriff and Tyrrell to Mullet Lake Park near

Geneva, and then to Columbia Medical Center Hospital - Sanford. The boy was not seriously hurt.

"He was terribly shaken up," Tyrrell said. "He had a laceration on his forehead, his gum was split and his lip busted up pretty bad," Tyrrell said. "He was conscious but in and out of it - really shook up."

The Sanford Historic Trust is painting the town red.

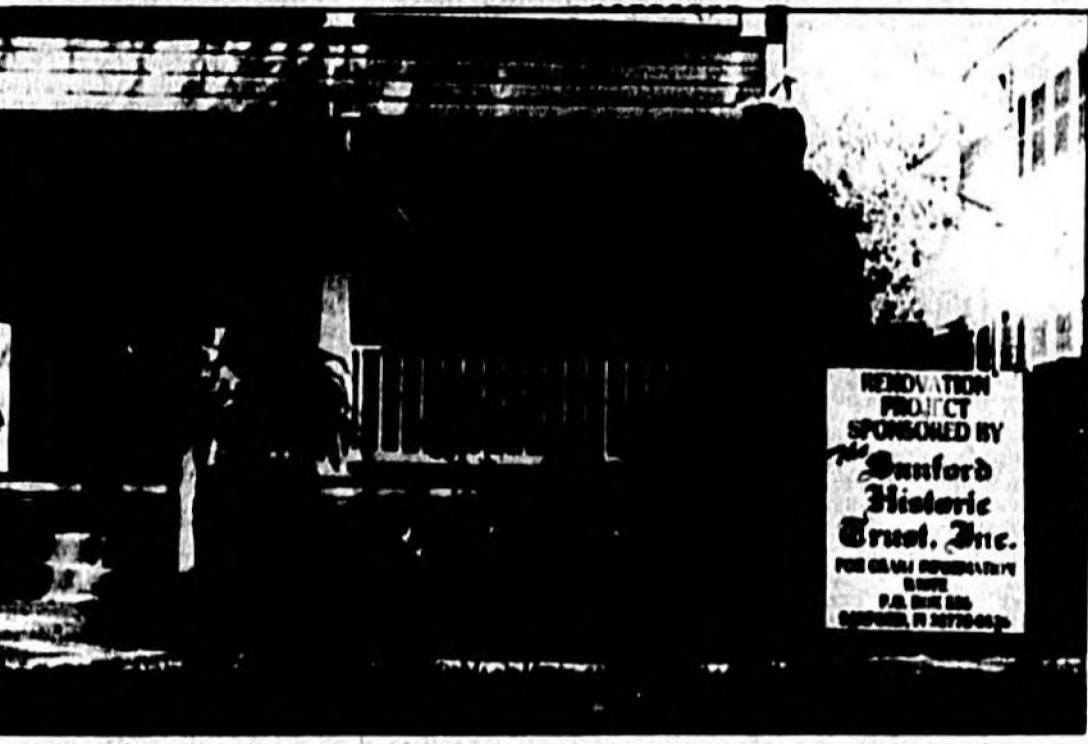
No, not really! But, funds from one of its 1996-97 grant projects have gone toward painting two houses in the historic district.

"Each year a grant is given to a project within the historic district," said Bert Padgett, of the Sanford Historic Trust. The grants are awarded from the proceeds of the Holiday Tour of Homes, held annually the first week of December.

The home of Pat Hart, at 613 Myrtle Ave., is one of the two homes to receive a grant. The Hart home has been completely repainted, in tones of beige and white.

Hart bought the home, with her mother, Edith, in 1994. She began renovation of the circa 1913 home then and continues to update

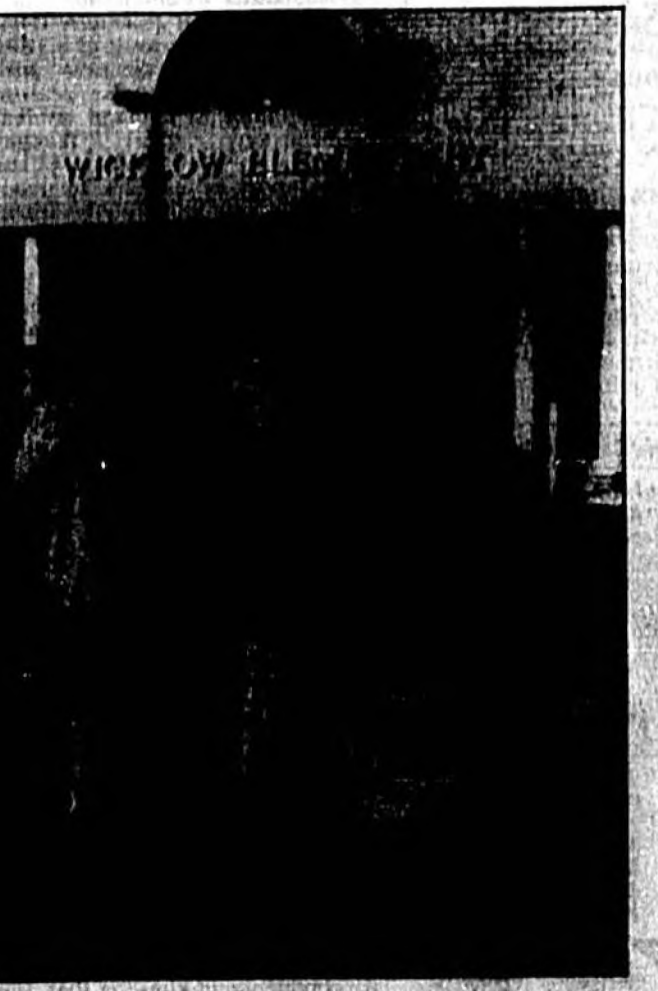
More than 550 school students moved into Wicklów Elementary School in Sanford today from their temporary facility at Goldboro Elementary.

