

City proceeds with city manager search

Commissioners also consider site plan for downtown Eckerd Drug Store

SANFORD — City commissioners will decide Monday how to proceed with a search for a new city manager.

Joe Denaro, Sanford's human resource director, is proposing two options. The first option proposes a traditional selection advisory committee that would screen resumes and make a recommendation to the city commission.

The advisory committee would narrow its selection from all applications received based on each applicant's background and how well those backgrounds match a profile

developed by city staff and commissioners. The profile would include a list of desired fields of knowledge, types of managements styles and abilities, and personal traits a successful candidate would need to effectively serve as the city's top administrative official.

Once the field of candidates has been narrowed, the advisory committee would ask candidates to complete a self-assessment questionnaire. That questionnaire would be used to screen the top five to 10 candidates

who would participate in oral interviews with the city commission.

Denaro is proposing that the advisory committee include himself, a member of the city commission, a local city or county administrator, a member of the business community with experience in hiring top management, and two members of the community.

The second option Denaro is proposing is similar to the first up through the self-

assessment phase of the process. At that point, a screening committee would conduct simulated exercises to assess how each candidate would perform on the job. The exercises could include mock staff and community meetings, interviews and other problem-solving drills.

Once the drills are completed, the screening committee would rank the candidates and make recommendations to the commission. Commissioners would then interview the top three candidates before making a final selection.

Commissioners will decide Monday

Former commissioner Yancey dies at age 86

SANFORD — Edward A. "Ned" Yancey Sr., a former Sanford City Commissioner during the 1980s, died Thursday, March 6, 2003. He was 86.

Yancey and his wife, Martha, were active in the city for decades, serving in elected roles and volunteering for various civic projects and groups. Both were involved in the Sanford Chamber of Commerce and in 1982, the "dynamic duo" became the first couple to receive the Topper Award, the chamber's top honor for volunteer service.

Yancey served on the city commission from 1980 to 1984, and made a run for mayor at the end

of his commission term. That race was won by Bettye Smith.

"Ned was a very nice man, and he served the city well," Smith said. "He and his wife, Martha, cared very much for this city."

Current city commissioner Whitey Eckstein noted that Yancey's commitment to the city did not end when he no longer served on the commission.

"Ned never stopped caring about the city of Sanford," Eckstein said. "His advice, concern and experience made a tremendous impact, regardless if he was a commissioner or a private citizen."

"Without Ned and Martha, we would not have had as nice a park as we do at Park on Park."

Pilot Club of Sanford hosts naturalization ceremony

Approximately 200 immigrants gathered at the Sanford Civic Center Thursday to become U.S. citizens.

"It's the happiest day of my life," said Ali Ghadiriah, a resident of Lake Mary who became a citizen at Thursday's ceremony. "I feel like I've been born again."

Ghadiriah, who has been living in the United States since 1991, says his mother, a resident of Iran, will be proud he is now a U.S. citizen.

Immigrants representing 16 countries from around the world joined Ghadiriah in reciting the Oath of Allegiance during the naturalization ceremony. Emotions ran high as family and friends watched loved ones fulfill their dreams of become a citizen.

"The United States is now my permanent home," said Lake Mary resident Farideh Fatemi. "I'm so excited. I can vote and become an active citizen."

Fatemi, a 38-year-old mother of two, became a citizen along with her husband, Zia, and friend, Sousan Kouchekei.

Phone threat, parcel delivery empties center

HEATHROW — Some 400 employees at the Convergys Information Management Group in Heathrow were evacuated from their offices on Tuesday after a parcel was delivered to their call center from an angry customer.

The company operates a customer service and telephone support center in Heathrow, and represents a number of vendors. Apparently, a customer in New York State was upset with a product that he ordered from one of Convergys clients. It was a

humidifier that the customer claimed didn't work. He called to complain last week.

During the course of the call, he said, according to Convergys employees, something to the effect, that he wanted to blow up the building in Heathrow. A Convergys representative made note of the call.

On Tuesday, a parcel was delivered to the facility in Heathrow, from New York. It had the customer's return address on it. Representatives at Convergys, made the connection between the

package and the angry/threatening call. The package was brought outside; the Seminole County Fire Department and Seminole County Sheriff's Office were called to the scene. The building was evacuated.

