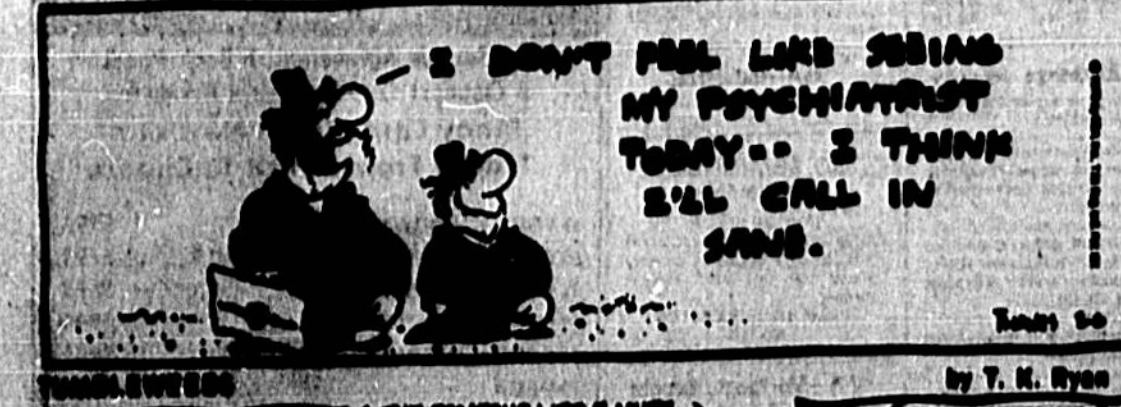
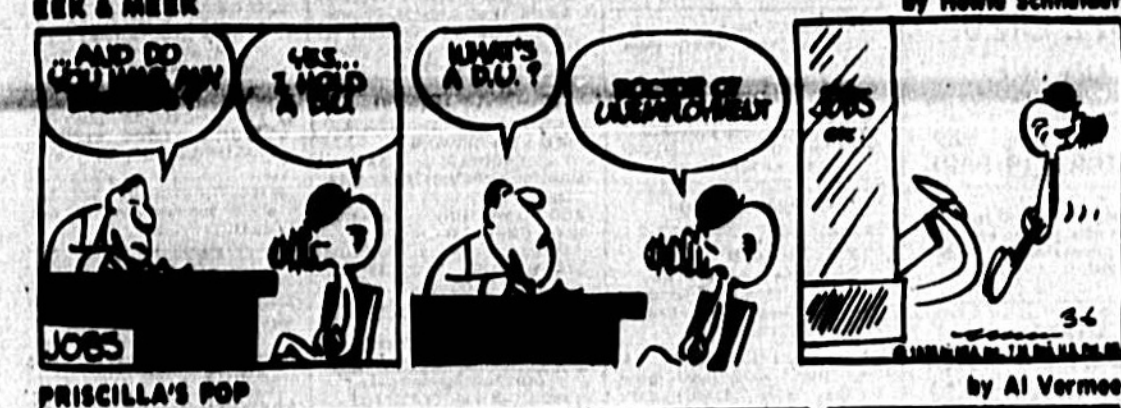
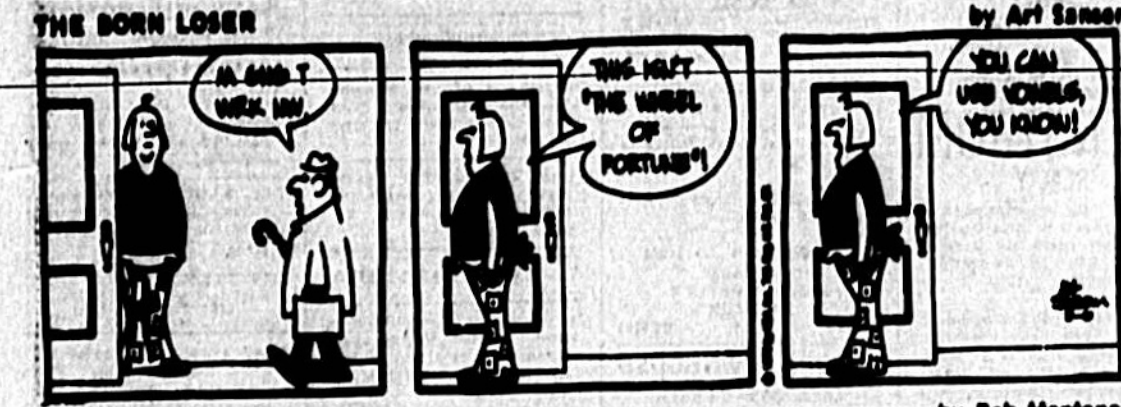

### Prostatitis: Cause And The Treatment

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** Can you possibly tell me what causes prostatitis and can it be treated?