About 550 students remain at Goldboro, which is slated to undergo major reconstruction.

The Sanford Herald has been sold to Republic Newspapers of Knoxville, Tenn.

Republic Newspapers, Inc., was formed in 1988. Prior to the purchase of the Herald, Republic owned 10 weekly newspapers, and one shopper (6 in North Carolina, 1 in Tennessee, 1 in Kentucky and 2 papers and 1 shopper in Florida). The ones in Florida are the South Lake Press and South Lake Shopper (Clermont) and the Zephyrhills News.

Since there is no current publisher at the Herald, Nick W. Drewry, executive vice president of the company, will act as the interim publisher until a permanent publisher can be named. The search for a publisher already has started. No other personnel changes are planned.

SCC offers adult education, testing

The Seminole Community College Adult Education Program began classes Aug. 25. An extended enrollment period will allow students to continue to sign up for classes.

The program offers free Adult Basic Education (ABE) and GED test prep classes to all Seminole County residents. Classes are offered at the SCC main campus as well as 11 adult learning centers throughout the county. Last year adult education classes served more than 6,500 students. Individuals successfully completing the GED test program will earn a Florida high school diploma.

The GED tests will be offered at SCC on Sept. 27, 29 and 30. Students may register for the tests in room B-102 in the Continuing Education Building test registration sessions are offered Sept. 15-18 at 11 a.m. or 7 p.m. Registration for the tests must be completed by Sept. 19 at 3 p.m.

ABE classes are designed to help students develop skills to improve basic reading, writing, and math abilities. Classes offer one-on-one and small group instruction and are designed to fit the individual needs of each student.

Water managers to hold line on taxes

PALATKA - Declaring an intention to "do more work without raising taxes," the Governing Board of the St. Johns River Water Management District accepted a tentative budget totaling \$128.1 million for the 1998 fiscal year beginning Oct. 1. The tentative budget is \$39.9 million less than the current year's budget adopted last year. In accepting the spending plan, Board members voted to keep the St. Johns District's property tax rate at 0.462 mill-.46.2 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value - for the fourth year in a row.

Under the millage rate, the owner of a \$75,000 house who claims a homestead exemption will pay \$24.10 per year in property tax for water management. The property tax the St. Johns District levies will raise \$56.1 million, with per-

mit fees, timber sales from District-owned lands, unencumbered carryover from the current year, and state and federal funding making up the balance of the budget.

"This budget reflects a conservative and balanced approach to resource protection without a tax increase," said Bill Segal, Governing Board chairman. "The average taxpayer has to tighten his or her belt and we will continue to seek out ways of improving efficiency to keep our tax rate as low as possible while safeguarding drinking water supplies, providing flood protection and protecting water quality in our lakes and rivers."

Approximately one-third of the budget is dedicated to purchasing environmentally valuable land, down from more than half of the current year's budget.

New teacher authority law promotes reasonable force

TALLAHASSEE - The State Board of Education approved a set of guidelines on the use of reasonable force by school personnel to maintain a safe and orderly learning environment.

The guidelines are the recommendation of the Education Standards Commission and the Education Practices Commission as the result of a 1996 law providing teachers with the authority to use reasonable force to manage student behavior. The Teacher Authority Law enhances the authority of teachers to maintain a safe and orderly learning environment by providing them with the authority to establish rules of conduct for their classrooms and have violent, abusive, uncontrollable or disruptive students removed from their classroom. Commissioner Brogan, former teacher, principal and superintendent of schools who once wrestled a gun away from a distraught student, advocated passage of the law. The law directed the Education Standards Commission and the Education Practices Commission to develop guidelines regarding use of reasonable force by teachers and other school personnel to protect themselves and others from injury and maintain an orderly learning environment.

"Teachers are not and should not be put in the position of being law enforcement officers," Commissioner Brogan said.

"Their role is to care for students and provide a safe learning environment. Teachers and students deserve the confidence of knowing that the classroom will be a haven for learning, safe from dangers and disruptions of inappropriate behavior. The law and these guidelines work together to restore that sense of confidence and provide assistance

when disruptive behavior threatens the safety of students and teachers."

