### Gold Mining Ban Hits Section Of U. S. Hard Blow

LEAD, S. D., Nov. 12.—A war-blow piece of paper hit this town the hardest blow any American community has suffered in this war.

The piece of paper was the order banning gold mining operations in western America. Every one of the 7,000 men women and children in Lead and the 4,000 in her gay playground sister town of Deadwood felt the weight of it.

What happened here can happen anywhere. It probably will, as the U. S. gets deeper in the war, and more and more non-essential industry is curtailed to send labor into essential war industry. So there's a lesson and an example in these black hills of South Dakota.

Lead and Deadwood have lived for and by gold ever since Wild Bill Hickok and Calamity Jane prowled these tall purple hills. The fabulous Homestake mine is Lead and Deadwood. Its payroll and the fat dividends that go largely to the surrounding territory support the retail, entertainment and service enterprises that are the only other business. It's been operating since 1876.

I arrived in Lead (pronounced lead) just after the government shutdown order became effective. Like a recent earthquake, it was the sole topic of conversation in bars, restaurants, hotels and shops.

What the shutdown order is doing and will do to Lead-Deadwood is a matter of opinion. There is the government version. There is the side of the hard-hits and apprehensive retailer-merchant. There is the story of the miners themselves.

The government ordered the gold mines closed to force the miners into the copper, lead, zinc and molybdenum mines. Gold isn't important now, in a world crying for practical war metals.

## Cherry, Pilot Of Rickenbacker, Is Rescued By Navy

### Search for World War Ace Is Intensified In Ocean South of Hawaiian Islands

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—The War Department today announced the rescue of a flier from Capt. Eddie V. Rickenbacker's missing plane in the Pacific and added "it is believed possible that other survivors may be on life rafts in the same general vicinity." The rescued flier, Capt. William T. Cherry, Jr., Abilene, Tex., was picked up by the Navy yesterday "in good condition but weak."

His rescue immediately intensified the search in the vast ocean area south of Honolulu where Rickenbacker's plane disappeared Oct. 31 when the World War One flying ace was enroute to the south Pacific to survey Army Air Forces for Secretary Blum and Air Force Chief Lieut.-Gen. Henry H. Arnold. Capt. Cherry was the pilot of the Rickenbacker plane.

## Auto Mileage Is Involved In New Rationing Plan

### Drivers Reminded To Dispose Of Tires Over Five Per Car

A new plan to ration automobile mileage rather than gasoline, goes into effect Nov. 22, A. B. Peterson, secretary of the Semi-ole County War Price and Rationing Board stated today.

Under the new program, motorists, in order to obtain gasoline must first dispose of all tires in excess of five per car also register their tires on hand with the Rationing Board, he said.

"In other words," said Mr. Peterson, "the owner of a passenger car is allowed the four tires in the running wheels and one spare. Possession of all tires other than these, is prohibited, by law, and owners must report same to the local board."

"So as to secure this information in order to fill in forms for Tire Record and Application for Basic Rationing Books, motorists are urged to mail this board to car owners throughout the county," Mr. Peterson advised, "and so these car owners will be required to list the serial numbers of all tires in their possession."

"These cards should be promptly filled in with the necessary tire information and serial numbers, and mailed at once to this office in order that we may fill in the rationing books for the owners for their signature," Mr. Peterson stated.

The curiously orphaned French flier lay with unopened parachute and steam up last night off Toulon, the last remaining bit of unoccupied France, as the United Nations and the Axis vied feverishly behind the scenes and openly on the air waves for its control.

Naval authorities were convinced that the French warships still were in Toulon, ready for any eventuality, but accurate on the continent with close connections in France persisted in the belief that at least some vessels had fled in the last several days to join the Allies.

Last night the Vichy radio broadcast that the French fleet had fled to Casablanca, French Morocco. It said the new 46,000-ton battleship Jean Bart, engaged around Casablanca, was out of action.

Against a background of threats, promises and intrigue in overran France, three German armored divisions slashed through the hitherto unoccupied zone to the Mediterranean coast.

But Hitler, trading lightly but brightly, the French ships into flight, pulled up his forces at Marseille, 30 miles short of Toulon, and the German-controlled Vichy radio and this estimate was ordered because the French navy chiefs had pledged themselves to resist "any aggression."

