"Good Lord have mercy, the people who built this city are suffering for water now," Councilman E. E. Williamson declared as he urged a moratorium be placed on further annexations for the next six months "at least."

The only exception to the moratorium, the 15-year veteran on the Council said, should be for "small sections to square up the city's boundaries.

"We need a moratorium if we ever needed it. We are up to the hilt. We are overloaded. We cannot give our people what they need," he insisted. Council William Klosky first urged that the matter be

tabled until Aug. 31 and then, apparently following a change of heart, seconded Williamson's motion Councilman Dick Crenshaw took up the tabling idea, however, stating that although Williamson had a good point

the matter deserved careful consideration at a work session with City Engineer William Palm in attendance. Mayor Kenneth Brown said he agreed with Williamson, declaring he, also, is concerned about providing services and favors squaring up the city limits. The chief executive

Rezoning Delayed

An error in procedure has delayed again the rezoning of the 190-acre tract bounded by SR 427, the north city limits, a point dividing East Lake and a point east of West Lake

The rezoning from duplex classification to high residential petition by property owners in the area has been discussed at various times over the past five months. Although approved on a four-to-one vote, with Council Chairman Eugene Jaques casting the only negative vote,

Davis said the action had a procedural fault. The difficulty stemmed from the fact Mayor Kenneth Brown recommended that a section of the tract fronting on SR 427 beginning at lots 2 and 3 extending north to the city's boundaries be deleted from the request and be rezoned business district. He said nearby properties fronting the highway are currently commercially developed. Council included Brown's recommendation in the adopted motion approving the higher type residential zoning.

Davis recommended the "whole ball of wax" be readvertised to avoid any legal question. During the public hearing, attorney Gene R. Stephenson representing Dr. Stanley Rappaport, an owner in the area, warned court litigation might be filed if the city insisted on the higher residential rezoning

Stephenson said the 13-acre Rappaport section is under contract for purchase and considerable money has been spent for preliminary planning, etc. Dan Carr representing himself and a partner, Allen Pyle, buyers of the land, said it is contemplated to build duplexes at the site.

Motion of Crenshaw, a constant supporter of the rezoning, calling a moratorium on issuance of building permits for construction of duplexes in that area was approved unanimously. The moratorium is for 90 days or until an ordinance rezoning the tract is adopted.

Separate public hearings on both the residential and business district rezonings were set for 7 p.m., Aug. 31.





Indochina War Issue: Still Here

There is just no way that the Indochina war can be forgotten, downgraded or ignored in this presidential election year.

It is an issue which has plagued every such election since the Eisenhower years. To expect that it could be shoved to one side this year was naive, to say the least.

President Nixon, whose slim win over Senator Hubert H. Humphrey in '68 was certainly achieved with his assertion that he had a "plan to end the war" has done everything that seemed proper to him to bring the conflict to an

Yet here it is in August of 1972 and the war is still on. It has been expanded into Laos and Cambodia by Nixon. It has been transformed from a ground struggle with Americans being killed every week to an air war where losses of planes and skilled men is the rule.

There is a change in the debate, however, for those who see this issue as one which must be dealt with appear to be zeroing in on the "conduct" of the war as well as an end of fighting.

Three recent events allow this deduction. One is the hornet's nest of controversy which Democratic Vice-Presidential nominee Sargent Shriver (former Ambassador to France) stirred up in suggesting that Nixon lost a golden opportunity to end the war through negotiation in '69 when Hanoi appeared ready.

Again here is the return of former Attorney-General Ramsey Clark from a two weeks observation tour in North Vietnam. He found the results of the intense bombing which Nixon has authorized to be devestating to the natural resources of that area and damaging nonmilitary objectives.

Then there is the rather extraordinary juxtaposition of two military circumstances. One is the return of the last platoon of American "grunts" from combat so that it could be said truthfully that no American ground troops were in the Vietnam war.

However, on the day when the infantrymen were engaged in this final wind-down, the air was filled with American planes. The giant B-52s



Nixon Confident: Convention Nears

Copley News Service

MIAMI BEACH - Sen. George McGovern rode out of the South Dakota plains to the Democratic presidential nomination on the "end-the-war" issue. President Nixon hopes to turn it into a boomerang

The Republican Party platform that will soon take shape here is expected to emphasize domestic issues - welfare reform, revenue sharing, controlled federal spending, the expanding economy, restraints on school busing to achieve racial balance and government reorganization, but Mr. Nixon's personal theme will be "a generation of peace."

While McGovern asks for total withdrawal from Southeast Asia, giant cuts in the defense budget, troops withdrawals from Western Europe, and major foreign policy changes, Mr. Nixon will emphasize American involvement in a changing world.

To retreat from global responsibilities, he has told key GOP congressional leaders, would invite the very disasters aboard McGovern says he would avoid and also snuff out hopes for social progress at home.