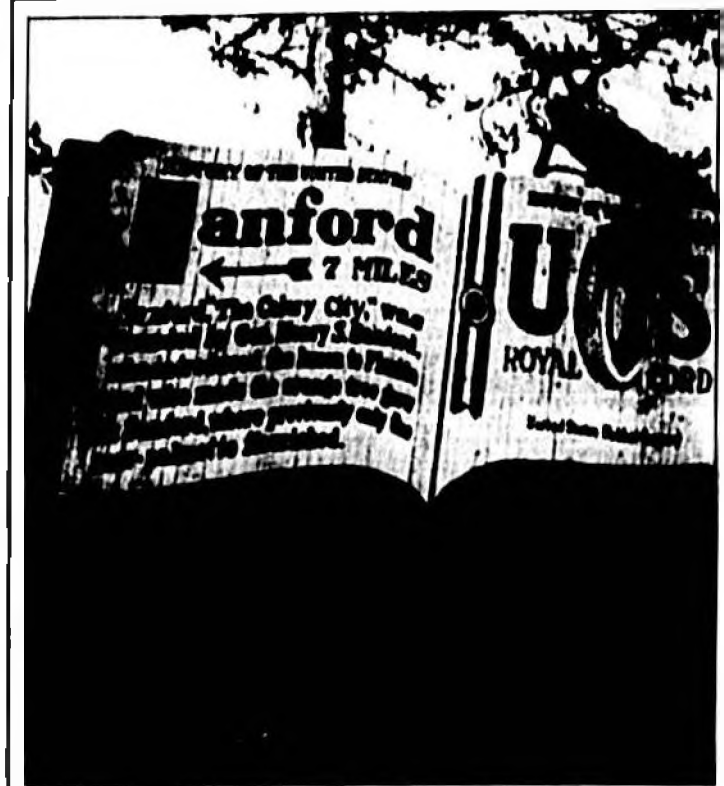
The recommendations are the result of the joint Education Practices/Education Standards committee; research about state and national standards for use of reasonable force; crisis management training; and public hearings throughout the state.

The guidelines define reasonable force as "appropriate professional conduct including physical force as necessary to maintain a safe and orderly learning environment." The recommendations include guidelines that would determine when the use of reasonable force is permitted, such as:

- conditions harmful to learning
- conditions harmful to student's mental health;
- conditions harmful to student's physical health;
- conditions harmful to safety; and
- harm and/or injury to self, school personnel and others.

The recommendations reinforce the value of training that focuses on techniques to defuse potentially volatile situations and recommended that the training programs be determined at the district level, where particular needs can be determined. The guidelines, along with a videotape that provides further direction on applying the guidelines, will be provided to school districts and every school in the state to assist them in the development of appropriate training programs for teachers and other school personnel.

Commissioner Brogan is addressing training for the use of reasonable force in his staff development budget proposal for 1998-99, and is encouraging school districts to direct their staff development programs to include training on the use of reasonable force.

Local Auxiliary president leads national convention

Florida's President, Anne Dorton of DeBary, a member of South Seminole County #8207, led the state delegation to the 84th National Convention of the Ladies Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) held August 16-21 at the Salt Palace Convention Center, in Salt Lake City, Utah.

As a leading representative of the state, she voiced the delegates' votes during the election of National Officers at today's session and played a key role in deciding the direction of the National Organization for 1997-98.

Highlighting the convention was the presentation of humanitarian awards by National President Eileen Tanner of Rockford, Ill. Approximately 5,000 members attended the convention activities, which recognized those who have helped the organization raise over \$3 million for its Cancer Aid and Research Fund for the ninth consecutive year, serving 2.8 million hours in the nation's hospitals, and spending \$5.8 million conducting programs to help young people, and donating \$10 million to assist non-hospitalized veterans through the Auxiliary's Rehabilitation Program.

During 1996-97, the 744-818 members also donated \$91,731 for the National President's Special Project, Operation Uplink. Begun last year jointly with the VFW, this program provides prepaid long-distance telephone cards to hospitalized veterans and active duty military personnel serving overseas.

At the convention, Mrs. Tanner presented two humanitarian awards. Della Reese, who sings the theme song and stars as Tess on "Touched By An Angel," was honored with the People Loving People For A Brighter Tomorrow Award, which is named after the National President's theme.

She was honored for serving as a positive role model. Whether she is dispatching wisdom as "An Angel" or enchanting people with her unique singing style or preaching to her flock of 350 at the Understanding Principles for Better Living Church in Los Angeles, where she has been a minister for the past 14 years, she

is spreading a positive message.

Deborah Stephenson, Charleston, S.C., received the Unsung Heroine Award for her outstanding efforts to help children with cancer. The Happy Days and Special Times program which she founded has evolved from a two-day camp for 29 children into a year-round program for children fighting cancer or whose cancer is in remission, their brothers and sisters, and the siblings of children who have lost their battle to cancer.

The 15th Annual Camp Happy Days lasted a week, ending July 5, 1997, and welcomed 235 campers and as many counselors. In addition to the camp, the non-profit organization provides week-end getaways for parents and siblings and has a special fund to help relieve financial stress for families.

Other presentations included \$5,000 to the University of Utah for cancer research, \$10,000 to the American Cancer Society to support its nationwide educational program, and the recognition of six young people who have won national scholarships from the Auxiliary during the past year.

In addition, members voted on Bylaws revisions, viewed the top five winning entries in the Young American Creative Patriotic Art Contest, and participated in several joint activities with the VFW, such as the Memorial Service at the Mormon Tabernacle and the Patriotic Rally.

The election and installation of National President Connie Atkinson of Conway, Ark., and the 1997-98 National Officers concluded the convention.

Tyrrell was on duty on a personal watercraft donated by Seminole Power Sports in

Longwood/Kawasaki JetSki Corporation. She is one of 20 firefighters/EMTs trained and certified on the watercraft. "Sally Tyrrell is a go-getter,

one of the most motivated members of our department," said Assistant Chief Chris Johnson of Operations. "She's a former school teacher who has been with us three years. She's studying to become a paramedic."