Bomb technicians were then called to the scene, and the decision was made to use a water cannon on the package. The force of the water cannon destroyed the package. The contents inside were examined, and it turned out

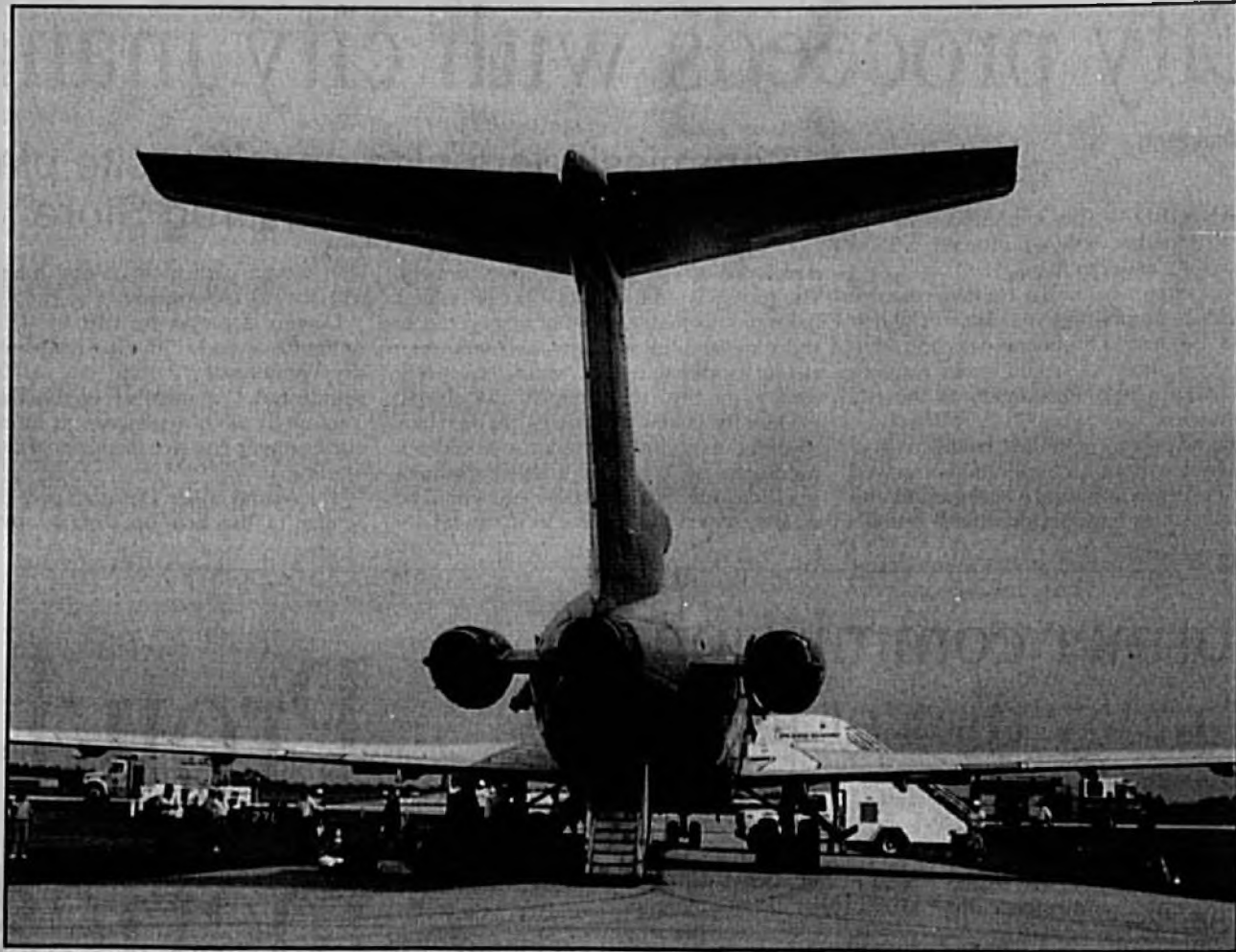
I can only hope the condition isn't permanent.

The year was 1965. I was employed by WESH-TV in the Holly Hill (Daytona Beach) studio. Back then, there were only about 15 on staff at that facility. At that time I was anchoring the noon news but I was still classed as a studio camera operator.