British naval authorities shrugged off as worthless Hitler's promise to "safeguard" the fleet. At the showdown, they believe, the French and their new men with power but without a chosen ally will determine on which side they will fight.

## New Attacks On Stalingrad Held Off By Soviets

MOSCOW, Nov. 12 (AP)—Repeated German attacks characterized as the beginning of a new offensive were held off by Soviet defenders today with heavy Nazi losses. The Soviet army paper Red Star announced that the Red Army had launched a new offensive in battered Stalingrad and in one sector smashed more than 100 yards into the German defenses, but a Russian counter-attack to the north flung back the enemy 400 yards, the Red army announced today.

Apparently apprised by the fact that icy winds sweeping across the barren steppes would force them to retreat to the warmer climate beyond the Don, the Germans regrouped their badly mauled forces, filled the gaps in their line with fresh reserves and attacked on all sectors of the Stalingrad yesterday, the Thursday midnight communique said.

The defenders of the city repulsed numerous attacks, the communique said, "in one sector they and with high losses, the Soviet forces are driving a wedge into our defenses and breaking back Soviet troops 100 to 200 yards."

In the successful Russian counter-attack in northern Stalingrad, the communique said, 200 German soldiers and men were killed and 100 captured. The Soviet forces were destroyed.

Laymen will speak in many of the churches, and the observance will be observed throughout the United States and Canada, he stated. The observance is sponsored by the Laymen's Missionary Movement, an international organization of Christian laymen with headquarters in Chicago.

"Christian Laymen and Women of the World" is the theme of the observance, which seeks to encourage Christian laymen in the course of their personal responsibility for the missionary work of their respective communities or denominations.

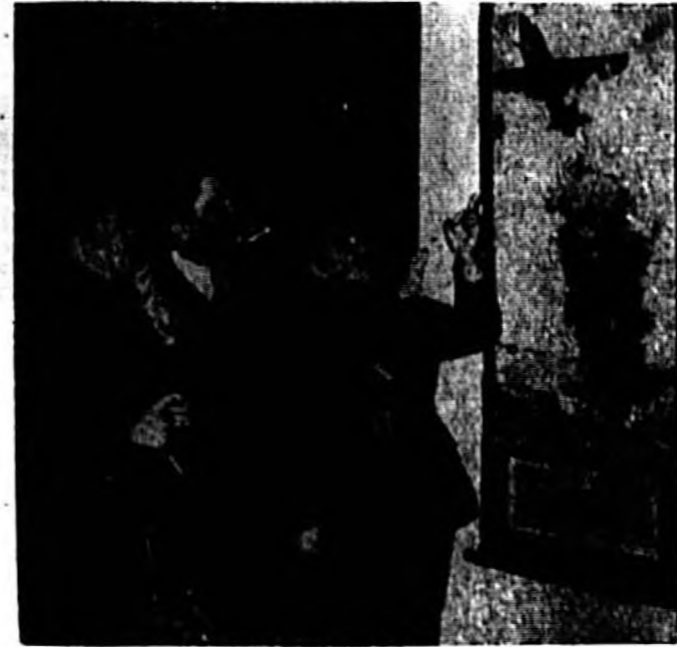
Members of the Association have been busy for weeks preparing for the opening of the Christmas seal sale here on Nov. 21. Mrs. Ingley stated:

### May Beat Rommel To Tripoli To Block Last Chance Of Escape For Axis

LONDON, Nov. 13, (AP)—The powerful striking force of Gen. Eisenhower's combined British-American Army swept toward Tunisia in strength today, suggesting it might break on through and beat Field Marshal Rommel to Tripoli, the last major port of escape left after the battle of El Alamein.

A British dispatch reported the Axis chief had fled the Port of Boue, 200 miles from Tripoli, and that the British was reported heard from a radio station on an American-held Rabat. There are many indications the Axis has been too late with too little of its force.

From Cairo came the report that Tripoli abandoned by the Axis was a headlong flight to the west. The Axis force was reported today by the British and the first indication the Axis was heading off to the west.