County EMTs and paramedics are now riding on patrol with deputies aboard the JetSki, the Sheriff's Office 22-foot patrol boat and Alert helicopter.

The Labor Day patrol was conducted on the St. Johns River, Bear Lake and Lake Brantley.

Last year, Florida had the largest number of boating accidents in the country - 1,337 incidents, 736 injuries

and 78 deaths.

It was a busy weekend for law enforcement agencies on land and water.

Writing to your elected representative

There are times when a citizen becomes so disturbed or irate over a government proposal or decision that he or she wants to write to their congressman (senator or representative).

Whoops, who is our representative and what is his or her address? Where can we find it? Some of our area phone books have a complete listing, but give only names and addresses without going into details.

Now, comes the League of Women Voters of Seminole County who has published a pamphlet of "Who's Who in Public Office in Seminole County." It is local, but also goes to the top with all of our government representatives.

Here, in one handy publication, are the phone numbers to call, and the addresses for letters to everyone from your local commissioner to the president.

Pay attention to the news and many times you will hear of a government official who says he or she voted because of a large influx of mail on a particular subject. We see this as an excellent example of government by the people and for the people.

But then there are those who believe they and only they have the knowledge with which to make a decision. The public, some believe, doesn't know the real facts behind this, so I'll vote as I believe.

The Who's Who is available at the Seminole County Public Library, or by sending a self-addressed stamped #10 envelope to League of Women Voters of Seminole County, P.O. Box #60394, Altamonte Springs, FL 32718-0394.

Get a copy. Use it as an address and phone number list. But also keep an eye and ear open. Find out which of our elected officials think they, not the electorate, should make decisions. When you find such a person, keep him or her in mind the next time you enter that voting booth.

Barry's Washington is a capital mess

You can tell it was a torpid August when the country's most adept agitators couldn't seem to whip up an appreciable protest.

They've been trying since Aug. 5, when President Clinton signed off on a congressional plan to put the government of the District of Columbia into receivership until it is fiscally viable. If you dozed off during this drama, you might have awakened thinking there has been a fascist putch, or that we are in Hong Kong and the Chinese army is bearing down upon us.

We are witnessing the "rape of democracy," said Hissoner Marion Barry of the federal move to transfer most of his powers to the financial control board that was created in 1995 to get the District solvent again. "People are intelligent," the mayor said. "I don't have to tell the community that their rights have been taken away. But I'm going to continue to tell the truth ... and continue to urge the community to rise up in anger."

Jesse Jackson came to town and informed the citizenry that they had been "stripped" of their rights. "The City Council has been stripped," said the reverend, who once toyed with the idea of allowing the populace to anoint him mayor but chose instead to be a

shadow senator. "The school board has been stripped. Voters have been stripped, and democracy has been stripped."

His script honed to perfection, Jackson then led a delegation to a pork processing plant in North Carolina, where he informed Sen. Lauch Faircloth's constituents of the lawmaker's dastardly role in the coup d'etat. As chairman So far, the D.C. community has managed to contain itself. Several hundred demonstrators rallied in front of the White House. Considerably fewer disrupted a control board meeting.

Jackson has promised to get the Rev. Louis Farrakhan involved -- a man who knows about

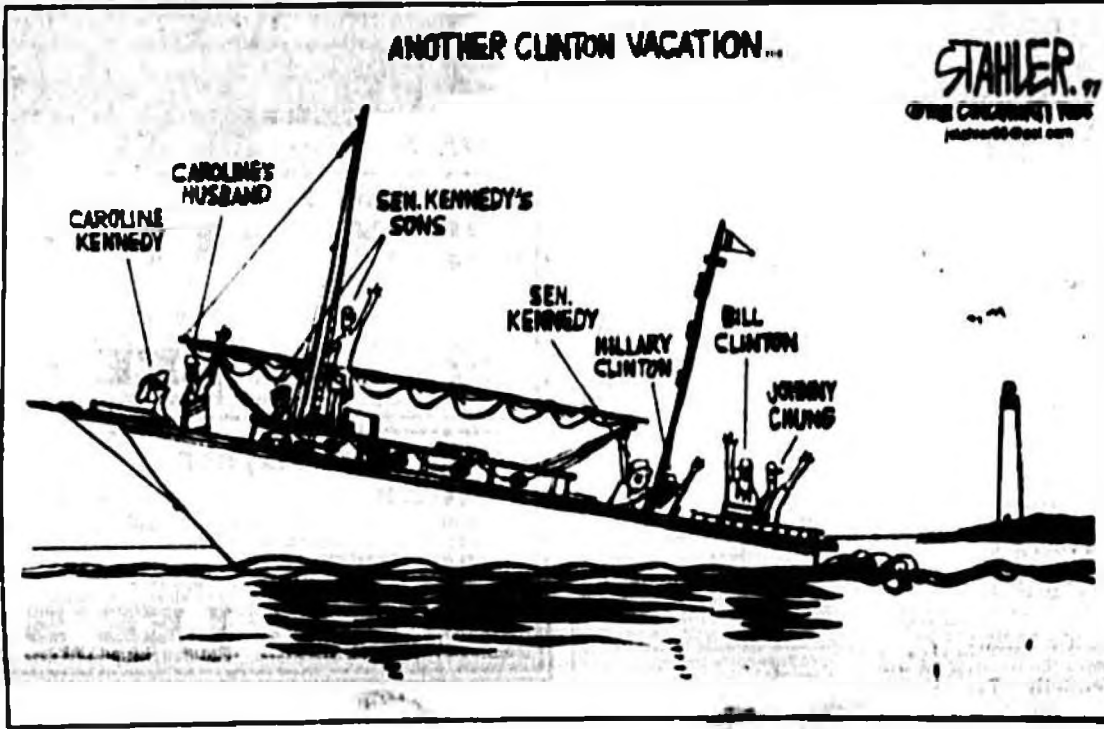
democracies, having studied them in such cradles of freedom as Libya and Iraq -- and vows to form a human chain around the Capitol building shortly after Labor Day. As we wait with bated breath to see what comes of those efforts, I pose a couple of observations for your consideration:

