





The framework of the human being is the skeleton, with the spine aiding in the support of the entire body. The delicate internal organs are protected mainly by the framework of the ribs; the bones of shoulders, arms, and legs are efficiently placed to function with ease.

The motive power of the body is the nerve force. This comes from the "dynamo" in the skull. This nerve force is carried to every part of the body through the uncountable millions of tiny "nerve lines," and the main trunk which carries all the "wires" is the spinal cord.

When the nerve system is working smoothly, the answer is normal health. Manipulation and other therapies, treat human ills by restoring this nerve force to the affected part.