**DEAR READER:** The word "prostatitis" means inflammation of the prostate gland. Inflammation can be acute or chronic or of a mixed nature. Acute prostatitis is fairly common and is caused by a bacterial infection. The bacteria may be any of a number of different organisms. That is why a culture and studies to learn what antibiotic will control it are often necessary. Chronic prostatitis is sometimes divided into two cases of bacterial origin (bacterial prostatitis) and that not caused by bacteria (non-bacterial prostatitis). Acute prostatitis is usually easily treated. It causes symptoms of an acute infection such as pain and discomfort. Chronic bacterial prostatitis is usually more difficult to treat and chronic non-bacterial prostatitis may prove to be a difficult and never-ending struggle for the physician and the patient. Prostatitis should not be confused with simple benign enlargement of the prostate that usually occurs as men get past middle age. ## By County Commission Roumillat Deal Delayed; State Eyed For Sheriff \$

A 30-month lease-purchase agreement between the county and owners of the Roumillat building was taken under advisement by the Seminole County Commission today.

The commission also took under advisement a request by Sheriff John Polk and Commissioner John Alexander to seek state funding for construction of an administrative facility for the sheriff's department. A similar request to the federal government was turned down last week. The lease-purchase agreement specifies the county would pay \$94,000 over a 30-month period for rent and purchase of the Roumillat building.

Terms of the agreement include provision for the improvement of the building, according to Robert Ellis, director of administrative services. He explained that covers of the building will be replaced and the third and fourth floors of the structure, at no cost to the county.

"These improvements will be made to the specifications of the tenant—the county," said Ellis.

Ellis, Commissioner Bill Kirshoff and other county staff members met on the final details of the lease-purchase agreement Monday. The contract was drawn-up by Harry Stewart, county attorney. Last month the commission, on a 3-2 vote, designated Kirshoff to initiate negotiations with owners of the Roumillat building.

The county's Manager Office is located on the second floor of the building. The first floor will be kept as a "shop," according to Ellis. Some thought has been given to moving the library into the first floor space, he noted.

The county began looking at the Roumillat building in an effort to obtain office space that would relieve overcrowding in the courthouses.

Polk and Alexander pushed the commission for a formal request to Gov. Jeb Ashworth for funds to construct the administrative facility.

"I met with people in Tallahassee yesterday," he said.

## 500 G Necklace Snatched

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—A diamond necklace valued at \$500,000 was snatched off the neck of the 61-year-old widow of industrialist Henry Kaiser in the lobby of the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City early today, police reported.

Police said that Alyce Amy Kaiser was returning home at about 2:18 a.m. from a party at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel when she was snatched by a man who fled into the lobby. She was seen running away from the building and was followed by a man in a dark suit.

They took a diamond necklace that police said was valued at about \$500,000. A large 30-carat diamond highlighted the jewelry, surrounded by several square diamonds in a platinum chain, detective said.

Police said Mrs. Kaiser arrived in front of the U.N. Plaza building in a chauffeur-driven limousine. A second car pulled up behind it, and she walked into the building, a well-dressed man emerged from the second car and followed her.

A police spokesman said the doorman, whose name was not revealed, saw the man with Mrs. Kaiser.

Her chauffeur, though, was suspicious. As he emerged from the limousine to protect a second man emerged from the other car, and both held the doorman and the chauffeur at gunpoint.

Inside, the first man took the necklace from Mrs. Kaiser near the lobby doors to the elevator. Mrs. Kaiser, since 1977 the widow of industrialist Henry Kaiser, was not hurt in the incident. Her late husband was chairman of the board of Kaiser Industries.

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## Guard Rail At Pond Edge? Not Likely Here—Engineer

It's not likely a guard rail will be installed at the edge of a pond on Lake Mary Boulevard where a girl drowned Saturday night when her car plunged into the water.

And it's also unlikely guard rails will be installed at any other county intersections at water's edge.

"That's the picture that emerged today in interviews with county and city officials responsible for engineering such intersections," Geraldine Cramer, chief of the Florida Department of Transportation, said. She is the county engineer in charge of the intersection of Lake Mary Boulevard and West Ridge Drive.