Station Manager Walter Strouse received a request from a gentleman to make a video recording, which would be sent to the Mike Douglas Program in California. He gave some stipulations however — that it be done at night, when the office staff was not on hand, and with a minimum of personnel making the recording.

The time was set for 9 p.m., with Strouse himself running the video tape machines, Al Wimberly directing, Ron Kendrick (he's still at Channel-2) operating the audio board, and I, as camera operator.

Shortly before 9 p.m., we were ready. Al told me to go to the front waiting room and unlock the door to let the two men in when they arrived. When I reached the front of the studio, they were both sitting on the sofa waiting for me. Yet, the door was still locked. (I never did understand that one).

Although there were two cameras in the studio, I was not allowed to be in the studio when they recorded. One camera was aimed at man No. 1, and the other was aimed at both of them. They were locked in position and I was told to leave the room.

Man No. 1 (as I will call him) was possibly 6 feet 6 inches tall. The other man was slightly over 5 feet in height. Both looked quite normal in human standards and were well dressed.

When the recording session began, they announced they were from the planet Venus "As earthlings called it," and were in Central Florida to study our space ventures at the Cape. They said they had a small disc shaped vehicle in the swamp areas just west of New Smyrna Beach, from which they would leave to join their larger craft which was hovering above Earth, not detected by our radar or other devices.

They reported they were dispatched from "Venus" to study Earth's space programs, and as soon as enough data was gathered, they would be leaving, but wanted to let the world know why they were here.

During their two-man conversation, they told of life on Venus (again — as WE call it) and how they had perfected space travel many decades ago. They discussed religion, (which I will delve into next week), and how their civilization had thrived. They also mentioned in passing that there were other planets in the solar system which had intelligent life. The next morning, we mailed the video tape to the Mike Douglas Show.

In about 10 days, the tape was returned along with a message — "What do you mean sending us a blank tape for our program, please explain".

While Strouse was the station manager at the time, he was still a licensed engineer, and there was no reason why the tape wasn't recorded.

(The scene changes) About a week later, I was driving during the early evening hours east on SR-46, nearing Mims. My brother-in-law John Jursa was with me.

Suddenly, we saw a bright light in the swamp land to the right of us. It was, without a doubt, a small disc shaped vehicle which took off from the land, rose into the sky, then suddenly disappeared into the night sky. We agreed at that time not to tell anyone as UFO sightings were quite common, and no one was believing in them.

The only people involved in the preceding situation were Ron Kendrick, who is still one of the top field reporters for WESH-TV, and Al Wimberly (although I have no idea where he is these days).

Strouse and my brother-in-law have since left us. I've talked to Ron and he still doesn't want to talk about it.

Similar to a Grace Marie Slincepher column, I will continue this next week, and tell you how I attempted to contact these two men in a few weeks after we received the blank tape returned from the Mike Douglas Show.

Am I a nut? Well, what I have said is the truth, and I will swear it happened. There may be other explanations, but this was several decades ago and I still have not found a logical solution.

Pseudo-patriotism trumps core American values

When President Bush visited Atlanta in mid-February, suburban housewife Sally Rountree decided to take the opportunity to show her opposition to the probable invasion of Iraq. So she scribbled a homemade sign — "No War for Oil" — and found a place along the route of the presidential motorcade, hoping Bush would see her protest.

As she tells it, she was never rude. She didn't shout. She didn't elbow other onlookers or jostle toward the front of the crowd. She merely stood holding her sign.

Nevertheless, for the offense of exercising her rights as a citizen of one of the world's greatest democracies, she was spat on, threatened and yelled at. One man went so far as to denounce her for wearing a cross around her neck. "Insulting I was not a Christian," she said.

As she wrote in an op-ed essay for the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*: "I was frightened that my neighbors were going to hurt me because I dared to express my opinion. This

could not be happening. Not in America, right?"

But it is happening here.

Rountree is not the only dissenting voice to find that her fellow citizens have adopted a pinched and distorted pseudo-patriotism that manages to mangle the very democratic principles upon which the nation was founded — including the freedom to freely criticize the president without fear of retribution.

Around the country, anti-war dissenters have been threatened and harassed, even for the mildest protests.

An Albany, N.Y., mall, for example, has apparently ejected some shoppers wearing peace slogans.