.. If anyone has a gripe, it is the taxpaying public. We have literally dumped money on the District of Columbia -- so much so, reported the Washington Post in a riveting series on the city's financial crisis, that it has not been able at times to spend it all. With stipends, contracts, grants and wages and salaries paid to federal workers, the Post estimated, Uncle Sam pours an astounding \$22.6 billion a year into the local economy. "Everyone complains how we got robbed by the federal government," the city's chief financial officer said. "The truth is, we've been lathered in money by the federal government."

.. Democracy is not under assault in Washington, D.C. This is patently impossible, as there is no democracy in Washington, D.C. It is a one-party town, and Barry has a built-in power base.

From 1978, when Barry was first elected, until

Doing that dumb male stuff

WASHINGTON--Reading the paper a week ago, I was struck by a photo of a tense young woman in camouflage garb doing push-ups between two crouched, yelling male cadets at the Virginia Military Institute. One cadet's face looked so contorted, I could feel the abuse he spouted. But it's a long-standing tradition for all freshman--called "rats"--to endure months of ritualized abuse at VMI, which just opened to women for the first time in its 158 years.

A few pages deeper was a similar photo--actress Demi Moore--sodden, bedraggled and breaking her long-standing tradition by being fully clothed--taking the abuse of hostile male officers bent on keeping her character from becoming the first female Navy SEAL in "O.I. Jane."

Later, I stopped for dinner after seeing "In the Company of Men," the acclaimed new movie about two white-collar guys who find a sweet deaf woman, simultaneously woo her and then drop her like a used gum wad. A man at a nearby table noticed that a fellow diner's date had left to go to the bathroom. "Don't worry if she doesn't come back," he joked to the other man. "In D. C., the ratio (of women to men) is 12 to 1."

You almost have to wonder why women want to be in the company of men.

Yet nothing's more seductive than power, and men have more of the kind that's easiest to measure. Maybe that's why it seems that women want to be around men, to receive their attention and acknowledgment--their validation--somewhat more than men want the same from women. Our feminine wanting extends from the personal--women plotting to "catch" men, seeing other women as competitors, whining, "Why can't he tell me his feelings"--to the social and financial, giving men a power over women that feminism has yet to conquer. The women's movement gave women new kinds of power by ensuring their equal, legal rights, allowing women to do things, like attending VMI, that once only men could do.

But that newspaper got me wondering: Has women's admiration of male power made us unduly impressed with men's stuff, causing us to devalue the feminine?

America's preschools are overflowing with masculine-named little girls--Morgans, Jordans, Kelseys and Taylors--while boys named Sue remain oddities. Schoolgirls' daily uniforms hardly differ from their male classmates': loose jeans, lumberjack shirts, boy's sneakers. Fewer women strive for fitness than for the fashion model's angular thinness of the jock's rock-hard buffness. Many starve themselves, throw up meals or just make themselves miserable in pursuit of an ideal that puzzles even the men many hope to attract. As one gay says, "I've yet to meet a man who says Kate Moss makes him lie awake

...I'd never suggest that women be limited to their traditional sources of power--their sexual sway over men, the bearing the nurturing of children, their intelligent use of compassion to soften the world's harsh edges. When the women's movement expanded women's power base into every sphere, much of the world changed for the better.

In the '70s, one of my gay pals theorized, feminine energy encouraged men to "grow their hair, wear bright colors, to embrace notions like human rights." A mere decade later, he says, "suddenly it was cool to be materialistic, to work your butt off at the expense of your family and sanity. ..."

"Now you see women actually wanting to be like men, who get blue in the face trying to convince you they're the same. But what's desirable about a more male society, where the accelerator is always pushed to the floor, where even play is competition?"

Have women changed as much as the type would suggest?

Nah. But those photos made me realize that in a "supposed to" world, I am a failure. I'm supposed to accept that the camaraderie and prestige that can follow military school abuse--which may boost graduates' military careers--makes such degradation tolerable. I'm supposed to see girl cadets and pumped-up film heroines beating men at their own macho game and feel pride.

I do, but I'm more puzzled. An executive friend who is nobody's pushover had just tearfully enrolled her daughter, 18, at college when she saw the VMI photo and wondered why she would willingly suck up such abuse. "It was hard enough leaving my daughter. ...But to leave her someplace where someone can spray spit into her face, to tear her down so she can be built up again? ...Why are women buying into that?"