Peace, in Mr. Nixon's view, rests on the delicate balance of power and interests that he sees emerging as a result of his summit visits to Peking and Moscow. Though he made the trips, he feels strongly that the unbending U.S. positions in the Middle East, Vietnam, Greece, Central Europe and Iran

convinced hard-pressed Red leaders that the moment for accommodation had arrived.

The stategic arms limitation agreement with the Soviet Union, he will argue, is only a timid first step back from the nuclear abyss. McGovern policies, he will tell the nation, will whet, not statisfy, Communist appetites for new dominions. "Why should Moscow - or Peking - consider curbs on nuclear arms if they think Washington is quitting the race?"

asks Sen James Buckley of New York. "The reaction would be quite the opposite. The temptation would be irresistable to plunge ahead and develop the kind of superiority that would intimidate the entire free

Mr. Nixon's clear-cut victories over McGovern in Senate votes on Trident submarine funds and the Democrat's proposed \$4 billion cut in defense spending have stiffened the President's resolve.

Republican campaign stategists are working on mail campaigns, television commercials and other advertising programs that will feature film clips and photos of Mr. Nixon in Peking and Moscow and at lesser summits with leaders of Western European, Asian and hemisphere nations. His cordial meetings with President Luis Echevarria of

Mexico will be emphasized in Mexican-American areas. His enthusiastic welcome in Warsaw and Bucharest will be featured in appeals to East European ethnic groups.

Modular Building Upturn Expected

The flood of mobile homes sweeping the nation in recent years has leveled off, while the new-era modular house is catching on at a rate indicating it someday may surpass even conventional home building in volume.

This is the view of Ray A. Watt, chairman of the National Corporation for Housing Partnerships created by Congress to speed development of homes for low- and moderate-income

A nationally recognized builder, Watt was appointed in 1969 by President Nixon to head the agency, part of the Housing and Urban Development Department (HUD). The mobile home industry blos-

somed about four years ago and attracted mostly older people," recalls Watt in an interview. "However, because of zoning and ther problems, it seems to have

reached its zenith. Even so we can expect it to produce some 500,000 additional units a year for some time to

That compares with the 2.1 million conventional housing starts in the last year, Watt points out. An adequate mobile home sells for \$12,000 to \$14,000 and requires state license fees and land rental of \$60 to \$100 a month, he explains. Modest conventional homes or attractive apartments cost about the same, Watt

He predicts the modular home built section by section at the factory, then hauled to the site to be put together - will push ahead of the mobile home

Financing for modulis can be spread over 30 years at 7 per cent interest. Mobile home financing is pegged on 10to 15-year loan maturity and up to 9 to 93, per cent interest For these reasons and others I think nodules will continue to appreciate and mobile homes will depreciate," Watt

Every year the gap between module and conventional housing starts is closing, he notes, and in time likely will overtake what builders call "stick" home construction. The module program got a big boost

under HUD's "Operation Breakthrough," which helped to push through a new state and local zoning and tax laws to accommodate this new approach to home building, Watt recalls. The module home is cheaper because it doesn't require the varieties of skilled labor needed 'or conventional construc-

"This is a housing evolution, not a revolution," Watt says. "Its greatest drawbacks so far are high research costs to develop better materials for modular construction and high transportation costs from factory to home

Posture: Just Sit

After extended discussions, the Nixon administration has decided to move very slowly and cautiously in the Middle East in the wake of Moscow's partial pullout from Egypt.

The United States will wait for President Anwar Sadat of Egypt and other Arab leaders to make known exactly what it is they want of the United States. As one high official put it privately, "We will wait for them to come to us."

American diplomats will not take the initiative. They are being instructed to tell the Arab countries to which they are accredited that President Nixon now believes the United States has carried the ball for too long in the Middle East and the leaders of each Arab country must decide, without suggestions from us, what relationship they will have with Washington and what role, if any, the Arab lands wish Nixon to play in the Arab-Israeli war. This relaxed U.S. attitude contrasts sharply with eager Washington moves early in the Arab-Israeli and India-West Pakistan conflicts. It is at sharp variance with the nistorical American belief that world and regional crises will inevitably erupt catastrophically unless American diplomats are in the ring pitching with both hands at all

But this new approach most certainly is in line with the Nixon doctrine which calls for countries in each region of the world to develop their own objectives, under their own leadership and initiative, then call on us for a what assistance or cooperation they need.

The go-slow Middle East policy is a result of the belief among analysts here that Egyptians, Libyans, Sudanese, Algerians and Yemeni are now exceedingly touchy about their independence and any type of big power intervention, crude or subtle, in the Arab-Israeli war or on vital economic issues such as oil or the Suez Canal. The U.S. stance also reflects a certain amount of wari-

ness. Sadat's order ousting thousands of Russians, some Washington officials worry, may be merely a technique aimed at getting more assistance from Moscow with less Russian interference in Egyptian affairs. But most American analysts are convinced that Sadat

and Egypt's intellectuals, students, businessmen and farmers are weary of conflict in the Middle East. They would like Egypt to get out of this mess and out of its role as a leader of the pan-Arab world-and on to the development of Egypt's economy and Egypt's own national role in the world. In this light, the new Egyptian alignment with Libya is

seen as facade. Sadat must go down the road verbally with Libya a certain distance because Libya's oil revenues, are used in part to aid Egypt. But Sadat's heart is not in a union, financially appealing as such an alliance would be. Sadat does not carry Gamal Abdel Nasser's pan-Arab dream on his back.