Last week, a security guard approached Stephen Downs at the Crossgates Mall and asked him to remove the T-shirt he was wearing, emblazoned with the words "Peace on Earth" and "Give peace a chance." When Downs refused to remove the shirt or leave the mall, he was arrested for trespassing. (The charges were

later dropped.) Three months ago, a group of activists wearing similar shirts were asked to leave the same mall, according to *The Associated Press*. So much for freedom of expression.

There is layer upon layer of sad irony here. Even as President Bush denounces Saddam's tyranny and vows to plant the seeds of democracy in Iraq, Americans are trying to suppress their neighbors' right to express dissenting views — one of the very pillars of American democracy. The citizens' right to criticize their leaders was so important to the Founding Fathers that they placed free speech in the First Amendment to the Constitution.

You would think that President Bush would use his bully pulpit to remind Americans that they ought to be modeling the democratic values that we are trying to export. But the White House has already proved a disappointment along those lines.

Back in October 2001, White House spokesman Ari Fletcher didn't stop at disagreeing with satirist Bill Maher, who suggested the 9/11 terrorists were "not cowards" in their suicide.

Instead, Fletcher snapped: "All Americans need to watch what they do, and this is not a time for remarks like that." Coming from the president's spokesman, it was a chilling suggestion of censorship.

The oddest thing about this wave of pseudo-patriotism is that it serves as a substitute for genuine patriotism — for a sense of shared sacrifice that would befit a proud nation threatened by hostile forces. Military recruiters report no upsurge in enlistment. And while one or two courageous voices have suggested a debate on a draft — either for the military or for homeland security — conscription is widely considered a political impossibility.

Few politicians would dare suggest we make any real sacrifices in the service of our country. Instead, too many of us believe we have shown ourselves to be great patriots when we stick an American flag bumper sticker on the old SUV and run over the peace placards in our neighbor's yard. Perhaps we've forgotten what we're fighting to defend.