Most aren't. And though I tip my hat to those who do for their own good reasons, I'm with my friend when she says, "I wish women could feel really good enough about themselves to say, 'Our stuff is good. We don't need to do that other male stuff.'"

"Especially when their stuff is dumb."

It's a question that's come up regularly over the last few years in highly classified intelligence reports. President Clinton receives, not to mention in the international media. But until now, the CIA has never fully settled the question.

Recently the reports have included excerpts from a disparaging new book written by Yeltsin's disgruntled former bodyguard, which covers this subject and many others.

So far, one CIA official confided to us, the CIA does not believe everything that's in the new book by Alexander Korzhakov, "but we think there's some important factual accounts in there. Knowing which is which is sometimes a coin toss."

From 1986 until his dismissal last year, Korzhakov served as Yeltsin's personal security chief and political adviser. Yeltsin previously credited Korzhakov as being the mastermind behind the 1993 assault Yeltsin ordered against Russia's parliament building. It was a bloody showdown with rebellious hard-liners, and dozens died. Privately, State Department officials excused the ugly episode at the time as "necessary" for Yeltsin to regain control and bring about a more compliant parliament.

In his book, Korzhakov lambastes Yeltsin from every direction, portraying him as a bumbling temperamental ineffectual.

We believe, based on personal knowledge of Yeltsin and aides close to him, that the drunk Yeltsin of Korzhakov's book is overdrawn. As one Washington Post writer has observed: "Hell has no fury like a bodyguard scorned."

Still, we also believe that Yeltsin has a serious drinking problem. The man likes his vodka; there's no question about that. It came up during one of our visits to Moscow early in Yeltsin's career.

He was telling a story about his baptism in the small village of Bulko in the Sverdlovsk province of the Soviet Union. It was tradition to ply the Russian Orthodox priest with alcohol, so the priest was pretty inebriated by the time this baby's turn came around.

The priest plunged the baby into the baptismal tub, then promptly forgot about it when a parishioner started arguing with him over some unrelated matter. Critical moments passed. When the priest turned to the congregation, the baby boy's mother screamed at seeing his empty hands. Turning white, he fished the baby out of the tub and it was soon coughing up water and crying.

The greatly relieved priest prophesied that any baby who could survive such an ordeal would some day become a great leader in Russia--and, therefore, deserved a strong Russian name. He pronounced: "I name him Boris Nikolayevich Yeltsin!"

Yeltsin told us this story with great drama and flair. Then he mentioned, in an aside to our associates Dale Van Atta, that it must have been a particularly rough day for the priest because Russian priests were the only ones, in his view, who could out drink him.

He made these remarks a couple years before he was president, before he hired public relations advisers. He the consumption prowess of which he boasted was a glimpse of the real Yeltsin.

tion as it becomes a magnet school under a federally mandated consent decree. The desegregation plan has been a subject of controversy among parents and educators as Seminole County prepares to assign children to Sanford schools, mostly through a family lottery system.
The new \$7.7 million school opened its doors this morning to youngsters arriving in 14 public school buses. Some parents walked with their children, while others drove to the 17,000 square-foot single-story building, which boasts 37 classrooms, four resource rooms and two computer skill laboratories.
In addition, the brick facility is outfitted with more than \$1 million in furniture and equipment, including a central media center with a television production studio.
Students currently have

plenty of room at the 894-person capacity campus. Each 1,000 square-foot classroom features two computer stations, telephones and teacher planning rooms. A multi-purpose room includes a stage and a large music suite.

On the exterior 18 useable acres, students and faculty will have at their disposal a covered physical education pavilion with a coaches' office and student toilets, and an additional hard court. For traffic control, a bus loop separates staff parking from the parent pick-up area.

Parent Shari Jansen, who walked her children, Correen, 7, and Albert, 8, said she liked the new school and her kids were very excited.

"I like it and I'm glad the school is broken up because the class sizes will be much smaller," Jansen said. "The teachers will have more time and patience with the kids and that's good."

Since that time, several sides of Yeltain's have confided to us that he sometimes consumes large quantities of vodka in the privacy of his quarters--which Korzhakov now openly charges. But Yeltain has usually been careful about his public drinking, and sobriety.

Ironically, on one of the public occasions when he was presumed to be drunk, Korzhakov actually defends him and says Yeltain was experiencing a heart attack. Returning from a Washington visit in 1994, Yeltain's plane stopped in Ireland at Shannon Airport, but Yeltain never emerged to meet with Irish officials. Words was he was drunk. In what at least one CIA source believes was a truthful part of Korzhakov's

book, the former body guard says he was immobilized on the plane because of a heart attack.

Another word of caution about taking Korzhakov's facts as facts: The man was a product of the KGB, finally leaving their employ in 1977 when Yeltain was expelled from the Communist Party Politburo.

The KGB was a serpentine organization, and its agents knew how to take a bit of truth and blow it out of proportion for their benefit. When Mikhail Gorbachev was leader of the Soviet Union, his KGB frequently spread misinformation about Yeltain's drunkenness in order to discredit the rising rival. On one occasion, in fact, we proved such a report regarding alleged Yeltain inebriation during a trip to the United States was in fact a KGB fabrication.