"The first accident I've heard of at that particular intersection," said Sanford City Engineer Mack LaZenny. "I've never heard of any need for a guard rail in that area. I think it's unusual for someone to cross Lake Mary Boulevard and go into the pond, especially through a stop sign. In any case, that road right-of-way is maintained by Seminole County—not Sanford."

Sanford's city limits begin just north of the Lake Mary Boulevard right-of-way at the intersection with West Ridge Drive, according to Seminole County Engineer Bill Bush. The pond itself is within the city, he said.

"There are no clear-cut guidelines for the placing of guard rails at these intersections. There aren't any county ordinances or resolutions we can go by. We don't utilize very much guard rail in the county because we don't have many embankments or ditches or elevated roads over bridges," said the county engineer.

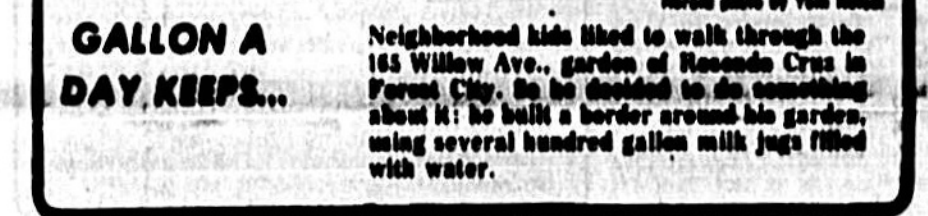
"Most of the guard rails used in the county are at the approach to bridges. I don't know of any place we'd put a guard rail at the intersecting road of a T-intersection. There are dozens of such intersections all over the county that run to lakes or ponds. The City of Sanford is full of them on Lake Monroe."

"There are limits in the Lake Arthur Section and in Forest City, too," said Bush.

The final report on the drawing will be completed by the end of this week, Sanford police said.

## 'Privacy Right' Eased For Govt. Intrusion

**TALLAHASSEE, (UPI)**—The Constitution Revision Commission amended its "right of privacy" policy today that attorneys would have a field day challenging laws giving the government authority to force more intrusion.

Commissioners rejected a move to eliminate the privacy guarantee from the proposed new constitution which will go before Florida voters in November.

At the urging of former Gov. Larry Collins and Supreme Court Chief Justice Ben Owen, the commission added the word, "unreasonable," to the amendment, giving every Floridian the right to be free from governmental intrusion into his private life.

Collins, author of the proposal, was on a slim 10-4. He had tried unsuccessfully to get the qualifying language into the original draft.

Without the restriction, the amendment might be interpreted by the courts to require search and seizure by law enforcement agencies and other government rights because there is "bound to be some government intrusion," Collins said.

That Daniel "Chapple" James Jr. was the first black American to rise to the rank of four-star general in the Army marked him for a special niche in our history. But this was only one of the distinctions that made him an extraordinary human being. His timely death from a heart attack at the age of 59 was a national loss.

Gen. James' skin was important only insofar as it reminds all Americans of the handicap he overcame in his distinguished career—and insofar as it will ever be a model to rising generations of a race.

For in his love of country and service to it, his transcending race and creed; he was simply a real American who lived and died as a true American patriot in a time of national disenchantment when this was not the popular thing to do. Indeed, this man's very life was a tribute to the United States. He reminded the whole world that this land, with its human imperfections, offers more freedom and opportunity to its disadvantaged than any other in all history.

Only in America could the last of 17 children of a coal-car pusher in a Florida ghetto rise to top military command and walk with presidents. In inspirational talks delivered all over the country before military and youth groups, Gen. James proclaimed the credo of personal responsibility. "I got here because... I filled the squares," he said. He drummed home what he called the "power of excellence," or the need for a good education and old-fashioned stick-to-itiveness. He was proud to be known as a salesman for national defense and Americanism. And in this job he had few peers.

"It's our job to be strong, to carry a big stick," he warned. "That can bludge the nose of any enemy who thinks about crossing the line."

**WASHINGTON**—Jimmy Carter has the dubious distinction of winning the presidency—the nation's most powerful and prestigious public office—in with the support of exactly 29.3 percent of the electorate.

When Democrat Bradley T. Byrne was routed governor of New Jersey four months ago, he had the backing of fewer than 25.3 percent of those eligible to vote. Nonetheless, Mr. Byrne was elected governor of Virginia on the same day with the support of less than 25.3 percent of the electorate.

Again, that's because only 29 percent of all eligible voters in the Garden State and only 29 percent in the Old Dominion ever bothered to cast their ballots in these contests.