One "Gal's" Opinion Must the Elderly

Live in Fear? By AILEEN SNODDY

Life for many of the elderly is one of perplexed pathos when it should be a time of well-earned relaxation. Many men and women manage to husband their lifelong earnings by turning to less expensive types of housing. A number find homes in public housing developments ostensibly built to ease the heavy financial burden of those who no longer take part in the day-to-day race hat provides a regular income.

Many of the elderly want to continue their education and keep in touch with the community. They do so by attending classes in foreign languages, reading seminars and arts and crafts. Some do volunteer work to help others, such as reading to the blind, working in hospitals and even answering save-a-life (suicide) phone calls.

The elderly generally prefer to keep active. However, more and more report they are prisoners in their own houses or apartments-afraid to go out day or night for fear of being assaulted physically. And, according to a testimony before a congressional subcommittee, many live in terror of being raped, mugged, tortured and robbed within their own homes. They are easy prey. Their ultimate frustrations bubble to the surface as

more and more of the elderly feel that no one really cares about their plight. Supposedly the public housing developments are to be safe. Yet, too many are not. The victims know this all too well and their frustration leads them to cry for soldiers to patrol the streets and make it safe for them to live their declining years in a more peaceful atmosphere.

Is this too much to ask? Is it enough for a subcommittee to take testimony and document the tragedy of crime against the elderly?

Where, a victim of a mugger may ask from a hospital bed, are those in a village, town or metropolis whose responsibility it is to curb such crime? Isn't this a local problem and one that calls for strong community action? The generosity seen as strangers rushed to aid victims of Hurricane Agnes show that the feeling of neighborliness still exists. But must a community have a major holocaust before people act as though they care?

A little day-to-day action—perhaps a community patrol coupled with periodic calls on elderly neighbors-to protect the vulnerable and elderly seems wiser, kinder. A realistic review of community priorities does seem

McCall Murder . Trial Under Way

OCALA, Fla. (AP) — Saying, "That damned nigger isn't crazy," suspended Lake County Sheriff Willis McCall booted a black prisoner in the stomach so hard that it caused his death, prosecutor Robert Eagan told an all-white jury today. In his opening remarks at McCall's second-degree murder trial, Eagan said investigators learned from other inmates and a jailer that McCall kicked Tommy Vickers 37, of Miami "with great force" April 13, then had Vickers

placed in a small metal cell known as "the tank." Vickers lay in the Lake County Jail in obvious physical distress until April 20, when he was taken to a hospital in Tavares, Eagan said. Vickers died in the hospital April 23.

"That blow was not caused by a man being struck with a fist," Eagan said of the blow that allegedly caused Vickers' death. The first witness called was Lake County Sheriff

Frank Meech, appointed by Gov. Reubin Askew after McCall was suspended, who testified as to the date Vickers was arrested and the date he died. Following Meech to the stand was Lake County Deputy Albert Foster, who picked Vickers up in Miami on a warrant issued by a Lake County judge

and transported the prisoner to Tavares. Foster said Miami authorities told him Vickers needed leg irons because "this man is violent and he's given us problems. It took several men to "Friendly Season". . . just look subdue him." Koster said he handcuffed Vickers and drove him

- Gov. Rubin Askew today announced across the board 15 per cent increases in welfare payments for the state's elderly poor, blind and disabled 'minimize losses" from increases in Social Security.

Askew ordered the maximum payment allowed for a household with one eligible recipient raised from \$114 to \$121 per month; and for households with two or more recipients, from

"I feel strongly that, in an affluent society such as ours, we have an obligation to help the old, the blind and the disabled," said Askew.

He said the money would come from within the \$99 million in state and federal funds appropriated by the 1972 Legislature for the operation of the public assistance program. Askew noted that the recent 20 per cent increase in Social Security benefits had an ironic

effect on welfare recipients:

welfare they could receive. He said the Social Security increases would have knocked 9,000 Floridians off the public assistance rolls. "By taking this action," he said, "there will be approximately 1,760 removed



Presently, Florida ranks 38th in aid to the blind, 35th in aid to the disabled and 42nd in aid to the elderly among the 56 states. "Even with this increase Florida will still be below average, 32nd for the blind, 27th for the disabled and 29th for the

elderly," said Askew. Other increases included in Askew's order were: from \$50 to \$62 in shelter allowance; \$5 to \$8 clothing allowance; and \$11.50 to \$14.50 for household