Helping to make reading program work

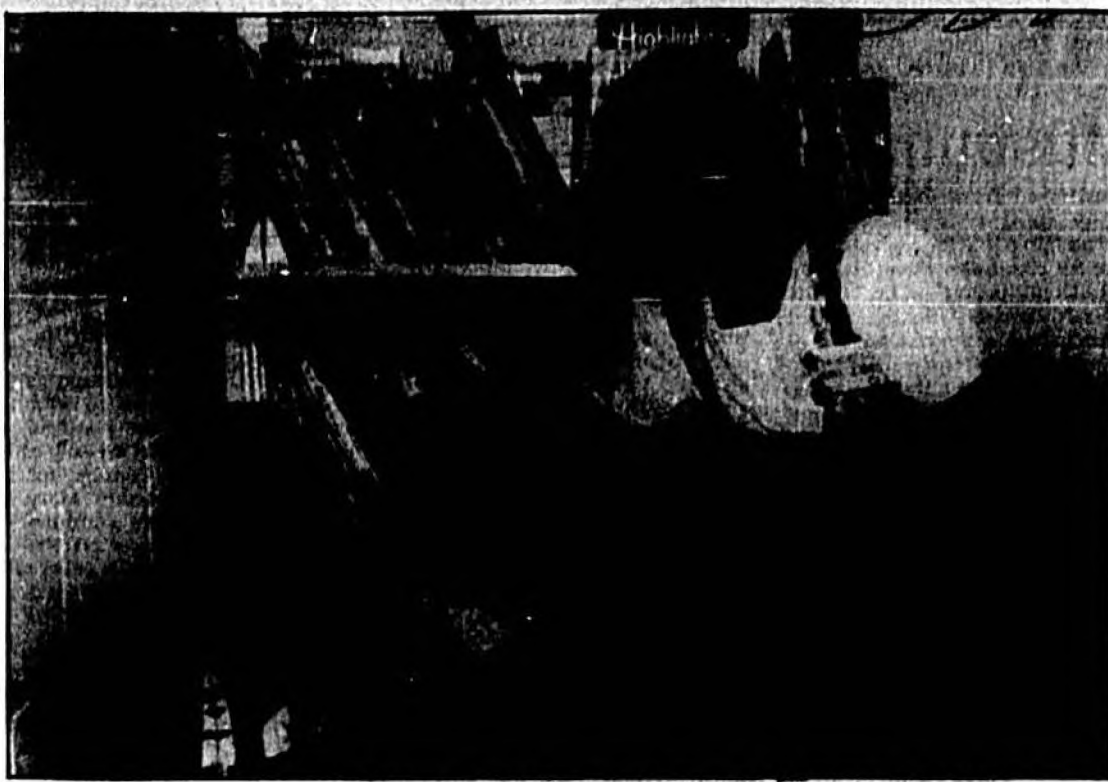

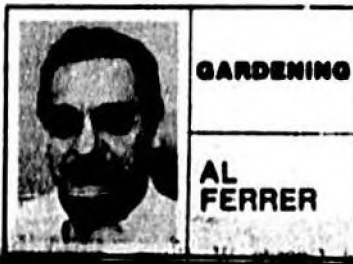
Red-banded thrips, can be troublesome

Introduction: The red-banded thrips, was first described from specimens from Guadeloupe, West Indies, where it was causing considerable damage to cacao. Because of that, in early publications it was called the cacao thrips. The red-banded thrips, is a tropical species found throughout Florida. Thrips are very small, less than 1/25 inch long. Many gardeners may see the damage caused by thrips and never realize that this little insect could produce that much damage.

Distribution: This insect occurs world wide, found mainly in tropical and subtropical areas. In Florida, it is found from Key West to MacClenny, but more commonly it is found south from the Orlando area.

Hosts: This thrips is a pest of many plants. Its host plants include both fruit and shade trees and numerous woody ornamental shrubs and vines, such as avocado, lychee nut, tung, acacia, persimmon, sweetgum, Brazil pepper tree, and pyracantha. In the West Indies it has been a serious pest of cacao and mango. The favorite tropical fruit hosts in Florida are mango and avocado.

Economic Importance: The larvae and adults feed on the foliage and the fruit by piercing

the epidermis with their mouthparts. They prefer young foliage. The thrips destroy the cells on which it feeds, causes some leaf distortion, causes injury to the fruit, and leaves unsightly dark colored droplets or blotches of excrement on the leaf surface. Honeydew excreted by red-banded thrips will promote growth of black sooty mold of affected plants. Where these thrips are abundant leaf drop can occur and may cause serious defoliation of trees. During the month of August, 1997 sweetgum trees have been seriously defoliated by this insect in Seminole County. Muscadine grape fruits have also been damaged on the surface by the feeding action of the red-banded thrips.

Description: The female is

about 1/25 inch long, and has a dark brown to black body with a visible red pigment in the first 3 abdominal segments. Wings are dark, long and narrow and fringed with long hairs. The male is similar but smaller and is seldom found. The larvae is light yellow to orange with the first two abdominal segments, colored bright red. The nymph and pupa are light yellow to orange with first three and last segments of the abdomen red but only immature thrips have the bright red bands. The life cycle is completed in Florida in about 3 weeks, and there are several generations a year depending on the weather conditions. Eggs of the red-banded thrips are inserted singly under the epidermis of the undersurface of leaves. Each egg site is covered with a drop of excreta that hardens and provides protection. Larvae and adults feed on foliage rupturing the epidermis with their mouthparts, killing the cells at the feeding site. Leaves suspected of being infested with thrips should be shaken over a white sheet of paper to better observe the insects. A 10-power magnifying

glass or hand lens will also aid in their detection.