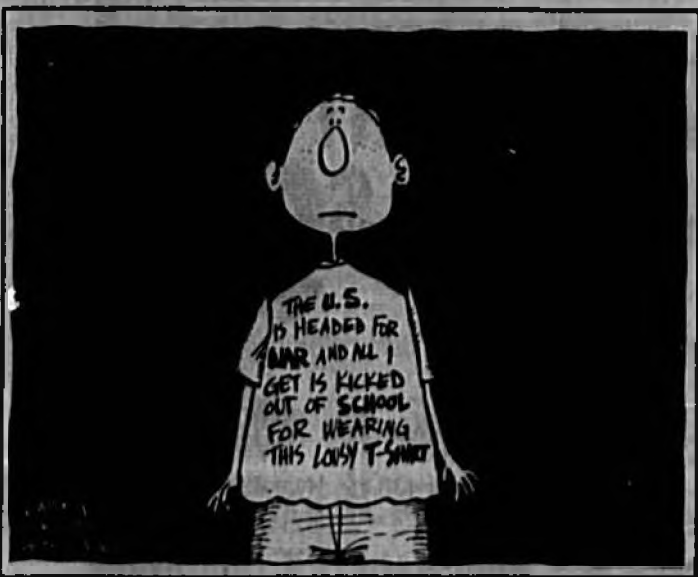

Los Angeles Times Sunday Crossword Puzzle

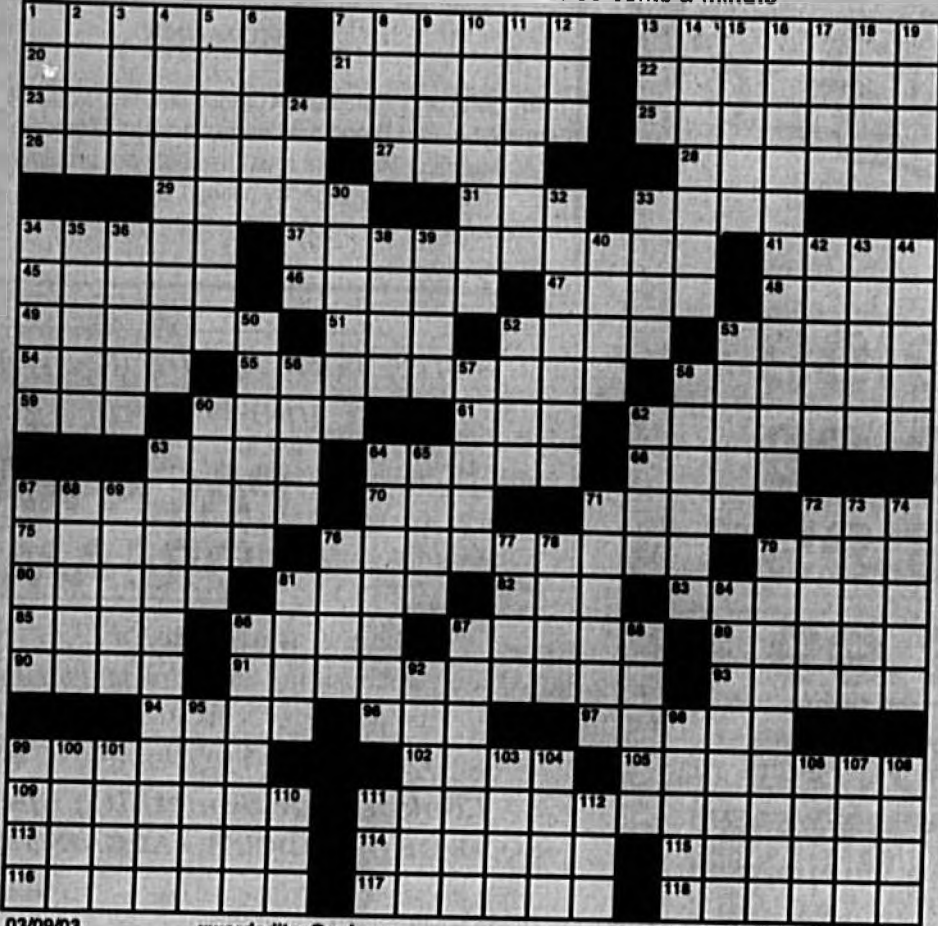

The Way We Were: Student life in 1940

Events as chronicled in the May 30, 1940 Seminole High Celery Fed and reported here should transport the students of that era back to a very enjoyable time in their lives. And those of us who attended SHS in later years will see similarities in our own experience. Enjoy!

Class History
A brief history of the Class of 1940 was given as was a synopsis of their senior year. Here are highlights:

During their freshman year, they chose red and white as their class colors and the red rose as their flower.

Their May Day program during their sophomore year was on of the most colorful ever presented. As juniors they lived up to their motto "Not to be served, but to serve" as they sponsored school dances in the gym and honored the seniors with one of the largest Junior-Senior Banquets ever given. Everyone enjoyed their class play "Let's Get Rich." Their senior play was "Little Women," under the direction of alumnus Sam Byrd, New York actor and producer. As a parting gift, the class donated a much needed public address system to the auditorium.

Officers of the senior class were Kent Rossitter, president; Jane Schultz, vice president; Helen Habe, secretary; Thomas Ratliff, treasurer; and Rose Harky, chaplain.

During 1939-40, Sadie Hawkins Day was observed. The student body selected a standard ring for four years, the band received new uniforms, several music students represented SHS at Rollins College and the football team fought valiantly, but won only two games.

Celery Fed Staff

The student newspaper, The Celery Fed, was published once a month and cost five cents a copy. Faculty sponsor was Miss Ruth Hand.

The staff included: Chuck DeWolski, editor; Elizabeth Pippin, associate editor; Mary Lynd Ross and Dickie Brown, sports editors; Julian Baumel, feature editor; John Dunn, exchange editor. Reporters were Marcia Proctor, Milton Huddleston, Dot Kader and Ralph Ray.

Business manager was Joe McCaslin and others on the staff were Mary Bedlin, Bobby Newman and Helen Kane.

May Day Ball

On May 3, the juniors honored the seniors with a May Day Ball held at the city hall. The white thrones in the ball room were surrounded by a colorful profusion of gladioli while green fern was placed in baskets and on a large trellis. Brightly colored streamers hanging from the ceiling added a feeling of gaiety.

Mark Cleveland, president of the sophomore class, announced early in the evening that the May King and Queen were Mary Wiggins and L.M. Telford.

The senior girls attending the queen were Madaly Truluck and Esther Strange. Girls from the other classes were Mary Martha Emerick, Patty Hodge, Lois Caldwell and Shirley Eick.