### Home Slaughtered Meat Counts As Part of Ration

**GAINESVILLE, Nov. 13 (Special)**—Farmers should count as a part of their meat allowance all home-slaughtered meat as well as that bought at local retail shops, according to a recent statement released by the Secretary of Agriculture, Claude R. Wickard, chairman of the Food Requirements Committee of the War Production Board, in a recent statement released by the Office of War Information. All families in the nation are being asked to contribute alike to this program by keeping meat consumption to the following weekly amounts by age groups: Under six years 3-4 pounds;

from 6 to 12 years 1-2 pounds; over 12 years 2-2 1/2 pounds. This includes home-slaughtered cattle, calves, hogs and sheep. To avoid waste when large supplies of home-slaughtered meat are temporarily available, as at butchering times, farmers may find it necessary to consume a larger volume, but as an average for the year their consumption should be held to 2 1/2 pounds per person weekly, the statement declared. Farmers who butcher meat for sale locally may continue to do so. However, families who purchase such meat from farmers are expected to consume it in accordance with their sharing allowance.

# Home Slaughtered Meat Counts As Part of Ration

**GAINESVILLE, Nov. 13.** (Special) — Farmers should count as a part of their meat allowance all home-slaughtered meat as well as that bought at local retail shops, according to Wickard, chairman of the Federal Agriculture Administration's Food Requirements Committee of the War Production Board, in a recent statement released by the Office of War Information.

All families in the nation are being asked to contribute alike to this program by keeping meat consumption to the following weekly amounts by age groups: Under six years 3-4 pounds;

from 6 to 12 years 1-2 pounds; over 12 years 2-2 1/2 pounds. This includes home-slaughtered cattle, calves, hogs and sheep.

To avoid waste when large supplies of home-slaughtered meat are temporarily available, as at butchering times, farmers may find it necessary to consume a larger volume, but as an average for the year their consumption should be held to 2 1/2 pounds per person weekly, the statement declared.

Farmers who butcher meat for sale locally may continue to do so. However, families who purchase such meat from farmers are expected to consume it in accordance with their sharing allowance.

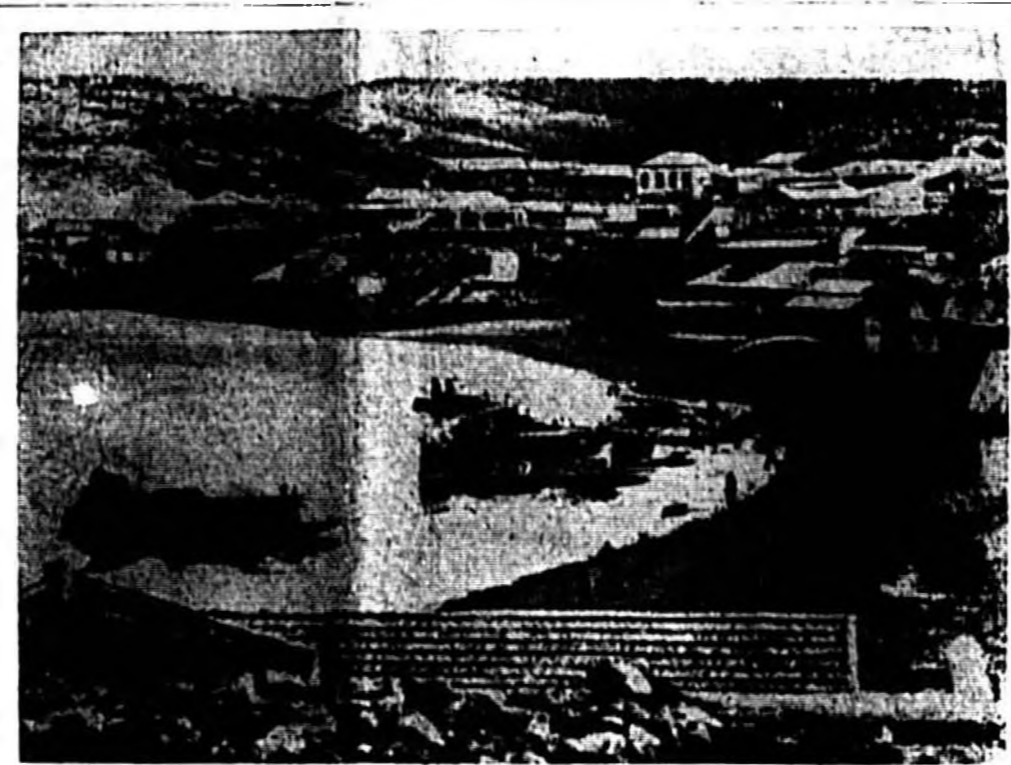