Control: Insecticidal soaps can be purchased for controlling insects and related pests. If one of the commercial soaps is unavailable, 4 tablespoons of liquid dishwashing soap per gallon of water may be applied as a foliar spray to the plants. Repeat weekly until the problem is controlled.

Soap is effective in controlling thrips and safe for people and the environment. Chemical controls are not always necessary for this thrips, as natural controls are apparently effective most of the time. If chemical control is necessary, apply one of the suggested insecticides such as orthene, malathion or Sevin. Spray the plants to the point of run-off. Be especially careful to cover the undersides of the leaves. Continue to inspect the plants periodically and apply an insecticide only if plants become re-infested. Insecticides are poisons and should be handled as such. Read the manufacturer's label carefully before opening the container and observe all instructions and precautions.

I did not ask for permission to discuss it with my support group. However, I did discuss it — and now I'm worried that one of the other members of the group will mention it to someone outside, and my indiscretion will come back to haunt me.

Mother does not know I did this. She and I are extremely close and I know she senses my nervousness. My question: Should I confess to Mother and clear my conscience, or should I pretend that nothing happened? This is tearing me up inside. I feel physically ill and I'm extremely depressed. My mother has been through enough and I don't want to hurt her, but I cannot forget what I have done.

FEELING GUILTY

DEAR FEELING GUILTY: It is unlikely that your secret will be discussed outside your therapy group, where generally, confidentiality is required. Discuss your fears with your psychiatrist, and ask him or her to make an announcement reiterating confidentiality at the next group session. Since you feel that your mother would be


upset by your disclosure, say nothing to her. Then forgive yourself, and let it go.

Is pneumonia contagious?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've heard that pneumonia is catching. Is this true?

DEAR READER: You bet your bippy. It's highly contagious, regardless of the cause, whatever the micro-organism. People with pneumonia cough. This expels microscopic water droplets that are laden with bacteria or viruses. If someone is near enough to the patient, he or she may breathe in this contaminated moisture and the infectious micro-organisms can be inhaled deep into the lungs, where they can start a new infection.

It's a wonder that more of us don't get pneumonia. The reason is that our healthy immune systems kill the invaders before they can set up shop. This isn't so in elderly, frail patients; in people with immune deficiencies; or in folks whose lungs are weakened by emphysema or other chronic pulmonary disorders.

Yes, pneumonia is contagious. Maintain a suitable distance. If you can, from people who cough.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer the tortures of the damned from what I call "bladder shyness." For the last two years, I have been TOTALLY unable to void in a public restroom no matter how much I have to go, whether I am alone or even if I use a "stall." This is a deep concern because, although otherwise not a shy man, I'm afraid to go out on a date or to a bar with my friends. I'm certain that this is mental, not physical.

DEAR READER: I agree. And I certainly sympathize with your unpleasant predicament. Because of tension, your bladder sphincter refuses to relax. I don't know why you experience such tension and anxiety in a public restroom, but I believe that this issue needs to be addressed. I advise you to seek psychological counseling so that you can learn the reason for your reaction and be helped by finding a solution to it.

DEAR READER: This ointment has many uses. If it helps your cold sores, fine. I must admit that I'd never heard of it as a treatment for hemorrhoids.

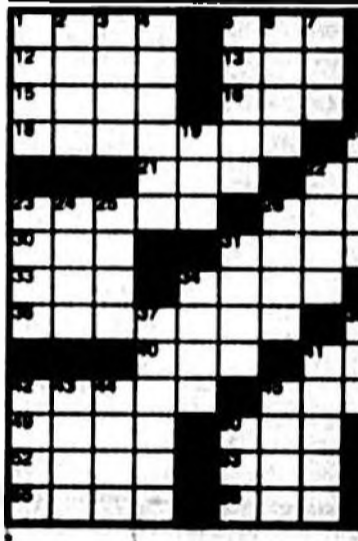

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Pairs: bizarre bridge

Suppose you are sitting North-South in a pairs event. You score one point for each of the other North-South pairs you do better than (or less badly than), and half a point for each pair you tie. If another pair is plus 620, you score one point whether you are plus 630 or 220. The best score of all is called a "top."

This deal occurred during a pairs tournament in New Zealand. West's opening bid showed 8-10 points with at least 5-5 in hearts and either minor.

North couldn't bring himself to pass, and South, taking his partner's vulnerable three-level overcall at face value, bid what he thought he could make. East doubled, then started thinking. "Lead a club, lead a club..."

However, West, not on the same

wavelength, led a heart. South won with his queen, took a winning diamond finesse, and ran all the diamonds, discarding two hearts and two clubs from hand. Understandably, East threw two hearts and four spades. So, declarer played a spade to the jack and cashed three more spade tricks. South had won all 13 for plus 1800. Surely a complete top?

No way! At another table, West passed, North opened three diamonds, East overcalled three spades, and South doubled for penalties. Ill-advisedly, West ran to three no-trump.

South doubled again. North led her spade. After winning with the jack, South cashed the spade ace before switching to diamonds. During that deluge, declarer (West) threw one spade too many from the dummy. So, after a heart to the ace, South cashed two more spade tricks for eight down and plus 2000. That was a top!