The senior boys attending the king were Charles Leivitt and Bobby Newman. Those from the other classes were Giles Chapman, David Gatchel, Leo Butner and Billy Fleming.

Following the coronation, a floor show was presented in honor of the king and queen.

Eloise Winn gave several impersonations including "How a Small Town Girl became a Big Nightclub Singer." Marian Haynes sang "Ma, She's Making Eyes at Me" and "Dark Town Strutters Ball." Mr. Ezell sang "In An Old Dutch Garden."

Immediately following the floor show, the newly crowned king and queen led the grand march.

The Crazy Cats of New Smyrna Beach furnished the music with SHS students Julian Baumel at the drums. During the evening, punch was served and corsages and candy were sold.

Annual Latin Banquet

The annual Latin Banquet, held in honor of Julian Caesar (John Angel) took place at the Episcopal Parish House on May 7.

Toastmaster was Edward Marshall and speeches were made by guests principal G.E. McKay, School Superintendent T.W. Lawton; and Boyd Coleman. Caesar made a speech to his mighty warriors and Miss Nellie Williams expressed thanks to all who helped make the evening a success.

The first year students, dressed as slaves, were at the beck and call of their masters. Baked chicken was served to Caesar's good people and everyone had a good time.

Junior/Senior Banquet Preview

The Junior-Senior Banquet was to be held that night, May 30, and a program had been presented in the auditorium earlier that week by the juniors as a preview of the event. They were also urging all to attend.

The presented a skit based on Kay Kyser's College of Musical Knowledge. The seniors were asked questions and the penalty for wrong answers were to attend the banquet.

Entertaining with several songs were Elizabeth Pippin, Owen Farrell and Maxine Saletta.

Plans for the banquet were still a secret according to the committee in charge of programs and menu. This committee included Joyce Whidden, Jessie Durden, Natalie Truc, Jane Cockrane, Margaret Spencer, Muriel Knox, Elizabeth Whigham, Helen Tamm, Gertrude Smith, Marcia Proctor and Milton Huddleston.

The decorating committee consisted of Elizabeth Pippin, Muriel Knox, Erma Doudney and Catherine Hurt. All flowers were being furnished by Pippin Gardens, thanks to Elizabeth.

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

The couple moved back to Sanford in 1975 after Ned's retirement and quickly became involved in the community.

Each year, 91-year-old Doris Stein, chaplain of the Pilot Club of Sanford, helps organize the event. Originally from Germany, Stein celebrated her 56th year as a U.S. citizen during Thursday's ceremony.

"The ceremony is important because it gives natural-born citizens the opportunity to recognize the process and procedure the new citizens must go through," said Ruth Gaines, secretary and treasurer of the Pilot Club of Sanford. "It reminds me and others how impressive it is and how valuable

it is to our patriotism. Citizenship is something special in our society. It reminds us the value of being a part of a country like ours."

According to Michael Pittman, supervisory district adjudication officer of the Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services, approximately 1,200 immigrants have become citizens during the ceremonies held in Sanford throughout the past 10 years.

With world affairs as they are, the naturalization ceremony brought family and friends of both natural and new citizens together for a common goal — patriotism.

"Several years ago we were much more complacent about citizenship and patriotism," explained Gaines. "Now, we fly our flags and do our part. This ceremony is a source to emphasize the flag and things related to our country, like the constitution."

According to Pittman, Thursday's naturalization ceremony was the first one held since the Immigration and Naturalization Services (INS) became the Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services under the umbrella of the Department of Homeland Security.

of determining if charges will be filed against the customer, for the alleged threats he made, which were perceived as real when the package appeared in the mail.

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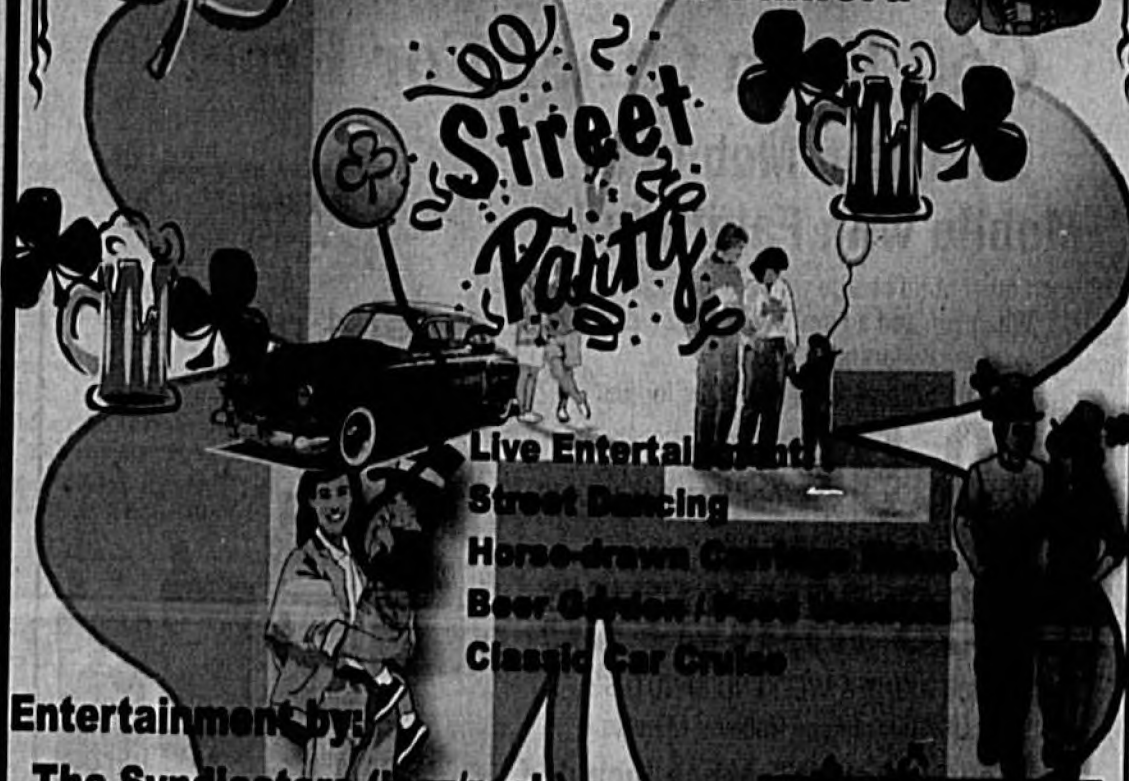

There are currently 33 cast members in the group. To become a part of the Fab Follies, each person must audition and realize — if asked to join — it's a non-paying gig.

"It's a lot of work," Taylor said. "We rehearse at least twice a week and perform more than a dozen shows each year."

As the group's director, Taylor creates each production — from choosing the music to designing the costumes. Although the 2003 season isn't even over, she is already looking ahead to next year's production.

"Sometimes it feels like it's taken over my life," Taylor said. "But, I love it, and the cast members love it. It's definitely worth it."

As part of the cast, Winckler is also dedicated to making the Fab Follies one of Central Florida's entertainment highlights. She was asked to join the group about two years ago and today is its marketing manager.

"The Fab Follies is such a great group," Winckler said. "My goal is to make us famous."

Winckler's boyfriend, Bert Phillippi, is even a member of the cast. Together, they are enjoying the art of entertaining while encouraging other seniors to fulfill their dreams.

which selection process to use and are expected to approve language for advertisements to be placed in national media companies.

Former city manager Ton VanDerworp resigned in January, with the resignation becoming effective Feb. 11. City commis-

sioners did not immediately begin a search for VanDerworp's replacement because the March 4 referendum asked voters whether the city should abolish the position and adopt a strong mayor form of government. Voters overwhelmingly rejected the change in the charter by a 70-

percent to 30 percent margin. During the interim, city commissioners appointed Deputy City Manager Roger Dixon as acting city manager.

In other business, the commission will:

- Discuss whether to move forward with legal action to remove pay phones at the Park Avenue Mart at 12th Street and Park Avenue. Residents have complained that the phones attract illegal activity.
- Decide whether to vacate a 66-foot easement in front of an assisted living facility located in the former Southside Elementary School between Palmetto and Magnolia avenues near 13th Street.
- Consider approval of a site plan for Eckerd Drug Store at the northeast corner of 1st Street and French Avenue. Commissioners will also consider a waiver to allow a drive-through facility, right-of-way agreements, and whether to vacate a 14-foot east-west alley.
